Senate Votes 63 to 23 For Outright Repeal

PEEPING THRU THE KNOTHOLE with BILL MAYES

Today, in talking with several about the attempted assassination of President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt, we mentioned that every so often some crank took a shot at a president, sometimes killing him and sometimes missing. We pointed out that Lincoln, Garfield and McKinley were killed and that Theodore Roosevelt was once shot by a fanatic, but not killed.

Every time we made the statement it was denied. Maybe we are wrong and our memory is serving us badly, but we seem to remember reading, once upon a time, that while visiting in Chicago Theodore Roosevelt was shot in the chest, the bullet being removed by doctors, who said that had it not been for his remarkable physique he would probably have been killed.

After our statement was denied or doubted several times our faith in our memory began to be shaken.

Yesterday afternoon we went out to Morton Valley with Ben Whitehouse for the purpose of asking a date between Ranger and Morton Valley, not a date for an athletic contest but a social engagement.

We interviewed Superintendent Smith and tentatively agreed on the night of March 2 for the first entertainment program to be sponsored by the merchants and citizens of Ranger at the rural communities.

These entertainments are to be furnished by the merchants and will be put on at each of the nearby rural communities. There was a demand at Morton Valley for the American Legion Tickville band, so it is up to the entertainment committee to do all they can to get that organization to assist in the first program.

A pie supper or something of the kind will be put on by the school, so that for a small outlay the visitor from Ranger will be able to get good, home-made pie, milk, ice cream or whatever is appropriate under the weather conditions that prevail at the time. Morton valley would appreciate an entertainment feature of that kind, which would allow the merchants of the city to get better acquainted with the people of that community.

After leaving Morton Valley we went to Colony, where the same proposition was placed before Superintendent Cooksey. He agreed on a tentative date for March 31, and both he and Smith agreed to work up a good crowd from their respective communities. A friendly mingling between the people of Ranger and their neighbors in the rural sections should be a great boon to a more friendly relation between the people who live in Ranger and those who trade in the city, and plans of this kind are expected to work out for the mutual benefit of all concerned.

Ben Whitehouse is figuring on putting on night agricultural classes at both Morton Valley and Colony and tentative plans for these classes were also laid. Both Cooksey and Smith were willing and eager to join in getting a crowd for both the night classes and for the entertainment features.

Similar plans are to be worked out for other communities so that a program can be presented every two weeks, each community near by being visited. Last year a similar program was put on at Colony after the night classes were completed, and a large number of Ranger people attended. When it was all over everyone was enthusiastic over the meeting and were anxious to go to the next one. Needs of the community of the kind, but it is possible that a more or less permanent thing can be made of the plan, so that it will provide entertainment for both the people of Ranger and the people of the rural communities.

ZANGARA IS CHARGED IN ASSAULT CASE

MIAMI, Feb. 16.—Complaints charging assault and attempt to commit murder on four counts were filed late today against Giuseppe Zangara, who attempted to assassinate President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt last night.

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 16.—President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt, saved from an assassin's bullet by the heroism of a woman, departed for New York today leaving behind him dangerously wounded, his friend, Mayor Anton Cermak of Chicago.

Mr. Roosevelt's last act before leaving was to visit the hospital and comfort Cermak and four other victims of last night's attempted assassination.

For five minutes he remained with the mayor and then, in turn, visited Mrs. J. H. Gill, also dangerously wounded, and Miss Margaret Kruis of Newark, N. J., William Sinnott, New York, and Russell Caldwell of Florida, less seriously wounded.

Meanwhile police questioned Giuseppe Zangara, anarchist, who blamed "the rich and powerful" for the impulse that led him to fire a volley of six shots at the President and his party last night. Zangara was held on the city scraper city hall, safe from mob anger.

Mr. Roosevelt arrived here aboard a yacht at 7 p. m., yesterday, after a 10-day cruise of southern waters. Jovial and appearing fit in every way, he received newspapermen to discuss his trip and conferred briefly with intimate advisers.

