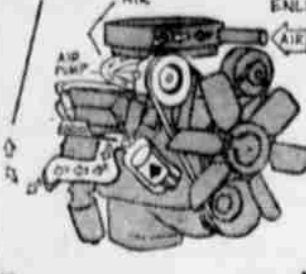

trial development, many heads are usually better than one, and (3) that it will work for the good of the entire community, without the complications and conflicts of personal interests.

The Industrial Foundation may not be able to raise all the money necessary to finance a given project, or it may not be prudent for it to do so. In this case, the Industrial Foundation can borrow just like any other corporation and loan associations, mortgage bankers, investment banks, insurance companies and the Small Business Administration. The Industrial Foundation may need to put up at least 10 per cent of the total financing (20 per cent in the case of Small Business Administration loans), and raise the remainder from one or more sources.

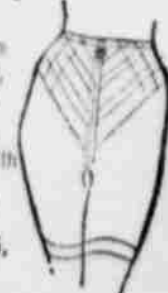

Modern math subject of TV programs to be launched Jan. 3

LUBBOCK — Parents as well as teachers may find many of their questions about modern math answered in a series of 30-minute films to be broadcast over Texas Tech's Channel 5 beginning Jan. 3, 1968.

Each of the 19 films in the weekly series will be shown twice, said KXTX-TV Director D. M. McElroy. The first showings are scheduled for 6:30 p. m. Wednesday and will be repeated at 4 p. m. Thursdays in order to make it available as a staff development program for teachers.

The film is co-sponsored by the Education Service Center for Region 17 in West Texas. The course is designed to give elementary teachers a better comprehension of mathematics, not merely "in how to compute with numbers but of what numbers are and why they work like they do."



Pipeline construction contracts are awarded by Pioneer Natural Gas Co.

AMARILLO — Contracts totaling approximately \$4 million dollars for three major pipeline construction projects were awarded today by Pioneer Natural Gas Company. Work on all three jobs will start immediately.

Successful bidder on all three contracts was The Great Plains Construction Company of Lubbock. Scheduled for completion by March 1 of next year is 15 miles of 12-1/4 inch pipe connecting with the high pressure main line at New Deal and extending west to Shallowater to provide additional gas supplies for the towns northwest of Lubbock.

Second of the three projects involved is a loop-line around Lubbock extending from 82nd Street and Quirt Avenue east and north to a point near New Deal. This line, scheduled for completion about March 15, will tie into the 15 mile line mentioned above.

The line around Lubbock will be 21 miles of 20-inch pipe, and it will replace a similar amount of 16-inch line. The new 20-inch line will have more than five and one-half times the capacity of the line it replaces.

The advent of these two new lines in the Lubbock area will permit Pioneer to take advantage of newly acquired gas reserves in the Delaware Basin to insure an increased volume of gas to take care of added industrial, residential and irrigation customers in these areas.

Pioneer has purchased a six-acre site for a new compressor station four miles north of the Lubbock Municipal Airport. While this isn't part of the current contract letting, construction of compressor installations is planned for 1969.

This is all part of Pioneer's determined effort to remain well in the forefront of growth in the area served. The addition of the enlarged loop-line around Lubbock and the tying in of the New Deal-Shallowater line, plus the eventual installation of the compressor station near New Deal, will permit Pioneer to move gas from the Delaware Basin north and northwest through their system. Gas from this area has been in use in the Lubbock and the Plainview area since September.

Many of the 80 West Texans who left Lubbock questioning the possibility of the part of the Texas Water Plan to move Mississippi River water to the plains, came back calling it not only possible, but vital, Potts reported.

They also changed their views from "water for West Texas" to "water for Texas".

Potts said although the Texas water plan is about four times as big as the California plan, the lift

across Texas is about the same and the area to be benefitted is greater.

In fact, the "politics" of bringing import water to the West Texas plains should be a whole lot simpler to handle than in the Bakerville region of California where recharge of a fading ground water formation is also involved. In Bakerville, there are 32 organized irrigation districts and municipalities to tie together by contracts with a master district.

Potts said another thing the group of West Texans brought back with them after viewing the daring of the Californians' project is that "you can't wait to get all the answers before you start."

