Others May Die

Wives Of Workers Arrive At Scene To Witness Rescue Work; Great Northern Train Hits Snowbank

PEORIA, Ill., Feb. 20.—Five miners were killed, four perhaps fatally hurt and about 150 others received less severe injuries in a train wreck today. Four cars of an eight coach train of the Peoria terminal railway company plunged over a 25 foot embankment near Hollis, five miles south of here. The train, carrying about 750 miners to work at the Crescent coal mines, 15 miles south of Peoria, was proceeding at the rate of only 12 or 15 miles an hour, miners and railroad officials said, when one of the coaches was thrown off the tracks by what miners said was a broken rail and broken "fish plate" the iron bar connecting the rail. One car after another tumbled down the embankment with their loads of from 60 to 75 miners each until four cars were piled in the ditch, some of them almost upside down, others on their sides. A fifth car left the tracks and slid partly way down the bank but remained upright. In some of the cars were coal heaters and one of them was set

Mussolini Okehs Easterwood Plan

ROME, Feb. 20.—(P)—In a 15 minute chat this afternoon with Col. W. E. Easterwood, of Dallas, Texas, Premier Benito Mussolini approved the Texan's offer of a prize of \$25,000 for a flight from Rome to Dallas by way of New York. The Italian statesman used strong, colloquial English and seemed to take pride in his recently acquired knowledge of that language.

Mussolini said he personally was interested in flying and that after he had completed his work and become an old man he hoped to visit America. He said he might be able to fly across the Atlantic, since by 20 years from now, a goodly portion of trans-oceanic journeying would be done through the air. Col. Easterwood explained to the premier his plans for making the proposed Rome-Dallas flight an international contest, open to all nations, and the premier promised that fliers of other countries would be permitted to use the Rome airdrome as the starting point.

Mrs. Hammonds' Nocturnal Visit To Capital Cited

Nightwatchman Tells Of Entrance Into Governor's Office Of Secretary By Second-Story Window

(By Associated Press)
OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 20.—A nocturnal visit to the governor's office by way of a second story window was charged today to Mrs. O. O. Hammonds, erstwhile confidential secretary to Henry S. Johnston, in testimony before a house investigating committee gathering evidence for Governor Johnston's impeachment trial.

Mrs. Hammonds held the spotlight both in the committee testimony and the senate court trial, where was told a story of another unsuccessful attempt to dislodge her from the governor's office. Told By Nightwatchman. The alleged window episode was told by C. A. Wallace, former watchman at the capitol, who said he saw Mrs. Hammonds walk along the ledge that encircles the structure at the second floor, pry open a window screen and enter the office.

The next day, Wallace said, Mrs. Hammonds attempted to have him discharged, telling J. R. Edwards, capitol chief of police, that the watchman was not vigilant and had permitted someone to enter the governor's office and take valuable papers. Wallace confided what he had seen to Edwards, he said, and was warned to be silent if he wished to retain his job.

Had To Be Sent After. Wallace said the incident occurred in the spring of 1927. He declared that since the present investigation and impeachment proceedings against Johnston have started, he was approached by a man who asked him if he was not afraid of

McCloskey Trial Promises To Be Hot Court Battle

Jury Selection Is Completed Wednesday And Battle Is On; Opening Minutes Are Active

Pleads Not Guilty

Employee Of San Antonio School Board Tells Of Irregularities In Election Of County Judge

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Feb. 20.—The jury in the criminal trial of congressman-elect August J. McCloskey of San Antonio was completed late today after three days of effort and the case immediately was turned into a bitter court battle. Facing trial on one of five indictments alleging general election vote frauds in the Fourteenth Congressional district from which returns are anticipated a victory over Harry M. Wurzbach, Texas' only republican congressman, Mr. McCloskey pleaded not guilty.

Henry H. Brooks, 23-year-old district attorney for Travis county to which the trial was brought on a change of venue from Bexar county, launched into his opening statement to the jury with the assertion that not only would ballot frauds be proved concerning the twentieth precinct but also others.

Defense Objects. The indictment mentions only the twentieth precinct, and the McCloskey chief of counsel, Dave Watson, immediately objected. From that moment on through the testimony of the first state witness, Ed Engelhardt, employee of the San Antonio school board, the legal battle was intense.

The first important testimony by Engelhardt was that he was positive as presiding officer of the twentieth precinct that McCloskey had obtained only 298 votes against Wurzbach's 261 and that the figure was correct.

Four Of Escaped Convicts Captured

Marietta Killer's Capture Last Night Leaves Only One Man A Loose; Search Is Continued

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 20.—William H. Young, 40, Marietta killer, was captured tonight in a field south of Youngsville, O., by county officers and was returned to Ohio penitentiary from which he escaped yesterday with four other convicts. Three of the men were caught last night.

Meanwhile, legislative investigation into the escape of the five prisoners was demanded in a resolution introduced in the house today.

Search Continues. Four of the convicts again were behind prison bars, and search continued for the others.

James W. Walton, 30, Cleveland robber, believed to have been the ring leader of the delivery yesterday, still was at large. Pat McDermott, "Trigger Man", in the slaying of Don R. Mellett, Canton publisher, Mike Jacko, Cleveland murderer, and Joe Rosso, Cleveland robber, were placed in solitary confinement after their capture less than 24 hours after the break.

LIQUOR CASE OPENS

Twelve Galveston County Men Named In Charges

GALVESTON, Feb. 20.—(P)—Submission of testimony linking twelve Galveston county men in an alleged conspiracy to operate a liquor partnership began here today in federal court. Five prohibition agents, including District Attorney et al. including District Deputy Administrator Victor J. Butthod, testified to a series of raids near Dickinson last summer, seizure of whiskey stills, liquor and other equipment and arrest of several defendants in the conspiracy case.

Pneumonia Claims Pioneer Cattleman

D. J. (Joe) Wyatt Dies At Sonora Ranch Home Wednesday; Spent Life In Cattle Industry

SAN ANGELO, Feb. 20.—D. J. (Joe) Wyatt, 65, millionaire banker and stockman, died of pneumonia at his ranch home 10 miles south of Sonora, today. Burial will be at Sonora, but arrangements are incomplete.

A native Texan, he had spent most of his life in developing the cattle industry in West Texas. Wyatt was born in Hamilton county and moved to Fort McKavitt when he was 16. He spent three years with cattle herds in Kansas and Oklahoma before returning to Sonora where he resided most of the rest of his life.

The survivors include two sisters: Mrs. E. F. Vander Stucken of Sonora and Mrs. A. W. Winkler of Dexter, New Mexico, and two brothers: C. D. Wyatt, Sonora rancher and Ed Wyatt of Bristow, Okla.

House In Canyon Community Burns

Fire Of Unknown Origin Completely Destroyed The Five Room House And Contents Of A. E. Sides, At The Canyon Community Store, Seven Miles East Of Lubbock At About 11 O'clock Wednesday Morning

The house was a frame structure and occupied by Ross McClean. Estimated loss was placed at \$2,500 for the loss of the house and \$600 for McClean's furniture.

