GREAT INDUSTRIAL EXPOSITION AT AMARILLO

The Jobbers & Manufacturers' Association of Amarillo will on November 23, 24 and 25, stage in Amarillo, what is conceded to be the greatest industrial exposition ever attempted in the Southwest. Amarillo made articles, together with commodities handled by jobbers who have distributing houses there will be displayed, and thousands of visitors representing all sections of the Panhandle, Oklahoma and New Mexico will be there to see the display. It has been announced by officials of the organization.

The exposition will be held in the J. L. Case Threshing Machine Company's building, and display booths are being arranged to accommodate the showing.

Amarillo is conceded to be one of the fastest growing manufacturing and jobbing centers in the Southwest and being in the heart of the World's greatest gas field, a tremendous growth of the manufacturing and industrial enterprise is believed inevitable.

Texas made products are rapidly becoming very popular, and the demand is growing greater every day, according to the local wholesale interests, and for that reason, the exposition at Amarillo is attracting wide attention.

Amarillo jobbers and manufacturers are urging the retail merchants of the entire Panhandle to lend their co-operation in making the exposition truly representative of the industrial activities there, and many of the merchants and business men are responding, and will urge their customers to attend the display.

The financial budget for the enterprise has been assured and committees from the association are at work arranging the details. In connection with the showing of manufactured products and merchandise jobbed through this point, a program of music and entertainment of exceptional merit is being arranged including band music, orchestra music, vaudeville performances, dancing and other forms of entertainment.

Amarillo hotel accommodations have been greatly increased within the past few months, but reservations for rooms should be made early, it was announced by officials of the association. VOTE FOR THE WATER AND LIGHT BONDS

The election to determine whether the city of Perryton shall issue bonds in the sum of \$75,000.00 for the purpose of acquiring, improving, extending or constructing a water works system in the city of Perryton will be held on Tuesday, December 5th. At the same time a bond issue of \$35,000.00 for the purpose of acquiring, improving, extending or constructing an electric light system within and for the City of Perryton, will be held.

This is a question that should be given a very careful consideration by every voter in this city. These two bond issues should carry by an overwhelming majority. Nothing is so vital to the advancement of a town as a good light and water plant. They are essential to success. These bond issues which will total \$110,000.00 are payable serially, or otherwise, within forty years from date and bear six per cent interest.

The paying of the tax on these bonds will not be an excessive burden on any one. In fact it is thought that the saving in the water and light rate will more than pay the tax which will be necessary to carry the bonds. And the insurance rates must be taken into consideration. A water plant such as will be put in will lower the rate of insurance paid on every piece of property in this town. With an eight inch main down Main Street and with six inch mains with fire plugs throughout the residence district, the fire department will be able to do efficient work. The plans also call for an extension of the present water system so that it will reach all parts of the city.

In the matter of the electric light system it is proposed to remodel present plant so that it will meet with all requirements of the city for years to come. A white way will be installed on Main Street and street lights put in throughout the residence district. Also all electric light wires will be moved to the alleys.

The contract with the engineering firm of Ghatt and Baker of Oklahoma City calls for an appraisal of the present water and light plant which is owned by the Perryton Public Utilities Co. It is the intention of the city council to buy this plant for what it will be worth in the construction of the new system. They will be paid what the engineers deem it worth. We think that the present company should be given a fair price for their holdings, they have given us excellent service for the past few years, far better than any other new town that we know of.

Now get out and talk this bond issue, work for it and then on Tuesday, December 5th cast your vote "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE BONDS."

M. on the 13th day of November A. D. 1922, and these are to command any person or persons interested in said lands to appear before said court at ten o'clock A. M. at said time and place to protest against such action if they so desire.

The petition so filed in said court, which contains a description of the lands concerned, is as follows to-wit:

Your petitioners would further represent to the court that on the 20th day of December, 1905, your petitioners, with others, subdivided and platted

into Town lots and blocks known and designated as the First Addition to the Town of Ochiltree, a portion of the land hereinafter described; that the official plat of said last named addition was filed for record on December 20th, 1905, and recorded in Volume 4, on Page 190 of the Town Deed Records of Ochiltree County, Texas.

