WITH the final day of the Texas Tech Farmers and Home-makers' Short Course at hand, officials of the college and those in charge of the affair are expressing satisfaction at the attendance and interest shown by farmers of the Panhandle and South Plains territory. The second day was featured by good crowds at practically every meeting and enrollment has climbed from that of the first day to approach the expectations of those actively engaged in promotion of the school.

Tuesday's attendance figures far exceeded those of a year ago. One hundred and seventy-five men assembled for their part of the morning's program, 400 were numbered at the afternoon session while 250 4-H club boys and girls were on hand for their portion of the entertainment last evening.

Mrs. Sewell Talks
The first speaker of the afternoon, Mrs. Chas. W. Sewell, director of the American Farm Bureau Federation, Chicago, without an announced subject chose "The Woman in the Case," taking as illustrations her statements of facts gleaned from study of history since the beginning of the world.

"No matter what it is to be done, no matter how it is done—a woman always receives a fair share of the blame or praise for it," declared the speaker. "Since the beginning of time this has been true. There is no exception."

Dictatorship For Chicago Accepted

City Council Capitulates To Ultimatum Of Rescue Committee; To Advance Money To Government

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—Chicago today accepted a virtual dictatorship in an attempt to drive the wolf from its governmental doors.

Without one dissenting vote, the city council capitulated to the ultimatum of the Silas H. Strawn Citizens' Rescue committee and pledged the city to cooperate with the committee.

The cooperation means that the Strawn group, backed by more than \$50,000,000, will advance money as it is needed for functioning of the city government.

The city council also called upon the school board, the public library directors and the Municipal Tuberculosis sanatorium board to adopt similar resolutions of cooperation with the rescue committee already had signified their willingness to submit their needs and payrolls to the Strawn committee.

Relief is expected to be accomplished through the purchase of tax anticipation warrants by Strawn and his colleagues, the purchases to be made as the money is needed and only when the committee approves proposed expenditures.

PENALTIES DEMANDED

License Plates Cannot Be Sold At Regular Price

AUSTIN, Feb. 4.—County tax collectors do not have the authority to issue automobile license plates after February 1 without collecting penalties, unless the licenses issued are on vehicles which have not been used during the year, or otherwise exempt from penalties. Assistant Attorney General Rice M. Tilley advised State Highway Engineer Gibb Gilchrist today.

Gilchrist told Tilley that there were some tax collectors in the state issuing license plates without collecting penalties. Tilley told him if he would report to the attorney general's office "such misconduct," investigators would ascertain the penalties having accrued on all plates issued by such tax collectors and institute suit against the officers and their bondsmen for same.

Naval Conference Moves With Speed In Two Conclaves

Spirit Of Optimism Enters Parley As Progress Is Made In Cause Of Naval Disarmament Program

LONDON, Feb. 4.—Moving with the greatest speed achieved since its start, the London naval conference today recorded definite progress in the cause of naval disarmament.

As a result of two important meetings, one of all delegates at St. James' palace this morning, the other a two-hour session between American and Japanese delegates this afternoon, a more confident spirit seemed to pervade conference circles.

Moreover, the official communiqué for the first time since the conference opened departed from cold chronology of meetings sufficiently to indicate that "good results in preparing the way for an agreement" are being produced by private conversations among the delegates, and added that those talks would continue.

The meeting today of the Americans and Japanese was considered a significant milestone in the conference work, for real problems of ships and tonnage were tackled. In a way, the talk was a continuation of general conversations held at Washington.

Secretary Stimson, head of the American delegation, was prepared and plunged into the knotty problem of Japanese-American differences regarding cruiser strength, but a Japanese spokesman said later that the actual talk about ships was largely limited to battleships and submarines.

Moody To Submit Measures Aiding Texas' Colleges

Emergency Appropriations For State Institutions Will Be Asked In Special Session Of Solons

Tech Is Included

College Here Would Benefit From Proposed Action Of Legislature; Committee Draws Up Bill

(By The Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 4.—Governor Moody will submit emergency appropriations for state colleges, elementary institutions and department as well as the subject of revenue and taxation, to the special session of the legislature it developed today. Assured by a delegation of presidents of state colleges that the governor had promised them to submit appropriations, the senate finance committee drew up and reported out a bill carrying \$150,000 for each year of the biennium to pay salaries of officers and employees and other expenses incident to maintaining summer schools. The house appropriations committee appointed a subcommittee to draft a bill along similar lines.

The governor had previously told the college presidents that there were emergency requests for more than \$3,000,000 from educational and eleemosynary institutions and the departments.

Educational institutions named in the senate bill were Agricultural and Mechanical college, University of Texas, John Tarleton Agricultural college, North Texas Agricultural college, Prairie View State Normal and Industrial college, College of Mines, College of Industrial Arts, Texas Technological college, College of Arts and Industries, North Texas State Teachers college, Sam Houston State Teachers, East Texas State Teachers college, Southwest Texas State Teachers college, West Texas State Teachers, Sul Ross State Teachers college and Stephen F. Austin State Teachers college.

Western Union Is Robbed By Bandits

Organized Gang Of 10 Men Escape With \$3,000 After Hold-Up With Revolvers And Machine Gun

(By Associated Press)

DETROIT, Feb. 4.—A well organized gang of ten men tonight held up the main office of Western Union Telegraph company in the center of the financial district here and escaped with approximately \$3,000.

Eight of the robbers, armed with revolvers and a sub-machine gun, guarded the two entrances to the building, and the two automobiles in which the getaway subsequently was made. The other two, carrying revolvers, entered the office, herded eleven employees and 20 customers to corners and scooped up the money from cash drawers.

BANK DOORS CLOSE

Fort Worth Failure Blamed In Aubrey Crash

DENTON, Feb. 4.—Failure of the Texas National Bank at Fort Worth to open its doors Saturday was blamed today for closing of the First State Bank of Aubrey, near here.

The Aubrey bank had deposits in the Fort Worth institution totalling more than \$25,000—a sum greater than the bank's capital stock. Prior to the closing of the Fort Worth bank, the Aubrey bank was in "excellent condition," said a statement issued by Cashier J. E. Borer.

Inauguration Of Rubio As Mexico President Today

Revolutionary Leader Will Succeed Emilio Portes Gil; Large Crowds There For Inaugural Program

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 4.—Pascual Ortiz Rubio, a typical example of the Mexican leaders developed in the revolutionary period since 1911, will be inaugurated tomorrow as president of the Mexican republic.

In the prime of life when Francisco Madero became the first revolutionary president after the overthrow of Porfirio Diaz dictatorship, Ortiz Rubio has risen to the supreme office of the republic through a series of important civilian posts.

