Colorado City Clinches District Crown

Wolves Win By A Foot

Bi-District Opponent Still Undetermined

Like two battleships at sea, Colorado City's Wolves and Coahoma's Bulldogs slugged it out for almost 45 minutes before the Wolves delivered the deciding shot, a 20-yard field goal off the foot of Gary Hulme with 3:04 left in the crucial District 6-AA game to decide the District 6-AA championship.

In winning the game and holding Coahoma scoreless, the Wolves extended their shut-out string to 27

consecutive quarters, going back to the first quarter of the Post game, the last time anyone has managed to score. The Wolves record is now eight wins and one loss, six wins and no losses in district.

By virtue of a 3-0 win over Coahoma and an identical 3-0 win over Stamford, the Wolves clinched the district in the playoffs although they still have a game to play against Winters at home Friday. Win-

ters is in the district cellar as they were defeated 21-0 by Ballinger Friday.

In the bi-district game, possibly to be played Nov. 24, the Wolves probably will get a re-match with Slaton, the only team that has defeated the Wolves this year and the only team that managed to score more than once against the Wolves. That score in the first game of the season was 20-13 with Slaton taking advantage of three

Wolves' fumbles to score on short drives.

Slaton defeated Seminole 27-15 Friday and is the only team in District 5-AA with just one loss in district play. Frenship also had only one loss going into Friday's action but lost to Denver City 21-13. Tahoka won over Post 33-16 but Tahoka has lost two games and they have also lost the services of all-state running back Clifford Bailey who has a broken bone in his back.

Slaton and Tahoka meet Friday and, should Slaton win, they will represent the district against the Wolves. Should they lose, assuming three other teams win, there would be a four-way tie for district among Slaton, Frenship, Tahoka and Seminole.

The Wolves' win over Coahoma Friday was classified by a number of fans as the best high school game they had ever seen. It was an exceptionally well played game by both teams. It was a very physical contest with every member of both teams obviously giving everything they had on every play.

Both teams played what has been called a flex defense, it bent but didn't break. It was Coahoma's first loss of the season and they didn't give it up lightly.

The Wolves showed a lot of class as they drove in to get the field goal. They got the ball on their own 19

after a Bulldog punt. There was only 10:41 left in the game and the Wolves were trailing two penetrations to none. In the event of a 0-0 tie, the number of penetrations, scored when a team gets inside the other team's 20, determines the winner when a play-off berth is at stake.

The Wolves had had the ball only two other times in the second half and neither time were they able to get a first down. It was a must score situation.

Three plays after getting the ball, the Wolves got a critical first down by the slimmest of margins, about a hair. Then Colorado City began to slug its way downfield with runners getting three and four yards a play behind hard charges by the offensive line.

CISD Board

To Meet

The audit report for the 1977-78 school year and the approval of several major school campus projects will be the main items of discussion at the regular monthly meeting of the Colorado School Board Monday at 7 p.m.

Superintendent of Schools Charlie Uselton stated that the projects to be discussed include improvements of the football field, tennis courts, the bus garage and the administration building.

Uselton said that he would also ask the board for a clarification of a current school policy on social events for students.

The board will hear a financial report, a report from the School Tax Assessment Practices Board, a report concerning the Permian Basin School Board meeting and a report from the State Convention on Community Education.

Under category A involving real residential single family, CISD reported \$13,369,119 while the STAPB reported \$24,208,946, marking a difference of 81.08 per cent.

Uselton explained that following the hearing, category A was adjusted to \$20,357,523.

Bales Begin Rolling In

Reports from local gin officials indicated that Mitchell County cotton producers are waiting for the freeze before heading to the gins.

Last year at this time, ginning season was well underway with 27,203 bales ginned and 3,525 bales on the yard.

As of Friday evening, area gins reported 1,082 bales had been ginned with about 54 on the yard.

