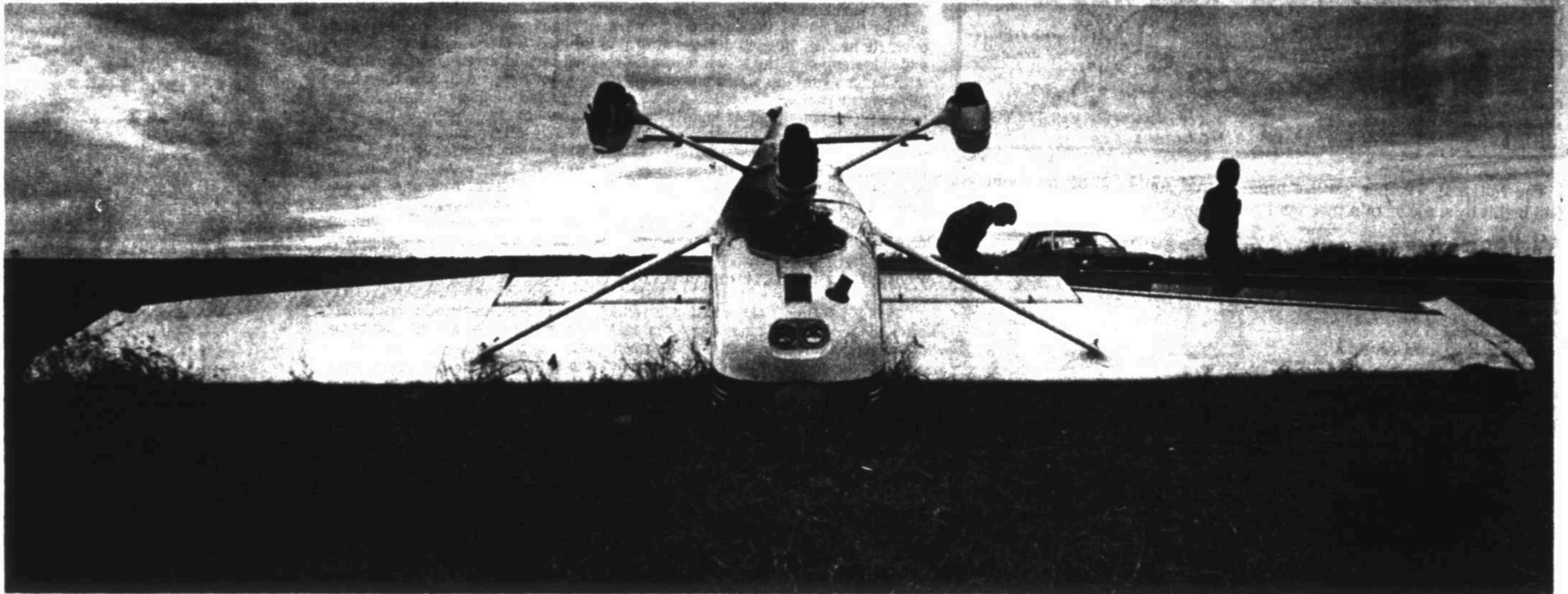

Seven die in Kentucky mine explosion

CRAYNOR, Ky. (AP) — Teams of workers today pulled the last bodies from a family-owned coal mine where seven men, including four members of the family, were killed in a blast that a state official says may have been caused by coal-mining explosives.

It was the fourth mining disaster in the Appalachian coalfields in seven weeks. Thirty-one men have died.

"Oh Lord have mercy, Lord have mercy, what am I going to do?" cried Lilly Hamilton, who lost three sons and a grandson in Wednesday morning's blast, as she watched work crews. Her house stands down the hill from the mine that her four sons opened several years ago on the winding left fork of Mink Branch, a tributary of Mud Creek.

"Come on inside now, mother, there's nothing you can do for them out here," Chester Newsome, a relative, said he told the woman.

THE COAL AT THE RFH Mining Co.'s No. 1 Mine had been mined with explosives, an old-fashioned but relatively inexpensive technique that also had been used in a mine in nearby Topmost, Ky., where eight people were killed in an explosion last month. Officials have speculated the Topmost blast may have been caused by a coal-dust explosion as coal was being blasted from its seam.

One body was removed Wednesday and workers today pulled the remain-

ing six from the mine on a foggy eastern Kentucky hillside.

State Mines and Minerals Commissioner Willard Stanley speculated explosives caused the blast.

The explosion fired debris hundreds of feet and spewed so much coal dust it blackened a hill facing the mine, said Mike Froman, who was on his way to the mine when yellow smoke began pouring from the it.

Stanley said the type of explosive used was a "water gel," and he said he was baffled that "it would generate that much heat." Some explosive detonators were not in proper containers, Stanley said.

UMW PRESIDENT Sam Church, who arrived at the mine in a helicopter loaned by West Virginia Gov. Jay Rockefeller, called the accident a "carbon copy" of the Dec. 7 blast 20 miles away at Topmost, Ky., where eight miners were killed. Church had been in Charleston, W.Va., discussing mine safety with Rockefeller.

Church said he talked with Kentucky Gov. John Y. Brown Jr. by telephone Wednesday night and said the governor wanted "to see if there is some way we might have changes in our legislation" to ban the use of explosives in underground mines.

The blast killed brothers Burnis, Don and Jack Hamilton, along with Wade Hamilton, Palmer Edwin McKenny, Ronnie Hall and Thurman Reynolds. Wade Hamilton was the

son of mine co-owner Purvis Hamilton.

ALLARD "BUSTER" Newsome, who operates a mine on the other side of the mountain, was among the first to arrive after the blast.

"We got there about three minutes later and ran into Purvis (Hamilton)," he said. "He said, 'Let's get the fan back on and get some air back there.'"

We then got the fan back on and waited for more men to come." Stanley told the miners' relatives that three bodies were found together about 700 feet from the entrance to the mine. The other four were much deeper in the mine, he added.

The mine was contracted to remove the coal, which was owned by Elkhorn Coal Corp. of Wayland, Ky., a subsidiary of Ethyl Corp.

MMH favored for special unit

Midland Memorial Hospital's application for a chemical dependency unit received a favorable recommendation from the local Health Systems Agency Wednesday night, while Parkview and West Plains hospitals will take an unfavorable recommendation to Austin for final approval.

"Obviously, we are very pleased," Ray Branson, MMH president, said.

"I'm very pleased by the decision that was made. It was in the best interest of the region," Roy Campbell, chairman of the MMH Board of Trustees, said.

After eight to nine hours of discussion this week, the Permian Basin Health Systems Agency Governing Body decided not to accept its Projects Review Committee's decision.

The committee chose two separate recommendations: a favorable recommendation on the concept of all three hospitals' applications, and favorable recommendations on proposed facilities by MMH and Parkview but an unfavorable recommendation on the West Plains facility.

ALL THREE HOSPITALS' applications for similar facilities will go before the Texas Health Facilities Commission in Austin for final approval April 5.

MMH's application is for a \$3.4 million freestanding 50-bed behavioral health service facility with only chemical dependency services for adults and adolescents to be constructed in north-east Midland.

Parkview proposed converting its 60-bed acute medical care facility into a 60-bed psychiatric hospital with substance abuse services. The \$500,000 conversion would not require a new facility.

SOUTHWEST Health of Midland/Odessa Inc., naming its hospital West Plains, submitted an application for a \$4.166 million psychiatric facility with chemical abuse services to be built at Air Terminal.

While nine representatives for MMH left the hearing with smiling faces, representatives for Parkview and West Plains both said "it's not over."

"We'll see them in Austin," Dick Lilley, Parkview administrator, said.

"We haven't given up yet," Michael Bullitt, vice president of operations for the Southwest — West Plains Hospital, said.

There were seven options for the Projects Review Committee:

—Favorable for one and unfavorable for two;

—Favorable for two and unfavorable

Reagan decides on higher excise taxes, record budget deficit

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan has decided on a 1983 budget plan that calls for higher excise taxes, the transfer of dozens of social programs to the states and the biggest deficit ever sent to Congress, administration sources report.

After meeting with his top economic advisers Wednesday, the president settled on a budget that would seek approximately \$15 billion in new taxes to keep the projected deficit to about \$75 billion, according to the sources, who did not want to be identified.

The sources said the new tax package would call for higher excise taxes on tobacco, alcohol and other consumer goods and the narrowing of a number of tax "loopholes."

The sources declined to be more specific about the tax proposals, saying some minor changes were possible over the next few days. They said the president planned to disclose his major budget proposals next Tuesday in his State of the Union message to Congress.

Earlier tax proposals under discussion within the administration centered on increased excise taxes on cigarettes, liquor, wine, long-distance telephone calls and "luxury" items, such as jewelry, furs and yachts.

HIGHER EXCISE TAXES on beer, gasoline and airline tickets also had been under review, but there was greater opposition within the adminis-

tration to increase taxes on these items.

Revenue from the federal excise taxes would be turned over to the states to finance some 40 federal programs in health, education and other social areas that the administration wants to shift to state control, sources said.

In addition, Reagan will propose the wholesale transfer of the giant welfare and food stamp programs to the states in exchange for a total federal takeover of the burgeoning Medicaid program, which has been growing 15 percent a year in costs for providing health care to the nation's poor, according to the sources.

Treasury Secretary Donald T. Regan disclosed Wednesday that one "loophole" the administration would seek to narrow involves tax-exempt industrial development bonds that local governments sell to attract new businesses.

Administration officials declined to identify the other tax changes the president approved, although one proposal under active consideration called for limiting deductions that can be claimed on unemployment insurance.

THE EXCISE TAX proposals are likely to provoke opposition from a number of Reagan's Republican supporters in Congress. Earlier this week, House GOP Whip Trent Lott of Mississippi and Rep. Jack Kemp of New York

complained that higher excise taxes will hurt the "little guy" and risk political defeat for Republicans.

Reagan is reluctantly supporting higher taxes as the only way to keep future deficits from soaring well beyond \$100 billion a year, aides said.

A \$75 billion deficit for fiscal 1983, which begins Oct. 1, would be the largest ever projected by a president in his budget message to Congress.

The deficit for the 1982 is expected to be the largest in history — about \$100 billion, but Reagan had projected a deficit of only \$45 billion for the year in his initial proposal to Congress.

The largest deficit now on the books is \$66.4 billion, set in 1976.

Sources also reported that an eco-

nomical forecast accompanying the new budget plan predicts the economy will achieve virtually no growth on average during 1982, then grow by 5 percent a year during 1983 and 1984.

INFLATION IS EXPECTED to recede to 8 percent in 1982, to 6 percent in 1983 and 5 percent in 1984. But unemployment is expected to average nearly 9 percent throughout 1982 — the highest level since World War II. The current jobless rate is 8.9 percent.

Among the new proposals in the budget is a plan to create up to 25 "urban enterprise zones" in depressed inner cities. The government will try to attract business in these areas through a combination of tax breaks and an easing of regulatory requirements.

Citations for new law vary

Whether or not Texas motorists get cited for not complying with the state's new mandatory liability insurance law depends on which police agency stops them, according to a random survey by The Reporter-Telegram.

Drivers stopped by the Department of Public Safety will get off with a warning for the time being, according to Lt. Jimmie Rhoads of the DPS' Safety Education Division.

"Normally on a new law," said Rhoads, "we allow 90 days for people to become familiar with it. Except for unusual cases, we'll issue only warning tickets until April 1."

Lamesa police will go along with the DPS policy, according to Chief of Police Gary Brown, while a spokesman for the Odessa Police Department says they will hold off issuing tickets until Feb. 1.

Both the Midland and Big Spring police departments started enforcing the law the day it went into effect: Jan. 1. Said a Big Spring spokesman, "It had been advertised since September, so we started enforcing it right off."

Midland Chief of Police Wayne Gideon could not be reached for comment.

Amarillo police are giving motorists until April 1 to comply. Dallas began enforcement Jan. 11, and a spokesman for Houston police said except for traffic accidents and heavy truck violations, they will wait until April 1 to begin enforcing the law, which calls for minimum liability and property damage coverage.

A first conviction will be classified as a Class-C misdemeanor, with a minimum fine of \$75. Subsequent convictions will be categorized as Class-B mis-

Auto talks halted temporarily

DETROIT (AP) — The surprising breakdown of emergency contract talks between the United Auto Workers and the nation's two biggest automakers may not mean an end to negotiations on contract concessions, according to UAW officials.

UAW President Douglas Fraser announced the halt of bargaining at General Motors Corp. shortly after noon Wednesday, saying the two sides were deadlocked on economic and job security issues. Late in the afternoon, the union's negotiating committee at Ford Motor Co. suspended contract talks at the No. 2 automaker.

demeanors carrying minimum fines of \$200 and the possibility of jail sentences.

Enforcement will be conducted by asking drivers at accident scenes and during routine stops for proof of financial liability. Out-of-state motorists are exempt from the law, as are government-owned vehicles and self-insured motorists.

The DPS estimates that 26 percent of the drivers in Texas do not carry insurance.

Fraser refused to elaborate on why bargaining was halted, but the suspension of talks may have as much to do with internal UAW politics as with differences between the companies and the union bargainers.

UAW bargainers have to be sure any agreement arising from the talks will be palatable to the union membership, and a UAW faction opposing the current talks voted Wednesday to continue its fight.

Donald Ephlin, UAW vice president and head of the union's Ford Department, said he expects the suspension of talks to be only temporary.

Two bank charters approved

AUSTIN — By a 3-0 vote, the State Banking Board Wednesday approved a charter for Midland American Bank, and approved an "interim charter" to allow acquisition of Western State Bank, Midland, by Consolidated Bancshares, Inc., Abilene.

Midland American Bank's application was unopposed at a hearing held Dec. 9 by the Department of Banking.

The bank lists \$400,000 in capital, with an equal amount in surplus, with \$200,000 reserves.

Proposed directors, all of Midland, are Dick Bench, Clyde C. Brown, Har-

riett Faudree, H.C. McCulloch and Margaret White.

Approval will allow the organizers to proceed with establishing the new bank, which lists as its site the southwest corner of Midland Drive and FM 868.

Interim charters, such as that approved for Western State Bank, are used to allow acquisition of existing banks by holding companies through exchange of stock.

The Banking Board also approved an application by Consolidated Bancshares for an interim charter for acquisition of Travis Bank and Trust, Austin.

Pilot's funeral to be in Crane

CRANE — Services for Roger Alan Pettit, 31, a native of Crane and the co-pilot of an Air Florida jet that crashed last week in Washington, D.C., will be at 3 p.m. Saturday at First Baptist Church here with burial in Crane County Cemetery.

Richard W. Box Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

Pettit, who was living in Cooper City, Fla., was one of 78 persons killed when the jet struck the 14th Street Bridge and plunged into the Potomac River last week.

Pettit had a total of 1,200 hours flying time and had been hired by Air Florida in September 1980 as a first officer on its Boeing 737s. He served eight years as a pilot of T-33s and F-100s in the U.S. Air Force after his graduation from Texas Tech in December 1971 with a bachelor's degree in political science.

Pettit was born in Odessa March 11, 1950, and graduated in 1968 from Crane High School. He served briefly as a

Jury hands Cuban suspended sentence

A Cuban refugee, who quietly wept while the prosecuting attorney argued that he should be sent to prison for slaying a fellow Cuban in Midland and while defense attorneys begged the jury to show mercy for their 35-year-old client, virtually was set free by the seven-man, five-woman jury in 238th State District Court Wednesday night.

The tearful and grateful defendant, Justo Alonzo, shook the jurors' hands, as they filed out of the courtroom and said "Thank you very much" over and over. He heartily hugged defense attorneys Edward T. Garza and Sandy Torres and side-stepped to the bench where he reached up and exchanged handshakes with Judge Vann Culp, again murmuring "Thank you very much." He then happily returned upstairs to jail to get his belongings and to check out after being locked up for more than six months under a murder charge.

The jury pondered almost 2 1/4 hours Wednesday afternoon before finding Alonzo guilty of the lesser offense of voluntary manslaughter in the shooting death of Jose Diaz, also 35, in the El Cantarito Bar at 200 E. Kentucky Ave., last June 27. Prosecuting attorney Jim Rex had sought a murder conviction.

Wednesday night, the jury deliberated almost 1 1/4 hours in the punishment phase of the trial before giving Alonzo a two-year suspended sentence and then placing him on probation for five years. With certain stipulations, he again was a free man.

"THAT'S WHAT I call a hell of a victory," Garza exclaimed to his co-counsel after the jury had left the courtroom, took the elevator down and headed home following the three-day trial. "We did good, Garza," Torres said.