Then he left the yacht to accept the formal welcome of Miami officials. A crowd of thousands waited to cheer him.

Mr. Roosevelt spoke briefly from the rear of an open automobile. As he concluded and the crowd broke into cheers, Mr. Roosevelt leaned over and shook hands with Mayor Cermak who was standing on the running board of the car. Then the President-elect got down and, at that moment six shots spread panic through the throng.

From stories of eye witnesses, it appeared that just as he concluded speaking, Zangara, who had been standing, stooped, suddenly straightened up and pulled a pistol from his pocket. Someone near him screamed. Mrs. M. J. Cross of Miami, standing beside him, saw the gun and tried to grasp it. Zangara stood upon a chair. Mrs. Cross leaped for his gun hand. Zangara fired. Mayor Cermak fell to his knees. A secret service man leaped to protect Mr. Roosevelt. The driver of the car slipped the machine into gear and started away.

Mr. Roosevelt waved his hand to show he was unhurt, but stopped the automobile and carried the major to a hospital.

Detectives and secret service men leaped upon Zangara as he stood with the still-hot gun in his hand. The crowd surged around. There were cries of "lynch him." Officers surrounded Zangara and led him to an automobile. They hurried to the jail, two officers holding him on the trunk rack of the car.

"I'm glad it was me, not you," Mayor Cermak later told Mr. Roosevelt. "I wish you would be careful! The country needs you badly. You shouldn't take any more chances as you took to-night."

Boy Scout Drive Planned in Ranger

The executive board of Boy Scouts for Ranger met in the office of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce Wednesday to discuss plans for the coming year.

It was decided that the annual drive for funds for scouting in Ranger would be begun on Monday morning, Feb. 27.

H. C. "Andy" Anderson was selected as chairman of the drive and he will appoint the members of the solicitation committee, which will be announced later.

Guy Quire, scout executive of the Comanche trail council, has announced that Ranger's quota for the year has been set at \$325, which will be enough to pay for the scouting work in Ranger until January, 1934.

Times Routes Are Established In 2 Other Towns

The circulation drive of the Ranger Times has been meeting with signal success in the past week, with two new routes added and the number of subscribers on a third more than doubled.

Carrier boys have been hired in Thurber and Strawn for the purpose of delivering papers in these two towns daily. At Thurber Garland Black has been hired for this purpose and he is turning in new names to go on the circulation list daily. At Strawn Joline Gibson has been secured for a similar position and is taking care of the distribution of papers in that town. Anyone can secure the Times in these two towns by seeing the local representatives.

At Olden, where a rout has been maintained for some time, G. W. Curry has more than doubled the number of daily subscribers, so that the Times is reaching a larger number of readers in Olden each day than ever before.

Subscribers in Ranger and in the outlying communities have been coming in regularly since the price was reduced to 10 cents a week, and the list is growing more rapidly than was anticipated.

She is the former Miss Mabel Jenkins and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Jenkins. Gill was formerly assistant general manager of the Dallas Power & Light company. His brother, Murray Gill, lived in Breckenridge and Eastland before moving east four years ago.

MEASURE GOES TO HOUSE FOR VOTE MONDAY

Garner Says Enough Votes Have Been Secured To Pass Measure.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The Senate today voted to repeal the 18th Amendment.

The vote was 63 to 23. A two-thirds vote is required for submission for a constitutional amendment to the states.

The issue now goes to the House, where Speaker Garner, planning to bring it to a test Monday, insists he has sufficient votes for passage.

Garner said that the Blaine resolution as amended last night is perfectly satisfactory to Democratic House leaders.

"By that I mean," he said, "It is outright repeal of the 18th Amendment, with ratification by state conventions."

Secret Service Is Redoubling Guard

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The secret service today redoubled protection of President Hoover and President-elect Roosevelt.

Senators suggested elaborate outdoor inauguration ceremonies on March 4 be cancelled for the safety of Mr. Roosevelt.