Area gins reported the following:

- Buford Co-op Gin, 10 bales ginned with none on the yard.
- China Grove Co-op, 23 bales ginned with none on the yard.
- Colorado Gin Company, 27 bales ginned with four on the yard.
- Farmers Gin, 213 bales ginned with none on the yard.
- Loraine Co-op Gin, 398 bales ginned and none on the yard.
- Mitchell County Gin, 130 bales ginned and none on the yard.
- Producers Co-op gin, 255 bales ginned and 50 on the yard.
- Westbrook Gin, 26 bales ginned and none on the yard.

Interest Rates Delay Factory

Increasing interest rates have delayed the possible location here of a mobile home factory.

Colorado City Chamber of Commerce officials Friday received word from the industrial prospect and he stated in a letter that, "I have indicated that I am taking a wait-see attitude until the end of the first quarter of 1979. Should interest rates stabilize or decline and should the mobile home market remain strong, I will then resume my efforts to become established in Texas."

In September and October local officials learned that the company the man owns was interested in locating a mobile home factory here in addition to one he now has in Colorado.

His only doubt was the available labor supply in Mitchell County and the Chamber and Industrial Team went to work surveying the labor force and came up with a list in excess of 500 names of potential employees, many of which were experienced in the mobile home business.

In the letter, the man stated, "I appreciate the efforts of you and your people on the recent survey. The response was gratifying and no doubt a labor pool exists for a mobile home manufacturing plant."

"The current business climate with very high interest rates on mobile homes, does not encourage me to commence operations in Texas immediately."

Loraine To Discuss Police Car

The Loraine City Council will meet in regular session Tuesday to discuss several items, including a police car.

According to Mayor Vance Dickenson, the council will consider whether to have the current police car repaired or to purchase a new car. Loraine's landfill will also be discussed by the council.

The meeting is set to begin at 7:30 p.m. at city hall.

Council Seeks City Manager

Establishment of criteria for hiring a new city manager will highlight Tuesday's regular meeting of the City Council of Colorado City.

Present City Manager James Campbell announced his resignation last week, stating plans to assume a similar position in Corsicana.

Campbell's resignation will be effective Nov. 30. According to Colorado City Mayor Marion Bassham, thus far there has been one applicant for the position.

Mayor Bassham noted that there should be no hurry in the matter since three weeks remain before Campbell is to leave.

"We may have to do without a city manager

until we can find someone who is suitable," she said.

Advertisements have been placed in the *Texas Town and City* and the *Texas Municipal Management Job Bank* publications to seek applicants.

Mayor Pro-Tem Jody Neff explained that the city was following the same procedure to hire a new city manager as has been done in previous times. She added that a screening committee will probably be selected by the council to interview applicants.

The Colorado City Charter, adopted in 1948, states no specific age, education or experience qualifications for the city manager position.

According to the charter the "council shall appoint a city manager who shall be the chief administrative and executive officer of the city and who shall have the powers and perform the duties set forth and provided in the charter."

It further states that "he shall be chosen by the city council solely on the basis of his executive and administrative training, experience and ability and need not, when appointed, be a resident of Colorado City but during his tenure of office shall reside within the city."

"No person who has held an elective office of the city of Colorado City shall be eligible for appointment as city manager within one year of his release from such office, and no councilman shall receive such appointment during the term for which he shall have been elected, nor within one year after the expiration of his term," notes the charter.

Campbell has served as city manager since January 1975 when he moved to Colorado City from Big Spring where he worked as

director of public works.

Besides discussing Campbell's resignation and making plans to hire a new city manager, the council will consider several other matters at Tuesday's meeting.

Slated on the agenda is consideration of a request by the Mitchell County Go-Cart Association for the use of city property and the consideration of a new waste system for the Colorado City Civic Center. In other business, the purchase of lighting equipment for the new airstrip will be discussed.

The meeting will get underway at 7 p.m. at city hall.

STAPB Adjusts District Values

Adjustments of values for the Colorado Independent School District and Loraine Independent School District have been made by the School Tax Assessment Practices Board (STAPB).

Three of the five adjustments sought by the CISD at the STAPB hearings in Austin were granted.

According to Superintendent of Schools Charlie Uselton, "We were satisfied with the outcome."

