Home Demonstration And Farm Agents Placed Here

Action Taken With No Cost To The County

Miss Miller And Mr. Griffin Serve Three Counties Ninety Days

Miss Myrtle Miller and O. P. Griffin Thursday were stationed here as home demonstration and county farm agents to serve Howard, Martin and Midland counties for the next three months.

Location of the pair here was made possible through an appropriation by the state and federal governments and was effected without expense to the county involved.

Miss Miller was formerly home demonstration agent in Gray and Hunt counties. Griffin was county agent for Brown county.

Miss Bernice Hill, district home demonstration agent, was here Thursday with Miss Miller and met with two county commissioners and the county judge for a brief period during the morning.

In providing funds out of which the pair will receive pay, the director of extension service listed the entire state as a prospective field. Largely through efforts of Miss Hill these three counties were selected.

Wildcat Tests Being Started In Eastern Howard And Ector Counties By Lee C. Harrison And Associates

Progress Reported On Dawson County Deep Wildcat And Helms' No. 1 Hilger In Glasscock

L. C. Harrison and Hugh Carlin's No. 1 Texas Land and Mortgage company-Broderick and Chevrolet—a test one and a half miles north and west of Harrison's production along the western edge of the Denman-Dodge pool of eastern Howard county, was spudded in Thursday. Fred Reed of Tulsa is the drilling contractor.

This marks the first development of a program planned on nine sections which formerly composed the Rhotan ranch, on which Harrison and others recently obtained leases.

It was the second test started within a week in eastern Howard. The other is Suddreth and Morris No. 1 C. D. Reed, more than a mile north of the Denman-Dodge pool production.

Location of the new test by Harrison and Corrigan is southeast corner of southwest quarter of section 4, block 30, Texas and Pacific Railway company survey.

Tools are being moved in for a new oil test in Ector county, a number of a mile south of L. C. Harrison and others' No. 1 Addis Estate producer which recently opened a new pool about four miles west of Odessa.

The first test will be at one of seven locations sited following the closing of a deal between Harrison, local operator, and the Waggoner Western Corporation headed by W. T. Waggoner, Jr., of Fort Worth.

Waggoner Western Corp. and Harrison's No. 2-A Addis is located in the northwest corner of the southwest 40 acres of the north-west quarter of section 35.

The Waggoner Western Corporation has taken a half interest with Harrison in the north 80 acres of the southwest quarter of section 35 and the southwest 40 acres of the north-west quarter of that section.

R. T. Helms' No. 1 Hilger, wildcat test in the southeastern corner of Glasscock county, 320 feet from the north and east lines of section 18, block 34, township 3 south, Texas and Pacific Railway company survey, was reported drilling Thursday at 455 feet.

Mr. Helms has held leases in the vicinity of this test for more than ten years and is now backing his judgment by drilling a well. He drilled several tests on the McJowell ranch several years ago.

Woodbridge and Albaugh's No. 1 Robinson, deep test 12 miles northwest of Lamesa in Dawson county, was drilling Thursday below 250 feet after setting 20-inch casing at 209 feet.

The test, which is scheduled to go to a depth of 650 feet or more if necessary to find production, is located in the center of the north-west quarter of section 46, block M. EL&RR Railway company survey.

Cleaning—
A confidential housecleaning of bank examiners is being quietly conducted.

At least one so far has been asked to find another job. He is the man who showed flagrant favoritism in permitting a group of large banks in an eastern industrial section to open while he kept their competitors closed. In a confidential investigation the authorities have found that not more than four of the ten banks in the group should have been given such preferred treatment.

There seems to be no use raising a fuss about it now as the matter probably will not be made public.

Other charges of favoritism reach up to the controller's office. Few are clear cut. Many can be traced directly to confusion.

Those in charge have reached the conclusion that the best thing to do now that the horse has been stolen is to get a new lot of stable boys. There will be an exodus of old ones from the Treasury shortly.

Rails—

A hectic time was had by all backstage in the framing of the Railroad Bill.

After the details got out Mr. Roosevelt was required to change it every 15 minutes to meet objections. The rail lobbyists ran around until they were dizzy trying to keep up with it. Finally they gave up, agreeing they would believe nothing until they saw the actual final wording of the bill.

The inner dispute centered around how far federal control should go. The rail chiefs thought it should go far enough to bolster bonds but not far enough for actual federal operation. Labor wanted it to go all the way or not at all.

It was Mr. Roosevelt's first test in pacifying the pickering elements which engulfed Mr. Hoover.

The official whisper in federal directorship of railroads is that the dictator will hasten to put the billion of railroad valuations through a wringer. About six billion of water is supposed to come out.

Some of the President's advisers think they could squeeze more, but that will be enough.

