Membership Drive Starts For County Ag Assn. Perryton School Commencement Week Program Opens Sunday Nineteen Carloads Of Feed Received In Perryton This Week

CHAMBER GETS QUICK ACTION FEED PROJECT

Get Result Of Work Done By
Representatives Sent To
Washington

Get More Cars
Allen And T. V. Elzey Return
This Week To Find Feed
On Track

Elimination of governmental
appeals brought some prompt ac-
tion on the appeals of Jack Allen
and T. V. Elzey who went to Wash-
ington last week in a determined
effort to get livestock feed shipped
from the Panhandle to prevent cattle
starvation with the result that several
carloads of the feed was on the
track here by the time they re-
turned home the first of the week.
As special representatives of the
Perryton Chamber of Commerce
operating agencies, they at-
tempted the problem with vigor, find-
ing assistance on every hand
in the nation's capital.

For an entire train load
of this county immediately,
the granting of feed loans by
the committee instead of send-
ing them to state headquarters at
Oklahoma, thus necessitating delays,
elimination of waivers for se-
cure feed loans, and the ability for
small livestock raisers to
obtain the feed, the Perryton men
granted every demand after
the dire necessity.

Elzey returned to Perryton
this morning to find several cars
on the track here, having been load-
ed from Missouri. Up
to present time nineteen cars of
thirty carloads requisitioned
had been received, nine cars being
loaded and ten cars containing
feed, a mixed balanced ration.
Allen did not return until Wed-
nesday, going on to New York from
Washington.

One of the first cars of fodder
in very poor condition but the
relief headquarters where the
feed is being dispensed have been
an adjustment of the bad
corn. The later shipments have
been in good shape.
The corn fodder is selling on the
track at \$7.50 per ton, the sweet
corn at \$26.25 per ton, of \$1.05 per
and sack. Anyone wishing the
feed can secure it through the
relief offices.

For not only feed locally,
Perryton representatives stressed
the need all over the Panhandle
the result that nearly every
point in this section has
received one or more carloads of
feed. Elzey and Mr. Allen report
received the finest kind of
attention from every office visit-
ing and appointment being made for
by Congressman Marvin Jones
and he lent every assistance
possible.

CHAIN LETTERS CAUSE OF RUSH

OUTGOING - INCOMING MAIL
IS SWELLED TO NEARLY
TWICE NOR-
MAL

Local post office employees have
been feeling the result of the flood
of chain letters that is nearly
swamping the mails all over the
southwest this week, with incom-
ing and outcoming mail double the
normal load.

Monday was the peak for outgoing
mail, with a total of 2700 pieces of
first class mail cancelled. The
normal cancellation for a day is in
the neighborhood of 1000.

First class mail has doubled this
week over last week, according to
postal employees. The same con-
dition prevails all over this section,
the Booker office selling completely
out of stamps and being forced to
make a special requisition from the
Perryton office the first of the week.

A few local participants in the
"send a dime" letters have profited
slightly but for the most part, the
dimes have been outward bound.
Many of the chain letters have been
raised until quarter, half dollar and
dollar letters are nearly as common
as the dime letters. A few five and
ten dollar letters have been received
it is rumored.

TRACE OF MOISTURE RECEIVED SATURDAY

Flurries of snow and light
sprinkles accompanied by cool,
temperatures and cloudy skies

less intent than for the past
several weeks.

MARVIN JONES BILL IS SIGNED

MORE THAN 5,000,000 ACRES
IN PANHANDLE AVAIL-
ABLE FOR SOIL
PROTECTION

Under provisions of the permanent
soil erosion control program, the
Panhandle will get \$1.50 or \$2 an
acre as needed, in addition to the
recent emergency fuel fund, accord-
ing to the Marvin Jones bill which
passed congress and was signed by
President Roosevelt last Saturday.

Information concerning the bill
was brought back to Perryton by
Jack Allen and T. V. Elzey who
were in Washington last week in the
interests of this as well as other
matters.

According to O. B. Martin, exten-
sion service director at College
Station, approximately 5,390,000
acres in the Panhandle are available
for this soil erosion treatment. This
estimate was made following a sur-
vey conducted through county
agents. On this basis it would mean
that the bill makes available a
minimum of \$8,000,000 for the soil
erosion service.