Members of the inaugural committee said there would be no change in arrangements. President Hoover issued a statement denouncing the attempted attack as a "dastardly act" and rejoining over the safety of the man to whom he will surrender the country's highest office in just 16 days.

Professor Cooksey, superintendent of the Colony school, has announced that the school will present a play on Friday night of this week. The play will be presented in the school auditorium and the curtain will rise at 7:30.

"An Old-Fashioned Mother" is the title of the play to be produced and presented by the pupils of the school. The public is invited to attend.

SWAGER SHERLEY AND HIS CAREER

Swager Sherley of Louisville and Washington is in the picture. He has been selected by President-elect Roosevelt to wield the ax in cutting out useless bureaus and getting rid of employees not vital to the conduct of the government. Carter Fields, a well known Washington correspondent, writes that in selecting Sherley for the job the president-elect "has set the former Kentucky congressman on the road to a new sort of unpopularity."

Sherley is an intellectual of first grade. He is a lawyer and an income tax expert. He served several terms as congressional representative of the Louisville district.

We C. Barrickman of Austin writes The Austin American that he is a kinsman of the Kentucky lawyer and statesman. Indeed, Sherley and Barrickman are lineal descendants of James Shirley of Virginia, who for services in the revolution was granted large tracts of land in Kentucky, then a part of Virginia. When Swager's great grandfather, Lewis, removed from Virginia to Kentucky, for the purpose, he said, according to family traditions, of identifying his posterity as his lineal descendants, he changed the spelling of the name to Sherley. All the descendants of James Shirley followed the original spelling. Thomas Sherley of Louisville, distiller of the celebrated old Sherley Bourbon whisky of pre-Volstead days, was Swager Sherley's father. Swager served as congressman for several terms, and was regarded as an able statesman. He resigned this position to become identified with the Charles N. Schwab interests as an adviser in income tax matters. He was a personal friend of Nick and Alice Longworth and as a congressman was a member of that group on a visit to the Philippines. His Texas kinsman places this in the record: "President-elect Roosevelt could do much worse than to select Swager for a part in his administration."

Now, according to Carter Fields, the Kentuckian has been selected by his old time friend, Franklin D., to wield the broad ax in cutting out useless bureaus and abolishing jobs "in the reorganization of the government so as to save the taxpayers' money." Indeed, Fields pays this tribute to Sherley: "For Roosevelt knew this man knows the bureaucrats forward and backward from his experience on the appropriations committee, and furthermore, was a man who could not be influenced by personal interest." Is it possible?

UNUSED OPPORTUNITY

Farmers in the last legislature provided a way for the purchase of long-staple fine-grade cotton seed from the prison system at no greater cost than ordinary seed.

Their farm constituency failed to take advantage of the law, and the high-quality cottonseed of the prison system was ground for oil and meal, except what was kept for replanting prison farms.

County officials, farm leaders or business men interested in advancing a county's welfare, just as well as farmers, could have sponsored the buying of carload quantities of prison farm cotton seed under the Giles-Tarwater law. But they didn't. You can't help people by law unless they want to help themselves.

UNFAIR TO THE TAXPAYERS

Texas has many counties and areas in which the state taxes are collected from citizens but turned over to the county to pay off bonds for reconstruction work, flood control and the like.

The homestead exemption amendment requires taxpayers in such areas to keep on paying taxes until the exemption period ends. In most cases that will be a long time.

Rep. McKee of Jefferson county has offered a new amendment to extend equal benefits to taxpayers of the coastal and other exempted areas. If it is just to the taxpayers of one county to exempt them from taxes, it cannot be just to deny those of another section, just because the governmental agencies have been able to get the tax proceeds.

THERE MUST BE ROOM AT THE TOP

J. J. Bernet of Cleveland, Ohio, started out to be a blacksmith. On the eve of his 65th birthday he was elected president of three important rail lines. This important personage who started out to be a blacksmith did not subscribe to the theory that "the world owes every man a living."