Rev. Spann Holds Coahoma Meeting

County Buys \$8,000 Bonds Of Own Issue

Surplus Still Remains In Sinking Fund For That Issue

Howard county has just paid off \$40,000 of its \$100,000 road bond issue, due in 1931 with option to pay now, at 95 and accrued interest.

Interest on the bonds was due April 5, a day or two before the purchase was completed by the county. By terms of the deal the county saved \$4000 on principal in addition receiving the accrued interest on the \$40,000 and obtaining higher rate of interest on the bonds than the one per cent received on daily bank balances.

Purchase of these bonds by the county reduced to \$50,000 the amount of the \$100,000 issue outstanding. The county still has in the interest and sinking fund a surplus of more than \$1,700 above the amount that must be set aside annually to properly protect the issue.

East Texas Closed Generally On Order Of Rail Commission

KILGORE, (AP)—The railroad commission's order closing 10,000 East Texas for five days was being obeyed generally Thursday, according to reports to the commission's field headquarters here.

Sixty-two operators hold injunctions against the commission.

Officials believed they would not close their producers.

A combined force of more than 100 men went into the field soon after the order was issued Wednesday night.

'Faith' Topic Of J. D. Harvey

Attendance At Church Of Christ Reported Gratifying

J. D. Harvey of Colorado, who is now in a splendid meeting with the Church of Christ, last night on the subject of "Faith." He used as a starting place, a text Second Corinthians 5:7. "For we walk by faith, not by sight." He illustrated the difference between faith and sight, declaring that faith is based on testimony from God's word while sight is based on opinion and feeling. He then marshalled before his audience numbers and numbers of Scriptures dealing with the subject of faith. The speaker then spent a few moments commenting on James 2:20. "But without works is dead," saying that faith without action or obedience is dead.

He said in part: "There are many examples of dead faith in the Scriptures. In John 12:42 we read about the rulers, many in number, who believed on Him, but because of fear of being put out of the synagogue—the fear of public scorn and ridicule, they would not confess Him. Many of the same type of fellows are living today—some right here in Big Spring. These fellows had faith, but it was dead faith. So the man who says that we are justified by faith only is in it's same class."

The speaker then quoted to show how faith comes. "So then faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God." Romans 10:17. After showing how faith comes, he then demonstrated what faith does for the believer. The high point of the sermon centered around the fact of when faith saves. He quoted John 3:36. "He that believeth on the Son hath eternal life; but he that obeyeth not the Son shall not see life." The speaker then listed a number of passages of Scripture showing the works of obedience that makes faith perfect, which are as follows: (1) Love, Gal. 5:6; (2) Repentance, Acts 18:25-26; (3) Confession, Romans 10:10; (4) Baptism, Acts 2:41; (5) Sacrifice, Heb. 11:18; (6) A choice for the right, Heb. 11:24; (7) A shield to the believer, Eph. 6:16; (8) Understanding, Heb. 11:3; (9) Victory, 1 John 5:4.

There was a gratifying increase in attendance over the preceding evening service.

AUSTIN, (UP)—What is a lobbyist like, what does he do, and what does he mean in the civic life of Texas and in the legislative pattern in which 6,000,000 people live?

Let us choose for exhibit A, Roy Miller, former Corpus Christi publisher, former mayor of that city and public relations director of the Texas Gulf Sulphur company.

Miller is a large, likable, ruddy-faced man of immaculate dress and commanding manner, who reminds one of a more sociable and more approachable Herbert Hoover.

He appeared before the House Committee on revenue and taxation the other night to speak against two tax bills, one would increase the Texas tax on sulphur from 75 cents a ton to \$1. The other would increase it to \$1.50.

Miller spoke for nearly four hours on two separate evenings. We learned the charge that Texas Gulf Sulphur Company had paid \$100,000 to the legislature for a special session.

House Refuses To Print Bill On Minority Report, Vote 65 To 45

AUSTIN (AP)—The administration's sales tax bill was killed Thursday when the house refused to print it on minority report.

The vote was 65 to 45.

The bill, sponsored by Governor Ferguson, provided for a tax of one-fourth of one per cent on sales by manufacturers, jobbers and wholesalers and one and a half per cent on retail sales. A two per cent tax was proposed on gross receipts of utilities and amusement operators.

Mrs. Fisher bought a small fifty-cent plant from E. B. Ribble's, three years ago. Today it has two runners that will touch the ceiling. One has grown all the way to the ceiling and is now growing down to the floor.

Considering that the stems seldom exceed three or four feet, this record is a remarkable one.

Mrs. Fisher's plant has fourteen blooms on it in clusters from eight to ten inches across. Mr. Ribble says he seldom sees a begonia grow as large as this one has.