Unlike the others, prosecutor Rex was not smiling. The jury could have sentenced Alonzo to as much as 20 years in prison on the manslaughter conviction. Had he been convicted of murder, Alonzo could have been sentenced from five years to 99 years or life in prison.

Alonzo, an anti-communist who fled Havana, Cuba, in 1980 by way of the Peruvian Embassy and came to the United States in a flotilla with other refugees, on Tuesday testified through an interpreter that he had shot Diaz out of fear for his life. He said Diaz had been deriding him, mocking him, calling him "effeminate," and threatening to kill him for months. He said that within days of the shooting, Diaz had poured pig's blood on his clothing. In Cuba, such a deed is an omen for impending death or injury, Alonzo said.

ALONZO'S courtroom demeanor was that of a gentle, sensitive person who appeared remorseful and afraid. Accounts of the more assertive Diaz projected him as a jealous bully who gained satisfaction in seeing how far he could "push" Alonzo. Their common bond, outside of fleeing Cuba, apparently was in Diaz's wife, whom Diaz had suspected at one time was Alonzo's sweetheart.

Evidence indicated that Alonzo ran into Diaz in the bar, shot him in the head with a .25-caliber pistol and then fired five more rounds into the fallen man after Diaz had "put his hand in his pocket and offended me morally," Alonzo had testified.

In his closing arguments in the punishment phase of the trial, Garza made a virtual hero out of Alonzo, who apparently had been black-listed by Cuban dictator Fidel Castro after he had handed out anti-communist literature and then sought freedom.

"He was a man who would risk 30 years in Fidel Castro's dungeon for freedom," Garza said in painting a backdrop for the defendant.

Garza said that sending Alonzo to the penitentiary would in no way help the dead man. "All the king's men and all the king's horses will not bring Mr. Diaz back."

He said that Alonzo was "pushed and pushed and pushed" by Diaz "into a corner, and he could go back no farther. "It's an unfortunate incident," Garza said. And he turned to his sobbing client.

"IF THIS MAN is not remorseful, I do not know what is," he said. "Please," Garza begged of the jurors, "don't place him in a cage like a common animal."

Torres suggested the jurors consider Alonzo's heritage and "the history of these (Cuban) people" before settling on a punishment. "He escaped (for) freedom, fought for freedom" while in Cuba.

Torres, a probation officer in El Paso before he was a lawyer, recommended probation for his client and shunned a prison life, which he hinted might not be all that rehabilitative, for Alonzo. "Does that (probation) deter anybody (from crime)?" Torres asked. "I don't know that, either."

IN HIS CLOSING statement, prosecutor Rex recommended to the jurors that Alonzo be sent off to prison for as many years "as your conscience will allow." Rex cautioned the jurors that if they give Alonzo a probation sentence, "He can catch the elevator with you as you leave."

Rex said Alonzo, who occasionally sobbed during the trial and nervously smoked filtered cigarettes, "was emotional then (when he shot Diaz); he's emotional now."

Rex said that there was no just restitution. "How can a man who's been killed be compensated?" he asked the jurors.

"I assure you, Mr. Diaz would gladly exchange a cage for a grave."

Ogg's campaign based on three issues

Stopping in the area during a three-day whirlwind tour of Texas, State Sen. Jack Ogg, D-Houston, announced his decision to seek the Democratic nomination for attorney general in the May 1 primary at Midland Regional Airport Wednesday afternoon.

Ogg, who said he is a firm believer in local government, said he was basing his campaign on three major areas.

Too many of the opinions passed by the attorney general, according to Ogg, are inadequately handled. "When a local official asks the attorney general for his legal opinion, often there is nothing set down specifically," Ogg explained. "I think it can be improved."

"We need to cut through the red tape," he continued. "There is too much time involved from the time it (the inquiry) goes through the committees and gets back to the person."

Placing a special emphasis on restitution to the victims of crime, Ogg said he also plans to reform and revise probation and parole laws. He used as an example the situation of a child who breaks an object and must pay for it with his allowance.

According to Ogg, a first offender should be required "to pay back some of the money" to the victims of his crime, if loss of money or property is involved, in addition to the standard probation laws such as reporting to a parole officer, maintaining employment and avoiding establishments where liquor is served or gambling is practiced, while on probation.

"I think it (restitution while on probation) is fair to the people asking for

rehabilitation and it's fair to the families of the victims," Ogg said.

"I don't think the state should reimburse every victim of every crime," he added. "But on one hand, the purpose (of such a law) is to protect its (the state's) people."

Although this is one of his main goals, Ogg said there were several ways to approach the problem but he doesn't "have the answers yet."

"I want to attempt to look at why the restitution program the state started has been broke," he said.

The third goal mentioned by Ogg dealt with child abuse and family violence, "two of the root causes of crime in our society," he said.

More than 85 percent of the people in the state have witnessed or been victims of abuse, he said, adding he wants to raise more funds for the purpose of maintaining crime hot lines and shelters for victims.

Ogg said he introduced bills funding such centers during the past legislative session. One of those bills, which he said came close to being passed, related to a center in the Midland-Odessa area. The proposed bills did not mention the establishment of new state agencies, he said. The bills were written to help provide monetary assistance locally.

"If you want to control it (abuse) and want some help, you've got to be responsible, too," Ogg said. He suggested increasing the price for marriage licenses and divorces as one means of raising funds for abuse centers.

On the issue of overcrowding in penitentiaries, Ogg said he thinks that

for one.

—Favorable on the concept with recommendation in order of preference.

—Favorable on concept with no recommendation.

—Unfavorable on concept.

—Unfavorable on all three projects.

—Or unfavorable on all three projects, leaving the decision up to the Governing Body.

THE REASONS for the committee's decision to give an unfavorable recommendation to West Plains was the cost of the project and its location. The committee stated to the HSA Governing Body that West Plains' facility was too costly and the location was a problem because of the activity from the airport.

However, members of the HSA Governing Body disagreed.

HSA member Dr. Paul Rogers of Andrews said the cost of the project was not relevant because hospital costs would continue to rise.

"The location is what is important," Dr. Rogers said. "West Plains is in the middle of Midland and Odessa, making it accessible to physicians and patients. I'm for the one in the middle," he said.

Bullitt said the West Plains project

cost more than MMH because of the land purchase.

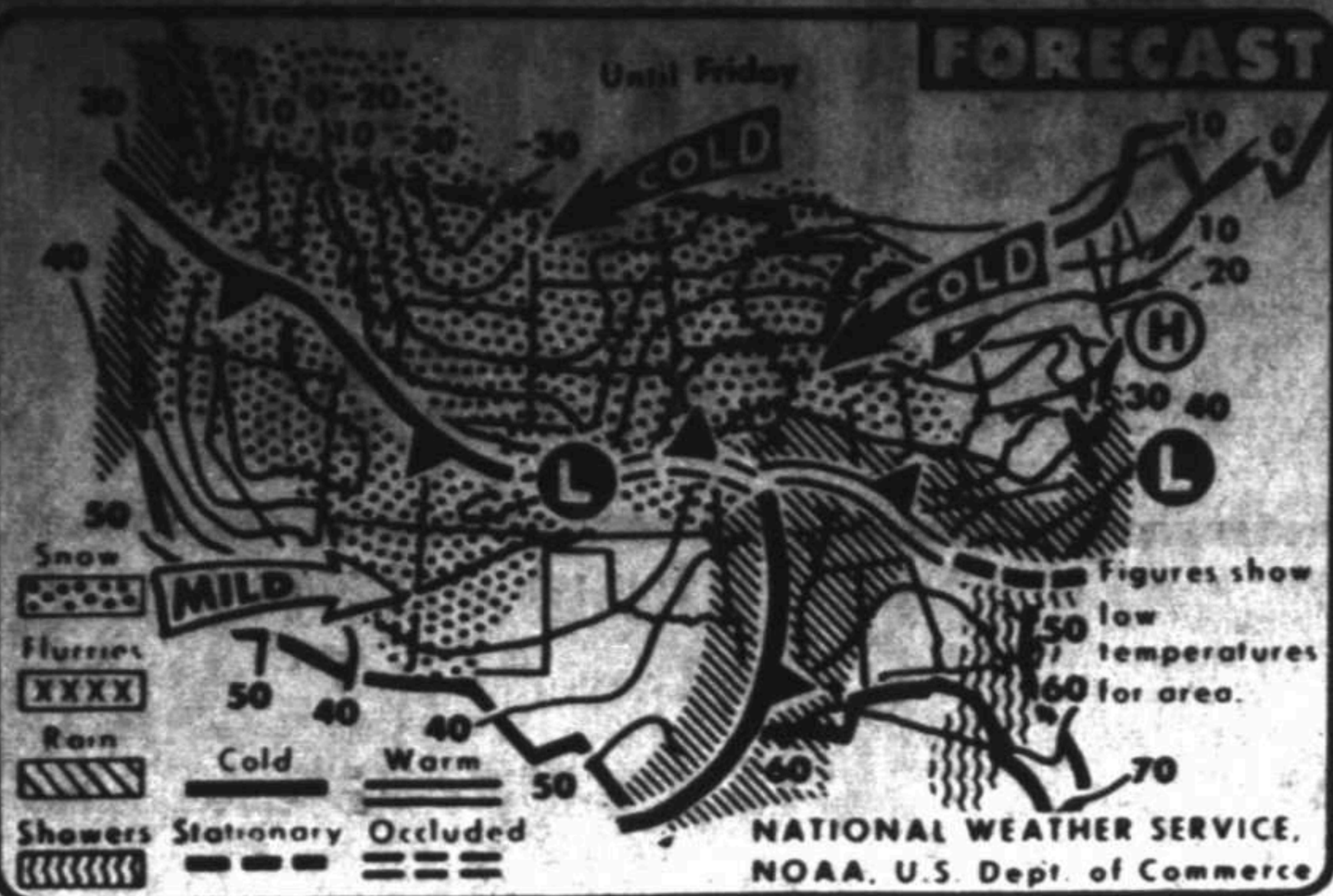
"The land is more expensive at the airport," he said.

BUT SOME MEMBERS of the HSA Governing Body were concerned about giving two favorable recommendations.

"Are they going to laugh at us in Austin, if we send two recommendations up there?" asked Keith Richmond, HSA Governing Body member who was on the Projects Review Committee. Richmond was concerned that the total number of substance abuse beds was higher than the HSA's 1986 projected need of 88 beds. Presently, MMH and Parkview together would total 70 beds for chemical abuse.

"We will be doing an injustice if we send both up there (Austin)," another HSA member said. "We need to bite the bullet — that's our purpose here."

With that comment, the HSA Governing Body voted 8 to 6 with one abstention for an unfavorable recommendation for West Plains, 5 to 7 with three abstentions for an unfavorable recommendation for Parkview and 8 to 3 with five abstentions for a favorable recommendation for MMH.

Report says U.S.-made trucks used to haul tanks

NEW YORK (AP)—Four hundred American-made trucks that Libya promised to use only for agricultural purposes have been rebuilt to haul Soviet-made tanks. The New York Times reported today.

The State Department says the 1978 truck sale to the militant Arab nation was approved in good faith and there is little the United States government can do about it now, the Times reported.

The Libyan government, which was barred from receiving military equipment made in the United States, provided written guarantees that the vehicles would be used only for agricultural purposes.

The manufacturer, the Oshkosh Truck Corp. in Wisconsin, says the alterations amount to fraud.

Leading members of the Wisconsin Congressional delegation had intervened at the State Department on the manufacturer's behalf after Oshkosh said it would be extremely difficult and expensive for Libya to modify the trucks for military use.

"We were double-crossed," said Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis.

Robert J. Sill, president of Oshkosh Truck, said: "We were double-crossed, too. We were not a party to the modifications. We were trying to be a good citizen company. I'd like to have the whole thing go away."

The deal involved a total sale of 400 trucks and spare parts for \$70 million, Oshkosh executives said.

Midland, Southwest incomes rank high

Figures released by the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics show major gains in average income in 1980 in the Southwest with Midland ranked high both in the state and the southwestern region.

Houston, which had the highest average annual income of any metropolitan area in the Southwest with \$17,460, ranked sixth in the nation. Midland, close behind at an average pay of \$17,136, thus ranked second in the state and Southwest and seventh in the U.S.

The high ranking of the Tall City is due to the large number of oil industry employees and the fact that Midland is an oil headquarters city with a high percentage, relative to population, of professional oil industry and support personnel.

The nation's highest paying area was Anchorage, Alaska, at \$23,126.

Of the five lowest paying areas in the nation, three were in Texas: Brownsville-Harlingen-San Benito, \$10,460; Laredo, \$10,404, and McAllen-Pharr-Edinburg, \$9,898.

The 1980 figures are for Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSAs) and are the latest available.

Midland also figured in the ranking of average income increases from 1979 to 1980, being included in the three Southwest SMSAs which led the nation in gains. Both Baton Rouge, La., and Midland chalked up 14.6 percent increases, while Lafayette, La. posted a 14.5 percent gain.

The Bureau noted that strong growth in the oil industries of all these areas accounted for much of the increases.

Suit asks for return of FBI-seized books

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—Three free-lance journalists have asked a federal court to order the FBI to return Iranian books that reportedly contain copies of classified U.S. documents seized in the 1979 takeover of the U.S. Embassy.

"Americans have a right to know what's going on in the world in their name," said New York producer William Worthy at a Wednesday news conference. Worthy is one of three plaintiffs who claim the FBI violated their constitutional rights.

American Civil Liberties Union attorneys filed the suit in U.S. District Court in Washington on Wednesday, asking for an injunction requiring the FBI to return 11 books confiscated last month at Boston's Logan International Airport.

The ACLU has also asked that the FBI action be ruled illegal.

Defendants included FBI Director William H. Webster, two Boston FBI agents who allegedly searched the journalists' luggage, U.S. Customs Commissioner William Von Raab and John V. Linde, district director of U.S. Customs in Boston.

The books belonged to Worthy and two technicians, Randy Goodman and Teresa Taylor, who spent two months in Iran last year at the invitation of the Iranian government.

The three said the books were widely published in Tehran and contained secret American documents seized in the embassy takeover by militants on Nov. 4, 1979, that began the 444-day hostage crisis.

Worthy said the books contained correspondence between Secretary of State Cyrus Vance and embassy officials about plans to allow the late Shah of Iran into the United States.

Other documents discussed the relationship between U.S. and Israeli intelligence operations and SAVAK, the secret police during the shah's regime.

