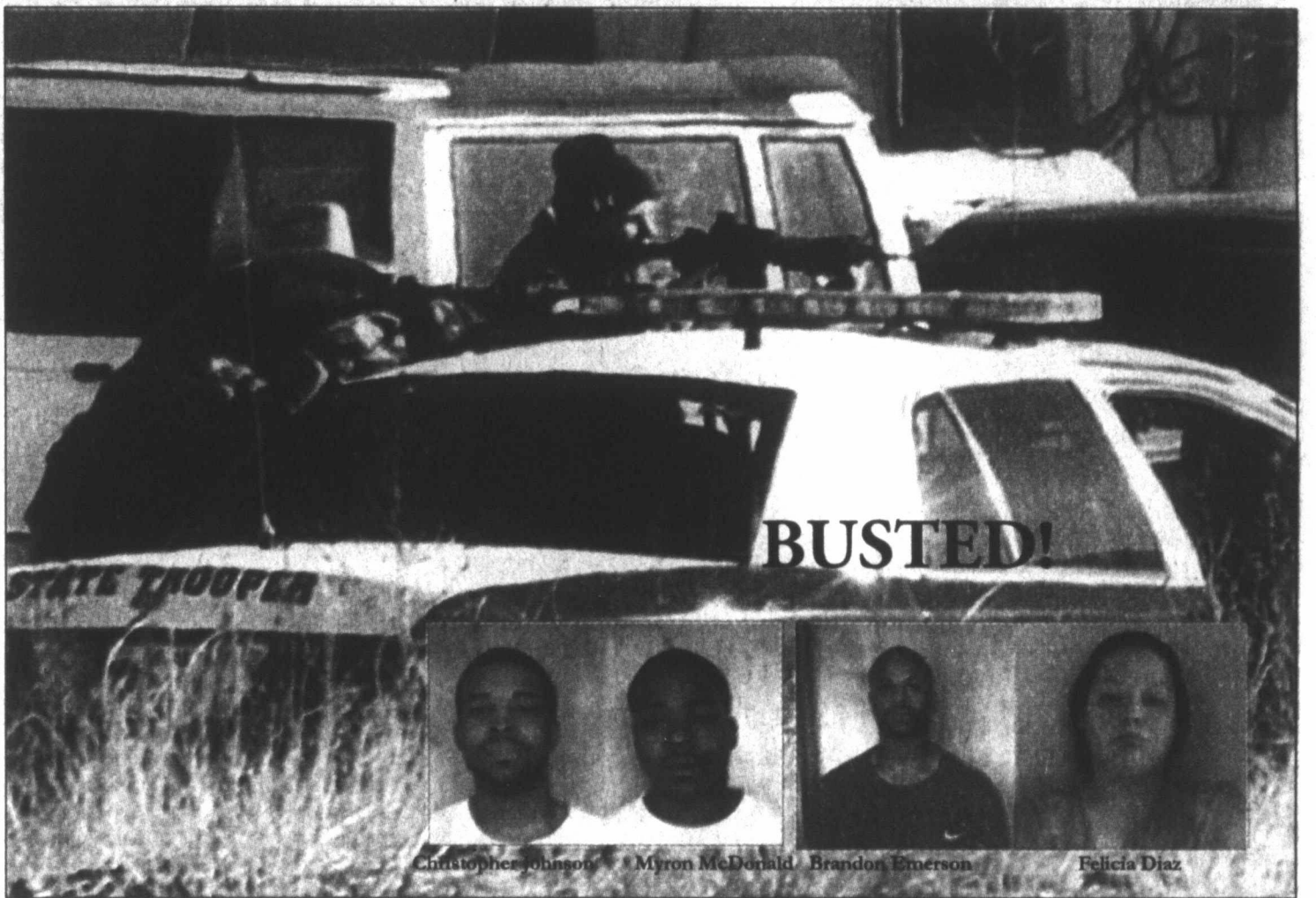
Shooting suspects arrested with no shots fired

It started before sunrise Monday morning with a high-speed chase, ending only after a SWAT team breached a house in Colorado City more than 20 hours later. Tuesday morning, the three suspects are in jail, under charges of attempted capital murder. Two local residents, Brandon Emerson and Felicia Diaz, both 24, were arrested and charged for felony hindering apprehension.

"We believe these two were instrumental in bringing the three suspects from Nolan County to Colorado City," Mitchell County Sheriff Patrick Toombs said. "We are just relieved we got these guys."

The three suspects arrested in the house on Austin were Christopher Johnson (24) and Myron McDonald (22), both from Oklahoma City. These two, along with a 16 year-old suspect, are believed to be the three individuals in the car which fired on the state trooper earlier in the

New businesses already arriving in county

Before last week's city council meeting Amie Wood was asked to work something up to let the city get a better understanding of what can be expected as far as new businesses are concerned. What she returned with was more than any of them could have expected at this point.

Wood told the council of 13 businesses which had already opened shop in and around Colorado City in just the last

three months. Nato's Barbecue, Freshwater Texas, Universal Oil Well Service and TRN Welding, Fabrication Trailer Sales and Energy Services were among those on the list, along with TAZ Services, Neff Cranes, Craig Moss Backhoe Services and Stevens Oilfield Service.