The term to which he was elected last November was to fill out that of the assassinated President-elect Obregon. As the candidate of the national revolutionary party, he overcame his principal rival, Jose Vasconcelos.

The inaugural ceremonies have brought the greatest gathering of Americans to Mexico City in 20 years. Hotels were so crowded tonight that many visitors had to return to the United States. Seventy ex-couriers from Wichita, Kas., and other midwestern cities were among them.

The first part of the inaugural program, which will culminate at noon tomorrow with the actual ceremony in the national stadium, was held today.

CONFIRMATION LIKELY

Approval Of Charles Evans Hughes Thought Sure

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Confirmation of Charles Evans Hughes by the Senate as Chief Justice seems assured and next week, immediately after that business is transacted, he will take over the post.

A day of reflection upon the nomination of the former secretary of state and former supreme court justice developed no sign of opposition to him in the senate. Chairman Norris of the senate judiciary committee felt no haste was necessary in consideration of Mr. Hughes, however, and stood by his decision to await the regular meeting of the committee next Monday.

COURT ROOM, AUSTIN, Feb. 4.—John W. Brady's murder trial was left in a jury's charge late tonight. Final arguments were completed at 4:55 p. m.

District Attorney Henry Brooks, the slim young son of Brady's former law partner, made the state's final accusation that the former appellate court judge in sound mind and with an intention to murder "It is as much your duty to give justice to John Brady, your friend, as it is mine to stand here and prosecute John Brady, my friend," Brooks, white faced and trembling, said in conclusion of the closing argument.

Contract For New High School Will Be Let March 4th

Plans Completed For Local \$650,000 Structure; Work Will Begin As Soon As Contract Is Awarded

Contract for the new \$650,000 Lubbock high school building will be let on March 4, according to an announcement last night by A. C. Jackson secretary of the board of the Lubbock Independent School district.

The plans have been completed, approved by the school board and will be turned over to contractors this week, stated Mr. Jackson. Bids are to be received on that date and contract let.

Work on the project will start immediately after let of contract and officials state that they expect to have the building ready for use of students by January 1, 1931, allowing eight or ten months for actual construction.

The bonds, which were voted on July 9, of last year, were sold to the Brown-Crummer investment company on January 8 at par value with accrued interest and a premium of \$650.

Site for the proposed new structure is bordered by Avenues T and U and Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets. The building will provide accommodations for 1,300 new students and provisions will be made for future additions for 1,500 and possibly 1,800 students.

NO VOTE TAKEN

Legislature Fails To Take Action On Prisons

AUSTIN, Feb. 4.—The legislature tried hard today to get a vote on prison reorganization legislation but failed. The house came within a step of an expression on the matter of site for a centralized prison plant after a long day of hectic debate, most of which was over parliamentary procedure.

A holding of Speaker W. S. Barne that a motion by Rep. Walter Deck of Fort Worth proposing that the house go on record favorable to present-owned lands near the central site was out of order, was appealed from, but the house sustained him, 60 to 45.

SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 4.—With only one more juror needed, the trial of Mrs. Altha Harbaugh, alias Alice Smith, sister of Lynn Stephens, indicted for murder in connection with the death September 24 of Captain Charles Stephens, federal prohibition officer, received late today for the second time during the day for lack of additional veniremen.

FRATERNITY MEETING TONIGHT

Prince And Bride To Feather Nest

Royal Pair Arrive At Turin To Make Home Guarded By Police From Anti-Fascist Enemies Along Route

TURIN, Italy, Feb. 4. (AP)—Guarded from anti-fascist enemies by police and military details, Crown Prince Umberto and his bride, who was Marie Jose of Belgium, have come to Turin to make their home. Turin's population of more than half a million gave the royal couple a tremendous welcome as they arrived yesterday from Val d'Aosta, where they had been enjoying winter sports, but the Italian authorities did not allow the citizens and applause to lull them into a feeling of false security.

Elaborate precautions were taken to protect them from any attempt at injury. Baggage of all persons entering Turin for the last few days was searched for weapons, and the Turin newspapers were not permitted to print the exact time of the royal train's arrival until Sunday morning. Streets were lined with troops, with drawn swords and fixed bayonets.

Today the royal couple began to keep house. It was not housekeeping according to the ordinary American sense, because the "little bungalow" of the crown prince and his bride really is a royal palace with 150 rooms, a half dozen cooks and a regiment of servants.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 4. (AP)—Charging alienation of her husband's affections, Mrs. Mary Ball today filed in circuit court here for \$1,000,000 damages against her former sister-in-law, Mrs. Jessie Ball DuPont, and the latter's husband, Alfred I. DuPont.

Although the bill of complaint made the charges specifically against Mrs. DuPont, Gordon McCauley, attorney for Mrs. Ball, explained that under the law it was necessary to name Mr. DuPont with his wife in the litigation.

Mrs. Ball was divorced about two years ago from her husband Thomas Ball, a Los Angeles attorney.

Conference Held On Cotton Belt Economic Problems

JACKSON, Miss., Feb. 4. (AP)—The conference on cotton belt economic problems and the Southern extension conference were opened today for a private discussion of problems affecting the agricultural sections of the South.

Speakers at the Cotton Belt meeting included Dr. C. L. Holmes and B. Youngblood of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The National Agricultural department also had W. B. Lanham of the bureau of agricultural economics and W. C. Warburton director of the extension service, as speakers at the extension conference.

Discontinue Fast Airline Service

TULSA, Okla., Feb. 4. (AP)—Erie P. Halliburton, president and general manager of the Southwest Air Fast Express, Inc., today announced the discontinuation of operations of his airlines system until such time as the condition of airports and general weather will permit safe flying.

The announcement followed nearly a month of unregulated schedules and but occasional operation due to storm, fog and snow and sleet accumulations.

"The entire organization," he said "will be kept together to re-establish operations on regular schedule as soon as the airports and weather permit."

The system serves St. Louis, Kansas City, Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Fort Worth, Dallas, Wichita Falls, Sweetwater, Abilene and Midland, Texas.

Editor, Manager Named for Paper

SPARTANBURG, S. C., Feb. 4. (AP)—An editor and a business manager named by federal court commissioners were in charge of the Spartanburg Herald and Journal today as the next move of William LaVarre, part owner, in his stormy legal battle to gain control of the papers was awaited.

The publisher was under an alternate sentence of 60 days in jail or a \$500 fine as a result of an attempt yesterday to take charge of the papers by force. He received the sentence on contempt charges preferred when he disregarded a court order restraining him from entering the newspaper plant.

Bus Lines Offer Improved Service

Lubbock patrons of the South Plains coaches and the Pioneer Motor lines are now being given additional service of transportation from and to their homes when purchasing fares for trips out of this city, officials of those two organizations announced late Tuesday.