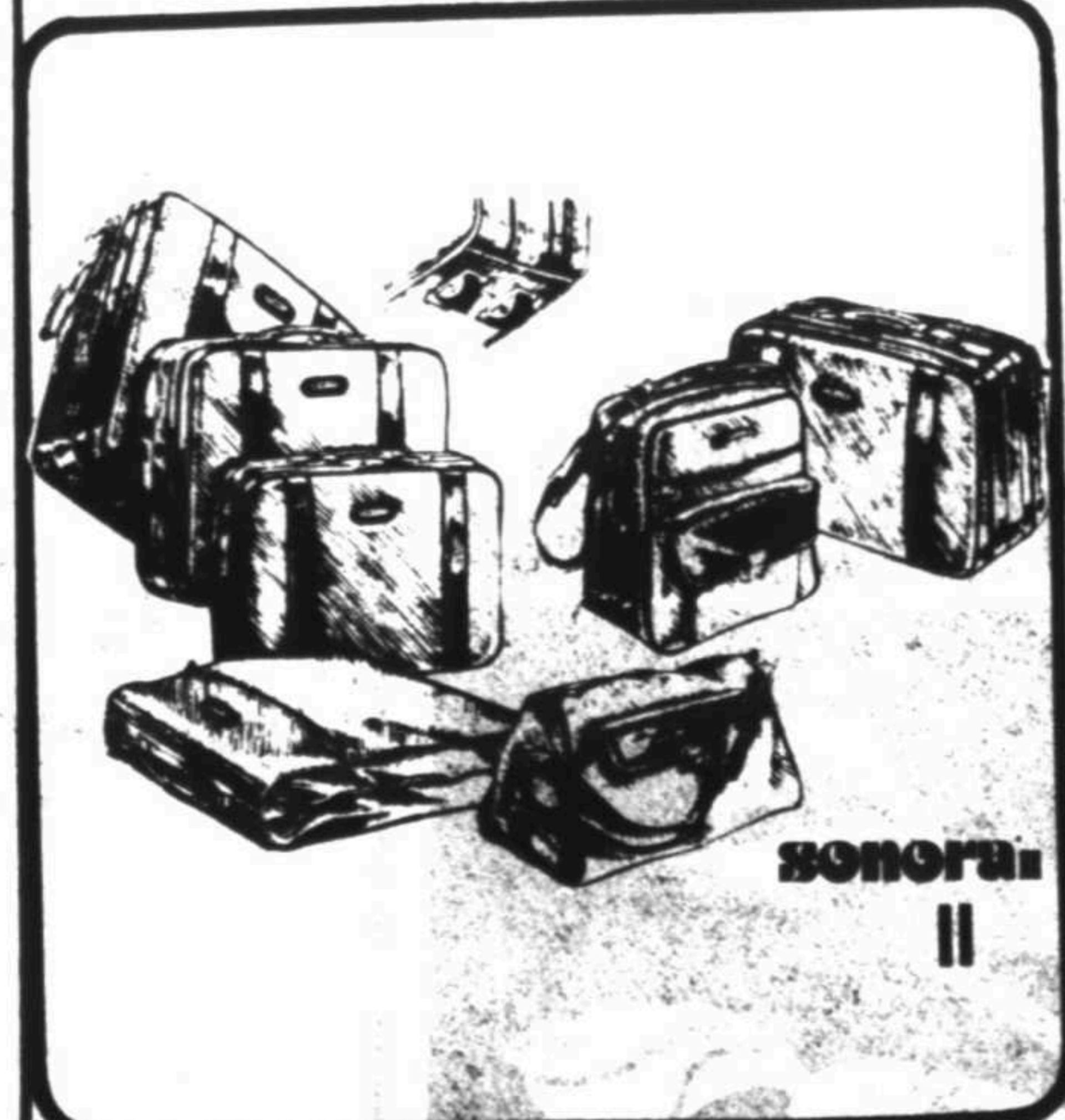

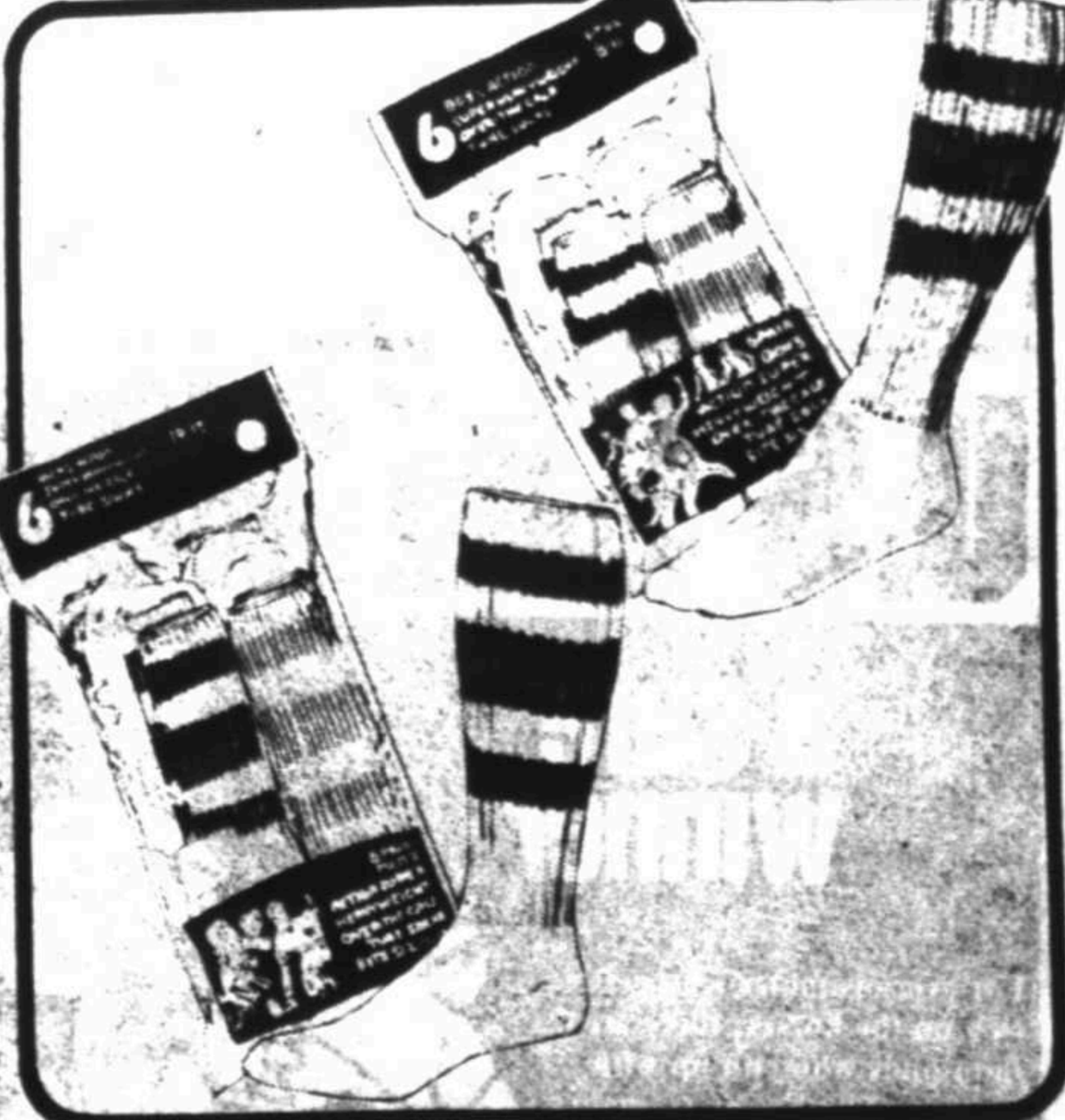

Court rules persons stopped for traffic offenses subject to search

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas stopped for traffic offenses are subject to complete searches, including a police check of their wallets, according to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

In a 5-3 decision Wednesday, the court ruled against Donald Snyder of Houston, who said his drug possession conviction was based on evidence illegally taken from his wallet by a policeman during a traffic stop.

Judge Marvin Teague's dissent said his colleagues' decision allows complete searches of "hapless motorists" stopped for the "most petty of traffic offenses."

The majority of the court, in an opinion written by Judge Tom Davis, said the search was legal because it was "incident to a lawful arrest."

Teague disagreed, saying Officer L.D. Garrison's reasons for looking into Snyder's wallet were "incredible." Garrison testified he wanted to see if there was a lot of money in it because "if it is not a payday, he could have acquired that large amount of money by some other means."

Garrison also said he wanted to check for weapons — razor blades, needles or even a key for handcuffs.

Teague said he "cannot subscribe to a principle of law that when any motorist is arrested for committing a breach of our traffic laws, that person becomes subject to a full body search, as well as a complete and thorough search of items of personal property found on his person."

People arrested for traffic or minor violations are entitled to "far more protection" than guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution's provision against unreasonable searches, he said.

Teague said Garrison had the right to seize the wallet, but not to look into it.

Today, a majority of this court sanctions a full custodial search of a person arrested for the most petty of traffic offenses and authorizes an extensive search of the person of the arrestee, including the reading of the private papers in the arrestee's wallet prior to booking and incarcerating of the hapless motorist," Teague said.

He said police should be allowed to do no more than a "pat search" to check for weapons in arrests involving minor offenses.

Judge Sam Houston Clinton, in another dissent, said such a search of "an otherwise innocuous wallet" is unconstitutional.

John Duncan, director of the Texas Civil Liberties Union, said the court missed an opportunity to give Texans greater protection against unreasonable searches than afforded by the U.S. Constitution.

"I would much prefer them to take the Texas Constitution and write a privacy right and construe it as giving greater protection than that which Nixon appointed to the Supreme Court," said Duncan.

Prosecutors seek death penalty for Herrera

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Prosecutors say they will try to convince a jury that convicted killer Leonel Herrera should die for the slaying of a rookie Los Fresnos policeman.

Herrera, 34, of Edinburg stared straight ahead and chewed gum as a guilty verdict was announced Wednesday in his capital murder trial.

State District Judge Darrell Hester told jurors to return today and be prepared to stay overnight if necessary in deciding whether to recommend death by injection or life imprisonment.

Jurors deliberated 3 1/2 hours before convicting Herrera in the death of Patrolman Enrique Carrizales, who was shot Sept. 29, 1961.

He also faces capital murder charges in the slaying of State Trooper David Rucker, who was killed minutes before and a few miles away from where Carrizales was shot.

"I don't want him to be put to death because that would be too easy," said Della Caudilla, Carrizales' sister, after the verdict. "His father and mother would be the ones suffering. A life sentence at hard labor, that would make him feel sorry for the rest of his life."

Carrizales, 23, had stopped a car on the main highway through Los Fresnos at 10:54 p.m., six minutes before his shift ended. He had been on the force 11 months.

His wife was waiting at the police station to take him home. Instead, she heard gunfire come across on his car radio and heard a friend riding with him yell for help.

She sat on the front row in the courtroom during the trial's last day and declined an interview after the verdict.

During closing arguments by Cameron County District Attorney Ray Cantu, she broke into tears as a side of her dead husband was flashed on the screen to jurors. Carrizales lived nine days after the shooting. He identified Herrera from a photograph as the man who shot him, witnesses testified.

Also in the courtroom was Herrera's sister, who sat weeping quietly as her brother was led away in handcuffs.

More than a dozen uniformed and plainclothed state and local law enforcement officers were in the courtroom for the trial. All spectators were frisked.

Cantu and defense lawyer Jim Bates said they would not comment on the trial until after the punishment phase.

During closing arguments, Bates tried to shoot down the state's case, especially the use of a handwritten, unaddressed letter signed, "Leonel Herrera."

The document, found after Herrera's arrest several days following the shootings, mentions Rucker by name.

Police delayed opening trunk to save fingerprints

HOUSTON (AP) — Police said they delayed opening the locked car trunk where the body of a slain Rice University student was found because they did not want to destroy any fingerprints or jeopardize the case by violating search and seizure laws.

Cathy Gregory, the victim's sister-in-law, said she pleaded with police to open the trunk of the abandoned car, but that officers waited for 26 hours.

Authorities found the body of Margaret Everson Fossil, 26, Monday stuffed in the trunk of a 1972 Capri.

The cause of death has not been determined, medical examiners said.

Mrs. Fossil, a fifth-year architectural student, was reported missing early Sunday. Police found the abandoned car about a block from her southwest Houston home that afternoon.

Acting Police Chief John P. Bales said detectives waited until Monday afternoon before they opened the trunk because they had not received permission from Mrs. Fossil's husband, Larry. Police said Fossil, a Yale University law student, was the car's registered owner.

District Attorney John Holmes said, "I'm not critical of what they did."

After the body was found, Mrs. Gregory said she realized her sister-in-law might still have been alive when the car was found.

"We're just distraught that she was in the trunk all that time," she said.

Detectives said they have no suspects or motives in the slaying, but Officer Tom Ladd said a wedding ring, a necklace and a pair of shoes belonging to Mrs. Fossil apparently were stolen. The keys to the car also were missing.

Services for Mrs. Fossil, the daughter of a vice president for National Can Corp. in Chicago, were held Wednesday.

CBS reports Vietnam deception

NEW YORK (AP) — Estimates of enemy troop strength in Vietnam through the Tet Offensive of 1968 were manipulated by military and civilian analysts, leaving Americans "misinformed about the nature and size" of the opposition, CBS News says in a special report to be broadcast Saturday night.

The 90-minute program documents, with testimony of several former military and civilian officials, what CBS calls "a conscious effort, indeed a conspiracy, at the highest levels of American military intelligence, to suppress and alter critical intelligence on the enemy."

The "Uncounted Enemy: A Vietnam Deception," to be shown 9:30-11 p.m. EST, includes a lengthy interview with Gen. William Westmoreland, the commander of U.S. forces in Vietnam at the time, along with several other key military and CIA officials.

SAM ADAMS, a one-time CIA analyst who was a primary source for the documentary, tells correspondent Mike Wallace that President Lyndon Johnson apparently was unaware of the huge buildup from the north that preceded Tet, or lunar new year.

"Shouldn't someone have told the president that not only were the VC planning a massive attack," Wallace asks Westmoreland, "but that they were flooding the south with North Vietnamese regulars?"

"Well, sure. That ... was known. That was known," the retired general replies.

In fact, Wallace says, the deception began as early as 1966. Despite mounting optimism for an American victory in Vietnam, CIA analysts — notably Adams — had begun to doubt estimates on enemy troop strength coming from military headquarters in Saigon, Wallace says.

Westmoreland, in April 1967, was summoned to Washington, where he told Johnson that the size of the Viet Cong army had leveled off at 285,000 men, the correspondent reports. The general apparently was not aware, Wallace says, that his own analysts had discovered evidence confirming CIA estimates of a much larger enemy force.

WESTMORELAND learned of their doubts on his return to Vietnam, Wallace says.

"I had the definite impression that he felt that if he sent those figures back to Washington at that time, it would create political bombshell," Gen. Joseph McChristian, Westmoreland's intelligence chief, tells CBS.

Westmoreland said he did not consider the new information reliable, and Wallace asks, "Why would it have been a 'political bombshell?'"

"Because," Westmoreland says, "the people in Washington were not sophisticated enough to understand and evaluate this thing, and neither

Jury asks to hear Abbott's testimony

NEW YORK (AP) — Jurors considering a charge against prison author Jack Henry Abbott, accused of killing a waiter last summer, asked to hear Abbott's testimony about the incident before returning to their deliberations.

Deliberations were to resume today in Manhattan's State Supreme Court. The jury deliberated unsuccessfully for about six hours Wednesday.

Acting Justice Irving Lang recessed the jury for the night at 10 p.m., about an hour after panelists returned from a two-hour dinner break. The panel was sequestered at a hotel overnight.

In addition to Abbott's testimony, the jury also asked to rehear the testimony of several eyewitnesses and a medical examiner and to examine the T-shirt that 22-year-old Richard Adan was wearing when he was killed. The jury also asked to see a photograph of Adan's body, diagrams of the scene of the killing and a letter Abbott wrote to his lawyer during the trial.

The jury received the case at 1:45 p.m. Wednesday after the defense and prosecution summed up their cases, showing conflicting versions of how Adan was killed last July 18.

Assistant District Attorney James Fogel had

asked the panel to convict Abbott, who is 38 years old today, of intentional murder. Fogel called the killing a "cold and calculated murder." Defense lawyer Ivan Fisher contends his client did not intend murder, saying Abbott was acting under the influence of "extreme emotional disturbance."

Abbott is the author of "In the Belly of the Beast," a critically acclaimed book about prison life, which he wrote with the aid and encouragement of author Norman Mailer. Mailer testified for the defense and was among the spectators at the trial.

Abbott is charged with killing Adan, an aspiring actor and playwright, outside a Manhattan restaurant where the victim worked.

The jurors are considering possible charges of murder, first-degree manslaughter or second-degree manslaughter.