In addition, the city also saw the opening of Got to Go Solutions, HW Services, Illixir Technology Solutions (ITS) and the

Rooster Cafe. Patriot Mudlogging made the list, but Wood said they had been in town longer than three months, as they were one of the first which came to this area.

"This is a list of businesses in Mitchell County," Wood said. "I have also added a list of businesses we can expect to be opening within this year."

The second list contained the names of an additional 12 busi-

nesses which have been working toward opening doors in the area. Those listed were the new Stripes Travel Center, Lone Wolf RV, Riverside RV, C-City RV, the Lantana Apartment Homes and JSP Steel Buildings.

Also listed was the new Medicine Place, which is relocating to the I-20 service road, an expanded Western Suites, the county's new gas-powered power plant, along with what is now believed

to be four new hotels. "These businesses are already in the area, spending their money getting involved in the community," Wood said. "We have had about 20 businesses open their doors since 2010. The difference is staggering when you look at what has already and what is about to happen here."

Wood also took the opportunity to remind the city that these

Relief in sight for housing crunch?

One of the main concerns in Colorado City and the surrounding area amidst all the talk of an oil boom is where to put all the workers. It is no secret there is a limited amount of housing readily available and with talk of hundreds — if not thousands — of workers heading this way, it poses a huge problem.

But one company, Turn Key Solutions, may have a solution it seems. David Ferguson says the company has plans to provide a much needed solution to the problem. Ferguson plans

to construct an 80-person housing facility in the currently open field just off of 17th Street, between the high school and Santiago's Restaurant.

"There is a large workforce coming in," Ferguson said. "Quality housing is vastly needed in Colorado City."

The housing will be provided for oilfield workers, with units to house one employee or multiple workers. According to Ferguson, the company will not rent the housing to individuals, but instead to oilfield companies directly.

Ferguson went on to say the facility would have 24-hour security as well as surveillance cameras, with residents not allowed to have visitors, guests or alcohol on the premises. He also added that the workers, when not on the rigs, would have a curfew to be back in the facility.

Ferguson said the facilities would be of the same quality, and answering to the same guidelines, as a motel or apartment building. "They will adhere strictly to IBC and IRC

Construction on oil storage tanks to begin

The Magellan Midstream Partners have announced the location of the new million barrel storage facility Colorado City has been expecting. The facility will be located just off of Hwy 208, just north of the Mitchell and Scurry County lines.

Bruce Heine, director of media affairs for Magellan, said the construction will be starting in six to eight weeks, with the actual date to begin flowing crude oil from Colorado City to the Houston area beginning in mid-2014.

The BridgeTex Pipeline is supported by long-term transportation commitments received during its re-

cent successful open season and has received a favorable order from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission approving the tariff structure for the pipeline.

The BridgeTex Pipeline will be capable of transporting up to 300,000 barrels per day of crude oil, with access to Houston Ship Channel refineries, Texas City refineries and other refineries throughout the Gulf Coast via third-party pipelines. The BridgeTex Pipeline project includes construction of the following energy infrastructure:

• Approximately 400 miles of 20-inch pipeline from Colorado City to

Magellan's terminal in East Houston;

• Approximately 1.2 million barrels of crude oil storage at Colorado City and 1.4 million barrels of crude oil storage at East Houston to facilitate pipeline movements; and

• Nearly 50 miles of 24-inch pipeline between East Houston and Texas City.

The BridgeTex Pipeline is expected to begin service by mid-2014, subject to necessary permitting. A joint project team will oversee the BridgeTex Pipeline project, with Magellan serving as the construction manager and operator of the BridgeTex Pipeline.

County authorized for emergency grazing

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Mitchell County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director, Keith Hiser recently announced that Mitchell County was authorized for emergency grazing use of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres for fiscal year (FY) 2013. This authorization brings the total to 53 counties approved to graze CRP acres.

The CRP emergency grazing authorization for fiscal year 2013 begins immediately for a 90 day period, not to exceed February 28, 2013.

Based on a decision made by the Texas FSA State Committee, CRP emergency grazing

approval will only be available for those CRP lands that were not utilized for haying or grazing during fiscal year 2011 or 2012. FSA's fiscal year runs from October 1 to September 30.

"Eligible producers who are interested in emergency grazing of CRP must request approval before grazing eligible acreage and obtain a modified conservation plan from the Natural Resources Conservation Service that includes grazing provisions," said Hiser. "Current provisions allow grazing on 100 percent of a field, up to the 75 percent stocking rate," he said.

Additionally, there will be a 25 percent CRP payment reduction for CRP acres used for grazing under these emergency provisions.

To take advantage of the emergency grazing provisions, authorized producers can use the CRP acreage for their own livestock or may grant another livestock producer use of the CRP acreage. The eligible CRP acreage is limited to acres located within the approved county.

Texas counties declared disaster areas

USDA Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA) Acting Executive Director James B. Douglass announced that 56 counties in Texas were declared a disaster on January 16, due to drought and heat using the new, streamlined Secretarial Disaster Designation process. Under this designation, producers with operations in any of the 11 primary disaster counties or 45 contiguous disaster counties are eligible to apply for low interest emergency loans.