Nov. 1, CISD Tax Assessor-Collector J. S. Craddock, School Board Vice President S. L. (Mac) Morris and Uselton appeared before the STAPB to appeal property values.

Uselton explained that the STAPB was "born in the last legislative session" and this was the first time for the reports.

Craddock explained that the report by STAPB has

made by a representative who took a sample of six items from the CISD tax rolls to arrive at a figure for the real residential single family category.

The CISD figure--which was \$10,839,827 less than the STAPB figure--was an average of all 72 items on the tax roll.

According to a report by the STAPB, the values were \$225,827,878 while CISD reported \$128,535,003, a difference of \$97,292,875 or 75.69 per cent.

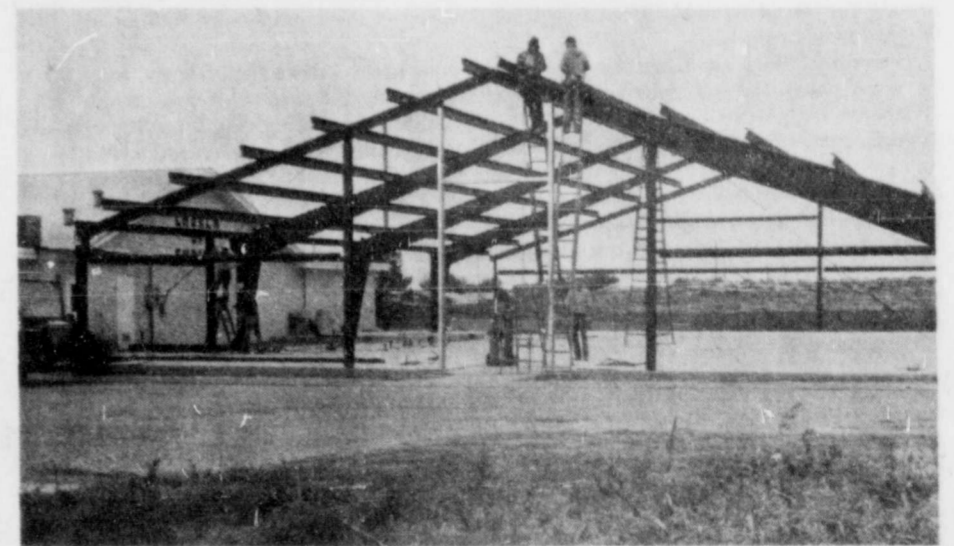
Uselton explained that the values were important because they directly relate to state fund assignments.

"This has nothing to do with local taxes," said Uselton. "It has to do with the allocation of state funds."

Regarding the allocation of state funds, Craddock

trial, CISD reported \$6,002,731 while the STAPB report showed \$6,383,857. Category F was adjusted to \$6,002,731 which was the CISD figure. For category N-intangible personal—the CISD

did not report anything because the school district does not have access to those figures. However, the report by STAPB was \$43,607,206, an increase of 100 per cent. As a result of the hearing, the intangible person-

al category was adjusted to \$43,166,328. Because an adjustment in real residential single family was granted, it affected category M-tangible personal other—and that figure was readjusted. CISD reported \$423,642 for tangible personal other while STAPB reported \$3,631,137. Adjustment was made to \$3,323,023. Although appeals were made in category D (real acreage—land only) and category E (real farms and ranch improvements), no adjustments were made by the STAPB.

LISD met with the STAPB for hearings Oct. 24 to appeal three categories. "We didn't get much adjustment except in our land values," said Superintendent of Schools L. R. Dunn. In category D for real acreage (land only), the figure was adjusted from \$11,205,025 to \$9,966,026. "This adjustment was made primarily because of an acreage difference," said Dunn. "Our report from STAPB indicated a total of 107,000 acres and

our tax office shows a total acreage of 102,000." Other appeals made by the LISD were category E for real farm and ranch improvements and category N for intangible personal. Neither was granted an adjustment. "This will affect the 1979-80 school year," said Dunn. "There's still a lot hinging here."