Because of the fact that the tanks of the vicinity were dry, a local bucket brigade could make no headway at fighting the fire. A call to the Lubbock fire department was made by telephone, but the lack of water made their requested run futile.

The fire is said to have first been noticed burning in the roof of the house. No damage was done to the store nearby.

Bruce demanded that the Alabama senator be called to order for using what he said was offensive language and also for attacking some one unable to defend himself in debate.

'Hello World' Appears With Carload Of Affidavits

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 20.—R. W. Burford, Shreveport, La., son-in-law of William G. Skelly, of the Skelly Oil company told the Radio Commission today that he had been called a "German spy" by the announcer at station KWKH at Shreveport and that his father-in-law had been called a "robber, hijacker and a member of the Teapot Dome gang."

Burford made his statement during a hearing the commission is holding on application of station KVOO of Tulsa, for the right to use a frequency of 650 kilocycles, now occupied by the Shreveport station.

Skelly Not Connected. Skelly testified that he owned stock of the company which operated KVOO but that the Skelly Oil company was in no way connected with the station.

The hearing rooms of the commission were crowded when W. K. Henderson, owner of the Shreveport station, which might begin its program with the salutation:

"Hello world; Shreveport on the air; Shreveport everywhere, don't go away," appeared to fight the Tulsa station's application.

Henderson arrived in Washington for the hearing with a box car full of affidavits concerning the services rendered by his station which he probably will present to the commission late tomorrow after KVOO has completed its testimony.

Burford's testimony came near the end of the day's proceedings after much time had been taken up with presenting statistics concerning the population, productivity, manufacturing, and mineral resources of Oklahoma. Attorneys for KVOO also presented logs of the programs sent out by KWKH and stenographic reports of such programs over a period of weeks.

"German" Spy Hinted

Burford testified that he was the president of the Crystal Oil company of Louisiana and that after the Tulsa station applied for the wave length of KWKH it was announced over the air, he said, for affidavits, that the Crystal company employees had not furnished any affidavits and "that it appeared there was a German spy in their midst."

On cross examination Burford was asked if he didn't think that Henderson was speaking figuratively. He replied that he did not think so and that the "things said about me and about my father-in-law and about my company were said in a malicious, villainous fashion."

Texas Republican Leaders To Appear Before Committee

Senator Brookhart Notifies Creager Of Chance For Men To Testify Regarding Patronage Charges

Statements Denied

Twenty Leading Party Men In State To Make Trip To Washington Next Week In Answer To Charges

(By Associated Press)

BROWNSVILLE, Feb. 20.—Texas republican leaders will be allowed to testify February 28 in Washington before the senate committee investigating patronage, said a telegram received today by R. B. Creager of Brownsville, national republican committeeman for Texas. Creager announced.

The notification was from Senator Smith W. Brookhart, committee chairman, in reply to Mr. Creager's telegram of protest and denial of charges that federal office holders in Texas had been "assessed" for money in return for support for their appointments to jobs.

Statement Is Denied. The statement by a former dry agent and recent witness before committee that a negro told him Creager had given protection to Dallas hotels against dry raids also has been denied vehemently by Mr. Creager.

The telegram from Brookhart to Creager follows: "Your telegram of February 18, stating that you and T. P. Lee of Houston, Orville Bunting, Wichita Falls; Eugene Nolte, Seguin, and F. L. Tomson of San Antonio, Texas, expect to be heard before our committee, received. Have made arrangements for their appearances to hear you and other gentlemen named, Thursday morning, February 28. Mr. Creager said that he and a number of Texans will leave Sunday night to arrive in Washington

Shaw Nomination Opposed By Group

Fifty Persons Appear Last Night Before Senate Committee On Nominations; Hearing Is Set

AUSTIN, Feb. 20.—About 50 persons appeared tonight before the senate committee on government nominations to protest reappointment of James Shaw as state banking commissioner.

The hearing was set for Friday night, March 1. M. C. Driscoll of Losam, former vice-president of insolvent Yeakum State bank and leader in the protest movement, was instructed to have a written copy of the charges in the hands of Shaw's attorneys for February 27 so that the banking commissioner might file an answer.

Former Senator W. J. Rogers of San Antonio represented Shaw before the committee. Driscoll requested postponement because he said the protesters and the contestants were unable to be present tonight. Most of the persons here tonight were from Yeakum and vicinity.

Perjury Charges Filed Against 3 In Pruett Trial

Defendant's Father And 2 Others Named By Judge; Youth Ordered To Face Murder Charge March 11

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, Feb. 20.—Judge C. A. Phippen tossed a bombshell into the robbery trial of William (Daggar) Pruitt Jr., today when he halted the hearing to order perjury charges against three defense witnesses and ordered Pruitt to go to trial for murder of William Mann, high school student, March 11.

The three "alibi" witnesses, W. P. Pruitt, father of the defendant, Jasper Smith and Herschel Wright, had testified Pruitt was on the Wright farm the night of January 3, when the drug store robbery for which Pruitt is accused occurred. Retiring the jury, Judge Phippen ordered the sheriff to arrest the three men. "The district attorney will file charges of perjury against them," he said.

Bonds Set At \$10,000. The complaints were filed in justice court and bond of \$10,000 set in each case. Wright made bond and was released. The complaints charged that the three witnesses did "wilfully and deliberately testify that William Pruitt was at the home of Herschel Wright the night of January 3, and knew the statement to be false when they made it."

Pruitt, attending court in a wheel chair from wounds received when resisting arrest, faces five other charges of robbery with firearms.

