Recipes in print are altogether different and many more satisfactory results are truly obtained by seeing the unique mixture of various foods, given so pleasingly and too, the enjoyment of being sociably entertained forming a nice combination.

Prizes are given each afternoon, furnished by each merchant co-operating in this school. A large number of prizes any housewife should be proud have been presented in compliment to their manifested interest.

A very delicious menu was prepared at the school yesterday afternoon, which consisted of recipes to follow. Added dishes are prepared each day and many given as prizes.

Attractive displays are arranged about the auditorium, showing to an advantage the new lines for winter, affording comfort to the home and individuals.

Chicken Fricassee With Noodles
One package of large size noodles, cooked quite tender, with 3 teaspoonfuls of shortening, 1 large onion, 3 teaspoonfuls of flour, added with 1 can of tomatoes. Mix 4 or 6 drops of tabasco sauce and spread well over chicken and noodles.

Date Cake
One package of chopped dates, 1 teaspoon of soda, 2 cups boiling water, 2-3 cup of lard, 2 cups of sugar, 3 eggs added one at a time and sift three cups of flour. Mix 3 teaspoons of K. C. baking powder and add 1-2 teaspoon of salt with another portion of salt well sifted and add 1 cup of pecans. Put together with caramel icing.

The popular orange nut bread was most deliciously baked together with a choice variety of other dishes.

Orange Nut Bread
Cut 5 oranges and use 1 teaspoon of soda with 1 cup of water, boil 5 minutes before adding 1 cup of sugar and another cup of water to replace the one cup drained off after baking five minutes and cook till mixture thickens. Add 1-2 teaspoon of melted shortening with 2 eggs and 1 cup of sweet milk, 1-2 cup of sugar, 3 1-2 cups of flour and 3 1-2 teaspoon of K. C. baking powder, 1 cup of nuts and mix together. Cook 1 1-2 hour at 350 degrees.

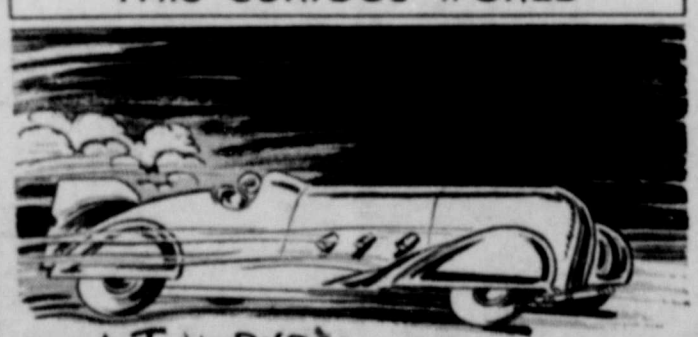

AN OCTOBER DRIVE FOR THE SALE OF MEDALLIONS

State Chairman Maury Hughes of the democratic committee has let it be known that a drive will be started Oct. 8 to sell at least 40,000 Roosevelt-Garner medallions, from which the major part of the campaign fund in Texas is supposed to come. Frank Schofield of Hill county, chairman of the state finance committee, has let it be known that Texas democrats have already contributed \$38,000 of the \$150,000 quota for the national campaign chest. Roosevelt-Garner medallions sell for a dollar and up "as the buyer is moved by his spirit." According to the totals of the July primaries there are 973,000 democrats in Texas. It should be an easy matter to raise a campaign fund of at least \$250,000 in Texas. If the democratic party is the party of the people then the people should defray the cost of the campaign in nation and state. A dollar speaks louder than a hundred words. It is impossible to direct campaigns, winning campaigns for the people, unless all the people are willing to do their part, in coin as well as conversation.

A LOUD CRY FOR THE RETURN OF THE INSULTS

Disgruntled bondholders are demanding the return of Samuel Insull from Paris to explain the details of how the collapse of his utilities caused a billion dollars to melt away. They are demanding the return of Martin Insull from Canada to tell how the concern under his management dwindled from a \$239,000,000 giant to a hopelessly insolvent orphan. Now the spotlights of the bankrupt courts of the federal government and Illinois state investigators are turned on the bankrupt concerns. These concerns three years ago had an approximate value of three billions. In adjudging several of the companies or subsidiaries bankrupt Federal Judge Walter C. Lindley told the stock holders to abandon hope of any recovery, that there was no chance of reorganization, no possibility that assets of sufficient character or amount to bring the stockholders any return whatsoever will ever be realized. Furthermore, he said that the most that can be hoped for is a distribution of dividends amongst creditors.

