GREATER PORTALES BEGINS TO BUILD!

The Two Largest Dry Goods Firms in all This Section Begin the Erection of Mammoth Modern Store Houses---These Buildings Will Be A Boost For Any Town in Southwest.

New Buildings To Be Erected.

Warren-Fooshee & Co. Have Let the Contract for Two Modern Brick Store Houses--The Work Has Already Begun.

Some ten days ago the contract was signed up between the Warren-Fooshee & Co., dry goods merchants and contractor W. H. Snell of this city for the erection of a handsome modern brick store house for Warren-Fooshee & Co., to cover sight of old building recently destroyed by fire. The contract calls for two buildings, the one 30x100 feet, with 18 feet ceiling and the other 20x100 feet with 16 feet ceiling, both to have all equipments of modern store buildings. The materials have been ordered and are on the way. The rubbish has all been removed and the new buildings, along with the new Portales, will begin to rise out of the ashes of the old within some fifteen or twenty days; though the foundation work is going in as we go to press and the substantial fire-proof ware house located in the rear of the new building sites have been completed some weeks since.

PORTALES IS ON THE LINE

THE TUCUMCARI-PORTALES AND GULF RAILROAD--TO BE THE NEXT ROAD--PLANS ARE ALREADY BEING MADE.

Engineers are in the field locating the first section of 22 miles from Pyote to Duval in Winkler county. We would like to know what inducements could be offered by your city to this road so that we may enter your city as soon as we learn your pleasure in this matter. We will be pleased to submit our proposition and plan in detail.

ROSWELL'S NO LICENSE CAMPAIGN.

Many of our readers know that Roswell has tried and tried under the very best conditions the proposition of high license and strict regulation of the whiskey traffic now being advocated by some of the Portales citizenship. It should also be known how this high license proposition has worked under these favorable conditions. Here are some of the splendid (?) results which have been obtained at Roswell:

1. The sale of practically the same amount of whiskey, only it has been worse whiskey, adulterated and poisoned in every conceivable way, so that the patrons have, after all, paid the high license.

2. The law has been violated in every conceivable way, under the high license regime, as it was before high license and as it always will be wherever a saloon exists. The boys at the Military Institute have been systematically drugged with the poisoned concoctions; harlots have been maintained in connection with the infernal business and sent from one hotel to another as they were chased by the officers of the law; and the same quota of gamblers have been doing business in the same old way at Roswell.

3. The same political corruptions have been inaugurated and carried on with the same degree of success under high license at Roswell as before. It is even said that some of the grand jurors meeting in Roswell while the high license well regulated saloons were running full blast, had no trouble in finding a gambling den also running full blast. Moreover they found this such an attractive den that they concluded to fall in with the gamblers and spend their evening with them. Unhappily some of the other officers of the law did not think it looked very well for men to sit on the grand jury in the day time and sit with the poker players at night.

4. The high licensed system at Roswell has been the prime cause of at least three suicides, one murder, four fifths of all other crimes in the town, and acted an avicious vampire sucking the life blood out of the social, political, moral and economic life of town.

Does Portales want to try taming and regulating and putting a high license on this old rusty copperhead snake? We may do it; but Roswell has enough. After strict trial they have come to believe that a snake is a snake, no matter what color, and that you can come as near regulating a rattle snake 100 years old as you can a saloon that old.

At a monster meeting at the Armory in Roswell last Sunday night the campaign for the abolition of the saloons in Roswell was definitely launched. Judge Wm. H. Pope delivered the main address, a summary of which we clip from the Daily Record, as follows:

There are two dry towns near Roswell, Portales and Artesia. Taking up Portales the speaker told of what he knew personally of the effect of No License there. Portales has been without saloons for about one year. Previous to this, at the last two terms of court before the adoption of the No License policy, there were many criminal cases coming from Portales. At the first term out of 25 cases in Roosevelt county, 14 came from Portales. At the next term of court, the last before the closing of the saloons, there were 15 cases in the county, ten of which came from Portales, more than half from Portales in each case. Two terms have been held since the adoption of the No License law, at the first term of which two cases came from Portales, and at the last term only one case. Thus the closing of the saloons in Portales had cut down crime to almost nothing.

