WHAT IS THE Community Clinic worth to Cisco?

We asked that question yesterday at a meeting of the Agriculture and Livestock Committee. And Mr. Ralph Duncan of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, who has been here all week to help with the clinic, was quick to answer it.

"This meeting alone has produced 27 separate ideas for work projects that would mean a great deal to the community," Mr. Duncan said. He went on to explain that the other meetings had had similar results.

"Your people are thinking and talking. They're becoming increasingly conscious of the needs and opportunities of their city. The clinic gives the people an opportunity to re-examine their city and to hunt for methods to improve it."

AND THAT'S JUST what is happening. We've attended several meetings and the people attending each of them were genuinely and seriously interested. The interest shown is the sort that takes to build and maintain strong communities. The clinic is going to prove to be worth much to our area.

When it's over, the Chamber of Commerce plans to take as many of the ideas and suggestions as possible and start to work on them. Dozens of committees will be assigned to one project each.

And the bank obtained a group of motion pictures. One has been shown at each meeting, and the film was related to the subject of the meeting.

A CLINIC EVERY few years is good for any town, Mr. Duncan says. Clinics are his job. He goes around over the West Texas territory to offer any assistance he can to local chambers of commerce. The regional chamber is doing a magnificent job.

Three Area Oil Tests Near Possible Production Zones



Several Locations Are Made In Area

Three Cisco area oil tests were nearing possible production horizons today and the outcome of each was expected to be known by the end of the week, according to a survey of drilling operations.

Deepest of the three was the L. A. Warren et al. No. 1 Mrs. Maurine Royal, located an eighth of a mile west of the city limits line. It was drilling in hard Caddo lime at 3,265 feet. No oil or gas show has been reported in the Caddo.

The operators hope to pick up a Lake sand section under the Caddo, which was expected to be present in the next 100 or more feet of the hole.

The Curtis McFadden Company No. 1 Myrick-Maxwell Heirs, drilling 330 feet northwest of the recently completed gasser, the Ed Connolly No. 1 Mrs. Pearl McMurray, was drilling at 3,250 feet in Caddo lime. Operators are hopeful that Lake sand expected in this test will yield oil. The nearby McMurray well is a strong gas well.

In the South Cisco pool, the E. K. Carey Drilling Company No. 1 Estes-House was drilling in Caddo lime at about 3,250 feet. This is an offset to Lake sand production in Carey's No. 1 Max Witt.

A failure for the area was the W. B. Hamilton No. 1 J. F. Penn Estate, located some three miles west of Cisco. It was plugged and abandoned over the weekend after failure of Ellenberger lime tests. The hole was 4,305 feet deep.

A new project for Eastland County is the KLB Drilling Corporation No. 1 J. M. Daniels, located some six miles northeast of Eastland, in Section 33, Block 4, H&T Survey. Permit calls for 4,000 feet.

W. W. Sawyer, Cisco, has staked a 500-foot cable tool wildcat shallow test two miles north of Dathan as his No. 1 M. N. Parmer. Location is in Section 3172, TE&L Survey.

Two and a half miles southwest of Putnam in Callahan County, J. R. Tolbert has staked location for his No. 1 Childs-Hensley as a 1,000 foot shallow test with cable tools. Location is in Section 305, Block 5, SP Survey.

In the Pueblo area of Callahan County, McElroy Ranch Company will drill their No. 1-B T. J. O'Dell in Section 2990, TE&L Survey. Permit calls for 3,300 feet to test the Caddo lime from which nearby wells are flowing.

In Section 2260, TE&L Survey, V. B. Ross of Eastland will drill his No. 2 Mrs. Troy Loudder as a Caddo lime test. He has also made locations for his No. 3 and No. 4 Loudder in the same section.

Twelve miles north of Cisco, in Stephens County, the Delta Oil Company's No. 1 Mrs. Bernice McCrea was reported to have shutdown completion operations for a fishing job. Tools were wedged in the casing.