That the land upon which the said Allen Addition was platted, and upon which a portion of said First Addition was platted, and concerning which petitioners herein pray for this court to make order concerning is described as follows to-wit: All of the Northwest one fourth (NW $\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Number seventeen (17) Block Number (13) Thirteen, T. & N. O. R. 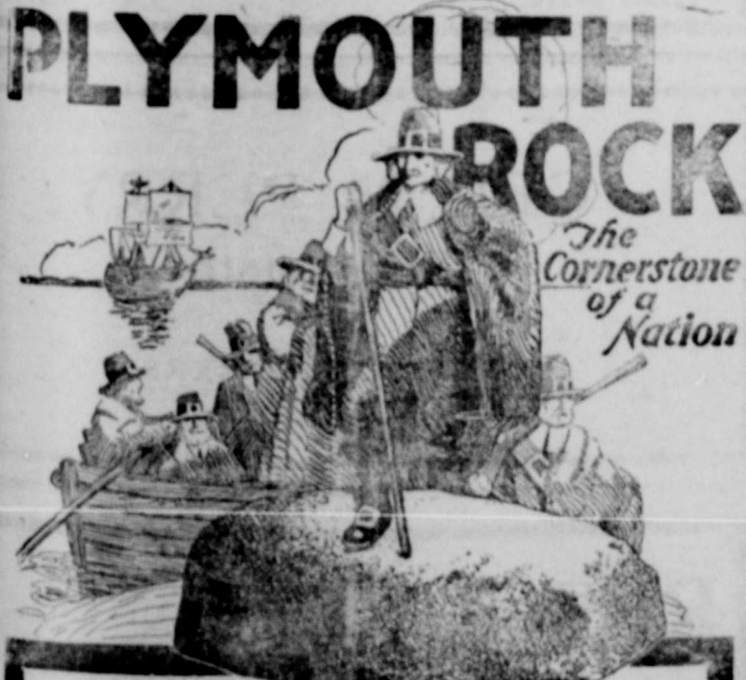

WHY NOT BUDGET YOUR INCOME?

Very soon now the average South-
ern farmer will be selling this year's
crop. With cotton at 20 cents a pound
and tobacco prices good, farmers al-
most all over the South will have
some surplus money.

We suggest that each reader figure
out about how much surplus money
he may reasonably expect and then
how it may be spent in the most pro-
fitable way. Decide what improved
machinery, seeds, livestock, or fer-
tilizer you will need, and about what
they will cost. Consider also what
additional household equipment you

ORDINANCE NO. 55

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION, REPAIR, STRAIGHTENING AND WIDENING OF SIDEWALKS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE LEVING OF ASSESSMENTS AGAINST PROPERTY ADJACENT THEREOF, FOR THE PAYMENT THEREOF, THE FIXING OF PERSONAL LIABILITY FOR SUCH PAYMENT ON THE OWNERS THEREOF, PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUING OF CERTIFICATES IN PAYMENT, FIXING A RATE OF INTEREST AND THE TIME AND MANNER OF PAYMENT; ALSO PROVIDING FOR NOTICE TO OWNERS FOR PROCEDURE NECESSARY FOR SUCH ASSESSMENTS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH SIDEWALKS SHALL BE ORDERED IN, ETC.

Section 1. Whenever in the judgment of the mayor and the city council of the City of Perryton, Texas it shall become necessary, and considered to be the best interests of said city to have constructed, graded, repaired or widened, any sidewalk in any portion of said city, it shall be the duty of the said city council, by resolution, to order said sidewalk constructed; a copy of said resolution shall be served upon the owner or owners of the property, their agent or attorney which said resolution shall specify the kind of walk to be constructed, or if repaired, the nature of the repairs to be made, or if it be to widen a sidewalk already constructed along said property, it shall give the dimensions, together with the specifications showing the additional walk to be constructed in widening such walk, and shall also set out and specify a certain time within which said walk may be constructed by the owner or owners of said property, which copy of such resolution shall be served by the city marshal, by delivering a copy thereof to the owner or owners of the property to be affected, and he shall make his return upon the original of such copy of said resolution which shall be returned to the city clerk and by him filed, and spread upon the minutes of said council.