Government Seeks To Force Defense To Cross Examine

Attorney For Ex-Sheriff In Liquor Trial Says He Is Ill And Not Equal To Task Of Questioning

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 4. (AP)—Unavailing attempts were made today by government attorneys to force the defense to cross-examine of Ruth Morgan May, who testified last Friday in the Pottawatomie county liquor conspiracy case to protection afforded bootleggers upon collection of tribute money.

S. Prince Freeling former attorney general of Oklahoma, counsel for Frank Fox, former sheriff, objected again today to the cross-examination of Mrs. May, saying he was ill and did not feel equal to the task. Cross examination was passed at the conclusion of Mrs. May's testimony when Freeling said he wished time to study the transcript.

"It is funny that she makes him ill when no other witness does," Roy St. Lewis, district attorney, commented in court.

Over the objection of defense counsel, Mrs. Clarence Burdette, wife of a former chief of police at Earlsboro, corroborated her husband's testimony yesterday that he was in charge of wholesale distribution of whiskey in Pottawatomie county during the first three months of 1929.

The defense objection was based on the contention that the 1929 conspiracy if it existed, constituted a separate offense from the conspiracy charged in the indictment which centered about the Earlsboro oil field from 1926 to 1928.

Davis Back From Dallas Hearings

A. B. Davis, manager of the Lubbock Chamber of commerce, returned Tuesday from Dallas, where he attended a hearing before army engineers on the proposal for canalization of Trinity river.

The hearing, attended by 200 representatives of business and industrial interests of Texas, was held before Major Milg Fox, of Galveston.

Major Fox's report has been withheld until disposal of a pending section of the rivers and harbors bill in congress, which proposes a 9-foot depth for the river project.

Lubbock would benefit through navigation of the river in that railroads are now recognizing water freight rates, following a recent act of congress.

Miss Jean Dorrell Lectures For Tech Short Course

Good And Bad Home Decorations Are Discussed By Associate Professor Of Applied Arts On Tuesday Morning

Says Bright Colors Should Be Lovely And In Small Amounts; Individuality Is Emphasized

"GOOD and Bad Home Decoration" was the subject chosen by Miss Jean Dorrell, associate professor of applied arts in the school of home economics at Texas Tech college, in a lecture given Tuesday morning for women members of the short course which is being conducted at the college.

The lecture was given with a demonstration in room 101 of the home economics building.

The speaker began her talk by remarking that a home should express the personalities of those who live in it.

"Home finishing," said Miss Dorrell, "is a creative art, a means of self-expression. There are many ways of making your home different from the ordinary and above the average in beauty, comfort and individuality."

Ways of accomplishing this "difference" were given as follows:

"Take a good magazine to give you a standard of good taste and new ideas; plan to spend part of your time making things like book covers, rug, head boxes for home furnishing and decoration, have some lovely color in your home and in planning it remember that the larger the area the less bright the color because bright colors must be beautiful and in small amounts. For example, walls, ceilings and floors should be dull in color while small vases, lamps and pictures may be brighter."

Picture Not Imitation

"A good artist," said the speaker, never attempts to imitate nature. The camera does that. A good picture is an interpretation rather than a literal representation of a subject even in the case of a portrait.

"In hanging pictures remember that light or medium light pictures should be hung on fairly light walls, except where a dark picture is hung over or near a dark piece of furniture. Vertically shaped pictures should be hung on vertical wall space and wide large pictures need large wall space, small ones need a smaller space. Never hang a very large picture beside a small one. Family portraits and photographs are too personal for the living room. They belong in small frames on a desk or in the bedroom."

Illustrated Pamphlets

Illustrated pamphlets of hanging draperies and of pictures were distributed to the women.

"A good way to hang curtains is to follow the structural lines of the window and the wall," said the speaker. "There is an art to hanging even glass curtains correctly."

This morning at 9:30 o'clock Miss Dorrell lectured in room 101 on "Child Management Problems." At 10:15 o'clock Miss Dorothy McFarland, associate professor of foods, lectured on "Easy Great Meals" in room 100 and at the same hour in room 104 Mrs. D. B. Boster demonstrated and lectured on "Selection of Ready Made Clothing."

There will be a reception for both men and women at the Home Management House on the campus at 4:30 o'clock.

Tech Instructors Speak To Women At Short Course

Miss Johnson Lectures On Nutrition Problems, And Miss Harper Discusses "Community Dinners"

Instructors of the home economics of the Texas Technological college addressed groups of women at the "Tech" short course Tuesday morning.

"Community dinners" was the subject chosen by Miss Katherine Harper, director of the cafeteria, and Miss Vivian Johnson, instructor of foods, spoke on "Application of Nutrition to Some Home Problems."

Menus for various meals and suggestions for meals and vegetable combinations were discussed by Miss Johnson. She distributed sheets with tables of weights and measures and tables of amounts.

Eat Raw Foods

"The trouble with many of us," said Miss Johnson, "is that we do not eat enough raw foods. We peel the fibers off of celery stalks, throw away peels from fruits, and eat food that is cooked to such an extent that it has lost its vitamins, minerals and best flavor."

"The housewife should avoid getting in a rut by serving the same meals over and over. Milk and milk products and eggs should be included in every day's menu."

Dieters Warned

The fact of dieting was referred to and the speaker warned her audience to remember that children need plenty of energy building foods in their meals.

Miss Margaret Weeks, dean of the school of home economics, lectured on "Feeding Problems of Young Children."

"Children cannot get along on poor diets," said Miss Weeks. "The problems of child feeding may be grouped around the right amount of food, the kind of food and eating in the right way."

Speaking of the feeding problems of infants, she said, "Babies must get a sufficient amount of Vitamin D in order to prevent rickets, bent legs, or bad teeth formation."

"Here in our section of the country we have an abundance of sunshine which has the power of acting on the substance of the skin and is very good for the child. Vitamins A, B and C may be found in vegetable pulp, orange and tomato juices, cereal jelly, and dry bread."

"Most children do not get enough calories," said Miss Weeks. "Milk, the great protective food, guards against errors in diet, and peanut butter diluted with milk makes a nourishing sandwich."

Vegetable and fruits supplement milk because they contain iron. Every child should have cereals for breakfast and a good thing to remember is that the simple foods are best for the growing child.

Predict Approval For Hoover Plan To Improve Laws

First Of Recommendations
For Strengthening Pro-
Enforcement To Be Voted
On This Week

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4. (AP)—The first of President Hoover's recommendations for improving prohibition enforcement is brought to a vote in the house this week with all signs pointing to overwhelming approval.

This is the proposal to consolidate the enforcement unit now in the treasury with the prosecuting agencies of the justice department under direction of the attorney general. It probably will be taken up on Thursday with four hours set aside for debate.

