Kathy Merket, Highland's '67 Homemaker Of Tomorrow

Kathy Merket, by finishing first in a written homemaking knowledge and attitude examination for Senior girls on Dec. 6th, became Highland's 1967 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow.

Kathy is now eligible for possible state and national scholarship awards. Her test also earned her a specially designed silver charm from General Mills, sponsor of the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

A state Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner-up will be selected from the winners of all schools in the state, with the former receiving a \$1,500 college scholarship; her school will be given a complete set of Encyclopedia Britannica by Encyclopedia Britannica, Inc. The runner-up will be awarded a \$500 educational grant.

The Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow from this state, together with those from other states and the District of Columbia, each accompanied by

her school advisor, will join in an expense paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C., next spring.

This is the 13th year of the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow, initiated in 1954-55 by General Mills to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. More than 5,000,000 Senior girls have participated in the Search since its inception, and 1,256 winners will have earned scholarships totaling \$1,371,500 at the conclusion of the current program.

The 581,334 girls and 14,753 schools registering for the 1967 Search established a new record for the program.

NATIONAL F.F.A. WEEK

Vocational Agriculture students in Loraine High School will join Future Farmers of America members throughout the nation in activities to focus attention on the importance of agriculture during National FFA Week, Feb. 18-25.

"Agriculture . . . Strength of America," is this year's FFA Week theme. The boys will undertake a campaign to inform the general public about the importance of the agriculture industry to America, the growing need for farming, and of the numerous and wide variety of opportunities that exist in the board fields of agriculture for young men who have a background of farm experience and training.

"We have had such an abundance of food in America that people are taking agriculture for granted," said Raymond Holt, Vocational Agriculture teacher and FFA Advisor. "Actually, farming is now and has always been our largest and most vital industry, and it is becoming increasingly important with our expanding population. In our area, particularly most of the businesses, and most of the jobs, are basically dependent upon surrounding farms for their existence. Take away the farms, and you all practical purposes you would destroy the entire community."

"We also want to point out," he added, "the very important part that agricultural knowledge and farm products have in the nation's world commitments."

Membership in the FFA is made up of students of vocational agriculture in high school. The organization's activities are designed to help develop rural

leadership and good citizenship, and to stimulate the students to better achievement in their study and work toward successful establishment in farming or other agricultural occupations.

The Loraine Chapter has 36 members. Officers are: President, Ronnie Finley; Vice President, Stanley Hackfeld; Secretary, Jesse Watkins; Treasurer, Ricky Walker; Reporter, David Terry; Sentinel, Herman Mitchell.

The national Future Farmer organization has approximately 450,000 members, with 9,000 local chapters in the 50 States and Puerto Rico. Membership in Texas totals 40,000.

Future Farmers choose the week of George Washington's birthday each year for the observance of National FFA Week. Although usually recognized as a Revolutionary War General and our first President, Washington's first love was the farm. He was one of the first in the nation to practice contour planting, crop rotation, fertilization, and other soil conservation and improvement methods.

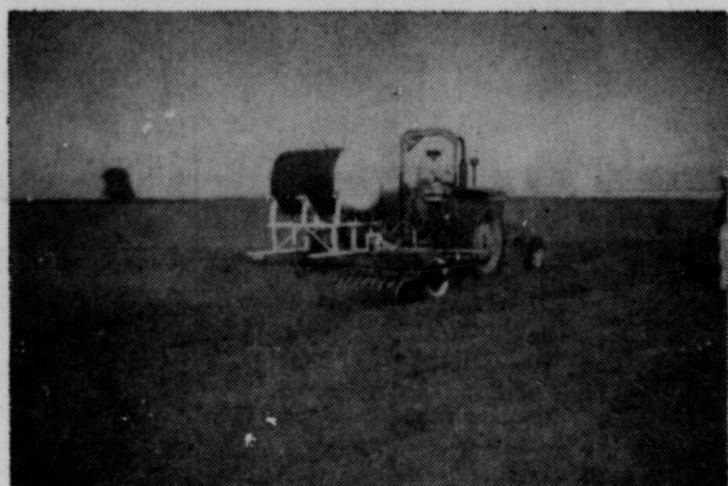

Farmers Hear Lubbock Speaker

Mr. George Babcock of Lubbock was spokesman for a meeting held at the Co-op Gin office Tuesday at 2 p. m.

Mr. Babcock made very plain what everyone has known for some time, that the cotton which we have been producing is not the quality of cotton the textile mills are using under their high speed operations. Mr. Babcock gave instances that revealed that the company now was operating at about three times the speed that they once operated, and that to enable them to run this fast, the fiber of the cotton was going to have to have tensile strength. The properties that textile mills must have are length, strength, and color.

We are going to have to upgrade our cotton so that we can meet standards that the mills are now demanding. This cotton, according to Mr. Larry Poeter, also of the Lubbock Marketing Assn., was selling above the loan enough that many are getting between 27-33 cents for their cotton.

They introduced a plan where by the Acala variety of cotton could be started in our area on a small scale. Many seemed to indicate they were interested in trying this program and would work for the goal of better quality cotton in our area.

The men spoke concerning this variety of cotton, saying, "that it would be a little more difficult to grow, in that it would demand a little more time and

watching. But that the difference in price would make it worth while."