Maybe we are whistling in the dark, but we also think that 1968 may be our "uranium year" at last. Being in the newspaper business, we get to hear more than most folks because outsiders come to a newspaper office for information.

Garza County has had a whole lot of "uranium lookers" in the last two or three months and from all this activity something well may jell in 1968, something far more significant than the county's bit of lease speculation of 1967.

We do know some of the "majors" have come in to look, and some have promised "to be back." But until the interest gets hot enough for test hole drilling, we will still be wondering whether the uranium we know we have is here in sufficient quantity and quality to make its mining profitable.

We feel sure of one thing about 1968 — we will know the answer to that question within the next 12 months.

School windows here shot out

Ten door glasses at the Post High School building were shot out by vandals over the Christmas weekend, Supt. Bill Shiver said Wednesday morning.

The heavy safety glass in the doors was badly shattered by shots from air rifles and pellet guns, and possibly 22 caliber guns, the superintendent said.

The entire cost of the damage will have to be borne by taxpayers of the school district, since the glass is not insured, Shiver said. He estimated the damage at \$2,000.

During the 1966-67 school year, window and door glass at the schools broken out by vandals cost taxpayers approximately \$1,300, the superintendent said.

Snow estimated at one inch here

A chilling whiff of the Arctic cold front which barged into Texas Wednesday brought Post and vicinity a year-end snowfall that was estimated at one inch—in lieu of an official measurement, which had not been reported at The Dispatch's press time Thursday morning.

Temperatures here dropped below the 20's Wednesday for one of their lower points of the year, but a warming trend was setting in Thursday morning.

Wednesday's weather flurry was as near to a potent and fast-moving winter storm as Post has had all year.

Vet's Forum

Q. I was married in 1963. My husband was a veteran of World War II. Approximately two years later he died. Shortly thereafter I made application for widow's pension. However, the VA disallowed the claim because we had not been married for five years and had no children. Has there been any change in the law? If there has been a change, is it too late to file a new claim?

A. The Veterans Pension and Readjustment Assistance Act of 1967, which became effective Oct. 1, 1967, has reduced the five-year requirement to one year. You should apply again for widow's pension. It is not too late.

It's the Law...

REVIEWS THAT STING

Tart reviews of movies, plays, books, and works of art have won many a chuckle from the reading public.

One reviewer was "underwhelmed" by a movie. Another said he saw a play under bad conditions: "The curtain was up." A third, having called an actor the worst he had ever seen, described his next performance as "not up to his usual standard."

But while readers chuckle, the person on the target end may be seething. If the criticism is really rough, may he collect damages for defamation of character?

He may — if the reviewer steps outside the legitimate bounds of criticism. The law frowns on attacks that are directed not at the work itself but at the character of the person who created it.

For example, an art critic was held liable for saying not only that a certain work of art was bad but also that the artist was a swindler.

But within his proper scope, the reviewer has enormous leeway. His honest opinion, however severe, is protected by the constitutional guarantees of free speech and free press.

Furthermore, the law recognizes that a critic may have to use pungent language to make his point. As one court put it, the critic may indulge in "all those delightful touches of style which go to make an article readable."

What about adverse comments outside the field of the arts? By and large, if it is a matter of legitimate public concern, the same broad freedom of opinion prevails.

Thus, the courts have rejected the complaint of a public contractor, criticized for his workmanship; of a financier, criticized for promoting a new transit system; and of a football coach, criticized for his strategy.

True enough, such brickbats may be hard to bear. But the public is benefitted. Not only is freedom upheld but also taste is fostered — by the encouragement of work that is good and the discouragement of work that is bad.

As for the hapless victim, he himself has invited criticism by submitting his work to the public in the first place.

"He should not be thin-skinned," commented one judge, "if the criticism so invited is no gentle."

Twelfth Night, or Epiphany, is old observance

There are many ancient and modern rituals surrounding the observance of the Twelfth Night or Epiphany, Jan. 6, which marks the end of the Christmas holiday season.

