## Two-Day Session Is Planned Here

Plans were complete today for the annual meeting of the Cisco District Conference of the Methodist Church at the local First Methodist Church on Wednesday night, Nov. 4, and all day Thursday, Nov. 5, the Rev. Leslie Seymour, district superintendent, announced today.

The program will begin with a men's banquet at 6:30 p. m. Wednesday. The Rev. J. Daniel Barron of Wichita Falls will be the speaker. Following the banquet, there will be a service of worship in the sanctuary, featuring a massed choir in a 30-minute period of hymn singing under the direction of Jack Chambliss of Cisco.

As a special number, the choir will present Fred Waring's arrangement of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic."

Dr. William C. Finch, president of Southwestern University at Georgetown, will preach a sermon on the subjects, "The Strategy of a Christian in Time of Crisis."

The business session of the conference will begin at 9 a. m. Thursday. At 11 a. m., Dr. E. F. Bohmfalk, Fort Worth district superintendent, will preach.

There will be a meeting of the women of the district at 1 p. m. in charge of the district president of the WSCS, Mrs. Vernon Deffebach, Ranger.

Two young men, Dan and Don Jobe, twin brothers of Scranton, have applied for license to preach and it is expected that the district conference will grant the license.

Matters of business will include reports from the pastors as well as from various committees and boards, Rev. Seymour said. Plans will be announced for the campaign to secure \$100,000 for Texas Wesleyan College of Fort Worth and Southwestern University of Georgetown, both schools within the bonds of the Central Texas Conference.

Several hundred visitors are expected here for the conference.

## LOCAL COMMITTEE DISCUSSES AREA HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENTS

A delegation from the Cisco Chamber of Commerce met with the Eastland County Commissioner's Court at the courthouse Monday morning to discuss improvements for the Breckenridge Highway north of Cisco.

Since the designation of the road as a federal north-south highway, it is desirable to straighten the reverse curve some seven miles north of Cisco, Chairman George Davis of the Chamber of Commerce highway committee told the court.

The state highway department has allocated funds for improving the road and has asked the county to obtain the necessary right-of-way. Members of the court explained their problems in obtaining the needed right-of-way and the matter was discussed in detail.

Mr. Davis said the committee was given "a good reception and we feel that the problem will soon be worked out."

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BEING A FINANCIER

There was a time when it was almost universally believed that the stock exchange was the exclusive province either of rich financiers or daring speculators—and when the people concerned with operating the exchange did little or nothing to discourage such a belief. That time belongs to history. A revealing article in Collier's for October 16, written by Donald L. Rogers, helps to show how a great change in attitude is taking place.

Mr. Rogers' article is entitled "How to Be a Wall Street Financier on \$10 a Week" and that pretty well describes its theme. He begins, "One day soon a man may knock at your door and offer you a chance to become a capitalist for \$10 down and \$10 a week. He won't be peddling panaceas. He'll offer no plan for retirement on a tropical isle, no guarantee of security for your old age. But he'll hold out something perhaps more important and more exciting—a chance to share profits, to buy into the ownership of America's industries with small cash payments. . . . He'll be selling stocks on a pay-as-you-go plan."

This, Mr. Rogers writes, is the revolutionary concept of the man who becomes president of the New York Stock Exchange two years ago, G. Keith Funston. Mr. Funston is an educator, who came to the job from the presidency of Trinity College, Connecticut, and he brought the attitude of an educator with him. His ambition, Mr. Rogers says, "is to make the facilities of his auction mart as familiar to the farmers of Maine's Aroostock County and the ranchers of Montana as they are now to the