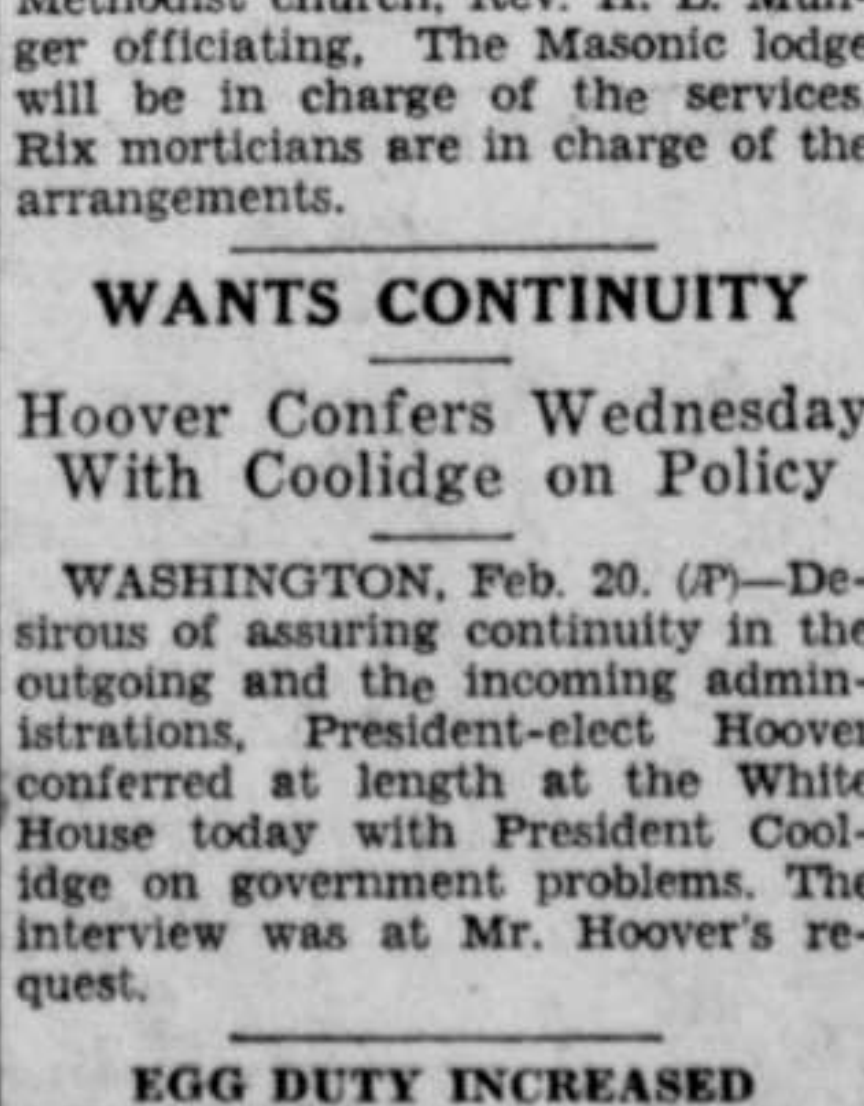
J. D. Sooter's Car Collides With Bus Tuesday Night

Cause of the accident was not learned, it having occurred at about 9 o'clock.

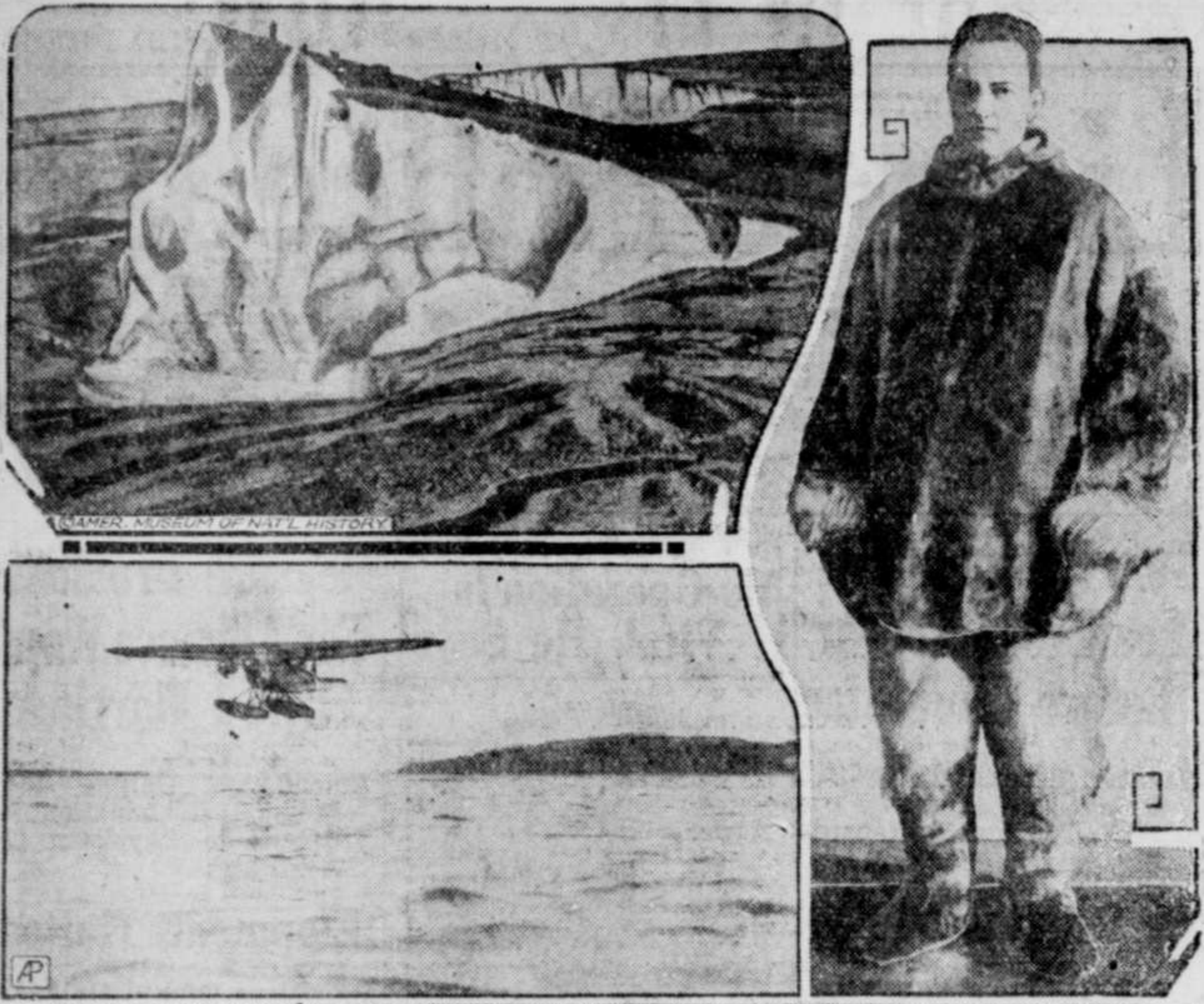

Byrd Expedition Is Camped On Safest Spot In Antarctic, American Museum Explorer Declares

NEW YORK, Feb. 20. (AP)—The upper portion of the Ross Sea. The glacier forms a great ice gulf, projecting 400 miles out over the supposed water, and filling the basin to a width of more than 300 miles.

Seemingly one of the most precarious spots for an explorer's headquarters, it nevertheless is one of the safest sites in the whole antarctic. The story of this glacier, in the century that men have known it, is itself an epic.