Dry Want Vote

Conscious of their voting strength, the drys are directing their efforts toward a vote in both branches of congress on measures to repeal the eighteenth amendment. In the senate this may come within a month; in the house, the judiciary committee will begin hearing such proposals on February 12.

The resolution introduced by Senator Blaine is to be the vehicle of action in the senate, where the prohibition storm is expected to strike as soon as the tariff bill is out of the way. House action on repeal awaits the condition of committee hearings.

To Seek Action

Chairman Williamson of the house expenditures committee, author of the transfer bill, planned to go before the rules committee of the house today at a special meeting and ask that his measure be placed on the house calendar for Thursday. The leaders of the house had previously agreed to take up the bill at the earliest possible time.

A dispute developed in connection with the transfer measure and this has to do with the proposal that secretary of the treasury and the attorney general be given joint authority over the issuance of industrial alcohol permits.

Counter Proposal May Be Submitted By U. S. Delegates

Indications Given At Press
Conference That Another
Plan May Supplant The
French Tonnage Proposal

LONDON, Feb. 4. (AP)—Indications that the American delegation took a second look at the French proposal for a tonnage plan were given at a press conference today.

The American ambassador to Switzerland, added today that no counter-proposal had been circulated and that a great deal of information would have to be exchanged on the French plan before any such proposal could be presented.

At any rate, he indicated, no counter-proposal to the French plan which is a compromise between the point and categorical systems of measuring naval power, could be expected tomorrow when the naval conference will resume discussion of the French system.

Conversations between the British United States and French representatives were proceedings this afternoon, the United States delegation meeting first the British and then the French.

Talk among the delegates is the the French compromise between the naval methods of reduction—by global tonnage or by categories of vessels—is so wide in scope as to embrace practically the whole conference agenda. The discussion on it therefore, is likely to be protracted.

Canadian Accuses Border Patrolmen

DETROIT, Feb. 4. (AP)—A Canadian citizen suffering bullet wounds at the Hotel Dieu, at Windsor, Ont., accused United States customs border patrol inspectors of firing on him as he was making for the Canadian shore across the ice of the Detroit river at 1 a. m. today.

The wounded man is Arthur Laframboise of LaSalle, Ont. He said he was fired upon when he ran from the officers who approached as he and a friend were working to free a sled load of liquor from the ice off the head of Fighting island on the Canadian side.

Laframboise said he had driven his automobile out on the ice, but when the officers approached he fled on foot.

At the customs border patrol base it was said no shooting had been reported by inspectors.

the Grand Duke Nicholas as head of the Russian exiles in Paris, mysteriously disappeared a week ago, and there have been numerous rumors that he had been kidnapped by Soviet secret police and was held prisoner in the Russian embassy building.