Section 2. If after the service of copy of a resolution by the city council, as provided for in Sec. 1 hereof, upon the owner or owners of property to be affected by the improvements or repairs so specified in said resolution, if the owner or owners of such property shall fail or refuse to construct such sidewalk or to make such repairs, or to do or cause to be done the improvements specified in said resolution in the time so specified in which the same should be done, then the city council may have said sidewalk constructed, repaired or widened, as the case may be, and may assess the cost thereof to the owner or owners of said property, and said assessment shall be a lien upon the property along which said improvements are made or said sidewalks constructed, and the same shall be a personal liability of the owner or owners of such property, and the city shall be authorized to issue assignable certificates in payment of said improvement or repair and declare the same to be a lien upon said property affected by such improvements or repairs, and fix the rate of interest the same shall bear and the terms of said certificate, when payable, which when issued as herein provided shall become a binding obligation on the owner thereof for which he shall be personally liable, and the same in addition thereto shall become and be a valid lien upon said premises. Provided that the cost of such repair or improvement shall in no case become a lien or a personal liability for a greater amount than the benefits to said property by reason of said improvement or repair, as the case may be; and provided, further, that nothing herein shall be construed to mean that a lien shall be fixed against property that is by law exempt from forced sale, but in such case the liability for the payment of said improvement and certificate issued therefore shall be a personal liability against the owner of such exempt property.

Section 3. Whenever it shall be determined, as provided in this ordinance to construct any sidewalk or to grade, widen, or repair such walk, and the cost thereof determined as herein provided, the city shall issue a special assessment certificate against the owner of such property, declaring the same to be a lien upon the property, which shall be described and set out in said certificate and shall also declare the same to be a personal liability of such owner for the amount thereof, said certificate shall bear interest from its date at the rate of eight percent per annum, the interest to be made payable annually, and said certificate shall also provide for the assessment of the cost of collection and a reasonable attorney's fee, if incurred, and shall be declared to be a first and paramount lien upon said premises, except as to

lawful adjoins, and a personal liability of the owner. It shall also provide that in accordance with this ordinance, if default shall be made in any installment of principal or interest, the whole debt shall then become due at the option of the holder, and that the same shall at once mature without notice, and the full amount of principal thereof shall be collectible as accrued interest and reasonable attorney's fees, cost of collection, if incurred. Said certificate shall be made payable to the collector of taxes for said city, whose duty it shall be to pay the same into the city treasury, and such money so collected and turned into the city treasury shall be paid to the holder of such certificate upon presentation of the same of proper coupon and its surrender for cancellation. Said certificate shall further provide that the same may be paid at any time after the first year by the tender of the amount due thereon, together with the accrued interest to the collector of taxes for said city, or the treasurer thereof, and upon such tender, interest on said certificate shall cease from the date of such payment, and the money shall be turned over to the party entitled to receive the same or the holder of said certificate upon the surrender thereof for cancellation. Said certificate shall further provide that upon default in the payment of any installment of principal or interest thereon at the maturity of said certificate, it is made the duty of the collector of taxes aforesaid, upon request of the legal holder of said certificate to sell said premises for the purpose of realizing any amount then due thereon, with interest and costs. Said sale to be made in the manner provided by law and in force in said city for the sale of property for the collection of taxes, or in case of such default, upon demand of the legal holder thereof said city will exercise its lawful power to enforce collection of said certificate by suit in its own name for the benefit of said holder, or the holder thereof may bring suit for the enforcement of said certificate in his own name in any court having jurisdiction. Said certificate shall further provide that all proceedings with reference to making such improvement, repair or widening of sidewalks, as the case may be, have been regularly had in compliance with law, in force in said city and the terms of said certificate, and that all prerequisites to the fixing of the lien and claim of personal liability evidenced by said certificate have been performed. The same shall be signed by the city, by its mayor, and attested by the secretary, with the seal of said city attached thereto.

