### Dates Announced For Second Annual Quarter Horse Show And Races Here

Dates for the Second Annual Heart of Texas Horse Show sponsored by the Heart of Texas Quarter Horse Show Association, Inc., have been set for October 15, 16, and 17, according to Dr. M. E. Genrich, local veterinarian and secretary-treasurer of the show.

Dr. Genrich said Tuesday that there would be a two-day racing program Saturday and Sunday, October 16 and 17 at the local racetrack, with A. B. Hightower in charge of the racing program. Dr. Genrich added that it was tentatively planned to have mostly purse races. Monday will be given over entirely to the Quarter Horse show, described last year as exceptionally successful.

The complete program will be announced in the News as soon as plans are finished. This year's show will probably have some changes in the reining classes but halter class rules will be about the same as last year, Dr. Genrich said.

President of the show this year is Joe Brown Ross and vice-president is Thomas Espy, both local ranchmen.

Seven beautiful trophies will be awarded this year, all donated by local business firms. To date, the Foxworth-Galbraith Lumber Company has been the only firm to subscribe for a trophy. Businessmen interested in donating a trophy are asked to contact Dr. Genrich.

### Fuqua Adding Shop, Parts Dept.

A native of Big Lake, Lambert attended the Big Lake schools and lettered on the football and basketball teams. Mrs. Lambert is a native of Corona, Calif.

During the war, the new store owner was an instructor in the Aircraft and Technical Training School at Long Beach, Calif.

Lambert has the distinction of being a Carnegie Medal winner, having been accorded the honor, together with a \$500 cash award for exceptional heroism in saving a man's life in an oil field accident near Crane in 1945. The man was overcome by gas in the cellar under a rig platform and Lambert brought him out, almost losing his own life in the process.

### Barker To Build Courts, Store, Shop, On US 290

#### NEW LOCATION TO BE ACROSS FROM HUMBLE STATION NEAR BRIDGE

Granville Barker has bought the B. W. Hucherson property between the Hucherson residence and Lowrey draw on U.S. 290, and is planning construction of a barber shop, liquor store, and living quarters in one building, and six or eight single-unit tourist cabins around the main building.

Construction of all buildings will be of concrete tile and stucco, and estimated cost of the main building is \$8,500. Names of the new businesses will be Drive Inn Barber Shop, Drive Inn Courts and Drive Inn Liquor Store.

Barker said Wednesday that he is planning a modern, 3-chair barber shop and that the shop, store and living quarters would be separated by walls and would have separate entrances.

He added that in all probability construction will start by Wednesday or Thursday of this coming week.

Barker's venture marks the third major construction job on U.S. 290, the other two being the new Humble Station and cafe across the highway from Barker, and Lambert's Grocery and Station 5 blocks east.

Formerly owner of the Corner Barber Shop, Barker sold it in 1948 to Finis Hamby and bought the Drive Inn Package Store. He was also associated with A. B. Hightower in a ranching venture last year.

The new building has been cleared of shelving and fixtures and new lighting installed. As soon as the asbestos tile flooring is put down the move will be made, Trainer added.

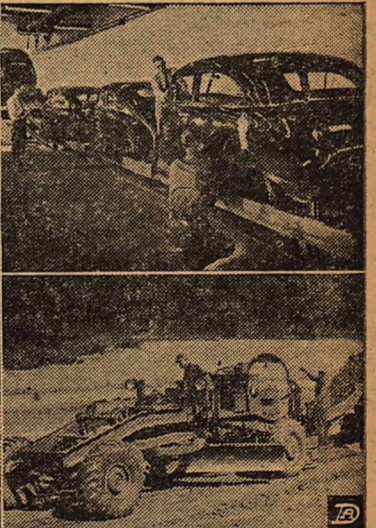
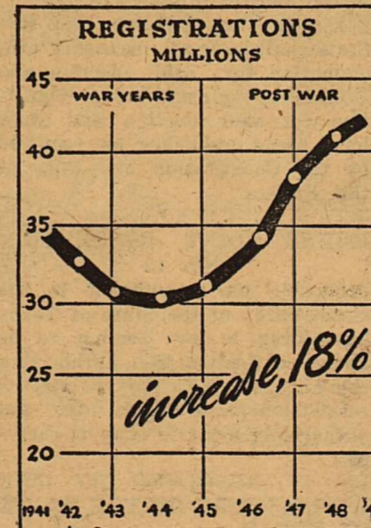

### Automotive Industry Moves Ahead



Automotive production at record levels; more automotive jobs than ever before; motor vehicle travel sets new record! This is the story of progress just revealed in the automotive industry by the Automobile Manufacturers Association.