The unusual thing about begonias is that both male and female flowers grow on the same plant instead of different plants. They are different in form and readily recognizable. There are 300 varieties of begonias but this particular begonia originated in Brazil, was carried to France and there developed for commercial trade. Its botanical name is *Carolinade Lucerne*.

A subdued light is best for begonias. Mrs. Fisher has grown her plant under ideal conditions and that explains why it, along with her London sword ferns, has attained such an enormous size.

The Right to Hoard

SANTA MONICA, Calif., April 6.—In traveling across the country it is not easy to keep in touch with what is being said privately in Washington. But I have seen a few articles written by veteran correspondents in Washington which betray considerable anxiety at the accumulation of powers by the Administration and some nervousness over the extent to which public policy is tending to override individual conduct. The government and the nation have been indeed moving very rapidly away from ideas which Mr. Harding once described as normalcy and toward conceptions of social responsibility which would have been utterly inconceivable during the post-war decade. many different sorts of people I have talked to in crossing the continent I have yet to meet any one who objected in principle to the direction in which the Administration has been moving. The farm bill alone is seriously criticized, and the criticisms here do not involve objection to the theory of government action in aid of agriculture, but turn, rather, upon the administrative complexity of the bill and upon the arbitrariness of its objectives. But even the criticisms of the farm bill are not intense. The country appears to have become convinced that a very considerable measure of social control over competition, individualistic, speculative economic enterprise is necessary and desirable.

An interesting sidelight on all this is furnished by the discussion of the vital problem of hoarding of gold and currency. In a recent article Mr. Mark Sullivan protests very forcibly at the notion that any one should consider measures designed to put pressure upon hoarders of currency. For some reason, which he does not explain, "a regards pressure upon hoarders of gold as acceptable but pressure upon hoarders of currency he regards as un-American. "I am willing," he says, "to defend the right of any man and every man to keep whatever part of his money he chooses in whatever place he chooses, in his bank or in his pocket, or under his arm in an iron pot buried in the

back yard." That is a very generous offer, but I am afraid Mr. Sullivan can not make it good. If "every man" decided to keep all his money in them mattress the monetary system of this country would be completely ruined and practically universal bankruptcy would ensue. The attempt to convert all bank deposits into currency would not merely close the banks, but would abolish them. If every man did what Mr. Sullivan thinks every man has a right to do the attempt to convert all the assets of the banks into cash would completely destroy the assets of the bank. The currency which would then be put in the mattress would not only not be redeemable in gold, but would simply be first money.

Now, it does not seem to me to be sound philosophy to say that every man has a right to do anything which, in fact, it is impossible for every man to do. If it is impossible for all the automobiles in America to drive up Pennsylvania Avenue at 11 a. m. on April 1, then the right of every man to drive his car when and where he chooses just does not exist. If a modern currency system on the gold standard can not be operated if every man wishes to convert all his deposits into gold then it is absurd to talk about the right of every man to withdraw gold freely. If a modern financial system, with gold convertibility suspended, can not be operated if every man tries to convert all deposits into currency, then there is no absolute right to hoard currency.

For, since it is impossible for every man to do what Mr. Sullivan says he has the right to do, namely, put all his money in the mattress—what happens to those who do hoard are those who are trying to be smarter than those who do not. They are trying to obtain special security for themselves at the expense of others. In their efforts to be perfectly safe themselves they make the position of all others much more unsafe. If they carry the thing to its logical conclusion, however, they ruin everybody, including themselves. There can, therefore, be no right to hoard any more than there can be a right to seize the best lifeboats at sea or to get the best food in a beleaguered city. Modern currencies and modern banks, at the gold standard, money and credit are based upon the assumption that the people who use them will behave in certain normal ways, and when they do not behave that way the whole mechanism falls into disorder.

It follows that the government and public opinion are not only entitled to insist upon standards by which the credit and currency mechanism shall be operated, but that they must impose such standards. The standards for those who manage the money and credit and are the trustees of the deposits are the banking laws. Those laws are obviously going to be drastically reformed. But standards of conduct which apply to depositors are also necessary and while there are practical difficulties in writing such standards into the law, there is no reason in principle why such standards should not be invoked by public opinion and emergencies put into law. The banker who manages other people's money must

obviously be held accountable. But you or I or any other man who wishes to enjoy the advantages of a banking system also has a social obligation. Thus we hold the management of a theater accountable for sound construction and safe exits in case of fire, but every individual in the audience is also accountable for not flying into a panic and starting a stampede.

