Many Texas Teachers Work Without License

To cut hair, a barber must be licensed. To practice medicine, a doctor must be certified. To practice law, a lawyer must be licensed. Even to drive a taxicab or a truck, a man must pass certain standards.

But, a man or woman may teach school in Texas without having any sort of license.

These conditions have been reported to the Gilmer-Aikin Committee by the Citizen's Advisory Committees of Texas. It is necessary to have a license if a teacher is to be paid from State funds. However, a person can start a private school of his own and teach the boys and girls of Texas without any supervision from the State school authorities at all. Texas children deserve protection from such practices.

Certificates which are issued may be obtained without taking so much as an hour of college training. County examinations are still held regularly. Even certain cities have the right to grant certificates in Texas.

The Citizen's Advisory Committee feels that these conditions should be corrected.