FINISH OF A GREAT ENGINEER

Col. John R. Slattery is dead at the early age of 55. He was one of the world famous engineers. In 1925 he abandoned a distinguished career of 25 years in the engineering corps of the United States army to assume the tremendous task of building for New York City the new Eighth avenue subway. For seven years he had labored day and night for the construction of this \$450,000,000 project. After the click of the first turnstile sounded the start of the subway he retired to his home, he died in his sleep, a victim of the vast machine he had built. For years he was the pride of the engineering corps of the army. He was drafted for the great work of building this gigantic and costly subway. He finished the job. He retired to his home. He turned his eyes to the wall and he passed out of the picture. Yes, "life is the queerest of propositions after all."

DID YOU EVER STOP TO THINK

JOHN TEMPLE GRAVES II, lecturer, and editorial columnist of the Birmingham (Ala.) Are-Herald, says: "Did you ever stop to think that truth does not change so much as it accumulates? All the talk of a new era to follow the depression may be very true, but other things are true as well and have been since the cave men carved their histories in stone. To forget the eternal verities for the certainties of a particular era is to expose that era to some such explosion as blew the last decade to bits. Men were talking of a 'new era' then, just as they are talking now, and in all the talk was a weird under-current of conviction that the old rules were repealed, that the old lids had been lifted, that there was no longer any top to anything, and that prosperity was going to pour equally forever on the economic sinner and the economic saint of our scheme. That conviction was exploded in the bitter Fall of 1929, and the detonations rang through three following years of the most frightful depression this nation has known. The forgotten verities made 'forgotten men' of us all."

Now we have, or seem about to have, another 'new era'—and another chance to remember the old rules while we are making new ones. We have a chance to remember that production is worth even more than distribution and that the farm is at least as important as the factory. We have a chance to remember that consumption and production are twin horses to the economic chariot and must move together or wreck the whiffle-tree. We have a chance to remember that there is a vast difference between gambling on the future and intelligently anticipating it. We have a chance to remember that there is a certain indispensable balance of gold among nations and wealth among men, and that neither people nor realms are going to buy from us indefinitely unless we allow them buying power. And we have a chance to remember that in the great business of distributing things the eternal rule is, first, to get the goods, and, then, to tell the world."

October Promises to Be One of Our "Hottest" Months



HALF A MILLION HOMES MAY BE RELIEVED OF STATE TAX IN NOVEMBER

AUSTIN.—Texas will free 565,270 homes from property taxation (up to \$3,000 value) if a proposed amendment to the state constitution is adopted at the Nov. 8 general election.

As that number is more than half the total number of votes ever cast in a Texas election, it is practically a foregone conclusion the amendment will be adopted.

The figures are approximate. Questionnaires now are out asking for accurate figures from each of the 254 counties in the state on the number of homesteads, that will be affected by the proposed amendment. The figures used are taken from federal census reports. They include 190,515 farms in Texas operated by the owners.

Some persons own and operate more than one farm but it is estimated that the duplications occurring for that reason are offset by excluding all of two other farm classes, though a few of these classes will fall within the exempted class.

There are 301,060 farms listed in Texas as operated by tenants. A number of these, however, may fall within the homestead classification as actual residences is not always a requisite to property being a homestead. There are also 3,314 farms operated by farm corporations with managers in charge.

In cities and towns there are 471,802 families living in rented homes, according to the 1930 census.

Homestead owners whose homes are assessed at not over \$3,000 valuation will escape all state ad valorem tax on them. As the average valuation for tax purposes is 50 per cent in practice, it will mean a man with a \$6,000 home will escape state ad valorem tax upon it.

If the home is assessed at \$4,000 he will pay state ad valorem tax on only \$1,000.

How many homes and farms with a valuation under \$3,000 is also a matter of estimate. Again using census figures as a basis for an estimate, the probable number is 294,238.

Present tax exemption in Texas is carried in a proviso to Section 1 of Article VIII of the State Constitution. This says: "Provided that \$250 worth of household and kitchen furniture, belonging to each family in this state shall be exempt from taxation."

The proposed amendment, if adopted, will write Section 1-

into this article of the constitution saying:

"Three thousand dollars of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for state purposes; nothing herein shall apply within those counties or other political subdivisions now receiving any remission of state taxes, but upon the expiration of such period of remission this section shall become applicable within such counties and political subdivisions."

Omission of the tax remitted areas is done because the state tax for different periods is collected in them and applied to retiring bonds have been issued for storm, flood or other protection, where the state may remit taxes.