In our social order it is an impossible form of individualism to say, as Mr. Sullivan does, that the depositor has no social obligation. The financial crisis since 1921 has shown quite clearly the menace of the violent movement of deposits from one banking center to another. This sort of thing has broken down one banking system after another. Now, of course, it is true that the principal remedy in the long run is to restore confidence in banks by reforming the banks. But in the short run, in order to overcome the crisis, pressure on the hoarder is equally necessary once there are banks open which are reasonably secure.

This point has now been reached in the United States with the opening of national banks under government approval and with what amounts to a moral guaranty that the reopened banks will not be permitted to fail. Having done this and assumed the obligation which it implies, the nation has every moral right to call upon the hoarder to play his part. It would have a perfect right, if it was deemed wise to do so, to put a heavy tax upon the possession of monetary gold. It is in practice more difficult to penalize the hoarding of currency, but if laws could be devised which would make the hoarding of currency inconvenient and expensive, I know of no reason in morals why such laws should be regarded as objectionable.

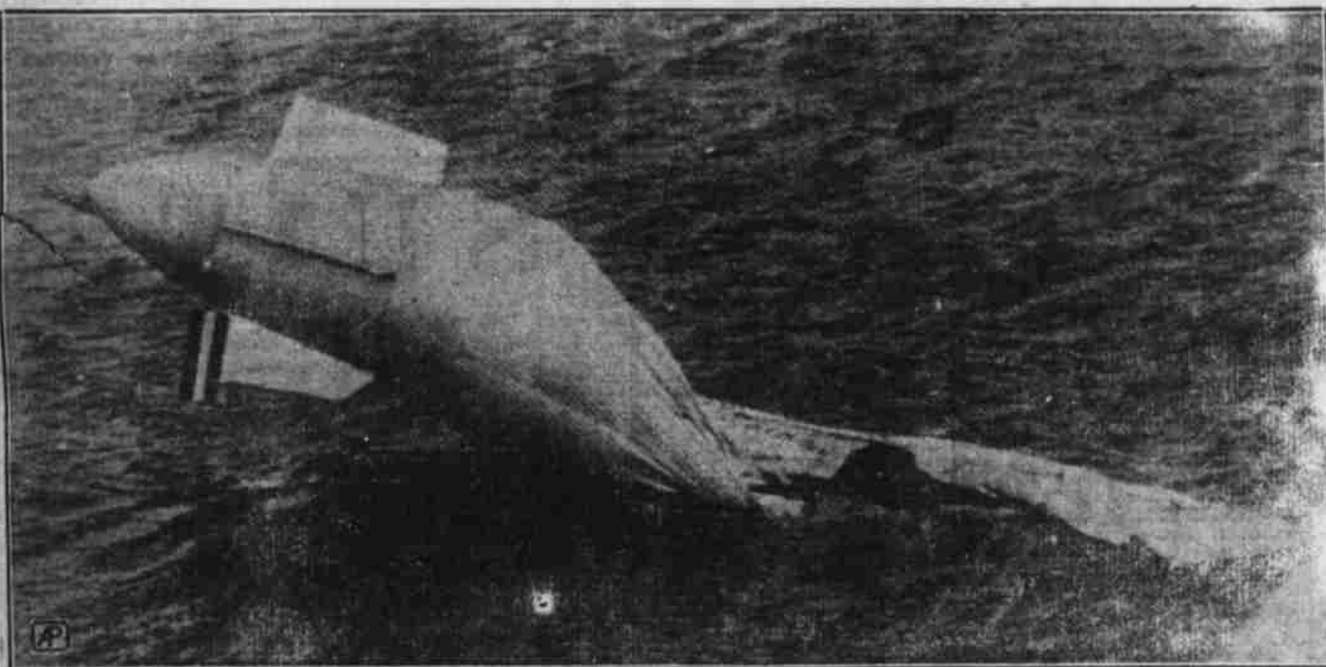

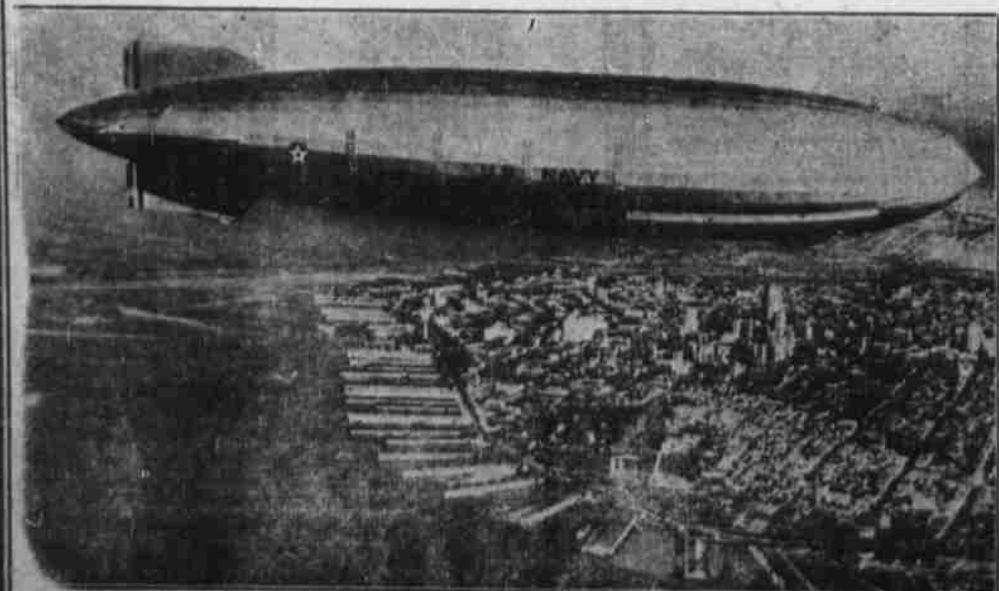

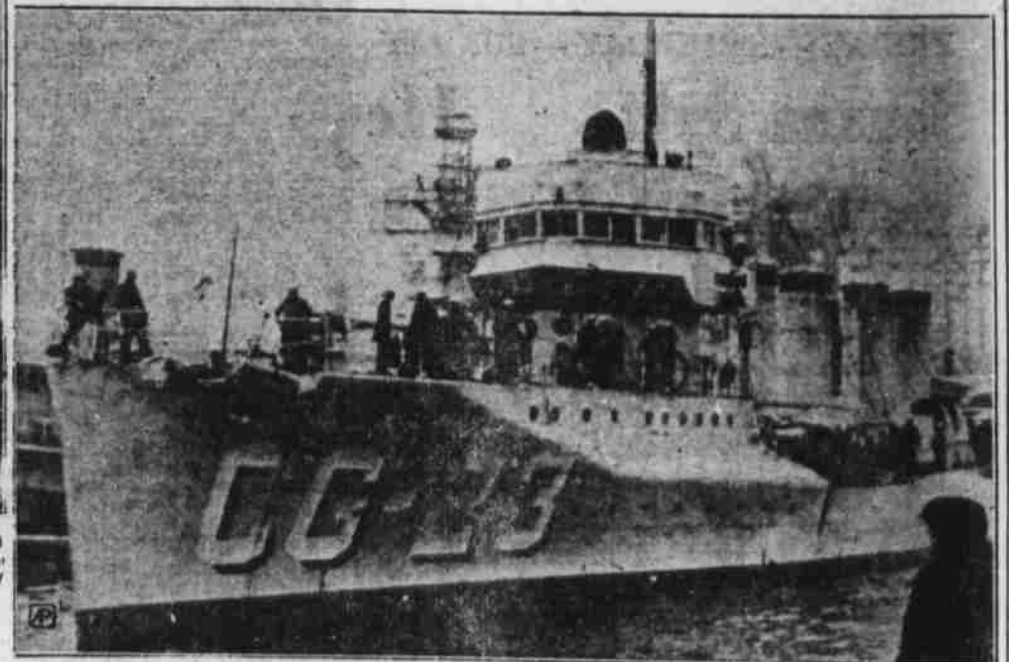

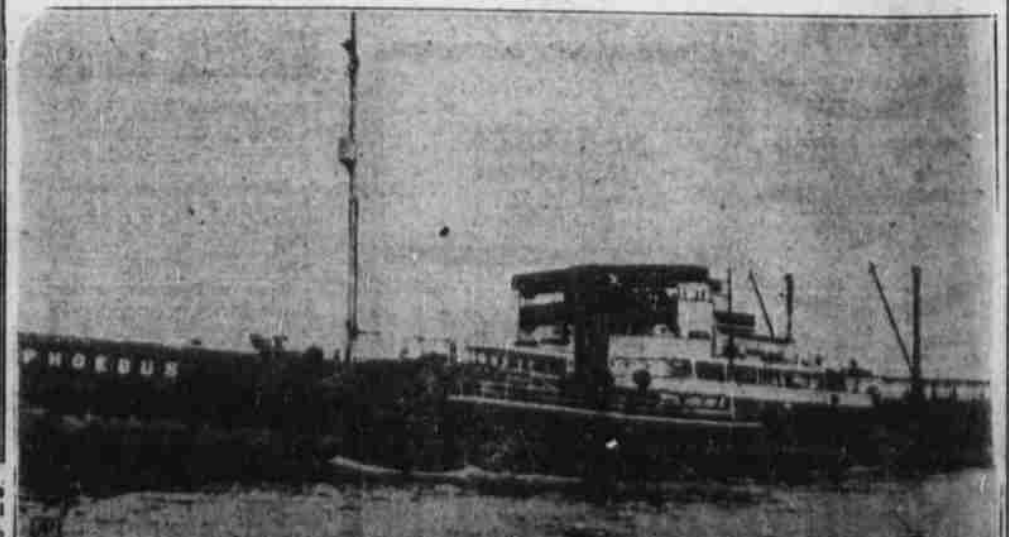

DESTROYER ARRIVES WITH THREE AKRON SURVIVORS



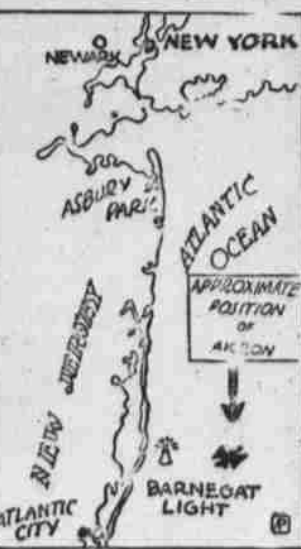
This Associated Press telephoto shows the coast guard destroyer Tucker as it arrived at the Brooklyn navy yard with the three survivors of the Akron tragedy.

AUSTIN, (UP) — Reversion over an amendment by Senator George Pugh to a fee bill has nearly broken up harmony among the Dallas county legislative delegation.

countered when Rep. Preston Anderson of San Antonio was forced to support the Pugh amendment, in which he personally had no interest. In order to show through his own interests. Thus, the five Dallas representatives had not only to combat their own brothers but to take a "work" at Anderson.