In Texas, 207 counties were previously declared a disaster on January 9, 2013, under a separate Secretarial Disaster Designation.

The streamlined disaster designation process issues a drought disaster declaration when a county has experienced a drought intensity value of at least a D2 (severe drought) level for eight consecutive weeks based on the U.S. Drought Monitor during the crop year. Under this declaration, 11 counties in Texas have reached that threshold since Nov. 1, 2012.

The following 11 counties were Blanco, Coke, Franklin, Glasscock, Gonzales, Llano, McCulloch, Mason, Medina, Sterling and Uvalde.

Mitchell County has been designated as one of the 45 contiguous disaster counties.

"The disaster designation is welcome relief to producers because it allows all qualified operators in primary and contiguous counties to apply for a low interest emergency (EM) loan,"

said Douglass.

Emergency loans help producers recover from production and physical losses due to drought, flooding and other natural disasters or quarantine.

Producers have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for emergency loan assistance. FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability. Producers can borrow up to 100 percent of actual production or physical losses, to a maximum amount of \$500,000. The current emergency loan interest rate is 2.25 percent.

Producers with operations in counties that did not receive a disaster designation could be eligible for emergency loan assistance if they suffered at least a 30 percent loss in crop production or a physical loss to livestock, livestock products, real estate or chattel property.

Blackboard keeps city connected

The Colorado City Police Department and the City of Colorado City would like to remind all citizens in the community, particularly those who may be new residents, of the availability of the Blackboard Connect Mass Notification service. This is a free service which gives city staff the ability to notify com-

munity members of emergency situations, utility service interruptions, traffic conditions or problems, etc.

To accept this service requires at least one phone number to be registered in the program. When a notification is released, it will be sent to all registered numbers via voice call, text and/or email.

TUMBLEWEED SMITH The woman who saved the Alamo

Debra Winegarten of Austin has written a book about Clara Driscoll, known as Savior of the Alamo.

"She was an amazing woman," says Debra. "I like to say she was born having won the lottery. Her father Robert Driscoll was one of the early ranchers and bankers near Corpus Christi. We're talking about the mid 1800's. When farmers and ranchers came to his bank, he would lend them money. When it came time for them to pay him back, he told them they could either pay him in money or land. He preferred land. So he got a lot of it and wouldn't you know it, oil was discovered on some of his land and overnight the guy was a zillionaire."

His daughter Clara was born in 1883 and raised on a ranch called La Gloria near Corpus. He sent her to New York and Europe for an education. It was during the Spanish-American War and most of the Americans fled back to the US, but Clara changed her name and passed herself off as a Spaniard. She had an exciting life, but what she is best known for is saving the Alamo.

"In the early 1900's a liquor company bought the Alamo convent with the thought of tearing it down and building a liquor store on the site. Clara ends up buying the property. She put down a check for \$5,000 of her own money, then goes back to Corpus and tells her father the story about buying the Alamo. Her father thought it was a stupid move but was proud of his daughter for doing it, so he made sure there was money in her checking account each month so she could make the installment payments."

A couple of years later Clara went before the Texas legislature and petitioned it to buy the Alamo back from her so she could donate it to the state. In 1905 the state reimbursed Driscoll. Until then, the only Alamo property owned by the state was the mission church. That same year, 1905, the entire Alamo property was handed over to the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, which controlled it until last year when the Texas General Land Office took over the facility.

The congressman who agreed to present her case before the legislature was Henry Sevier. He and his client fell in love, got married, honeymooned in Europe for three months and took up residence in Austin. They divorced in the late 1930's.

She was active in politics and women's groups. She was a Democratic Committee woman from Texas for 16 years and was the honorary life president of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. In 1943 she deeded her Austin residence, Laguna Gloria, to the Texas Fine Arts Association. Today it houses an art school and museum. She set up the Driscoll Foundation to provide a hospital and free clinic for sick and crippled children. The Driscoll Children's Hospital still operates in Corpus Christi.

Clara wrote two books and a comedic opera that had a short run on Broadway. She died in 1945. Her body lay in state at the Alamo and Texas flags were at half-staff.

A county properly armed

If you want to see how it will work, simply look at his hometown of Chicago. They have the strictest gun laws in the country and the highest crime rate. I believe even the kids would call that an epic fail.

As it relates to the standoff in Colorado City, I want to bring something to your attention. The guys in the building, the ones who had taken shots at a DPS officer, were already criminals. The weapons they had were not obtained through channels any gun regulation could have stopped. So it brings back the familiar argument: Criminalize guns and then only the

criminals will have guns. No thanks.

While this incident worked out well, with some incredibly patient and thought-out tactics by all those men and women involved with our local and area law enforcement, I shudder to think what could have happened, had they not been able to locate these individuals quickly.

