## State Capital NEWS

Austin. — What happened to the million tourists who did not come to Texas this year?

That question faces a State-wide conference of "Texans for Tourists" called for November 28 in Austin, by Gov. Price Daniel.

Since 1957, the number of tourists coming to Texas has steadily declined. Governor Daniel always has felt that Texas should match the advertising programs of other states.

Nationally, tourism is the third largest industry. In Texas, it ranks 13th.

Texas voters amended the constitution in 1958 to allow state money to be spent to attract tourists. But two sessions of the Legislature have declined to appropriate the money.

Charged with responsibility of promoting tourism in Texas is the State Highway Department. The upcoming all-day session is designed to build grassroots support for legislation to finance a program of advertising.

**SAFE HIGHWAYS** — An increase in highway fatalities this year, after a 26 per cent decline in past years, disturbs the state's chief policeman, Col. Homer Garrison Jr. of the Department of Public Safety.

Present statistics indicate the number of deaths in 1961 will be 20 to 25 more than the 2,254 of 1960. So Colonel Garrison has sent our word for his men to redouble their efforts to remove the unsafe and reckless drivers from the highways.

Program includes more use of radar equipment to check speeds, especially the new type which requires only one highway patrolman per car. It also includes more stopping of drivers to make sure they hold drivers licenses.

Tougher enforcement policy will be followed by Governor Daniel's annual Christmas traffic safety drive starting with Safety Sunday—Dec. 10. Governor Daniel urged pastors to remind their

members of their personal and moral obligation to drive carefully.

**MORE TAX LAWS?** — City officials had their annual meeting, and heard Governor Daniel give support to their main thesis—that cities need new sources of revenue if they are to handle the growing problems caused by Texans moving to town.

Most likely avenue is the movement to have the state abandon the property tax, so it can be used exclusively for city and school purposes. The State and Local Tax Study Commission created by the Legislature in 1959 is specifically directed to report on this possibility.

Speaker James A. Turman filled two vacancies on that study group. He named Reps. Charles L. Sandahl of Austin and Charles N. Wilson of Trinity to work with senators and citizens who have been named to it by Governor Daniel and former Lieut. Gov. Ben Ramsey.

In addition to reporting on the idea of state abandonment of the ad valorem tax, now bringing in about \$40,000,000 a year, the commission will report on whether other new tax sources should be granted to cities which need them.

Most startling tax news came from James McGrew, research director for the Texas Research League. He said it is a very close question whether the new sales tax will produce enough state revenue in the two years starting September 1, 1963, to keep the state's books in the black. The big factor—steady and heavy growth of public schools and colleges.

**HIGH HEAD COUNT** — Enrollment in the 19 colleges and universities operated by the state government rose sharply this year—about 11 per cent.

Total head count at the 19 schools this fall was 100,982. This compares with 91,960 a year ago

and 52,568 only 10 years ago. Addition of the University of Houston to the list of state-supported colleges in 1963 will give the state school total a big jump. Its 11,860 enrollment this fall makes it the second largest in the state, second only to the University of Texas' 20,396.

Texas Tech at Lubbock has become the third largest with 10,212 enrolled. Colleges and universities which are not state-supported showed a smaller gain than the state schools—from 59,036 to 60,924. One factor in the change was the move of Midwestern University at Wichita Falls into the state-supported group.

Fastest-growing college is Arlington State. It had 1,318 students 10 years ago and now has 8,318 to rank it fifth largest. Right behind is Texas A&M, which has 8,835 students this fall.

**NURSE PROGRAM** — Studies by the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners reveal that 24,613 vocational nurses have been licensed in Texas since 1951. Also 103 training schools now are in operation over the state. Examinations on October 20 and 21 resulted in licensing of 656 candidates.

It now takes one year in a vocational nurses school or two years in a professional nursing school to become eligible to take the state board examinations.

**WORKING ON THE HIGHWAYS** — Texas Highway Commission laid out \$20,000,000 worth of work for its staff to do to improve safety on 2,433 miles of primary highway.

List includes 378 projects in 156 counties, and ranges from pavement and bridgework to complete reconstruction.

Highway workers are getting some new training, too. They will be taught how to detect radiation contamination, so traffic can be routed away from unsafe areas in case of a nuclear attack.

## Talco Tramples Bogata By 50-12

Talco Trojans treated their Dads to a hard-running game as they overpowered the Bogata Bulldogs 50 to 12 Friday night at Talco.

