## Nomination Made On No. 1 Farmer

GORMAN, June 7.—Gorman's number one farmer at the present writing is J. E. Smith, who resides about one mile out on the DeLeon highway — and proof to this statement may be had in person by a personal tour of his 20-acre Irish potato field.

Smith has been on this farm since 1933, and when he first settled there, it was given up to be one of the worst run-down and least productive farms in this section of the state — but judging from the results actually seen, it is believed it will now produce more cash per acre than any farm in this section.

This spring Mr. Smith devoted 20 acres of his farm to Irish potatoes, believing that they would pay him to do so. He started digging them last week, and is making from 115 to 125 bushels of potatoes per acre, with a price of two cents per pound for No. 1 potatoes and one cent per pound for the No. 2 tubers.

He is employing some twenty-five people to help dig, gather, grade and pack the potatoes. And he is finding a ready market for them through trucks from the north and west, who have "just happened" to learn of his harvesting.

He has used both commercial and barnyard fertilizer in enriching the soil for this crop, which was planted in the middle of February and his efforts to make the crop pay have been handsomely rewarded.

Smith plans now, as soon as the crop is harvested, to plant melons, black-eyed peas and cantaloupes on his potato land, thereby again producing a money-making crop. Farmers who doubt that the soil in this section will produce paying truck crops have only to make a trip to the Smith farm to see for themselves just what can be done, when the proper effort is put forth.

## Method to Control Grasshoppers Given

Modern methods of controlling grasshoppers are economical and very effective if used properly, according to County Agent Cook. He is urging those whose crops are suffering from grasshopper infestation to apply control measures early in the infestation, as the expense of control at this stage is much less than if used later.

Poison bran mash for grasshopper control is made as follows: Course wheat bran, 25 pounds; Paris green or white arsenic, 1 pound; High grade amyl acetate (avoid cheap grades of banana oil or bronzing liquids), 1 ounce; Cane or sorghum molasses (avoid corn syrup), 2 quarts.

Water sufficiently to make a moist mash as explained. Mix the bran and poison together thoroughly. Dilute the amyl acetate and molasses in about two gallons of water. Pour this liquid over the mixture of poison and bran until every particle is moist. Then make further additions of water and mix thoroughly until a mash is obtained that is quite moist, yet so it will fall apart after being tightly squeezed, and so may readily be sown broadcast.

This quantity of mash should be broadcast so as to cover about five acres. A good practice is to mix at night and sow early in the morning before nine o'clock, since the hoppers do not actively feed until the dew dries up. If it is desired to kill hoppers in grassland, sow over the entire acreage to be protected. Where they are migrating from fence rows or pastures into cultivated crops, sow the fence row on a fairly broad margin of the pasture, and also a broad margin of the cultivated crop with the mixture.

Amyl acetate is preferable in the formula, but if it cannot be obtained, substitute six lemons for one ounce of the amyl acetate. This should be diluted with water as with the other substance, but one should use both juice and rinds, grinding the latter in a fine food chopper.

Do not place the mash in piles or do not use lead arsenate. Use Paris green or white arsenic, and do not use cheap banana oil or bronzing liquids, advised Cook.

## Desdemona Deep Test Drilling At 375 Feet Tuesday

Garvin Chastain of Ranger reported today that a number of rumors about the Gallagher and Lawson deep test at Desdemona were unfounded, as he had talked to Mr. Lawson Tuesday and it is doing nicely.

Rumors heard included one that a second string of tools had been lost in the well and that the rig would have to be skidded again. Chastain said that this was untrue and that the well was now drilling at 375 feet, with 140 feet of 20-inch casing already installed. Another report said that the derrick had been struck by lightning and destroyed. Investigation proved that lightning did hit the derrick, but that it did no damage and did not delay drilling operations.

Oil men who have made a study of this section of the country have great hopes for the well being a producer and much interest is being taken in the test, not only in Eastland county but throughout the state.

## Extend Invitation For Requests Upon Field Terrace Lines

Eastland county farmers and ranchers who intend to make requests to the county agent's office for field terrace lines or pasture contour lines and who intend to do the construction work this summer should get their requests in at once, announced County Agent Cook.

The county terracing supervisor, R. R. Bradshaw, and N. Y. A. boys employed under the terracing project will terminate their services on July 1, and workers to run terrace and contour lines will not likely be available after that date, Cook stated. However, it is likely that another such project will start operation again this fall running terrace lines on row-crop land, said Cook.