The program will start as soon
as the governmental agencies in
control of the project can be put
into operation.

At the time Marvin Jones, House
agricultural committee chairman in-
troduced the measure, he explained:
"This bill establishes a perman-
ent agency or service. It translates
the temporary orders already in ef-
fect into something permanent."

In regards to the 10 cents an acre
grant for fuel and listing Congress-
man Jones explained that it was
only a temporary measure to get
immediate action and "it is not a
part either of the emergency or the
regular soil erosion program, both
of which will be handled by the
soil erosion service and which I am
sure will be handled on a well-
rounded basis. The President has
given assurance adequate funds will
be given to do this work in an ef-
fective fashion."

"Both the emergency and the
regular soil erosion program will
be handled from different funds
and by an entirely different depart-
ment", he also wrote.

Under provisions of the bill, Sec-
retary of Agriculture Wallace will
create a "soil conservation service".
This new agency will be empowered
to conduct surveys and maintain
erosion plans to meet all erosion
problems.

One of the projects as already
announced, is the establishment of
CCC camps to battle wind erosion,
one of which will be located in
Ochiltree county.

THOU ART A JEWEL!

If like the famous humorist, all we knew was what we read in the papers, and the only paper we had available was the Amarillo Daily News, we could easily picture the Panhandle as a veritable Garden of Eden, following the "drought-breaking precipitation" of last week-end. In 96-point type across the front page read the banner "Crop Prospects Revived By General Moisture" then followed the story, a three column, in length, continuing the information that the entire "dust bowl" was wrenched with snows and rains.

To quote the lead paragraph, "Range grass farm crops, an end of the dust storms, and a check on devastating soil erosion—all these immeasurable blessings appeared promised for the Panhandle Plains and Eastern New Mexico last night after rain, snow, sleet and mist had brought general moisture from an eighth to two inches, during Friday and Saturday."

Dalhart was reported as receiving the heaviest fall in the Texas Panhandle north of the Canadian river, and they received the staggering amount of two-tenths of an inch of moisture. Imagine it! While Amarillo itself received 31 of an inch. Someway or other the story failed to mention that Perryton also received a trace of moisture—a very small trace.

In the not too distant past, anything under a quarter of an inch was called a shower. Which goes to show how things have changed. It has only been a few weeks ago that the News-Globe was predicting only a fifty per cent wheat crop for the Panhandle. This estimate appeared as late as April 7, with a 20,000 bushel crop probable, according to the authority quoted.

Undoubtedly this splendid rain will boost that estimate several million bushels, or enough at least to cause the price of wheat to drop sufficiently to fill Amarillo's fine new terminal elevators at the expense of the American farmers.

RELIEF STARTS IN AUSTIN

Possibly there is no graft connected with it, possibly it is all an honest deal, but to say the least, some of the actions of the state relief administration appear rather unfair if not downright suspicious.

At any rate, they have apparently adopted the slogan "relief starts in Austin" for it seems to be impossible for a local concern of any kind to get any business from them.

In our own line, we have quoted prices on printing, offering the lowest price that could be figured under the code that the government says we must follow, only to find that we have been underbid by some Dallas or Austin printer. Incidentally we have never been able to learn just what the successful bid was.

Even small items in the stationery line are supplied by some down-state office supply firm.

On the other hand, the state relief administration is very liberal with us in dispensing free publicity. Surprising that they should deem the country newspapers worthy of such consideration. The Austin printing concerns apparently can't serve in this capacity.

We do not mean to cast any reflections on the local county relief administration. They have no voice in the matter. They get their orders from Austin.

JOIN YOUR ASSOCIATION

During the past week a new organization was started in Ochiltree county—one that deserves the support of every man and woman in this community. We refer to the newly formed Ochiltree County Agricultural Association.

In the past we have too often taken the "let George do it" attitude. A small group of men have donated their services, taken their own time and money, driven their own cars and bought their own gasoline, to attend the many meetings held over the Panhandle in regards to various agriculture problems.

They have been important meetings and much good has been accomplished through them. The things that have been accomplished by these men have not been for the entire county. They did not attend these meetings for selfish motives, but in the interests of their neighbors as well.

