Ten Ranger High School student council members and J. S. Wilhelm, sponsor, attended the Eleventh Annual Oil Belt and District Council meeting in Stephenville last week.

Dr. J. H. Landes Elected President Texas Baptists

Dr. James H. Landes, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Wichita Falls, was re-elected Thursday to his second term as president of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Elected as first vice-president for the convention was Dr. Joe Weldon Bailey, pastor of the Columbus Avenue Baptist Church of Waco, and named as second vice-president was the Rev. Tommy Burress, pastor of the Hillcrest Baptist Church of Austin.

In the Thursday morning opening address, the executive secretary of the Southern Baptist executive committee, Dr. Porter Routh of Nashville, Tenn., said that the denomination had made great strides in growth during the past decade.

"But I would not paint my ' Pollyanna' picture of easy progress in the decade ahead," said Routh, a native of Lufkin.

"Our launching pads are important," he said, "but we must be cautious lest we spend all of our money on our launching pads and seek to use tissue paper rockets."

"The next decade will depend more on what man does with his inner space than with what he does in outer space," Routh said.

In an earlier address, Dr. Herbert Howard, pastor of the Park Cities Baptist Church of Dallas, diagnosed what he felt was the main reason Baptists have not been giving enough funds to world missions.

Dr. Howard said that local churches too often think of the denomination's "Cooperative Program" method of giving as just another item on the budget, like the pastor's salary to be "held in check."

He suggested changing the name of the Cooperative Program to "what it really is — 'World Missions.'"

Bob Patterson Attends FBI School Monday

Ranger Chief of Police Bob Patterson attended a FBI School of Instruction in Abilene last Monday. The school was for all law enforcement officers and bankers in the Abilene area.

Post Office To Help Count County Livestock

Rural mail carriers from the Ranger post office will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes beginning Nov. 16th.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas Farms," Acting Postmaster Max Ohr explained.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes.

"This means that not every box will get a card," Mr. Ohr said. "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that US DA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: Wesley Poyner, Route 1; D. C. Singleton, Route 2; and C. B. Oslen, Route 3.

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for the Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of Livestock and poultry on farms as one of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio, and television.

This annual survey has been a joint undertaking of the Post Office and the Agriculture Department since 1924.

NUCLEAR PULSE REACTOR—The U. S. Army Ordnance Corps' first Nuclear Pulse Reactor was dedicated Oct. 17 at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, Forest Glen, Md. Nicknamed DORF—for Diamond Ordnance Radiation Facility—the reactor will be manned and operated by personnel of the Diamond Ordnance Fuze Laboratories. The pulsing reactor can simulate many of the conditions encountered in a nuclear blast with safety to operating personnel. Radiation effects on selected Army items of equipment then can be analyzed without the blast and heat effect of an exploding bomb. The reactor was constructed by General Dynamics Corp., Calif.

County Pecan Show To Have New Feature This Year

Seventeen attended the meeting at the Ranger Chamber of Commerce Thursday night, November 9 to work out details of the Ninth Annual Pecan Show of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association, including officers and directors of the Association and local citizens.

W. J. Herrington, of Ranger, general chairman for arrangements, introduced "Hank" Sims, president of the association who presided. Sims expressed his and the association's appreciation for the enthusiasm shown by the group and especially thanked County Agent J. M. Cooper for the service he is rendering the association and for the people of Eastland County.

Ben McKinnis, secretary of the association presented a work sheet setting forth things to be done in preparation for the show, and Chairman Herrington accepted the responsibility for the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, and will announce his committees within the next few days.

A new feature added to this year's show will include first, second and third prizes for the best center-piece pecans in various forms and other material, such as leaves, etc. The prizes will be \$5.00, \$3.00 and \$2, and ribbons will also be awarded the winners.

The show will be held in the Joseph building on Main street Dec. 8-9 and will be preceded by the crowning of the queen of the show on Thursday night, Dec. 8, before the show starts on Friday. The 1947 Club of Ranger is sponsoring the queen contest program and 27 committees in Eastland County have been invited to enter contestants.

Rules and regulations are now in the hands of the printer and will be mailed to every member of the association and to those who are not members but had exhibits in last year's show.

There were 261 entries in last year's show and the goal this year is for at least 300.

Shoside was awarded a 2.0 Air Force, Navy, Marine and Coast Guard reserve officers selected to gain a better understanding of the world conflict and the organization, resources and methods used by our adversaries to accomplish their aims. The seminar alerted these officers to the threat posed by, and the dangers of, the cold war, as well as to inform them of U. S. plans and programs in support of national security policy.

Shoside heard many outstanding military leaders as well as civilians during the two-week Seminar.

Shoside is a graduate of T.C.M. and is a World War II veteran. He has been connected with newspapers, advertising and public relations for several years. He was presented the Air Force Commendation Medal in April, 1960, for his work as a reserve officer within the Strategic Air Command. He is a member of the military affairs committee of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce.

It is that the United States has 7% of the world's population and manufactures half of the goods and services of the world. This alone proves that America is great, but it is spiritual enlightenment that makes countries come from bondage to some other form of government. "A nation rises to greatness and remains that way because it responds to all challenges." Some of the challenges to be met are productivity, responsibility, the eclipse of the individual, and too much emphasis on security.

He concluded by stating five principles that have made our country great: Firm religious conviction; a great economic system headed by the American dollar, the power of production and of lands in the hands of individuals, having a definite goal, and international position.

Dr. Wallace in his address Wednesday evening said that, if the American dream of education for all is to be realized and we are to meet the competition of opposing forces, certain conditions in America will have to be corrected. The public image of schools must change, schools must offer a comprehensive, balanced program, the American public has to get interested and informed about education, Americans must come to realize that there is a relation between quality of schools and cost, and people in America at the community level must sit down with board members and legislators and come to an agreement as to what is needed in schools.

He concluded by stating that we need "to stir ourselves, love learning, and respect work." Attendance at the various programs was very good. In addition to Ranger Junior College students,

students from Ranger and Gordon High Schools and townspeople from both Ranger and Eastland attended.

ved Rotary Foundation Fellowships for study in 50 countries, with grants averaging about \$2,600. Total grants by The Rotary Foundation for this activity now exceed \$3,700,000.

Rotary Fellowships are unique in that, with more than 11,000 rotary Clubs throughout the world, the student is in direct contact with Rotarians and their families wherever he is studying. He attends their Rotary club meetings, visits in their homes and places of business, and travels as much as possible during his school holidays. In his way he sees at first hand how the people in his host country live and he lays the foundation for increased international understanding which is one of Rotary's principal objectives.