Section 4. No assessment of any part of the costs of such improvement, as hereinabove set out, shall be made against any property abutting thereon or its owner, until a full and fair hearing shall first have been given to the owner or owners of such property, preceded by notice given to said owner or owners, their agents or attorneys, for at least ten days before the date of such hearing. Such notice shall be given by serving upon the owner or owners, their agents or attorneys, a notice which shall set out and recite the nature and kind of improvement to be made, fully describing such improvements and shall also set out and fully describe the property along which said improvement is proposed to be made, and the estimated cost of such improvement, which said notice shall be directed to the city marshal, whose duty it shall be to serve the same and so issue, said notice to be signed by the secretary, the seal of the city affixed thereto, and when said notice shall be served same shall be returned by said city marshal to the city clerk of said city and the same filed by said clerk; notice shall also be given to such owner or owners, their agents or attorneys, as above specified, by publishing the same in the Ochiltree County Herald, a newspaper published in said city, and of general circulation, for at least three insertions in said paper, the first of which shall be more than ten days before the date set for said hearing. Said hearing shall be had before the city council of the City of Perryton, at which time and place as specified in said notice, said owner shall have the right to contest said assessment and personal liability and the regularity of the proceeding with reference to such improvement, as above defined, and the benefit of said improvement to their property, and any other matter with reference thereto. Provided that no assessment shall be made against any owner of abutting property of his property in any event in excess of the actual benefit to such owner in the enhanced value to his property by means of such improvement, as ascertained by such hearing. Any owner or party who may be dissatisfied with the finding of said city council shall have the right to appeal from said finding and assessment at any time within ten

days from the date of the judgment of said city council making such assessment and fixing such personal liability a lien upon such property.

Section 5. The city council of the City of Perryton shall correct any mistake or irregularity in any proceeding with reference to any improvement, or assessment of the cost thereof against abutting property and its owners, whenever and at such time as the same may be called to the attention of said city council by any party aggrieved thereby and shall have power to reassess against any abutting property and its owner the cost or any part of the cost of such improvement which shall be erroneously assessed or which shall be invalid by reason of any irregularity in the first proceeding, providing that such reassessment shall not exceed the benefits in the enhanced value of such property from such improvement.

Section 6. Provided that in case it should be desired to construct any improvement contemplated in this ordinance along abutting property which is exempt by law, homestead or otherwise, and the owner or owners of such property are desirous of having such improvements constructed along such property, and are desirous also of taking advantage of the assessment and the cost thereof by said city against their property, as provided hereinabove, and the issuance of the city's assignable certificate in payment thereof, the mayor shall be authorized and it is hereby made his duty to enter into a contract with such owner or owners of such property, for the construction of such improvement, which said contract shall be in compliance with the statutes of this state for the making of valuable and permanent improvement upon the homestead and fixing a lien therefor on said exempt property; provided, that all certificates issued under the terms of this section of this ordinance against the owner or owners of exempt property which shall be made or declared a lien thereon shall in addition to the other recitals provided for hereinabove, recite the execution of said contract and shall set out and refer to the same and by reference make the same a part of said certificate, giving the date of said contract, the date of its filing and the book and page of its record in the office of the county clerk of Ochiltree County, Texas and provided further that the costs incurred in the execution filing and recording of said contract shall be paid by the city out of the general funds.

Section 7. Provided that all the improvements provided for in this ordinance shall be constructed in accordance with the law in effect in said city at the time the same shall be done.

Section 8. The word "improvement" wherever used in this ordinance shall include the construction, grading, repairing and widening of sidewalks in said city, whether the particular improvements to which said section refers is mentioned or not.

