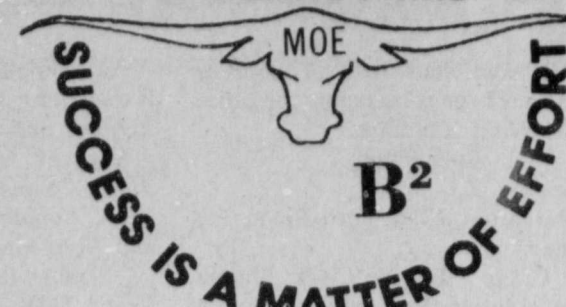

4-H week noted

This is National 4-H Week in Texas as well as across the country. 4-H has been a part of Texas tradition for more than 75 years. It is time this week to congratulate the almost 5 million youth and over 600,000 4-H volunteer leaders across the country. Right here in Floyd County there are almost 550 youth involved in 4-H with some 50 volunteer leaders. That makes us a special part of this Texas tradition.

Four-H started in Texas around 1909 with boys and girls raising corn and hogs as well as canning tomatoes. This educational program for youth has come a long way since this beginning. 4-H still believes in "learning by doing" as was taught in the beginning, but now 4-H projects have expanded tremendously. There are 36 award programs available for 4-H'ers to enter including Automotive, Breada, Leadership, Plants and Soil Science, Health, Dairy, Public Speaking, ... the list goes on and on.

4-H definitely offers something for everyone. A few of the activities planned for the near future in Floyd County are: the foods and nutrition project and show, leadership retreats, the annual Achievement Banquet, rifle contests method demonstrations, livestock judging, deci-

sion making contests, archery projects, County Stock Show and County Camp. The opportunities that 4-H offers youth are countless... a 4-H'er can go as far as he/she wants to go!

The 4-H program is the educational program for youth, ages 9-19, of the Cooperative Extension Service System. Extension is a 3-way partnership of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the State land-grant universities, and county governments. The volunteer leaders and Extension supporters are often described as the fourth partners in the system that makes it keep working.

The Floyd County Extension staff is proud to be working for the county and for the 4-H program. Agency supports issues

At the recent county convention held by Farm Bureau, the Floyd County organization voiced its support of several county, state, and national resolutions.

The county resolutions included urging the county commissioners to set a cutoff date of April 20th of each year for the use of 2-4-D ester. Also the Floyd County Farm Bureau organization would promote the educational program, through local news media two weeks prior to the cutoff date.

They also voted to support a job safety program through the Texas Engineering Extension Service, and to support the county commissioners efforts in shreading ditches rather than blading where water or wind erosion is a problem. A five year bill to reach 95% parity and a crop reduction program at the county level, was also recommended.

At the state level resolutions were approved by local Farm Bureau membership for funding vocational agriculture and home economics. They also recommended that Farm Bureau continue education of the public on the farm economy, and approved supporting the amendment that would allow for the Commissioner of Agriculture to be an appointed office rather than an elected one.

Scout troop organized for Lockney youth

Recently a cub scout troop has been organized in Lockney and Ed and Joyce Marks are acting as the troop adult leaders.

There are over 20 scouts enrolled in the program and they will begin selling tickets to the 75th South Plains Council Scout Show to be held in Lubbock on November 2, 1985, at the Memorial Civic Center.

The Scout Show is a booth event manned by cub, boy, and explorer scouts from a 21 county area and it will highlight the various skills of the scouting program. Each of the booths is designed around a theme of the units choosing and plans for the booths are worked on by scouting members and supervised by scout leaders.

The show gives scouting members the opportunity to meet the public, both through tickets sales and at the show. They will be working closely with other units and boys, as well as building exhibits, and decorating booths.

Tickets for the event are available from local scouting members and cost only \$1.00 each. Each ticket has eight coupons attached to it that are redeemable at Grandy's, Arby's, Pistol Pete's Pizza, Burger King, McDonald's, Kentucky Fried Chicken, and Hollon's Home Furnishings. These coupons are redeemable for everything from cents off, to buy one and get one free food items, as well as \$50.00 off any furniture purchase from Hollon's.

The purchase of a ticket will not only gain admission to the scout show but

will also put money into the local troops fund. For each 100 tickets sold the troop will be given \$40.00 commission. Also each of the boys may obtain scouting equipment and supplies for the tickets he sells.