DETROIT—In the first six months of 1949, the automotive industry produced nearly 3,000,000 new cars, trucks and buses—almost as many units as were turned out in the full year of 1946. A steady increase has been registered since the industry surmounted its war reconversion problems. A 55% gain in production was made in 1947 over 1946, and a 10% gain was registered in 1948 over the preceding year. The half year of 1949 is up 20% from the first six months of 1948.

Industry jobs jumped from 6,700,000 in 1941 to 9,020,000 in 1948. This means one out of every seven job holders in the nation earns his wages in the highway transportation industry. These jobs cover manufacturing, road building, sales and service, trucking and miscellaneous work.

Main street is dotted with more businesses keyed to highway transportation, and over 90% of them are small enterprises, employing less than 20 employees each. Business accounts for 56% of all car trips; social and recreational driving is 16% of the total; shopping 12% and other purposes 16%. Rural travel climbed from 169 billion miles in 1941 to 197 billion in 1948. Urban travel increased from 163 billion miles in 1941 to 203 billion in 1948. Governmental agencies are collecting an all-time high in automotive dollars. Special taxes alone now exceed \$3 billion annually, with motor trucks accounting for more than a third of the total. One of the largest tax items is the federal excise levy on new motor vehicles. First invoked as a "temporary emergency measure" in 1932, it has been increased twice since, instead of being repealed.

Constitutional Amendments- Election Tuesday, NOV. 8

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be the same is amended hereby so to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed on thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following: "FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on proposed amendment; and if shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand and (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 15, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: Section 19. The Legislature shall reserve by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; providing that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is, amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows: "Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3) cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and provid-

ing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows: "Sec. 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month."

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller."

Section 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows: "Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year."

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session. Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months."

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4/5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

Section 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D. 1950.

Section 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State of the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

Section 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15

Section 1. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following: "FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts;" and "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 34

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; and "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows: "Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following: "FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts;" and "AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

## Texas Retail Sales Show 4% Drop Under July, 1948; Lumber 20% Less

Texas retail sales estimated at 401 million dollars in July were 1 per cent lower than in June and 4 per cent below July 1948, the Texas Bureau of Business Research reported this week.

Jewelry sales dropped 12 per cent from June and 21 per cent from July 1948. Automotive stores' sales gained 3 per cent over June and 14 per cent over July 1948 but other durable goods monthly declines included hardware store sales, 9 per cent; building material and lumber sales, 6 per cent; and furniture and household sales, 2 per cent. In the July-to-July durable goods comparison, building material and lumber sales slumped 20 per cent; hardware store sales, 11 per cent; and furniture and household sales, 9 per cent.

In the nondurable goods group, July sales dipped 2 per cent from June and 9 per cent from July 1948.

Food stores had a 7-per-cent monthly gain, drug stores and eating and drinking places had a 1-per-cent rise, and country general store sales were up fractionally, but all other nondurable goods stores showed July sales lagging behind June totals.

From a year earlier, department store sales fell 13 per cent; apparel store sales sagged 10 per cent; women's speciality and shoe stores had 11-per-cent declines; family clothing stores, 10-per-cent decreases; and men's and boys' clothing stores, 6 per cent drops.

Other declines from July 1948 included: florist, office supply

dealers, country general and general merchandise stores, 10 per cent; eating and drinking places, 9 per cent; food stores, 6 per cent; and drug stores and filling stations, 3 per cent.

