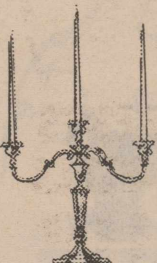

Energas Company, a division of Pioneer Corporation, hereby gives notice of its intent to implement new rates for domestic and commercial type, small industrial and large air conditioning/electric generating customer classes residing in the unincorporated areas (environs) of its West Texas System. It is anticipated that the new rates will result in a 1.6% increase in Energas' gross revenues, which increase is not a "major change" as defined in Section 43(b) of Article 1446c, V.A.T.C.S.