The O. C. A. A. was formed for the express purpose of assisting in a small way at least, to pay some of the expenses incurred by such trips. The least that those of us who stay at home could do would be to join the association and help in

a small way. The membership fee is only one dollar a year. Every man and woman who is directly or indirectly interested in agriculture—and that takes in all of us, business men as well—should send in this dollar. We urge you to do so.

Curtis Roach is secretary of the association and would be glad to receive your membership. Or if it would be more convenient, leave it at the Herald office or the county agent's office in the courthouse. Mail it in, hand it in, send it in—but do it now!

BE SURE TO VOTE!

The attention of all wheat farmers is called to the AAA wheat referendum which will be held in this county on Saturday, May 25. It is the duty of every wheat allotment contract signer to vote on this day. The wheat allotment program hangs in the balance. Big business is doing everything possible to defeat this program for from the start they have been opposed to the levying of a process tax on farm commodities. Without such a tax the allotment program would be impossible.

On the other hand the allotment program means very little to the wheat farmers east of the Mississippi, where they are farming small patches of wheat, from twenty to fifty acres each. The benefit payments are so small that they probably feel they could gain more by having all their land in production, especially so with a drought in the big wheat producing states and the prospects of a small yield. But the vote that small wheat farmer casts counts just as much as the ballot of the Ochiltree county farmer who puts in ten times as much land.

The matter is placed directly up to you. See to it that you and your neighbors vote in the coming referendum.

SIDELIGHTS by Marvin Jones

The Southwest is very much interested in the question of soil erosion. No other question is more vital to our section of the country.

The President on last Saturday signed the bill which provides for a soil erosion service in the Department of Agriculture. He used two pens in signing this measure, presenting one to Congressman Dempsey of New Mexico and the other to me.

This soil erosion service will have charge of both the emergency and the regular soil erosion programs.

The President has given assurance that adequate funds will be made available to do the work properly, both on an emergency and on a permanent basis.

It will be expected that the farmers will cooperate in doing the work and in such other ways as they may be in a position to assist, but provisions will be made to do the task in a proper way. The CCC camps will also assist in carrying out the program.

In the meantime, an allowance of ten cents per acre has been made for the purchase of oil and gas for emergency listing. In order that there may be no misunderstanding, it should be made clear that this is no part of either the emergency or the long-range soil erosion program.

It is an extra allotment, and was made immediately available out of a small balance of old drought relief funds. It was made available through the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, and was intended as a stop-gap until such time as the emergency and regular funds can be allotted.

I am writing this to make it clear that this small allowance is no part of either the emergency or the regular program, which will be handled by the Soil Erosion Service on a well-rounded basis.

In view of the tremendous task of fashioning a program over the whole country, it takes a little time to arrange the plans, even for emergency work. The situation in our section was so desperate, it was felt that even a small allowance from some old unexpended funds might be of some advantage.

The farmers throughout the nation have shown a disposition to cooperate with the government in the vast conservation program that is being mapped out. The conservation of our natural resources is a matter of great importance to all of our people during the years to come. No work of greater importance could be done.