The one thing which does, in fact, help me sleep at night is that I know all too well how armed and prepared Mitchell County was as this event transpired over the course of 20 hours. I could not then, nor could I possibly see in the future, the possibility of someone in Mitchell County being caught unaware and unprepared. I was there when the Heart of Texas Museum opened its gun exhibit. The county's residents showed up in throngs with some phenomenal weapons. Do not fool yourself into thinking these 'boys out here in the desert are simply helpless victims.

No, I like my neighbors properly armed as much as I like the idea of Chief Owens having more than ten bullets. In the midst of the standoff, before I was asked to move back out of shooting range, I felt as safe as I could possibly be. Right now, in Texas and especially Mitchell County, I feel the same way at home. And it is that feeling, as much, if not more than the guns themselves, that I ask this president to not take away from us.

Seriously, stop what you are doing now, before it is too late.

Help with medicine is available to senior citizens

If you've ever gone a day without your medications or cut your pills in half to make them last a little longer, there may be relief for you. People on a tight budget can get help paying for the premiums, deductible and co-payments in their Medicare drug plan.

About 10 million people — about one in three people with Medicare drug coverage — now enjoy the break. But another 2 million may qualify for the help yet don't even realize it. They're missing out on hundreds, maybe thousands, of dollars in savings each year.

Recent changes in the law make it easier than ever to qualify for the "extra help" program. Even if you applied and didn't qualify before, you may be eligible now. The amount of additional assistance you'd receive depends on your income and resources.

If you qualify for full help, you'll pay no more than \$2.65 for a generic drug and \$6.60 for a brand-name drug. If you qualify for partial help, you'll pay no more than 15 percent of the cost of your drugs. The program is estimated to save someone \$4,000 a year on average.

So, if you're having difficulty affording your prescriptions, it's worth checking out.

To get the subsidy, your resources can't be more than \$13,070 if you're single or \$26,120 if you're a married couple living together.

Bank accounts, stocks and bonds count as resources, but homes, cars and personal belongings do not.

Also, your annual income can't be more than \$16,755 if you're single or \$22,695 if you're a married couple living to-

gether.

If you support family members who live with you, however, your income can be higher.

In addition, the government won't count any money you receive from friends or family for household expenses like food, rent, mortgage payments, utilities and property taxes.

Does that sound like you? Then give yourself a break and apply. Or if you have parents or other loved ones whom you think might benefit, reach out to them. Helping them save money on their prescriptions is one of the best things you could do for them.

There are three ways to sign up for extra help:

Visit the Social Security website, socialsecurity.gov/extra-help. The online application offers step-by-step instructions and lets you work at your own pace.

Call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-3213, to apply over the phone or request an application. Ask for Form SSA-1020, fill it out and return it by mail.

Go to your local Social Security office and request help.

It's not hard to complete the form. But you'll need your Social Security number and information about your bank balances, pensions and investments. Social Security will review your application and send you a letter within a few weeks letting you know whether you qualify.

When you sign up for extra help, Social Security can also assist you in applying for state-run programs that pay for some of your other Medicare costs. Those are called Medicare Savings Programs, and depending on your resources and income, they can help cover the out-of-pocket costs for other parts of Medicare.

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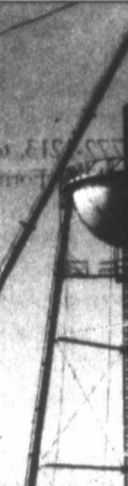

day. Once the individuals had been confirmed to be in the building, the water and electricity was shut off, as member after member of SWAT team personnel arrived and prepared to breach the building.

When a second tactical team arrived in an armored vehicle shortly after 11 p.m. Monday night, the suspects' time in the building was already shortening.

Just after midnight, the team deployed flash grenades and then entered the building, where they took the three suspects into custody without incident.

It had all begun shortly after 6 a.m. Monday when Texas State Trooper Frank Casares attempted to stop a vehicle traveling at speeds in excess of 100 mph three miles west of Westbrook. The vehicle, registered in Oklahoma, pulled over, but when the trooper approached the vehicle, the driver fired three shots at him and then sped away, prompting the high-speed chase.

The officers, Texas DPS, Mitchell County Sheriff's Office and Colorado City Police Department, chased the vehicle east, before losing sight of it near Loraine. The vehicle was later discovered on FM 1230 in Nolan County. FM 1230 is the first Farm to Market road as you enter Nolan County off of I-20.

Just before 2 p.m. Tuesday afternoon, phone calls to law enforcement confirmed that the three individuals had been seen in a house on Austin Street in southeast Colorado City. When law enforcement arrived at the location, the three men began barricading themselves inside the house. The house, once known as

Big Mama's Cafe, is now known by some locals as an illegal bar/drug house.

"It sort of reminds you of a club house for criminals," Colorado City resident JoAnn Richtel said of the house. "I am not sure why the house has not been torn down by now."

According to interim city manager David Hoover, that would be just fine.

"I would love to see the house torn down," Hoover said Tuesday morning. "Hopefully, we can get that accomplished."

Along with officers from Colorado City Police Department, Mitchell County Sheriff's Office and the Texas Department of Public Safety, help arrived from the Texas Rangers, Nolan County Sheriff's Office, Sweetwater Police Department, Scurry County Sheriff's Office and Howard County Sheriff's Department, along with EMS teams from Scurry and Mitchell counties. A helicopter from the Texas DPS was also on location, providing intense lighting on the building.

