SOUTHERN CROSS LANDS IN HAWAII

DOZEN FEARED
LOST AS TWO
SHIPS COLLIDEFREIGHTER RAMMED IN
VINEYARD HAVEN BY
BIG STEAMER

(By Associated Press)
VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., June 1.—An undetermined number of the crew of the freighter Kershaw, variously estimated from seven to 12, were drowned here early today when their ship was rammed and sunk by the Boston-bound Dollar Liner President Garfield. Thirty members of the Kershaw's crew, including Captain Brooks, were rescued.

The collision occurred a few feet off East Chop, an island off Vineyard Haven, at 12:30 a. m. in a clear sky and smooth sea. According to Captain G. H. Moir, seaman here for the Dollar Line company, the President Garfield was proceeding at 14 knots when it struck the Kershaw on the latter's port side, forward of the bridge.

Freighter Breaks Apart
The Kershaw rolled over and the two ships held together for a moment. The freighter broke apart and went down within 10 minutes in 80 feet of water.

Boat Coming
With Rescued

BOSTON, June 1 (AP).—Officers of the Dollar Line here announced their steamer President Garfield, which rammed and sank the freighter Kershaw off Martha's Vineyard early today had reported as proceeding with 20 survivors, including the captain, of the sunken ship.

MEXICO CITY, June 1.—Two men were under arrest today in connection with the attempted smuggling of silk into Mexico from the United States, and the attorney of one of them has been ordered to leave the country.

BODIES FOUND
AFTER HOME IS
FIRE WRECKEDFATHER AND MOTHER
AND SIX CHILDREN
DIE IN KANSAS

COVERT, Kas., June 1.—The Albert Kaser family of eight was burned to death in a fire of undetermined origin, which destroyed their farm home, 2½ miles northeast of Covert, last night.

The charred bodies of the father and mother and their six children were discovered in the ruins. All but the two younger children were burned past recognition.

Inquest Is Ordered

A coroner's inquest was to be held today.
The dead: Albert Kaser, 32; Mrs. Albert Kaser, 30; Katie Lee Kaser, 2; Alvin Kaser, 4; Margaret Kaser, 6; John Kaser, 8; Albert Kaser, 10; and Raymond Kaser, 12.

The fire was past control when discovered about 11 o'clock when the entire building was a mass of flames. There was no sign of life evident in the home.

Bodies Are All Found

As soon as the drying embers had cooled sufficiently, neighbors entered the ruins. They found the bodies of the entire family on what remained of their beds, with the exception of the father. His body was found lying in the ruins near where the door to the house had been located.

The house was a two-story structure and all the family was reported to have been sleeping on the second floor.

Five empty revolver shells were found just outside the house. They had been fired since the rain last night, it was believed, as they were untraced. Kaser's revolver was found in the ruins of the house.

Two Men Killed In
Explosion Of Acid

KEARNY, N. J., June 1 (AP).—At least two men were killed and a severe injured in an explosion of acid today at the DuPont Viscoid company plant in DeForest Avenue. The bodies of the two men were recovered from the ruins by police and firemen, who, protected by gas masks, began the search a few minutes after the blast had occurred.

About a score of girls employed in departments near the scene of the explosion, were treated at the emergency hospital for shock.

SEVEN KILLED
AS INTERURBAN
CARS COLLIDEFIVE OTHERS BELIEVED
FATALLY HURT AND
15 MORE INJURED

(By the Associated Press)
DANVILLE, Ill., June 1.—Two interurban cars of the Illinois traction system crashed head on near Pittsburg, seven miles west of here, late yesterday. Seven persons were killed, five were probably fatally hurt and 15 others were injured less seriously.

Failure of airbrakes of the eastbound limited, which was to have taken a siding to let the westbound local pass, was blamed for the accident. The motorman of the local, Clarence Cummings, Springfield, escaped with bruises, jumping when he realized he could not check his car. Frank Craig, Danville motorman of the eastbound local, was killed.

Local Car Shattered

All the dead and seriously injured were in the local, a car of wooden construction. The limited was of steel.