Ellenberger lime tests in the well had indicated that a large oil well would be completed. Bottom of the hole was 4,218 feet — 33 feet in the production time. A good show had also been logged in the Caddo lime in the test.

The Delta has considerable holdings in that area and additional drilling is expected.

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THE POLITICAL PICTURE CHANGES

As the old saying has it, one swallow doesn't make a summer. By the same token, one primary doesn't determine the fate of the aspirants for the Presidency. But the results in New Hampshire threw the whole political situation into an upheaval, and made it certain that from now until the bitter end the campaigns will be grueling, no-holds-barred affairs.

General Eisenhower's sweep of the state's 14-vote delegation gave his cause a shot in the arm that it sorely needed. It was much more conclusive than his supporters had dared to hope for — indeed shortly before the preferential primary some seasoned political observers thought it possible that Taft would beat him or that, at best, his margin of victory would be very small. The Eisenhower campaign is still none too well organized — too many political amateurs have been trying to get into the act, and there has been no effective, centralized direction. The professionals on

his side, such as the able Senator Lodge, will now try to move mountains to remedy that. It is one of the political facts of life that no amount of popular support is a satisfactory substitute for a first-class organization. After all, you have to get the nomination before you can be elected.

That the New Hampshire outcome was a serious setback for Senator Taft goes without saying. He had intimated that he expected to win about 4 of the state's 14 votes. His campaign leaders had hoped for several more. Yet he got none. This is a powerful stimulant to those in the Eisenhower camp and elsewhere who argue that Taft is a fine vote-getter in Ohio, but nowhere else. The Taft adherents reply that New Hampshire was Eisenhower ground all along, that Taft did not have the time to effectively stump the rural areas, where Eisenhower ran the strongest, and that it was not a true sample of sentiment on the national level.

Which of these divergent views is correct will be decided to some extent in New Jersey on April 15. There the voters of a big, highly-industrialized state will register their opinion of the merits of Taft and Eisenhower. The result will be of the highest political importance.

In some respects, Senator Kefauver's upset win over President Truman in New Hampshire was the most stunning thing that has happened yet in the political arena. Kefauver is a very junior senator and until he headed the crime investigation he was virtually unknown outside of the South. To many seasoned politicians, he is something of an up-

start. The established Democratic machine in New Hampshire went straight down the line for Mr. Truman and it is almost a law of politics that, in a primary, the machine is unbeatable. Yet Kefauver won handily. The Senator said that he does not regard this as evidence of anti-Truman sentiment, but as evidence of the voters' desire for new faces. Others are not so charitable — they think Kefauver won because of widespread revulsion against corruption and graft in the government.

In any event, the dog-fights are on. It is no longer certain that Truman can control the Demo-

cratic convention. And Senator Taft's chances of winning the Republican nod on an early ballot, which were strong a short time ago, have shrunk tremendously.