The game was dedicated to the fathers of the Talco players in a pre-game ceremony as fathers and sons were introduced to the fans. The Dads were special guests with reserved seats on the sidelines with the players.

The game turned out to be a ground battle all the way with the only pass completion being a toss from Jimmy Clemmons, Trojan quarterback, to Sidney Bonds for the extra points after the third Talco touchdown.

The game started off with Trojan tackle Pat Parr grabbing a fumble on the first play from scrimmage on the Bogata 41-yard line. Talco was unable to take advantage of the break and were forced to punt.

Bogata moved for one first down but couldn't make the second. Butch Black received the kick for the Trojans on his own 38-yard line and raced 62 yards for the first score of the game. Rodney Russell carried over for the extra points to give Talco an 8-0 lead.

Jackie Dixon, subbing for big brother Pete, sliced off right tackle and sped 49 yards to the end zone late in the quarter only to see the run nullified by a slipping penalty.

Big Steve Wallace, Bulldog fullback, later crashed thru with a host of Bogata linemen to block a punt. The ball bounced behind the kicker and Steve kept moving and outran the Talco defenders 40 yards to score standing up. Gerald Knowles went over in the extra point try but an offside penalty spoiled the play. Second try failed and the score remained Talco 8, Bogata 6.

Jimmy Clemmons took the next kickoff and ran it back to the 40, a penalty against the Bulldogs add five yards. Jackie Dixon, Russell and Pete Dixon moved the ball to the 14-yard line. Clemmons went 14 yards over right tackle for the second Trojan touchdown. Pete Dixon drove through the line for the extra points to make it Talco 16, Bogata 6.

Clemmons, Jackie Dixon and Pete Dixon carried the next drive from the 42 yard line to the 13 yard line, from where Russell carried down the middle for the touchdown. Clemmons then tossed the only complete pass of the night to Bonds for the extra points to bring the score to Talco 24 - Bogata 6. Butch Black intercepted a Bulldog pass on the 22 yard line to stop their drive as the half ended.

The Trojans took the kickoff to open the second half and made a 75-yard drive with Pete Dixon going over from the six-yard line for the score. The drive was sparked by a 41-yard run by Butch Black, who also went over for the extra points to give Talco a 30 to 6 lead.

Gerald Knowles, Bogata backfield workhorse, made a fine 20-yard runback on the kickoff and added another 14 yards from scrimmage to start the Bulldogs

Butch Perdue crashed to toss the Bulldogs for a three-yard loss and on the next play the ball got away and bounced into the end zone. Bogata recovered but lost two points on the safety, running the score to Talco 34, Bogata 6.

Bryson kicked from the 20-yard line across midfield, with Russell receiving on the 40-yard line and making one of the finest broken field runs of the season, going 60 yards to score. Jackie Dixon carried across for the extra points, raising the score to Talco 42, Bogata 6.

Knowles received the next kickoff for the Bulldogs and, assisted by some excellent blocking by Wallace, moved the ball to the three-yard line. Wallace bucked across for the second Bogata TD. Extra point try was blocked.

Trojan reserves received the kickoff on the 15 yard line and with fine running by Jackie Dixon they moved 85 yards to score again. Dixon had one 60-yard gainer in the drive. Eddie Brown ran for the extra points bringing the final score to Talco 50, Bogata 12.

Talco fans were gratified to see the fine running, blocking and defensive play of sophomore fullback Jackie Dixon who has been overshadowed by his brother, Pete, a senior. Pete watched most of the game from the bench as the coaches held him out to rest an injured leg in prepadation for the big game next week with the powerful Mt. Vernon Tigers.

## Deer Season Opens Nov. 16 In Most Local Counties

Numerous hunters will take to the woods next week seeking to kill a deer as the season opens Thursday, Nov. 16.

The season in Lamar County will be from Nov. 16 to Nov. 20 inclusive. In Red River and Bowie counties the season is Nov. 16 through Nov. 30, inclusive, except at Red River Arsenal which is extended to Dec. 5. In Franklin, Delta and Hopkins counties the season is Nov. 21 to Nov. 25, both days inclusive. Out of county hunters must register with the county clerk in these counties. Limit is one buck per season.

In Titus County the season is Nov. 16 to Nov. 24, both days inclusive.

Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset. Sale of deer hides are permitted.

Parties are being formed for the season. Many will be hunting in Red River County north-east of Clarksville, where antlerless deer may be killed. Permits for the does were issued the first of the week to applicants who own land in the doe hunting area.