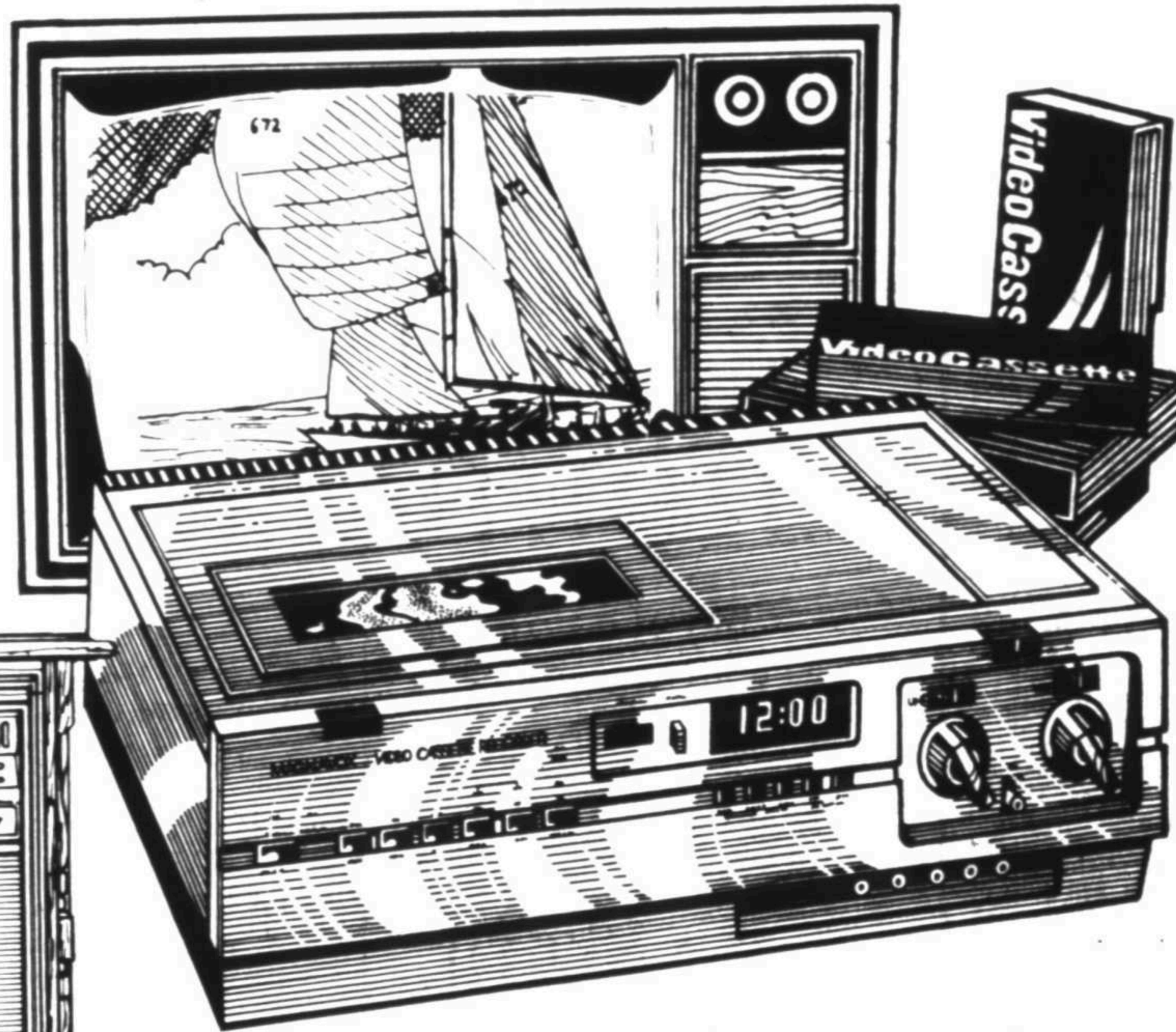

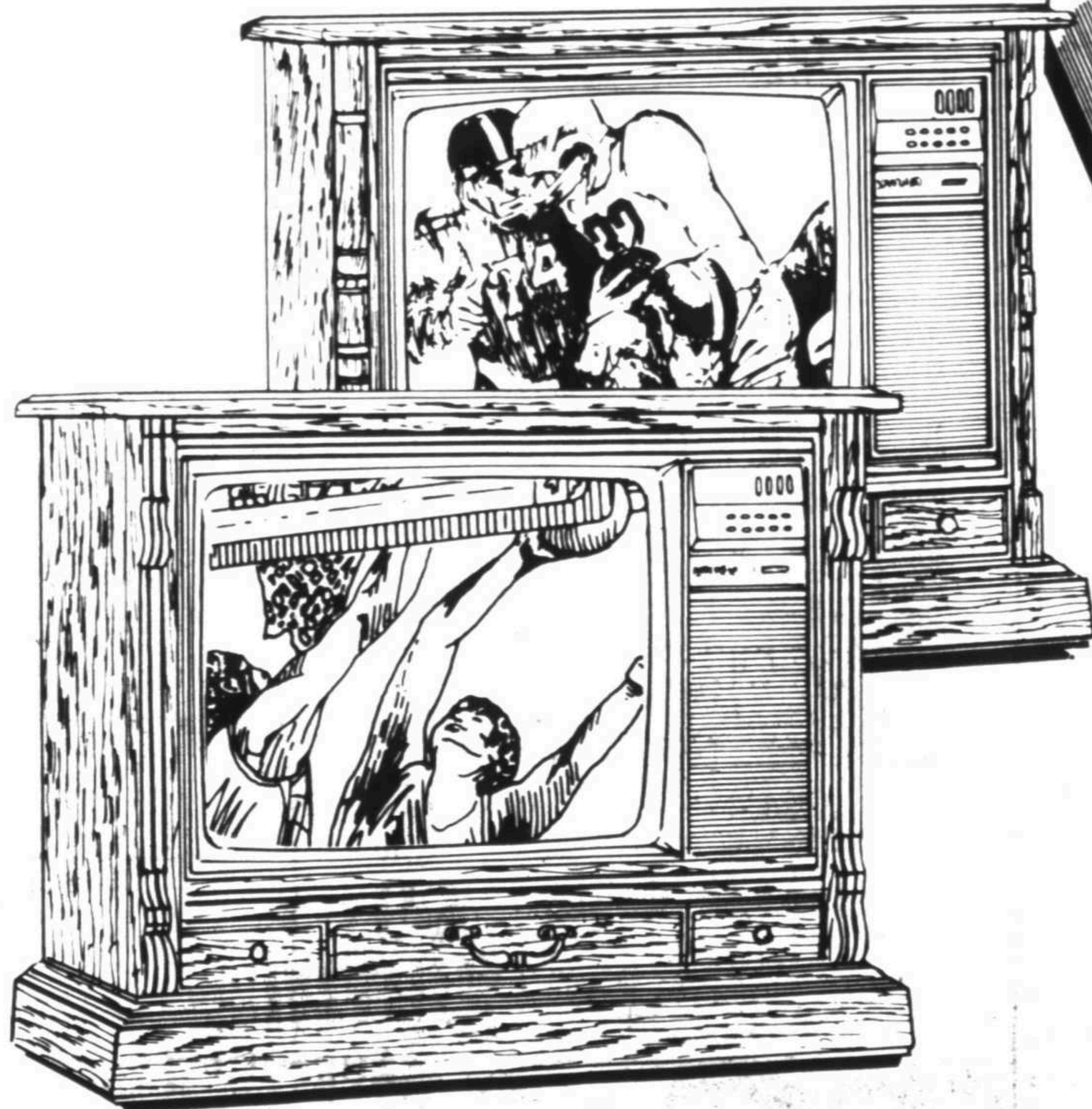

Wood grand jury to meet again today

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — After a three-month recess in its investigation of U.S. District Judge John Wood's murder, a federal grand jury planned to meet for the second straight day today to mull over evidence in the nearly three-year-old case.

Meeting for the first time since Oct. 21, the grand jurors Wednesday apparently heard from only one subpoenaed witness as they continued to focus attention on imprisoned narcotics trafficker Jimmy Chagra.

The witness was Las Vegas attorney Oscar Goodman, who represented Chagra during a 1979 trial at Austin in which the professional gambler was convicted of narcotics-related continuing criminal enterprise and sentenced to 30 years without parole.

Chagra's wife, Elizabeth, also was subpoenaed for Wednesday but did not appear because of an agreement with Justice Department attorneys.

A source close to the investigation confirmed that the federal attorneys agreed to Mrs. Chagra's request not to appear because she had a broken foot. In turn, the El Paso woman agreed to provide handwriting and hair samples sought by investigators, the source said.

CHAGRA had been scheduled for trial before Wood when the federal judge was shot and killed outside his San Antonio residence on May 29, 1979.

Government attorneys have indicated through questioning of witnesses they suspect that Chagra hired convicted "hit man" Charles V. Harrelson to kill Wood.

While the grand jury took the three-month

recess, Harrelson was convicted at Houston and Van Horn on narcotics and bond-jumping charges and sentenced to jail terms totaling 60 years.

His wife, Jo Ann Starr Harrelson, also was convicted in Dallas of using a fictitious name to buy a high-powered rifle, suspected of being the murder weapon, and sentenced to three years in prison.

In previous interrogations of Mrs. Harrelson and her daughter, Theresa Starr Jasper, charter pilots and others, the grand jurors sought information about an alleged "payoff" of money they suspect was delivered by Elizabeth Chagra to a Harrelson family member in South Texas.

Chagra, his wife, his brother, El Paso attorney Joe Chagra, Harrelson, his wife and step-daughter, all have been listed as targets of the nearly three-year-old investigation.

'Freeway Killer' sentenced to die

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The jury that condemned William Bonin to die in the gas chamber for 10 "Freeway Killings" spent a long time going over its notes but decided on the sentence on a unanimous first vote, the panel's foreman says.

"Nobody likes to take another man's life. But we did what had to be done," foreman John M. Lang of Torrance said outside court Wednesday. He called Bonin "a very sick man."

Bonin's lawyer said the 35-year-old defendant "had prepared himself for it" and was "emotionless" when the verdict was pronounced Wednesday.

The lawyer, William Charvet, said Bonin feels various legal rulings in the case "will cause the

Supreme Court to look at this case very closely" and order a new trial in the homosexual torture slayings of young men and boys whose nude bodies were dumped near Southern California freeways.

But Deputy District Attorney Sterling Norris said Bonin "stands a very good chance of having this verdict carried out."

"The crimes were so horrible, so repeated," said Norris. "There was no other just verdict... After listening to this evidence, I think you reach a moral judgment. My Lord, what this man did!"

The jury had convicted Bonin of the 10 murders Jan. 6. He was also convicted of 10 counts of robbery, and it was the special circumstance of murder committed dur-

ing a robbery that the prosecution used in seeking the death penalty. In California, death can be imposed only when murder is committed under special circumstances that are clearly spelled out.

Outside court, one victim's mother, Barbara Biehn, said she was pleased with the outcome and hoped Bonin would be executed.

"When they drop the pellet, then I'll be satisfied," she said, referring to cyanide gas pellets used in California executions. "Until he draws his last breath, I won't rest."

Bonin was convicted of murdering her son, Steven Wood, 16, of Bellflower.

Keene ordered a hearing Feb. 24 at which Bonin's lawyer may argue

for modification of the sentence to life without possibility of parole. In cases where death is imposed, the appeal is automatic under California law.

Bonin, once a truck driver in suburban Downey and a twice-paroled sex offender, maintained the same passive expression he has had throughout the trial as the word "death" resounded in the packed courtroom 10 times in the late afternoon.

"We, the jury in the above entitled action... do determine the penalty shall be death," the clerk read, giving each victim's name.

The parents of several victims sat in the front row of the courtroom.

Dr. Leroy Krusel, 46, was convicted by a jury Wednesday and U.S. District Judge Woodrow Seals ordered him held until a sentencing hearing is scheduled.

Krusel called the FBI's office here on Aug. 27 and told agents, "I will do physical harm to President Reagan because I'm an angry man," Assistant U.S. Attorney Linda Lattimore said.

Krusel faces a maximum sentence of five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine.

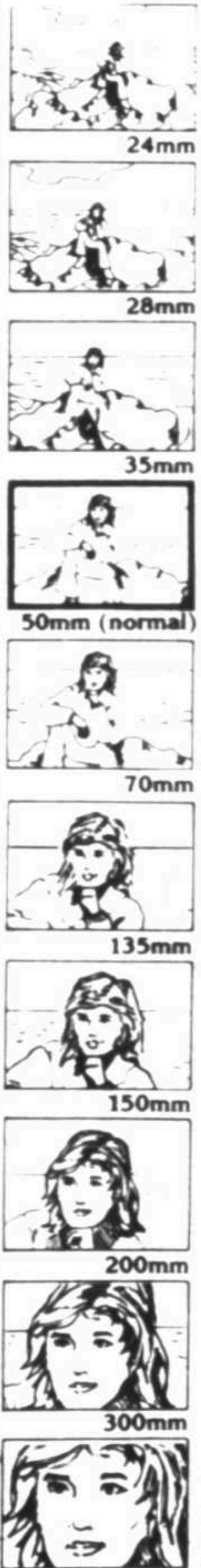

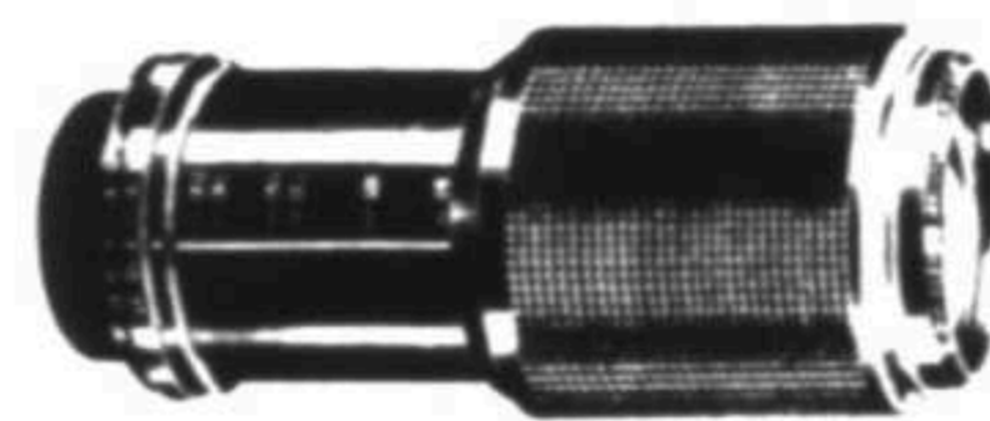

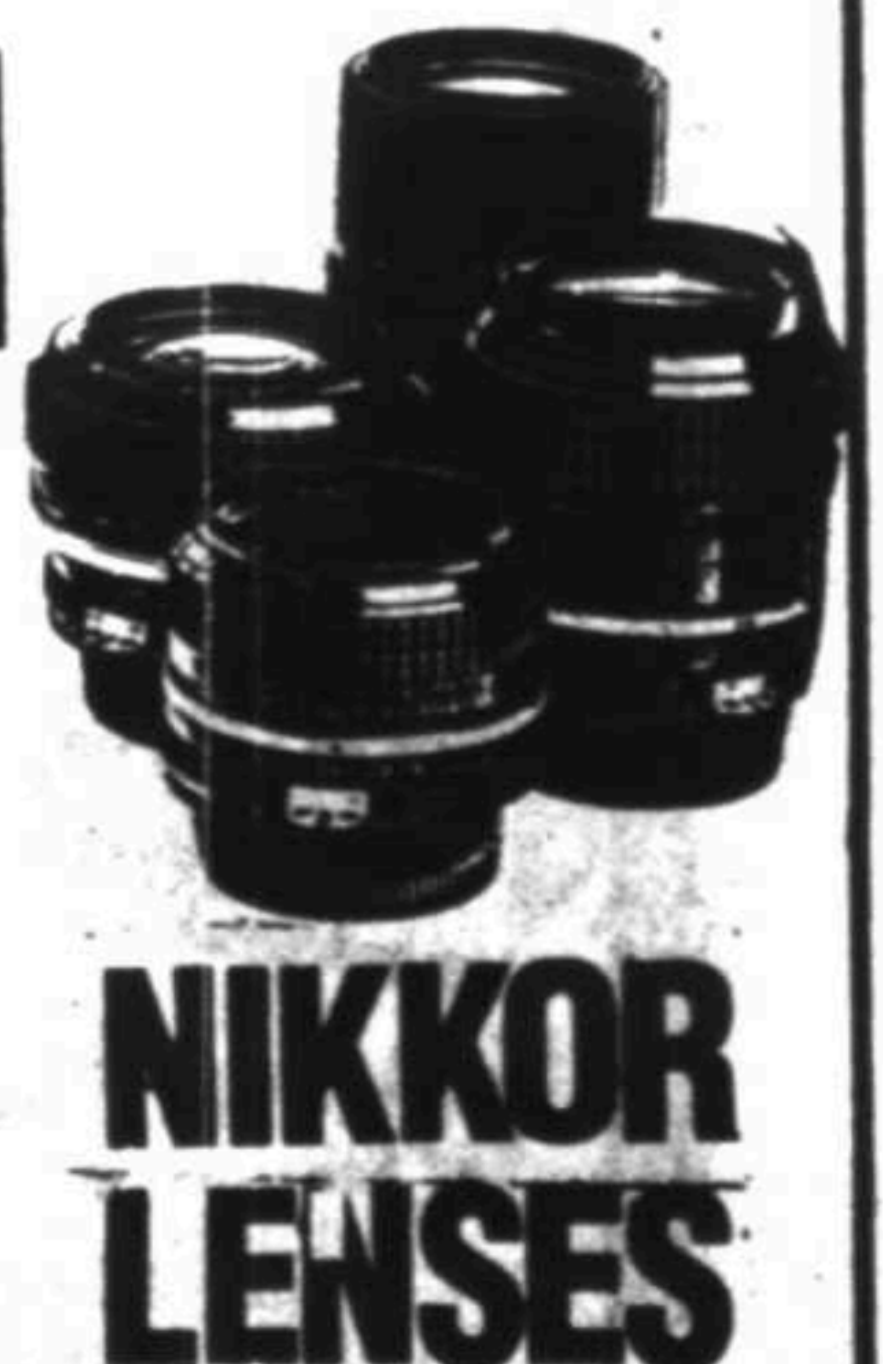

Williams' lawyers want to limit testimony on fibers

ATLANTA (AP) — Wayne Williams' lawyers have asked a judge to limit testimony on some of the fibers the prosecution says link Williams to the slayings of two young men and an FBI expert said fibers are not positive evidence.