Sixty members of the House were content to sit back and "unpire" the tiff, turning on the white light (which means "present and not voting") when a vote was taken on recommitting the bill.

State Senator Ben O'Neal, Wichita Falls, back from an interstate commerce commission as a confederate, believes the federal government will soon give up its emergency gasoline tax, leaving gasoline taxes as an exclusive field for states. That course was recommended by the commission. It proposed that no additional state tobacco taxes be levied for fear of diminishing federal revenue from this source.

Congress was requested to have electrical energy taxes to states and states recommended to have beer taxes, except for regulatory purposes, to the national government. Further investigation of general sales taxes was ordered before the commission makes recommendations. The commission also went on record in favor of federal and state compacts.

Rep. Lonnie Dupp, Carthage, is gradually training members of the House in the correct pronunciation of Sabine. Many members say SABINE river, but Dupp reminds them it is SABINE.

Possible revival of the movement for a state road bond issue is seen in recent developments at Austin, heightened by the secrecy that a senator sought to impose upon them.

Success Of World Economic Session Depends On Granting By America Of War Debt Moratorium Says Writer

Unless President Roosevelt can persuade Congress to grant a new moratorium in War Debts, before June 30, the date when the next installment is due there is no chance of a successful International Economic Conference this year. The statement is made by Frank H. Simonds in his new book, "The A B C of War Debts" published by Harper's today.