"It was a large concentrated effort by many departments," Toombs said. "We are thankful for all of them and everything they did."

Sheriff Toombs said some of the details are still being investigated about the incident, including the connection to Colorado City residents. The possibility of more arrests stemming from this investigation is very conceivable.

"We are still going through the house," Toombs said. "We will have to wait until the investigation is finished before we will know everything."

these businesses were really nothing more than the tip of the iceberg, as Colorado City can expect many more oilfield related businesses to appear before the boom is over.

"The drilling companies themselves, as well as water hauling companies and heavy equipment companies, can be expected," she said. "We can expect to see fracking companies, more hotels and restaurants, as well as home builders."

Wood stressed to the city

the need for an improved infrastructure to prepare for the arrival of these new companies.

"With opportunities come challenges," she told them. "How much can we realistically house at this point? Currently, we are at 76 percent on the sewer services. That does not include possibly 120 new units, hotels, the new law enforcement center, restaurants, these are not included. We are in the red as far as needing to move forward."

Wood told the council the city was at about 76 percent for water as well and that the water would be depleted quicker than the sewer services with the companies moving in.

"Currently, we don't have the infrastructure to meet the new businesses which are coming here," she said. "They want to be here, in this central location. Unfortunately, we have some challenges to meet that. We don't have very much housing," Wood said she had talked

with 12 people who wanted to invest in or build RV parks in the city, but with the current infrastructure, it would not be easily accomplished.

"One thing we need to consider is that everything is about to go up, our property values, water and sewer funds, our sales taxes. We are already seeing a change in these. We can expect much more," she said. "Growth is inevitable at this point. We need to get ready for for what looks like the reality."

codes," he said.

Interim city manager David Hoover spoke highly of the project, hoping it would add some needed relief to the potential housing shortage in Colorado City's.

"We want to be sure we can get something the town can be proud of," Hoover said. "Like I said before in city council meetings, I don't want a bunch of mobile homes which have been subdivided."

Hoover said he watched Ferguson's presentation at the Colorado City Lions Club on Friday, a pre-

sentation which showed as many single-dwelling homes as multiple-worker facilities, and Hoover liked what he saw.

"As you know, we have to provide housing for the prison, housing they can afford," Hoover said. "They're having to bring people in and they are short housing. We certainly don't want to risk losing our prisons, which have been a very welcomed partner with the city and county over the last two decades."

Hoover was asked how the process would work for the single

family homes, if the city would purchase the homes and then sell or rent them out. He said he did not see that happening.

"No, we are not going to go into the housing business," Hoover said. "They would have to be the ones who build the houses and bring them in and set them up. We do have a lot of lots we have been hoping to get rid of, which would make great future home sites."

Hoover said he particularly liked the idea of using some of

the crew housing facilities, which come equipped with laundry room, kitchen, etc., being used in the future, perhaps after the oil boom subsides, for senior citizens.

"I know there's a waiting list to get in the senior citizens center," he said. "That might be something we can use them for in the future. I just want to see some quality built structures come into the city, and by just looking at their specs and the presentation Friday, I believe these will be."

KCCCB annual meeting set January 28

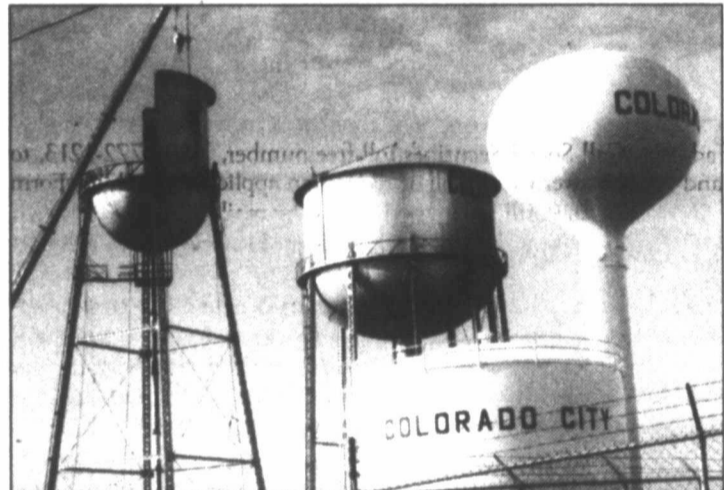
Keep Colorado City Beautiful will hold the annual meeting and meal on Monday, January 28th at 5 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church.

Cline Shale meetings grow

Crowds are growing at the monthly Cline Shale meetings held in Snyder at The Coliseum, according to a story that ran in the *Snyder Daily News* last Thursday. According to the daily paper, more than double the usual number were in attendance at the meeting which was held Wednesday, January 16th.

Representatives from Snyder, Sweetwater, Colorado City, Abilene, Brownwood, Roscoe, Hermleigh, Lubbock, Loraine and Texas Tech University attended the session. Tom Pauken, Texas Workforce Commission chairman and Rep. Charles Perry, R-Lubbock, addressed the group and addressed the shortage of skilled workers.