Section 9. All the proceedings had with reference to the making of improvements under the provisions of this ordinance, including all notices and resolutions passed, issued and served, together with the proceedings of the city council had thereon, shall be recorded in the minutes of the proceedings of the city council of said city had at the meeting in which such proceedings take place. This ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after its passage and publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 54

A FIRE MARSHAL ORDINANCE
An Ordinance Creating the Office of Fire Marshal, Prescribing the Duties Thereof, Providing for Its Maintenance, and Prescribing Penalties for Violations.

Be it ordained by the City Commission or Council of the City of Perryton, Texas:

SECTION 1. The office of Fire Marshal is hereby created. Such office shall be independent of other city departments, the Fire Marshal reporting directly to the Mayor and City Commission or Council. Such office shall be filled by appointment by the Mayor, by and with the consent of the City Commission or Council, within 10 days after this ordinance shall take effect. The said Fire Marshal shall be properly qualified for the duties of his office, and shall be removed only for cause. He shall receive an annual salary of \$120 dollars, payable in monthly installments, as full compensation for his services.

SEC. 2. The Fire Marshal shall investigate the cause, origin and circumstances of every fire occurring within this city by which property has been destroyed or damaged, and shall especially make investigation as to whether such fire was the result of carelessness or design. Such investigation shall be begun within twenty-four hours, not including Sunday, of the occurrence of such fire. The Fire Marshal shall keep in his office a record of all fires, together with all facts, statistics and circumstances, including the origin of the fires and the amount of the loss, which may be determined by the investigation required by this ordinance.

SEC. 3. The Fire Marshal, when in his opinion further investigation is necessary, shall take or cause to be taken the testimony, on oath, of all persons supposed to be cognizant of any facts or to have means of knowledge in relation to the matter under investigation, and shall cause the same to be reduced to writing; and if he shall be of the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arson, or with the attempt to commit the crime of arson, or of conspiracy to defraud, or criminal conduct in connection with such fire, he shall cause such person to be lawfully arrested and charged with such offense or offenses of them, and shall furnish to the proper prosecuting attorney all such evidence, together with the names of witnesses and all of the information obtained by him, including a copy of all pertinent and material testimony taken in the case.

SEC. 4. The Fire Marshal shall have the power to summon witness before him to testify in relation to any matter which is by the provisions of this ordinance a subject of inquiry and investigation, and may require the production of any book, paper or document deemed pertinent thereto. The said Fire Marshal is hereby authorized and empowered to administer oaths and affirmations to any persons appearing as witness before him.

SEC. 5. Any witness who refuses to be sworn, or who refuses to appear or testify, or who disobeys any lawful order of said Fire Marshal, or who fails or refuses to produce any book, paper or document touching any matter under examination, or who is guilty of any contemptuous conduct during any of the proceedings of the Fire Marshal in the matter of said investigation or inquiry, after being summoned to give testimony in relation to any matter under investigation as aforesaid, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor; and it shall be the duty of the Fire Marshal to cause all such offenders to be prosecuted. Any person being convicted of any such misdemeanor shall be fined in a sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars (\$25.00). Provided, however, that any person so convicted shall have the right of appeal.

SEC. 6. All investigations held by or under the direction of the Fire Marshal may, in his discretion, be private, and persons other than those required to be present may be excluded from the place where such investigation is held, and witnesses may be kept separate and apart from each other and not allowed to communicate with each other until they have been examined.

SEC. 7. The Fire Marshal shall have the authority at all time of day or night, when necessary, in the performance of the duties imposed upon him by the provisions of this ordinance, to enter upon and examine any building or premises where any fire has occurred, and other buildings and premises adjoining or near the same, which authority shall be exercised only with reason and good discretion.