SETTLEMENT IN
RADIUM POISON
CASE IS SEENPROPOSAL IS MADE BY
JUDGE AFTER WOMEN
SUE FOR DAMAGES

(By Associated Press)
NEWARK, N. J., June 1.—Proposals for settlement of the \$1,250,000 suits of five women said to be dying as a result of their work in the factory of the United States Radium corporation at Orange, N. J., today were before attorneys.

The proposals were advanced by Federal Judge William Clark, who is acting in a private capacity, at a conference yesterday among officials of the company, their insurance backers and lawyers for the women. A decision on the compromise proposals is expected to be made at a further conference in Judge Clark's chambers Monday. The damage suits are scheduled to come up in circuit court June 11.

Women Said Dying

Several physicians have said the five women are dying of radioactivity in their bodies, caused by absorbing radium when they touched to their lips the brushes they used in the factory to paint dials on watches.

The five are Katherine Schaub, Quinla McDonald, Grace Fryer, Edna Hussman and Albina Larice. The proposals call for an annuity settlement for money spent for medical treatments and insurance to go to their families when they die.

Confers With Doctor

Justice Clark, prior to the conference, conferred with Dr. Harrison S. Martland, county medical examiner, who told him that a recent test convinced him of the presence of radioactivity in the women's bodies. When he had the women breathe against a pure zinc sulphide screen tiny sparks were visible.

Justice Clark said he was acting as a mediator merely in a private capacity as a citizen and from purely humanitarian motives. "I would like to see the girls get some compensation to make them happy for as long as they have to live," he said. "They need it now and to have their cases go to trial would mean that decision might not be had for two or three years, and then it might come too late."

Moody Celebrates
Birthday At Work

AUSTIN, June 1 (AP).—Governor Dan Moody was 35 years old today. As far as could be learned, he planned to "celebrate" only by going through his office routine.

Receiving 35 made the executive busy enough to hold the office of president or vice-president. While he has been mentioned frequently as a possible recipient of the vice-presidential nomination, Mr. Moody has said that he seeks and is considering no post other than that of governor for a second term.

NEGRO PAYS IN
STATE PEN FOR
YOUTH'S DEATHDAVENPORT WALKS TO
CHAIR CALMLY AND
PAYS WITH LIFE

(By Associated Press)
HUNTSVILLE, June 1.—Lawrence Davenport, Houston negro, walked to the electric chair in the penitentiary here at 12:41 a. m. today and paid with his life for the slaying of Oscar Foster, white youth of Houston.

Poster Was Shot to Death on May 22, 1927, as he was attempting to protect a young girl companion from an attack by the negro.

Col. W. A. McDaniel, recently appointed warden of the penitentiary, threw the switches which sent currents of electricity through the negro's body.

Has Nothing to Say

Entering the execution chamber, Davenport told the warden he had nothing to say. Then he knelt at the feet of father Finnegan, prison chaplain, and kissed a golden cross hanging about his black robes. He chanted a prayer as he watched attendants adjust the electrodes.

The lights dimmed; the body lurched forward and three minutes after the first current, the negro was pronounced dead.

"I have nothing to say," Col. McDaniel, a former army officer, recalled when questioned about his first execution. "Earlier he said he favored capital punishment."

Fort Worth Woman
Hurt In Collision

MONOPLANE COMPLETES FIRST
LEG OF AUSTRALIAN TRIP AND
LANDS ON FIELD AT HONOLULU

(By the Associated Press)
WHEELER FIELD, Hawaii, June 1.—The world's most perilous over water flight—west coast to Hawaii—was completed today for the fifth time when Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith and three companions of the monoplane Southern Cross landed at Wheeler Field, Honolulu, from Oakland airport at 9:49 A. M., (12:19 A. M. coast time).

Anxiety that had continued hours for the courageous Australian-American crew was relieved when the plane was sighted over Koko Head, and escorting planes rushed to meet them. In the pilots cockpit besides Kingsford-Smith, commander, were Lieut. Charles Ulm, co-pilot, and the two Americans, Harry W. Lyon, navigator, and James Warner, both of San Francisco.