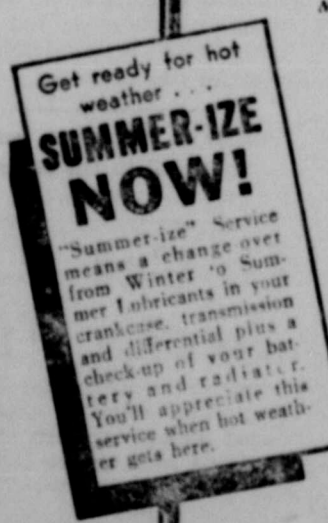

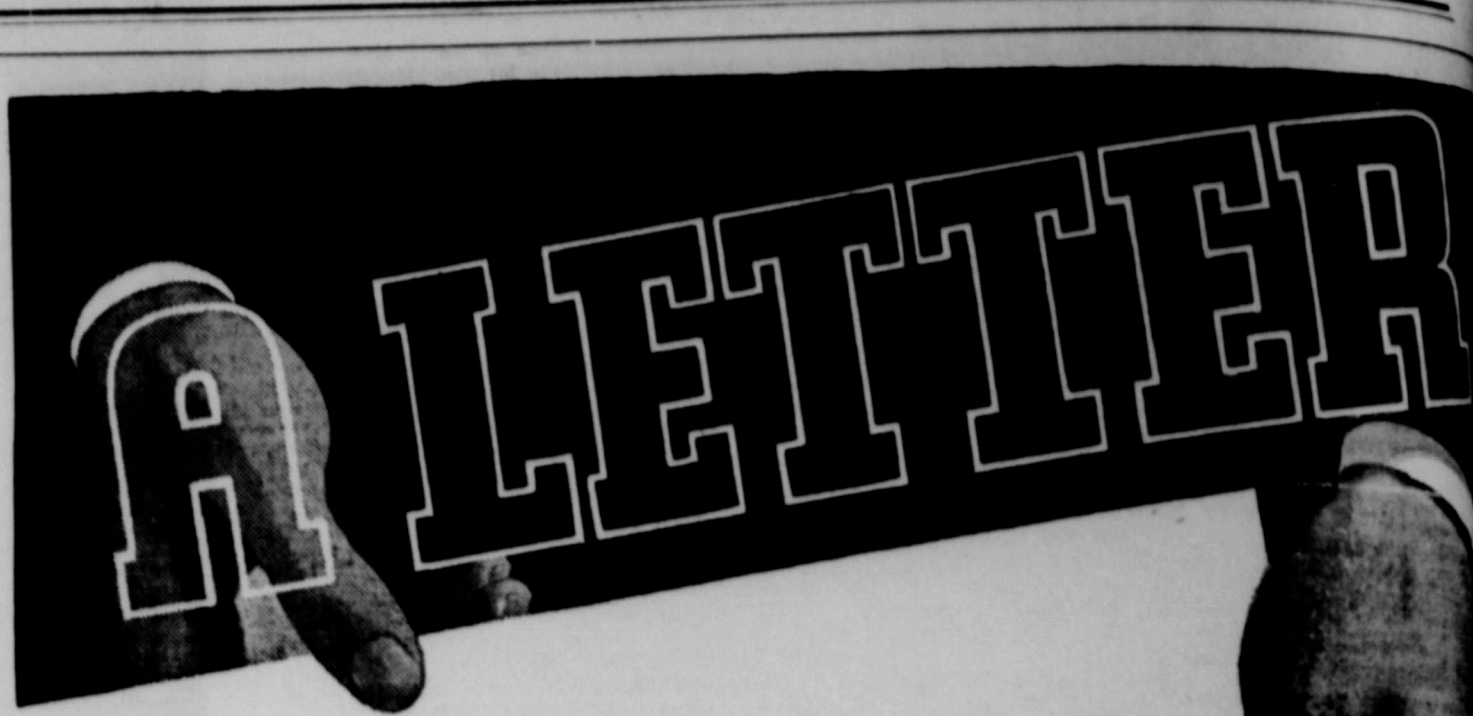

OCHILTREE COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION WOMEN REALLY "DOING THINGS"

June 7 and 8 have been set as wardrobe contest dates for the home demonstration women and 4-H club girls. June 7, the clothes closets are to be scored and on the 8th, the garments are to be modeled.

Wardrobe demonstrators and co-operators, both women and girls, are working on storage and garments.

Ninety-two club members have reported that they are keeping clothing accounts, 56 reported improved storage, 23 new closets have been added 14 foundation patterns have been altered, and 26 foundation patterns were started during April.

A clothes closet has been completed by Mrs. Virgil Wilbanks, wardrobe demonstrator of Blodgett home demonstration club. Mrs. Wilbanks has 2 long shelves the entire length of the closet at top and several smaller shelves at both sides of the closet. One end of the closet is being finished for Mrs. Wilbanks' 2-year old daughter to keep her things in. The closet was built at a cost of \$1.90.

By rearranging shelves, lowering rod for hanging clothes and lining her closet, Mrs. A. W. Henry, 1st year wardrobe demonstrator of Missouri Avenue home demonstration club, will have a more convenient storage space for clothes at a very small cost. Garment bags and a shoe rack are additional improvements.

Mrs. J. H. Callihan, 2nd year wardrobe demonstrator of Wolf Creek club, is making improvements on her storage for the family by the addition of garment bags and shoe pockets. Mrs. Callihan is helping her co-operators in 1st year wardrobe to make foundation patterns.