SEC. 8. The Fire Marshal, upon complaint of any person having an interest in any building or property adjacent, and without any complaint, shall have a right at all reasonable hours, for the purpose of examination, to enter into and upon all buildings and premises within the city, and it shall be his duty, quarterly or more often, to enter upon and make, or cause to be entered upon and made, a thorough examination of all mercantile, manufacturing and public buildings, together with the premises belonging thereto. Whenever he shall find any building or other structure which, for want of repair, or by reason of age or dilapidated condition, or for any cause, is especially liable to fire, and which is so situated as to endanger other buildings or property, or so occupied that fire would endanger persons or property therein, and whenever he shall find an improper or dangerous arrangement of stoves, ranges, furnaces or other heating appliances of any kind whatsoever, including chimneys, flues, and pipes with which the same may be connected, or a dangerous arrangement of lighting devices or systems, or a dangerous or unlawful storage of explosives, compounds, petroleum, gasoline, kerosene, dangerous chemicals, vegetable products, ashes, combustible, inflammable and refuse materials, or other conditions which may be dangerous in character or liable to cause or promote fire or create conditions dangerous to the firemen or occupants, he shall order the same to be removed or remedied, and such

order shall be forthwith complied with by the owner or occupant of said building or premises. Provided, however, that if said owner or occupants deems himself aggrieved by such order, he may, within five (5) days, appeal to the Mayor, who shall investigate the cause of the complaint and unless by his authority the order is revoked, such order shall remain in force and be forthwith complied with by said owner or occupant.

SEC. 9. Any owner or occupant of a building or other structure or premises, who shall keep or maintain the same when, for want of repair, or by reason of age or dilapidated condition, or for any cause, it is especially liable to fire, and which is so situated as to endanger buildings or property of others, or is especially liable to fire and which is so occupied that fire would endanger other persons or their property therein, shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than fifty dollars (\$50.00).

SEC. 10. Any owner or occupant of any building or other structure, or premises, who shall keep or maintain the same with an improper arrangement of a stove, range, furnace, or other heating appliance of any kind whatever, including chimneys, flues, and pipes with which the same may be connected, so as to be dangerous in the matter of fire, or health, or safety of persons or property of others; or who shall keep or maintain any building, other structure or premises with an improper arrangement of a lighting device or system, or with a storage of explosives, petroleum, gasoline, kerosene, chemicals, vegetable products, ashes, combustibles, inflammable materials, refuse, or with any other condition which shall be dangerous in character to the persons, health or property of others; or which shall be dangerous in the matter of promoting, augmenting or causing fires; or which shall create conditions dangerous to firemen, or occupants of such building, structure or premises other than the maintainers thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than fifty dollars (\$50.00).

SEC. 11. No prosecution shall be brought under Sections 9 and 10 of this ordinance until the order provided for in Section 8 be given, and the party notified shall fail or refuse to comply with the same.

SEC. 12. The penalties provided for herein shall be recovered by the city in the same manner as provided by law for the enforcement of fines, forfeitures, and punishments for offenses against the city.

SEC. 13. Every day's maintenance of any of the conditions prohibited in any of the foregoing sections shall be a distinct and separate offense.

SEC. 14. All misdemeanors herein provided for shall be prosecuted, and all fines and forfeitures herein provided for shall be recovered and enforced, in the same manner as provided by law for the enforcement of fines, forfeitures, penalties and punishments for offenses generally against the city.

SEC. 15. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SEC. 16. Whereas, public safety demands the immediate passage of this ordinance, creating the office of Fire Marshal and empowering the said officer to discharge the duties herein set out, therefore an emergency exists demanding a suspension of the rules requiring ordinances to be read on three several days, said rule is hereby suspended, and this ordinance is placed on its first reading and final passage, and shall be effective and in full force from and after its passage and approval.

POULTRY

DIRECT TIME TO CAPONIZE

Responsible to Determine by Age as All Birds Do Not Develop Alike—Watch Comb.

This is a question asked more frequently than any other by novices. It is a very important question, and the answer should be so simple that anyone could understand. It is impossible to tell the best time to caponize by the age, because all birds do not develop alike; neither do birds of the same breed and hatch; some will be small of body with large heads and wattle developments, while others will show very little comb and wattle and vigorous.

With any breed when the comb and wattle begin to grow you may know the reproductive organs are growing correspondingly; when the little comb begins to recede you may know

For the organs are receiving more blood for their very rapid growth; as they receive more blood the danger of operation is greater, for the artery carrying the blood to the testicle is larger and in more danger of being injured.