Escorted by army and navy planes she came into the field, 20 miles from Honolulu, announced by strains of enthusiastic welcomes.

Thus ended the first leg of an air adventure of 7,800 miles over seas to Sydney, Australia. The next air passage is to Suva, Fiji Islands, more than 3,100 miles over swelling waves broken only by occasional detts of Gormi-and-volcanic-rock.

A Battery Is Dead

HONOLULU, June 1 (AP).—The Southern Cross radioed: "Guess we are lost. Radio A battery went down. Please get ship with receiver. Get our bearing on my 740 wave. Will keep going so they can track us."

The message was received about 10:15 a. m. coast time.

This message came 25 minutes after one from the Southern Cross flashing the tensing words "sighted land."

It meant that the watchers ashore must curb their impatience and eagerness to greet the four men bravely winging their way from California's coast at Oakland.

Cleveland took its third straight beating from the oncoming Detroit Tigers, 9 to 4. Shautie and Buckeye were pounded for sixteen hits while Obispo pitched effectively for the Tigers.

The St. Louis Browns and Chicago White Sox ended all square after a double-header at St. Louis. Lyons held the Browns to seven scattered hits in the first set.

WISCONSIN IS MAKING READY FOR COOLIDGE

PRESIDENT TO SPEND SUMMER VACATION NEAR SUPERIOR

(The Associated Press.)
SUPERIOR, Wis., June 1.—A jubilant Wisconsin hummed today with eager preparations for a president's vacation.

So far as the vacation itself was concerned there remained nothing to do, for nature dresses most attractively in the Brule river country. The forests of Jack Pine, the wild life, the crystal-clear waters are there. Trout flash in the streams, black bass idle in the lake, while an occasional deer jumps between the trees.

Details Not Arranged

These things are ready for President Coolidge at the Cedar Island lodge of the late Henry Clay Pierce, New York and St. Louis financiers. Details of communication and transportation to be worked out in the fortnight remaining before the president plans to arrive. When these arrangements are completed, the little island will be equipped as a place where the president not only may have every opportunity for rest, but also facilities for keeping a constant finger on the pulse of a nation.

The executive headquarters of the nation is expected to be established in the Superior, Wis., Central high school from the time of the president's anticipated arrival on June 12, to his departure early in September. President and Mrs. Coolidge's entourage will include 14 house servants, ten secret service men, Everett Sanders, the

daily, excepting Sundays, between Superior and the lodge, a distance of about 40 miles. It is probable that the president will attend church services at Lake Nebagamon Congregational church, 10 miles from the president's white house choice.

Facilities Being Arranged

In Superior plans have been started toward arranging for the president's telephone, telegraph and president's secretary and 60 soldiers to serve as guards. The president probably will drive other facilities at his summer executive offices here. New wires and instruments, and other equipment will have to be installed at Brule and Winnebago, it is expected. Among the novelties of the Pierce estate is a "cedar" bridge made of oak. Mr. Pierce, who spent thousands to beautify his grounds, wanted a cedar bridge from among his trees, but all his cedars were back in the swamp and virtually unobtainable, or of such quality as not suitable. So he used oak instead and cleverly imposed the cedar bark over the oak logs in such a manner that one almost has to cut into the wood before noticing the deception.

And for the men aboard the Southern Cross watching the gauge which marked the diminishing supply of gasoline it meant anxious peering ahead to discern the lofty peaks of Oahu Island on which they bring their land plane to rest.

Immediately on receipt of the latest message, three planes of the army were ordered to stand by ready to escort Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith, Lieut. Charles T. P. Ulm, the Australian pilots, together with Harry W. Lyon, navigator, and James Warner, radio operator, both of San Francisco, to a safe landing.

"Sighted Land" Is Report From Plane

HONOLULU, June 1.—The Mutual Wireless company reported that the Southern Cross flashed this message "sighted land" at 6:35 a. m. (8:05 a. m. Pacific time). A beautiful clear morning greeted the aviators as they approached the end of the first stage of their long flight to Australia from Oakland.