The purpose of scouting is to provide an educational program for boys and young adults to build character, self-reliance, personal fitness, to train in the responsibilities of participating in citizenship, and to learn to share responsibility.

Longhorns lose 21-0

The Lockney Longhorns lost their fourth game of the 1985 season to the Abernathy Antelopes last Friday night in Abernathy. Final score was 21-0.

The Horns took the ball on the kickoff but after four plays were forced to punt the ball back to the Lopes. The Lopes took the ball but were forced to return it to Lockney after only four plays.

Johnny Torrez took the punt and returned the ball to the Lockney 25 yard line. Quarterback Steven Cates kept the ball on the first run for two yards. Rusty Teeter was on the receiving end of a completed pass that put Lockney on their own 43 yard line on the second play of the series. Lockney was accessed a five yard penalty on the play and the Horns had a first and 15 situation. Three plays later the Horns were unable to make another first down and were forced to give the Lopes the ball. The first quarter saw much of the same play as neither team kept the ball for very long.

In the second quarter the Lopes took the ball from the Horns with nearly four minutes of game time but were unable to score.

The Horns then took the ball on their own 20 yard line. A penalty on the opponents put Lockney on its own 37 yard line. On the second and 8 play quarterback Cates reared back and threw a complete 27 yard pass to Johnny Torrez putting the Horns on the Abernathy 36 yard line. The Horns advanced eight yards and on the Lopes 28 yard line Coach Bob Purser signalled to go for the first down. The attempt failed however and the Lopes took over on their own 28 yard line.

The Lopes took just two plays to score the first touchdown of the game. The extra point was good and at the half Abernathy lead the Horns seven to 0.

Lockney had two possessions of the ball in the third quarter but Abernathy took advantage of their third possession

to again score, and at the end of the third quarter the Horns were behind 14-0.

In the fourth quarter the Horns had the chance to score on an Abernathy fumble. Lupe Basaldua took an Abernathy fumble on the Lopes own 20 yard line. A penalty accessed to the Horns put them first and 15 on the Lopes 25 yard line. Four plays later the Horns had not moved the ball and the Lopes took over at that point.

Eight plays later with 6:35 left in the game the Lopes again scored a touchdown.

Lockney had possession of the ball after the touchdown but an intercepted pass on the Abernathy 20 yard line dashed any hopes of a score at this point. On the only other Horn possession of the game the Horns got no further than the Lopes 49 yard line.

Coach Bob Purser said, "We played hard but not hard enough to win. Defensively we looked good and played hard enough to win but offensively we couldn't move the ball."

Horns of the Week for the Abernathy game are offensive back Rusty Teeter, defensive forcing unit player, George Basaldua, special teams player Tony Banda, and the secondary unit player Johnny Torrez.

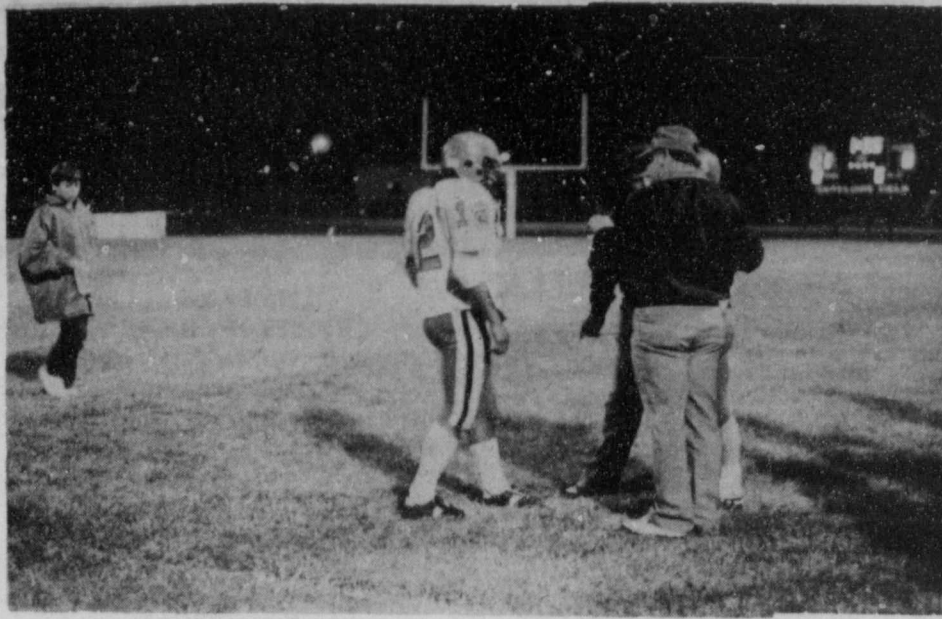

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In times like these... By Mary Jo Fielding