Places thus affected are Aransas, Brooks, Cameron, Duval, Jim Hogg, Jim Wells, Kleberg, Nueces, Willacy, Orange, Galveston, Wharton, San Patricio and Hidalgo counties; road district No. 23 in Brazoria county; commissioners precincts 1, 2 and 4 in Matagorda county and commissioners precinct 2 in Jefferson county. In Cameron county the remission extends only to the levy of any amount over 10 cents on \$100 valuation.

A homestead in Texas not in a town or city consists of not more than 200 acres of land with the improvements. The land may be in one or more parcels.

The homestead in a city, town or village consists of a lot or lots not to exceed \$5,000 value at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of the improvements; provided that the same shall be used for the purposes of a home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of the family; provided, also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change it as a homestead when no other homestead is acquired.

Courts have held that no formal steps are necessary to "designate" of a homestead, the intent to make it such being the governing fact.

GIANT SEA TURTLE CAUGHT. RICHMOND, Va.—A sea turtle weighing 16 pounds, measuring 36 inches around, and the shell 21 inches in length, was caught at Wilson's creek, a tributary to the York river, with hook and line. The catch was made by John L. Petty, Centerville. He was fishing with a hand line and using a strip of bacon for bait.

Car of Flour Arrives in Cisco

The Chamber of Commerce has just received notice from J. E. Spencer of Cisco, chairman of Eastland County Red Cross committee, that another carload of flour has been received at Cisco, the quota for Eastland being 300 24-pound sacks.

This in all probability will be the last car of flour to be received through this source, and will have to last all the winter.

However, an application has been made by Dr. H. B. Tanner, secretary of the Eastland chamber; Wayne Hickey, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce, and J. E. Spencer, secretary of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce to the reconstruction finance corporation for a loan to be applied to the aid of the sufferers throughout Eastland county.

"We, therefore, urge our fellow Democrats to work with and make their contributions through the county and district organizations which have been set up throughout the state under the direction of these headquarters."

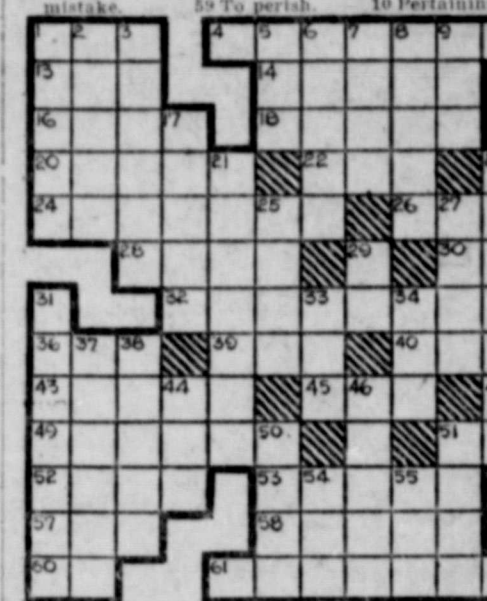

Weekly Sunday School Lesson

The Christian in the Family

Text: Luke 2:40-52; 10:38-42.
The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Oct. 9.

By WM. E. GILROY, D. D.,
Editor of The Congregationalist.
The life of two homes is presented to us in the study of this lesson—the home of Jesus in Nazareth, where he grew up with his parents, and the home of Martha and Mary and their brother, Lazarus, which was to be in a sense the home of the Master in the years of his later life. The two passages emphasize two aspects of home life, and one of them emphasizes particularly some of the problems of home life.

The reference to the childhood of Jesus is very brief, but it is effective and revealing. "Jesus grew and waxed strong, filled with wisdom, and the grace of God was upon him." What could give a more wonderful story of a great childhood than these simple words? And if we believe with any reality in the earthly life of Jesus, and that his divinity was a divinity manifested in a life that was truly human, we must understand what could only have been the nature of

the home life and parentage of Jesus.

We have, in the portion presented for our lesson, one phase of this home life in the story of the pilgrimage to Jerusalem. The parents of Jesus were devout. They had brought him up in the wholesome atmosphere of response to the high and true things in their religion. So it was that in this later childhood of Jesus, when he was gradually appreciating the meaning of things, the record is that "Jesus advanced in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and men." That also is a remarkable description of a boy of 12.

In the glimpses that we have into the home in Bethany, where Martha and Mary lived, we enter into the realm of home problems. The home is not simply a happy and desirable place, where everything happens itself. It is a place where there are very definite duties involving labors and relationships. It is a place where neglect and inefficiency are very serious, and it is a place in which ideals are tested.