The night was rainless with a full moon. Visibility from Wheeler Field was excellent, the bold promontory of Diamond Head looming clearly.

Field Nearly Deserted
In contrast to previous west coast to Hawaii flight mornings, Wheeler Field was practically deserted. The larger part of the spectators awaiting the flyers was made up of seven companies of troops who marched on the field at 6 a. m., prepared to keep order.

Governor Wallace R. Farrington arrived at the field in company with the debating team from Bates College of Lewiston, Maine. Some 300 persons were on the field at 6:30 a. m. Very few of

these had been on the field all night, contrasted with the great crowds who came out the night before to greet the Dole flyers last summer.

Dole Flight Cited As Last Attempt

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1.—The last serious attempt to fly across the Pacific was made during the Dole flight last August, which resulted in several tragedies. The flight was for \$25,000 in prizes posted by James B. Dole, Hawaiian pineapple grower. The first prize of \$25,000 was won by Arthur Gossel of Hollywood, in the Woolacoe. The second prize of \$10,000 was won by Martin Jensen of Honolulu, in the Aloha. The prizes were paid in the order of arrival in Honolulu from Oakland, California.

Army Men First Victims
Lieut. George Covell and Lieut. R. S. Waggoner of the naval air station at San Diego were the first victims of the flight. Their monoplane crashed at Point Loma, Calif., a few minutes after they started for Oakland and both were burned to death.

Arthur V. Rodgers, another entrant, plunged to his death at Los Angeles a few minutes after he had taken off from Los Angeles for Oakland.

Only two planes outside of getting under way in the Dole race and two of these, together with another plane that went to hunt for them, were lost with all aboard. The two planes lost were the "Miss Doran", carrying Miss Mildred Doran, 22-year-old Flint, Michigan school teacher; J. Augus Pedler, pilot, and Lieut. Vilas R. Knobel, P. S. N. navigator, and "The Golden Eagle", entered by George Hearst, son of the publisher, and manned by Jack Frost and Gordon Scott of Los Angeles. None of the five was ever found.

Irwin Joins in Hunt
After it appeared "The Golden Eagle" and the "Miss Doran" were lost, Captain William Irwin of Dallas, as pilot set out in the "Dallas Spirit" to hunt for them, with Alvin Eichwaldt of Hayward, Calif., as navigator, and radio operator.

About 700 miles out on Friday night, August 19, "The Dallas Spirit" sent a wireless call saying the ship was going in a tail spin. This was repeated, and then no more was ever heard from the craft.

Flyers have demonstrated, however, that under the right conditions they can reach Honolulu. In addition to the Dole flyers who made it, the late Commander John Rodgers and his crew in the navy

REBEL LEADERS SURRENDER TO MARINE FORCE

TWO FAMOUS OUTLAWS LAY DOWN ARMS AND ACCEPT AMNESTY

MANAGUA, Nic., June 1.—Two Nicaraguan leaders and some of their followers have laid down their arms within a week and have been granted amnesty. Santa Maria Sevilla, an outlaw who had been operating in Esteli, surrendered with twenty men to Lieutenant Colonel Benjamin S. Berry, commanding the marines at Jinotega. Eleven rifles, two pistols and ammunition were turned over to the marines. The outlaws were accorded full amnesty and protection in accordance with terms recently offered by the Nicaraguan government.

Sevilla's band was attacked on May 20 by Lieutenant Howard N. Kenyon, whose patrol routed them, wounding one and capturing some equipment.

Cornelius Sandoval, another outlaw, surrendered to Colonel Robert D. Dunlap at Ocotal on Monday. Petronila Garcia was captured by marines near Buena Vista with five rifles in his possession. He will be sent to the national penitentiary to await trial on a charge of engaging in rebellion.

Marines also captured six rebels, reputed to be members of the band

July traded off to 20.17 and October and December to 19.97 or 15 to 17 points down from the previous close.

