UNION SERVICE WELL ATTENDED

Enumerating the manifold blessings for which the American people have cause to be profoundly grateful this Thanksgiving season, Dr. Alvin Swindell delivered a sermon at the union services at the Methodist church on Thanksgiving morning which inspired and encouraged those who attended the services.

The attendance, while not as large as such an occasion should be, was perhaps larger than the average Thanksgiving congregation, the different churches of the city being well represented. Rev. R. B. Twitty was director of the choir which rendered special music, two anthems by the choir and a violin offertory by Miss Dorothy Chaney with Miss Maggie Underwood at the piano. Mrs. J. M. Skinner played the prelude and piano accompaniment for the choir. Mr. Killam pronounced the benediction.

After picturing the teaching of thankfulness as taught in the different parables of the Bible, Dr. Swindell said that the Master Himself teaches thankfulness. "Unthankfulness indicates a shriveled life," said Dr. Swindell, and he declared that the thankful heart is the normal heart, and an unthankful heart is an abnormal heart.

"Thankfulness tells who we are and what we are," said the minister, and he enumerated the many things for which we should be thankful. "We should be thankful for the material blessings of life," said Dr. Swindell, "thankful for food, clothing and good health. We should be thankful for the modern means of travel and communication, the relief brought to humanity by modern science.

"We should be thankful for intellectual, moral and spiritual blessings of life. We can't calculate these blessings. When it comes to measuring moral and spiritual blessings, when it comes to measuring God's mercy and God's blessings our arithmetic breaks down. We can't measure God's goodness; His list of blessings is endless. We should thank Him for His temples of justice, charity and benevolences."

Dr. Swindell also listed among the things for which we should be thankful the adversities of life. "It is easy to be thankful in the midst of plenty," said the speaker, "but it takes the fires of adversity to refine out the gold that is in our lives." The minister referred to the hardships of the Pilgrim fathers, how they braved the storms and suffered the hardships, but yet they were thankful, and how they set an example of thankfulness which today reaches all over the United States. He called attention to the fact that King David was in the midst of adversity and a burdensome life when he wrote the 103rd Psalm which is a psalm of praise and thanksgiving. Paul in the time of shipwreck found time to give thanks. "Adversity is God's refining fire," declared Dr. Swindell, "and adversity has a place in life and often brings out the dross of life."

TEACHERS ASK FOR NEW LAWS

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 28.—Preliminary steps to revise the school laws of Texas crystallized in some degree here today in recommendations made by the executive committee of the Texas State Teachers Association. The committee recommended that T. N. Jones, of Tyler; Judge Howard Templeton, of San Antonio; and Judge Frank Etheridge, of Dallas; three widely known Texas lawyers, be added to the executive committee in an advisory capacity and that they be made honorary members of the association.

The executive committee also recommended that the thirty-ninth legislature pass an act continuing the present Texas educational survey commission to make complete a revision of the Texas school laws.

The school code "in the light of recommendations of the survey staff" was one of the principal features of the report of the committee on resolutions which will be ready for submission to the convention tomorrow.

GRAND CHILDREN GET BIG ESTATE

MARION, Ohio, Nov. 28.—Jeanne and George Dewolene, grandchildren of the late Mrs. Warren G. Harding, are left the bulk of the Harding estate, according to the will filed for probate here today. No estimate of the value of the estate was disclosed in the will, but it is believed that Mrs. Harding's estate will amount to \$500,000.

The will makes special bequests to friends and relatives aggregating \$56,000, and leaves the residue from the estate to the grandchildren, who live here.

TO START OVER SEAS MAIL ROUTE

BERLIN, Nov. 28.—Weekly mail Zeppelin service between the United States and Europe will soon be started, Dr. Hugo Eckener, director of the Zeppelin Company, who had charge of the ZR-3 trans-Atlantic flight, said today.

Dr. Eckener indicated in his statement that the Zeppelin-Goodyear combination does not intend to establish a passenger service for the present, but said that he believed that one Zeppelin each way weekly, carrying a half million letters at twenty-five cents each would be a business success.

JEANES MOVES ECONOMY MILLS

E. A. Jeanes, who recently purchased the building occupied by the American Legion, has moved the Economy Mills plant from Eighth Street to the new location, and is opening up a general produce house. He will install a commercial incubator and deal largely in poultry and poultry feed, supplies, etc. Later he expects to enlarge the business to take in cold storage and other lines.

MUTINY AMONG EGYPT'S ARMY

CAIRO, Nov. 28.—Two platoons of the Eleventh Sudan Army at Khartoum today mutinied and attacked the military hospital killing the British doctors and two Syrian doctors. British troops fired on the mutineers and inflicted a number of casualties.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—The Egyptian embassy in London said today that it regarded the outbreak among the Egyptian troops at Khartoum as not due to any influence outside of the battalion involved in the mutiny and does not believe that it had anything to do with the trouble at Cairo growing out of the controversy between the British and Egyptian governments as the result of the assassination of Sirdar Lee Stack.

LIGHT CAMPAIGN EXPENSE ACCT.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Campaign expenditures filed today with the clerk of the House by candidates for congress included the campaign statements of Representatives Black, Manfield and Jones, all Democrats of Texas.

Congressman Black's expense account shows that he spent three dollars; Manfield spent \$29 and Jones did not spend a cent to be re-elected.

G. O. P. SELECTS PARTY LEADER

LEGION CONDUCTS YOUTHS' FUNERAL

The remains of Jess Whitley ar-
rived here from Tucson, Arizona
on the A. & S. motor car Friday
morning, and were laid to rest in
Evergreen Cemetery Friday after-
noon.

The remains were met at the
station by a special guard of
American Legion men, and ac-
companied to the undertaking est-
ablishment of Higginbotham
Bros. & Co., where at the request
of the brothers of the deceased an
examination of the body was
made to determine, if possible,
how the gun-shot wounds which
caused the death of the young
man were inflicted.

An examination of the body in-
dicated that Whitley was mur-
dered in rather a brutal manner,
and at close range by the hands
of his assassin. The body showed
a bullet entered his head just
above the right ear and passed
almost straight through the head,
passing out just above the left
ear. The right side of the face
was powder burned. There was
another bullet wound in the pit of
the stomach and a deep knife
wound about six inches long in
the back. The brothers of the
deceased here requested the exam-
ination in order that they might
be in a position to assist in the
prosecution of the murderer. The
only information they have re-
ceived from Arizona is that the
man who did the killing was
being held in jail and had been
denied bond.

The remains were removed from
the undertaking parlors to the
home of Mrs. S. A. McCray, an
aunt of the deceased, and at 2:30
Friday afternoon the funeral was
held from that place, Rev. Alvin
Swindell conducting the funeral
services, with the American
Legion in charge. The remains
were laid to rest in Evergreen
Cemetery.

Young Whitley was twenty-
seven years of age. He was raised
in Ballinger, leaving here four
years ago and moving to Arizona.
The first news of his death was

received here Tuesday, in a mes-
sage stating that he had been
murdered. The mother, Mrs. M.
J. Whitley, who moved from Bal-
linger to Breckenridge a few
years ago, several brothers and a
sister, joined other relatives here
to attend the funeral.