Therefore, if you wish to operate at the perfect time watch the growth of the comb and wattles; when they are "showing red" is the best and proper time; then there will be little danger to the life of the bird, less pain and no "setback" to speak of; while if you wait until the comb is bright red and the wattles hang considerably there will be more danger of death and more "slips."

EARLY HATCHED FOWLS BEST

Pluck Mature So That They Begin to Lay in Fall When Fresh Egg Supply is Low.

Every fall hens take a vacation. In doing so they have very important business on hand. Typically feminine in nature, they insist upon having a new dress each fall. During their vacation they are engaged in shedding their old plumage and in growing new. Their energy is so occupied in this way that they lay few or no eggs. The process of molt or changing their plumage takes at least three months, the average, and it is due to this "three months' vacation" that the supply of fresh eggs is so scarce during the fall and winter. Early hatched pullets mature so that they begin to lay in the fall and early winter, and it is upon these early hatched pullets that the poultry keeper must depend for the supply of eggs during the time the old hens are molting and resting from their labor as egg producers. No if you want eggs when the old hens have not laying, be sure that you hatch early and have a nice bunch of early hatched pullets coming along to supply the eggs at that time.

MALES FAVOR SCRATCH FEED

Plan to Have Medium Sized Peas Than Too Large, Especially for Breeding.

Outdoors usually eat more scratch feed and less mash than the pullets. Feeds which develop a medium sized bird are better than to have the chickens develop into too large roosters, especially those to be saved for breeding purposes.

POULTRY NOTES

As the chicks grow they need more food. It does not pay to let them starve.

Beware of musty, mouldy, sour, or rancid food. It is sure to cause trouble.

Tough grass is of no value as a green food. Better sow some quick growing crop.

Feed hoppers greatly reduce the loss. If they are kept filled, the chicks will never go hungry.

Two-year-old hens had better be sold to the market. They seldom pay for their food if kept over the third year.

Old and young should be included in the ration for both young and old. To neglect this would be a mistake.

ROAD BUILDING

INSTRUMENT TO TEST SOILS

By Means of Modern Apparatus it is Possible to Obtain Most Valuable Information.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

An instrument for testing soils on which roads are to be built has been devised by the bureau of public roads of the United States Department of Agriculture. It consists of a metal disk resting on the soil and supporting a cylinder into which shot can be poured. The apparatus is held in position vertically by means of a tripod, at the top of which is mounted a small dial that tells to one-tenth of an inch how far the disk sinks into the soil as shot is poured into the cylinder. By means of the instrument it is possible to get information as to how the soil will act in wet weather.

The kind of soil beneath a road surface has a great deal to do with how it will stand up under modern traffic, and engineers look upon this as an important consideration in determining the kind of road to be built. This is confirmed by a number of instances where two sections of the same road have been built in exactly the same manner and subjected to the same traffic but on different types of soil. One section has lasted well while the other has broken up in a manner that can only be explained by a lack of supporting power of the soil beneath the road.

The bureau has for some time been investigating this question along vari-

ous lines both in the field and in the laboratory, studying the characteristics of different soils and experimenting with means to keep down the moisture content of the soil and thus increase its bearing power. The latest development has been the new device

FILMS SHOW ROAD BUILDING

Scenes Depicting Actual Construction of Various Types of Highways Are Displayed.

Close-ups of the activities of the bureau of public roads are contained in two films released, "Building Bituminous Roads" and "Mixed Asphalt Pavements." The new films show how Uncle Sam, who has become the world's greatest road builder through the federal-aid road act, makes use of bituminous materials in the construction of the Nation's highways.

"Building Bituminous Roads" deals directly with the surface treated and penetration macadam type of bituminous roads.

"Mixed Asphalt Pavements" embraces the construction of asphaltic concrete and sheet asphalt roads, and carries the audience from the paving plant, where the materials are mixed, to the completed highway, open for traffic. Scenes depicting the actual construction of the various types of roads were made under the direction of skilled engineers of the bureau of public roads, United States Department of Agriculture, and are designed to instruct the layman as well as the engineer in modern road-building practices. Several animated close-ups graphically depict the details of construction.