OWSLEY OPENS SOUTH PLAINS SPEAKING HERE

CANDIDATE FOR SEAT OF MAYFIELD RAPS REPUBLICANS

Col. Alvin Owsley of Dallas opened his South Plains campaign for the candidacy to the United States senate seat now occupied by Earl B. Mayfield in the district court room here last night with a virulent attack against his opponents, Senator Mayfield, Tom Connally and Thomas Blanton and the republican party. He received a splendid ovation from the several hundred who heard him speak.

Law Enforcement
"Failure to enforce the laws" was his greatest denunciation against the republican party while his attacks against his opponents centered around the allegations that "they were either dead or slackers to public duty."

The only hope for far relief, Colonel Owsley said, is through the Federal Reserve bank. "Manufacturing and merchandising companies of the north and east are financed by the Federal Reserve bank," he said, "and it is through that channel that prosperity can be brought to the farmer."

Colonel Owsley stated that he was opposed to the cancellation of foreign debts, which he declared "is favored only by international bankers who also have loans out to foreign countries and wish to increase their chances of collection by the cancellation of the federal debts."

Favors Prohibition
He favors prohibition and restriction of immigration and stated that he was entirely in sympathy with enforcement of both.

The head of the U. S. department of agriculture is the greatest enemy to the Texas farmer, he said, and relief never has and never could come from that department.

Colonel Owsley left here early this morning to continue his tour which will practically cover the entire state.

SPANISH PLANE FORCED DOWN IN UR OF CHALDEES

(By Associated Press)
KARACHI, India, June 1.—The Spanish airplane Jesus Del Gran Poder attempting to break the distance flight record came down yesterday at Nasiriyah near Ur of the Chaldees.

Captains Ignacio Jimenez and Francisco Iglesias made a forced landing. Nasiriyah, in Mesopotamia is approximately 3,000 miles from Seville, from which point they started at noon Tuesday.

Long Distance Record
Seville, Spain, dispatches last night credited the two fliers with having beaten the long distance flight record set by Clarence Chamberlin and Charles A. Levine at 3,911 miles on their flight to Germany.

A radio message was received at the Tablada airdrome, Seville, saying the aviators had reached Nasiriyah, capital of the district of Almere, British India. Nasiriyah is approximately 4,500 miles east of Seville and was some 500 miles beyond the flier's goal, Karachi. Later an English radio message was received at the airdrome confirming the first one.

Seville and Spain immediately began to celebrate what was considered to be a record breaking feat.

RUSHVILLE, Ind., June 1.—If "The Jim Watsons" move into the White House on March 4, 1929, the politicians might just as well know first and foremost that the president will have little time to bother with the likes of them on April Fool's Day.

April Fool's Day is a red-letter day in "the Jim Watson family." Just as it's apt to be in any household full of impish kids.

To be sure, all the Watsons, big and old, know all the jokes. But somebody's bound to get caught.

The Watsons like their pancake joke. They have pancakes and airup for breakfast every morning, so there's nothing in the mound of browned crisped cakes in themselves to label the day and make one suspicious.

But somebody's bound to get a notion cake that morning. That April Fool cake has gone the rounds from Dad and Mother down to Joseph Edwin, aged one.

The Watsons and their April Fool give a pretty good idea of the sort of family they are: a "close family," a family which prefers its own society to all the other people in the world; a family which thinks home the best place anywhere.

Naturally, someone is responsible for this family solidarity. In the case of the "Jim Watsons," they say honors are about equally shared in the home job by Mr. and Mrs. Watson.

Mention Mrs. Watson down in Washington and they'll say: "Yes, the handsome Mrs. Watson."

Mention Mrs. Jim Watson here in Rushville, and they'll say: "Yes, that jolly friendly Mrs. Watson."

Mention her around the home and they'll call her "Mom."

Whenever the senator makes a speech, those who have heard him before are sure of one passage. They say his secretary takes it down even before the senator says it.

It goes like this: "The home is the supreme thing to every man. I am proud to say that for 34 years I have enjoyed a happy and if you will pardon me, as beautiful a home life as all the lot of any man."