He hoed his own row and created his own opportunities. He has been the right hand man of the Van Swearingen brothers since they began to build their railroad empire in 1916. WASHINGTON BEHIND THE SCENES IN

WASHINGTON.—Budget balancing, temporarily, seems to be just a form of monkey business.

Those of us who predicted that this session of Congress would come nowhere near balancing the budget may have hoped to be disappointed when Mr. Roosevelt called his impressive New York conference with Democratic congressional leaders. But the prediction stands, more emphatically than before.

It appears that Roosevelt hadn't any revenue-economy program to put up to the leaders, as they expected, and that the leaders hadn't any program to put up to him, as he doubtless expected. So they just talked. And issued a statement, part of which obviously didn't mean anything, and the rest of whose meaning is a matter of dispute. For prospect of action we wait, as usual, for the special session of the next Congress.

THE declaration in New York for an income tax boost which would also lower exemptions so as to take in a couple of millions of persons in the small-income class was accompanied by differing estimates of the return and followed by so much disagreement in individual statements that no one can be quite sure whether the Democrats really meant it or were only fooling.

Adding a couple of million small-salaried folks to the tax list is at least as politically dangerous as a sales tax and the Democratic leaders are a group of smart politicians, from Roosevelt down the line.

Everyone has had a chance to get sore at the proposal. The small-salaried people and the progressives are sore because it hits at a class already hard hit by income reductions and other depression misfortunes. And sore, too, are the conservatives who want some action on a sales tax and the proposed large cut in veterans' expenditures—two highly important measures which are said not to have been mentioned.

One recalls, also rather sourly, that the House leaders recently went into a huddle among themselves and then announced that they were seriously considering a sales tax. Everyone supposed they had consulted Roosevelt about it, but Roosevelt promptly let it be known that he was "horridly" and that was the end of that.

ADDED to the other surprising aspects of the budget balancing whiffing among the Democrats is the fact that everyone admits the impossibility of passing the income tax boost at this session even if the leaders seriously tried to put it over. Naturally, that begets speculation as to whether they didn't have some hidden motive—such as a propaganda for the sales tax, the beer tax or the Democrats.

Meanwhile, no major taxes or economies have been agreed upon, and it is doubtful whether any intelligent, well-considered program of taxation and economy can be worked out at a special session before the beginning of the next fiscal year in July.

WILLIAM SOUTHERN, JR., Publisher of the Independence (Mo.) Examiner, says:

"If you for any reason suddenly found your community without a newspaper there would be a big mass meeting sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, methods would be adopted to induce somebody to start a paper, probably a bonus would be offered and advertising contracts promised. Every community wants a newspaper of its own, a paper which is the only paper published in the world that cares a darn for that particular community."

"This means that a newspaper is considered an asset to any community. It means that a community without a newspaper is not much of a community."

"Did you ever stop to think that in order to be of greatest value to its community a newspaper must be prosperous; that it must earn by legitimate support from subscribers and advertisers a sufficient amount to be able to put out a paper worthwhile? That the better supported your home paper is the more value it is to the community and the more able it is to do real things?"

"Did you ever stop to think that every dollar you spend on hand bills, which are of no value as advertising and which are deemed a nuisance by the housewives, you take away from the legitimate newspaper and make it harder for that paper to be of its finest service? Did you ever think that the advertising money given to free papers and hand bills, which are of no value to your community, weakens your home paper just that much and is a knock on your town?"

"The better a community supports its newspaper, the better able is that paper to support the community."

Whatever the real situation or whatever the possibilities may be, there is no question but that the Economy propaganda as set before us by organized minorities has brought on such a state of nervousness among the people that it has effected business in a bad way.

Mound Builders Mecca Is Found

WICKLIFFE, Ky.—The mecca, shrine, of people that preceded the Indians to America, has been discovered by archaeologists on a high bluff overlooking the junction of the Ohio and Mississippi rivers here.