Epiphany was first observed in memory of the baptism of Christ. It was first mentioned in A. D. 194 and by the 4th Century was a widely accepted holiday. Today, Epiphany has a three-fold meaning: the visit of the Wise Men to Jesus; the baptism of Jesus; and the miracle at Cana when Jesus changed water to wine at the wedding feast.

In 9th century England, King Alfred decreed that the Christmas season would include Christmas day and the 12 days following.

The Twelfth Night cake, along with the tradition of burning of Christmas greenery on Jan. 6, was in vogue when Charles II ascended the throne.

Latin peoples regard Epiphany as not only a solemn religious festival but as the beginning of the pre-Lenten carnival season. Mexican observance of Epiphany includes a march of the devout to the shrine of the miraculous Lord of Chalma in a valley southwest of Mexico City.

A Jan. 6 ritual at Tarpon Springs, Fla., involves blessing of the Greek sponge divers and casting of a gold crucifix into the waters to signify the baptism of Christ.

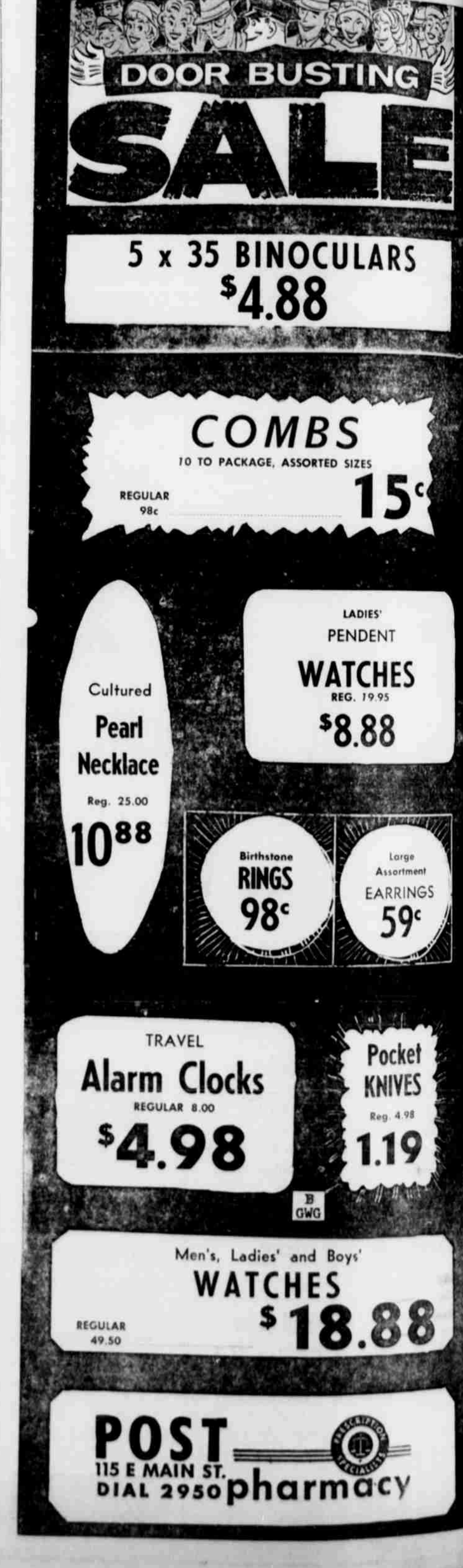

AUSTIN — Closer relationship between junior and senior colleges is inevitable.

Crowded senior college campuses across the state have convinced the Coordinating Board of the Texas College and University System that educational emphasis cannot be laid solely on the larger schools in the future.

Answer seems to be a junior college program that offers two-year courses of study which than can be transferred to the four - year colleges for degree credit.

Dr. Jack Williams, commissioner of higher education, has submitted to the board a plan to establish guidelines for future relationship between the two fields of education. It also sets up 52 geographic regions in Texas for junior college development, 18 of which have no junior college.

Ideal behind the regional approach is to prevent creation of any junior college in an area which cannot support it and to encourage the development of junior colleges in areas needing them.

None of the existing public junior colleges would be disbanded by the plan. But each of the 52 regions would have at least one junior college in it. Envisioned is a junior college system of 70 to 75 campuses.