The area designated for doe hunting in Red River County during the 1961 season opening Nov. 16, will be the same as last year.

## Teachers Qualify For Science Institute

Twenty-seven elementary and 37 secondary school teachers from northeast Texas have qualified for enrollment in the National Science Foundation In-Service Institutes, conducted Saturdays at ETSC, Commerce.

Elementary teachers who instruct one or more science classes and secondary teachers of chemistry, earth science, mathematics, or physics were eligible to enroll.

As one of the few schools in this section of the country to provide this type program, East Texas State is offering chemistry and earth science to elementary teachers, and courses in chemistry, earth science, mathematics, and physics to secondary school teachers.

Tuition, allowances for books, and traveling expenses are being paid by the National Science Foundation, which designed these institutes to increase the subject matter competence of secondary school teachers and to increase the ability of elementary teachers to teach physical science in the first through the sixth grades.

Among secondary teachers enrolled are M. L. Barron of Talco and Charles Wardrup of Littleton.

Friends of the family are planning a shower for the family in the basement of Bogata Methodist Church Saturday night.

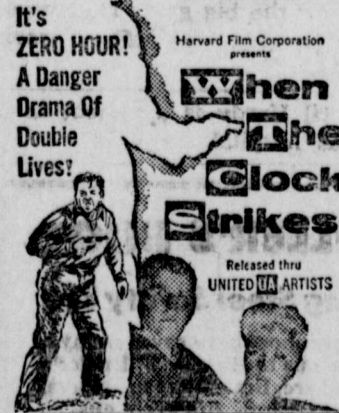

## Alcorn Wonders How Russian School Children Get Along in History Courses

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn Philosopher discusses Russian education this week. Anything to get the spotlight off his education.

Dear Editor: In between all those test bombs the Russians have been setting off recently there was an interesting piece of news out of Russia that I read in a newspaper an insurance salesman left out here—incidentally, I didn't take any of his insurance, on account of we had a disagreement on what extended coverage included; he said it included such things as hail, windstorms, lightning, etc., and I thought it ought to cover Russian fallout too—at any rate, to get on with this particular piece of news.

According to it, the late Stalin's body, which has been kept in a glass tomb in Red Square for Russians to file by in hero worship, has been removed on orders of Khrushchev, who is a candidate for the spot himself later on. Furthermore, the Russians have now been informed that Stalin was a bum.

Now I was just thinking, what sort of a problem does this pre-

sent to Russian school kids? On Friday they took their work with them, with an assignment to memorize the birth and death dates of Stalin and recite at least ten of his many heroic achievements for the People's Democracy. On Monday they were told to turn in their history books, due to a typographical error the books were wrong about Stalin.

I can hear a good Communist teacher telling her pupils: "I just don't know how such an error could creep in, I should have caught it myself, but everybody knows, if he listened to the radio Sunday that Stalin is no hero and never was. What I said about him Friday when I was bragging on him, you will immediately erase from your minds."

I tell you, teaching school in Russia must be a trying job. If everything you learn is going to be subject to change without notice, you might as well play it safe and stay ignorant. The only people who came out on the long end of this latest Russian switch were the Russian school kids who failed to do their home work on that weekend. Yours faithfully A. A.

## Control Program For Screwworms

A 100-million dollar problem is the immediate target of an aroused group of Texans who recently banded together to form the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation. Though its long range goal is the study of all animals health problems, the Foundation's first campaign will be launched against the screwworm, generally considered Public Enemy No. 1, by livestock producers throughout the southwest.

Incorporated as a non-profit organization by the State of Texas, the Foundation will be supported by voluntary contributions and governed by a 15-man board of trustees. Initial board members are Dolph Brisco, Jr., Uvalde; T. A. Kincaid, Jr. Ozona; C. H. Devaney, Coahoma; Marvin Bridges, Buffalo, and C. G. Scruggs, Dallas.

Foundation spokesmen said they would employ the sterile-fly technique so successfully used in Florida and the Southeast where screwworm control now is almost complete.

County agricultural agents and vocational agriculture teachers have taken the lead in preseting details of the screwworm control program to livestock producers in each Texas county. Action committees have been formed in 10 counties and preliminary meetings are underway in many others. Already, more than 70 per cent of the livestock producers in Crockett county have made voluntary contributions totalling \$27,346. Wayne West, chairman of the Crockett county committee, said that many retired ranchmen also had contributed.