What's more, his secretary will tell you, he means it. He says it all because it's good political stuff, but because he just has to say it.

Flora Miller and Jim Watson went to school together back in "Inchester, Ind. The day after their marriage they moved to Rushville, which has been home ever since.

The Watsons' courtship days in "Inchester were a mixture of dirt roads, horse and buggy rides, box socials, church suppers, and the usual road company of "Uncle Tom's Cabin" at the Opera House. Even to this day, they say, the

Watsons like an old-fashioned buggy or sleigh ride or hayrack ride in fragrant hay under a harvest moon.

But in Washington no senator's wife is more poised in sophisticated social circles than "the handsome Mrs. Watson."

They say his idea of a 100 per cent evening is to settle down before the fireplace at his solitary while "the Mrs." sits by reading or sewing, throwing out an occasional comment about "the children."

The children are James E. Jr., who is 31, married, lives in Chicago, and has two sons of his own; Edwin G., aged 23; Katherine, 20; Joseph C., 18; and "Hoosier," the family bull dog.

Edwin G. says he's never going to marry. "There's no girl like mother," which may help describe Mrs. James E. Watson, another possible "First Lady."

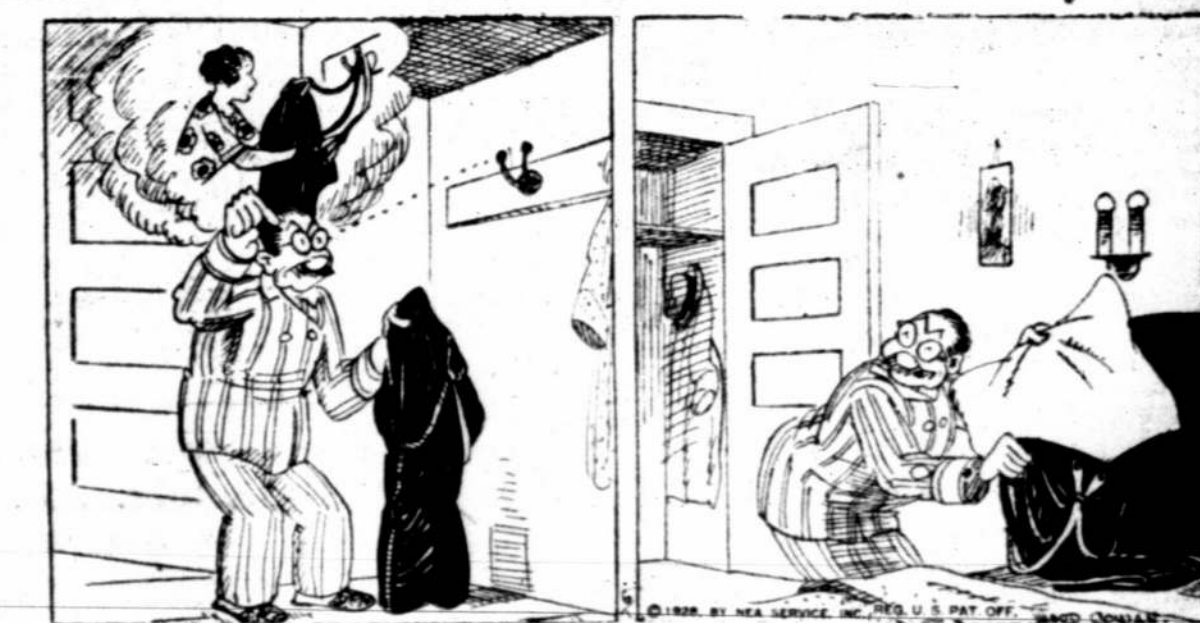

Samson Is Optimistic

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LAWYERS URGE MANY CHANGES IN TEXAS LAW

INSANE CRIMINALS ARE GIVEN CONSIDERATION BY BARRISTERS

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, June 1.—Material changes in law and legal procedure, including provisions for the incarceration of insane criminals until they are "absolutely safe," are recommended in a report to the Texas Bar association by the committee on criminal law and procedure.