In briefing junior college presidents on the proposal, Commissioner Williams cited the importance of community two - year colleges in the overall higher education picture. According to Williams, 727,000 Texas students will be attending colleges and universities in this state by 1985. And junior colleges must be able to take care of 305,525 of them.

New schools would be recommended only where enrollment of at least 500 students could be expected by the end of the third Fall term and 1,000 by the fifth term.

Recommended regions would include seven Panhandle divisions. These would center around Borger, Amarillo, Clarendon, Levelland, Lubbock, Plainview and the Oldham - Parmer - Deaf Smith-Castro counties area.

In West Texas, the regions would encompass El Paso, the Trans-Pecos area, Odessa, Big Spring, Wichita Falls, San Angelo, and two junior colleges in Eastland County, Uvalde and a 13 - county region around Mason County.

North Texas districts would center around Weatherford, Dallas-Fort Worth, Cooke County, Sherman, Paris, Texarkana, Hill County and Corsicana.

South Texas section of junior college education would be Laredo, San Antonio, the Lower Rio Grande Valley, Alice, Corpus Christi, Bee County, Wharton and the Caldwell - Guadalupe - Gonzales-Wilson counties area.

East and Southeast Texas areas would have schools in the regions of Longview and Panola County, Tyler, Lufkin, Houston, Galveston, Beaumont - Port Arthur-Orange and two other four - county areas just northwest of Beaumont.

Central Texas junior college education would be centered around Waco, Bell County, Austin, Brenham, Bryan - College Station and San Marcos.

Public hearings on the proposals will be held in Austin on Jan. 8.

COURTS SPEAK—District Court at Corpus Christi has upheld Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin's opinion that voter registration applications can't be submitted in bulk by third parties. Court refused to serve a writ of mandamus to Nueces County tax assessor - collector to issue registration certificates where applications were turned in by someone other than the applicants' closest relatives. Decision will be appealed.

State Supreme Court will hear arguments Feb. 21 as to whether the state may tax casinghead gas used for lifting oil to the surface.

A Jan. 10 hearing has been set at Sarita (Kenedy County) on an injunction order that stopped Indiana and California firms from exploring ruins of an old Spanish ship on state - owned land near Port Mansfield.

NEW HIGHWAYS—Texas Highway Commission has approved a "consolidated highway program" which will include \$362,000,000 construction or reconstruction of 1,668 miles of non - interstate highways over the next two years.

Master plan places emphasis on what the Texas Highway Department calls its "bread and butter" routes. "These highways of the primary system are the transportation lifelines for a vast number of Texans," the Commission said.

"Our people and commerce are deeply involved in these routes, yet many are outmoded."

That \$362,000,000 covers the state's part for acquisition of right-of-way on 557 miles of U. S. and state highways, which will cost \$27,000,000. Local governments will pay half of the cost.

VETS LAND BONDS SOLD — Veterans Land Board sold \$30,000,000 worth of new new Veterans Land Bonds at the low interest rate of 4.2823. First National City Bank of New York and Harris Trust and Savings Bank of Chicago and Associates were low bidders.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler termed the rate "impressive". He said it will enable veterans of World War II, and Korean War and Vietnam to purchase property at five per cent down payment and five and a half per cent interest on the balance over a 40 - year period.

Board will begin taking applications to buy land about Jan. 15.

VOTER DRIVE — Secretary of State John L. Hill, as chief election officer, has announced plans for a statewide voter registration drive throughout January.

Hill has asked daily newspapers to publish registration application forms at least every Sunday and weeklies to carry them in each issue. Forms may be filled in and sent to county tax assessor - collectors.

Hill noted that, for the first time, all persons over 60 who live in towns under 10,000 population or in rural areas must register in order to vote.

Deadline for all is Jan. 31.

TRAINS TO DISCONTINUE — Missouri Pacific Railroad's application to discontinue passenger trains 7 and 8 between San Antonio and Longview will be heard by the Railroad Commission early in February at Longview, Austin and San Antonio.

Railroad brotherhoods have filed a protest. Notices of applications have gone to mayors of all towns along the route.

DRUG CONTROL PUSHED — Rep. Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge wants to mobilize state-agency resources to see that laws against drug abuse are enforced and the public told about the dangers of drug use.

