Tuesday Is Vote Day!

Voters will go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 3 to cast votes in an "off-year" election. Of importance to Texans, however, are the constitutional amendments appearing on the general election ballots.

Seven amendments are proposed including the one "authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhance-

ment and flood control purposes..."

That amendment, number four on the ballot, authorizes the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee bonds of cities, counties, towns and other units of local government in the financing of projects for the aforementioned purposes.

Amendment one is to authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to

encourage the improvement, development or re-development of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds and notes.

Amendment two authorizes the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of Nov. 15, 1981.

Amendment three seeks to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds.

Amendment five will provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry within farm products as exempt from taxation.

Amendment six authorizes a political subdivision to provide property tax relief for owners of residence homesteads and changing certain property tax administrative procedures.

Amendment seven authorizes the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' land program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans' land fund bonds.

Longhorns Lose Heartbreaker To Springlake-Earth, 12-13

Springlake-Earth took advantage of two costly Longhorn turnovers and a key penalty to post a very exciting 13-12 District 3-AA win. This was the second straight one-point loss for Hart, dropping their season record to 3-4 and 0-2 in District. S-E upped their record to 4-3 and 1-1 in District play.

Neither team mounted much offense in the first quarter, although Hart kept the Wolverines backed up in their own territory most of the initial period.

Late in the second quarter the Longhorns punted from deep in their own territory, allowing S-E to regain possession of the ball at midfield with just over three minutes remaining in the half. The Wolverines moved downfield on the passing combination of QB Todd Moore and TE Claude Barlow. A pass interference call gave S-E a first and goal from the Longhorns' four yard line. Hart stiffened on defense and S-E's fake field goal was unsuccessful, but Hart was flagged for being offside, giving the Wolverines one more chance. S-E took advantage of that mistake and scored on the next play with Moore hitting Barlow on a four

yard scoring toss with only 18 seconds left in the half. Roy James booted the PAT and the Wolverines led 7-0 at halftime.

The first Longhorn touchdown came early in the second quarter after Chris Clifford returned an interception 30 yards down to the Wolverines' 20 yard line. Clay Barnes then carried the ball to the 10 yard line. On third and goal from the five, QB Derek Rich hit TE Chris Reyna for the score. The pass for two points failed, leaving S-E in the lead, 7-6 with 9:48 left in the third period.

The Wolverines took the ensuing kickoff and marched 60 yards for their second score. Lorenzo Monreal capped the drive with a one yard run. However, the kick failed, leaving the Wolverines on top by a 13-6 count with 6:51 showing in the third quarter.

Not to be denied, Hart came back with a drive of their own, going 65 yards in only 8 plays. Daniel Guzman finished off the march with a 28 yard touchdown run with 2:51 remaining in the third stanza. The run for two points

Set By Lions

Selling Fruit, Nuts

Band Boosters are accepting orders for pecans and fruit. They may be purchased from any band member.

Irish Acres pecans sell for \$4.80 per pound. Fruit is available in small or large boxes. Small boxes, holding 20 pounds, sell for \$6.50 for grapefruit, \$7 for early oranges and \$8.50 for navel oranges. Large boxes, 40 pounds each, sell for \$9.75, grapefruit; \$10 early oranges and \$14, navel oranges.

Apples are \$10 for a half-carton. Mixed fruit (approximately 12 each of oranges, grapefruit and apples) sell for \$10 for half box.

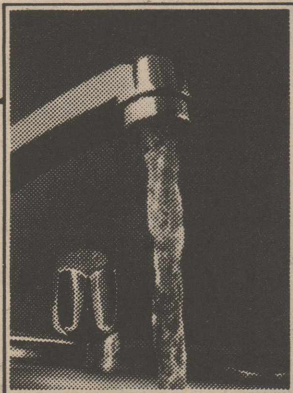

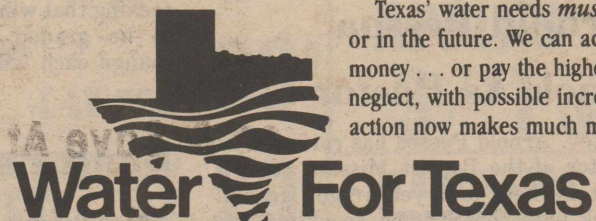

Different in that it may be prepared ahead and that it's cooked in the oven, the omelet is one that lends itself to variations, Jane says. For her family, she adds chopped green chilies plus extra onion for a Mexican omelet.

The pineapple cheese ball is an easy to fix but very good and, like the tea, is great to have when friends visit.

HAM AND CHEESE OVEN OMELET

8 eggs
1 c milk
½ t seasoned salt
1 c chopped ham
1 c shredded cheddar cheese
3 T finely chopped onion
dash of hot sauce

Beat eggs, milk and seasoned salt. Stir in remaining ingredients. Pour into greased oblong baking dish, 12x7x2". Cook uncovered in 325° oven until set and golden brown, 40-45 mins. Can be mixed and refrigerated the night before.

PINEAPPLE CHEESE BALL

8 oz cream cheese, softened
8 oz crushed pineapple, drained
½ bell pepper, chopped finely
1 T mayonnaise
1 T grated onion

Mix well; form into ball and roll in chopped pecans.

HOLIDAY SPICED TEA

1 qt water
15 whole cloves
2 stk cinnamon
Bring above ingredients to slow boil - put in 5 to 7 tea bags and let steep 10 mins. Take out cloves, leave cinnamon and add:

1 can frozen lemon juice
2 c orange juice
2 c pineapple juice
2 to 2½ c sugar
3 qts water

Mix and keep refrigerated until ready to heat and serve.