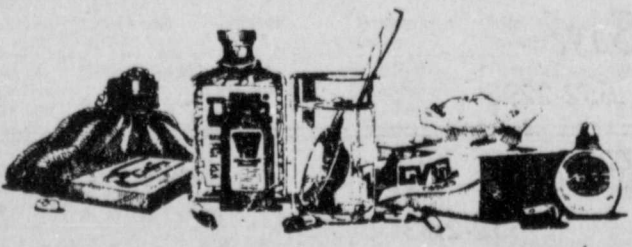
Scientist Robert Ballard, leader of the U.S. French expedition that discovered the Titanic in early September, has spent nearly decades studying the ocean's bottom, exploring what he calls "inner space." Ballard, 43, became interested in the Titanic through a friend who headed the Titanic Historical Society. He read dozens of books and spent hundreds of hours analyzing ocean currents in the area where the famed liner went down in 1913. It took more than 1,500 to their death, including many members of high echelon of society.

Ballard brought to his quest two special qualities—talent as a marine engineer and uncanny luck. His technological know-how helped him to produce the Argo, a computer-controlled robot whose cameras came upon the Titanic in the Atlantic's frigid depths east of Newfoundland. At a September 11 news conference, he showed videotape and

distributed photos of the iceberg gashed liner. "It was a fluke," he said of the find. "Any fishing boat could have done it."

This under-statement is characteristic from a Kansas native who began his career in 1966 when the Navy made him a newly minted ensign, its liaison officer with the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution on Massachusetts Cape Cod. Extroverted and articulate, Ballard became widely known in America through his hosting of public television shows about ocean research.

As for the Titanic, Ballard opposes any effort at salvage. He says the ship "lies now in 13,000 feet of water on a gentle sloping, Alpine-looking countryside overlooking a small canyon—a fitting place for the remains of their greatest of sea tragedies to rest. Forever may it remain that way. And may God bless these now found souls."



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J.C. BAILEY, Minister at the City Park Church of Christ, was born in Lamesa, Texas in 1947. His childhood experience included life on a farm southwest of Lamesa. He attended school at Klondike. His parents, four younger brothers, and one sister moved from the Dawson County farm to Winnsboro, Texas in 1966. That same year he began to attend Abilene Christian College. He attended A.C.C. for four years and in 1971 graduated from the Sunset School of Preaching in Lubbock. In 1970 he married Janis Justus of Crosbyton. They now have four children and have lived for one year in Floydada.

Distractions

How many of us have been amused by the boy who accidentally ran his bike upon the curb or walked into a post because he had been distracted for just a moment girl(s) watching? Not all distractions are amusing. Last year a young man accidentally killed four people on a busy freeway. His pickup truck plowed into the victims' car because he had been distracted for just a few seconds by his efforts to retrieve his overturned cup on the floor board.

Anxiety can be a costly distraction. Luke described Martha's anxiety in Luke 10:40 when he wrote, "But Martha was distracted (emphasis J.C.B.) by all the preparations that had to be made..." Martha's anxiety was evident when she lashed out at Mary in her question and command to Jesus. Jesus replied to her in Luke 10:41-42, "Martha, Martha,..." "you are worried and upset about many things, but only one thing is needed." The "one thing" Martha needed was to stop worrying!

The high cost of anxiety is evident. We annually pay for relief and cures from this habitual distraction into the billions of dollars. Martha was already paying the cost for her anxiety. She was upset and had spoiled an otherwise pleasant opportunity for learning and friendship. The costs for our anxiety must be totaled in more than dollars and cents. Our anxiety erodes friendships and puts needless pressure on our families.

Jesus summed up how useless worry really is when he asked in Matthew 6:27, "Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life?" Worry is useless and harmful because it distracts us from the good purposes of life.
