This meeting is under the joint sponsorship of Modern Bu. tane Co. of Burkburnett and Warren Petroleum Corp. Films will be shown and the fundamen- tal uses and advantages of Flame-cultivation of row crops will be discussed.

Experts in the field of Flame-cultivation will be on hand to answer any questions. Although flame-cultivation is not a new or untried method of weed control, not too much work has been done in this area simply because the machines haven't been demonstrated and the farmer has been unable to get a good look at what the advantages can be to him.

This meeting has been very well planned and will be of great importance to anyone farming row crops in this area.

Porch Light Drive Tues., Jan. 30th 76 Cities Added to Council-Mgr. Form of Government During 1961

CHICAGO—Seventy-six cities and other local governmental units are included for the first time in the "1962 Directory of Council-Manager Cities" just published by the International City Managers' Association.

The directory now lists a total of 1,814 local governments 1,757 in the United States and 57 in Canada.

Since 1950, the number of cities using the council-manager plan has increased at an average rate of 70 per year. It is estimated that more than 42 million people live in council-manager cities and counties.

At the present time, more than one-half of the cities between 25,000 and 250,000 population (344 out of 678) have the council-manager plan of local government. Sixteen out of 51 with populations in excess of a quarter-million also use the plan. Four of these have populations in excess of a half-million: San Antonio and Dallas, Texas; San Diego, California; and Cincinnati, Ohio. The largest government with the council-manager plan is Dade County (Miami) Florida, which has a population of 935,047.

Among the larger cities added to the directory in its new edition are Independence, Missouri (63,328); Battle Creek, Michigan (44,169); Bell Gardens, California (26,467); Wheaton, Illinois (24,312); and Galt, Ontario, Canada (28,000).

The council-manager form of government is 54 years old. It started in 1908 when the council of Staunton, Virginia, appointed a manager. Four years later, Sumter, South Carolina, became the first city in which the plan was adopted by a vote of the people. Under the system, a manager is appointed by the council to serve as administrative head of the city or county government under the general direction of an elected council.

The greatest growth in council-manager government has occurred since the end of World War II. The number of cities with managers more than doubled in the past 15 years.

A survey reported in the directory indicates that most of

the men appointed as managers during 1961 had previous public administrative experience, usually as a manager in another city, an assistant manager, or a department head. Most of the new appointees were under 40 years of age at the time of their appointment.

In addition to the 1,814 council-managers cities in North America listed in the Directory, there are 1,732 cities and counties in Europe with managers. All of these are in Finland, Germany, Ireland, Norway and Sweden.

Fertilize Soil or Not Fertilize?

When you use fertilizer you will make a profit or you will soon cease to use it. What are some of the factors that determine whether or not you make a profit? Actually, there are a number of these, according to B. T. Haws, county agent. Such things as good seed, good seedbed preparation, time of planting and rate of seeding all play a part. Other important factors include type of soil, amount of water available and the amount, kind and fertilizer placement.

Haws says all of this boils down to doing a good job of farming including wise use of fertilizer. He says good farming is a well organized plan, executed with the precision of a play by a professional football team. The farmer that fails to consider his entire plan will fail just as will the football team that does not have 11 players doing their assignments well.

The place to begin your plan is with the soil test to determine the kinds and amounts of fertilizer needed to make your plan work.

Top 20 Cowboys to Contest In Ft. Worth Rodeo

Fort Worth Stock Show Rodeo activity gathered momentum this week with announcement by President-Manager W. R. Watt that the nation's top 20 cowboys in all five major rodeo events will compete, and naming of two rodeo judges.

The rodeo prime attraction of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, January 26-February 4, will feature "Bonanza" TV stars Lorne Greene (Ben Cartwright) and Dan Blocker (Hoss).

Watt, in Denver to attend meetings of the Rodeo Foundation, Inc. and Rodeo Cowboys Association, said competitors have approved Pete Crump of Green Acres, Washington, and Sonny Tureman of Oakdale, California, as rodeo judges. Both are veterans of the arena. Tureman is a former bareback champ, and Crump ranked 13th in that category for the 1961 season.

Cowboy champions expected to complete in a field of approximately 400 at the Fort Worth rodeo include Benny Reynolds of Melrose, Montana, 1961 all-around champion (money won in two or more events.) Champions are determined by the RCA on the basis of dollars won. Others are:

Bareback, Eddy Akridge of Midland, Texas; steer wrestling, James Bynum of Forrester, Texas, bull riding, Ronnie Rossen of Broadus, Montana; calf roping, Dean Oliver of Boise, Idaho, and saddle bronc, Winston Bruce of Calgary, Alberta, Canada.