"It is by thousands of times the largest glacier known," says Dr. Robert Cushman Murphy of the American Museum of Natural History, himself an antarctic veteran. "The ice comes down from high land to the south, from the direc-

Add remaining flour mixture and mix smooth. Dissolve soda in sour milk and add. Mix well and stir in lemon rind and apple. Turn into oiled molds and steam one hour. 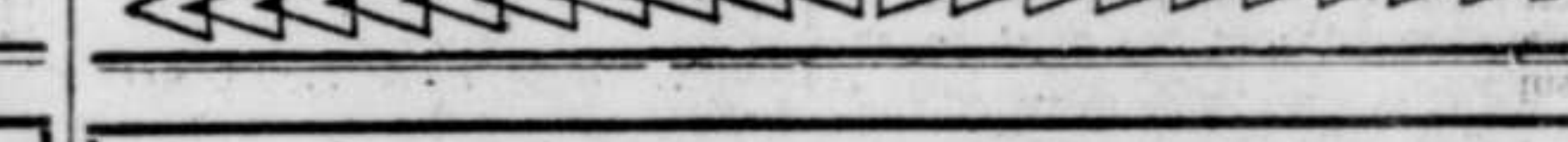

How to Achieve Beauty

Beauty is a chain, made up of many links, and only as strong as the weakest of them.

If you think of the most beautiful woman you know and then imagine her with red, ugly, unkempt hands, or a sail-like complexion you will see what I mean.

For your beautiful woman is no longer beautiful if she is not. For one disfiguring element outshines the loveliness around it, spoiling completely any harmonious effect of beauty.

Like the "bump on the leg" a single defect of whatever kind assumes enormous proportions.

So, take care that there is no weakest link in all your beauty chain. But, perhaps you are saying all of us cannot have perfect features, the profile of a lady on an ancient Grecian coin, or the figure of the famous Venus. Some of us have sharply upturned noses and stubborn chins and some of us are fatter than we should like to be or thinner. Can we change these things?

Some of them you can. Not all, and why wish to? Individual differences may be very charming. If you will make your type conform to them and build harmony around these, your personal characteristics, you can create an effect of loveliness that is delightful because it is completely your own. But there must be harmony, for beauty requires harmony as one of its first laws. Therefore, take care in building your type that no flagrant neglect appears among its elements to betray your carelessness in beauty seeking.

These are the links that we must consider, the factors of beauty that we can influence and change and build into our chain.

Health comes first. Good general health and proper diet to maintain it. If your health is good you are so much nearer to beauty, for all lasting beauty is based on health. And if you are truly healthy you cannot be very much overweight nor underweight. Your body is firm and supple and your facial contours and skin are firm and smooth. Your hair is glowing and radiant, easy to arrange becomingly. And your eyes are bright and rested, your teeth and hands well cared for.

Water and sunlight and air have their part in beauty's chain. They are factors in maintaining health, such important factors that I shall discuss them later, separately, like a link in beauty's chain. Exercise and dancing, especially, will help you to walk and move in beauty.

Then there is the important care of your skin. To keep it always lovely there are several means at your command, easy, scientific ways to preserve the health of the skin. We shall discuss them all, too, later.

And make-up. Your make-up, like your clothes, should be chosen to enhance your natural loveliness. It should be put on artistically and should perfectly suit your type, following the color scheme that nature chose for you. An artificial make-up is never beautiful. Art, not artifice, has to do with beauty.

Then grooming. Pay attention to all the tiny details of your appearance that are so very important to the complete ensemble effect of beauty. The beauty modern woman prize is not like that of an old-fashioned garden, attractive when left to bloom in a careless riot. Sophisticated modern beauty means little contributing outline and necessary. Remember this and remember that beauty is like a chain, as strong as the weakest link. Plan to keep all your links strong and see how beautiful you can be.

Memory Of Tex Rickard Hangs Around Miami Beach Venture; Men Covering Story Are Being Square And Telling Truth Concerning Bout

MIAMI BEACH, Feb. 20.—This is another spot off the beaten path of the battle-scarred prize fight reporters. But it is not another Shelby, Montana. Nor is it the Miami of a number of years ago that tried to get two high-priced young men into the ring with moneyless promises.



There was a fight between Jack Dempsey and Tommy Gibbons but it was the financial bust of history. Three banks blew up under the strain of paying Dempsey \$100,000 less than he had been guaranteed and if poor Tom Gibbons had demanded a single copper he would have been forced to accept an I. O. U. signed with a borrowed pencil.

Miami's venture, attempted later, was not quite such a crash. It may be ages before Shelby's record ever will be tied. Miami tried to stage a fight between Willie Stribling and Gene Tunney without money and without an experienced promoter in the ring as there was in Shelby. Tunney may not have been in fear of the same young man who is a principal in the coming contest, but he certainly was looking for an out and did take quick advantage of the chance offered.

Big Money Men Assure Success.
Arriving here from the north with the predictions of northerners that "there won't be a fight down there," it is easy to have any misgivings dispelled. The men in charge tell you that Jack Sharkey and Willie Stribling will be in there to do something on the night of February 27. And they are big money men—men of Tex Rickard's gr up of 600 millionaires, and if the customers do not make it a financial success, there will be no explosion of the banks and trust companies in this territory.

Some Wall Street vaults will have to take the bait. It is not the purpose of this piece to say how many thousands of dollars are to be made or lost on Rickard's last venture or how many vacant seats there will be when time comes for the fight that has been advertised to produce the next heavyweight champion of the world.

It is our guess that there will be many persons present and the guess is based upon the experience gained in covering the Shelby tragedy and the Miami comedy.

Memory Of Rickard Around Fight.
The men who buy tickets for this fight know that there is going to be a fight. Prospective purchasers had their doubts from the first about the Shelby fight and the world went around that Tunney would take advantage of any excuse to duck his Miami engagement, and the magic of the Rickard name was not applied to either.

The money of Rickard hangs around this Miami Beach venture. The men behind it undertook what they thought to be a hopeless task as a memorial to him that might cost them \$200,000. They followed the Rickard policy of being square and telling the truth. Rickard showed those who doubted him in Goldfield by pouring \$30,000 in gold pieces in an unguarded window of his saloon and William F. Carey, standing here in Rickard's shoes, showed his hand and in the same manner when the experienced reporters came to him with their doubts.

"Come with me," Carey said, and he led them to the bank and showed them the money on hand and he has been showing daily receipts from the box offices that indicate no big money will be lost on the fight, if any.

All the money we have shown you is fight money. We have never gone into our pockets," Carey said. Promoters Honest In All Dealings. Carey, by his frankness, won the confidence of many customers who must come from miles around if all the seats are taken for this fight. He even talked down a ck Dempsey when that outspoken young man was gloating about a half million dollar gate.

"Not that much, Jack, hold down your enthusiasm," Carey admonished him.

The big difference between the men in charge of the fight here and those who tried to put over the Shelby thing is not one of experience particularly—it is one of honesty with the men covering the story.

The men in charge in Shelby lied and lied. There are more gentle words that might be used, but what they did was lie. They told the country that they had the money and they didn't have it, they said they would get it when the money came and they didn't have a chance to get it. And the experience there was what caused the veteran reporters to be so cautious about the financial phase of this enterprise. It is out of line to be talking so much about finances. The men who buy tickets for a fight don't care whether the promoters lose their shirts as long as they see some-

The former champion carried a telegram in his pocket from James A. Farley, chairman of the New York State Athletic commission, granting rugged Lou Magnolia the right to act as referee when the Boston tar and the Georgian square off.