## A LOOK AT THE BOOK

Jesus Christ healed a blind man on the Sabbath day. When the Pharisees heard about it, they questioned the man; and hearing the story of the miracle, there was a division among them—some, not believing, and some saying of Jesus, "This man is not of God, because He keepeth not the Sabbath day," and other saying, "How can a man that is a sinner do such miracles?" (John 9:16). Finally they sent for the parents of the man who had been healed. They gave their evidence, testifying that he was their son and had been born blind. "By what mean he now seeth, we know not; or who hath opened his eyes, we know not; he is of age; ask him: he shall speak for himself." Brought again before the Pharisees, this man whose eyes had been opened said, "I have told you already, and ye did not hear." The Pharisees in anger replied, "We know that God spake unto Moses: as for this fellow, we know not from whence He is." The answer of the man who had known the touch of the Saviour's hand in healing is stinging in its contempt and unanswerable in its rebuke, "Why herein is a marvelous thing, that ye know not from whence He is, and yet He hath opened mine eyes."

The Pharisees quite plainly were not searching for the truth in their questioning. They had refused the truth when it was given to them. They were more interested in disproving a miracle than they were in finding out its cause. "Wise men" they were, yet ignorant of the important truth that God's Son, their Messiah, was in their midst. They remind us of some of the "wise men" of our own day. The philosophers and the psychologists deny the miracle of the new birth; and when faced with the inescapable evidence of God's power in salvation, they seek to analyze and explain it. Refusing to recognize the deity of the Lord Jesus Christ and the power of His blood to take away all sin, believing Him only a teacher and the son of Joseph, the carpenter, they are confounded and silenced by the simple Chris-

tian who bears in his daily living the evidence of a transforming miracle. Man by wisdom knows not God (1 Corinthians 1:21), and wise men can never find Him in the mazes of their logic. But this is a marvelous thing—that He hath opened blind eyes and given new life to men dead in sin.

1½ lbs. chuck beef, ground  
2 tablespoons minced onion  
1½ tablespoons chopped green pepper  
1 1/3 cups finely cubed soft bread crumbs  
½ teaspoon salt  
1 egg  
3 tablespoons catchup  
2½ teaspoons prepared horseradish  
½ teaspoon dry mustard  
1 cup Barbecue Sauce, heated  
Mix beef, onion, green pepper bread crumbs, salt, egg catchup, horseradish, mustard and milk together; blend well. Shape into 6 small loaves; place in greased 10 x 6 x 2 inch baking dish. Bake in oven 350 degrees F. for 1 hour. Serve with Barbecue Sauce. Makes 6 servings.

TO FREEZE: Bake as usual; cool. Wrap 6 loaves in moisture-vapor-proof paper using drugstore fold. Insert in stockinette; knot ends; label. Or wrap in aluminum foil; label. Place in home freezer and freeze.

TO THAW: Unwrap; place 6 unthawed meat loaves in 10 x 6 x 2-inch baking dish. Bake in oven 400 degrees F. After 20 minutes pour 1 cup Barbecue Sauce over meat loaves - heat 10 minutes longer. Makes 6 servings.

Barbecue Sauce  
2¼ cups tomato catchup  
2½ tablespoons Worcestershire sauce.

¾ teaspoon red pepper  
¾ teaspoon chili powder  
½ cup tarragon vinegar  
1 cup salt pork liquor\*  
1 cup sugar  
6 to 8 cloves garlic, scored  
1 tablespoon minced onion  
Combine all ingredients. Bring to boil. Remove pieces of garlic. Makes about 1 quart.

Note: cover and store in refrigerator until used. Sauce may be stored for 2 weeks.

\*Salt pork liquor is made by boiling 2 strips (1½ x 5 x 1/8 inches) salt pork in 1½ cups of water for about 5 minutes. Drain off 1 cup liquor.

