Parmer County moves on tax abatement policy

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday adopted a resolution adopting a comprehensive policy of guidelines and criteria for governing tax abatement guidelines.

The state has mandated each taxing unit to adopt such a resolution and adopt tax abatement guidelines and criteria.

The next step is to approve such guidelines. County Judge Bonnie Clayton passed out to the commissioners copies of guidelines from Plainview, Friona, Deaf Smith County, Dallem County and Ochiltree County.

The main question the commissioners must answer is what percentage to allow as tax abatement, and the period of years. Also, they must determine the capital investment required to allow a business to receive tax abatement.

The commissioners are expected to decide on guidelines at one of their August meetings.

As an example, the Friona guidelines for allowing a business to get a tax abatement is a minimum of five new jobs and/or a \$50,000 capital investment. The abatement terms are: year 1, 100%; year 2, 100%; year 3, 75%; year 4, 50%; and year 5, 25%.

Speaking at the Monday meeting were Bill McCoy, speaking for the Friona Economic Development Corp., the Friona Chamber of Commerce, the Friona City Council and others, and Laurie Clayton, Excel accountant. Both urged the commissioners to take swift action on meeting the state mandate.

McCoy said, "Tax abatements should not be viewed as giving up anything to a potential business because generally if one is not granted, then the taxing entity will probably not receive the property improvement to tax anyway. If the tax is abated and the property is improved, then the revenue from the improvement will be on the books only at a later date. Also generally included in abatements are provisos for job development or creation which tend to increase the tax base of the entity and thus create more revenue."

Mrs. Clayton said Excel would like to seek a tax abatement because they plan \$44 million worth of expansion in the next 5 to 6 years. The first step is \$4 million planned for a cooler for carcasses.

She noted that Excel's employee total has risen from 1,300 in 1990 to 1,900 in 1997. Also, the property tax the meat packing plant near Friona has paid has jumped over 100 percent, to more than \$700,000.

Mrs. Clayton noted that Excel also has a facility in Plainview. To stay competitive with Plainview, which has a tax abatement policy in place, she said one is needed here. "Or they will grow and we won't," she added.

She also noted that Excel uses local contractors when possible.

She told the commissioners that Excel needs a tax abatement policy in place here by August or September.

Binturougs outlawed!

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday banned you from keeping "binturougs" on your property!

That's right! No binturougs, period!

You see, the commissioners approved an ordinance prohibiting wild animals.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Division used to enforce this, but a new law, effective Sept. 1, put the onus on

counties, instead.

So counties throughout Texas are having to adopt similar ordinances.

Banned are "lions, tigers, ocelots, cougars, leopards, cheetahs, jaguars, hyenas, bears, lesser pandas, wolves, apes, elephants, rhinoceroses and binturougs."

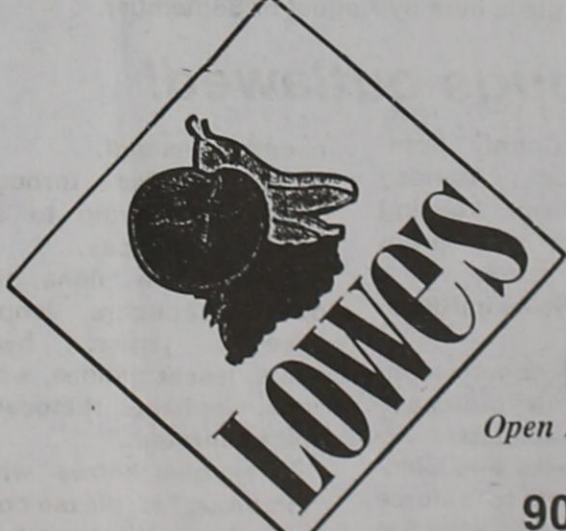

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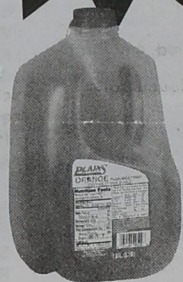
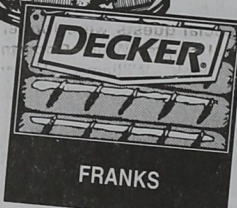

MOLD THAT BUTTER

In another generation, people had the habit of molding butter. After churning for what seemed an interminable period, the butter would rise. When washed and salted, the butter was pressed into a mold. When extracted, the butter closely resembled the mold.

Just so, when concrete mix is poured into a form, one can expect the hardened concrete to look like the form. Or, when a seamstress makes a dress by pattern, the dress resembles the pattern.

Paul stated, "Ye became obedient from the heart to that form of teaching (doctrine) whereunto ye were delivered; and being made free from sin, ye became servants of righteousness" (Rom 6:17,18). "Form of doctrine" may also be translated "pattern (standard) of teaching," or "mold of teaching."

How terribly important! It must be stressed that obedience to a form or mold of doctrine frees man from sin and makes him the servant of righteousness. Whatever this mold or form of doctrine is, the cruciality of the matter cannot be denied. It is a signal matter requiring most urgent consideration. What is it?

The basic doctrine of Christ is expressed by Paul: it is the death, burial and resurrection of Christ (cf. 1 Cor 15:1-4). These are the great fundamental facts to be believed. One cannot obey a fact. One cannot obey the death of Christ. But one can obey a form of that death; a mold of the burial and resurrection of Christ.

Commands are to be obeyed; facts are to be believed. So, man is to believe the doctrine and obey the form of the doctrine of Christ. The form is man's death to sin; his burial and resurrection in baptism.