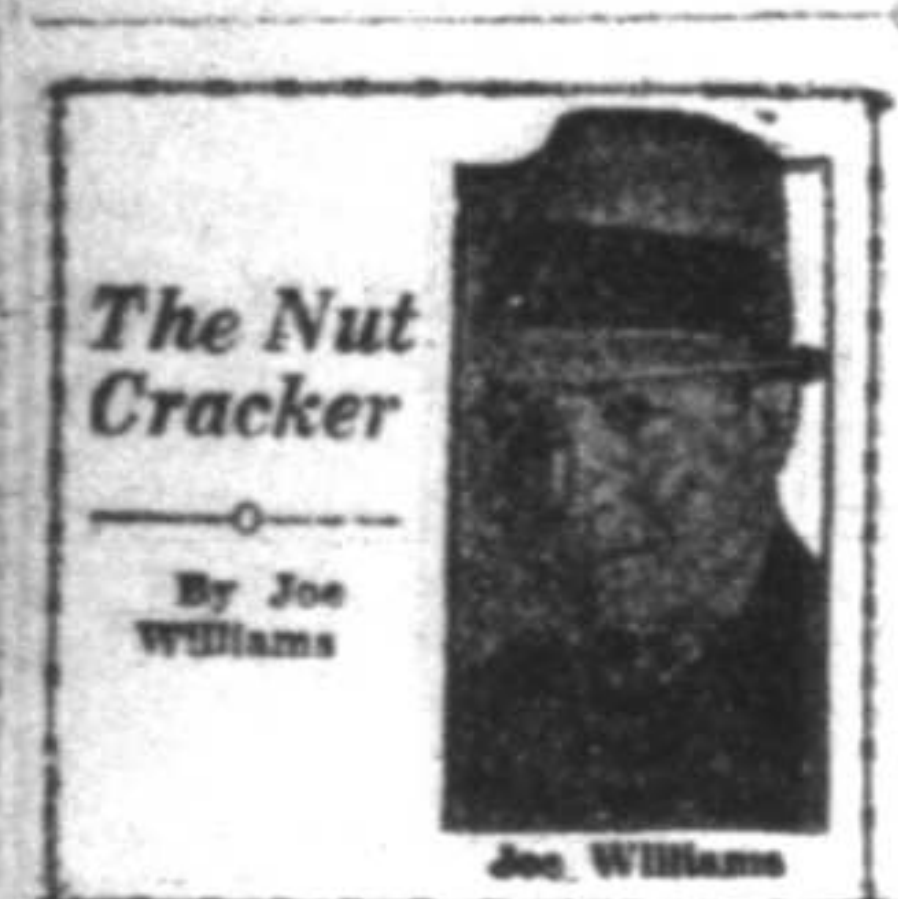

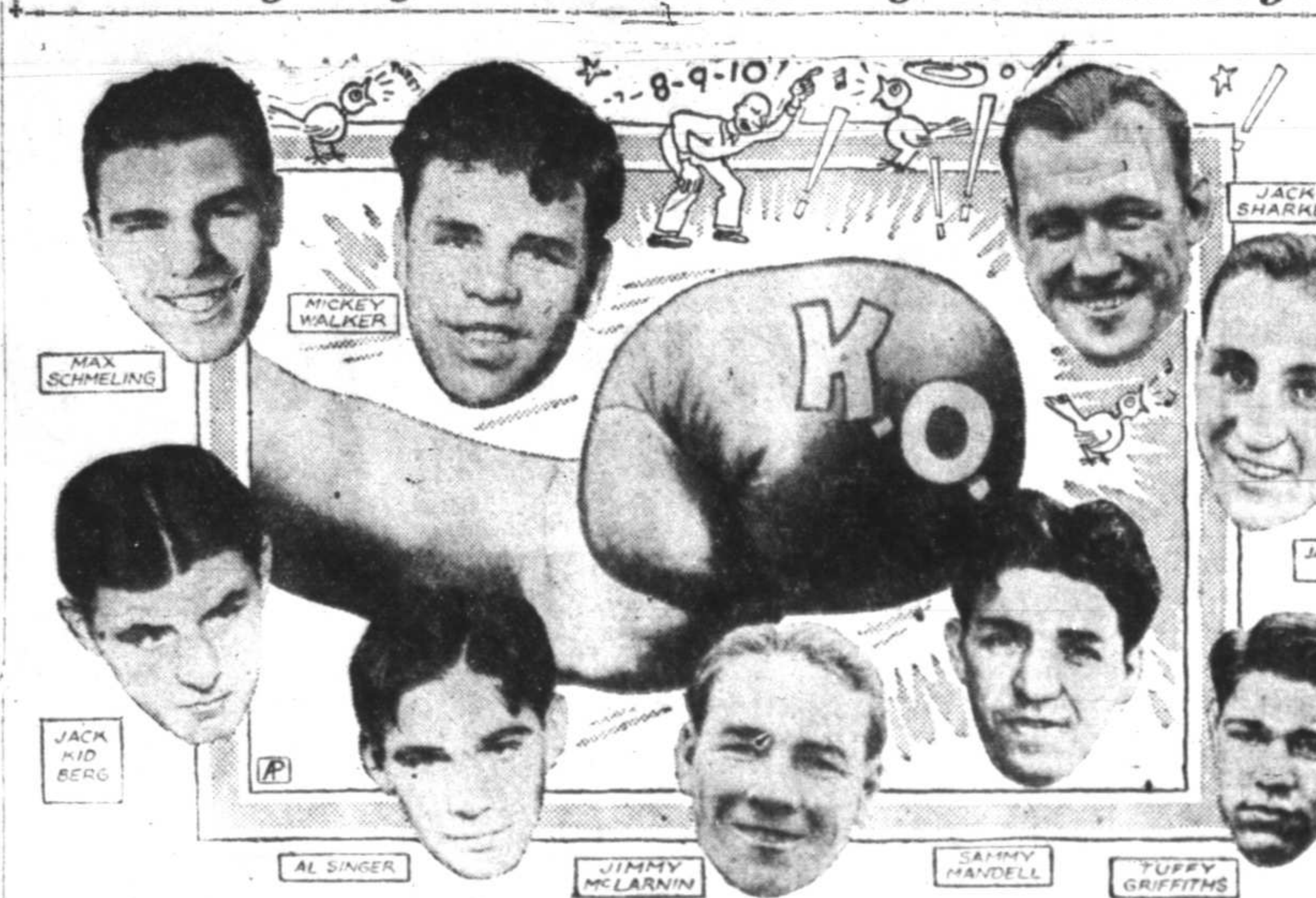

Investigation In Carnera's Fight Suspends His Foe

CHICAGO, Feb. 4. (P)—Primo Carnera, the huge muscle man from Italy, was just a big bogy man and not a conspirator.

This was the consensus of the Illinois State Athletic Commission today after it had finished an investigation of Carnera's 47-second knockout of Kiefer Riox, the French Canadian woodsman from Montreal, in the Chicago stadium punch bowl last Friday night. Riox, the commission decided, was scared into a half faint at first sight of the tremendous bulk of the Italian giant and did not deliberately take a dive.

Riox Suspended
Because of Riox's unsatisfactory showing, however, he was fined \$1,000, and suspended indefinitely. No action was taken against Carnera. He was held blameless and his purse of approximately \$15,000 was ordered paid. Riox's fine was deducted from his \$3,000 purse.

After questioning all principals or their representatives, the commission concluded, there was no evidence of a conspiracy, fraud or collusion. Dave Barry, referee of the abbreviated match, said he was of the impression that Riox was so badly frightened, even before he entered the ring, that he had no heart to fight. He said Riox appeared to be flinching with fear when called to the center of the ring and that his muscles would not respond when the big Italian made his first furious rush at the clang of the gong.

The two judges, E. L. Cook and W. A. Baity, agreed that Riox hit the floor five times without being punched hard enough to knock over a banianweight. The punch that sent him to the floor, flat on his face, for the sixth and final count, was described by them as a well directed smash to the chin. That final punch, the judges qualified, did not carry sufficient force to knock Riox out.

Basketball Shots

THE college game this season is replete with strong, colorful teams and outstanding individual performers.

In the east, Pittsburgh, Syracuse and Pennsylvania are among the leaders with such smaller colleges as St. Bonaventure and St. Johns of Brooklyn about as good as they come.

The middle west boasts Butler and Loyola of Chicago, a pair of little giants, in addition to the big nine aggregations of which Purdue got away to the best start.

Although losing to Butler, Loyola and Pittsburgh, the Montana State College Bobcats in their rally through the middle west and east put on a great exhibition of basketball as it is played in the Rocky mountain conference.

Kansas is the team of the hour in the Missouri Valley Big Six where Oklahoma, the defending champion, appears not up to last year's form.

Texas, which already has taken a fall out of Arkansas, promises to prove a stumbling block in the way of the Razorbacks in their bid for another southwestern conference crown.

Rich in strong aggregations this year, the South has uncovered something of a sensation in the shape of Washington and Lee. The Generals bowled over the fast-stepping Duke five, and last year's runners-up and champions—North Carolina and North Carolina State—in rapid succession and are figured to have as good a chance as any to win the big championship tournament with which the Dixie season concludes.

The Pacific Coast conference race has not taken definite shape as yet.

DERHAPS the two outstanding basket shooters of the season thus far have been Chilly Hyatt of Pittsburgh and Cal Thompson of Montana State. In that connection it must be noted that the Montana State mentor himself concedes Hyatt, the edge over his own great star.

One of the best centers of the season was lost to Fordham early in the campaign through an injury and this is partly responsible for the New York team's disappointing showing.

Baker hit the floor hard in a game with Yale at New York and injured his knees so badly he was unable to rise. The play, incidentally, was so fast that the teams battled on for a full minute before players and officials realized what had happened.

"MY TEAM is only fair this year," confided Coach Lew Andreas of Syracuse to Coach Ed Kelleher of Fordham shortly before their proteges met in a game in New York last season, "but next year I am going to have a great team. Watch out for us in 1935-36."

Just to prove his coach a real prophet, the current Syracuse quintet has trimmed both Fordham and Pennsylvania and has bowled over such other sturdy aggregations as Dartmouth and Michigan State. Oregon managed to stop the Orange but the Nebaskans were beaten in a second game, squaring accounts.

Miami Fight Card For Sharkey Bout Includes Heavies

NEW YORK, Feb. 4. (P)—The supporting card of Jack Sharkey's heavyweight match with Phil Scott, in Miami, Fla., February 27, was announced today at Madison Square Garden.