One dollar and fifty-five cents was the cost of a woolen sweater suit made by Miss Julia Hamilton, 2nd year wardrobe demonstrator of "4 in 1" home demonstration club. Julia took a navy blue coat which she had discarded and combined it with navy and white checked material for the coat of her suit. For the skirt and hat Julia used the checked material.

She has added garment bags and a belt rack to her clothes closet and is making plans for portable clothes closet in her mother's bedroom.

Fertilizer sacks are being used by Waldeen Dodson, Ochiltree 4-H club cooperator to make a swaggar suit. Waldeen has removed the letters from the sacks and plans to wear suit in wardrobe contest.

"Until I got my foundation pattern, I never had a sleeve to fit," stated Mrs. G. M. Cooper, wardrobe cooperator of Missouri Avenue Club.

To replace the curtain and nails used for clothes storage, Waneta and Nadine Bryan of the McMillen 4-H club have added a closet, 2x5 feet. The closet has three compartments. Six small shelves are used for storing underwear, shoes and hats. The upper compartment is used for storing bedding. A four foot rod and a long shelf make up the largest compartment. Mr. Bryan did the carpenter work for Waneta and Nadine.

Pillow cases made of chicken feed sacks have been added to Mrs. W. G. Yeary's supply of bed linens. To remove the letters from the sacks Mrs. Yeary put lard on letters and let stand for several hours. This loosened the paint. The sacks were then soaked in suds and washed. A little starch was used to give the pillow cases the appearance of linen.

work in farm food supply, 11,533 feet of tile has been laid by the girls and women. 6 hotbeds have been planted and 7 cold frames and 36 seed boxes have been made. 1,476 asparagus crowns have been set out this spring. The pantry demonstrators are trying 3 new vegetables in their gardens this year—Canadian field peas, Chinese cabbage, and Black Spanish radish, (fall plant).

Mrs. L. W. Philpaw, farm food supply demonstrator of Ochiltree Club, has built a cellar and is lining it with cardboard boxes. Kevinator boxes were used to build cabinets and shelves. Mrs. Philpaw has one shelf set aside for products to be used in the fall for exhibit purposes.

As a part of her farm food supply work for the year, Mrs. M. J. Groves, pantry demonstrator for the Waka Home Demonstration Club, improved her storage by having a cellar 8x14 feet and 6 feet deep dug. Sixty feet of shelving has been built in the cellar also has two windows and an upright door.

Mr. Groves did the work and there was no cost for building the cellar.

Mrs. Groves has 8 varieties of meat products such as head cheese, scrapple, chili, soup stock, roasts, steak and sausage. 250 pounds of meat have been cured and 8 gallons of lard made. Mrs. Groves also has a variety of vegetables, fruits and fruit juices.

By using meat scraps and leftovers of grease for soap making, Mrs. Pate Waggoner, farm food supply operator of Notia home demonstration club does not have to use bought soap.

Foreign particles are removed from grease in soap making, says Mrs. Waggoner, by addition of water to grease. Let boil for few minutes, then remove from fire. Grease comes to top and after mixture is cold the grease can be taken off and makes a whiter and firmer soap.

A meat press made out of a box 12x27 inches enables Mrs. Ben Peckenpaugh of Farnsworth home demonstration club to have a more uniform bacon. The bacon is put in press while animal heat is still in the meat, and a lid to fit inside of the box is placed on top of the meat and an automobile jack is used to press lid down.

Twenty-eight hundred and ten feet of tile has been laid by the Twichell 4-H girls. The dust storms have not stopped Twichell 4-H girls from working on their gardens. Eight seed boxes have been planted by the girls. Mrs. J. H. Kershaw, sponsor, reports that 8 of the girls are keeping clothing records, 3 have improved storage and 2 new closets have been added.

By making 250 feet of tile at 2c per foot for A. N. Wiebe, the Waka 4-H girl and boys have \$5.00 added to their treasury for July School Course expenses. The girls and boys have found tile so successful in their home gardens and yards that they have tiled the school yard. Miss Virginia King, club sponsor, is helping 4-H club members to plant trees and flowers on school ground.

GREAT ACCOMPLISHMENTS BY HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUBS OF STATE

A report of the 1934 home demonstration work for Texas has been received by Marie Ludwick, County Home Demonstration Agent, from Miss Mildred Horton, State Home Demonstration Agent.