Is Portales a dead town? For several years it has been very dry in that locality, this naturally having its effect on the town of Portales. Yet despite this the town is investing \$20,000 in a water and sewer plant, and is engaged in the prosecution of a

pumping plant to finally cost a half million dollars. Joyce-Pruit Company of Roswell had just gone into Portales and has installed a large store there, and he would like to know if these enterprising Roswell merchants were going to do that in a dead town. No, Portales was a long way from a dead town.

Then taking up the case of Artesia the Justice gave some concrete hard facts, which effectually demolished the "dead town" argument. Artesia was one of the liveliest towns in the Pecos Valley. It had built a college costing many thousands of dollars, with comfortable and substantial buildings; Joyce-Pruit Company had branched out there extensively and greatly enlarged their store and they were not doing this in a dead town.

Before No License went into effect in Artesia, E. H. Hardwick had stated that it would kill the town, but it went through nevertheless. Now Mr. Hardwick is building an elegant new hotel and business block, costing many thousands of dollars. This hotel would be one of the best in New Mexico, with a telephone in every room, and he did not believe Mr. Hardwick was investing his thousands in what he considered a dead town. No the absence of saloons had not hurt Artesia, rather the contrary.

In one term of court in Carlsbad, the cost of the court was \$1500. He had investigated the cases causing this and had found that those caused by the saloons had cost over \$3,000 of this amount. Saloons did not pay Carlsbad.

Judge Pope has held a term of court in Portales. The case consuming the greatest length of time, three days and three nights, originated in a saloon at LaLande, the saloon bar-keeper being an active participant.

In Portales the jail has now but one occupant. Has that ever occurred in Roswell?

From a business standpoint the closing of the saloons in Roswell would be a good thing. It would help business and furthermore it would not add to the taxes, rather the contrary. The speaker made the assertion that the license money collected in this city every year did not equal the costs of the cases caused by the saloons. The saloons were conducted at a loss to the community. But aside from that he would far rather have his taxes increased than to permit this iniquitous trade to continue.

In closing he said that 1910 years ago in the morning, Christ went to the temple and found it occupied by money-changers. He

did not ask that the license be increased, so that more revenue be obtained; he did not ask that they occupy another portion of the building, and he did not ask that they use it at another time. No, he took a whip and drove them from the building. So in this case. The people of Roswell should not ask that the saloon license be increased or that other regulations be made, but should appear at the polls on the fifth day of April and drive them out with their votes, and he believed that this they would do.

THE FUTURE FARMER OF THE PORTALES VALLEY.

Department of Agriculture enumerating the list of bulletins for the month of February this year. In a hasty glance over this list, we could not but feel grateful to a parental government for what is being done for the farming class of our land. And all of these books are to be had absolutely for nothing. The Herald might publish for years articles of help to farmers and not begin to touch the information that the government has gotten together and spent millions of dollars to obtain, information which not only every farmer can have for the asking, but to which he is entitled as well. THE STATEHOOD BILL AMENDMENTS.

Washington, D. C., March 11. The senate committee on territories today voted unanimously to report the statehood bill to the senate with a favorable recommendation.

The amendments that have been adopted will permit all citizens who have resided in the territories a year or more to vote for the ratification of the constitution of the proposed states.

Another important amendment sets aside a million acres of public land in each territory for the payment of county bonds, which have been specifically validated by acts of congress. The bill cannot be taken up in the senate until after the disposition of the administration railroad bill.

The land qualifications in the amended bill remain as in the house bill introduced by Hamilton for educational, charitable and penal institutions. For the payment of the bonds and interest of Santa Fe Grant, Pinal and Yavapai counties, 100,000 acres is allowed, Arizona being granted a like amount.