The tax relief amendment to the constitution which was passed by voters in the general election Tuesday may have an affect on category N of the tax values. According to the amendment, one of the items stated that intangibles would be deleted from the constitutional tax base, allowing the legislature to decide what intangibles will be taxed. If the tax relief amendment passes the legislature, the intangible values will be removed from the values, thereby cutting down the tax values for school districts markedly. Also affecting the school districts as far as the tax relief amendment is concerned is homestead exemptions. According to the amendment, a \$5,000 homestead

Turner, Byrne To Be Honored

Travis Turner of Colorado City and Mrs. Bruce Byrne of Loraine will be honored in San Angelo on Wednesday as a part of the District Diamond Anniversary Celebration of Cooperative Demonstration Work.

Representatives from the 17 county area making up District 7 of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will gather at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at 9:30 a.m.

Addressing the group will be Bill Porter of Terrell, Texas. Porter is the son of Walter C. Porter whose farm was the site for the first demonstration designed to show farmers how to use scientific methods to increase yields and income. Dr. Seaman A. Knapp, a U.S. Department of Agriculture educator and special agent, guided this demonstration in 1903.

Knapp's "teaching by demonstration" idea was highly successful and spread rapidly to other states. The U.S. Congress passed the Smith-Lever Act in 1914, which paved the way for an Extension Service with responsibility for agriculture, home economics, 4-H, and community resource development programs in each state.

Texas legislators subsequently created the State Extension Service as a part of the land-grant university system where it continues to function as a part of the Texas A&M University System.

Mitchell County honorees will be recognized for their all-round contributions and support of their County Extension program.

Turner was selected for his outstanding participation and support of local Extension Activities and Community Development. He has conducted cotton demonstrations on his farm in past years and has participated in the Cotton Post Management Program. Turner and his wife Lucy have served as 4-H adult leaders for five years. He is presently serving as chairman of the Mitchell County Program Building Committee.

Turner has furnished watermelons during the Mitchell County Farm tour for several years and has also served as chairman of the Mitchell County Fair. Mr. and Mrs. Turner have two children Tony and Robin. Tony is the Gold Star Boy for Mitchell County in 1978.

Louell Byrne has supported the local Extension service by participation in many activities and helping with community developments in Mitchell County. She has served as an officer in the Looney Extension Homemakers Club and has been a 4-H leader for 21 years. Mrs. Byrne is the mother of five children, three of which have been 4-H Gold Star winners.

Mrs. Byrne not only lends her support to the local extension service but also to the district and state as it is needed.

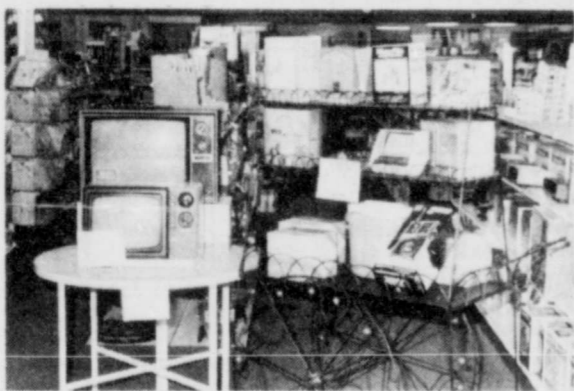

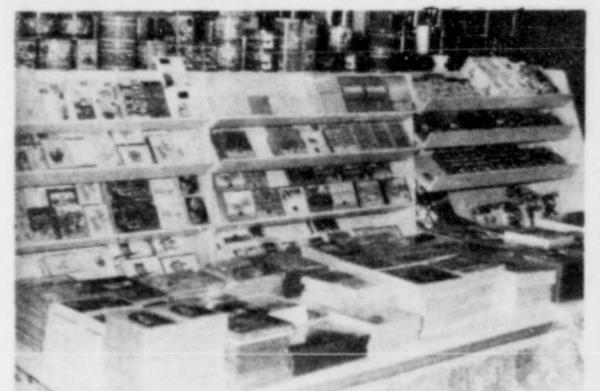

There are times when a person shouldn't diet. People are brought up to believe that in our society every female and male who isn't slim not only wants to diet but should. But going

on a diet is not the answer or the best thing for every overweight person. One particular time when dieting may not be good for you is when you are already coping with

stress brought on by recent changes in your life. Fluctuation in your weight is worse for you than staying that 15% over weight. Fad dieting can and has caused severe

medical problems. Such can be seen in the very recent fad of liquid protein dieting. If you are overweight then food may mean more to you than just fuel for

your engine. It may likely be a source of pleasure usually an escape when your life isn't going too well. Depriving yourself of food or dieting can result in depression. Therefore a combination of stress and dieting may deepen your depression into unhappiness.