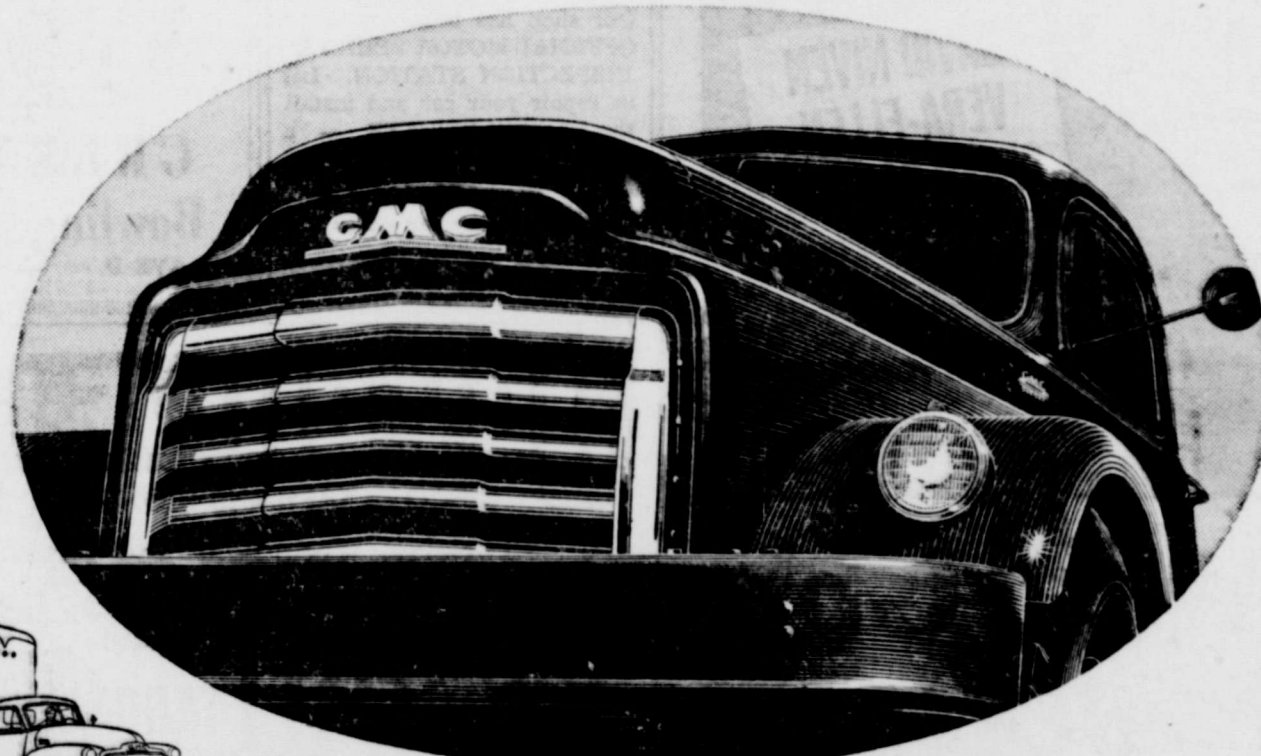

State Meeting To Study Crime Is Called By Daniel

Attorney General Price Daniel announced today a second annual State-wide conference on organized crime to be attended by the State's 315 prosecuting attorneys and other law enforcement officers. Daniel said he has invited every County Attorney and District Attorney in Texas to attend the meeting in Dallas on April 16, 17, and 18.

"The fight against commercial gambling and organized crime is

a continuing battle," Daniel said. "Our crime conference last year did much toward keeping racketeers and hoodlums out of this State. This year we must let them know that Texas is still on guard and will not tolerate their unlawful activities."

The first State-wide conference of prosecuting attorneys at Austin last year was attended by most of the State's prosecuting attorneys, and has been credited with helping to bring about new legislation and better enforcement of laws against organized gambling in Texas, Daniel said. The Kefauver Senate Crime Committee gave special praise to the 1951 conference in its final report.

This year's conference in Dallas is jointly sponsored by the Attorney General and the Southwestern Legal Foundation at Southern Methodist University as a part of the annual Lawyers Week. Col. Robert G. Storey, President of the Southwestern Legal Foundation, and other business and professional leaders will join in the conference, discussing means to combat immorality in government, Daniel stated.

Prominent speakers include Senator Kefauver, who will address a public meeting on the night of April 16, Mayor de Lesseps S. Morrison of New Orleans, D. A. Huley, President of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, Virgil Peterson, Director, Chicago Crime Commission, Col. Homer Garrison Jr., Director of the Department of Public Safety, Hon. Fred V. Meridith, Chairman of the Texas House Investigating Committee on Organized Crime, President M. E. Sadler of Texas Christian University, District Attorney R. L. Whitehead of Longview, Criminal District Attorney Henry Wade of Dallas, Criminal District Judge Robert A. Hall of Dallas, Sheriff C. H. (Charley) Meyer of Beaumont, Constable Kal Segrist of Dallas, Chief of Police J. W. Dellinger of Taylor, and representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

