

## Ballots Mailed Committee Elections

Agricultural Stabilization Conservation community committee election ballots were mailed Tuesday to all known eligible farm voters in Mitchell County.

Deadline for returning ballots to the ASCS office is set for Sept. 11, according to Curtis E. Latimer, chairman of Mitchell County ASCS committee.

"Farm voters can vote for up to three of the candidates listed," Latimer said, "or they may write in their choices on lines provided at the bottom of the ballot."

Nominees for committeemen, are:

A Community (west of Colorado River) - J. B. Autry, Harry Dockrey, Rex T. McKenney, Tommie C. Moore, A. Preston Morris and Jerry Webb.

B Community (east of Colorado River and north of Interstate 20) - A. M. Heights Jr., Dual O. Blair, Henry Hoyle, J. R. Erwin, A. K. McCauley Jr. and Hubert Meadows.

C Community (east of Colorado River and south of Interstate 20) - K. J. Barron, Travis S. Branch, Lee Roy Cornutt, Tommy Fuller, Alfred Hackfeld and Thomas Vest.

Three committeemen and two alternates will be elected in each of the ASC communities. However, farmers are to vote for only three candidates, a change from past elections in which five choices have been marked.

Candidate receiving the largest number of votes becomes community chairman, nominee having second high count will be vice chairman, third high, regular member. Fourth and fifth high become first and second alternates who will serve on the committee if regular members are temporarily absent or a permanent vacancy occurs during the one year term.

Latimer said, "It's very important that farmers elect their most qualified farm neighbor for community committee posts.

These community committees elect the County ASC Committee and choose its officers. They also assist the County ASC Committee in local administration of Government farm programs and help keep farmers informed on how the programs affect individual farm operations.

Any farm owner, tenant or sharecropper who is of legal voting age can vote if he has

an interest in a farm and is eligible to participate in any ASCS program administered in his community.

Others eligible to vote are minors who supervise and conduct farming operation of an entire farm, spouses of eligible voters, legal guardians who manage farms for a child and persons representing a legal entity such as a partnership or corporation.

The ASC committee chairman emphasized that producers who have farm interests in more than one community may select the community in which to vote, but may vote in only one community in the county.

## Blair Wins Saddle

### Lorraine Roper Tops In County

Larry Blair, of Lorraine, a senior student at Sul Ross State University, was winner of Saturday night's Mitchell County Roping.

His award was a hand-tooled saddle from Western Riding Club, sponsor of the eighth annual event.

Blair, 25-year-old Vietnam veteran, in competition for the first time, was one of eight contestants. He clocked a total of 81.8 seconds for three-calf roping.

He had second low time in first and second rounds with 19.3 and 31 seconds. He was

third in final round with 31.5 seconds.

Another Lorraine entry, Carroll Bowles, was runner-up in competition. His total was 84.8 with roping times of 26.5, 32.3 and 26.

Stanley Hackfeld, also of Lorraine, had low time in first-calf roping with 12.7 seconds. He had a 30.4 in second round but registered "no time" for his last calf.

Others entered in the event were Tom Neff, Joe Dan Hudson, Eddie Puckett of Lorraine, Dink Rees and Bobby Grisham.

Winners of saddle in previous county roping contests were Bill Ellis, now of Sweetwater, 1963; Clay Mann Smith, 1964; Bobby Northcutt, 1965; Hunter Mann, 1966; Jack Lee Long, 1967; Keith Hackfeld, 1968; and Wayne Smith, 1969.

Paul Petska of Carlisbad, N. M., was winner of first jackpot roping with a two-calf total of 23.9 seconds. Robert Regan was clocked at 30.5.

Ropers in the second jackpot, won by Burt West with 25.9 for two-calf time, were Crenshaw, Long, Hackfeld, Petska, Everett, Henderson, Regan and West.

Marie Voss of Snyder was winner of girls' jackpot barrel racing event.

She rounded the barrels at 20.6 seconds.