The Fort Worth Rodeo's rugged hoping calves, steers and bucking stock will be furnished by Rodeo Producer Harry Knight of Fowler, Colorado. Famed broncs "Jake" and "Sage Hen" are two of the tough ones scheduled to break out of the chutes.

Nazarenes To Hear Missionary Talk

Miss Marjorie Peel, returned Nazarene educator and missionary to South Africa, is on furlough to the United States, doing deputation work among churches of the denomination. Miss Peel has been stationed since December, 1955, at Acornhoek, Eastern Transvaal, Union of South Africa, where her duties have been numerous and varied.

She has served as the missionary pastor of a local church, as supervisor of children's and youth work, and as a teacher and administrator. She also has been station and zone treasurer.

Since her arrival at Acornhoek, the young people's program has more than doubled in membership.

In her missionary talks, she will describe the country and its people and will show color slides, where possible.

Miss Peel was born in Michigan and graduated from Olivet Nazarene College, Kankakee, Illinois, in 1946. She took graduate work at the University of Michigan where she received a master of arts degree in school administration.

She taught in the public school system at Grand Rapids for nine years and then was assigned abroad by the Department of Foreign Missions of the denomination. This will be her first furlough to the states.

Keep People Informed

The State of Oregon has two high speed freeways of advanced design. These have carried, along with the usual highway numbers, the names of engineers primarily responsible for their development and construction. Thus, an honor has been paid men who rendered a service of significance to the state, and whose outstanding ability has been recognized throughout this country and abroad.

But now one of the freeways has become part of the federal superhighway system, and the other will follow as soon as certain changes and additions can be made. The federal government is paying most of the costs. So the signs with the engineer's names on them must come down, to be replaced by signs providing only the federally approved highway number. This is a government regulation, from which state and local government cannot deviate.

The event is hardly world shaking. But it illustrates one of the oldest truisms: He who pays the piper calls the tune. And this applies, with brutal force, to all the existing and proposed "federal aid" schemes—whether they involve roads, or slum clearance, or aid to education, or anything else.

A Bargain

For many years Congress has allowed oil producers what is known as a depletion allowance. This amounts to a credit, to a maximum of 27½ per cent, against federal income taxes. It simply recognizes the fact that search for oil and producing oil involves heavy and special hazards, and that an inducement is necessary if men are to take the long risks and maintain oil reserves at needed levels.

This year, as in the past, efforts are being made to eliminate or drastically reduce the allowance. In that connection, the Independent Petroleum Association of America has come up with a study which should be of direct interest to all motorists. It finds that if the allowance were eliminated, consumers would have to pay at least four cents more per gallon for their motor fuel.

Here's the way it works. Under the 27½ per cent depletion allowance, about 14.3 cents from each dollar of income from crude sales can be set aside for oil exploration. To replace this loss of funds if depletion were

repealed, crude oil prices would have to be increased about 90 cents per barrel, or a little more than two cents a gallon. Applied to motor fuels, the price increase would work out to about four cents a gallon.

And this wouldn't be limited to motorists. The railroads, bus and taxi companies, and other commercial fuel users would have to pay much higher fuel bills. These increased costs, obviously, would have to be paid by consumers in one way or another—no one else can do the paying.

So it looks as if the depletion allowance is a "bargain." It keeps our oil reserve up—and fuel prices down.

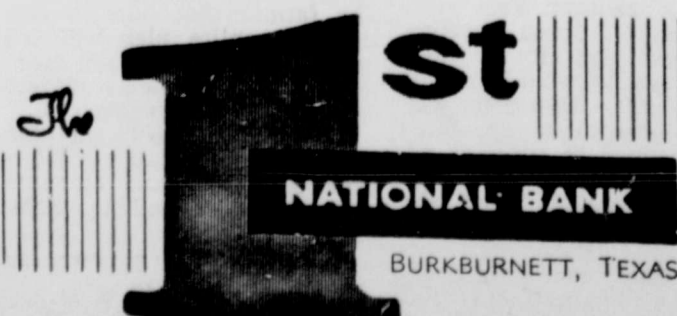

Internal Revenue Service district director Ellis Campbell Jr., reminds area employers who made timely deposits of income withheld and social security taxes due for the fourth quarter that they must file their fourth quarter returns (Form 941), no later than February 12, 1962.

Similarly, Mr. Campbell said, "manufacturers, retailers and others, who made timely deposits of all excise taxes due for the fourth quarter, must file their fourth quarter returns using Form 720, no later than February 12."

These returns are due January 31 by employers who did not make deposit or make deposits on time.