Food frequently functions as a tranquilizer to some. So before going on a diet ask yourself what you actually expect. Be realistic about your expectations. Dieting won't make you perfect or give you a perfect life but after carefully thinking it through then consult a doctor and give it a try.

Choose a well balanced diet which supplies the body with nutrients needed to promote growth, repair damage and help the body function to full capacity. Remember every decade past your 13th birthday your calorie intake requirement drops by 10%. Multiply your present weight by 15 and subtract the two to determine the calories you must cut per day to attain the weight you want. If you eat more than your body burns as fuel it will be stored in the form of fat.

Remember these points, one-make the right decision as to your most expendable calories. Two, water retention may result and cause no immediate show of weight loss. Three, figure the reason behind your snacking and eliminate your problems. Intermediate exercises are bend and twist, airplane, high to low.

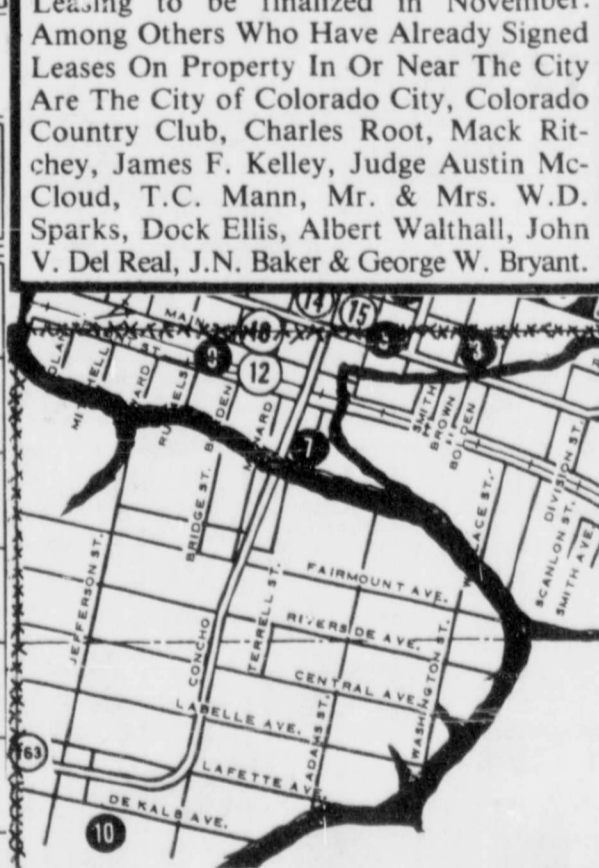
Cash awards totaling \$3,890 went to contest winners, adult poets winning \$3,565 and student poets \$325.

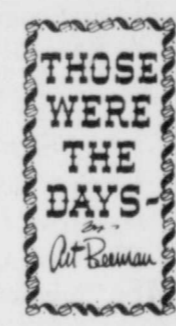

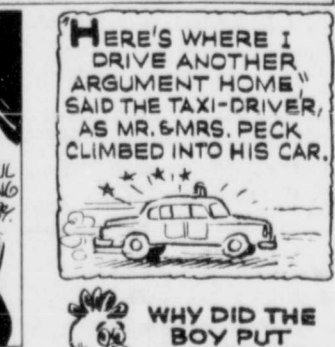

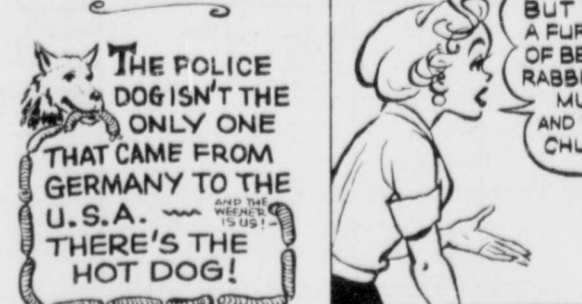

cepted two passes on Coahoma's next two possessions, one interception at the Wolves 39 and one at the Wolves 34.