In accordance with general forecasts, Johnny Rizo, the Cleveland baker boy, will meet Victorio Campolo, husky Argentine, in the 10-round semi-final. This match was ruled out for the Garden here by the New York State athletic commission which decided that Johnny was "too small," for the South American.

Another ten-round match, previously announced, brings together Tommy Loughran, former light heavyweight champion, and Pierre Charles of Belgium, the first ten rounder pairs Jimmy Malone of Boston and Moise Bouquillon, French heavyweight, George Cook, British veteran, opens the card in a six round bout with Paul Bianchi of the Argentine.

When the board is recruited to its full strength, a meeting will be called by Heydier and the other officials of the club will be elected.

Robinson Makes Statement

"It's all right," was Robinson's comment after the announcement of the settlement. Mr. McKeever and Mr. Gillespie were content to let the statement of the agreement, made by Mr. Heydier, speak for them, declining to amplify it. Representatives of both warring baseball factions, however, seemed relieved that an agreement had been reached.

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South Plains Area Produces Tenth Of 1929-30 Cotton Crop In Texas

The South Plains and lower plains region produced one-tenth of the 1929-30 Texas cotton crop, a report of ginnings announced Tuesday by the United States Department of Commerce revealed.

Nineteen counties of this region produced a total of 387,754 bales, while the total ginnings of the state up until January 16 were 3,750,327.

Lamb county, with a ginning total of 49,302 bales and Lubbock county with 45,045 bales led the region.

Other high producers are: Dawson, 32,327; Hockley, 29,515 and Lynn, 29,646.

With ginnings continuing in a number of points over the region, the total is expected to increase by at least five thousand bales, ginnings estimated today.

The report by counties follows: Lubbock, 45,045; Bailey, 7,387; Breckenridge, 7,983; Crosby, 24,327; Dawson, 32,327; Hockley, 29,515; Hale, 18,480; Garza, 5,082; Gaines, 4,459; Foard, 14,499; Floyd, 16,383; Dickens, 13,317; Lamb, 49,302; Lynn, 29,646; Motley, 18,126; Nolan, 19,579; Terry, 22,949; Scurry, 19,420.

Sale Of Railroad Depends On Ruling

Purchase Of Gulf, Texas And Western To Frisco Lines Rests With Interstate Commerce Group

DALLAS, Feb. 4. (P)—Sale of the Gulf, Texas and Western railway to the Frisco Lines depends upon a ruling by the Interstate Commerce commission regarding exceptions to an examiner's report filed by the Fort Worth and Denver railway and the Gulf Texas and Western. President W. Frank Know reported at the stockholders meeting today.

Sale of the road for \$2,300,000 was agreed upon last year, but when the hearing was held before Examiner T. P. Sullivan, he recommended the price be fixed at \$1,800,000. Exceptions to this recommendation have been filed, based upon the ground that the commission has granted the Frisco permission to extend the line from Seymour to Vernon at a cost of \$38,000 a mile, whereas the sale price as fixed by Examiner Sullivan allowed only \$18,000 per mile for the existing road.

The Fort Worth and Denver filed an exception because it was denied a permit to build from Fort Worth to Pampa. Deadline for exceptions was set for Jan. 29, with all parties free to file answers to exceptions until Feb. 10. Upon that date the commission will determine the date of the hearing.

Purchase of the G. T. and W. and extension of the line to Vernon would give the Frisco connection at Vernon with its Oklahoma lines.

CADE BURIED HERE

Services Held Monday For Lubbock County Man

SLATON, Feb. 4. (Special)—S. R. Cade, 64, who died Sunday, was buried here Monday afternoon. He lived eight miles west of Slaton.

TOKYO, Feb. 4. (P)—Prince Takamatsu younger brother of the emperor and Prince Chichibu, and Princess Kikuko Tokugawa, granddaughter of the late Shogun, exchanged marriage vows today before the Kashiwakoku, sanctuary of the Sun Goddess Amaterasu, in the imperial palace.

Dressed in the costumes of the ancient court of the Mikados, the young couple bowed before the sanctuary, in which is enshrined the sacred mirror, symbol of the soul of the goddess, "divine ancestress" of the imperial line and the Japanese nation. In token of their pledges of faithfulness they exchanged and drank cups of sake, or rice wine, previously sanctified.

The Japanese nation joined the imperial family in celebrating this marriage, which unites the ruling line with probably the most illustrious subject house in the empire.

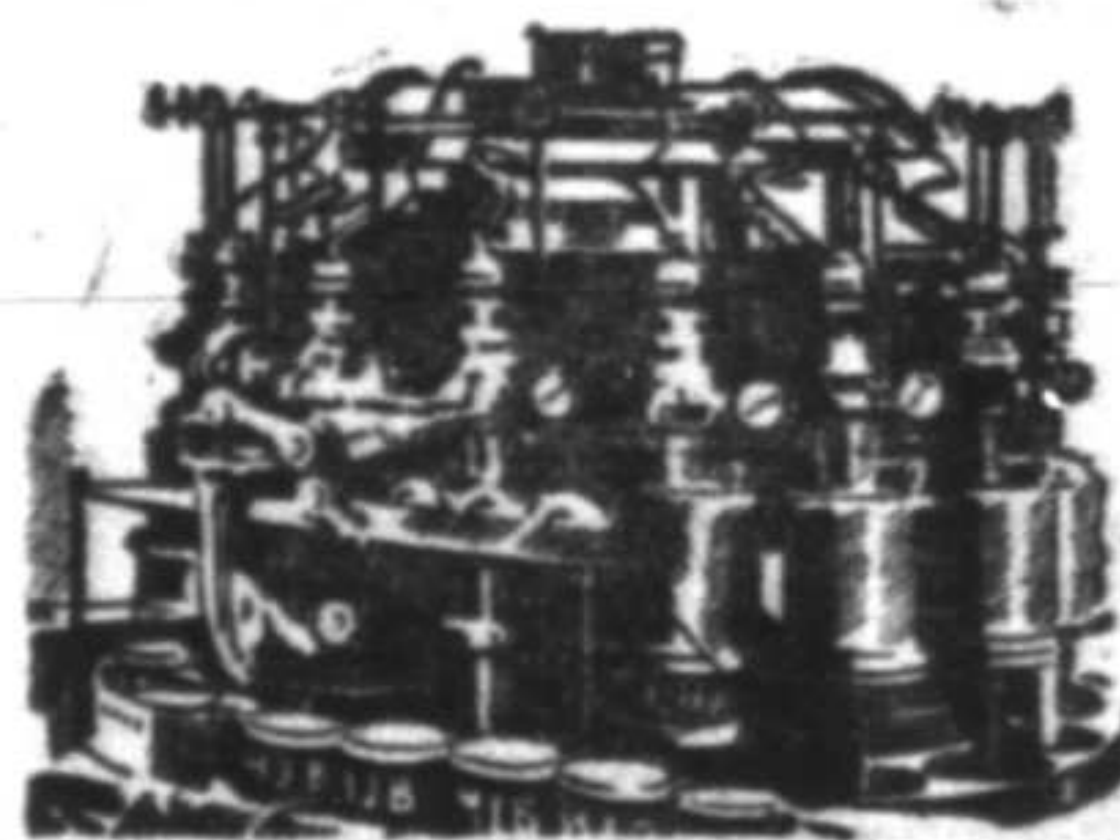

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ONE MINUTE PULPIT

A FORTUNE FOR A FROLIC

NEW YORK'S socially elite, bolstered by an assortment of artists, musicians and writers, recently sponsored a ball which cost \$250,000—a quarter of a million—to produce. Thus a fortune was swept into one evening's frivolity.

