It means that the great West will have to be given its rightful consideration. It means that control of the country is passing steadily away from the Atlantic seaboard.

It means that we have a vast multitude of sober, hardworking, intelligent men and women living on the tablelands and Pacific slope, who are guided neither by tradition nor by commercialism in their political alignment, but who watch each administration and each candidate very closely and render judgment according to the apparent merits of the case.

THANKSGIVING DAY

That we're at peace with all the world
Safe in our cities and our homes,
That unto this, our favored land,
Such gift, with all its blessings, comes.
That men go not to war and death,
That women do not fearful brood
By anxious hearths for dear ones gone,
We thank Thee, Giver of all good.

That no ambitious strife is ours,
That lust of conquest does not thrill
This mighty nation's inmost heart,
That we abhor to burn and kill,
That weaker nations we protect,
Fight but to make their wronging cease,
And only comes to make them free,
We thank Thee, God of love and peace.

That in the stress around us now,
We feel our hearts with pity throb,

It means that with the South solidly Democratic, largely from sentimental reasons, and the East solidly republican because of financial influences, the West holds the balance of power, a balance which is rendered very dangerous to professional politicians because it is impregnated with some conscience and a whole lot of independence.

The Western ascendancy is, in some respects, a good thing for this country, for it injects a new and a wholesome element into our politics.

The election indicates an evolution in this country's political complexion. A week ago we were all pretty much of the opinion that New York and Illinois were very doubtful and would determine the result. They were neither doubtful nor will they determine the result.

The West has given Wall Street a surprise party, a surprise party so different from what was expected, so inclined toward independence, and with such a different way of arriving at conclusions that we shall all have something to think about.

The West is optimistic in philosophy, it wants nothing but constructive suggestion. Even if it feels a certain thing to be wrong, it prefers to be told what ought to be done to correct the wrong rather than why it is wrong.

Mr. Hughes failed to live up to the Western philosophy. He was put down as a knacker after his first tour, and that characterization probably had more to do with the stump in his vote than any issue that was raised.

The West believes, whether soundly or not, that a man's general attitude toward life is of more importance than his convictions on any particular question, and it was disappointed in the disposition which Mr. Hughes exhibited.

The fact that the West cannot be calculated upon, that it scratches its ticket ruthlessly, indicates that it votes neither by its pocketbook nor according to local tradition.

In connection with this assertion, which of course, is but a matter of opinion, we call attention to the fact that the West is the one section in which woman suffrage prevails to any extent, and, if the West, as compared to the South and East, furnishes reliable evidence as to the influence of woman suffrage on politics in a general way, then we say that woman suffrage is a mighty good thing, and the sooner it comes the better it will be for this nation.—Houston Chronicle.

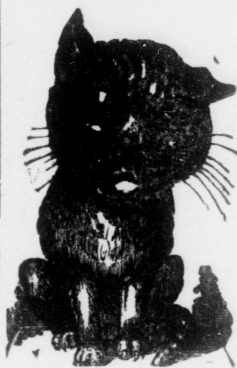

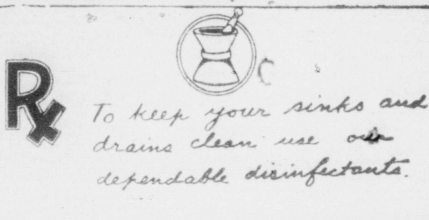
