He received training at Camp Callan and Ontario, Cal., Las Cruces, N. M., Camp Swift and Camp Barkeley, in Texas. He left the states early this year.

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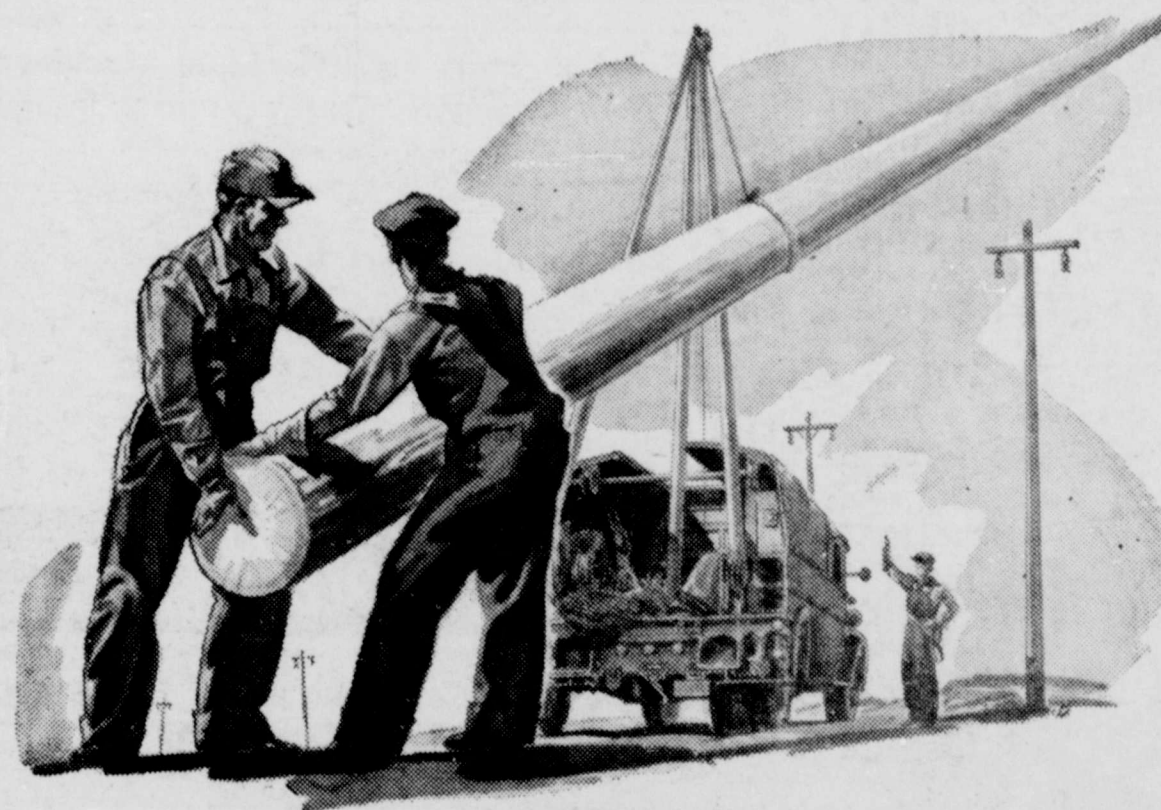

Inside Germany, Feb. 12, 1945.
Dear Buford: I guess it's just about time I was trying to drop you a few lines to let you know that I enjoy the Review very much. And, I also want to thank the people who are responsible for getting it to us boys . . . I missed quite a few copies for about the first six months I was in combat. But, I really enjoyed the ones I did get . . . I'm doing just fine, except for a few close shaves I've had in the past few weeks. I got caught in some Jerry machine gun and artillery fire one day and got a bullet through my pack and a piece of shrapnel hit me on the leg, but failed to penetrate the skin. I guess I can consider myself lucky and thank the Lord that I'm still around to tell about things like that . . . Once a couple of my copies of the Review didn't show up, so, in a few days we made a push and fought our way into a town that had been taken by the Jerries in their counter offensive. A couple of our boys set up a forward o. p. overlooking the Jerry lines, in the second floor of a house. While I was setting up the telescope, one of the boys, (I'll call him Leroy F. Thompson of St. Louis, Mo.) was looking thru a bag of mail that had been left behind by someone when we withdrew from the place about a month ago. In it was the two copies of the Review. How they stayed there that long, without being touched, beats me . . . I saw Cyril Webb a couple of days ago and he was doing just fine. He seems to be getting fat . . . It must be from laying around too much. Or, maybe he's eating too much fresh steak from these German cows, I don't know which . . . Jerry must be mad. He is throwing in a few rounds of artillery now, so maybe it would be a good idea for me to cut this short and find myself a hole . . . Well, Buford, have they reclassified any of those 4-F's yet? may need some of them to help us if this thing lasts much longer, end it . . . This is about all for today. You keep the papers coming—and we will end the war as fast as we can. Say hello to everyone for me. Sincerely, Pfc. Carl E. Shipman.

Dear Buford: I am leaving Camp Fannin next Monday, Mar. 5, and will go to Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo. Can't tell yet just how long I'll be there. I wish you would save my papers, and as soon as the army lets me stop long enough, I'll send you my address . . . I have really appreciated the paper and want to thank everyone who has made it possible for all of us in the service to get the news from our home town . . . I would like to see everyone at Abernathy, but don't have time. They gave me a three-day pass to come home and it takes almost 40 hours on a bus to make the trip from Tyler to Amarillo and return. Always, Sgt. J. P. Daniel.