Johnny Buckley, manager of Sharkey and Pa Stribling, father-manager of the Southern ace, met with Dempsey and adopted the New York commission rules in general as the governing code. This was necessary since Florida has no boxing commission and no fistic code of its own.

In the rules discussion, Dempsey, possibly with the situation in Chicago where the controversy of the "long count," developed, in mind, insisted that in the event of a knockdown, the referee must pick up the count of the official time-keeper if the arbiter is busy the first few seconds getting the aggressor to a neutral corner.

The furrowed brow of Jack Dempsey, making a troubled debut as a sports promoter, was clearing as he left for Palm Beach, tonight to take part with Babe Ruth in a charity performance. The former champion carried a telegram in his pocket from James A. Farley, chairman of the New York State Athletic commission, granting rugged Lou Magnolia the right to act as referee when the Boston tar and the Georgian square off.

Johnny Buckley, manager of Sharkey and Pa Stribling, father-manager of the Southern ace, met with Dempsey and adopted the New York commission rules in general as the governing code. This was necessary since Florida has no boxing commission and no fistic code of its own.

Inasmuch as the managers of the battlers argued two weeks before agreeing to a referee it appeared probable that no judges would be leaving the work that night entirely on Magnolia's shoulders.

In the rules discussion, Dempsey, possibly with the situation in Chicago where the controversy of the "long count," developed, in mind, insisted that in the event of a knockdown, the referee must pick up the count of the official time-keeper if the arbiter is busy the first few seconds getting the aggressor to a neutral corner.

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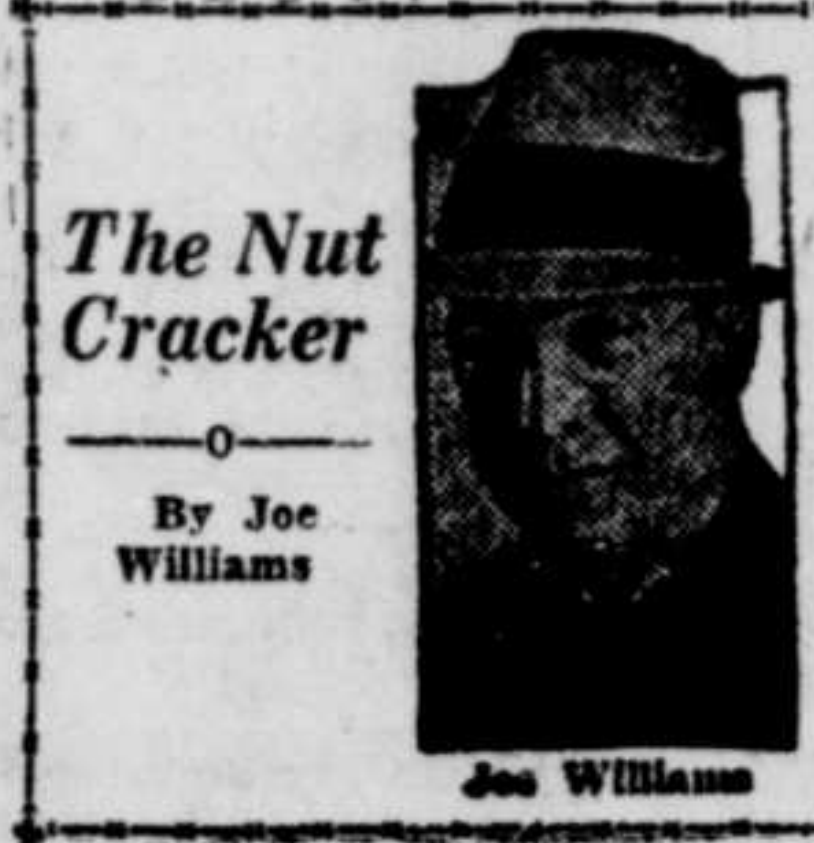

Priceless Little Rocks Attach Historic Value To Home-Made Hearth Of Pennsylvania Hobbyist

ALTOONA, Pa., Feb. 20.—Two years ago Joe Parks got an idea.

He was planning to build a new home near here and, being a sportsman, his homelife wouldn't be complete if he was without a den in which to display his many trophies. But in planning his den Joe Parks wanted to have something unique, something out of the ordinary, so he chose the fireplace to hold this honor.

Now, two years after the idea came to him, Joe takes his friends into his den, immediately walks to the fireplace, and, with an air of pride, points to one of the many numbers on the various stones which make up the structure.

"There," he usually begins, pointing to a stone with the numeral one, "is a stone taken from the site of the manger where Christ was born, in Bethlehem."

"And this one," he adds, pointing to another, "is from the boyhood home of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, world famous flyer, at Little Falls, Minn."

And so on down the line Joe usually points out stone after stone over his hearth which, he claims, and others agree, is probably the world's most historic fireplace.

There are stones in the fireplace from all corners of the earth—77 in all "You see," he explains, "I didn't gather all these myself. I got many of them through information supplied by the National Geographic society, the Carnegie Institute at Washington, D. C., and some were secured with the cooperation of postmasters in various sections of the United States and Canada, and, in many foreign countries through the courtesy of American consuls."

"A few of the stones came from custom-made mine in various parts of the world. I operate a large poultry farm."

"Now this stone from Christ's birthplace," Parks goes on, pointing again at No. 1, "I was able to get through the assistant postmaster at Bethlehem. And No. 2, over there, I procured through the American colony stores at Jerusalem. It is from the ruins of Solomon's temple at that place."

Johnstown Flood
Another of historic value secured near his home was a stone from the breast of the Johnstown dam, which brings back memories of 1889, when hundreds met death under the onrush of water from the dam when its walls were unable to hold the heavy pressure.

One of the most unusual is a stone from the house where Colonel Lindbergh spent his youth. It is a formation resembling concrete mottled with bits of dark, hard substance, one of which forms a plain "L."

A feature of the fireplace is that the stones ranging from No. 10 up to and including No. 49 give a varied history of the development of North America from the time of the Norsemen on down to the old Alamo.

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Williams' Death Remains Mystery

Autopsy Reveals Victim Was Not Poisoned; 3 Other Trails Are Being Followed in Investigation

(By Associated Press)

LAREDO, Feb. 20.—Belief that Harry Williams, 24, Laredo newspaper man missing since Jan. 19, whose body was found in the Rio Grande Monday, might have been poisoned, was somewhat dissipated today when Doctor Lowry who held the autopsy, said although no chemical analysis of the stomach contents had been made, there was no inflammation or other indication that a poison had entered the stomach.

"Only poisons such as are rare and hard for the layman to obtain could have been used if he was poisoned," he explained. He reiterated belief that Williams was dead before being placed in the water.

Three other trails are being followed. They are to determine if Williams was choked to death, if he committed suicide or if his neck was broken.