The Morning Avalanche is not opposed to people's having a good time. We agree that dancing, bridge playing and for that matter, many other forms of entertainment are beneficial to the human race when entered into in moderation. But spending \$250,000 for a single dance, as we see it, is going pretty far, particularly when one considers the amount of public and private good to which a quarter of a million dollars may be put.

Right in that same city, probably not more than five miles removed from the scene of the dance, there are many investments in humanity which could be profitably made. For instance, the ghetto boy in whose soul slumbers a desire for a musical education; the East Side girl who might, if properly educated, become a great artist or a great teacher. Or, getting closer to earth, the opportunity to furnish a hundred boys and girls from the poverty-stricken sections of America's greatest city with merely a common school education which they otherwise might never receive. The practical uses for that \$250,000 are legion!

We are of the opinion that even the socially elite of New York should be able to have a good time at a dance which, for a company of 500 couples, we'll say, should cost no more than \$2,500, or one-hundredth of the sum spent. And to us in West Texas even \$2,500 seems a lot of money to spend for a party.

The kind of thing of which we wrote could happen nowhere but in this great, rich country of ours. And The Morning Avalanche sometimes wonders if that sort of Americanism is worth very much after all.

POPULATION GROWTH

With rare exceptions, American communities large and small aspire for larger population and greater territorial size. Among cities and towns and even hamlets of nearly equal size there exists keen competition, and census figures are as eagerly awaited as the umpire's decision in a ball game.

There are advantages in urban bigness. The more people the more business, and the more business the greater prosperity for all. The larger the city the greater its natural advantages and the more numerous and varied its sources of amusement and recreation. For many of the best things in life the people of the smaller communities must go to the big cities.

But there is also a price to pay for the distinction of urban bigness. As a city grows in size and population its people become more and more like so many surging ants in a disturbed ant hill. Homes become tenements. The few blocks between home and place of employment become miles. Privacy vanishes, the cost of living keeps pace with the growth in population, and even the pure air and quiet are taken away.

As they build higher and wider let the towns and cities heed these words of an official of the United States Chamber of Commerce:

"While the existence of a town or city depends upon business, the existence is not justified unless the profits of business make life in that town constantly more and more worth living."

It is as important to the community to guard against the disadvantages of bigness as it is to strive for bigness, and the place that grows wisely need not regret its greater size.

MERITED ORLOQUY

Little sympathy from the outside may be expected by the Italian government when it complains that all sorts of wild rumors and suspicions are being circulated by enemies of Fascism. It seems the many-tongued monster rumor is abroad to upset the equanimity of Mussolini the Peerless.

False rumors, everyone will agree, are unpleasant things and exceedingly difficult to combat, but those who follow a course encouraging and promoting them should not complain when the gossip gets beyond their control.

Censorship of the Italian press and of news-carrying cables and mails leaving Italy has been a rigid policy of the Mussolini government and it has been that form of censorship which forbids publication of the truth. Deprived of facts and fed for years upon a diet of propaganda, it was only natural for the Italian people to place more confidence in rumors, equally as fantastic as the government's propaganda, than in government bulletins and newspapers. That primitive means of communication "by word of mouth" is not less reliable, however, than the manufactured news of a nation permitting censorship of the press.

Rumor is a disease whose only remedy is publication of the truth, whatever the truth may be. With a remedy at hand, Mussolini prefers to rave over his suffering rather than effect a cure. If the rumors about himself and his government are, at their worst, a lesser evil than the truth about conditions in Italy, then II Duce should check his rage and suffer in silence.

HAND SHAKING

Just because men of long ago clasped hands as a guarantee that they were not going to stab each other, a Russian composer now giving a series of concerts in this country is going to insist on having his contract changed.

That contract was very evidently framed by a practical person who aforesaid had business relations with some very temperamental person. It provides that the composer must shake hands with every individual presented to him. The drawback is, as the musician sees it, that there are too many strong men in the United States, for one out of every ten who shakes his hand nearly breaks it. People who have to do a lot of hand-shaking, including presidents of the United States, early learn the trick of quickly grabbing the hand extended, and they have been known to brag of the skill experience brings.

We think it could be conceded for any of the present heavyweights that he is heavy.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

SECRETARY OF TREASURY TRYING TO DODGE PLAN OF HAVING YOUNG ARMY UNDER HIM TO HALT LAND SMUGGLING

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—England has the world's strongest navy. There really is no doubt about it. Ours is entitled to parity with it but we have not kept it there. Ours is second.

Some folks say Japan's nearly on a par with us, but that is an exaggeration. Japan's is third. France's is fourth. Italy is entitled to parity with France, just as we are entitled to parity with the British, but even the Fascists have been unable to keep up the pace.

So Italy's is fifth. And whose is sixth? Why, the United States coast guard's to be sure. This is no joke. Since the augmentation of his fleet to fight rum running, Rear Admiral Frederick C. Billard has commanded the sixth strongest navy in the world.

Here and there one or another of the minor sea powers has a bigger individual ship to show than any which flies the U. S. treasury pennant, but in point of personnel, number of vessels, total tonnage, weight of metal, up-to-dateness and all-round efficiency, Admiral Billard's outfit has them all backed off the ocean. In fact, he could lick two or three of most of them in one.

And now it looks as if the treasury department is about to be provided with an army equal to making quite a few little countries feel envious, too.

Ten thousand men! Such is the force which congress is discussing, to stop smugglers from crossing our land frontiers hitherward, even as it is the coast guard's duty to prevent them from descending on our shores.

People who are not yet so very old can remember when our whole standing army mustered only two and a half times that many—in Indian warfare days, at that. The king of Denmark gets along with an army of 10,000. The Irish Free State's military establishment is 8,555. Conditions are so troubled in central South America that Bolivia is on a war footing, with 8,750 conscripts under arms.