One-tenth second behind her was Ann Henderson, also of Snyder. Other entries were Jackie Caubel, third; James Hudson, fourth; Terri Lewis, Cindy Beaver of Snyder and Melody Walker.

## Wolf Scrimmage Opens Grid Fare

Colorado High Wolves, predicted every where from top to middle in 1970 District 3-AAA football, make another test run here Friday evening--this time against Haskell.

The pre-season scrimmage, from which Coach Truman Nix will turn loose his Wolfpack into a 10-game full schedule, begins at 7 p.m.

Actually, there will be an earlier hour of football menu with all teams, players and coaches--varsity, junior varsity, freshmen and junior high--being introduced to fans in a special Quarterback Club event.

Last week Nix and his Pack journeyed to Floydada for a scrimmage with the Whirlwind which is favored to repeat as District 3-AA champ.

And, they found the encounter rugged against the team that has 25 returning seniors

placed strategically in its roster.

Here this weekend against Haskell, the Wolves charge into another top AA club. Last year the Indians won tough 7-AA with a 10-1-1 record.

The Indians are favored again this season in their 7-AA over Stamford, Hamlin and Anson since Charlie Franklin is back.

Franklin is the lad who scored 31 touchdown last fall and averaged more than 10 yards every time he ran with the ball.

In their scrimmage last week with Floydada the Wolves counted three touchdowns with Quarterback Steve Vest and tight end Carl Devorce scoring.

Floydada scored four times, but one of the touchdowns came with the Whirlwind's junior var-

sity against Colorado City's second team.

With Sharpshootin' Steve at helm, the Wolves came out throwing. And during their four 15-minute offensive periods gained approximately 330 yards through the air. When Vest wasn't passing, his backup quarterback, Randy Nix, was handling the chores.

On the ground, the Wolf offensive accounted for more than 150 yards. The running attack was hampered when Skip Maines was hurt early in the scrimmage and taken to the Floydada hospital for check of his head injury.

Floydada, loaded with their 25 seniors, backed up predictions its play is better this season than last fall when it won district champ.

"Friday night they looked like you would expect 'em to look in their third or fourth game," coaches said.

But apparently the Wolves are improved, too. Last year they were outscored handsily. This time, the varsities were even and C-City had five more first downs, 22 to 17.

"One thing for sure," Coach Nix, "we found some new ball players. . . some kids who want to play."

One of these was Bobby Benson, the skinny but gutsy monster defensive back who took over running chores for the injured Maines.

## 5 Road Jobs

### Due Here In '71

Texas Highway Commission Tuesday set aside an estimated \$67,900 for seal-coating of two state highways and three farm-to-market roads in Mitchell County during 1971.

That amount is a part of the \$1,949,900 approved expenditure for highway safety and betterment and improvement of highways and roads in District 8 next year.

District Engineer J. C. Roberts of Abilene said that 344.5 miles in the 13-county district will be involved in the annual program - 32.6 of that total in Mitchell County.

Types of work included in the proposed program cover 339 miles of asphalt seal coats scattered over the district plus reconstruction of a section of State 176 in Howard County.

Projects for this county, according to Roberts, are:

US 84 (in northeast part of county), .4 mile from Nolan county line to Scurry county line, \$2,900 estimated cost.

State 163 from Colorado City to Spade Community, 12.1 miles, \$28,700 estimated cost.

FM 644 from Lorraine to Scurry county line, 7.9 miles, \$14,600 estimated cost.

FM 670 from Interstate 20 to State 163, 8.5 miles, \$14,600 estimated cost.

FM 1982 from FM 644 to Nolan county line, 3.7 miles, \$6,800 estimated cost.

Other counties in District 8 involved in the 1971 highway program are Callahan, Taylor, Nolan, Howard, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Haskell, Stonewall and Kent.