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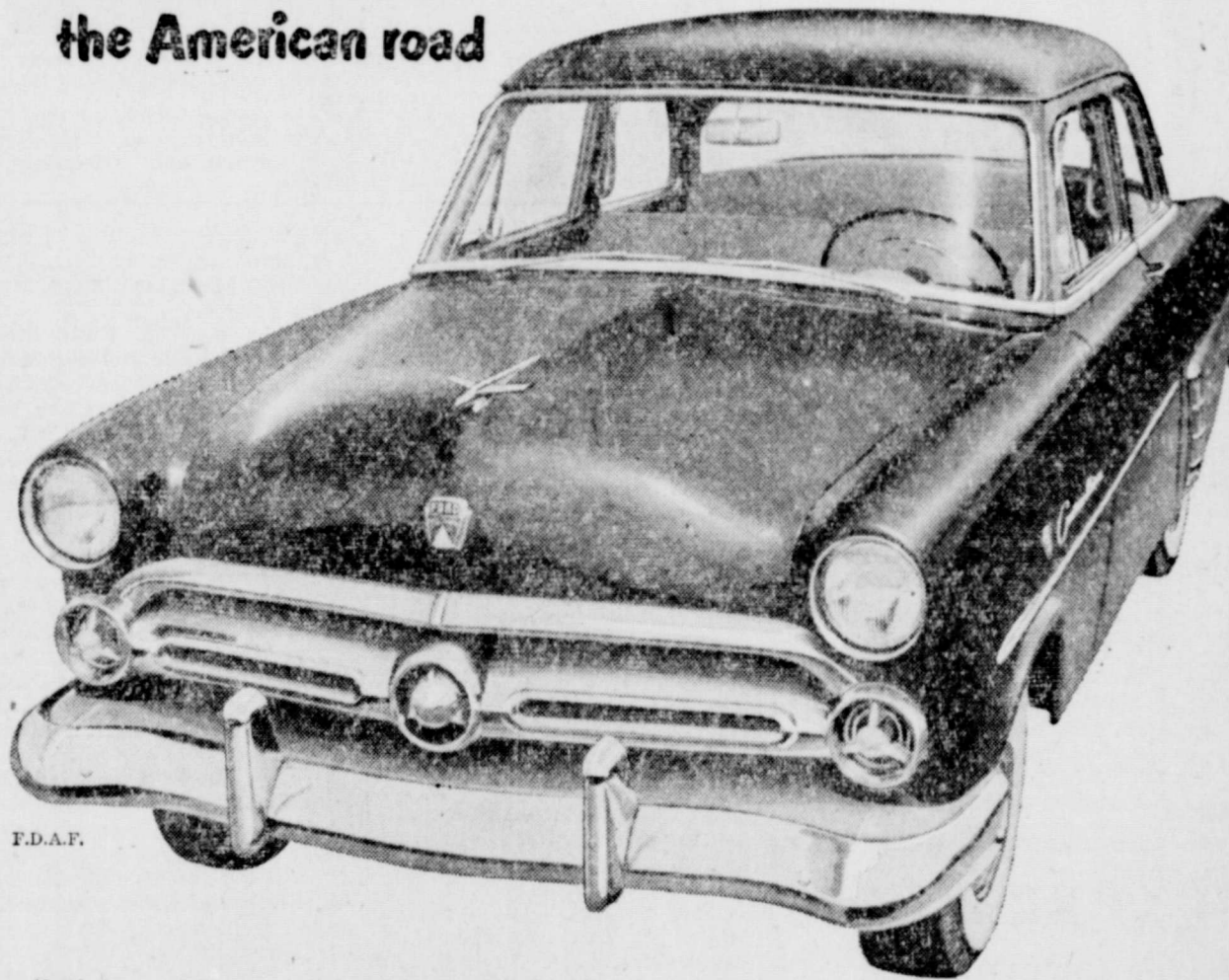