Coahoma was unable to get inside Wolf territory in the second half except for one time when they barely got inside the 50.

The game went exactly as it was billed, a defensive struggle with two errors stopping Coahoma on would-be scoring drives, one a five yard penalty at the Wolves 18 and another was a fumble at the Wolves 16 recovered by Colorado City's Jim Shoemaker.

The Coahoma coaches apparently sensed the importance of any kind of score and attempted a 42-yard field goal after the drive was stopped on the five yard penalty but it was short and wide of the mark.

Another important aspect of the contest was the punting and kick coverage by both teams. Both teams stayed on their own end of the field all night because of long punts and good coverage.

The Wolves got the kickoff at their own 19 and after getting one first down, punted. Coahoma was held without a first down and kicked back to the Wolves who got it at their own 21. The Wolves mounted a drive and got to the Coahoma 22, only one of two times in the game the Wolves had serious threats to score.

Coahoma got one first down and kicked back to the Wolves. The Wolves couldn't move and a 61-yard punt by the Wolves Jay Feaster put the Bulldogs on their own 20. From there, they drove to the Wolves 19, got backed up to the 24 and attempted the 42 yard field goal which was no good.

The Wolves got the ball and after getting one first down, had to punt. Coahoma started from their own 19 and drove to the Wolves 16 before fumbling just as the half ended.

Neither team could move the ball in the third quarter. It seemed that the Wolves defense finally had the number of Coahoma's runners. For example, the Bulldogs' Ronald Sundry had 80 yards on eight carries in the first half but in the second half, he had a -6 yards on nine carries.

Coahoma consumed the clock in the third quarter and the first part of the fourth quarter on short gains in two drives picking up two first downs each time. The Wolves went without gaining a first down in the third quarter.

Then with 10:41 left in the contest, the Wolves got the ball and started the drive that resulted in the

field goal. It is unknown at this time, but the win probably gave Colorado City their first back to back district championship.

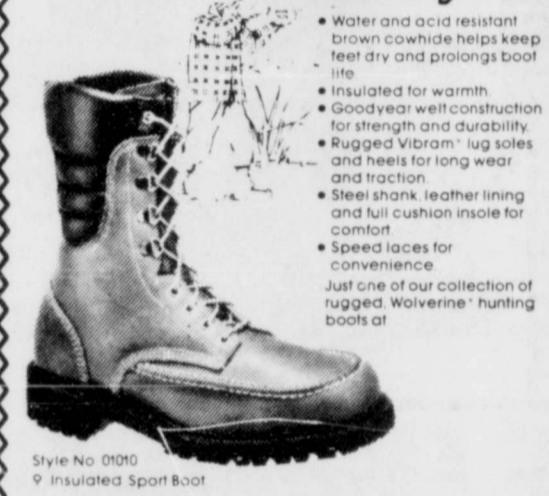

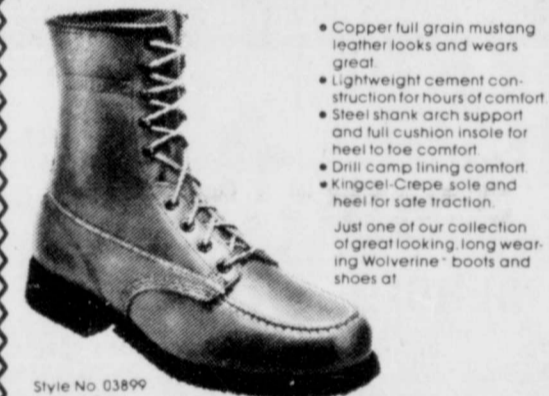
