Bob Reily named citizen of year Andersons, Wheeler also honored at banquet

Colorado City insurance agent and immediate past president of the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce, Bob Reily, was named Citizen of the Year during the 78th annual chamber banquet Saturday night.

In addition, the Woody Andersons were named the Farm Family of the Year and Effie Wheeler was named the Business and Professional Women's Club Woman of the Year.

Marion Bassham, last year's recipient of the outstanding citizen award, announced Reily's selection as this year's award winner.

"The committee charged with selecting this year's outstanding citizen was faced with a difficult decision," said Mrs. Bassham. "The qualities of between 10-15 men and women were discussed and in the final analysis, one person rapidly became a favorite of the committee. In fact, the committee was surprised to learn this year's recipient had not already been so honored by this community."

She noted that Reily moved to Colorado City 30 years ago and "soon the community began to benefit from services which were also given with a smile."

She said he worked with young people and those young at heart through church work, including being a Sunday School teacher, through work in the chamber of commerce and through his being named the town's centennial celebration chairman.

"This fine Christian person is a college graduate and shares the knowledge thus gained by teaching adult education classes," she said.

Reily has also been active in the Red Cross, the Salvation Army, the American Cancer Society, the Heart Fund, the United Fund and Scouts. His special interests include the Mitchell County Library of which he serves as a board member and the Mitchell County Hospital District of which he was an original board member. He also has been active in the Colorado City Playhouse as well as with his home and family.

He is a long-time member of the Lions Club and has held local and district offices. He was honored by the Jaycees as "Outstanding Young Man of the Year."

Reily and his wife, Charlene, have two sons, Pat and Bill.

"I am so glad Bob Reily is my friend, and I am very proud to give him this award," said Mrs. Bassham. "Bob Reily is one of the best things we have going for us in Colorado City."

D. M. Smith made the Farm Family presentation in the absence of an ailing Rob Holman, last year's recipient.

"The husband of this team is a graduate of Colorado High School and the University of Texas and began full-time farming in 1974," said Smith. "He is involved in farming some 3,200 acres with his father and a brother."

The Andersons produce cotton, grain sorghum, wheat and hay grazer.

Anderson serves as secretary of the Producer's Co-Op Gin board of directors and is a past president and outstanding member of the Colorado City Jay-

"Husbandry," one of the 1986 productions of the Colorado City Playhouse, was entered in the Festival of Plays this past weekend at the Abilene Community Theater. The festival is sponsored by the Texas Non-Profit Theatre Organization.

George Womack, director, said the play did not advance in competition but two of the cast members, Carl Moore and Marsha Moore, his wife, were named to the all-star cast.

The two other plays in the festival were entered by the El Paso Southwest Repertory Theatre and the Permian Playhouse of Odessa.

The El Paso and Odessa plays will advance to Fort Worth for further competition.

Other cast members of "Husbandry" included Kent Womack and Carrie Conley. Don Hurt

was in charge of lighting while Tandy Curlee was in charge of the set and Kay Oyler, stage manager.

Farm equipment auction Saturday

The Sixth Annual Colorado City Kiwanis Club Farm Equipment Auction will get underway Saturday at 10 a.m. at the Mitchell County Fair Grounds on West Highway 80.

Steve Morris, chairman of the event, said a variety of equipment will be auctioned. Gray Morris will be auctioneer.

Proceeds from the auction will be used to help fund the various community projects sponsored by the Kiwanis Club, he said.

"The Kiwanis Club sponsors a lot of youth projects," said

Morris. He said club members and other individuals have volunteered time and effort to make the event a success.

Besides an array of farm equipment, Morris said other items to be auctioned include a 1975 Peterbilt truck and a 1982 Winnebago motor home.

Besides farm tractors, there will be cotton and grain trailers, plows, planters and cultivators.

The Extension Homemakers clubs of Mitchell County will be providing food and drinks in the ag barn kitchen.

Refund asked for electric customers Chamber

TU Electric has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission asking authorization to refund about \$69.7 million, including interest, to its customers.

The refund, the fifth since May 1986, represents a continuation of savings to customers brought about by lower costs for fuel to make electricity.