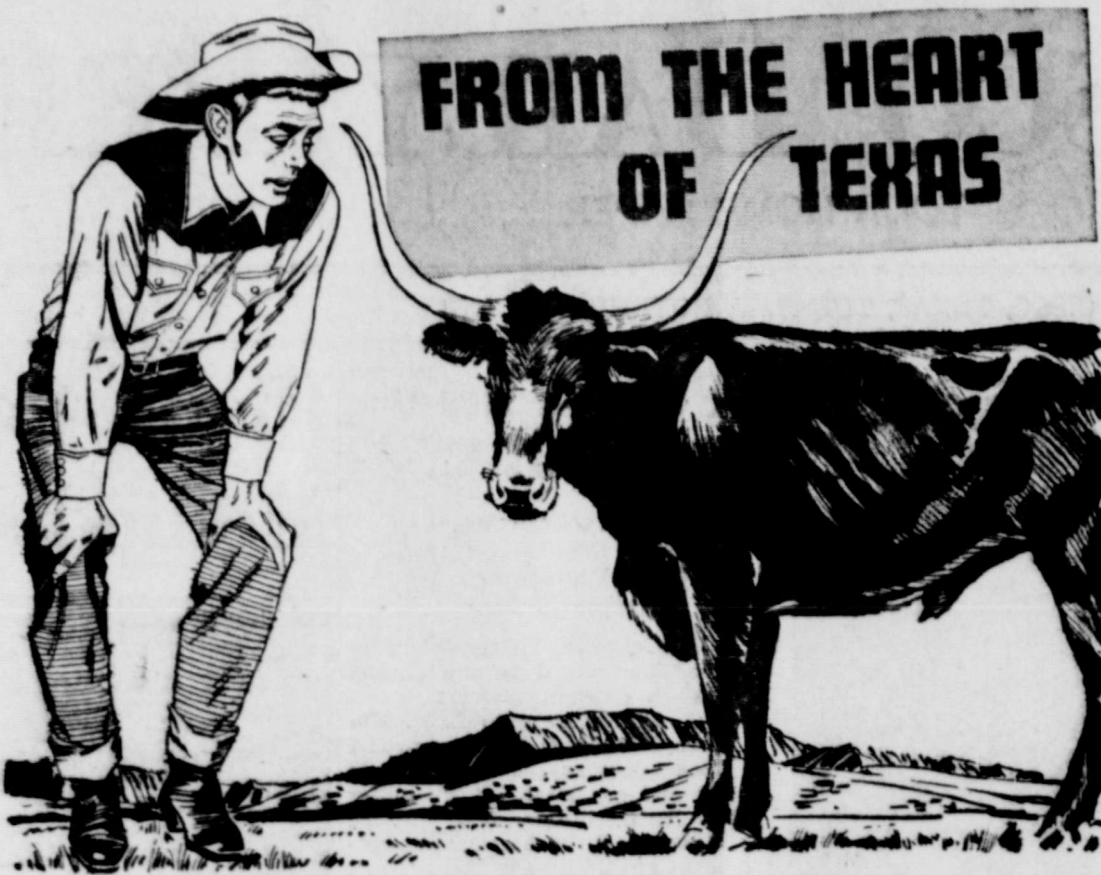
Wall Street is by far the most important source of the money industry needs for expansion and other improvements. Mr. Funston said, "Unless Wall Street is restored to health, there will be no place where American corporations can raise new money, no place to cultivate the expansion of American industry. It doesn't take much imagination to visualize what would happen if our industries couldn't expand, or if new ones couldn't come along."

Mr. Rogers describes what is now being done to teach the facts of capitalism to Americans. He concludes, "Funston is proud that 1300 tourists a day visit the stock exchange. They're more than visitors, Funston believes. They're future investors."

Public Hunting Tests Planned By Game Agency

AUSTIN, Oct. 28. — The Texas Game and Fish Commission indicated favor for proposed public hunting experiments in East Texas forest lands but decided time was too short to permit the trial projects during the coming big game harvest season.

The public shoots, discussed at the Commission's regular quarterly meeting in Austin, would be on National Forest Lands covered by a two-way agreement between the United States Forest Service and the Commission.

The Commission decided to try out the program despite the patch-work areas involved, caused by irregularly owned tracts with many privately owned tracts wholly enclosed by the National Forest Lands.

One point made by the Executive Secretary, in outlining the proposed restricted harvests, was that the game population would soon reach such proportions that the brood stock would not be endangered by limited shooting.

It also was emphasized that law enforcement might be strengthened under the suggested new policy in the affected areas where local sentiment opposes prosecutions for game law violations.

The Commission's stand on the proposal, which has been studied by state and federal technicians, indicated the possibility that the experiment might be ready for the 1954 fall season.

Most big game hunting in Texas now is done under the traditional land ownership-game management program whereby wildlife is harvested under leases between land owners and hunters.

The Commission heard suggestions for surveying Gulf Coast reef shell deposits.

Final Commission authority was given the proposed limited harvest of antlerless deer in Kerr, Gillespie and Mason counties to be begun this fall as a means of restoring the sex balance to deer herds.