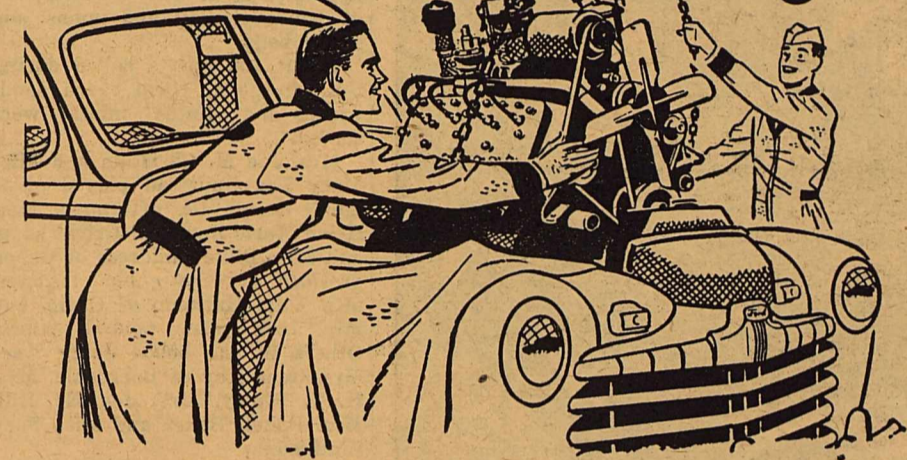

### YOUR HEALTH

The month of September brings a return of school days, and thousands of Texas boys and girls will be returning to classrooms for the next nine months. Every one of these children, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, should be as free as possible from all physical defects that can be corrected, and protected against other diseases which frequently spread through classrooms.

A complete medical and dental pre-school check-up is of the utmost importance in getting the child ready for school. Eyes, ears, nose, throat, and teeth should be carefully examined, and all remediable defects corrected or placed under treatment. Such defects can lead to serious impairment of growth and progress academically, socially and emotionally.

Defects of hearing and vision handicap a child in his class work, and often result in the false impression that he is backward and unable to learn. Such defects can often be corrected, and the child is not only more progressive in his school work, but is a happier, better balanced individual as a result of being more socially acceptable. Dental defects should be corrected not only for cosmetic reasons, but because good teeth enable a child to chew his food properly and thus promote good digestion and bodily nourishment.

"In addition to correcting such defects as already exist, young children should be protected by immunization against disease, when possible," Dr. Cox said. "Immunization is safe and dependable, and every child is entitled to this protection against disease."

- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg
- 2 1/2 cups milk
- 1/4 cup melted shortening

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Beat egg slightly and add milk. Add to flour mixture, stirring until flour is moistened. Add shortening. Bake on ungreased, hot griddle. Makes about 30 four-inch cakes.

**No Substitute For The Superior Flavor Home-Grown Vegetables Have**

Why not grow a fall garden this year? There is no substitute for the superior flavor and delicious goodness of vegetables grown in your own garden, says John E. Hutchinson, horticulturist of Texas A&M.

Soil preparation is simple. The residues of the previous crops, the stems and the vines should be removed along with all grass and weeds, he adds.

Germination at this season is

usually poor and Hutchinson advises using about a fourth more seed in order to get a good stand. Seed with a hard seed coat, such as beets and carrots, should be soaked over night before planting but don't plant soaked seed in dry soil. Irrigate before planting if the soil is dry.

In many sections of the state, it is time now to make your first plantings. You can include beans either Pinto or Stringless Green

Pod; Irish Potatoes, Bliss Triumph or Katahdin; onions, use sets or plants for the Bermudas and shallots for the Creole; mustard, Tendergreen or Southern Curled; turnips, Purple Top or Shogoin; radishes, Scarlet Globe or Icicle; and for something new Hutchinson suggests you try the Great Lakes variety of lettuce.

For the second planting, you can include semi-hardy vegetables that are able to withstand a light frost; carrots, Chantenay or Danvers Half Long; cabbage, Jersey Wakefield, All Head or Copenhagen Market; beets, Detroit Dark Red or Crosby's Egyptian; swiss chard, Lucullus.

For the third planting, you can include the hardy vegetables. They are the ones able to withstand a heavy frost: collards, Georgia or Louisiana Sweet (use plants); english peas, First & Best (smooth) or Marvel (wrinkled); lettuce, (head) New York No. 12 or Imperial; spinach, Bloomsdale Savoy (crinkle), or Giant Noble (smooth) and another planting of onions is in order, says Hutchinson.

The suggested dates for the first planting are August 15-30; for the second, September 1-15 and for the third, September 15 to October 15. These suggested dates according to Hutchinson are for Central Texas and in North and Northwest Texas earlier plantings should be made while in the southern part of the state plantings can be made at a later date.

Hutchinson says, it is still hot in August and the soil will dry out very rapidly after you have made your plantings. If you'll cover your planted rows with boards or old sacks, it will help keep the soil cool and conserve moisture. But don't forget to remove them when the plants start coming up, he cautions. Don't cultivate deep but stir the soil after each shower or irrigation, says Hutchinson.