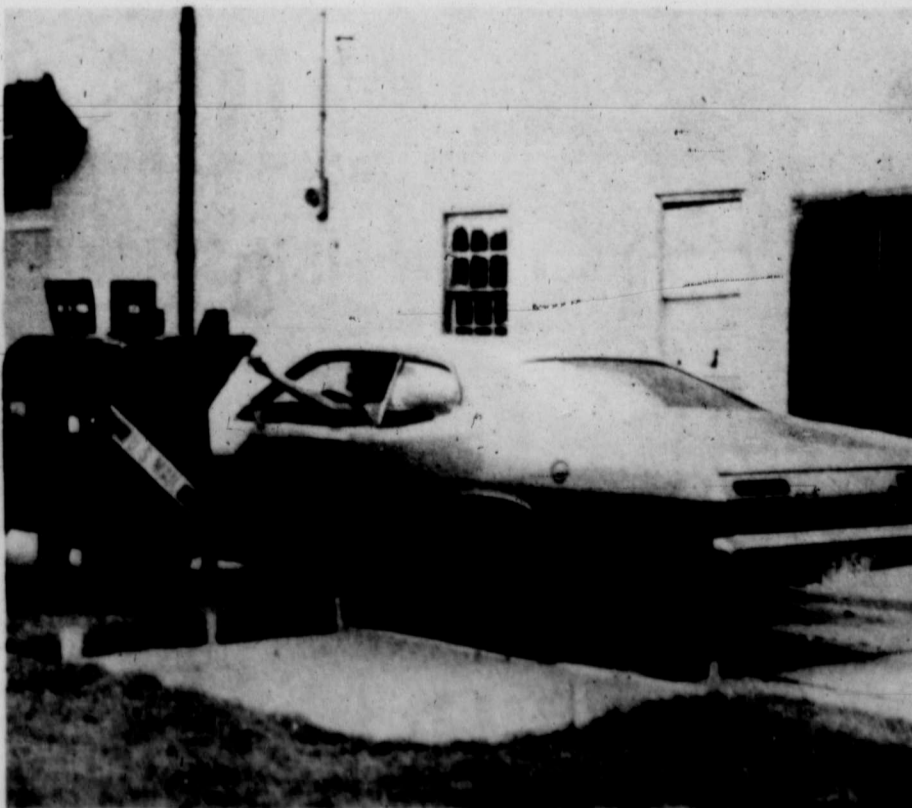
Road maps and information on traffic and weather conditions will be made available to motorists.

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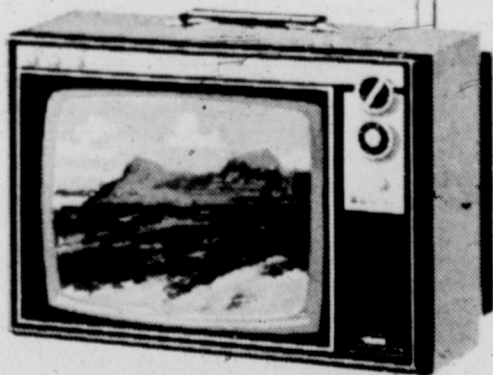