"Much of our education system is teaching toward tests for students who want to go to four-year colleges. It doesn't take into account what schools are doing in technical education and some students learn differently and don't want to go to college," he said. "I encourage local community colleges to partner with school districts on developing skilled workers."

Pauken added that local school districts should have control of the education system and have a greater flexibility with courses.

Perry said that he felt the state, in spending more than \$500 million for testing "was over-testing." Representatives from each community also made brief statements, mainly noting they are preparing for a boom based on projections of the Cline Shale oil play.

Sue Young, director of the Board of Economic Development in Mitchell County, said that Colorado City is focusing on housing for both single- and multi-family homes. "We're preparing for the people we think are coming in," she said.

Ken Becker, executive director of the Sweetwater Enterprise

for Economic Development, said the community has an 88-acre industrial park that saw little activity over the years, but the last lot was sold Tuesday.

That was the same sentiment of Bill Lavers, executive director of the Development Corporation of Snyder. He said lots in the SnTx Industrial Park could not be given away in the past, but now he has businesses calling on a daily basis inquiring about lots.

Snyder ISD Superintendent Dr. Randy Brown said the district is experiencing growth and has plans for a new campus. He added that the administration also realizes there could be a decline in the student population later.

"We're working to deal with any possibility," Brown said. "If we build a new campus, then

we close an older campus sooner than later."

Scurry County Judge Ricky Fritz said the county recently selected an engineering firm for a new subdivision known as the Maverick West Addition.

"We're looking to contract with the firm next week and our goal is to have the first 100 lots ready as soon as possible," he said.

Loraine is also gearing up for what leaders hope is a boom. The community is also making land available for development.

Gary Robinett summed up his comments by stating that Abilene is just on the edge of the projected boom, but is seeing some activity.

"But we're trying to figure out what's real and what isn't real," he said.

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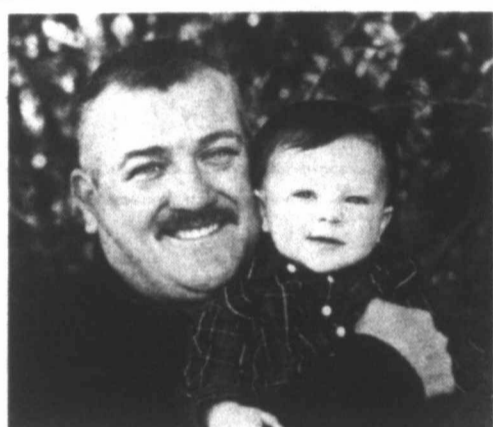

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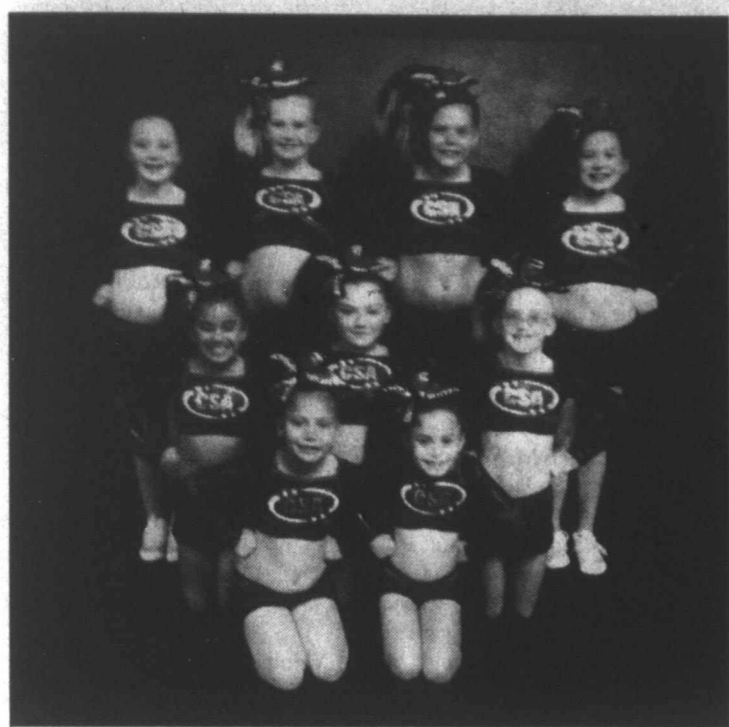
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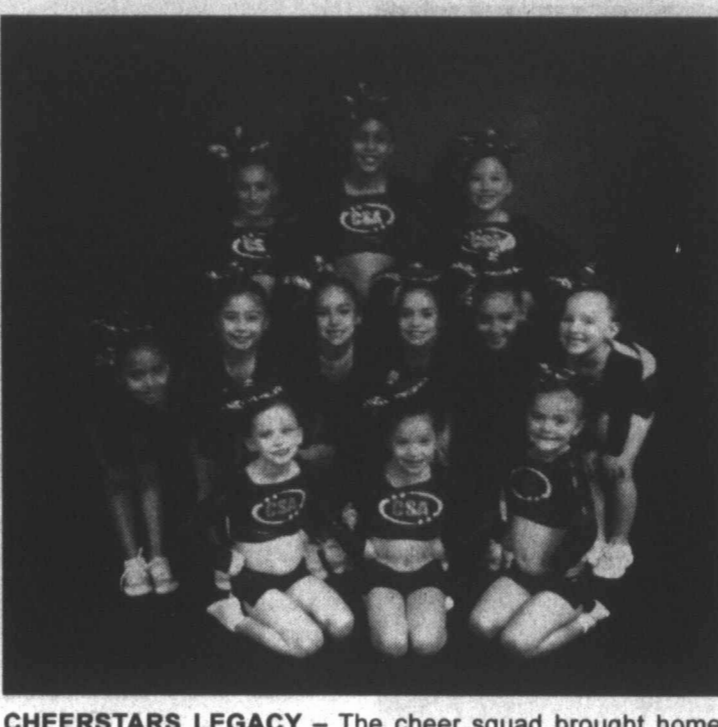