The report shows that 67,699 rural women and girls working in 3,335 home demonstration clubs located in 144 Texas counties guided by home demonstration agents and aided by their families canned 20,326,889 pints of food and cured, dried and stored 13,658, 446 pounds of food valued together at \$3,509,634.74.

Because of this food preservation work and that of those who have gone before pioneering in home canning of fruit, vegetables and meats the Relief Administration was able to secure cooperation and supervision which resulted in the establishment of 551 community canning plants and 21 Federal meat canning plants having a total output of 58,928,318 cans of food most of which would not have been conserved at all.

In carrying on this food work rural homes were improved by:

The building of 11,813 pantries with 112,461 feet of shelving; the making of 12,469 steam pressure cookers and 1,878 sealers; the digging of 1,011 cellars and 311 storage pits; the building of 1,029 smoke houses; the preparation of 6,442 hotbeds and 1,546 coldframes; the installation of 2,440 subirrigation and 2,896 surface irrigation systems; 6,126 pounds of vegetables were produced for home use—some to be canned and some for serving fresh; 16,251 fruit trees, grape and berry vines were planted to increase the home fruit supply.

Rural homes were further improved in these ways: 195,584 trees and shrubs were planted to improve the appearance and comfort of these homes; 9,103 lawns were sodded and 160,219 cuttings rooted for 1935 planting; 17,017 bedrooms were im-

Raise CCC Age Limit

Will Enlist Over 10,000 Men in CCC Organization Between Ages 18 To 28

Austin—Texas' quota of young men to join the Civilian Conservation Corps has been nearly doubled by an increase from 14,200 under the old program to 26,880 under a new program, it was announced last week by Neal Guy, enrollment supervisor for Texas.

Enrollment under the new quota will take place between June 15 and August 31, Guy stated, at which time county relief administrators will receive applications from young Texans desiring to go to civilian conservation camps. Heretofore, applicants have had to be between the ages of 18 and 25, which has now been stretched to a ten-year bracket of from 18 to 28. Part of the men accepted will be sent to camps in nearby states, the rest to camps in Texas.

"Application should be made to the county administrators," Guy instructed applicants, "and not to

Increase of Texas' quota follows President Roosevelt's authorization to increase the national quota from 300,000 to 600,000. It will enable Texas officials to bring the old quota up to full strength and take in from 10,000 to 12,000 new men.

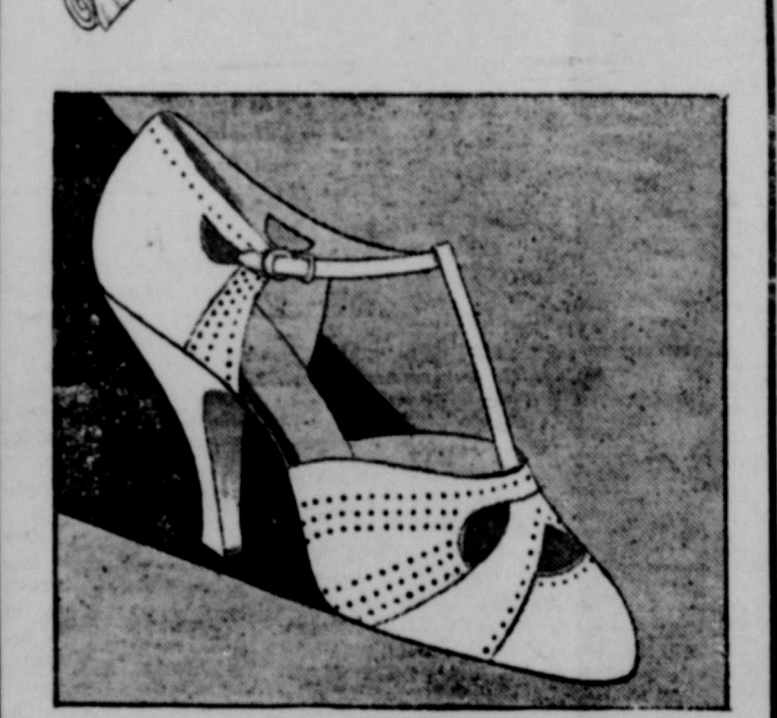