Despite a contention by prosecutors that fibers on the bodies of the two victims are not unusual to fibers found in Williams' car and home, fiber expert Harold Deadman said Wednesday that no tests were made to see if the fibers existed in the victims' homes.

The judge, Clarence Cooper, promised an early ruling today on the defense effort to limit testimony about the fibers.

Defense attorney Alvin Binder told Cooper on Wednesday that prosecution witnesses should not be allowed to testify about any tests conducted on the fiber evidence after Dec. 14, when the defense was given its last reports on lab tests on the fibers.

aspiring talent scout, is charged with the murders of Nathaniel Cater, 27, and Jimmy Ray Payne, 21, two of 28 young blacks who disappeared during a 22-month period and later were found slain. A special police task force created to investigate the killings has made no arrests in the 26 other deaths.

Prosecutors have made no effort during two days of testimony about fibers to link Williams with either of the two victims. But pretrial testimony indicated that tiny fibers and dog hairs found on the bodies of Cater and Payne were not microscopically different from fibers and dog hairs taken from Williams' home and car.

Binder argued the defense would be harmed if prosecution experts were allowed to testify about "scientific evidence that they diabolically didn't put in writing to

keep it from our experts." Binder filed the motion as Deadman prepared to take the stand for the first time in the trial, which is in its fourth week. Cooper allowed Deadman to testify before he ruled on the motion, but Deadman didn't discuss any of his findings from tests on the fiber evidence.

Instead, Deadman told the jury in detail how fibers are analyzed in the laboratory and how comparisons of fibers can be used to show that two people, or a person and an object, could have come in contact.

Under questioning by Binder, Deadman acknowledged that matching fibers cannot be used to "tell with absolute certainty" that a fiber came from a particular source. He said fiber evidence can be used only as circumstantial evidence and cannot be used to prove "positive identification."

Comparisons are significant only if the fiber type involved is unusual, he said.

Deadman told Binder he agreed with the FBI Handbook of Forensic Science, which states: "A fiber match is not positive evidence but circumstantial and must be supported by other evidence."

Deadman said the presence of only one fiber on a corpse that could be matched with a fiber from another person would be sufficient to show that the two could have come in contact "if I could be sure there had been no contamination."

When Binder asked how he could be sure no contamination of fibers had taken place on a body found in the Chattahoochee River, Deadman conceded that there was no way to be certain.

The bodies of Cater and Payne were found a month apart floating in

the same area of the Chattahoochee, about a mile downstream from the bridge where Williams first came to the attention of authorities in the pre-dawn hours of May 22.

Prosecutors contend he dumped the bodies of the two young blacks off the bridge. Cater's body was found two days after Williams was stopped near the bridge when a police stakeout officer heard a loud splash in the river.

Constable braves crocodile-infested flood waters

Pointing to the large wall map in the Mount Isa police station — in Queensland, Australia — Jennie Brown showed the inspector exactly where her 29-year-old son, Dennis, was stranded: on the Camooweal-Burketown road, about 100 miles south of the Gulf of Carpentaria. She described how she had chartered a light plane with her daughter-in-law and spotted her son bogged down in his truck, completely cut off by flood waters in every direction.

"That's where he is," she said with anxious certainty. "And the water's coming up fast all around him."
Four days earlier, Dennis Brown had set out from his small cattle property in an effort to beat a gathering tropical storm into Mount Isa. In the wet season between Christmas and the end of March, up to 18 inches of rain have been known to fall in 24 hours.

Brown had been driving for seven hours when, suddenly, his truck plunged through the surface of the road. He climbed out and immediately sank to his waist in bubbling, sulfur-smelling mud. He had driven straight into one of the most dangerous traps awaiting the unwary driver in the Outback. A hard-rock base 15 feet below the road prevents the water that runs off the hills from seeping away. Gradually, the subsoil becomes saturated, but the sun-baked sur-

face forms a hard crust. Deceptive, it is strong enough to support a man — yet any vehicle that ventures onto it becomes hopelessly trapped. Brown knew he would never make it out on foot. His left leg had been crippled by polio, and he walked with a pronounced limp. The nearest settlement, Gregory Downs, was 40 miles away. That night, four inches of rain fell in an hour. Flooded creeks closed Brown in. All next day, he struggled to dig out the truck. When darkness fell, it was even deeper into the mire.

Two days later, Brown was down to his last tin of meat. The temperature, over 100 degrees F., sapped his strength. Next morning, the search plane appeared overhead and dropped food. Brown waved frantically to show he was alive.

Police Sergeant Ray Brand, 39, and Constable Graham Robson, 23, were instructed to rescue Dennis Brown. The two men packed emergency supplies into a four-wheel-drive police truck and quickly took off from Camooweal, 100 miles southeast of the stranded Brown.

As they headed north, the road became increasingly treacherous. For the last 30 miles, they crept through flooded creeks and sand, slid almost out of control in black mud. For hundreds of yards at a stretch, the road disappeared under water. Not until 9:15 p.m., six hours out of Camooweal, did they finally sight Brown. But their joy turned to despair as more of the road surface collapsed and the rescue vehicle, too, bogged down.

Around 1 a.m., Robson proposed that he, as the fittest of the group, should try to walk the 40 miles to Gregory Downs for help. He had no illusions about his chances of getting through in the heat of the day. For the first six miles, he made good progress. Then his ears caught the sound of wildly rushing water: another creek that had become a torrent.

He took one step into the swirling current but recoiled as he heard downstream the deep-throated roar of a crocodile. For 10 minutes, he stood rooted to the spot with fear; then, ashamed, he took a deep breath and walked boldly into the water, where he was carried swiftly downstream toward the crocodiles.

Reaching up to push away what he thought was a branch, he found it to be a big water python. Robson shuddered as the current carried the snake away, scraping its cold, six-foot length along his face.

For the next 10 miles, he was in waist-deep water most of the time, then mud. Mosquitoes tormented him; leeches attached themselves to his ankles; enormous centipedes crawled up his legs and over his body.

Hours passed. As the sun climbed hotly into the sky, Robson thought he was going mad and walking in circles. He became obsessed with counting his footsteps. Then came a rumbling sound. He sank to his knees, burying his head in his hands as driver Bill Bailey brought his truck to a halt.

He took Robson back to Gregory Downs, where a rescue team was quickly assembled. It reached the grateful Dennis Brown and Sergeant Brand that afternoon.

For Robson, the citations and awards for bravery would come later. What the young constable needed now was sleep.

Teachers do the LEAST they can in classroom

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — After being screamed at, shoved and ignored by her students during 17 years of teaching, Sara Achenbach at last has found peace in her classroom.

Has she gotten tough with the students? No. The statewide teachers' union likes to say she accomplished it by doing the LEAST she can. LEAST is a program in classroom discipline.

"The program teaches teachers how to do as little as possible to maintain control, because anytime you create a disruption in responding to misbehavior, you lose teaching time," said Roger Erskine, LEAST program director for the Pennsylvania State Education Association.

In her Reading, Pa., high school English classes today, Ms. Achenbach said, "I'm having fewer confrontations that turn into yelling bouts."

"The discipline forms I send to the office now mainly are for class cuts," she said. "Before, they were for threatening the teacher, arguing with other students, talking when told to do work."

The acronym LEAST stands for five steps the teachers are told to use in dealing with classroom discipline problems.

L stands for "leave the misbehavior alone." E for "end the disruption indirectly." A for "attend more fully to the reasons behind the disruption." S for "spell out directions to the student;" and T for "track student's misbehaviors and progress."

"The ideas aren't new, but the program gives you a system to deal with a problem. You don't make snap decisions," said Jack Gibble, a 6th-grade teacher in the Penn Manor District, Lancaster County.

Gibble became one of the 100 classroom teachers who train their colleagues in LEAST when fellow teacher Beth Rosenberg "was at the end of her rope over discipline. She felt discipline problems weren't allowing her to teach."

After her in-service day of LEAST training, "Compared to previous years, I didn't have to raise my voice as much last year," said Mrs. Rosenberg. "The kids knew I meant business. I still got tense, but I didn't flip out."

The 100 teacher-trainers provided the three-hour LEAST sessions to 5,000 Pennsylvania teachers last year, and as many as 8,000 will go through the program this year, according to the PSEA.

"There's no doubt that colleges haven't done the job in training teachers to deal with disruptions," said Dr. Robert Tauber, an assistant professor involved with classroom management at Penn State University.


"They're taught that if you learn what you should, you'll be an exciting teacher and not have problems. That's not the real world."

It was only 2½ years ago that Penn State began offering courses that dealt solely with classroom discipline, Tauber said.

LEAST's step-by-step strategy is important, Tauber said. "If a teacher goes to the extreme immediately and uses his or her most serious means of discipline and it fails, there's nothing left. What do you do next?"

The key element of LEAST is the tracking, the teachers said.

In support of free press

The latest news in the debate over how best to create an international free press is that the venue has changed but the arguments remain the same.

Spokesmen for the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization continue to argue that the way to help journalistically-impaired nations is to infuse measures of government control into the news-gathering process. The United States continues to argue that governments should keep hands off, and that news management in any form is anathema to the people's right to know.

The battle was joined again this week in the Mexican resort of Acapulco. The second session of the UNESCO-backed International Program for Development of Communications was convened to discuss means of improving the flow of news to, from, and in, the developing nations.

The theme of the United States position was clear, and consistent with past expressions of policy. The Reagan administration does not want to support information programs controlled by Third World governments. The United States is willing to promote aid from the private sector to help Third World nations to purchase transmission equipment and train journalists. Dozens of financial donations, scholarships and U.S.-sponsored training programs have proved this in the past two years.

This Acapulco round could result in a draw, as so many bouts with UNESCO have. On the other hand, there is always hope that delegates from the United States, a nation that needs to apologize to no one for its championship of a free press, will be listened to more carefully.

All our leaders are saying is that the press should be entrusted to the people, and not to those who govern the people.

Legacy of Red Smith

Red Smith left the world better than he found it. The nation's foremost sportswriter, who died the other day at the age of 76, would be the first to object to such a simple and seemingly trite observation about his life and times.

But it is true. Walter Wellesley Smith — he hated the name, but could joke about it — left a legacy that will enrich, inspire, educate, and prod the conscience of this and future generations.

Red Smith could write. He could write because he did not take his literary skills for granted. Like a good opera singer or violinist, he knew that quality performances depended on continuing to take lessons, no matter how good you are, and Red Smith took lessons by reading the classics and critiquing his own prose until the quality of his performances became a shining chapter in the history of American journalism. A Pulitzer prize officially recognized what Red's readers already knew.

He was a gentle, thoughtful man. No matter how busy he was covering sports for the New York Herald Tribune or the Times, he had the patience and found the time to counsel young reporters. His daily columns, at one time seven a week, were sermons in literacy. A fellow editor once was asked who the best writers in the United States were, and his ready answer was, "E.B. White and Red Smith." Other readers have other favorites, but none would dispute the prowess of these two.

Red Smith's columns also were written by a man with a social con-

science. He disdained sham and hypocrisy, and could write scathingly of "scholar-athletes," knowing jolly well that many a football coach had scant understanding of the "scholar" part of the term. He called for a boycott of the Russian Olympics when Russia invaded Afghanistan, and won acclaim, and cooperation, throughout the world.

In his final column, on the Monday before he died, columnist and noble citizen Smith wrote: "On this job two questions are inevitably asked: 'Of all those you have met, who was the best athlete?' and 'Which did you like best?'"

If anyone should ask those two questions about American sports writers, many readers of sports pages likely would answer "Red Smith."

Only issue between grid players, owners is splitting loot

WASHINGTON — The class struggle between labor and capital is heating up. After the Super Bowl (three hours of football enveloped by two weeks of advertising), the proletariat whose trade union is the National Football League Player Association may next be seen on picket lines.

The NFLPA's proposal would end the existing process of individual players negotiating with individual teams. Instead, players would receive 55 percent of the league's gross revenues, which would be apportioned according to years of service and certain achievements (such as getting into the play-offs) that would trigger various incentive clauses. The NFLPA says players are now getting only about 30 percent of the gross. The owners say an independent audit shows that in 1980 the figure was 42 percent.

An athlete's career is like a beehive, containing both honey and stings. Athletes compress into a short span much of life's trajectory. As his peers are reaching peak earning years, an athlete is experiencing erosion of his skills and the need to start over. Understandably, players feel driven to get as much as

they can, while they can. For that reason, players may not be the best trustees for a sport's long-term institutional needs. But the record of the baseball owners, who deserved a large share of the blame for last summer's strike, demonstrates that ownership does not guarantee a sense of trusteeship.

The owners, who have a long-term commitment to the NFL, worry that an entitlement to a stipulated percentage of the gross will make the players de facto partners claiming a derivative entitlement to participate in all decisions that might affect the size of the gross. And the owners worry that the players, whose careers are short (4.7 seasons on average), will sacrifice the league's long-term interests to their short-term interests.

But something like the players' proposal might encourage trusteeship by concentrating players' minds on maximizing their industry's revenues. American industry generally could benefit from profit-sharing and other arrangements that encourage less of an adversarial relationship between labor and management.

The players (whether they know it or not) subscribe to what Marx called the labor theory of value: the theory that all economic value derives from labor. Like Marx, the players are a bit blind to the contributions of capital and entrepreneurship. They say that they labor and owners merely promote.

Furthermore, they say owners have little economic incentive to work

harder. They cite the equal division of television revenues (the Green Bay Packers get as much as the New York Giants) and of play-off monies, the 60-40 (home and visitors) split of gate receipts, and sell-out most places (an average of 60,745 tickets were sold for this year's 224 regular season games).

Of course, good owners, like good players, have a non-economic incentive: animal spirits. (This is sometimes called pride, or the desire to win.) And most owners, unlike most players, could make more money easier doing other things. But Pete Rozelle, the NFL commissioner, acknowledges that the teams compete only on the field and are otherwise partners in a common enterprise.

The NFL is an island of semi-socialism in a sea of capitalism. Capitalism is predatory: You want to weaken, even devour, the competition. But the NFL has a stake in competitive balance. The NFLPA proposal would extend collectivism to the players' side of the table. By setting salaries by seniority and performance incentives, it might make the computation of compensation routine. This would be a blessing because the sports pages of newspapers would no longer seem so much like the business pages.

The NFLPA says 97 percent of all players would immediately receive a substantial pay increase and the average salary would double. (It was \$78,000 in 1980.) The NFLPA says that with cable television's potential, the pro-

pisal could mean a \$700,000 average — yes, average — by 1987.

Now don't say no one is worth that much. We should all be glad we are not paid according to our moral worth. And the economic worth of NFL players is clear. The NFL exists for television, which exists to sell beer and such things. The players' worth is a function of their ability to get scores of millions of Americans to sit through commercials.

So there is no use coming down with moral cramps because the Rams have more money than Mother Teresa. Football is going to go on generating vast sums, and all that is at issue between players and owners is how the loot gets split.

WASHINGTON MERRY-GO-ROUND

Weinberg's wife was his biggest scam

WASHINGTON — Why did Marie Weinberg decide to blow the whistle on her husband, Mel, the convicted swindler who was the architect of the FBI's ABSCAM operation?

Marie was the ultimate victim of the conscienceless con man's misconduct. For 14 of the 19 years she has been married to Weinberg, he cheated on her shamelessly. He used her as a doormat.

But more than that, she is concerned about the way her husband used her as an unwitting tool in the profitable side deals he worked while he was setting up members of Congress and other politicians in the FBI's "sting" operation.

"It's not revenge why I'm telling you this," Marie Weinberg told my associate Indy Badwar. "It's conscience. I'm not a woman scorned but a woman scammed." Mel, she added, "used me as a practice ground for all his other scams."

Marie's story is truly a pitiful one. Abandoned at birth, her childhood was spent in one foster home after another. She married Weinberg just as he was embarking on his life of crime. She kept house for him, polished his shoes, manicured his nails and looked after their adopted son, J.R., now 16. She learned to suffer in silence — and to keep her mouth shut.

When Weinberg was nailed for fraud in 1977 and faced three years in jail, Marie handed over her diamond engagement ring and the deed to the house to raise the \$10,000 bail. He repaid her slavish devotion by setting up housekeeping with another woman.

Inspired by the old Alec Guinness movie, "The Captain's Paradise," Weinberg created duplicate households a few miles apart, with Marie's unknowing help.

The other woman was Evelyn Dawn Knight. She was arrested with Weinberg in 1977, in his self-serving book, "The Sting Man." Weinberg claims that it was to save Evelyn's hide that he agreed to cooperate with the FBI.

Marie read the book and asked her husband about "Lady Diane," as Wein-

berg and co-author Bob Greene referred to Evelyn. "Mel told me that Bob had made it up just to add sex to the book so it would sell," Marie said.