In this book Mr. Simonds repeats his testimony before the Senate Finance Committee that the war debts are dead because the United States can find no way in which it can afford to accept payment save in gold and the debt nations will not send any more gold. To-day, therefore the choice is between cancellation by America and default by Europe. But since Congress and the public opinion are equally hostile to cancellation, default, which means repudiation must come in June if there is no new moratorium and American anger and European resentment following will create an atmosphere which will make international cooperation impossible.

Mr. Simonds admits that if Europe does not pay the American taxpayer will have to but he says that will not mean a new shifting of the burden to American shoulders since we have so far lent Europe all the money it has paid, we have always carried the burden. He agrees that the debt settlements were just and even generous. That the American people are entitled to payment in full, that it is the duty of the Roosevelt Administration to collect if it can. But he asserts that no way of collecting debts without destroying American foreign or domestic trade has ever been suggested or exists.

Says Coolidge Mistaken Calvin Coolidge's statement that "They hired the money" was mistaken, Mr. Simonds declares, because "no money went to Europe. We lent the Allies not cash but

are growing stronger. May 10 is the time for expiration, but indications are that many measures will not be complete at that time.

Of course those not reached can be allowed to die on the calendar. But some of those due to be in that condition are revenue bills. If time is not extended to pass them, the treasury will empty quickly.

Little likelihood of a sales tax being used to revive state finances remains. Rep. Harold Kayton has so far kept his sales tax bill from the general slaughter of such measures, but it faces likely decapitation when the House committee finally reaches it. Kay's bill, held back in deference to the bill favored by Governor Ferguson, differs mainly in providing that local communities shall share in the tax, thus being able to relieve local ad valorem taxation, as the state planned to avoid state ad valorem.