Excavations being conducted under the direction of Fain W. Ling, for 30 years one of America's foremost amateur archaeologists, already have resulted in discovery of three temples, to which were early inhabitants of America brought offerings from hundreds of miles.

At the base of these temples were found marine shells from the Gulf of Mexico; flake mica from the Carolinas; copper coated ornaments from the Northwest; lead from the Joplin, Mo., district; and a small piece of iron from the Rosicler district of the Ohio River and hematite of iron ore from the Cumberland River district.

The mounds cover an area of more than 25 acres, indicating, archaeologists say, not only that there was located the mecca of the mound builders, but that one of the metropolises of their civilization.

Estimates of the time the city flourished range from 3,000 to 5,000 years ago. It probably was inhabited for at least 1,000 years. About these temples, of which it is estimated there are 140, also are located the burial grounds of the mound builders.

The excavations have revealed two distinct types of architecture, one of the most common is the one, or extended type, which are made with the flesh on the inside. Another is the "bundled" type, in which the flesh had been removed from the bones at one point and the bones placed in the mound. The third type of mound contains the ashes of the cremated dead.

Unexpected Leap Set Ski Record

BERLIN.—Take-off facilities for ski jumping constantly are being improved and ever longer jumps are possible. A few years ago, a jump of 60 meters would have won first place in any international competition. Now it is not to place with anything under 100 meters, and new take-off facilities are constructed with the aid of experts in aerial dynamics who have said to make possible jumps close to the 100 meter mark.

Yet modern champions will reach to jump a great deal farther. On Feb. 19, 1931, he was the first to jump 100 meters, established on Feb. 19, 1931, by a Fifth Battalion of Prussian Guards, at Hirschberg, Silesia. Curdes achievement has been preserved in the official annals of his battalion, corroborated by a non-commissioned officer and number of privates as eyewitnesses.

Young French Stars Due For Places on Cup Team

France will seek new blood for her Davis cup team this year for the first time since her quartet of youthful veterans captured the trophy from the United States in 1927.

For six years France has chosen her Davis cup team from that quartet—Henri Cochet, Rene Lacoste, Jean Borotra and Jacques Brugnon.

Now with only Cochet certain of a place, the younger French stars are expected to get their chance to check the attack of the United States or whatever nation wins through to the challenge round.

Three ambitious youngsters, Christian Bousset, Marcel Bernard and Andre Merlin, are favored for places on the team.

Bousset, a left-hander, has participated in international tournaments for five years, alternating victories over first-string players and then disappointing them by defeats at the hands of unknowns.

Last year, however, he showed such consistently good form that he would have been selected for the team had not Borotra agreed at the last moment to play single. Bousset ranks third in France, after Cochet and Borotra.

Bernard, another left-hander, ranks seventh. He is a boy 29 who began his international career last year when he won his way through to the final of the French championships to be beaten by Cochet.

Bernard has every stroke a good tennis player needs and is a remarkable strategist, but his game is too conservative to appeal to the average French fan.

The exact contrary is Merlin, who lacks any sort of judgment but who can sweep the average player off the court by the force of his attack. He ranks fourth.

Pinchot Urges Tax Army Cut

By United Press

HARRISBURG, Pa.—The "young army" of tax collectors in Pennsylvania can be reduced 75 per cent and still function effectively, according to Governor Gifford Pinchot.

The governor urged the state legislature to eliminate many of the estimated 5,000 tax-collecting jobs within the state.

"Elected tax collectors, including receivers of delinquent taxes, total 2,594. The number of appointed collectors is 416. To that must be added hundreds of employees and deputies," he said.

These collectors extract extravagant sums from the people. As taxes filter through, the law permits 5 or 6 per cent to stick to their fingers. Just as the gold ducats stuck to the pitch-covered measure of Ali Baba.

Tax collectors bob up everywhere and all the time. Pinchot mentioned Allentown, with 46 tax collectors; Reading, with 35, and the single bureau of delinquent taxes in Philadelphia, with 70, as examples of what he claimed was excess employment.