Musgrove, one of the sponsors of the anti - LSD bill passed by the last Legislature, met with representatives of a number of state agencies and private groups in Austin to clarify whatever problems exist and to suggest solutions.

It was generally agreed that the drug - law - enforcement division of the Department of Public Safety should be tripled in size and that the State Health Department would be made the clearing house for public information on drug use.

DRINKING DRIVERS — If a study conducted in San Antonio represents the state as a whole, the Texas Safety Association says almost half of the drivers and pedestrians in Texas traffic accidents may have been highly intoxicated.

A 10 - year blood - alcohol study in Bexar County Medical Examiner's Office shows 48 per cent of the persons killed in San Antonio traffic accidents has .15 per cent or more alcohol present in their blood.

That means that, theoretically, each of them had consumed more than three highballs or more than six beers in his final hour. A driver with an alcohol content of .10 per cent is considered by most experts to be too intoxicated to drive safely.

OIL ALLOWABLE INCREASED — Railroad Commission boosted statewide oil allowable from 40.8 per cent to 45.7 per cent of potential for January. Figure permits 3,593,405 barrels daily production compared with the present 3,317,796 barrels.

Commission extended its temporary lease allowable system inaugurated in June to help increase production during the Mid - East crisis.

Malcolm Bull's sister dies in Amarillo

Funeral services were conducted in Amarillo Tuesday morning for Mrs. Bryan Rogers, sister of Malcolm Bull of Post who died at her Amarillo home Saturday morning after a long illness.

She was 53 years old. Survivors also include her husband and one son. Burial was in Amarillo.

AMARILLO — Plans to construct a pipeline between Amarillo, Tex., and Clovis, N. M., were announced today by John S. Reed, president of the Santa Fe Railway.

The pipeline, costing in excess of \$2 million, will be built and managed by a wholly - owned subsidiary, Santa Fe Pipeline Company, and will operate as a common carrier. Throughout will be comprised principally of jet fuel from Amarillo to Cannon Air Force Base, near Clovis, but the line will also handle other petroleum products. Construction is expected to begin shortly and will be completed about the middle of 1968, Reed added.

2,500 individual items of interest found in new Texas Travel Handbook

AUSTIN — An expanded edition of the popular Texas Travel Handbook has been released by the Texas Highway Department.

The handbook, issued last year as an aid to the tourist, has been revised and enlarged to include more than 2,500 individual items of interest. The 208-page handbook also contains 112 photographs which provide travelers with previews of such attractions as the aerial tramway in El Paso, and Presidio La Bahia near Goliad.

Handbook subjects are as varied as the state itself, ranging from the melancholy Empty Saddle Monument in Dalhart to the humorous Popeye statue in Crystal City.

With the Texas Travel Handbook as a guide, travelers may discover dinosaur tracks, Indian pictographs and buried cities. They will learn the locations of little-known ghost towns, and follow specific directions to the most popular attractions of modern Texas cities.

Special sections are devoted to recreational facilities in Texas national and state forests, and in more than 55 state parks. Summaries of Texas hunting and fishing regulations are provided, as well as information on visiting Mexico.

Like all Highway Department travel literature, the handbook is free. Since its initial publication last year, the guide has become a major item among more than four million pieces of travel material distributed annually by the Texas Highway Department.

The guide is available to three-quarters of a million visitors who stop at Highway Department Tourist Bureaus each year, and by individual request from the Texas Highway Department, Travel and Information Division, P. O. Box 5064, Austin, Texas 78703.

Critical year coming up for area farmers

LUBBOCK — Citing a probable all-out fight on government payment limitations and the possibility of new cotton legislation being introduced in Washington next year, Plains Cotton Growers President Don Anderson of Crosbyton tabbed 1968 a "most critical year for High Plains cotton farmers."

Speaking at the year-end meeting of the PCG Board of Directors, Anderson said "If our interests are to be protected we will have to maintain an alert, aggressive cotton producer organization. And to do this we are going to have to become active, interested participants in PCG affairs."