But Evelyn was real. She even changed her name to Evelyn Dawn Weinberg in June 1981. When Mel wanted to buy Evelyn a new Cadillac, he brought her old car to Marie, saying it belonged to a "Sir Gordon" (a fictitious name he pulled out of the hat and needed sprucing up. Mel paid Marie \$50 to clean and paint the car. He then sold it and bought the Caddy.

When the Weinbergs moved to Jupiter, Fla., in July 1979, he set Evelyn up in a condo just like theirs, 16 miles away in Stewart. He told Marie he had bought the second condo for investment and was renting it to a "stupid" union official and his "dumb" wife, who knew nothing about decorating an apartment.

On this pretext, Weinberg got Marie to give him samples of her wallpaper and floor coverings, and had her measure the wall unit in the Jupiter condo. He spent a lot of time in Stewart, supposedly helping the union official and his wife furnish their rental unit.

Another ruse he used to dupe Marie was to announce that he was taking their son to Jacksonville overnight. Instead, he would stay with Evelyn. He explained her to J.R. as an FBI agent with whom he was working on an undercover assignment, and told the boy to keep mum about it lest he upset his mother.

But Marie was getting suspicious. She had seen a piece of paper lying around with Evelyn's name on it. Weinberg reassured her, saying, "There is no Evelyn... I love you and only you."

When Weinberg said he was taking J.R. to Jacksonville last Halloween night, Marie resolved to follow her suspicions. The next day, she found the other condo. Mel's car and Evelyn's Cadillac were parked outside.

Marie knocked. Evelyn opened the door. "Evelyn?" said Marie. "I'm Mel's wife, Marie."

"Call me Eve," said the other woman coolly.

"How long has this been going on?" Marie asked.

"Fourteen years," said Evelyn. Weinberg was upstairs and refused to come down. J.R. had gone out.

When Mel finally came home, he shrugged off Marie's demand for an

explanation. "So I got caught," he said. "I always told you I'm the world's biggest liar." Then he nestled into his favorite armchair, ordered some Chinese food — and asked Marie to give him a manicure.

Footnote: Inspired by my series on ABSCAM, the ABC News show "20/20" will air a special tonight that will detail the Mel Weinberg-FBI scandal.

FENCING WITH BURGER: It's always gratifying to see quick results from an item in this column, but it's not often that the results are achieved even before the column sees print.

Last week I reported that Chief Justice Warren Burger was in apparent violation of the building codes for having a rusty barbed-wire fence partially surrounding his property in suburban Arlington, Va. A resident had complained that the fence posed a threat to the children and pets in the heavily developed neighborhood.

A building inspector explained, however, that because the chief justice's fence was there long before the building codes were promulgated, he was legally entitled to leave it up.

But a funny thing happened on the way to publication. In the interval between our calls to Burger's office and the distribution of the column around the country, the barbed wire disappeared — at least the most conspicuous segments of it. There are still some lengths of barbed wire tangled in the honeysuckle vines and underbrush along the front of the Burger property — or there were when this report was written.

Ronnie falls from nation's 'Honor Roll'!

The Los Angeles Times and Cable News TV have just held a nationwide poll and asked 1,500 people to give Ronald Reagan a report card on his first year as president. They gave him a C-plus.

In a similar report card in April, after his first 100 days, Reagan got a B.

As one of Ronnie's proud parents, I was very upset that he was falling back in his grades, so I went to see his teacher.

She told me that despite the C-plus, Ronnie was still one of her favorite pupils, and got along well with all the students, and was well liked by 70 percent of his class.

"Well, he could take a course in remedial arithmetic. He wouldn't be the first president who had to do it."

"When do you teach it?"

"On Wednesday afternoons."

"But that's when Ronnie takes horse-back riding."

"It's your decision," the teacher said. "If you're satisfied with a C-plus then I'd let things go along as they are. But if he doesn't improve his addition and subtraction I should warn you the next time his report card comes out he could get a D."

Pregnant women must control blood sugar

Dear Dr. Solomon: I have diabetes, but my husband and I have decided to start a family within the year. Once I become pregnant I'll be seeing an obstetrician, but I wonder if you would have any advice for me at this time. — Mrs. D.K., Montgomery, Ala.

Dear Mrs. K.: The best advice I can give is for you to discuss your plans with your physician before you become pregnant, since a successful outcome can be made more likely if certain steps are taken now. For example, it is very important that your blood sugar be controlled before you become pregnant.

Dr. Richard L. Byyny, of the University of Colorado School of Medicine, points out that infant mortality around the time of birth is not much different for diabetic mothers whose blood sugar is controlled, compared with nondiabetic mothers. However, the mortality rises significantly if the blood sugar is not controlled.

The bottom line is that the time to begin assuring a successful pregnancy is before you become pregnant.

Dear Dr. Solomon: You recently had a question from a reader who said that his doctor prescribed an antidepressant because he had back pain. My doctor prescribed an antidepressant because he said I have muscle contraction headaches. Does this treatment work? — Stu, Tulsa

Dear Stu: Chronic pain that is not related to a specific injury is believed to be linked to depression. Therefore, antidepressants can be effective in their treatment, although some form of counseling might also prove helpful.

A study at the Henry Ford Hospital Pain Clinic showed that about 70 percent of people with muscle contraction headaches who received antidepressants and counseling experienced some degree of relief.

Dear Dr. Solomon: When my middle-aged aunt developed cancer, it progressed very slowly. From time to time, she went for treatments, but she lived to a ripe old age. Now, I've just heard that the grandchild of a neighbor died after having cancer for only a few months. Why did the cancer progress so slowly in one person and so fast in another? — Elma, Cedar Rapids

Dear Elma: There are more than one hundred different types of cancer. It is

actually not one disease but many. You are probably describing two different types of cancer. Not only do some grow slowly while others grow much faster, but some grow like a balloon, while others spread like a lava flow. Some originate in the muscle, and some being in the skin or organs. Others develop in the blood. And some respond to treatment, while, unfortunately, others do not.

Dear Dr. Solomon: My neighbor accidentally cut herself while she was gardening. The doctor insisted that she come to his office for a needle of some kind. Is he just trying to make some extra money? — Susan, Kansas City

Dear Susan: Absolutely not, the doctor was trying to prevent your neighbor from contracting a dangerous disease called tetanus. This bacterial disease most often begins with a wound, and one of the chief causes of wound contamination is soil. Tetanus bacteria make a deadly nerve poison which is absorbed in the bloodstream and circulates through the body. Stiffness, then rigidity of muscles are two of the symptoms.

"She was a nice Japanese girl when I met her," he laughs. "She used to walk three steps behind me. Now she's always three steps in front of me."

"I'm a liberated woman," Mrs. Shale says proudly.

At 30, her beauty is striking, even in the worn jeans and workshirts she wears during the day.

Begin said to reject Palestinian self-rule

WASHINGTON (AP) — Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin is telling President Reagan that Israel will reject any agreement on Palestinian autonomy that raises the possibility of a separate Palestinian state, a knowledgeable source says.

The source said Begin's views are contained in a letter to Reagan that was delivered Tuesday. U.S. officials confirmed Wednesday that such a letter had been received, but had no comment on its contents.

Israel is known to object to what it believes is Egypt's insistence that an autonomy agreement for the 1.3 million Palestinians living on the Israeli-occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip keep open the possibility of self-determination.

"If we let them (the Palestinians) determine what they want, they will ask for a state, and we don't intend to let that happen," the source said, emphasizing a point he said is contained in Begin's letter.

The source said the question of self-determination for the Palestinians was raised recently by Egyptian officials. Begin told Reagan that Israel does not believe that full autonomy for the Palestinians means self-determination, according to the source.

"The Egyptians are trying to say that self-determination is included in the Camp David accords," said the source. "That is not our understanding about what

Camp David is all about."

The source said the Camp David accords call for "full autonomy, which is what they are going to get."

Egyptian officials take the view that while they do not seek the immediate creation of a Palestinian state, they do not believe that Israel should exclude the emergence of a "Palestinian entity" from its thinking about the future.

In his letter, Begin also told Reagan that there is

nothing in the strategic cooperation agreement between Israel and the United States that permitted the agreement to be suspended, the source said.

Reagan suspended the Golan Heights, which it captured from Syria in the 1967 Arab-Israeli war.

Begin also repeated a pledge that Israel will not attack Lebanon unless Israel is attacked, the source said.

Pete was not only violent, he also lied about his violence and denied responsibility for his behavior. This is characteristic of abusive men. It is difficult for them to admit they are hurting someone they love.

It is tempting to call Pete and other men "sick" and "mentally deranged." This is only one of the myths that sur-

round domestic violence. The fact is, violence has very little correlation to mental illness. Violence is one of the ways (and certainly one of the most negative and dangerous ways) that men have learned to cope with stress.

Abby, you're right. Pete needs help. But he doesn't need help for a mental illness, he needs help in accepting responsibility for his violent behavior and learning more positive ways of coping with stress. — WALTER MAJOROS

DEAR WALTER: Thank you. But Pete cut his wife's fingertips with scissors, threw her down the stairs, and beat her over the head with a telephone, causing a concussion and a gash

that required 22 stitches to close! Perhaps "counseling" to teach him more appropriate ways to cope with stress is all Pete needs, but I would also insist on a psychiatric evaluation. If this man is not a dangerous psychopath, he certainly behaves like one.

DEAR ABBY: Is there such a thing as "Hookers Anonymous"? We have a daughter living in L.A. who is trying to quit. She's been seeing a psychologist for some time. However, the combination of an expensive lifestyle, an expensive psychologist and the continuing temptation of "easy" money is hard to beat.

If she could talk to others in the same boat, it might help her. If there is no such thing, there should be. Right?

Answer in your column, please. — CONCERNED PARENTS

DEAR PARENTS: There's a support group for nearly every kind of problem afflicting the human condition, so if there isn't a Hookers Anonymous, there should be.

PORK ROLL WITH WINTER SAUCE

Mince-meat makes the sauce unusual and delightful.

- 2 1/4 pound smoked boneless pork shoulder butt
- 1/4 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon cornstarch
- 1-3rd cup cold water
- 1 1/2 teaspoons cider vinegar
- 2 tablespoons medium sherry
- 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 cup ready-to-use mince-meat (with brandy and rum) from a 28-ounce jar

Cook the pork butt according to wrapper directions; drain and keep warm on a serving plate in a low oven. In a 1-quart saucepan stir together the brown sugar and cornstarch; gradually stir in the water, vinegar, sherry and Worcestershire, keeping smooth; add the mince-meat. Cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly, until clear, slightly thickened and boiling. Pour the hot sauce — there will be about 1 cup of it — over the pork butt. Serve at once.

The deer had left the field for the cooler, safer woods. The cow, being milked, needed no longer to moo. And the rooster was silent.

I stood there despite Buffy's protestation, filled with two realizations, more than enough, surely, to begin - and crown - any day. If I had not forced myself to get up, to push at the pain of leaving my warm, family-filled bed, I would have missed that first perfect moment; never again would all the ingredients mix together so beautifully, so perfectly. That I knew.

THE BUTCHER

Make delicious stewed chicken dishes from fryers

One of our favorite winter meals, when I was growing up, was stewed chicken — stewed chicken with dumplings, chicken fricasse with homemade noodles, or simply stewed chicken served with piles of mashed potatoes, biscuits and honey. There were dozens of delicious things to do with any hen in the henhouse that stopped laying eggs.

Unfortunately, in most markets these days, good stewing hens are as scarce as the proverbial hen's teeth. The few stewing hens that I do see from time to time look like lean, scrawny rejects from a soup kitchen.

It's understandable, I suppose. Hens today are bred and fed for efficient egg production — not for flavor, unlike those in the henhouse of yesteryear, which were kept for their meat as much as for their eggs. These days stewing hens don't have much flavor.

It is possible, however, to make a great pot of chicken and dumplings or chicken fricasse from an inexpensive, often "on special" frying chicken — if you treat it right. Fryers are much too tender for the long simmering it takes to tenderize an old stewing hen. They would be cooked to death and falling off the bones long before you had a good rich broth. But it takes long, slow simmering to produce a good broth — the essential part of a chicken stew.

Here's how I solve that problem.

Cut the chicken up as if you were going to fry it. Separate out the meaty parts — the breast pieces, legs, thighs and the large parts of the wings — and set them aside in the refrigerator. Put the bony parts — the back, neck, wing tips and giblets (except the liver) — in a good-sized stock pot and cover them with water. Add one whole small onion stuck with a couple of cloves, a stalk of celery, a carrot, a few peppercorns, a bay leaf and a teaspoon of salt. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and remove any scum that has come to the top. Cover and simmer for 2 to 3 hours. What you are doing is making a good, rich broth in which the meaty pieces will be cooked later.

When the meat is falling off the bone, and the liquid is so rich and full of flavor you can call it soup, strain the broth into a large bowl and set aside. Remove the chicken pieces from the pot and set them aside in the refrigerator. Do not throw them away. There's a lot of good meat to be picked from those bones to use for chicken salad or crepes or something else some other time.

Discard the vegetables. Rinse the pot and pour the broth back in. (You may want to remove some of the fat that has risen to the top of the broth before you pour it back into the pot.)

Take the meaty pieces of chicken out of the refrigerator. Melt 3 tablespoons of butter in a large skillet, add the

chicken pieces and saute them gently, turning occasionally, until golden brown. Remove from heat and transfer the chicken pieces to the broth.

Simmer gently until the chicken is tender, about 30 minutes. Meanwhile, add 3 tablespoons of flour to the skillet in which the chicken was browned, and blend it with the butter.

When the chicken is tender, remove it to a heated platter and keep warm. Reduce the broth over high heat until you have about 2 1/2 to 3 cups. Add the stock to the flour-butter mixture in the skillet and stir over moderate heat until the sauce is the desired consistency.

For a richer, more old-fashioned sauce, you may add an egg yolk and cream enrichment: Combine 2 egg yolks with one cup of heavy cream, mix a spoonful or two of the hot broth into the mixture, then stir into the hot broth in the stock pot, simmer (DO NOT BOIL) until nicely blended and thickened.

Pour the sauce over the chicken and serve with mashed potatoes or noodles. Or, if chicken and dumplings is your desire, drop dumplings into the broth at this point, cover and cook about 15 minutes, or until the dumplings are done.

Don't waste your money on a scrawny stewing hen. For a good chicken stew, fricasse a fryer.

Heloise to the rescue with Sauerkraut Chocolate Cake recipe

DEAR HELOISE:

Some years ago, you had a recipe for Sauerkraut Chocolate Cake. I tried it and it was really delicious. However, last year my house burned along with all my recipes.

To make a long story short, would you please send me the recipe? I would really appreciate it. — Ruth Walker

It would be my pleasure, dear heart and I'm so sorry about your fire! One of the tragedies of a fire is all the little things it consumes that we gradually miss. They usually are irreplaceable. But, thank goodness, some things can be replaced and, in this case, I'm very glad I can be of some small help.

Others might like to try this delicious cake too, so here's what to do: The instructions are really very simple. To your favorite chocolate cake recipe, just add one-half to two-thirds cup sauerkraut, chopped, rinsed and drained.

Or, you may add the same amount of sauerkraut to a boxed chocolate cake mix. The baking time will be slightly longer for both type cakes, so test for doneness. (A toothpick inserted into the cake will come out clean.)

Mocha, sour cream, or a cream cheese icing goes especially well with this cake. Look in any cookbook for specific recipes, or use one of your favorites.

Lawyers want doctor's bag barred as evidence

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP) — A black doctor's bag that may have contained a drug-soaked needle is among evidence defense lawyers want to bar at socialite Claus C. von Bulow's trial on charges of trying to kill his wife with insulin injections.

Defense lawyer Harold P. Fahringer also wants to bar a statement the wealthy financial consultant gave a detective, as well as records of blood tests on his business wife, who is now lying comatose in a New York City hospital.

Superior Court Judge Thomas H. Needham said he will begin hearing arguments on the motions today.

The last of 16 jurors for the trial was picked Wednesday. Von Bulow, 56, is charged with trying to murder his wife with injections of insulin and barbiturates during Christmas visits to their Newport mansion.

The state alleges von Bulow wanted his wife dead because he loved another woman and wanted the estimated \$30 million fortune he would inherit. The state says the shots pushed Martha "Sunny" von Bulow, 50, into a coma, in which she has languished for more than a year.

Fahringer said he will also seek dismissal of the charges against von Bulow because a lawyer, Richard H. Kuh, helped gather evidence before telling official investigators a crime might have occurred.