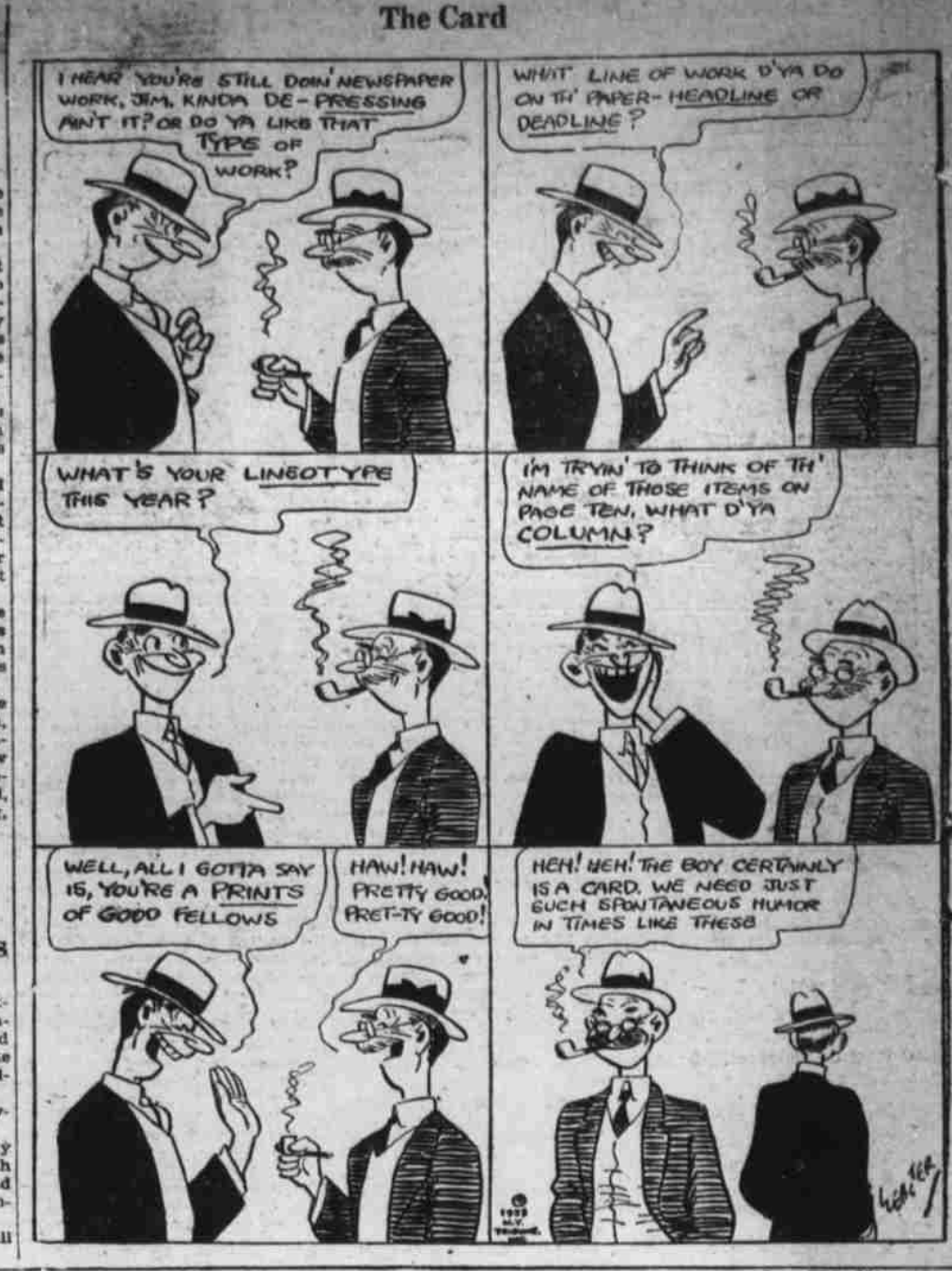

Roosevelt Favors Divorcement Of Interstate Pipelines From Other Branches As Asked By Independents
WASHINGTON, (UP)—Rehabilitation of the oil industry of the nation through remedial legislation was definitely a part of President Roosevelt's program.
In a letter to the governor of the 17 oil producing states, President Roosevelt pledged legislation in accord with decisions reached at recent conferences here attended by representatives of the oil states and independent and major producing agencies.
The letter reviewed these decisions and then added:
"I am of the opinion that the suggestion that the congress pass legislation prohibiting the transportation in interstate and foreign commerce of any oil or the products thereof produced or manufactured in any state in violation of the laws thereof, is well considered."
"I am prepared to recommend such legislation to congress as a contribution on the part of the national government toward the solution of the difficulties in which the oil industry finds itself."
The report of the Independent Petroleum Association opposed to monopoly recommends the enactment of emergency legislation by congress divorcing oil pipe lines engaged in interstate commerce from other branches of the industry.
"I am of the opinion that this is a reasonable request and that legislation should be enacted at an early date as possible."
There are other suggestions and recommendations made to the Secretary of the Interior as a result of the deliberations of the oil conference that on their face are fair and reasonable but which do not require immediate action.
"These recommendations can be taken up at a later date, perhaps after further conference between the representatives of the states and the national government."
The letter was addressed to the Governor of Arkansas, California, Colorado, Illinois, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Montana, New York, New Mexico, Ohio, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Texas, West Virginia, Wyoming, all oil producing states.
Commission Order In Conroe Field Attacked In Suits
HOUSTON, (UP)—Two suits asking that the state railroad commission be temporarily restrained from enforcing prohibition in the Conroe oil field were filed in federal court here.
Both suits protested low allowable net for wells.
The first suit was filed jointly by the Heep Oil corporation, North Star Corporation and R. W. Bond and the second by Mortex Oil company.
A three-judge court probably will be convened to hear the suits.

Internal Revenue Stamps To Be Sold By Post Offices

Postmaster General Jim Farley has clipped out a troublesome piece of red tape that in the past has bothered those who must purchase internal revenue stamps for any purpose.

By an amendment to the postal laws and regulations ordered a few days ago Mr. Farley empowers all post offices of first and second classes and all third and fourth class offices in county seats to sell internal revenue stamps.

Heretofore these stamps have had to be bought from the nearest internal revenue collector, which in the case of Big Spring is in Dallas.