He reminded directors, of which PCG has two from each of 23 High Plains counties, that they were elected to represent the cotton interests of their respective areas, and that it is their responsibility to attend meetings, keep themselves informed and make a sustained effort to look after those interests.

A LIMITATION on the total amount of government payments that any farmer could receive from all government price support and acreage diversion programs has been repeatedly proposed in Washington, but in the past has always been beaten back. In 1968, according to Anderson, the task of defeating such proposals is going to be more difficult than ever before.

The level of such limitations has been advocated at from \$5,000 to \$50,000, but the most recurrent figure seems to have been \$10,000. And Anderson said "I seriously doubt if half the cotton producers on the Plains could stay in business with a \$10,000 limitation."

He recalled that the danger of such limitations was one of the primary reasons for PCG's opposition to the current cotton program when it was passed in 1965.

This program is a part of the Agricultural Act of 1965 and extends through 1969. But top officials of the U. S. Department of Agriculture are reported to have said new legislation would be introduced to Congress in 1968.

"AND WHETHER the Department is serious about getting a new cotton program passed in 1968 or not, we have to be ready at all times to counteract any proposal that might be injurious to the High Plains cotton industry," Anderson told the Board.

In this connection he advised that the PCG Legislative Committee was in the process of being reconstituted and would soon begin discussions toward legislative recommendations to the Board.

The Legislative and other standing PCG committees are appointed by the President and approved by the Executive Committee.

THE EXECUTIVE Committee is made up of the organization's officers and past presidents plus six members elected by and from the Board to represent each of six districts. The six elected members, announced as the result of a recent mail ballot, are W. L. Edelman of Friona, Bill Thompson of Shallowater, Don Marble of South Plains in Floyd County, Clyde Crausbay of McAdoo, Joe D. Unfred of New Home and Joe Anderson of Seminole.

Completing the Executive Committee are President Anderson, Vice President Donnell Echols of Lamesa, Secretary-Treasurer Ray Joe Riley of Hart, Chairman of the Board J. D. Smith of Littlefield, and past presidents Wilmer Smith, New Home and Roy Fornkner, Lubbock.

In other action the Board voted unanimous support for a PCG effort to get the deadline for sign-up in the 1968 cotton program extended in this area to July 1. As regulations are now written producers are required to make known their cotton planting intentions by March 15, some three months before planting time on the Plains.

Farmers advised of income tax

Garza County farmers who earned at least two-thirds of their 1967 gross income from farming are reminded that they should file their declaration of estimated Federal income tax (including self-employment) for 1967 on or before Monday, Jan. 15. Form 1040-ES should be used for this purpose.

However, Ellis Campbell Jr., district director of Internal Revenue for North Texas, said that farmers need not file an estimate if they file their 1967 Federal income tax return, Form 1040, and pay in full any tax due by Feb. 15.

"Farmer's Tax Guide," (Publication No. 225), which furnished information on this subject, may be obtained from the Internal Revenue Service or from the county farm agent.

Employment at HemisFair 1968 is available to 1,500 young Texans

SAN ANTONIO — The fun and excitement of employment at a World's Fair is available to more than 1,500 young Texans.

B. F. Agee, manager of personnel for HemisFair 1968, has announced that a statewide recruiting program has started to hire at least that many young people for employment from March 15 to Oct. 6, 1968.

Agee is working with Texas Employment Commission offices

throughout the state to find accountants, ticket sellers, ticket takers, hostesses, security guards, maintenance personnel, secretaries, general clerical help, writers, guides, ushers and parking lot attendants.

Another 1,500 employees are being sought by restaurants, concession stands and exhibition halls on the 92.6-acre site of the international exposition.

Texas Employment Commission

offices in all parts of the state will accept applications for HemisFair work, and forward them to Agee. TEC applicants also will be available for consideration by exhibitors, concessionaires and restaurateurs who are hiring their own help.

"Since the goal of HemisFair is to be the best international exhibition ever held," Agee said, "we will need people who are young in heart and spirit, energetic, not afraid of hard work and who enjoy being of service."

The need now is for workers who can work from March 15 to Oct. 6, 1968. The program has not yet been worked out for college stu-

dents seeking employment for only the summer months, Agee said.