Freshman Bre Beltran took 3rd place in the 123 pound class behind Lendermon, while Haley Maxwell, in the 165 pound class, took 2nd place.

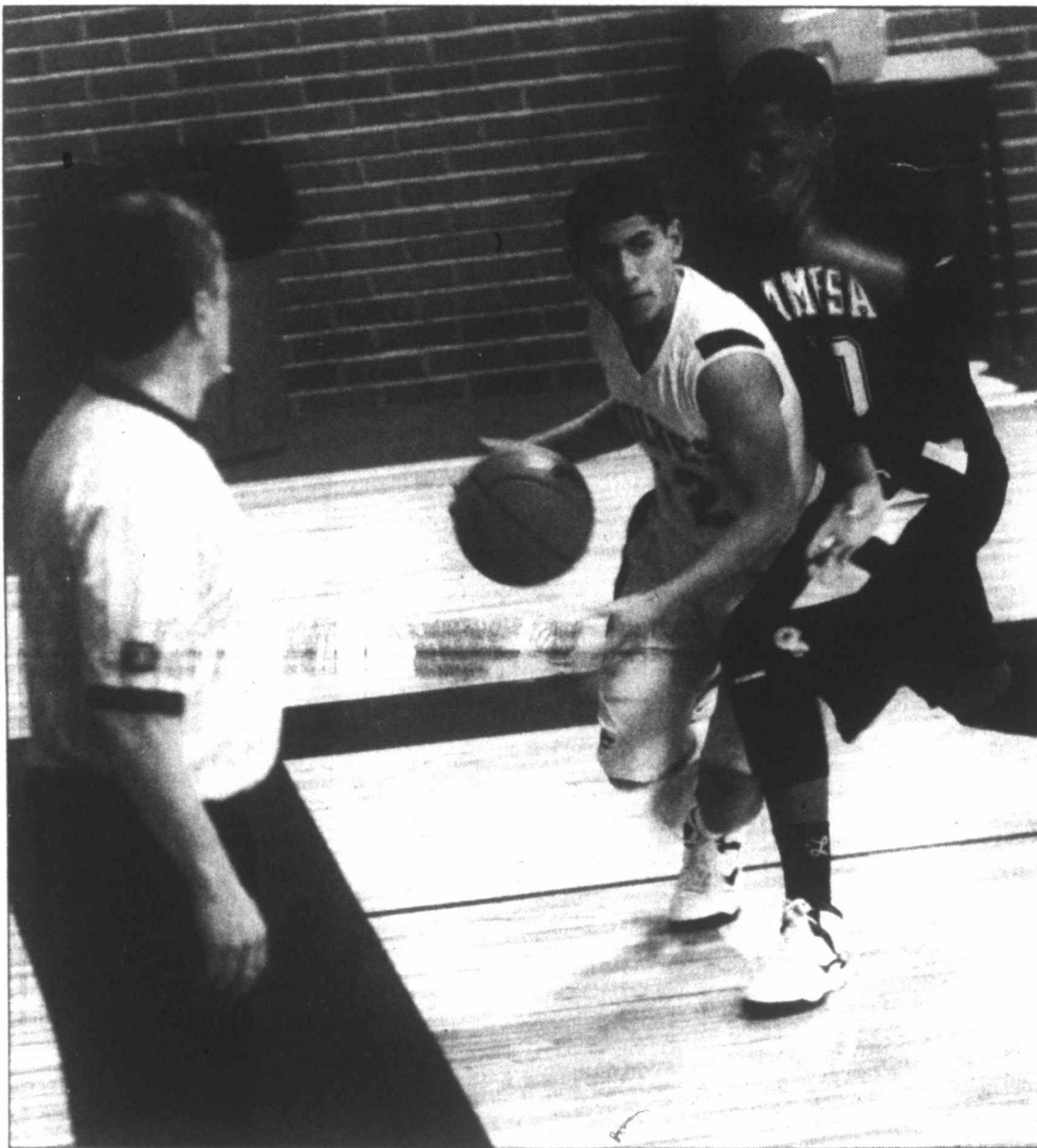
Jazzlynn Mendoza and Jasmin Mendoza took 2nd and 3rd place in the 198-pound class respectively.