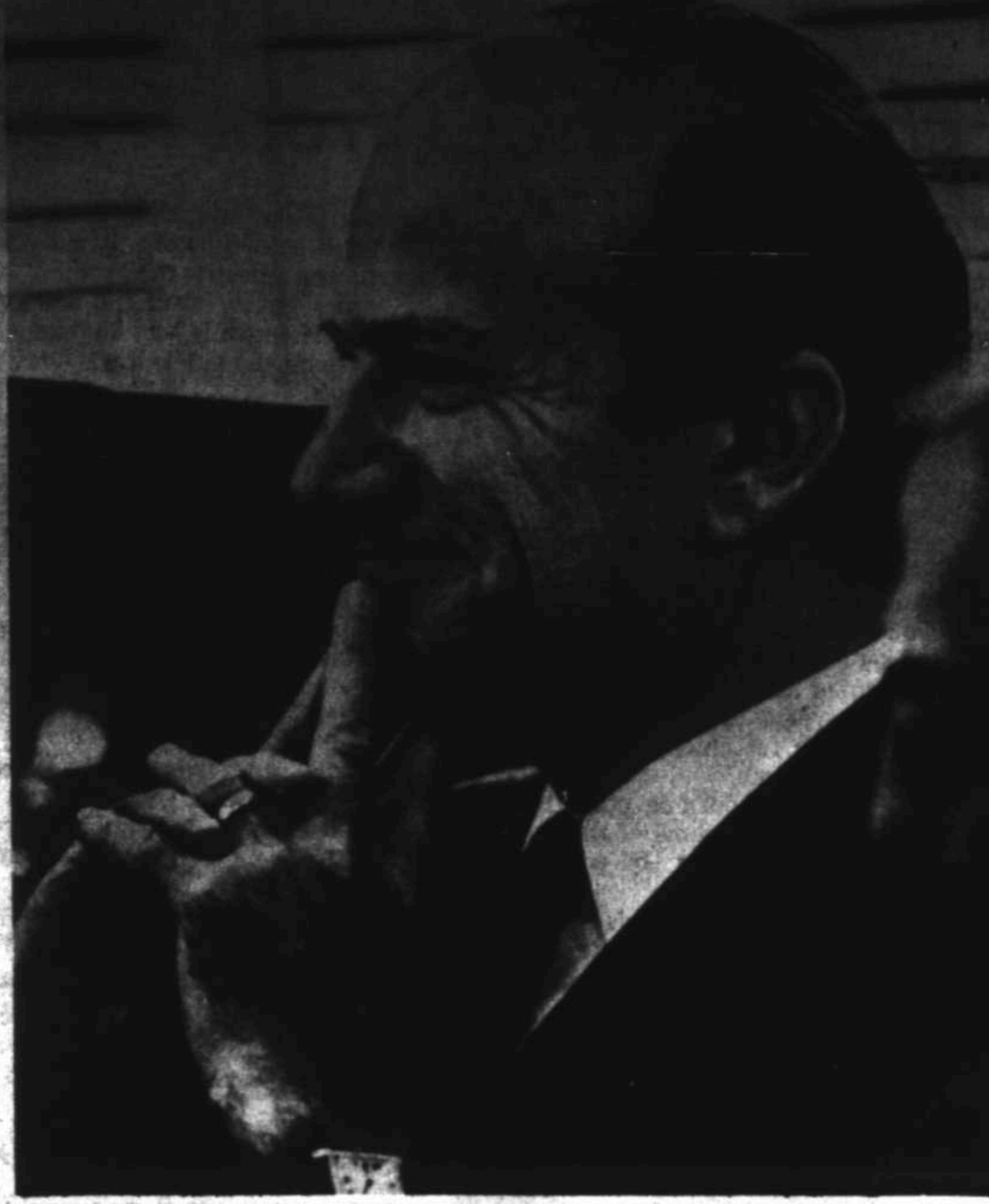
He said Kuh "initiated the whole thing."

"Public prosecutors are the ones who are supposed to prosecute cases because the theory is that they will be impartial," he said during a break in the selection of four back-up jurors.

Mrs. von Bulow's children by her first marriage hired Kuh, who was once a member of the Manhattan district attorney's office, after a maid became suspicious about their mother's illness.

With Kuh's guidance Mrs. von Bulow's son, Prince Alexander G. von Auersperg, and a private detective searched a locked closet in the Newport mansion and found the black bag.

Inside the bag, von Auersperg said he found drugs and a used hypodermic needle. Court papers say laboratory analysis revealed evidence of barbiturates and insulin in the needle.

Inmate convicted of murder

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — Inmate Richard Chapman, portrayed by a prosecutor as a merciless killer, has been convicted of killing a fellow prisoner during the Feb. 23, 1980 riot at the New Mexico State Penitentiary.

A district court jury here late Wednesday found Chapman guilty of first-degree murder for the slaying of prisoner Donald James Gossens during the two days of rioting that shook the state's largest penal institution nearly two years ago.

In closing arguments, prosecutors told the jury Chapman had beaten Gossens to death and had driven a spike through an eye of the victim. Assistant District Attorney Jerry Herrera described the slaying of Gossens as "sadistic and savage."

Gossens was one of several inmates killed in the prison's protective custody cellblock.

The 12-member jury deliberated about 5 1/2 hours before returning the guilty verdict. The state did not seek the death penalty in the case. Chapman, who is already serving a life term for murder and robbery and an additional five years for escape from the New Mexico Penitentiary in 1979, could receive an additional 30 years in prison.

Chapman, 27, also must still stand trial for the slaying of another inmate, Larry Smith, during the riot in that case, which is scheduled to go to trial March 1, the state is seeking the death penalty.

Chapman becomes the second inmate convicted by a jury of a riot-related killing. Last year, prisoner Moses Sandoval was convicted of a similar charge. Two other inmates have been acquitted and several others have pleaded guilty to charges resulting from the bloody uprising.

During the trial the prosecution had built its case on the testimony of other inmates who said they had witnessed the killing of Gossens during the riot and identified Chapman as one of the assailants.

Former teacher on probation

HOUSTON (AP) — A federal judge ordered a former teacher to spend four months at a halfway house following her conviction for illegally operating a Grimes County drug manufacturing laboratory.

In addition to the four months, U.S. District Judge Carl O. Bue ordered Cynthia Standley Dawson to devote 400 hours to community service and placed her on five years probation Tuesday.

Bue also sentenced co-defendants Richard Bickstaff, 26, to five years in prison and Stanley M. Riley, 25, to a four-year prison term.

Reagan promises to 'drain swamp'

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan gathered the hierarchy of his administration on Wednesday to toast his first anniversary in office and remind one and all that "you're here to drain the swamp" of big government.

Later, at a formal, \$10,000-a-table dinner dance at the Washington Hilton, the president was to tell big contributors to Republican coffers that "the days of sensational, quick victories are mostly behind us."

"Now we move from the glamor of initial commitment to the grit of the long haul," Reagan said in his prepared remarks.

The message was similar to one Reagan delivered earlier Wednesday at a pep rally, complete with brass band, in the inter-department auditorium in the Commerce Department for 1,500 residential appointees.

The second, replica with marching band and cheerleaders virtually all the Cabinet and White House stars, bore the style and euphoria of a Super Bowl victory party.

"Any coach worth his salt knows that it's not the season that just ended that counts; it's the season that's just beginning," Reagan told his appointees.

"AS A TEAM, we are about to launch our second season, and it's going to be a tough one... Today, and throughout the year ahead, only our best will be good enough."

"As the old saying goes," said Reagan, "when you're up to your armpits in alligators, it's sometimes hard to remember that you're here to drain the swamp."

"But that is why you're here and I'm here: to cut back on waste and mismanagement; to eliminate unnecessary, restrictive regulations that make it harder for the American economy to compete and harder for American workers to find jobs; to drain the swamp of over-taxation, over-regulation and runaway inflation that has dangerously eroded our free way of life."

According to Baker, Reagan already has fulfilled 104 of the 147 major promises of his 1980 campaign. Baker said only three of those promises are beyond reach. One was the pledge to balance the budget by 1983, a goal that slipped to 1984 after the election and now is "out of the question" before the end of Reagan's term, Baker said.

Baker reminded the crowd, composed of about 1,500 of Reagan's 2,300 appointees, that this is the administration that:

- Cut taxes.
- Cut the growth rate of government spending in half.
- Cut the growth of federal regulations by a third.

Stockman recalled some of the season's highlights.

The administration "finally closed down" the seven Public Health Service hospitals that Stockman said every administration since 1799 had been trying to do away with. And he mentioned the \$5 billion CETA public-service jobs program, which was abolished, and the termination of the long-entrenched dairy subsidy program, which he said was costing the taxpayer "\$100 for every cow, calf and heifer in the country."

It was left to Donald Regan, the treasury secretary, to explain the season's low point, a six-month-long recession that hasn't bottomed out yet.

"It's true that the administration hadn't achieved what it hoped, but 'I'm bullish on America,' said the former head of Merrill, Lynch. "Just wait until that market place really catches up with the tax incentives and starts to run before passing judgment on which way the game is going."

After all, he said, the economy was staggering when Reagan took over, and it just "could not hold out" until the new team could get itself together. By the middle of the 1982 season, he predicted, things would be looking up.

Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. modestly noted that he'd had three awards "this past month alone," including the Doublespeak Award from a group of Boston college English professors and the Sore Law Award from a group of London linguists.

"I explained to the president, who wanted to know, that it was my college football experience that taught me the teamwork that has carried me so well."

In China, fierce-faced stone dogs guard entrances to cities, temples and public buildings. Dogs are able to detect and repel evil, sniffing out demons and distinguishing between friends and foes of the master.

So it follows that folks born under the sign of the dog make excellent jurists, investigators and personnel directors.

The dog years this century have been 1910, 1922, 1934, 1946, 1958 and 1970.

Snoopy's fans may like to know that cartoonist Charles "Peanuts" Schulz is a celebrity born under the dog star.

Dog people are ticked by trivia and can be caustic with their biting wit. They tend to be independent and aloof. Somerset Maugham was born in a year of the dog.

Another trait of those born under the canine sign is that they are idealistic and champion worthy causes. Like Shirley Maclaine, born in 1934, a dog year.

Those who observe a lunar new year will welcome the Year of the Dog on Jan. 25. President's brother decides home should become shrine

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Neil Reagan, the president's older brother, says he has changed his mind and decided it might not be a bad idea after all to make the former Reagan home in Dixon, Ill., into a shrine.

Reagan told a business group here Wednesday that he initially thought the idea "stupid," but that was before he visited other presidential memorials and decided "every president's house ought to be a memorial."

Reagan, 73, is now honorary chairman of a committee that is seeking \$500,000 to preserve and restore the house where he and President Reagan grew up.

When Marvin Gibson of Sun City, a local organizer of the house fund drive, said some of the money would be used to shore up the roof, Reagan said: "It was falling in when I lived there."

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — What began as a Mississippi River ride through the books of Mark Twain has become a dream-come-true for Argentine author Jorge Luis Borges, who says he "always wanted to know the Deep South personally."

Borges is getting his wish. On Wednesday, accompanied by scholars, diplomats and a young assistant, the blind writer spent an evening on a well-worn bench at the French Quarter jazz club, Preservation Hall. "I was delighted," he said. "This is the fountainhead of jazz, and I love jazz."

The era and the area has fascinated him since youth, the 82-year-old writer said, noting that "Huckleberry Finn was the first novel I ever read through."

Borges, considered South America's senior man of letters, is here for 10 days to lecture and be honored by two universities.

He is author of "Other Inquisitions," "The Aleph and Other Stories," "Dreamtigers" and "The Book of Imaginary Beings."

A hereditary disease blinded him at age 56 but, he said, "my dreams keep on being a vision. I keep on seeing ... I live in the center of a luminous mist."

NEW YORK (AP) — Former President Richard Nixon made what became known as the Watergate tapes in an effort to influence the judgment of history, John Ehrlichman says.

In other words, says Nixon's former domestic affairs adviser, Nixon didn't want history to bestow Henry Kissinger with honors Nixon felt he should get himself.

Nixon's chief of staff, H.R. Haldeman, told Ehrlichman "that the reason that the taping system went in is that Nixon wanted to be able to prove to history that the great initiatives in foreign policy were his concepts, not Henry's, and that he was afraid Henry would run away with history, the judgment of history."

Ehrlichman's comments came in a segment taped last week for showing tonight on ABC's "20/20" television program.

Ehrlichman himself spent 18 months in prison for his part in the Watergate cover-up. On the television program he repeats allegations from his book, "Witness to Power," that Chief Justice Warren Burger, Attorney General John Mitchell and Nixon discussed issues that were before the high court. Mitchell denies such conversations took place, and Burger has refused to discuss the matter.

"Well, I didn't make it up," Ehrlichman said. "I came back from that breakfast meeting and I sat down and made notes of what was discussed." He said the date was Dec. 18, 1970.

"I thought it was extraordinary that the chief justice would sit there and let Richard Nixon lobby him," Ehrlichman said. He said there were other similar discussions involving school desegregation, the death penalty and criminal issues.

French embassy personnel thinking of safeguards

PARIS (AP) — No one has asked for a transfer home since the assassination four days ago of one of the U.S. Embassy's military attaches. But the mood among the men and women at one of the Foreign Service's most prized posts is "a combination of shock, frustration and anger," says an embassy official.

The murder of Lt. Col. Charles Ray was the second such attack within two months, and "I think if you took an informal poll among embassy employees, more than 50 percent would say the trouble is not over," said the official, who asked not to be identified.

Embassy staff members are being more cautious, he continued, but "you don't see a long line of people signing up to go home. In fact, no one has asked for a transfer because of this."

"The general feeling is that employees believe their dependents are safe. One would hope there are some limits to what these type of attacks will do."

U.S. and French officials are studying new security arrangements for the 400 Americans on the embassy

staff and their families, estimated at about 1,000 people. But Foreign Minister Claude Cheysson pointed out that full protection for all of them is impossible.

"NO ONE CAN argue with Cheysson's contention," the embassy official said. "There's no way we can provide round-the-clock bodyguards for all our people. But security begins with the individual, and there are things we can do."

For one thing, the embassy would like to do away with the special license plates for diplomats' cars.

"Our plates all start with 6 CD," he said. "For anyone who is attuned to that sort of thing, the plates stand out like a sore thumb."

He also said embassy employees should vary their daily routines.

Ray, 43, was shot as he left his apartment house at the usual hour he went to work. The first target, Deputy Ambassador Christian Chapman, was attacked Nov. 18 under the same circumstances. But his assailant opened fire from farther away, and Chapman ducked behind his car and was not hurt.

Delegate talks of U.S. plans to keep tabs on U.N. voting

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is taking the offensive against "wild and horrifying" accusations and actions by Third World representatives at the United Nations, a ranking member of the U.S. delegation to the world body says.

And, he adds, the U.S. delegation is making a "very careful" tabulation of voting records by U.N. delegates, "not for nefarious purposes but to hold people accountable for what they do and to let these people know these kinds of votes are not going to be ignored and sloughed off."

The official, who spoke with a small group of reporters on the condition he not be identified, says the effort already has begun and will continue as the United States makes a serious attempt to "turn around" the "negative" political atmosphere at the United Nations.

He said the goal is to forge "a new consensus

more in line with the goals and values of many U.N. members, including the United States."

"We are taking the United Nations very, very seriously, which surprises a lot of people up there," the official said.

He said it will be the policy of the U.S. delegation "to answer charges against the United States in the form they are given and at the time they are given and to do it throughout."

The official acknowledged the U.S. delegation under Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick "could have done a better job of lobbying" U.N. delegates in the pursuit of U.S. interests.

He called this "a very labor-intensive effort" and said that "we've kind of fallen down in the lobby

ing department."

The official said the actions of many U.N. delegates often do not match the policies of their governments and that the United States has found that its most effective lobbying on U.N. matters is done in foreign capitals, not at U.N. headquarters in New York.

"There's a big disparity," the official said. "The whole way that it works is driving people nuts."

Meanwhile, The Heritage Foundation, a conservative policy study group, in the first of a series of U.N. studies, said popular support for the United Nations has fallen so low that if the vote to ratify the U.N. charter were taken again "the result would probably be reversed."

Intellectuals attacked by Polish regime

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Poland's intellectuals, the firebrands of the Solidarity reform movement, are under constant official attack for their actions during the 16 months of crisis that preceded the martial law crackdown.

"Quite a number of people from the creative milieu were dominated by some incomprehensible masochism," Deputy Premier Mieczyslaw Rakowski said, scolding intellectuals at a recent meeting.

"Total criticism of almost everything that arose in people's Poland has become like a new religion," said Rakowski, an ex-newspaper editor and intellectual himself who has become a critic of his colleagues.

Rakowski blamed intellectuals for remaining "silent when they should have shouted" and "permitting the dismantling of the Polish state."