As Christ died, so man dies to sin. As Christ was buried and arose, so man is buried and rises from baptism to walk in newness of life (cf. Rom 6:3,4).

-- Heard Ronald Byrd report that it's too late to effectively promote a fund-raising golf tourney this year, but plans can be made to hold one next summer.

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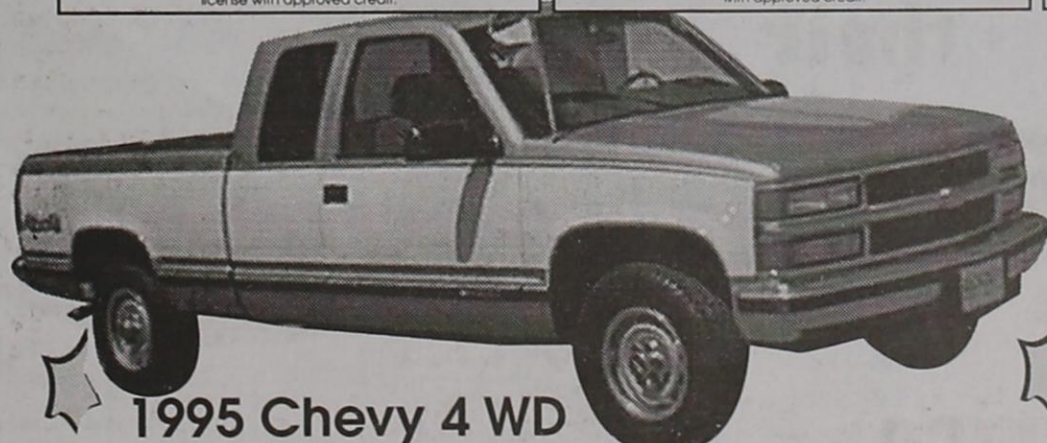

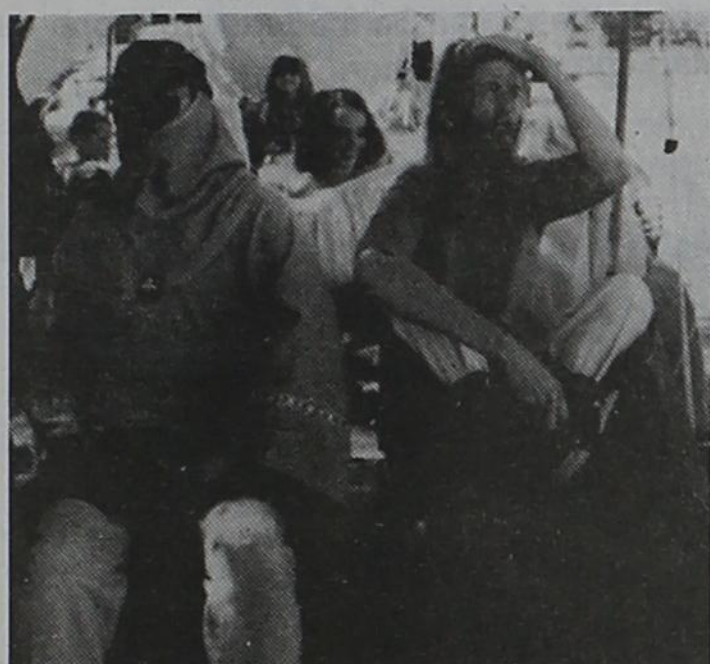

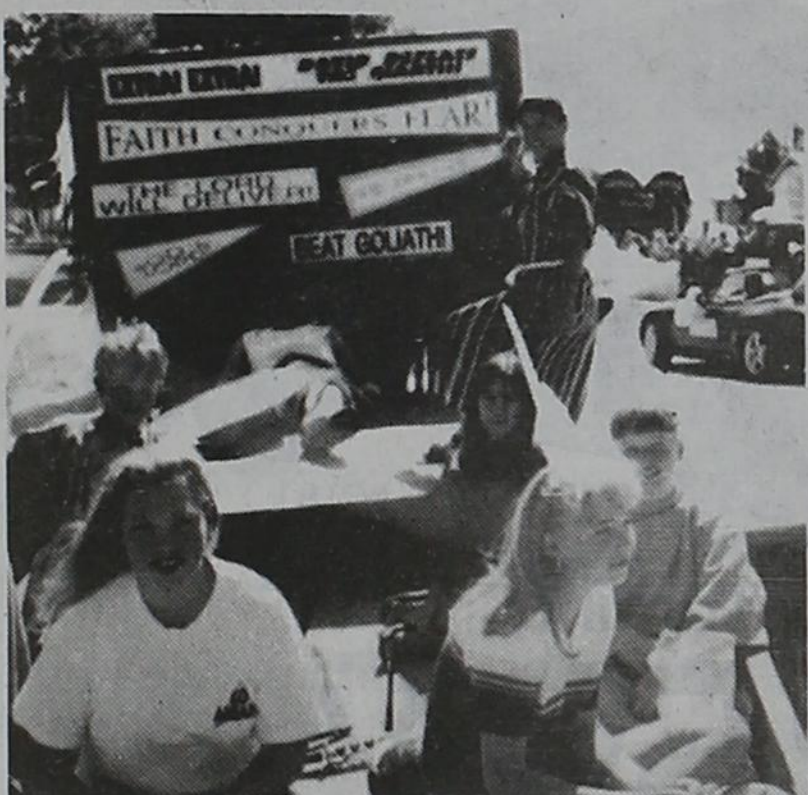