## Oregon Acts to End Hide Bounty Racket

PORTLAND, Ore.—The process of soaking cougar hides and stretching them on frames to conceal the removal of the perforated "O.G.C." from the neck may pass into the limbo of other days, a ruling of the Oregon State Game Commission held.

The board believed that they may have paid two or even three \$20 bounties to predatory animal hunters on a single skin.

It had been noted that cougar hides of rather weird dimensions had been brought into headquarters for the royal fee. Henceforth, commission members held, the perforated stamp will be made in the middle of the skin and on various other sections of the hide.

The Brown twins have been important cogs in the Eagle track team, which made a sensational record the past season. ## Judge George Davenport, Disqualified, Appoints Breckenridge Jurist To Sit In Beer Election Contest on Friday

Judge George L. Davenport on Thursday certified his disqualification to preside in the beer election contest set for Friday morning at 9 a. m. in 91st district court and appointed B. H. Atchison, judge of 90th district court of Breckenridge.

Judge Davenport's disqualification was because of a first-cousin relationship to Henry Davenport, member of commissioners' court, named as one of the respondents in the case, styled G. Connally et al vs. W. S. Adamson, county judge, et al.

As judge of the eighth administrative judicial district of Texas, Davenport was authorized to appoint another to preside in the case.

In certifying his disqualification, Judge Davenport made the following statement:

"After a careful study of the pleadings of the parties to this suit, the decisions of the courts of this and other states, I am convinced of my disqualification as above announced.

"When this suit was originally filed and I was called upon to act upon an application for an injunction it did not occur to me that my relation to County Com-

missioner Henry Davenport, who was named a defendant in his official capacity only, would disqualify me from trying the litigation and, as none of the parties to the suit raised the question in connection with temporary injunction previously granted, concerning which the public has been advised, but realizing the importance of the litigation and the far-reaching effect of the disposition of the same upon the people of this county, I was prompted to investigate most thoroughly the question of my qualification and after doing so arrived at the conclusion as stated above.

"There appears some conflict of decisions among the courts of the state, but the weight of authorities justifies the course I have adopted.

"In one of the leading cases of this state the following language is used:

"It may be doubted whether the absence of pecuniary interest in the controversy will prevent the disqualification declared by the Constitution and the Statute to arise from the relationship to one who is in effect a party. The Constitution does not say 'party in interest' but simply 'party'. It may

be argued with reason that the mere fact that the relative of the judge was identified with the controversy as a party to the record was deemed sufficient to work disqualification, whether his pecuniary interests are involved or not. The language used supports such a view."

"The principals announced in the opinion cited above is adopted in the more recent case of Campbell vs. Moore reported in the 12th Southwestern, Second, at page 806.

"In view of the absence of Judge Patterson, who is in Arizona with a sick brother and therefore not available, the attorneys representing the parties at interest have agreed upon the Honorable B. H. Atchison of the 90th court of Breckenridge to preside in the trial of the above suit, and Judge Atchison has kindly consented and will be present and preside when the case is called Friday morning. I feel that this selection is a wise one and that Judge Atchison will preside in such a way as to merit the confidence and approval of the parties to the controversy."

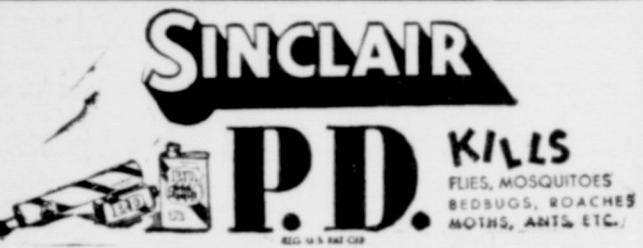

### WHOLE NATION WATCHES TEST OF 'RENT STRIKE'

PONTIAC, Mich., June 9.—That the "rent strike" unfolding here is important as a "test tube" for a new weapon in the economic arena, is well shown by inquiries flooding in on the local committee of the United Auto Workers which is directing the strike.

Not only is a similar and larger movement being planned for Detroit about July 1, but inquiries have been received by the local committee from a half dozen other Michigan cities and from New York, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania and Indiana. Tenants and landlords in increasing numbers are realizing the possibilities in this newest field of union activity.

The "strike" which began June 1 was the brain-child of a rent committee of Local 159, U. A. W. A. The plan was that, beginning with that day, all members were to withhold payment of their rent whether dissatisfied or not. Then an effort would be made to establish a scale of rents based on a dollar a month on each \$1000 of assessed valuation.