These stamps are for use, among other things, as payment of taxes on the following instruments: issue of bonds or capital stock, sale or transfer of bonds, transfers of stock not made through exchanges, real estate conveyances, deeds, etc., and insurance policies, tickets or foreign insurance policies.

NEW YORK (UP)—The auto-graphed copy of Jesse James' memoirs which this bureau awarded each year to the sportsman making the most liberal gesture, has been forwarded to Thomas Kearney, St. Louis betting commissioner.

Mr. Kearney won the award with a booklet containing his odds on making a horse that would win both the Kentucky Derby and the Pimlico Preskness. If you name Ladyman, for example, and Ladyman comes through, Mr. Kearney will pay you back 35 to 1. He'll give you 75 to 1 on Charley O and Renald, and 300 to 1 on Bolter-maker, and seven other horses. You understand, once you pay your money to Mr. Kearney it's play or pay, which means if your horse breaks a leg or is scratched it's just too bad.

You will appreciate Mr. Kearney's big-heartedness all the more when we tell you in the long history of the Derby and Preskness, but three horses have scored the double win, Sir Barton in 1919, Gallant Fox in 1930 and Burgooning in 1932. And there are no Sir Bartons nor Gallant Foxes in this year's renewal of the two stakes.

Let us do a little analyzing on that 35 to 1 business on Ladyman. In his individual books on the Derby and Preskness, Mr. Kearney regards the Go colt as an 8 to 1 shot in each stake. By my method of figuring two 8 to 1 chances in a parley, it would net a return of \$72 to \$1.

"Oh, yes," you may say, "but the odds on Ladyman in the Preskness won't be 8 to 1 if he wins the Derby." No, they won't, but they aren't likely to go below "to 1. So if you bet a dollar on Ladyman to win the Derby and he did, and then took the 35 and bet it at "to 1 in the Preskness you'd still get \$36.

So what's the use of fiddling around with that 35 to 1 business? You've got everything to lose and nothing to gain. If we were going to play Ladyman we'd play him as outlined above, thus exposing ourselves to the chance that he might go to the post in the Pre kness at juicier odds than 3 to 1.

"Eko screamed, 'the he's in shot me,'" testified Daniel Tice, seaman, who said Yurash was the only boatwain aboard the tanker.

Earlier that day, Tice testified, he heard Yurash and Eko "wrangling," in the Forecastle over a projected seamen's strike in 1921.

"Eko told Yurash, 'you broke up the strike in 1921,'" said Tice. "Yurash told Eko he was yellow."

Two seamen, Chester Tullison of Massachusetts and Joseph Boyanek of Pennsylvania, told of witnessing a scuffle between the pair.

A cook on board the Thayer told of hearing two shots and seeing Yurash with a pistol just before Eko's body was found.

Yurash pleaded not guilty to the murder charge.

Wisconsin Votes For Pro Amendment Repeal

MILWAUKEE, (UP)—At Wisconsin's constitutional convention three weeks hence, the vote for repeal of the eighteenth amendment will be unanimous. Ratons from Tuesday's election showed four to one in favor of repeal.

Prohibitionists conceded repealists elected all of their fourteen candidates.