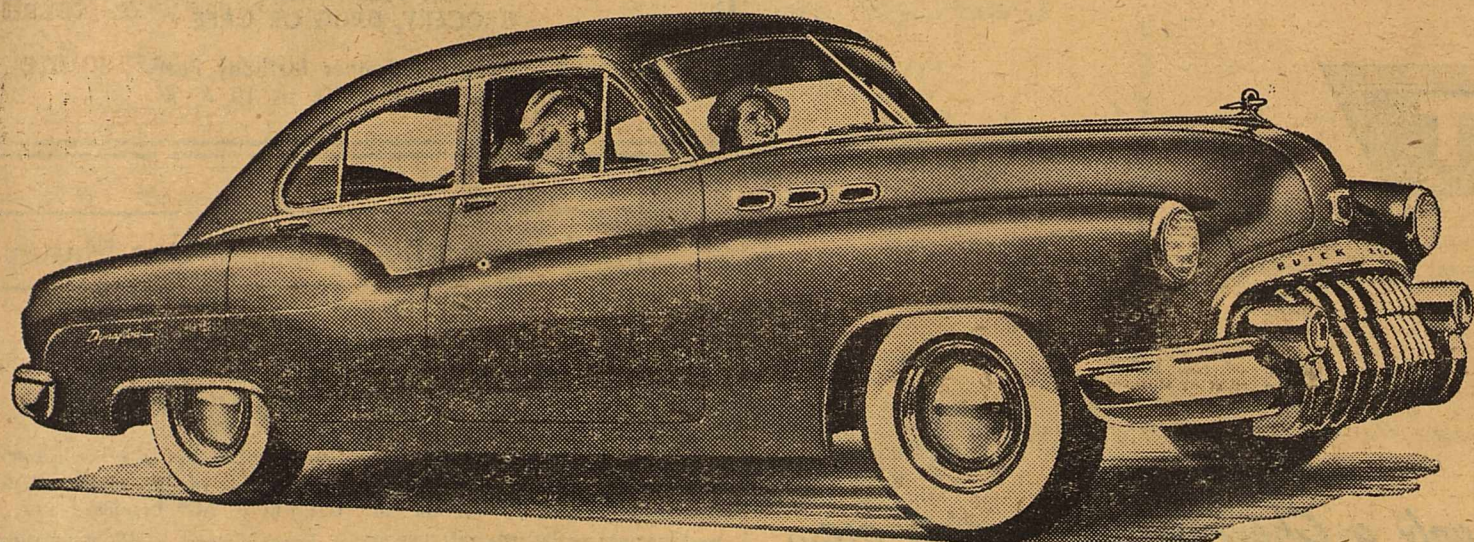

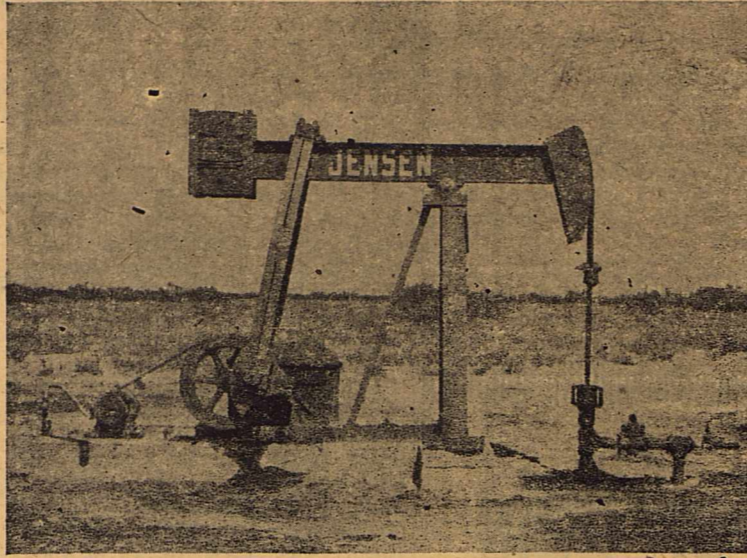

**Weekly Swing of  
SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS**

Many southwest farm products moved to lower price levels during the past week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Heavier receipts of cattle and calves last week than the week before brought generally lower prices. Most classes lost around 50 cents at Houston, and \$1 to \$2 or more at Fort Worth and Oklahoma City. However, Monday's trade found many kinds unchanged from a week before at San Antonio, and some higher at Denver.