Under the company's proposal, the refund would be made through a credit to bills in May or later, depending on when PUC approval is received. Residential customers who use 1,000 kilowatt-hours will receive re-

funds averaging about \$15.

TU Electric's composite charge for fuel was lowered in March 1986 and again in February 1987, for a total reduction of 10.3 percent. Most of the amount the company is presently asking to refund was over-collected in December 1986 and January 1987, before the most recent reduction in the fuel charge took effect.

In the four previous refunds, a total of \$319 million, including interest, has been returned to customers.

These savings to customers have been made possible by the

declining cost of natural gas and the success of TU Electric's program to aggressively pursue lower-priced fuel supplies. The company's average cost of natural gas has declined from \$3.74 per million Btu in 1984 to \$2.77 in 1986.

In addition, during 1986, TU Electric was able to increase the use of lignite coal to generate electricity to almost 54 percent of its total fuel requirements. The cost of lignite per million Btu is considerably less than the cost of natural gas. Therefore, its use lowers the company's overall cost of fuel.

TU Electric provides electric service to more than 2 million customers, or about one-third the population of Texas.

Wonderful, not a quitter, loving, caring and a volunteer were used by Mrs. Staats to describe Mrs. Wheeler who is a mother, grandmother and a great-grandmother. Mrs. Wheeler is the ninth of 16 children. Her parents moved to Mitchell County in 1906 and she has lived most of her life in the county.

"She works once a month as a volunteer helping in serving lunch to the Lion's Club of Loraine," said Mrs. Staats. "She arrives at the Loraine Senior Citizens' lunches early willing to help in any capacity. She has served on the governing board and is currently on the nutritional advisory council board. She carries out lunches to shut-ins. All the work done for the senior citizens is volunteer work."

Mrs. Wheeler was active in helping to defeat the liquor election in Loraine and is a volun-

teer walker for the American Cancer Society.

"This lady is an active member of the North Loraine Home Demonstration Club of which she has served as president for several years," said Mrs. Staats. "She works at the fair each year and any other project that needs volunteers."

Mrs. Staats described Mrs. Wheeler as loyal member of the First United Methodist Church of Loraine.

"She loves her Lord and shows it through her daily walk," said Mrs. Staats of Mrs. Wheeler. "She has served on the church board in several capacities - a trustee, a Sunday School teacher, on the governing board, president of the United Methodist Women for at least 12 years, as a district officer of Social Concerns in the UMW. She gets to every meeting of the church as well as the regular worship services."

"Effie has had some health problems that slowed her down a little, not completely, but just a little," said Mrs. Staats. "Our Mitchell County Woman of the Year who is wonderful, who makes others feel important, who is loving, who is caring and who is a volunteer, and most of all, is not a quitter, is Effie Wheeler."

A comical highlight of the awards presentations was a pie in the face to the four losing members of three two-man teams in a recent membership

drive. Tom Lovell and Travis Turner brought in the most new members and were given the privilege of delivering pies in the faces of the losing teams members - Eddie Piland, Mike Ratliff, Mark Waldrip and D. M. Smith. However, Lovell and Turner relinquished their pie-throwing privileges to chamber executive Penny Solomon, who took aim and delivered the pies, much to the audience's delight.

Miss Solomon, who has been with the chamber of the past two years, also was honored with a gift from the chamber directors. Miss Solomon has accepted a similar position with the Azle Chamber of Commerce and the banquet was her last chamber function here.

Guest speaker was humorist George McKinney of Dallas, who urged his audience members to "get on with things that are pleasant" and not to "dwell on the bad things".

"Think positive," he said. "Positive-thinking people get the job done."

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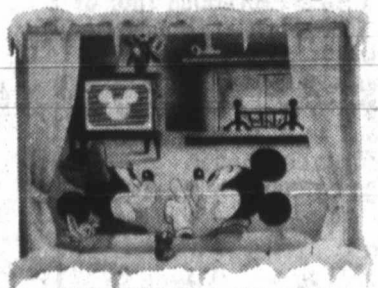

Cable company changes format

Landmark Cablevision, Colorado City's cable TV company since 1975, will eliminate its SuperCable package beginning April 1, thereby offering all its subscribers a basic package of 22 channels, Rex Thacker, manager, announced.

