ry School Child Must Be Vaccinated, Is Order Of Board

An effort to ward off a possible epidemic here, after sporadic outbreaks of cases in the city for several weeks, and appearance of one in the Central Ward school line, the school board of the city independent school district ordered that every school child in the city schools here must be vaccinated.

There is little cause for alarm at the time, Dr. J. W. Rollo, city health officer, said today, and with proper cooperation of parents, no further outbreaks of the disease is feared, but Dr. Rollo urged that every school child be vaccinated in the situation.

A small girl, affected with the disease, was found in a room at the Central Ward building, but the disease was discovered in early stages, the girl was thoroughly disinfected, and a precautionary step taken by authorities. Although several children in the building were in company with the girl, officials are not alarmed.

Rollo asked today that parents of school and city officials in the situation plan, saying that no danger whatever will be caused by such measures, and that it may be the means of warding off an epidemic. Three houses have been quarantined this week, but other cases have been reported.

EL PASO, TEXAS, Jan. 14 (AP).—Now that Commissioner Landis has exonerated the baseball players accused of participating in a "sloughed" series between Detroit and Chicago in 1917, Chick Gandil doesn't see now the baseball rule "Can do anything but vindicate Ty Cobb charged with betting on an alleged fixed game."

NEW YORK, Jan. 14 (AP).—Pugilistic dynamite that blasted the immediate welterweight championship aspirations of Joe Dundee a few weeks ago will be planted in front of the Baltimore challenger once more tonight at Madison Square Garden.

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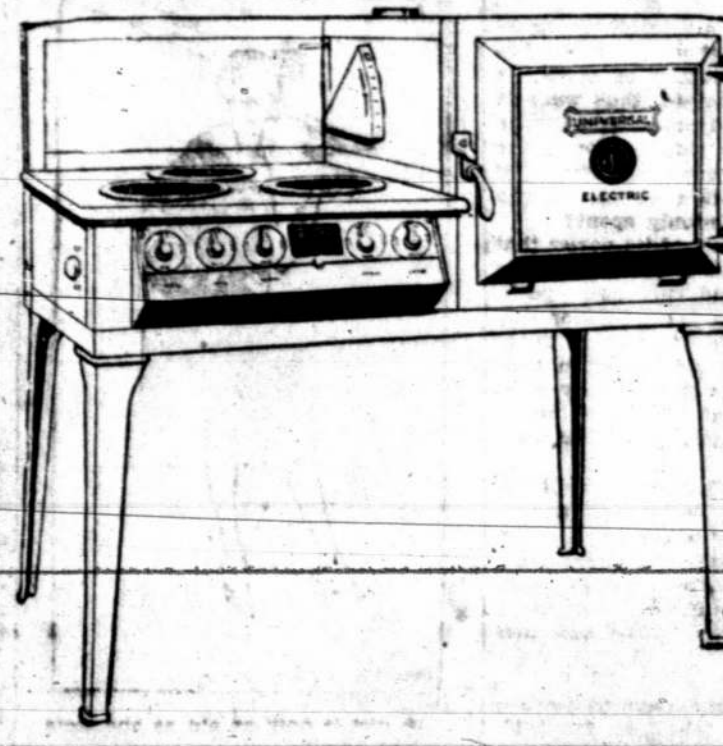

Don't Be Apathetic Toward Measles!

It is a common superstition, among the uninformed, that a child must have measles sooner or later and that therefore it is unnecessary to take steps to avoid this disease.

This attitude must be characterized as nothing short of homicidal. In 1920, 19,000 children died in the United States from measles and at least as many died from bronchial pneumonia following measles, or later from tuberculosis.

Other thousands recovered from the disease, but with such complications as weak eyes and running ears.

Measles is not most contagious at the time when the patient is peeling or having a fine granular scaling of the skin after the disease.

The time when the disease is most easily spread is at the period when the person is just beginning to "come down" with it. Since a bad cough or cold may be one of the first symptoms of measles, a child with a bad cough should not be allowed to come in contact with other children.

Most epidemics of measles occur during the cold months, probably because people are crowded together under conditions that do not exist in the warmer months. Windows are kept closed and the air is not changed.

In 1848, a man with measles landed on the Faroe Islands, a place in which the disease had not previously occurred. On the islands at that time there were 7782 people and 6000 of them developed the disease. The condition is not likely to spread to this extent among persons in this country, since many of them have a natural resistance to the disease which comes to them with the blood of their parents and with the milk of the mother. However, so many do not have resistance that it is well to give them every protection possible.

Since 10,000 children died from measles in 1920, it is likely that about one million had the disease. The severity of measles varies from time to time—in the years when its severity is not great, the mortality rate is much lower than in other years.

Until the cause of this disease is definitely determined, and until means of prevention have been worked out, similar to those now available for diphtheria and scarlet fever, it will continue to be one of the most serious dangers of childhood.

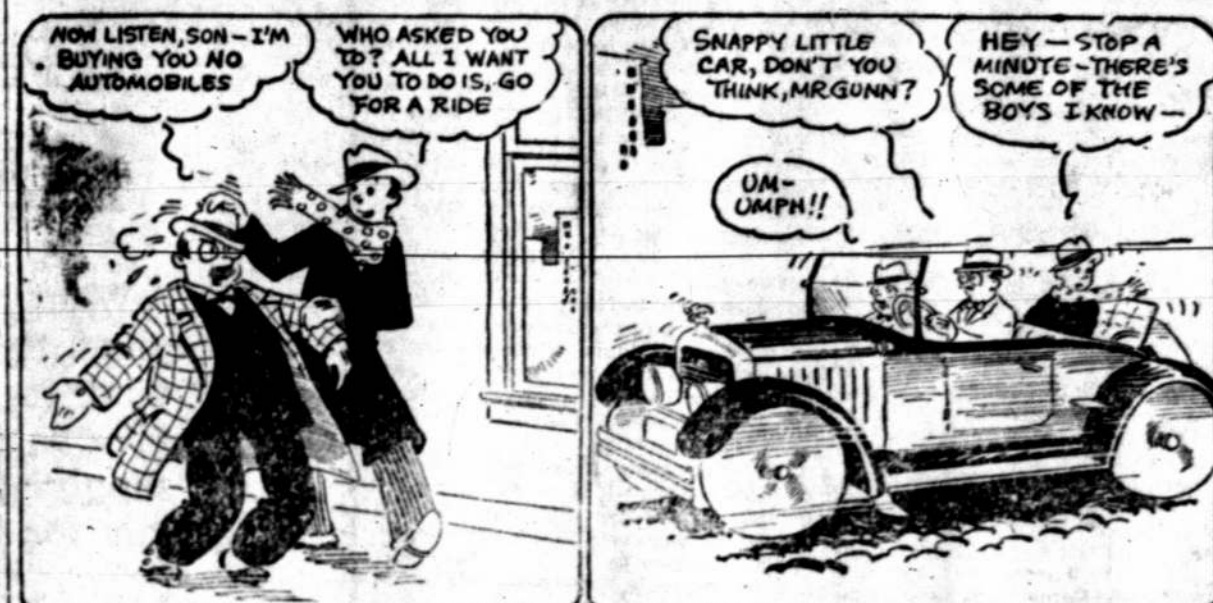