TEXAS-OKLAHOMA "DEAL" SLOWED UP

The negotiations between Texas and Oklahoma over the One Hundredth Meridian boundary question, which seemed to be hurrying breathlessly into an arrangement for the sale of a portion of Texas territory to Oklahoma, have been slowed up. The legislative committee, appointed to confer with a similar committee of the Oklahoma Legislature, has decided to postpone the conference. The idea that the matter is one that calls for a good deal of mulling over has gained ground.

A good many constitutional authorities, among them Mr. Keeling, former Attorney General of Texas; Mr. Gregory, formerly Attorney General of the United States; Chief Justice Cullen and the present Attorney General, Mr. Pollard, say that the Texas Government is without power to sell to any other State any portion of Texas soil. But the question is not properly one whether or not it can be done. The question is rightly whether the laudable aims of the proposition can be accomplished satisfactorily in some other way. Until that possibility is denied at all points, there is no proper occasion for discussing the proposition of sale of the territory to Oklahoma.

The object sought is the protection of settlers and other land owners in the sparsely settled region from loss by reason of the fact that their lands have previously been held as being in Oklahoma. By final judgment of the highest authority, the Supreme court of the United States, it is fixed that the lands are and always have been a part of Texas, and that all Oklahoma acts respecting them are void. Yet, since the good faith of the private owners is nowhere protected, the duty of Texas is to treat these owners exactly as if their acts of ownership were accomplished under Texas laws.

There is no doubt of the full intention of the Texas Government and the Texas people that this shall be done. The owners of the "disputed" territory—which is no longer disputed—will lose nothing. This being assured, by measures withdrawing the land from public entry until settlement can be worked out, there is no reason why adequate time may not be taken to ascertain if a workable method can not be devised for clearing up all title difficulties in the area. If it is found that this can not be done and that there must be loss to the owners, then and only then, will it be time to seek means for accomplishing the transfer of the land to Oklahoma sovereignty, which admittedly would cure the difficulties.

One Texas newspaper points out that when the Supreme Court gave Oklahoma title to areas claimed by Texas, there was no disposition of that State to sell the land to Texas. This is true enough, but there is properly no idea of retaliation in Texas attitude at present. If it were possible for the State Government to alienate a portion of its territory, and such a sale were made, it would set a precedent which undoubtedly would cause trouble in the future. But the whole good to be sought in the matter is the preservation of the interests of the land owners who, having been good citizens of Oklahoma while they were actually Texans, will be as good citizens of Texas now that their citizenship is established.

THE HEART OF BIG CORPORATION

The heartless corporations are sometimes not so heartless as many people would think they are. There has been, and is still, a great tendency to consolidate, and to bring together business institutions, under one head, and many people fear that this will finally terminate disastrously to the working classes of people, and independent businesses will be killed out entirely. Be this as it may, there seems yet to be a heart in the corporations, or at least some of them. For some time, telegraph operators have been in a pretty tough time, because of the installation of the print machines in so many of the offices. Telegraph operators have been having a pretty tough struggle of late. Press operators and commercial telegraph operators alike have been displaced by the thousands through the installation of automatic sending and receiving instruments, by which the old Morse wires have been eliminated.

It is somewhat unusual, and slightly refreshing, then, to read of the action of the Pennsylvania railroad system in increasing the pay of its telegraph operators—numbering more than four thousand—4 cents per hour. The increase will mean an increase in the income of the operators of about \$450,000 per year.

Incidentally, the problem created by the mechanization of telegraphy is one that is puzzling economists slightly. It has long been the theory that invention of new machines to replace men tends to increase general prosperity. It is believed that new machines speed up industry, lower prices, create new demands, and thus bring about new jobs and better wages for the men displaced. How far that theory may extend, however, is beginning to cause just a slight uneasiness. Production is on the upgrade in the United States; there is no real questioning of the fact that, as a whole, the nation is enjoying remarkable prosperity. But for some reason or other the extent of unemployment appears to be growing. To be sure, it can be argued that the condition is but temporary; that industry will begin to "take up the slack" as adjustments are made to meet new conditions.

Which may be of little consolation to the chap who has been displaced by a machine, and who is unable to find a new job. The promise of more remuneration in the latter part of 1929 doesn't seem to the men who are hungry in February, 1929. Any prolonged period of widespread unemployment cannot fail to upset economic conditions generally. Whether or not industry can continue to absorb bodies of men displaced by machine production is a question that will become more and more vexing. Or is a question toward which the genius which has been devoted to greater production may well be turned.

NEW ANANIAS CLUB OPEN ENROLLMENT
BY CHARLES F. STEWART

Washington Correspondent For Central Press And The Avalanche

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—President-elect Hoover's Ananias club is open plenty early and Chairman Fred A. Britten of the house of representatives committee on naval affairs is in on the ground floor.

The Chicago congressman looks rather lonely yet but he may have lots of company before long. An indefinable something in the atmosphere hints at a thriving four, or maybe eight years ahead for the presidential Ananias club. It is possible to sense that club's period of prosperity in advance, somehow.

Every now and then a public man looms into ultra-importance who is singularly difficult to "quote" to suit him, for no apparent reason.

President Roosevelt was conspicuously so.

Under President Taft the Ananias club languished and almost died. President Wilson revived it but never built it up as in Teddy's day. Neither President Harding nor President Coolidge ever made a nomination to its active list, so far as I can recall.

The success of an Ananias club depends largely upon the fashion in which its members names are proposed.

There must be nothing half-hearted about it. No candidate can enter the club's portals with due eclat on the strength of some such wishy-washy endorsement as that he made a mistake or that his memory slipped or even that he exaggerated.

"Ananias" his nomination must ring out loud and clear in a tone guaranteed not to leave a doubt in anybody's mind that his sponsor means just what he says.

The promise of a strong organization during the 1929-33 or '37 White House regime lies in the vigor with which President-elect Hoover introduces his selections for Ananias club honors.

It is not a long roll thus far, to be sure. The first initiate under Mr. Hoover's auspices was an obscure newspaper reporter—both his cognomen and the grounds of his eligibility since forgotten—back in campaign time. Anyway it was not the individual or the form of his application for Ananias club membership that signified. The significant thing was the classy style in which Mr. Hoover propelled him into the club.

Congressman Britten's admission was more of an event. It was just as good of an initiation as the earlier one and Britten is a statesman of note. Although, then, the Hoover Ananias club is smallish up to date, we are justified in regarding it as a club of great potentialities because it is already evident that Mr. Hoover knows how an Ananias club should be run.

One danger hovers over every presidential Ananias club. If too many people get into it, it loses its exclusiveness. A member in good standing is even liable to be asked if, honestly, he is entitled to belong.

Indeed, the validity of Britten's membership is being attacked.

The congressman says a president-elect said so-and-so about the proposed new cruiser fleet. Mr. Hoover says he didn't.

This would imply that Britten really committed the Ananias act.