"This change means that all our customers will now receive such satellite channels as ESPN

(the all-sports service), CNN (the all-news channel), USA Network (24-hour family entertainment), and Nickelodeon (the children's channel," said Thacker. "Previously only about half our subscribers received all these channels."

The monthly price for basic service will be increased to \$12.50.

Landmark will offer its customers the use of a free converter box for one TV set, Thacker said, so that all basic channels can be received.

In addition, Landmark will offer a special VCR hookup kit for \$14.95 and a video control for \$49.95. Both are designed to simplify video equipment hook-

up and usage.

Thacker said each subscriber will receive a letter detailing the changes as well as a new channel lineup card.

Landmark also operates cable systems in Loveland, Littlefield, Brownfield, Coleman, Slaton, Stanton, Morton and Lorraine.

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Mitchell County Oil News

At a location three miles northeast of Westbrook, Tom Rasmussen finished a new oil producer in Mitchell County's East Westbrook Field.

The well is designated as the No. 12 Newby, pumping 65 barrels of oil per day.

Location is in a 171-acre lease in the T&P Survey. Bottomed at 3,315 feet and plugged back to 3,148 feet, production will be from perforations in the Clear Fork Formation, 3,080 to 3,131 feet into the wellbore.

D. L. Ray, Inc. has posted production figures on three developmental wells in Mitchell County's East Iatan-Howard Field. The Nos. 9, 27 and 28 T. L. McKenney "D" are located seven to eight miles southwest of Westbrook in 120 and 320-acre leases in the T&P Survey.

The No. 9 well flowed 40 barrels of oil per day, plus 253 barrels of water on a 64-64-in. choke. Production is commingled from perforations in the Gorieta and Clear Fork Formations, ranging from 2,557 to 3,369 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 27 well flowed 14 barrels of oil per day, plus 197

barrels of water, and the No. 28 well flowed 14 barrels of oil per day, plus 266 barrels of water. Production tests at both wells were run on 64-64-in. chokes.

They produce from perforations commingled in the Gorieta and Clear Fork Formations, ranging from 2,478 to 3,378 feet into the hole.

The same operation has revealed

production data on four more developmental wells in the East Iatan-Howard Field, Mitchell County. Wells' designations are the Nos. 17, 20, 21 and 23 Mitchell "B" Fee. Drillsites are seven miles west of Westbrook in a 240-acre lease in the T&P Survey.

The No. 17 well flowed seven barrels of oil per day plus 85 barrels of water; the No. 20 well flowed 17 barrels of oil per day;

the No. 21 well flowed 11 barrels of oil per day; and the No. 23 well flowed 26 barrels of oil daily. Production tests at all four wells were run on 64-64-in. chokes. Production is comming-

led from perforations in the Gorieta and Clear Fork Formations, ranging from 2,450 1/2 to 3,365 1/2 feet into the wellbore. Total depth for each well was 3,400 feet.

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Methodist women meet

The Loraine United Methodist Women began a new study Monday, March 9, at 3:45 p.m. They met at the church.

Mrs. Lola Fay Bennett, study leader, gave the introduction and over-view of the study entitled "The Spirit and Struggle in Southern Asia." The five countries involved in the study are as follows: India, Nepal, Pakistan, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka. Authors of the text used were Barbara Chase and Martha L. Man. Ms. Chase spent more than 10 years in this area of Asia, and was well prepared to write the

text. In these five countries, approximately 20 percent of the world's population live there. India alone has nearly 350 million people. In each of the five countries, their intense aim is to retain their identity.

All major religions of the world are practiced in the southern area of Asia-Hindu being the most common and Christianity with the smallest percent. However, in northern India, 3.5 percent of the many religions is Christianity.