It may seem as if any red-blooded cabinet member would be proud to have a fine little army like this wished upon him. Strange to say, the situation is otherwise. Secretary Mellon is understood to have made a number of suggestions designed to sidestep having 10,000 dumped on his hands. However, his cabinet brethren, younger and more active, have sidestepped even faster. Indications are that Mr. Mellon is stuck with the job.

At first it was proposed to place the new legion under the war secretary's jurisdiction but the scheme which that department had out rent the air. The navy department hastily pointed out that it can have no possible interest in activities ashore. Justice department officials plead that this necessarily was a military unit and that soldiering is out of their legal line.

Secretary of Labor Davis although concerned in shooing off unauthorized immigration, also represents that he is unfamiliar with troop movements. Secretary Hyde had to put up a pretty warm argument in opposition to Mr. Mellon's contention that the agriculture department needs at least 10,000 warriors to drive back insect pests, trying to enter the United States.

After all, the treasury head is the logical commander-in-chief of the proposed cohort, as of the coast guard. In the well-known last analysis, it is a customs patrol.

But Admiral Billard will have none of it in his mind. The admiral is a sea-dog—an admiral, not a general. The conclusion appears to be that the landmen will be organized into a body somewhat on the coast guard pattern, modified to suit shore conditions and with a colonel or maybe a brigadier in command, on the same basis as Admiral Billard is in command afloat.

This raises the question of pay. The rank and file of coast guardsmen get about \$25 a month, which is all very well for a sailor, with everything provided for him, but not so liberal ashore, for a trooper who will have to buy a good many things for himself. Hence an emolument of \$2,500 yearly per man is being urged. The drawback is that \$2,500 yearly for a force of 10,000 would cost only for back pay; it runs into quite a snug sum.

One suggestion heard on Capitol hill is that the guardsmen be authorized to solicit subscriptions to the popular magazines on the side.

Your Health

CANCERS OF THE MOUTH CAN BE CURED IF TREATED PROMPTLY

Cancer of the mouth is fairly frequent in men and has been in the past rather infrequent in women. It has been associated by the experts with irritations due to sharp and jagged teeth, with badly fitting dental plates, and repeated biting of the tongue.

The excessive use of either smoking or chewing tobacco is believed to be associated with cancer of the mouth and lip, and since women have taken to smoking excessively as well as men, it is predicted by many physicians that the rate for cancer of the mouth will soon equal that for men.

Uncleanliness of the mouth leads to bad teeth and thereby to irritations which are associated with cancer. In a recent consideration of this subject in Hygiene, Dr. George E. Fahler emphasizes the fact that most physicians believe that cancer never develops in fully healthful tissue.

The first sign of cancer of the mouth is a pearly elevated or warty outgrowth on the lips or gums which does not show signs of healing after two weeks, but which persists as a crust or an ulcer. If any core tends to persist for more than two weeks, it is advisable to consult a competent physician and not to attempt to cause it to heal by treating it with caustics or similar methods.

Cancer of the mouth, if seen early and treated by surgical removal or radium, can be stopped with little pain or discomfort. On the other hand, cancer tends to spread if not treated, and once it has affected the glands of the neck, the cure becomes problematical if not impossible. In cancer of the mouth, as in all other forms, the slogan must be, in the light of our present knowledge, early diagnosis and removal.

Gil Will Remain With Government

President Of Mexico Will Step Down From Office Today; To Become Minister Of Interior

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 4. (AP)—Emilio Portes Gil, provisional president of Mexico, stepping down from his high office tomorrow to permit accession of Pascual Ortiz Rubio, will not leave the government, but will take the portfolio of minister of interior in the cabinet of his successor.

Three others of the cabinet of President Portes Gil will continue on the cabinet of Ortiz Rubio, the official list of appointments as published today indicated. General Joaquin Amaro will remain in the war ministry and Montes De Oca will continue as secretary of the treasury. Genaro Estrada, acting foreign minister, will be raised to the rank of full minister.

New appointments include that of General Juan Andreu Almazan as minister for communications and public works. General Almazan, next to President Calles, was the leading figure in the federal offensive against the rebellion of last March.

Manuel Perez Trevino, president of the national revolution party, will be minister of agriculture, and Luis Leon, secretary-general of the party and minister of agriculture under former President Calles will become minister of industry, commerce and labor. Aaron Saez, governor of Nueva Leon, defeated by Ortiz Rubio for the party nomination, will be minister of education.

Barge Crew Will Tell of Tragedy

MOBILE Ala., Feb. 4. (AP)—Testimony in connection with the sinking of the tug Edgar F. Coney in the Gulf of Mexico last Tuesday will be taken from the crew of the barge which was in tow at the time when members of the crew arrive in Mobile, steamboat inspectors here announced today.

The crew had not arrived today but the hearing will not start until all are on hand. Testimony will be forwarded to Tampa to district inspector's office.

The Edgar F. Coney went to the bottom while towing a barge for the Mobile office of the Pure Oil company. All 14 members of the crew were lost.

OPPOSE RESTRICTION

Grange Representative In Immigration Fight

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4. (AP)—Frederic Brenckman, Washington representative of the National Grange, today presented the opposition of that organization to the placing of a quota limit on new world immigration to the house immigration committee.

The Grange in 1927 adopted a resolution setting forth this position, he said, adding that its members favored appointment of a commission to study the farm labor situation in the southwest before the entry of Mexican laborers was restricted.

"If the Mexicans are partially excluded," he testified, "the farmers will have to fall back on the American and Porto Rican negroes and the Filipinos. They consider the Mexican more desirable."

BODY RECOVERED

JENNY LIND, Ark., Feb. 4. (AP)—The body of M. D. Redfern, 40, a "shot firer" reported missing last night was taken from a coal mine here today by a rescue party which traveled almost 3,500 feet down the mine slope. The searchers said he had succumbed to asphyxiation which followed a minor explosion late yesterday.

His wife, mother of eight, had kept an all night vigil in the faint hope that Redfern might be found alive.

Murder Details Told By Officers

Mexican Police Search For Culprit After Body Of Ranchman Is Found Decapitated Near Guerrero

LAREDO, Feb. 4. (AP)—Details of the murder of Tomas Bernal, Mexican ranchman, whose decapitated body was found in an isolated part of his ranch south of Guerrero, Mexico, last week, were related to Laredo authorities today by Mexican officials searching for the culprit.

An unknown Mexican, about 24, called at the Bernal ranch home about a week ago in search of work, which Bernal gave him. Bernal and the Mexican left the ranch house, Bernal carrying an axe, intending to cut pear cactus for some cattle.

Neighbors calling Tuesday instituted a search, and the body was found about three miles from the house. The blood stained axe lay nearby. Mexican officials found the ranch house, in which the rancher lived alone, had been robbed of money and clothing. There were evidences of a struggle at the scene of the murder.