Yet when the question was raised in the senate—did the Chicagoan actually prevaricate or not?—Senator Cullen expressed the opinion that "Aw," he guessed, "all Fred did was to place Mr. Hoover in an embarrassing position."

If that is the best sowing Fred Britten can make for himself he ought to be fired from the club.

"Personal Hygiene Applied" by Jesse Feiring Williams, has been planned for those who wish not only to learn personal hygiene but also to take the securing of health to ideals, ambitions, hopes and aspirations.

The first five chapters are devoted to such subjects as the meaning of health, the health problem, intelligence and ideals, the approach to knowledge of health and of science and the proper attitude toward life. Health is defined as the quality of life that renders the individual fit to live most and to serve best.

Dr. Williams is not content to give an account of the foundations and methods of medicine alone. He carries the war into the enemy's camp and presents brief but adequate criticisms of all the cults and of the strange methods of one-track healing that they propose.

Other chapters of his book are devoted to the hygiene of the various parts of the body classified under systems such as the respiratory, circulatory and digestive. The book is marked throughout by an extraordinary rationality. The author has an instinct for sound, proved facts and his book may be recommended as a safe guide.

This book is one for every educated man or woman who wants to know something about the workings of his own body, who wants to realize some of the tremendous accomplishments of modern medicine and who wishes to acquaint himself in the field of medical science.

After a consideration of normal physiology, discussing each one of the systems and important organs of the human body, Dr. Hagar provides chapters on intelligence, posture, fatigue, body temperature, and the effect of climate, reproduction, growth and development, and venereal disease.

The book is as soundly informative as any volume of public health education thus far available. It has, unfortunately, not the readability or the philosophical point of view of the recently published work of similar character by Logan Clendinning. Compared, on the other hand, with such volumes as "Living Machinery" by A. W. Hill and "Physiology" by V. H. Mottram, also offered for the general reader, it is a monument of lucidity. The matter of public health education is apparently still so young in Great Britain that the English writers have not learned to talk in less than four syllables. Dr. Hagar has written for the child as well as for the adult and apparently realizes that the average adult intelligence is not so far above that of the normal American child. Throughout the volume the actual information relative to the workings of the human tissues is associated with practical discussions of infectious disease, metabolic complaints and similar subjects. An exceptionally adequate index makes this book a safe guide for the layman, in fact, practically a home book on health.

Your Income Tax

No. 15

A loss on the sale of residential property purchased or constructed by the taxpayer for use as his personal residence and so used by him up to the time of the sale is not deductible. Where, however, property so purchased or constructed is prior to its sale rented or otherwise appropriated to income-producing purposes and is used for such purposes up to the time of its sale, a loss from the sale of the property computed as provided in section 111 of the Revenue Act of 1928, is an allowable deduction for its amount not to exceed the excess of the value of the property at the time it was appropriated to income-producing purposes (with proper adjustment for depreciation) over the amount realized from the sale. However, in case the property was so appropriated prior to March 1, 1913, the loss is an allowable deduction in an amount not to exceed the excess of the value of the property at the time it was so appropriated or at March 1, 1913, whichever is greater (with proper adjustment for depreciation), over the amount realized from the sale. A person claiming a deduction for a loss incurred in the sale of residential property should attach to his return a statement showing how the deduction was computed, including facts as to the use of the property, supported by evidence (reasonable in all the circumstances), and the date the property was appropriated to income-producing purposes and its value on the date it was so appropriated.

INSTALL NEW PUMP

Slaton Water Department Gets Improvement

Prices Surge High But Sales Drop In New York Market

Transactions Drop Below 3,000,000 Mark As Score Of Issues Rise; Call Is Steady Throughout Day

NEW YORK, Feb. 20. (AP)—Although the day's transactions fell below 3,000,000 shares for the first full session this year, prices surged higher on the stock market today, under the impetus of a number of favorable industrial developments. About a score of issues rose 5 to 15 points, with steel, merchandising, automotive and aeronautical issues making conspicuous progress.

Call money renewed at 6-1/2 per cent, in contrast to 7 yesterday, but not lower than 6. Bankers see little prospect of appreciable improvement in credit rates for several weeks, as seasonal expansion of commercial requirements is due in March. The federal reserve board, in keeping with its policy of reducing credit available for the stock market, announced that it would approve increases in the bankers' acceptance buying rates at all reserve banks, to conform with the recent increase at New York. This would tend to withdraw funds from New York.

Cotton Remains Quiet On Gotham Market Thursday

NEW YORK, Feb. 20. (AP)—Except for continued liquidation of near months, cotton showed no special trading feature today. Business was again quiet, with fluctuations narrow and irregular. The May contract ranged from 20.02 to 20.06 and closed at 20.04, compared with 20.05 at yesterday's close. The general market closed steady, net 2 points lower to 4 points higher, with new crop positions relatively steady.

Fluctuation In Cotton Ranges Only Two Points

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 20. (AP)—Extreme quiet characterized today's session of the cotton market and prices fluctuated within a range of only 2 to 4 points, one of the smallest spreads of the season. Such trading as developed was mainly liquidation of the March position in advance of the first notice day. March traded down to 19.24 and closed one point above that figure for a net loss of 5 points. The general market closed steady at net declines of 1 to 5 points.

As Liverpool cables were slightly lower than due first trades here showed losses of 1 to 2 points. March liquidation was encountered right after the start and as that month soon traded off to 19.24, or 6 points net down, other positions eased off in sympathy. May trading to 19.42 and July 19.48 or 3 to 6 points below the previous close.

At these levels the market encountered some support probably induced by a report from New York of good buying of new crop positions there. Prices, however, did not reach new highs but kept within the early range, rallying but 2 points from the lows.

Although unfavorable weather was a supporting influence in the market trades were reluctant to enter upon new commitments in advance of the holiday Friday to be followed by first March notice day.

The spread between March and May in the spot market extended to 19 points compared with an average of 15 yesterday. Liquidation of the near month was limited today with spot interest absorbing contracts.

Taken To Hospital

The first of the injured were taken to hospitals in Perola by passing motorists. This fact added to the confusion of those hunting for relatives. One hysterical woman heard the name of her husband called off as among the dead only to find him alive and only slightly hurt a few minutes later.

Tonight forty injured men still were in hospitals. About 100 others had been treated for minor injuries and taken to their homes. Those killed were William Brown, Lester Jones, George Wilkinson, Cecil Walker, and Charles Luthy, all residing in or near Perla. Among those so seriously hurt were James Clark, Henry Zorn, Bert Nael, and Henry Zimmer.

Wilkinson was sitting with his son when the crash came. The son helped pull his father from the wreckage and started with him to the hospital but stopped to notify the wife and mother. When they reached the hospital the man was dead.

Brown tried to leap from a smashed window and struck the ground just as the car in which he was riding fell on him. Under his body was the body of Luthy who still was alive when rescue workers reached him after using jacks to raise the car. Luthy died in a hospital later.