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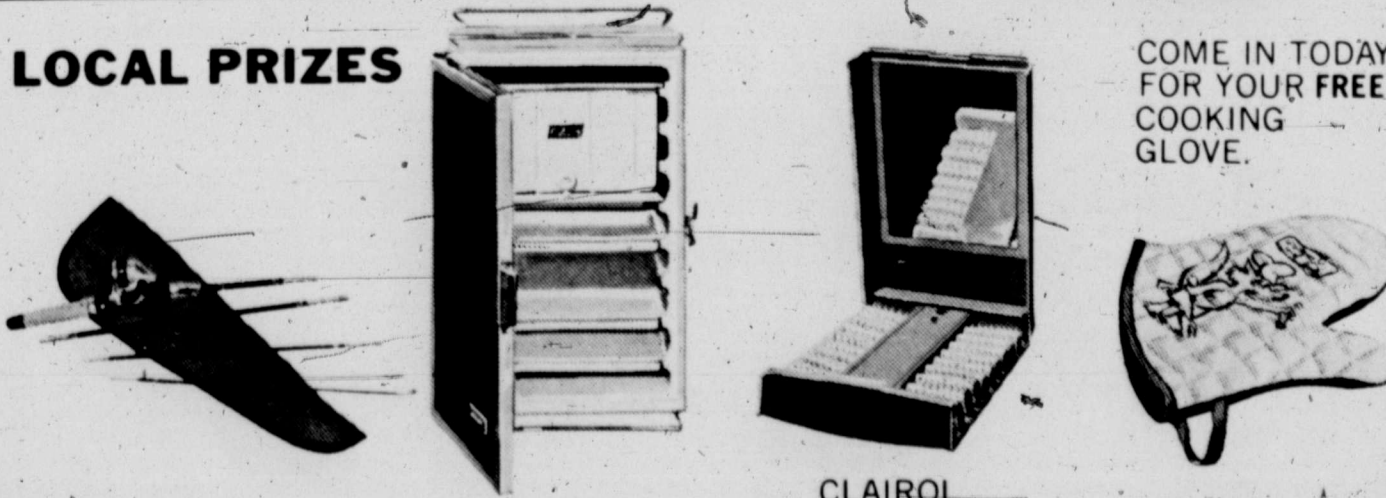

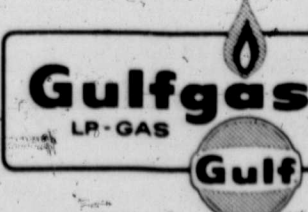

# CONVERSATION CORNER



SEPTEMBER is here again! And September came in with rain in her hair, mist in the air, and everybody smiling everywhere.

The writer D. H. Lawrence once said "I am very fond of Sussex--it so full of sky and wind and weather."

West Texans are fond of West Texas for the very same reason. It, too, is so full of sky and wind and weather.

Poets and farmers usually love the rain, though for somewhat different reasons. And all West Texans love a change in weather.

Feel sorry for people who live where the weather never changes. Always wonder what they find to talk about if they have to put up with the same old sameness of weather. Would not care to live through 12 months of August, would you?

LOOKED UP some quotations,

concerning weather, to share. Most often quoted bit is from Mark Twain. It's the one that goes "Everybody talks about the weather but nobody does anything about it."

Twain was only partly right with that one. Women have all kinds of ways to do something about the weather when the nights grow cool and the days stop being sizzlers.

Now is the time for all good women to check the blanket supply. . . to fry pork chops instead of chicken. . . to wash or send for cleaning sweaters of all sizes. . . and maybe to bake a batch of blueberry muffins.

MARK TWAIN also opined once "If you don't like the weather in New England, just wait a few minutes." He must have meant West Texas.

Another clever writer named

O. Henry decided in print "We may achieve climate, but weather is thrust upon us."

(Aside--there is a new O. Henry biography in Mitchell County Public Library which makes great reading for all O. Henry fans.)

Oscar Wilde, who spent part of his misspent life being witty on the bitter side because he was a bit of a bitter genius, declared "Whenever people talk to me about the weather, I always feel certain that they mean something else."

Just what else, he didn't

WEATHER is a very ticklish subject for people who make their living--predicting weather.

Weather is also a sure source of embarrassment to people who write columns while trying to catch the mood of weather.

Learned that long ago. Write a column extolling the rain--because rain makes you glad and always has--and what happens? By the time that "deathless prose" gets in print, skies are clear and it's time to turn on the lawn sprinkler.

Snow, one of God's special gifts to children, is not very safe as written subject-matter in West Texas, either.

John Greenleaf Whittier could never have composed his marvelous poem "Snow Bound" had he lived in West Texas because after the first 20 or 30 lines the snow would have been melting all around.

