10% More Diesel Allocation Increase To Get Out Crops

The federal government has intervened to make sure that farmers have necessary diesel fuel to plant, grow and harvest crops as well as produce livestock.

According to directives issued within the last week by Eli T. Reich, administrator of the recently established office of Petroleum Allocation, suppliers shall give preference in the allocation of diesel fuels for a number of purposes including farming and ranching, the exploration, production, refining and distribution of petroleum, natural gas and coal and for the operation of public mass transportation systems within metropolitan areas.

Under the directives, distributors of diesel fuels have been given an extra 10 per cent above the amount of diesel fuel they sold last year and have been told to use a common sense approach in selling the diesel.

Suppliers in many counties

have been reluctant to sell any more diesel than they purchased during the same period last year, according to Eddie Braswell, district director of the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The reason for this reluctance is due to severe fines

amounting to \$10,000 that can be levied against distributors who sell more fuel than they are allotted in violation of allocation guidelines.

Before the 10 per cent increase was allowed, fuel distributors were limited in their purchases from refineries to

the amount they purchased one year ago. In some cases, the allocated amount from a year ago has been cut.

One of the prime reasons for the need for an increase in the allocation of diesel is the fact that within the last year, a number of farmers have switched

from gasoline and butane-propane fueled tractors to diesel engines.

In addition there are a number of new farmers who were not in business last year and therefore, do not have an allocation of diesel fuel.

In November, 1971, the first unit of the lignite coal-fired Big Brown generating plant near Fairfield began producing electricity.

It added 575,000 kilowatts of power to the generating capability of Texas Electric and two other electric utility companies who cooperated in building the plant.

The first unit of the new lignite-fired Monticello plant will become operational in 1974. It duplicates the first unit at Big Brown, right down to the last kilowatt.

Fertilize In Fall Says Benson
The application of fertilizer this fall, or as soon as possible after harvest, is a matter worthy of immediate consideration and decision, states County agent Bob Benson.
All reports clearly indicate shortages of nitrogen and phosphate will be with us throughout 1974 and for an undetermined period thereafter, according to Benson. Contributing to shortages at the dealer level are insufficient supplies of natural gas, fertilizer exports, release of reserve acreage back into production, higher sale prices of crops and transportation difficulties.
The effectiveness of fall fertilizer application on the heavier soils of the High Plains is well established. On sandy soils, phosphate may be applied in the fall but nitrogen application should perhaps be delayed until spring to prevent possible leaching loss. Advantages of fall application include getting the fertilizer while it is available and incorporating it into the soil in the initial tillage operation so as to avoid weather problems likely to occur in the early months of 1974. Benson offers these suggestions on fertilizer use for the next crop.
Find out what your soil really needs by having a soil test made on each field. Information on sampling and mailing is available in his office.
Soil test data from the High Plains clearly show that less than one half of the soils will respond profitably to applications of phosphate. Applying available material only to deficient areas will stretch the supply without reducing the yield potential.
An appreciable nitrogen carryover may be detected. If this is the case, nitrogen rate can be reduced or in some instances omitted.
Consider using feedlot waste. There is much evidence to indicate that a 10-ton application of "average" manure is sufficient to produce near maximum grain sorghum yields without additional commercial fertilizer.
Plan your fertilizer needs as soon as possible and finalize an agreement with your supplier.
Fertilizers have become a major contributor to profitable yields. By keeping the above facts in mind, maximum profits from limited supplies can be realized, Benson concludes.

Key Rate Same For Colorado City

Fire insurance in Colorado City will sell at the same rates this year as last year.
The State Board of Insurance has set the fire insurance key rate for Colorado City at 29 cents, the same as for last year.

The key rate for a city is determined by charging the city for certain fire hazards and giving it credits for certain fire prevention equipment and practices.
The inspections are carried out each year and then the key rate is set. Every five years a very thorough inspection must be passed.

City Manager Junior Sadler explained that Colorado City's key rate is very low compared to most of the cities and towns in our area, although we are deducted points because our fire department is voluntary and not permanent.
The city was found deficient by the examiners and charged in several areas. The largest single deficiencies were in the number of full time paid men in the fire department and building laws and structural conditions 80 per cent deficient in code or enforcement.

Other lesser charges were for a fire alarm system with only an electric siren (examiners feel that systems should also have an auxiliary source of power in case of power failure), conflagration hazards such as overhead wires in mercantile districts and over 40 per cent combustible roofs in residential sections.
They also found the water works and water mains slightly deficient and 20 per cent too few

Grain and forage sorghum stalks and even cotton stalks have been successfully used to control wind erosion.
Many farmers in West Texas leave their stalks unshredded and only chisel their field until past the critical wind erosion period each spring.
Some have even left their cotton stalks until after the cotton was planted in the spring and then used a shredder or rotary hoe after the critical period of the young plants has passed. This has eliminated the use of the sand fighters because the standing stubble acts as a wind barrier.
This method of wind erosion control is more effective than deep breaking and much less costly. Another advantage is that fuel is saved for the more essential operations.
For information on conservation practices and how they can be used to help control erosion, contact the Soil Conservation Service Office in Colorado City.

District 6-AA Officials Have Meet
Colorado City coaches attended a meeting of District 6-AA officials in Sweetwater this past Monday.
The purpose of the meeting was to attend to business pertaining to the district, such as selecting the All-District team.

Wind Erosion Control
The standing stalks reduce the wind speed on the soil surface and this cuts down on the amount and size of soil particles that can be moved by the wind, according to Kazda.
Residues and stubble of the current crops can be used to control wind erosion next spring", says John Kazda of the Soil Conservation Service.