Already a jury pretty evenly divided between tenants and property owners has heard one case and decided it in favor of the landlord, Mrs. Ada A. Cook. Her tenant, Wilbur Jennings, an auto worker, rented a four-room suite of a nine-unit building in which Mrs. Cook, the landlord, also lives. He was paying on a weekly basis \$11 a week, which Mrs. Cook raised to \$12.50 last December. Jennings refused to pay more than \$11, and Mrs. Cook allowed him to continue at that rate until May 28, when she sued to regain possession of her apartment. The court gave Jennings five days to get out.

It is not yet possible to determine the effectiveness of the strike. No one knows just how many union members had rent due on June 1, and refusal will not be definitely clear until around June 10.

The sing, "Pontiac Tenants' Union Headquarters, U. A. W. A. Local 159," hangs over the regular union headquarters. Efforts are being made to get other unions to join the movement.

### Armadillo Ranks With Backbone as A New Delicacy

COLLEGE STATION, Texas—Smothered armadillo ranks with pork ribs and backbone as a palate teaser, two field men of the Texas Cooperative Wildlife Service report following recent inspection of wild life resources on a large lumber company's preserve in Trinity County.

They were introduced to what was to them, and may be to many

others, this new delicacy of the culinary art by Judge R. E. Min-ton of Lufkin who announced during the inspection tour that the evening meal would be chiefly of the meat of this nocturnal, armored mammal. Prepared by Pres, Negro cook of the expedition, the viand, so the field men reported, produced a smacking of lips and sighs of contentment.

Pres' recipe for smothered armadillo is first, catch your armadillo, then after dressing, parboil until tender in water well-seasoned with salt, pepper and vinegar. Sear in a heavy skillet in small amount of grease and when well seared cover with sauce of tomato paste or catsup, mustard,

vinegar, salt, pepper and a sweet bay leaf. Then cover the skillet and let the meat simmer in the sauce, adding water from time to time. When the meat begins to fall off the bone and the sauce is fairly thick, the smothered armadillo is ready to serve.

# HIGH COURT REVERSED ONE 1923 OPINION

By United Press  
WASHINGTON.—The question of the validity of the Wagner Labor Relations Act and the Social Security Act constituted the most important decisions of the United States supreme court as its term was concluded June 1.

The major decisions of the court in the term were:

The Duke Power company challenge to the authority of PWA to make loans and grants to municipalities for publicly owned power systems. Remanded to lower court for further proceedings. Unanimous decision.

Administration's stay of proceedings in power company challenges to the validity of the utility holding company act, pending Electric Bond and Share company case determination. Approved unanimously.

Airplane manufacturers' challenge to neutrality proclamation banning arms and munitions shipments to Bolivia and Paraguay in Chaco dispute. Presidential proclamation sustained, Justice McReynolds dissenting.

Retrospective tax on silver profits made while silver purchase act was under consideration in Congress. Sustained, unanimous.

New York Unemployment Insurance law. Sustained, 4 to 4 vote. Individual votes not announced.

Dirk de Jonge, Portland, Ore., Communist, convicted of violating state's anti-sedition law. Conviction set aside as abridgement of freedom of speech, unanimous.

Washington Minimum Wage for Women law. Sustained, Justices Van Devanter, McReynolds, Sutherland, Butler dissenting. Decision reversed 1923 stand that such legislation was invalid.

Angelo Herndon, Atlanta, Ga., negro Communist organizer, sentenced to 18 to 20 years for Communist organization activities. Conviction set aside, Justices Van Devanter, McReynolds, Sutherland, Butler dissenting.

Railway Labor act, giving collective bargaining guarantees to railway workers. Sustained, unanimous.

# Two New Forms of Social Security Blanks Are Ready

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Announcement was made today by Commissioner of Internal Revenue Guy T. Helvering of the release of Forms SS-2 and SS-2a which have been prescribed for use by employers in making their information returns under Title VIII of the Social Security Act. Copies of these forms are now being printed and will be made available in the near future at offices of Collectors of Internal Revenue.

Every employer who, during any calendar month beginning with the month of January 1937, employed one or more individuals in an occupation not specifically exempt from the taxes imposed by Title VIII of the Act is required to file an information return on Forms SS-2 and SS-2a. These forms, it was stated, are in addition to the monthly tax return on Form SS-1 which is also required to be filed by each such employer.