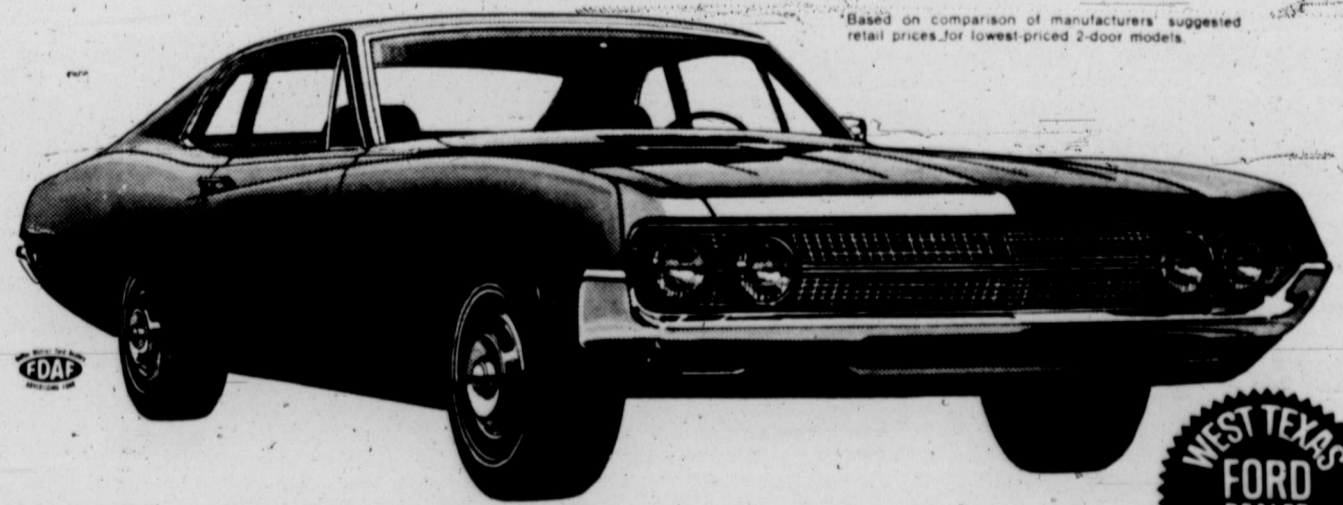

The case went to the jury late Wednesday afternoon here, following arguments by state and defense lawyers, Criminal District Attorney Ed Paynter and Nelson Quinn, both of Abilene.

Monteith is on trial here for the alleged murder of his 3-month-old daughter, Stephanie, last January in Abilene.

His wife, Judy, originally charged with the same offense, was freed Tuesday morning following a motion for dismissal by the state's attorney and a verbal order by Judge Austin McCloud.

Paynter asked that charges against the 18-year-old Mrs. Monteith be dismissed because "wives of defendants cannot be convicted as an accessory in the state of Texas and insufficient evidence, at this point, to show Mrs. Monteith was a principal with her husband in the alleged crime.

The district attorney is still seeking the death penalty for Monteith, 23-year-old former Abilene High track star.

In Monday testimony Dr. Herman Schaffer, the Abilene phys-

ician who was called to an Abilene hospital to treat the baby Jan. 13, discounted defense contention that the child's fatal injuries were caused by being dropped on her head, rather than being beaten as the state sought to prove.

Condition of the badly bruised child when he first saw her in the emergency room was "marked critical," he said.

If a drop or fall on the head caused the subdural hematoma, one would expect to find "some evidence - a bruise or abrasion" on the head, but none was found on the child, he said.

A second major witness Monday was the 16-year-old stepbrother of Monteith, Jimmy Allen Martin of Abilene, who testified he saw the defendant slap the child on Jan. 10.

Among the 9 other witnesses the first day of testimony were Monteith's mother, Mrs. Rosemary Martin of Abilene, and Marlene Goodgame, a registered nurse at Hendricks Memorial Hospital.

Monteith, testifying in his own defense Tuesday, said he only lightly "tapped" his infant daughter "with my fingers" on the night the state alleges the child's fatal injuries were inflicted.