Spring lambs evidenced less weakness at Texas and Oklahoma markets than in the midwest, as receipts showed less increase. Ewes made up a large part of receipts and prices eased slightly. Goats advanced mostly 25 cents at San Antonio.

Texas wools sold strong at 50 to 52 cents a pound in heavy contracting last week. Mohair rose to mostly 40 to 41 a pound for adult and 61 to 65 for kid.

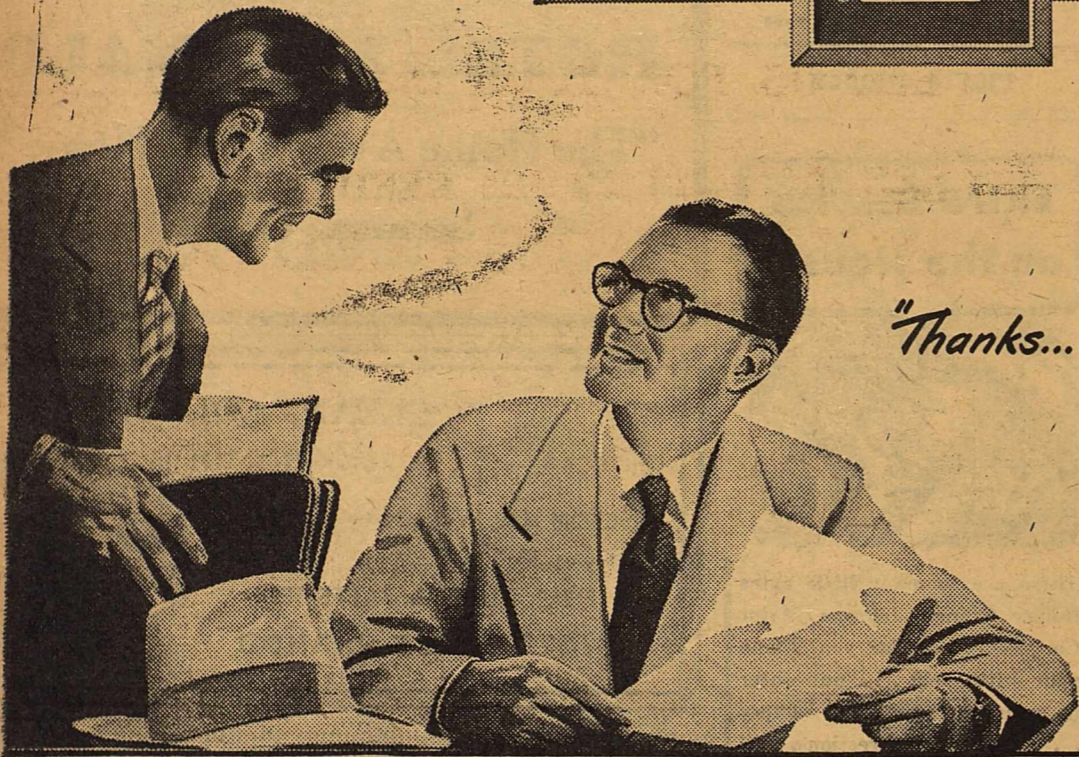

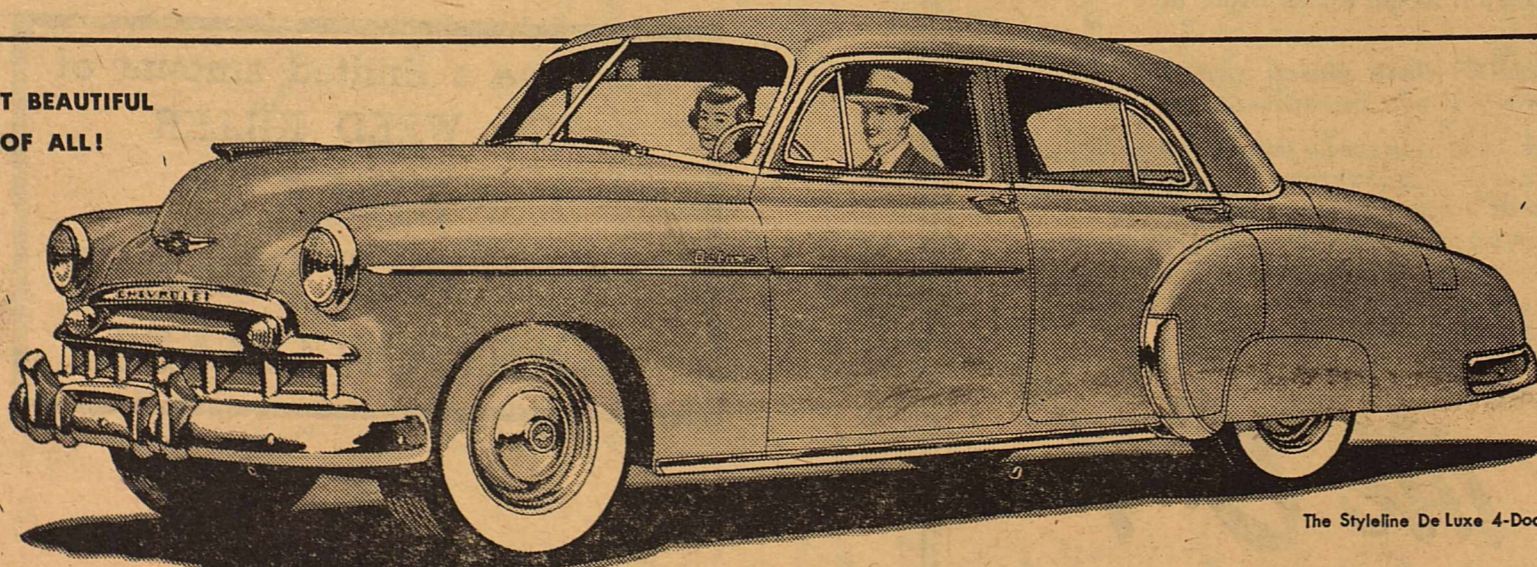

Grading your wool for market is not a difficult job, and over the long pull, it will pay good dividends, says Joe V. Whiteman, Extension Assistant, State College, New Mexico.

In fine wool clips, let's grade the wool on length. All wool over 2 1/2 inches in length, we will call "A" wool; wool 2 to 2 1/2 inches long, we will call "B" wool; and the rest of the wool, or the wool under 2 inches in length, we will call "C" wool. This grading can be done easiest and best before shearing, by means of a long narrow chute about five feet wide in which we can crowd the ewes. We examine the fleece on each ewe and mark her according to the length of wool. A spot half-way between the hip bone and tail and just at the edge of the back, or where the back breaks to become the breech, is a good spot to indicate the average length of fleece on the ewe. A ewe is marked on the head, B's on the back, and C's on the rump.

After marking the ewes according to the length of wool, we separate them according to the marks which we put on them. Then shear each group separately, bag the wool separately, and mark the bag according to the kind of wool that's in it.

When wool is put up this way, the buyer knows exactly what he is getting, we know what we've got, and it is very easy to calculate what it is worth. We can also tell the return for wool from our A ewes compared to our C ewes. The ewes are also separated for selective breeding, if we wish to use this highly commendable method of improvement.

If our wool is mixed wool—that is, of more than one grade—then we table grade it according to U. S. grades. Here again the advantages are the same. We know what we've got and what it is worth, and the buyer knows what he is bidding on and can more easily pay the full value.

Can you remember how hot bare ground felt when you used to go

barefooted? How you hunted grassy spots to walk on? That was just probably what you called a natural reaction, but the matter of soil temperature is a very important item in a soil building program, says Roy L. Donahue of Texas A&M.

A summer cover crop keeps the soil cooler in hot weather and a winter cover crop helps to hold the temperature up in the winter time. This cover is important for Donahue says that for every 10 degrees rise in temperature most chemical reactions are doubled and there are plenty of chemical reactions taking place in the soil. The rotting of organic matter is a chemical reaction.