Unless you have a close relative who is a lawyer, your opinion of our courts probably is a mixture of hearsay, rumor, mystery and awe. The average citizen has had little experience with the courts, and is apt to view with a sinking feeling some document requiring his presence in court.

Most criminals have a good idea of their rights in court, but the average citizen, confronted with a traffic ticket or a court summons, has little knowledge of the protections provided for him. If you are innocent of the charge and know your rights as a citizen in court, you need have no fear of your appearance before the jury and judge.

Probably the most fundamental and important right is summarized in the well known adage, "Every man is innocent until proved guilty." It is up to the prosecuting authorities to prove that the person on trial is guilty — and not the obligation of the person accused to prove that he is innocent. The prosecution must prove your guilt beyond a reasonable doubt, or you will be acquitted. The mere fact that you have been given a ticket or accused of a crime is not even evidence of guilt.

Another important protection is the right to have a witness whose testimony you may need subpoenaed to appear in court and testify. Many people are reluctant to go to court when their own rights are involved, and unless you had a means for compelling their attendance and testimony, you often would be unable to prove the facts necessary for success in your case.

It is the duty of every citizen to testify if he has information important to law suit and is called upon to do so. The courts can and do enforce attendance in court and the giving of testimony.

Certain other safeguards are valuable to you. A person may refuse to testify in any proceeding if he has a reasonable belief that his testimony could be used as a basis of a criminal proceeding against him. This does not mean, of course, that a confession given freely and voluntarily cannot be used in evidence. But it does mean that an accused cannot be compelled to take the witness stand, nor can his failure

Regulations Are Given On Hunting

AUSTIN, Oct. 31.—Only two changes from last year mark the new waterfowl regulations, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The daily shooting period was extended until sunset and baiting was forbidden altogether.

Here are the major rules for shooting ducks and geese:

Season — From noon on November 6 through January 4.

Hours — From one half hour before sunup to sunset.

Bag limit (Ducks) — Five per day or ten in possession.

Bag Limit (Geese) — Five per day or five in possession, including in such limit not more than either two Canada geese (or its subspecies, Hutchins or lesser Canada) or two white-fronted geese, or one of each.

Weapons — Use of rifles to kill waterfowl is forbidden; guns must not be larger than ten gauge; all repeaters or automatics must be plugged to a limit of three shell capacity.

Boats — Ducks or geese may be taken from outboard motor boat provided motor is removed from boat and placed inside the boat, or boat is secured to a shooting blind.

Federal duck stamp costing \$2.00 is required.

to testify be commented upon by the prosecution.

Our courts provide many safeguards for the innocent against false accusations of crime. But many of these rights would be valueless without the assistance of a lawyer, who has been schooled in legal principles and rules of statute or decision involved, to invoke these rights. The "right to counsel" must be granted to every accused person before any court in the state. The law provides that if any accused person cannot afford to pay for legal counsel and desires it, the court must appoint a lawyer to assist him in his case.

Every person charged with an infraction of the law has the right to consult counsel before making any plea. This applies to cases in every court — including justice of the peace courts, municipal courts, traffic courts and district courts. It does little good to consult a lawyer after you have pleaded guilty and paid the fine, for then the damage has been done.

The courts are open to you any time one of your legal rights has been denied or any of your property has been unlawfully taken. This is one of your most precious rights. The courts are the only peaceful means of enforcing your

## Vet Questions And Answers

Q — I'm a World War II veteran, and I've just finished a course in television repair under the original GI Bill. I have some entitlement left, and I'd like to enroll in a business course. Would this be possible?

A — No. Under the World War II GI Bill, once a veteran completes or discontinues a course, he's not permitted to begin another one.

Q — I'm on active duty, and I have a National Service Life Insurance term policy that's under waiver. What happens if my policy comes to the end of its term while it's under waiver. Is there anything I'm supposed to do to renew it?

A — If your GI term policy comes to the end of its term while premiums are being waived, it will be renewed automatically for another five-year period, and the renewed policy also will be under waiver. Since renewal is automatic, there's nothing you need do about it.

Q — Does the law require me to make a down payment, if I buy a house with a GI loan?

A — The law does not require a down payment. However, your lender has the right to ask for one, if he chooses to do so.

Q — May I take on-the-job training under the Korean GI Bill in a plant that was approved by my State for World War II veterans?

A — World War II GI Bill approval is not enough. The training course must be State-approved under the Korean GI Bill, before you may enroll, under the law.