His speech was the first in what has become a series of government attacks on the thinkers who inspired the now-suspended Solidarity labor movement.

Some observers believe the official criticism of intellectuals for pushing Solidarity toward a clash with authorities, or failing to head off such a confrontation, is an attempt to block a reunion of labor and intellectuals after martial law is lifted.

The state media reserved particular wrath for Jacek Kuron, Karol Modzelewski and Adam Michnik, intel-

lectuals who belonged to the dissident Committee for Social Self-Defense, or KOR, and served as key advisers to Solidarity leaders.

But in some cases intellectuals are taking advantage of the new situation to attack each other, suggesting that behind the charges of ignoring reality there may be more than a touch of personal back-biting.

Polish film director Czeslaw Petelski, in a recent interview with the official PAP news agency, criticized his colleagues for not sensing "where the (Solidarity) leaders' addiction to politics would lead them."

"It is especially unpleasant for us that an artist of the calibre of Andrzej Wajda turned out to be the most zealous advocate of extremist tendencies," Petelski said, attacking his rival, Wajda, the director best-known outside Poland.

In addition to the intellectuals, students and their professors also have come under attack from the martial law regime.

The government disbanded the independent students' organization, while it has only suspended Solidarity. And authorities have staggered the dates for reopening university classes, apparently to avoid organized student protests against the crackdown.

Returning students are finding new rules, including a ban on loitering on campus longer than necessary to attend classes or use the library.

Professors are being told to renounce their Solidarity memberships or face loss of their jobs.

Attacker disagrees with 'no harm' claim

LYON, France (AP) — The anonymous caller who claimed responsibility for an attack on Super Phenix, France's first nuclear breeder reactor plant being built east of Lyon, disputed the police claim that his rockets did no serious damage.

The man, who said he represented an ecological group, told the French news agency Wednesday night that one of the five rockets hit either the interior reactor housing or an entry port to the reactor, both "vital points."

"That will cause an enormous delay in the construction of the plant, which was our objective," he said.

"We were not trying to be spectacular for the sake of it but to delay the building of this monstrous object and make people think so that the nuclear debate will start again in France."

Officials could not be reached immediately for comment on the claim.

The police said earlier that five rockets were fired Monday night across the Rhone River at the Creys-Malville nuclear power plant 28 miles east of Lyon, and one of them gouged a 4-inch-deep hole in the 40-inch-thick wall of the main building.

The reactor, which has been dubbed Super

Phenix, is two years away from completion, and officials said there was no radioactive material at the site.

Police and army investigators said Wednesday they have no leads to the members of the ecology group.

Girl Scout cookies: National tradition

QUINCY, Mass. (AP) — At age 11, Lisa Thompson knows about mass marketing and sales promotion. A champion cookie seller last year, Lisa is one of 2.5 million Girl Scouts preparing to go forth

once again with the boxes of cookies that have become a national tradition and a big business.

The sixth grader is holder of the prestigious "Super Seller Patch," which she received for selling 871 boxes of cookies — the most sold last year in the Patriots' Trail

Girl Scout Council which includes 25,000 scouts in the Boston metropolitan area. This year she is shooting for the 1,000-box mark.

"I guess it's kind of hard for people to say no," she said, explaining her success. It didn't hurt that her father, who works for the food services department at Boston College, persuaded the food services manager to take 200 boxes last year and sell them to students. This year, he is taking 400.

"I showed him the kinds of cookies we had, and he said he'd do it because he used to buy cookies from his niece," Lisa said.

Girl Scouts sold 120 million boxes of Thin Mints, Tagalongs, Trefoils and other varieties last year at prices ranging from \$1.50 to \$2.00 a box.

While the National Council does not keep records on the nation's 340 local councils, last year's sale is believed to have grossed around \$200 million.

"It's a very impressive figure," says Frances Hesselbein, the national director of the Girl Scouts. "The figures are important, but for most girls it's their first experience in the business world. It's training for the future."

Ely List, a spokeswoman for the Girl Scouts, says the origins of the cookie sale are "shrouded in the mists of time." While many lay claim to the first cookie sale, credit goes to the Philadelphia Council for being the first to buy cookies from a commercial bak-

ery in 1904.

That first effort sold 114,000 boxes. Since then, says Mrs. Hesselbein, there has been a steady growth in sales, even in years of recession and inflation.

The National Council now licenses six separate companies to bake official Girl Scout cookies. The largest, Little Brownie Bakers, located at 3 Cookie Lane in Louisville, Ky., says about 40 percent of its business comes from the scouts.

"We felt it would be a good business to enter and it's been very good for our company," says William Bayers, a vice president for sales.

Bayers spends part of each year on the road, pitching his company's cookies to 50 or 60 councils. Competition among the franchised cookie makers is hot and salesmen try to win customers by offering low prices, quality cookies and promotional material that will help the scouts sell their cookies.

"They are just like any business people," Bayers says of the council leaders. "They require that you live up to your commitments."

He said Girl Scout cookies have a pronounced, if short-lived impact on the regular cookie market.

"Most of these cookies are sold in a relatively short period of time, and during that period... you can see store sales of cookies drop," said Bayers.

One of Bayers' customers is the Boston-area Patriots Trail Council, the sixth largest in the nation.

The council hopes to sell one million boxes this year.

There is no one date set for national cookie sales. Each local council picks its own date, but most choose to hawk their wares in late winter or early spring.

Colette Phillips, a spokeswoman for Patriots Trail, says the bakery gets 70 cents for every \$2 box of cookies sold. The rest of the proceeds go to individual troops, property improvements and community service efforts.

The council's scouts will compete for special patches and T-shirts, commemorating the number of boxes of cookies sold. The young saleswomen also earn credits toward summer camp.

"Competition is healthy, but it doesn't exist in a cutthroat way," said Ms. Phillips.

Through the years, the Girl Scouts have improved on their door-to-door method of sales. Last year, United Airlines

purchased \$50,000 worth of cookies to distribute among passengers. Mrs. Hesselbein says Delta and Pan Am will join United this year in distributing two million packets of cookies to celebrate the 70th anniversary of the Girl Scouts.

While the profits from the Cookies provide for scouting's financial well-

being, Mrs. Hesselbein said the yearly sales serve as an important object lesson for the girls.

"They learn how you talk to a prospective customer, how you make change and how you deliver the cookies after you sell them," she said. "It's a really marvelous preparation for the world of work."

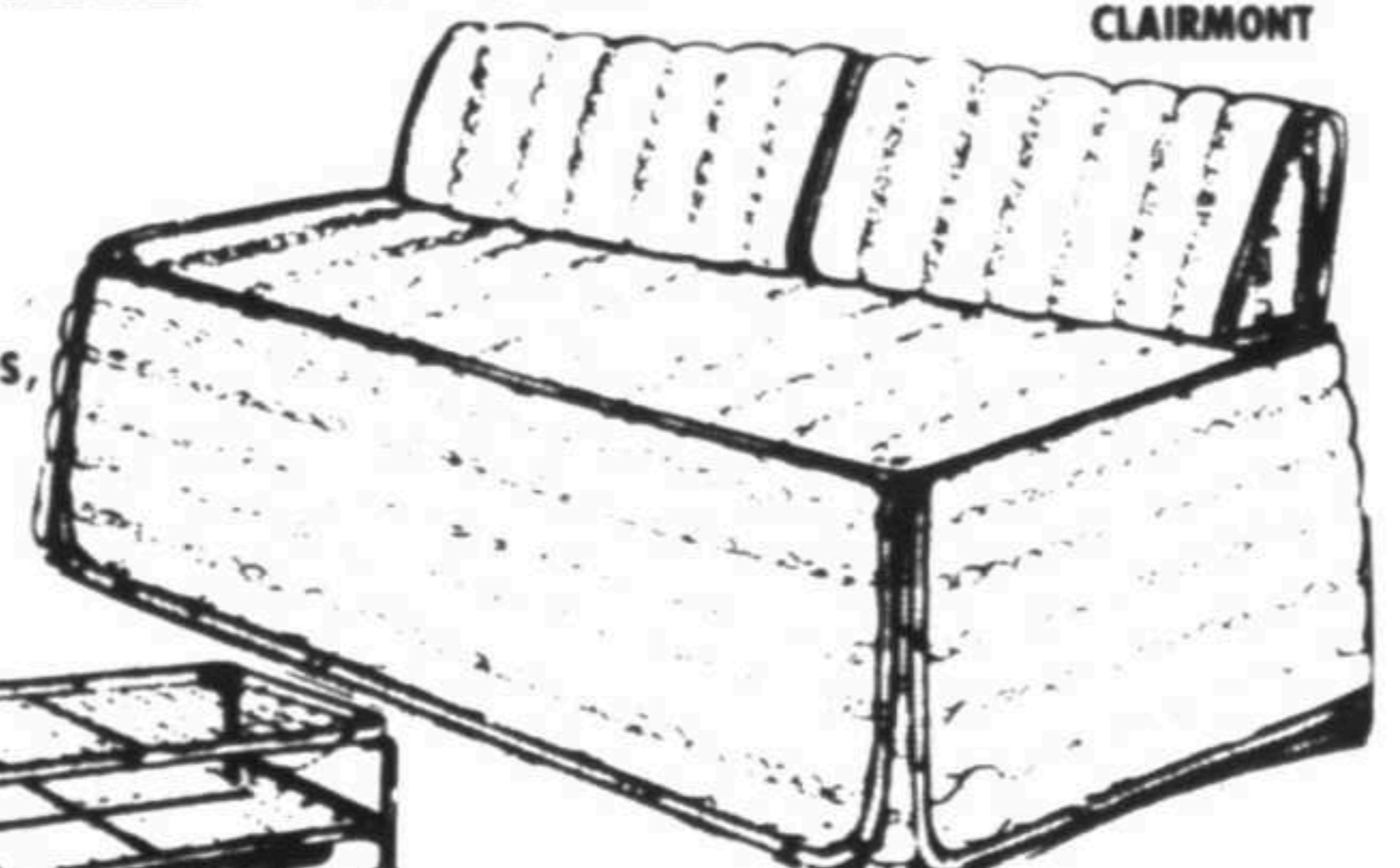

Mitchelson client seeking \$3 billion settlement

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Celebrity divorce specialist Marvin Mitchelson has set one multi-billion dollar case and filed suit against a Saudi Arabian sheik whose wife is asking for a record \$3 billion.

Mitchelson announced an out-of-court settlement of Soraya Khashoggi's \$2.5 billion claim against her husband, Adnan Khashoggi, but retained his status as a participant in the world's richest marital battle with an even larger suit on behalf of Sheika Dena Al-Fassi.

Mrs. Al-Fassi claims 27-year-old Sheik Mohammed Al-Fassi imprisoned and threatened her. Her Superior Court lawsuit seeks dissolution of his other two marriages and half of their community property, which Mitchelson estimated at more than \$6 billion.

"He is still married to all three women. This is contrary to California law," Mitchelson said Wednesday. "We feel Sheika Dena is the only rightful wife. She was the first wife. They were married when she was 15."

Mrs. Al-Fassi, now 23, was born in Belgium, Mitchelson said as she sat silently next to him in his offices.

She married Al-Fassi in 1975. They have four children, two of them adopted, who currently live with their father at the Diplomat Hotel in Hollywood, Fla.

Mrs. Al-Fassi's suit said she has "been held a captive in a locked room by my husband's squad of bodyguards, acting on his orders, and prevented from using a telephone."

"I have recently been threatened by my husband with physical injury unless I signed his proposed property settlement agreement," the suit said. "I am afraid that, unless restrained, my husband will order his henchmen to abduct and falsely imprison (me)."

Al-Fassi captured national attention by painting wildly colored sexual details on statues in front of his mansion, which was gutted in a New Year's Day 1980 fire that investigators labeled arson. Mitchelson said the couple never lived in the mansion.

The suit listed other homes in Switzerland, London, Germany, France, Spain, Japan and at the Royal Palace in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia.

Mitchelson said the couple's lavish lifestyle had included a \$250,000 birthday party for one of their sons, private airplanes and 15 residences in Florida as well as many others around the world.

Mrs. Al-Fassi's suit alleged that her husband has concealed ownership of some California property because of other pending lawsuits, including one by one of his other wives.

Mitchelson said Mrs. Khashoggi's suit against her Saudi husband had been "settled amicably." California courts refused to hear it, saying it should be tried in England, where she spent most of her time.

Mitchelson said he could not reveal how much she was awarded. But when asked by a reporter if the amount was adequate, he replied, "I'm smiling, aren't I?"

Khashoggi's lawyer, Joseph Ball, said only the settlement was "nothing like what she was asking for." Mrs. Khashoggi had demanded half her husband's fortune, estimated at \$5 billion.

Mrs. Khashoggi took the veil of the Moslem faith when she married Khashoggi as a teen-ager. She filed suit two years ago, claiming her husband obtained a proxy divorce without her knowledge, cut her off without sufficient funds and barred her from seeing their five children.

Mitchelson said all that has been resolved, and Mrs. Khashoggi now sees the children regularly.

Polish regime pressuring farmers in order to secure food

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Putting on pressure to increase the supply of flour and bread at controlled prices, Poland's martial law regime told farmers it won't sell them seed grain for spring planting unless they trade food grain for it.

The government announced that in February and March, farmers will be allowed to buy 220 pounds of seed grain for every 264 pounds of food grain they sell the state, the official news agency PAP reported Wednesday.

It appeared to be a step toward obligatory farm sales — abandoned in the 1960s — to combat severe shortages in the foods the government sells at controlled prices.

Explaining its adoption of the carrot-and-stick tactic, the government said it hoped to buy 3.6 million tons of grain from Polish farmers last year but was 2.2 million tons short because the farmers were either hoarding it or selling it on the free market for higher prices.

Some observers believe the government may take similar action to divert meat from the free market. A government news-

paper reported Tuesday that officials expect a severe shortage of meat and chicken in the next two months.

MORE AND POSSIBLY worse shortages appeared to be in prospect. Warsaw television reported a cabinet meeting Wednesday was told of shortages in fertilizers, pesticides and farm machinery.

This report said 50,000 tractors will be out of operation during spring planting because of a shortage of parts. It said foreign exchange had been allocated for the purchase of pesticides from the West, the chemical industry would increase fertilizer production at least 30,000 tons and the engineering industry pledged to increase production of machinery and hand tools.

The success or failure of plans to increase prices Feb. 1 could determine the future course taken by the Communist Party, one government official told The Associated Press.

"If there are no riots, demonstrations or strikes, the government will go ahead with the economic, social and political reforms which were talked about before Dec. 13" (when martial law was declared), said the official, who asked not to be identified.

"If the price hikes are not accepted, well..." The government has been waging a vigorous propaganda campaign to convince the public of the necessity of raising the prices of milk, butter, meat and other staples 200 to 400 percent. Speaking to a Western reporter this week, one member of the Solidarity labor union predicted "a round of food riots much worse than anything we have experienced so far." But others appeared resigned and said they would have to make the best of the situation.

Attempts to raise prices touched off violent public protests in 1970 and 1976 that forced the government to retreat. Another attempt in 1980 set off a nationwide strike wave that mushroomed into a movement for economic and political reforms and resulted in the formation of Solidarity, the Soviet bloc's first legal trade union independent of the Communist Party.

THE UNION, AFTER wresting unprecedented democratic reforms from the Communist government, was suspended when martial law was declared and thousands of its members were interned.

Producer says Japanese steel tubes pose threat

WASHINGTON (AP) — Low-priced Japanese tube steel used with petroleum production equipment is a growing threat to domestic specialty steelmakers, the Babcock & Wilcox Co. says.

The U.S. firm, which manufactures seamless tube and pipe products, made the assertion Wednesday in unexpected anti-dumping petitions filed with the Commerce Department.

The federal agency must now investigate the complaints, which could lead to higher tariffs on Japanese tube-steel imports.

The action marks the first time foreign companies have been charged with dumping tubular and pipe products on the American market, considered until now so strong that U.S. producers didn't seek help.

Five of America's largest steelmakers filed hundreds of individual unfair trade

petitions against European steel producers last week, but those suits involved all types of steel except tubes and pipes.

Japan supplied about 30 percent of the tube-steel products used in the United States in the first nine months of 1981, according to the B&W petition.

Thomas Krebs, B&W's senior vice president for tubular products, said Japanese firms are selling their products at prices as much as 63.1 percent below fair value.

"These prices cannot continue without crippling the domestic specialty steel tubing industries," Krebs said.

"As a domestic producer, B&W is faced with the dilemma of either maintaining its market share by lowering prices in the face of unfair imports and losing its profitability, or preserving profits by losing a significant portion of market share," company spokesman John Pasult said in a prepared statement.