ROAD BUILDING IN KENTUCKY

Was First State to Conceive Idea of Highway Construction in the United States.

"In 1821 the people of Kentucky inaugurated the first state road building policy ever conceived in these United States," according to Edward S. Jordan of the highways committee of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, speaking recently at the University of Kentucky.

Long Alaskan Highway.
An automobile highway, available for tourists, has been completed in Alaska, covering a distance of 270 miles, from Valdez to Fairbanks. The scenic attractions along this highway are said to be marvelous, because of canyons, dense forests, and the wilderness of the surrounding regions.

Good Roads Organization.
The American Road Builders' Association is the oldest and largest organization for good roads in the United States.

(6 per cent) per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of acquiring, improving, extending or constructing an electric light system within and for the City of PERRYTON, Texas, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Statutes 1911, and Article 882, Revised Statutes 1911, and amendments thereto, and the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas."

The said election shall be held at the Court House in the City of PERRYTON, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit:

Miss Nellie Perry, Clerk of Election.

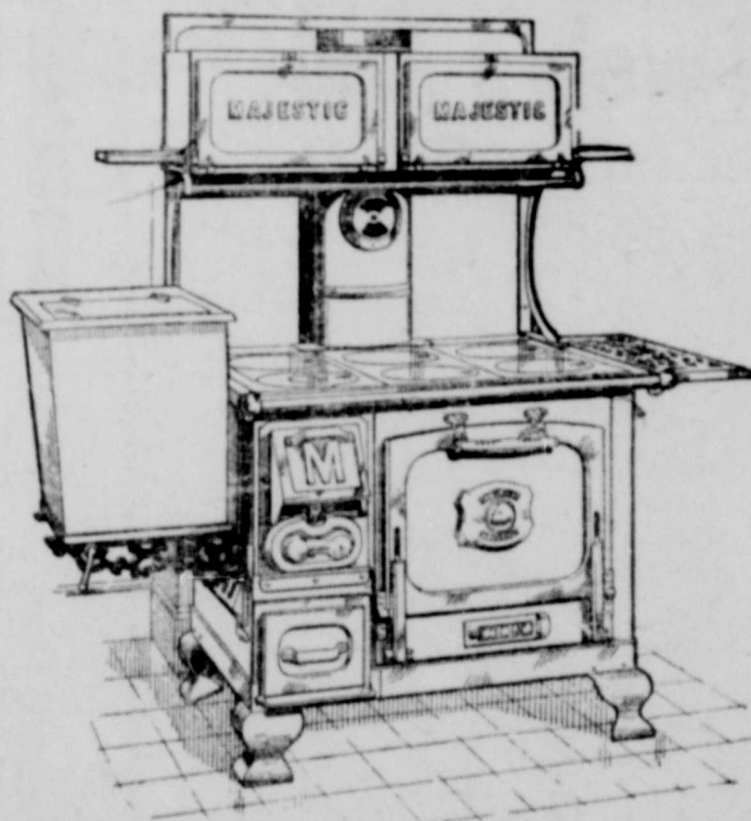

THE ADVERTISING GRAFTER

An advertising grafter hit town last week, and canvassed the merchants so he could raise enough money to carry him along thru the week as he journeyed in the Panhandle. He came to the Record office with a contract for having the printing done. When he found that he couldn't get the work done for about one-half the price it was really worth—and which would have been a loss to us—he took his little contract along with him and said he would get it printed at some cheap mail order house.

Ever since we have been in the newspaper business we have had experience with these transient advertising grafters. They are usually some fellow who is broke and who works the game to get a stake with.

One fellow came to Canadian and asked our price on a few thousand envelopes. The job amounted to \$35.

He laughed and said: "I am going to get orders from Canadian merchants for envelopes. If I can get the orders this job will bring me \$115." There was no merit to his scheme except to pick up some easy money. We wouldn't do the work and he left Canadian without the orders.