The first return on Forms SS-2 and SS-2a covers the period January 1, 1937, to June 30, 1937, both dates inclusive, and must be filed not later than July 31, 1937, with the collector of internal revenue for the district in which the employer's principal place of business is located. Subsequent returns on such forms will be filed on a quarterly basis to cover each period of three calendar months ending on September 30, December 31, March 31, and June 30, and are required to be filed on or before the last day of the first month following the period for which the return is made.

Form SS-2, which must be filed in duplicate, will contain a summary statement of all taxable wages paid to all employees within the period covered by the return. Form SS-2a must show the taxable wages paid to each employee, within such period. Form SS-2a is not to be filed in duplicate but, it was emphasized, a separate original form must be filed for each employee, whether temporary or permanent.

Each employer who filed Form SS-4, employer's application for an identification number, will be notified of his number prior to the time the first information return on Forms SS-2 and SS-2a is due. The employer is required to enter his identification number on the information return as well as his monthly tax returns. If no identification number has been assigned prior to the time for filing the information return, the employer must enter on the return the date on which the application on Form SS-4 was filed and the name and address of the agency to which the application was addressed.

Each Form SS-2a filed by an employer must also show the account number of the employee whose taxable wages are reported thereon. If the employee has no account number, the employer is required to enter on the form the date on which the application for the number on Form SS-5 was filed, the agency to which the application was addressed, and the address of the employee. It was pointed out in this connection that under Treasury regulations if, on the last day of the period covered by an information return, an employee has failed to file an application for an account number on Form SS-5, the employer is required to file an application for such employee, based on information and belief.

Form SS-2 must be signed by (1) the individual, if the employer is an individual; (2) the president, vice president, or other principal officer, if the employer is a corporation; or (3) a responsible and duly authorized member having knowledge of its affairs, if the employer is a partnership or other unincorporated organization.

Wagner Labor Relations act. Sustained unanimously as applied to Washington, Virginia and Maryland Coach company. Sustained applied to press wire services, Justices Van Devanter, McReynolds, Sutherland and Butler dissenting, holding the act infringed freedom of the press. Sustained as applied to steel, auto and clothing manufacture, the same justices dissenting on the grounds these did not involve interstate commerce.

Three cents per pound tax on processing of coconut oil imported from Philippines. Sustained, unanimously.

Litvinoff agreement, giving the United States right to collect Russian claims growing out of Soviet nationalization decrees, approved. Justices Stone, Brandeis and Cardozo concur in result.

Procedural requirements set up for recovery of processing taxes invalidated by AAA decision, including "unjust enrichment" provisions. Sustained, Justices Stone and Cardozo concurring, Justice McReynolds dissenting.

Social Security act Unemployment insurance sustained by 5-4 vote, Justices Hughes, Brandeis, Stone, Roberts and Cardozo concurring. Old age pension provisions sustained by a 7 to 2 vote. Justices McReynolds and Butler dissenting. Alabama State unemployment act sustained by 5-4 vote.

Each return must be acknowledged before an officer authorized to administer oaths but if the amount of taxable wages paid within the period covered by the return is \$500 or less, the return may be acknowledged before two disinterested witnesses instead of under oath. An employee is not considered to be a disinterested witness.

Employers who have been filing Forms SS-1 and whose names are thus on collector's mailing lists, it was stated, will be furnished with a supply blank forms SS-2 and SS-2a sufficient for their current needs without the necessity for requesting them at collector's offices. In view of the large number of employers to whom the forms must be furnished, however, it was not expected that the distribution by collectors would be completed before July 1, 1937. An employer who does not receive copies of the forms by that date should at that time, but not before, request a supply sufficient for his current needs from the office of the collector for his district. In this connection, it was pointed out that failure to receive blank forms will not excuse employers for failure to file their returns on time. Severe penalties are imposed by law for willful failure to file returns or for false or fraudulent returns.

The information to be reported on forms SS-2 and SS2a should be made up from the records which every employer liable for tax under Title VIII of the Act is required to keep with respect to all remuneration paid to his employees after December 31, 1936, for services performed for him after that date. Such records must show in regard to each employee: (1) his name, address and social security account number; (2) his occupation; (3) the total amount and date of each remuneration payment and the period of services covered by such payment; (4) the amount of such remuneration payment which constitutes wages 'subject to tax; and (5) the amount of employees' tax withheld or collected with respect to such payment, and, if collected at a time other than the time such payment was made, the date collected.

No particular form is prescribed for keeping these records. Each employer must use such forms and systems of accounting as will enable the Commission of Internal Revenue to ascertain whether the taxes for which the employer is liable are correctly computed and paid.