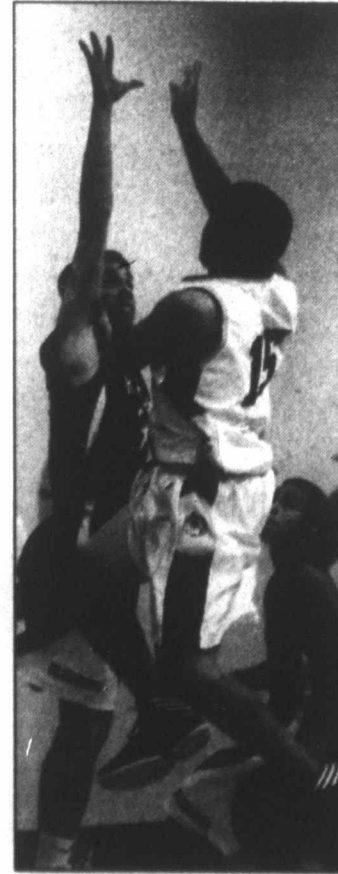
Duncan and Mark Munoz each were good for three points in the game, while Lewis put up two.

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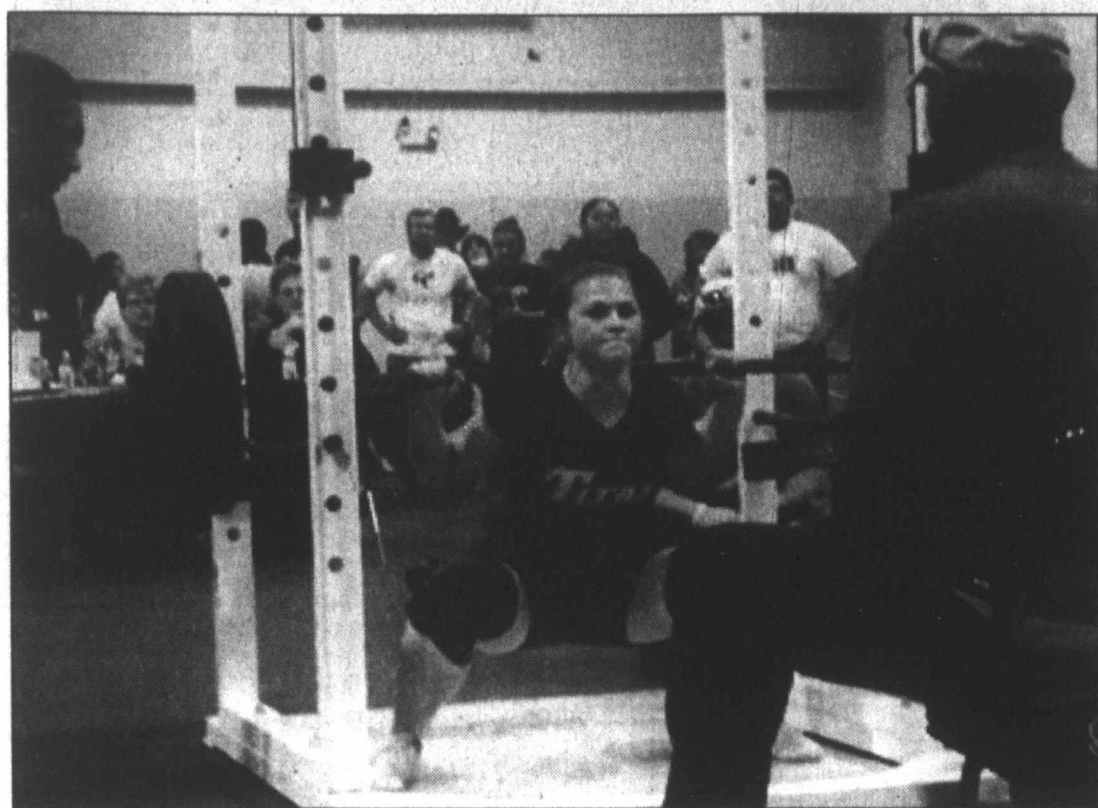

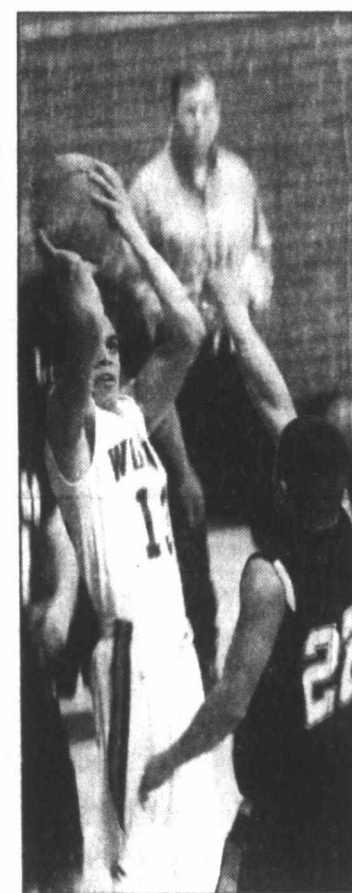
