Greetings:

Tuberculosis is the number one killer of human beings in the United States of America.

Texas ranks high in the number of cases of tuberculosis a fact that we cannot view with pride.

A great effort to stamp out this dread disease is being put forth by the Texas State Health Department and our local Tuberculosis Association. The local association has made arrangements with the State Health Department to furnish an X-Ray machine and technicians to make x-ray pictures of the chests of all adults in this area in an effort to stamp out tuberculosis.

We in Loraine are proud of the record made by the State Health Department and our own Tuberculosis Association in their work to discover tuberculosis among our people before the disease has time to develop to such an extent that a cure is difficult. Early discovery of the disease is essential to its cure. Chest x-ray will show any disease of the lungs, heart and other organs of the chest and will give each individual an opportunity to take steps to cure whatever is wrong.

The continued progress of the effort to stamp out tuberculosis requires increased public understandings of the importance of chest x-ray and the greatest possible encouragement and support of every citizen. To this end, I, Vance Dickenson, Mayor of Loraine, do hereby designate Saturday, August 15, as

CHEST X-RAY DAY IN LORAIN

and I urge that on this day every adult in Loraine and surrounding area visit the Lions Club building in Loraine and have his chest x-rayed free of charge.

Saturday Day Set For Chest X-Rays Here

The Lions Club building will be the chest x-ray headquarters on Saturday, August 15.

Why Chest X-Ray? 1. As a citizen and taxpayer it is your duty and privilege to help stamp out tuberculosis. 2. Tuberculosis germ may be working in your body now, even though you feel well. 3. Have your chest x-rayed every year. Lots can happen in 12 months. 4. The medical profession urge 100% participation. 5. All reports are confidential. 6. The process is very simple and quick. Go to the X-Ray center, give the secretary your name, address, etc, step in front of the x-ray. Click! That's all. No need to undress. 7. Other unknown diseases are often discovered through the chest x-ray, such as heart ailments and cancer of the lungs. 8. No x-ray on people below 15 years of age.

TB kills 45,000 people in the United States each year. TB is the number one killer among contagious diseases in the U. S. There are only 4 more states that have more TB than Texas.

Early TB gives no warning. It may be a long time before the symptoms appear. Fatigue, indigestion, loss of appetite and weight, a chronic cough, fever, are the signs of advanced TB.

You can find TB by chest x-ray, which is a picture of the lungs. The x-ray finds out what is going on inside the chest long before there is any other way to tell whether or not your lungs are healthy.

Having a chest x-ray is as simple and easy as having your picture taken.

Many people think they're safe from tuberculosis. They're wrong—more than half of those who die from TB are over 45. You can have TB at any age. Many people have TB and don't know it—you can have TB without feeling sick. And if you have TB, you may spread it to your family and friends. But doctors can cure TB at any age.

Now, what? You've shown good sense and had a chest x-ray. Now you want to know the results. Don't start worrying. Only a small percentage of people x-rayed have TB, but it's better to be sure than sorry.

Doctors will examine your film for shadows that don't belong there. If your x-ray shows the need for further study you will be notified and told what to do. If your chest is all right you will be so advised.

A chest x-ray can show one of three things about TB. 1. No suspicious shadows are seen on the x-ray TB has passed you by, so far. But you can get TB at any age, so play safe and have x-ray once a year. 2. Perhaps without your knowing it, TB once attacked your lungs. If so, old scars will show on the x-ray, and other tests and x-rays may be necessary before your doctor can say that the lungs are healed. If they are healed, have regular medical check-ups including x-rays to be sure they stay that way. 3. Shadows that make your doctor suspect active TB means that further x-rays and tests are necessary for more careful study. If your doctor decides that you have TB, follow his advice at once. Your family and those with whom you live and work will need to be examined, too.

If everyone would have a chest x-ray we would be a long way toward wiping out TB in the country. Urge your family and friends to have chest x-rays and have one yourself each year, or oftener if your doctor says so.

Those who live in town are urged to come for x-rays in the morning if possible as the greater part of the rural people will be coming in the afternoon. The time is 8:30 a. m. to 5:30 p. m.

Billy Joe Campbell Released By Reds

The moment that Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Campbell have looked forward to for more than 33 months became a reality Sunday night when they received the news that their son, Pfc. Billy Joe Campbell, was one of those released by the Chinese communists.

Billy Joe was reported missing in action November 2, 1950. Shortly after they received a telegram stating that the name Billy Joe Campbell, believed to be that of their son, was included in a list of prisoners supposed to be held by enemy forces. It was not until July 30, 1951, that this word was verified by the War Department that he was actually a prisoner of the communists.

The parents had remained by their radio the past week as names of released prisoners were called, and that is where they were Sunday night when Varnell Templeton went out to inform them they had some long distance calls. Coming in with him to the office and while they were away from their radio, Billy Joe's name was called. But the telephone call was from the Abilene Reporter-News to give them the news of his release. Russell Cope took them to the home of their son near Champion later in the evening to share the good news with them.

The parents, he 74 and she 64, were rejoicing over the wonderful news and while the reporter was visiting them early Wednesday they reported that each mail brought letters and cards from relatives, close friends and some whom they did not know but wrote to express their happiness with them.

While we talked to them the postman brought a telegram direct from Billy Joe which read "Dear Mother: Freed from the Reds at last. Your prayers for me have been answered. Feel pretty good for the shape I'm in. Nothing wrong with me that getting home won't cure. On my way home by boat." Billy Joe.

On Tuesday a telegram was received from Washington, D. C., to inform them that Billy Joe would be returned to the United States by surface transportation at an early date.

A reunion of the parents and their 11 children is planned with a big celebration at the return of Billy Joe.