Neanderthal Flappers Will Be Cast In Stellar Roles For Drama of World's Early Stages, Scientists' Plan

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—Broadway is to be invaded by a troop of Cro-Magnon flappers. Neanderthal rheeks, dinosaurs, cavemen and other leading characters in the drama of anthropology.

The newest idea in theatrical revival is to go right back to the dear old colorful days when we lived in the slime, the trees and in caves.

For science is to be dramatized, popularized and visualized for us in the new Science Theatre which the American Institute of Science is going to build right in the theatrical district of New York.

To Be Scientifically Authentic, Dr. Harvey Brace Lemon, physicist, and Dr. Fay-Cooper Cole, anthropologist, professors at the University of Chicago and co-authors of "The Nature of the World and Man" have been engaged to plan the first drama of man's development for the new theatre.

Later a playwright will be called in to whip it in shape for Broadway consumption—build up the love interest, add a few of the caveman's jokes, which have survived to this day, and get this scientific loaf leavened with a little present-day levity so it can compete with our Follies and Scandals and Vanities.

"In The Beginning—" "The play begins," Dr. Cole explains, "with the story of the lifeless ages, before the reptiles and their successors, and then the coming of the glaciers over Europe. A combination of film, staging and lighting effects brings this to the eyes as the story proceeds."

"When the Third Interglacial epoch is reached, living actors appear to carry out the haunting life of that period. Man is forced by the sweeping down of the glaciers, to find shelter in the caves, and the glacial begins his struggle with the cave bears and other animals that surround him."

"Then comes the invading Cro-Magnon, who drive out the Neanderthal people, possess their caves and introduce new weapons and information and a medium for distributing and popularizing knowledge."

It will contain a auditorium which can be used for scientific societies, demonstrations of new discoveries and inventions, and the institute's own numerous lecture series. The institute has existed over a hundred years, having been founded in 1928.

Skyscraper Science. The theatre is just one feature of the skyscraper which the institute is going to build here, to become the headquarters for scientific information and a medium for distributing and popularizing knowledge.

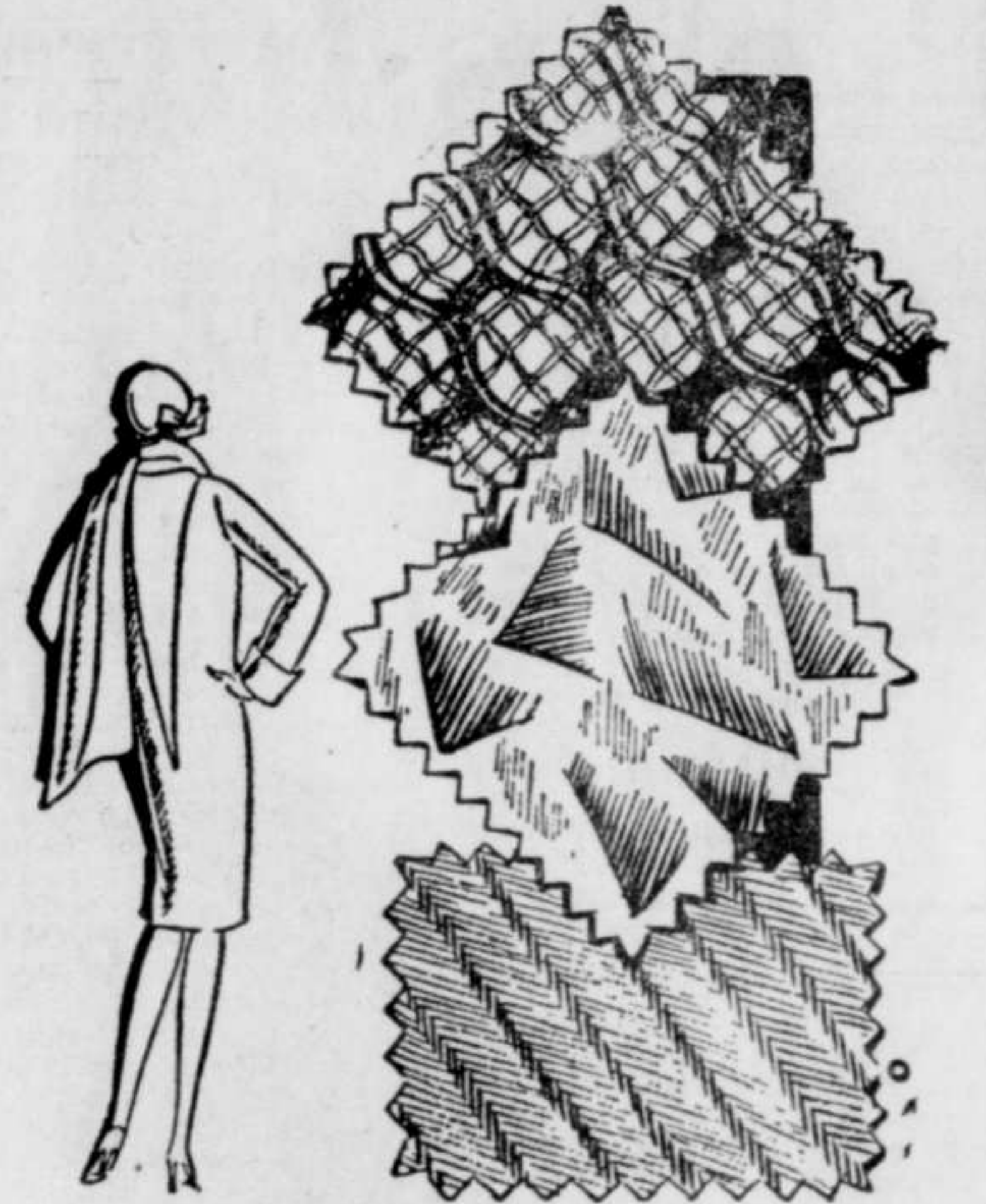

Judges and lawyers agree that circumstantial evidence must be absolutely convincing before it is safe to inflict the death penalty on the strength of it. Innocent men have been caught in its meshes and have been sent to the gallows.

One of the most noted cases in which a man has been put to death for a crime he did not commit occurred in Illinois. Mary Murphy, a domestic employed in Pontiac, Ill., went to visit her family living about six miles from town. The next afternoon she started back, walking along the railroad tracks. Eighteen days later her body was found near the tracks.

Suspicion pointed to Wiley J. Morris, who was seen in the vicinity on the afternoon of the murder. Blood stains were found on his clothing. He was arrested, convicted and hanged, despite his claims that the bloodstains were received in a fight he had had that same afternoon.

Several years after his execution a gang of horse thieves was rounded up. One of the members confessed the murder of Mary Murphy.

In the interests of justice, crimes must be solved correctly. Circumstantial evidence must be discounted. Beginning Sunday, February 24, the Morning Avalanche will publish an amazing mystery serial by Anne Austin, "The Black Pigeon."