The bill prohibits liquor on the Indian reservations for a period of 25 years.

No election shall be held to change the capital of either state until 1925.

In addition to the foregoing changes, Committee Barsum gives out the information that "the provisions for the regular election in 1910, for territorial and county officers, which would have brought four general elections within a period of twelve months, have been eliminated and under the bill as it now stands, officers elected in 1908 will hold over until the completion of the state government, while there will be no legislature in 1911."

CIVIC PROBLEMS IN WASHINGTON.

After living in prohibition territory for several years it was natural for me to notice the contrast between prohibition territory and where saloons are open all day and most of the night. I see as much drunkenness here almost any week as I saw in Georgia for years. Not only men, but women and children drink. In my immediate community within the past few days, two men and one woman have died from falling downstairs while intoxicated. It was my sad lot to conduct two of the funerals. Give me prohibition every time.

It will be surprising to many of your readers to know we have scarcely any Sunday law in the District. The saloons and pool rooms are supposed to be closed on Sunday, but the electric theatres, stores, shops and building enterprises go on if they want to.

The District is governed by Congress. Those who live in the District have no vote. We are wards of the government like the Indians and Philipinos. Hence it is hard to get proper laws passed. Yesterday I talked with a congressman and told him the deplorable state of affairs. Although he has been a member of Congress sixteen years, and has lived here a good portion of that time, yet he did not even know that we have no Sunday law. The Sabbath rest bill recently passed the Senate and is now with the House. If any reader will bring his influence to bear upon his congressman in behalf of this bill he will serve a good cause and receive the thanks of the good people of Washington.—Baptist World.

D. PORTER GAINES MAKES MARK.

Some of our readers will doubtless recall young D. Porter Gaines of Kentucky who once kept books in the First National bank, this city. While here a great change of character and life came over him. He surrendered himself to preach, but did not see the way to get to college and prepare himself. Some months later, however, his father decided to move to Georgetown, Ken and get his children in the University there. This gave D. Porter Gaines his opportunity. He gave up his place in the bank, being succeeded by Geo. Tharp, and entered Georgetown College first of last year. And now comes the news that he has won the honors of a Rhodes Scholarship in Oxford, England, an honor attained by few young men. Louisville Courier Journal says:

President Arthur Yager of Georgetown College, who is chairman of the Rhodes Scholarship Committee for Kentucky, has received from Oxford the official report of the examinations for the Rhodes Scholarship held October 19 and 20. The following young men have successfully passed the examination and are qualified to enter for the scholarship:

Allen Barnett, Broadhead Davis, Porter Gaines, of Georgetown, Thos. H. Jones of Switzer. They are all students of Georgetown College. These were the only applicants who passed successfully the examination. A meeting of the committee for the election of the Rhodes Scholarship will be called in about a fortnight.

NECESSITIES VS. LIQUOR.

A table has been prepared, based on the government statistics, which shows how the expenditure of one billion dollars for the twenty necessities of life, such

as breadstuffs, boots, shoes, cotton goods, hats, meat, clothing, furniture, etc., is divided with "raw materials" and labor. We cannot give the entire table, we do give its footings:

Total 20 necessities. Retail value, \$1,000,000,000; to raw material, \$499,209,264; men employed to produce, 1,619,586.

Total liquor. Retail value, \$1,000,000,000; to raw material, \$98,640,650; men employed, 302,457.

Showing the credit of necessities, in raw material, \$400,568,614 and 1,347,129 men employed.

That is to say, if the billion dollars spent for liquor were spent for the twenty necessities, it would mean that \$400,568,614 would go into the development of the raw material, and 1,347,129 more men would be employed. And yet gentlemen high up in finance are claiming that to send this \$400,568,614 out to furnish employment to all who work in breweries, saloons, as bartenders in clubs, etc., and then to employ 1,347,129 persons besides, would mean hard times. In what text book of banking was that kind of logic learned? It is nonsense. Exchange.