The report was filed with George C. Gaines, Jr., secretary of the association, by Ned B. Morris of Houston, chairman of the committee.

A criminal insane institution should be created, the committee said, where persons of unsound mind convicted of homicide can be kept under observation and treated for a "suitable length of time." In proper cases, the report said, the issue of insanity should be tried exclusively in the district courts. Among other recommendations, the committee urged that a law be passed permitting felony defendants to waive jury trials by plea of guilty, and that permission be given to waive a jury in all cases by consent of the state and the defendant.

It also was urged that the penalty for liquor law violation be amended so as to permit the penalty to be either a term in prison, or a fine, or a fine and imprisonment. Changes in the matter of selecting and organizing juries, the report said, making provisions directory and not mandatory, should be made.

Revision of Bail Law
Revision of laws relative to bail lodged in felony cases should be amended to require the defendant to appear at the first term of court after final disposition of his case on appeal to answer the charges against him, it was recommended. At present the bond can be forfeited only after the case is affirmed. "If it is reversed and remanded," the committee said, "he need not appear but may escape if he desires to do so."

A civil statute requiring the attorney general to report on indictments returned during his tenure of office, although it has been followed, has become almost worthless, the committee said. It was recommended that the statute be amended so as to require these reports from clerks of the district and county courts twice each year.

The committee also recommended that the court of criminal appeals be empowered, by law revision, to sit during vacation periods, that is

from the last Saturday in June until the first Monday in October. Another law change would clarify the jurisdiction of courts in offenses committed on federal property and deprive persons of citizenship in criminal cases unless the conviction carried with it a penitentiary sentence.

Statute on Felonies
A general statute should be passed declaring that no offense should be considered a felony unless it may be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary, the committee said. The defendant then should not be considered a felon and deprived of his citizenship unless the penalty assessed him is a penitentiary term, the report said.

The legislature should study conflicting rules relative to the testimony of penitentiary convicts to testify in criminal cases and declare plainly their meaning, the committee urged.

Closing its report, the committee declared: "On the whole the enforcement of criminal laws in this state was never in a more wholesome condition from the court of criminal appeals down through all the lower courts."

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HUNTERS BEGIN LONG JAUNT IN ITALIA SEARCH

RUGGED MOUNTAINS OF ICE HOLD BARRIERS FOR INTREPID MEN

(By Associated Press)
KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, June 1.—Over the glacial ice of northern Spitzbergen four alpine chasseurs plodded today under guidance of Paul Kremer, a hunter, hoping to find some trace of the missing dirigible Italia.

Traveling in a northeasterly direction, they made their way over glaciers moving slowly to the sea between pointed and rugged mountains. The entire terrain will be inspected for traces of General Umberto Nobile and his men. They will travel from winter shelter to winter shelter across the bleak land.

These Italian soldiers, used to maneuvering in the Alpine regions, made their way on foot across a landscape brought down to the level of the ocean.

Other soldiers aboard the base the Lamesa Luncheon club have each endorsed the move and the petition will be in the hands of the commission the latter part of this week.

ship Citta Di Milano hoped that they would be sent into the north from Kings Bay on skis to Wood Bay or Wide Fjord, the longest opening on the north coast. Meantime another exploring expedition is continuing to search along the northern coast of Russia. The foreign ministry proposed to Sweden, Norway and Japan that they co-operate with the various measures being undertaken by the Soviet.

Ellsworth To Back Independent Search

OSLO, Norway, June 1 (AP).—Lieutenant Dietrichsen, Norwegian flier,

today announced that Lincoln Ellsworth of New York would finance an independent expedition to search by air for the missing dirigible Italia and discussed plans of the expedition of which Dietrichsen will be a member.

The expedition will be under the command of Roald Amundsen. It will not be able to start for the Arctic until the arrival of the Ellsworth at Bergen, ten days from now. Plans for the flights from Spitzbergen were already under consideration. Dietrichsen said, in collaboration with other relief parties. The Swedish government also has authorized the chief of the aviation

department to equip three seaplanes to proceed to Spitzbergen to search for the missing airship.