So when the soil is allowed to go without summer cover, it gets very hot and this causes the organic matter to burn up faster. Soil low in organic matter doesn't take up moisture when it rains and is drier when the rains don't come often. In areas where wind erosion is a problem, it blows away easily, and in areas of heavy rainfall, it washes badly, says Donahue.

Hog cholera continues to take a heavy death toll of swine in Texas and there is no good excuse

for this loss, as the disease could probably be eradicated, if all Texas swine producers followed a program of strict sanitation and used the highly successful vaccinations recommended for the control of hog cholera.

The most widely used method of vaccination is known as the serum and virus or simultaneous method. The live virus of hog cholera and a hog cholera antiserum are injected at the same time. This method produces immunity in from seven to ten days after being administered to healthy pigs. The immunity in normal pigs is usually strong enough to give lifetime protection and the cost is moderate.

The big advantage of using the serum and virus method is that live virus is introduced on the

premises. Carelessness or misuse can cause an outbreak of hog cholera. Once vaccination is done with serum and virus, it is wise to repeat the vaccination year after year on all pigs.

The advantages of the "kill" vaccine method are based on the facts that the virus in the vaccine have been killed and it will not introduce hog cholera on clean premises nor can susceptible pigs become infected from it. In addition, this vaccine can be used on ailing or unthrifty pigs without the risk of adding one disease to another.

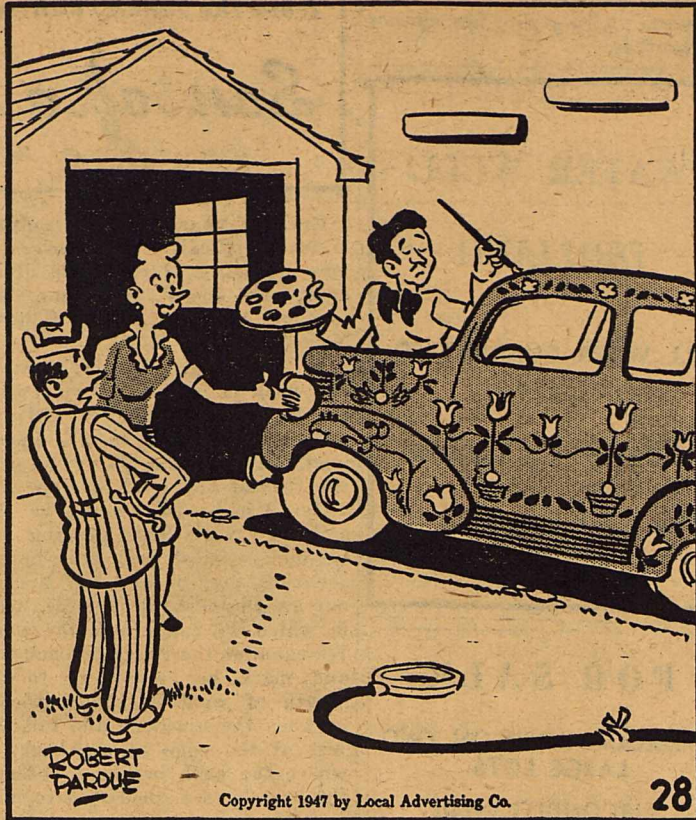

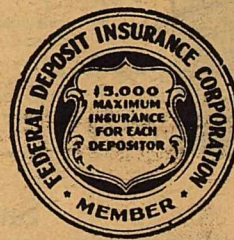

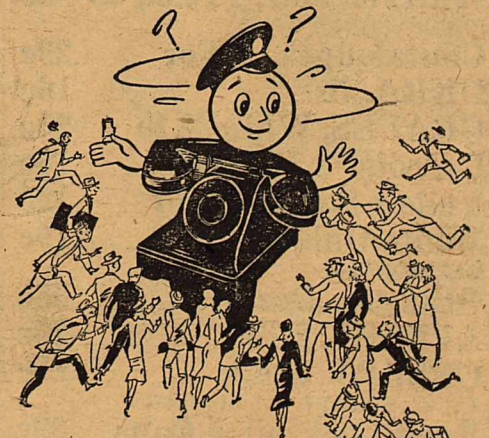