We must not today judge Mary and Martha by the paucity of the

record. We must avoid taking the part of Mary, who seemed to be willing to let Martha do most of the drudgery; and we must equally be careful not to take the part of Martha, who seemed to have much justice on her side in claiming that there were certain tasks and duties that had to be fulfilled regardless of higher attainments and values.

Probably both Mary and Martha were right. There might have been a little more consideration on the part of one, and more vision on the part of the other. Jesus apparently sympathized with Mary, because he felt that Martha was rather too much troubled and anxious. Probably that was exactly the case.

It is one thing to perform necessary tasks well, but it is quite another thing to become so fussy and careful about a home that the very peace and contentment of the home are destroyed.

It is possible to become so engrossed in the outward work and maintenance of the home that there is forgetfulness of what the home is for. After all, it is primarily a place to live, and a place in which to seek the highest values of personal love and relationship. Everything in the home ought to minister to these things.

Employment On Increase For the Second Month

AUSTIN—For the second consecutive month, there has been a gain in the number of workers in 13 core firms, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. The 930 establishments reporting to the Bureau of Business and the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics had 66,172 workers on their payrolls on Sept. 15 as compared with 63,689 on the corresponding date a month earlier. "This increase of 4.9 per cent in the number of employees stands out as an unusually good showing in comparison with changes between August and September in previous years," the University Bureau report said. "Last year, for example, there was a drop of 9.5 per cent; in 1930, there was a drop of 4.5 per cent. It is necessary to go back to 1929 to find another gain—and that was for only 1.3 per cent."

These successive monthly gains in employees which are due, apparently, to other than seasonal factors, have cut down the decline in the number of workers as compared with a year ago. As compared with September, 1931, the number of workers on payrolls for the month just passed was only 12.7 per cent behind; the decline has been as much as 19.9 per cent, which occurred in May, 1932.

"Purely seasonal influences brought about substantial increases in the number of workers at bakeries, confectioneries, cotton oil mills, cotton compresses, men's and women's clothing manufacturers, but a large number of other classifications also showed gains, notable among which were lumber and saw mills, cement

Chinese Warlord Urges a Meeting

By United Press.
PEIFING, China.—Marshal Wu Pei-fu, once the dominant warlord in China, who has been waiting here for an opportunity to launch a "come-back" campaign, has aroused political circles by distributing copies of a letter he has written to Emperor Hirohito of Japan.

Marshal Wu, who failed to regain his former power after the resignation of Marshal Chang Hsueh-liang, urged a conference of the elder statesmen of both China and Japan in an attempt to reach a basis for solving the crisis in the Far East, in his letter. He urged the immediate cessation of all hostilities. He placed the blame for China's current troubles on the shoulders of the military element. Declaring that China and Japan are "brother countries," Marshal Wu expressed belief that Sino-Japanese problems can be settled by negotiation.

Chief interest in the letter is attached to the complete reversal of Marshal Wu's former attitude. He sent a copy of his letter to the League of Nations' Commission of Inquiry, which he has condemned for failing to settle the controversy. It is only a few weeks since Marshal Wu demanded a Chinese punitive expedition charged with responsibility for recovering Manchuria by force of arms. He always has prided himself on the fact that he never has been a supporter of Japanese-influenced groups of China.

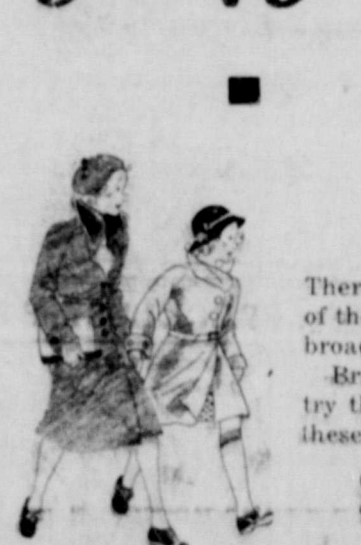

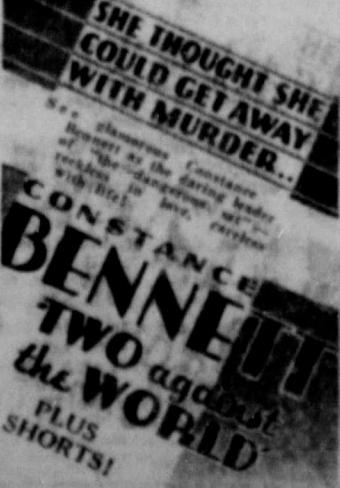