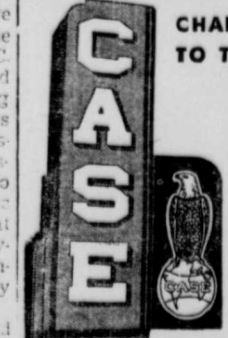

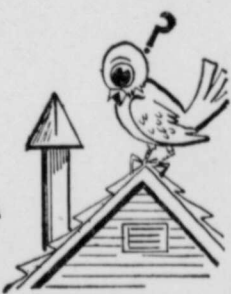

The Fifth Plate

The present birthrate in the United States indicates that one extra person will be sitting at every American table for four by 1975. People are now asking: "Where is the food coming from to fill this fifth plate?"

If population forecasters are right, our agricultural production will have to increase 20 per cent to feed the next generation as well as we are eating now. This means a big demand for additional food.

In the past, such demands have led to drastic changes in the lives of many people. When the Irish potato crop failed in 1845, hundreds of thousands left their native country to find homes in the United States. As the population increased in the eastern states, people moved west, opening new land and advancing the frontier.

In World War I, American farmers expanded their production by putting vast acreages of land into cash crops. And you all know the years of distress that followed when the war-time market collapsed in the 20's.

When a second World War again demanded the utmost of

farmers, they increased production by nearly one-third. This was about the limit of our production capacity at that time.

Today, each farmer now raises enough to feed himself and about 15 others. And there are 7,000 new babies to be fed in the United States every morning of the year. New farmers and new farms can't be created fast enough to keep the ratio balanced.

If we have to raise our sights to feed a permanently expanding population, where shall we turn this time? There are no new frontiers of first-rate land to be opened up. Only a little more than one-fifth of our land area is now being used for crops, so millions more acres could be put into cultivation—but the investment for irrigation alone would be staggering.

The problem is not a new one. About 150 years ago, Thomas Malthus, a brilliant but rather short-sighted English economist forecast starvation for the human race because the world population, he said, was outstripping agricultural production. But Malthus was wrong. He underestimated the farmer's

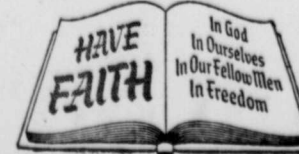

Questions and Answers

Q. I used to be a bookkeeper before I entered service. I've just been released, and I want to take a course in bookkeeping under the Korean GI Bill to brush up on the subject. Will I be allowed to do so?

A. No. The law prohibits veterans from studying for objectives for which they already are qualified. And you already are qualified for the objective of

bookkeeper, because of your past experience. But you would be permitted to train for an advanced objective you haven't already reached, such as that of accountant.

Q. I had a permanent National Service Life Insurance policy which I surrendered for cash when I went back on active duty. Now that I've been separated, would it be possible for me to reinstate that same policy as of the original date?

A. Yes. It may be reinstated at the original age and effective date, and without a medical examination, upon payment of the required reserve and the current premium. But you must apply in writing within 120 days after your separation from service.

Q. I'm a disabled World War 2 veteran, and I've delayed entering training under Public Law 16 until now. How much training will I be allowed to get?

A. You may train for as long as is necessary to restore your ability to earn a living at the objective you've selected. However, the course you take must be one that can be completed by July 25, 1955, the legal ending date of the Public Law 16 program.

Q. What papers will I need in order to apply for a certificate of eligibility for a GI home loan? And where do I apply?

A. You'll need your original discharge or separation paper. The place to apply is your nearest VA regional office.

Mitchell County Soil Conservation News



Walker Makes It Rain On His Farm

Noble Walker, District cooperator of the Mitchell County Soil Conservation District, in his farm 4 miles east of Colorado City, has been making rain on his farm with his sprinkler irrigation systems since last fall. He was one of the first to drill for water locally and was in search for enough water to irrigate a garden. In drilling the first well, the first stream of water showed up good enough for a windmill and each succeeding stream got better until it was finally drilled down to 201 feet. At this point it was gauged at 450 gallons per minute. This well was located by the highway right-of-way and had he known for sure that much water would have been found he would have drilled this well in a more central place so as to be able to water more acreage with less total length sprinkler pipe. Later on he drilled two other wells at strategic locations over the farm and they turned out to be good wells also. One of these wells pumped about 550 gallons per minute and the other about 350. He has never been able to pump any of the wells down so far and he estimates that he has available on the farm from the three wells about 1400 to 1500 gallons per minute.

He irrigated 20 acres of wheat and 10 acres of oats last fall and this spring for land cover, grazing, hay, and grain. These grain patches were grazed with 23 head of cattle from October 15 until April 1, of this year. The grain was watered and permitted to mature. The oats were harvested for hay and they made about 1 ton per acre whereas the 20 acres of wheat produced about 20 bushels per acre. He has about 10 acres of alfalfa which he is doubly proud of. About 4 acres of this alfalfa surround the farmstead on the windward side and he figures this is irreplaceable just for the cover alone not counting the grazing and hay which is coming in regularly also. He planted about 3 acres of his less productive land to a winter grass mixture last fall for grazing. He has irrigated this grass some and he has gotten a lot of grazing from the area with much more in prospect for this winter and spring. At present he is watering about 90 acres of cotton. He has just completed the second watering for this cotton and plans to water it all once more unless good rains come in the meantime. He is entertaining an idea of constructing a reservoir between two wells for next years use and do his sprinkling at night from the reservoir. He believes there would be less water loss through evaporation and that he would be able to run two or more lines side by side which would also help in reducing evaporation. He plans to seed another 10 acres to alfalfa this fall along with some other winter cover crops.