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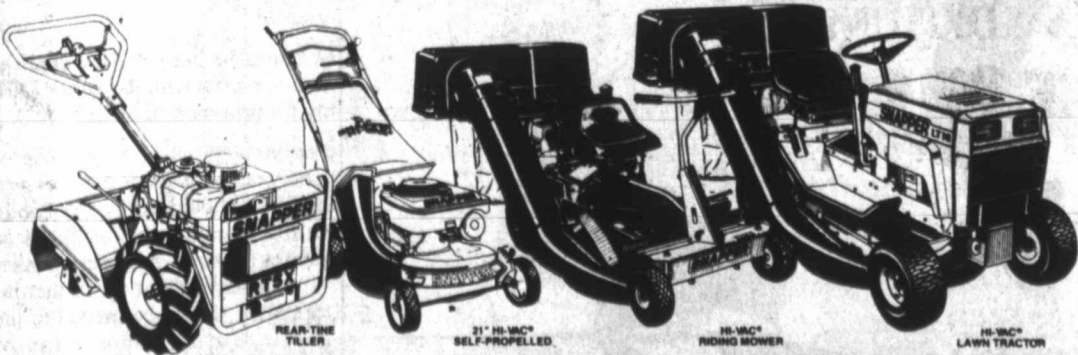

Reynolds to be in Hall of Fame

At 51 years of age, Colorado High School principal, Jerry Reynolds knows legs don't age as gracefully as minds.

"I can walk a hundred yards but I can't run it," said Reynolds from his CHS office earlier this week.

There was a time he could cover the distance of a football field in less than 10 seconds.

Those memories and others will be awakened Saturday when Reynolds is to be inducted into the McMurry College Hall of Fame. Reynolds graduated from McMurry in 1958 and during the same spring, he posted a 9.8 100 yard run for the Indians. That accomplishment was the tail end of a standout four-year career. Saturday's 7 p.m. dinner and Hall of Fame awards presentation at McMurry's Student Center will honor Reynolds' and others' contributions to the Indians' athletic program.

Reynolds, in his ninth year as CHS principal, was born in Lubbock, January 4, 1936 but found his niche in track at Slaton where he moved to at age "8 or 9."

Slaton didn't offer track until Reynolds was a junior. He competed for the Tigers his last two years at Slaton—running the 100 and 220 yard dashes as well as the sprint relay.

Reynolds clocked a 10.5 100 yards as a junior and got his time down to 9.7 as a senior in 1954. After district victories, Reynolds took third in all three events at the regional meet. In addition he was a four year basketball letterman, a three year football letterman and a two year baseball letterman.

He declined a baseball scholarship from Colorado State and left the dirt track of Slaton for the cinder at McMurry. He says the connection was made through the Methodist church in Slaton. The McMurry graduate

es in Slaton probably helped," said Reynolds.

As a freshman and sophomore, Reynolds won Texas Conference titles for the Indians in the 100, 220 and sprint relay. McMurry was an independent his last two seasons, but still

travelled to places like Odessa, Fort Worth and Monterrey, Mexico. As a senior, Reynolds enjoyed times of 9.6 in the 100, 21.8 in the 220 and 41.8 in the relay.

A Bachelor of Science degree ended his stint at McMurry but

began a teaching career that has spanned 29 years. His first assignment brought him here to Colorado City in the fall of 1958. He left his position as Texas History teacher, seventh grade football coach and ninth grade track coach in January of 1980 in favor of Denver City where his duties included seventh and eighth grade football coach and ninth and head track coach.

A one year stay at Lubbock Monterrey in '65-66 found him as assistant football and track coach. He took the same jobs at Andrews from '66-69. That completed a circle that brought him

back to Wolf Country in the fall of 1969 as Hutchinson principal. Five years there were followed by four years as head of Colorado Middle School. His nine years at CHS began when son Blake was a senior in 1978-79. Blake attends Angelo State University and wife Wilma, teaches second grade.

Reynolds' memories include having coached Abilene Christian College standouts Craig Fox, Pat Hubbard and Chip Bennet. "The trip to Monterrey (Mexico) was the most eventful as far as running. While at Denver City in 1960 we won the

state football title. We also won the district track four years and were second at state twice."

The change from cinder to all-weather tracks isn't the only thing Reynolds has witnessed.

Of his successes, "a lot came with maturity and hard work"—the thought he would like most to pass on to students.

"There have been a lot of changes, especially since House Bill 72. Especially in curriculum and extra-curricular activities. It's getting tougher or maybe just tightening up. I want students to do their best whatever it is."