Featherston Speaker at Garden Club

W. B. Featherston of Falls was guest speaker at the Unity Garden Club, 17, in the home of L. Gilbow, with Mrs. Gaben, co-hostess. Mrs. Featherston is District II zone Chairman of Ways and Means Committee of the Forum, Chairman of the Earth Horticulture Club, Chairman of the Green Flower Arrangers. She is Japanese arranging to University Park Garden and possesses many awards for her work.

She gave the various methods of drying flowers and foliage. The most common way and the speaker's favorite is by hanging the material upside down in a darkened place. Many large leaves may be cured by rubbing the backs with oil and pressing with newspapers. For a curled or natural look lift the top papers after the first day. Leaves and flowers dry better if picked during a dry spell in the heat of the summer. Photinia and loquat leaves are Mrs. Featherston's favorites for drying. She displayed beautiful bases for arrangements that were cross pieces of logs, given a dull finish by using shoe polish. She exhibited twelve finished arrangements. Some of these had won prizes of distinction. She also showed a plaque of dried materials, a shadow

box, many types of leaves curved by various methods, seed pods and heads to be used as centers of interest and flowers dried in silica gel that had retained their natural colors.

Mrs. Roy Magers, leader for the program, introduced the speaker. Members had answered roll call by giving a method of drying plant material.

Mrs. Troy J. Miller, was re-elected president. Mrs. George Bellamy was elected vice president; Mrs. A. L. Gilbow, secretary and Mrs. B. H. Alexander, treasurer. Mrs. W. R. Stimpson, chairman of the nominating committee had presented the names and they were elected unanimously.

Unity Garden Club members are to take part in the planting of trees Arbor Day in Harding Park — a project of the Council of Garden Clubs. The

club is furnishing dwarf euonymus, pyracantha and ligustrum to be planted at the Southside Elementary School.

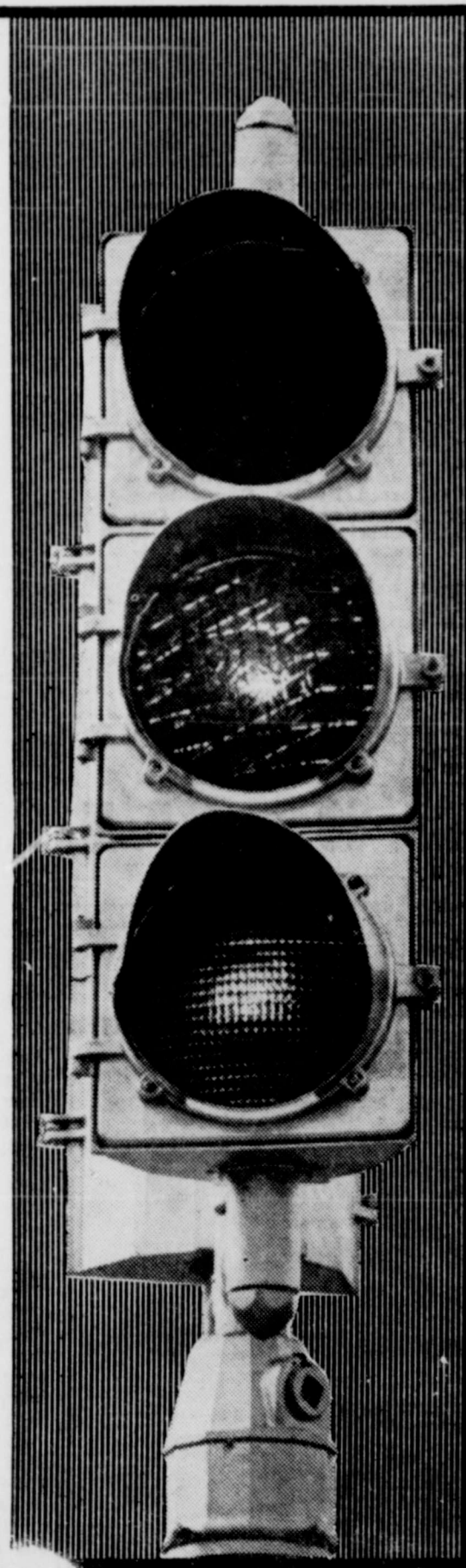

New Arthritis Test Developed By March of Dimes Research

A new and sensitive blood test for diagnosing rheumatoid arthritis in children was one of the medical achievements of 1961 highlighted by The National Foundation in a year-end review of progress by March of Dimes-supported scientists.

The report, by Dr. Thomas M. Rivers, vice president for medical affairs of The Foundation, cited accomplishments related to birth defects, virus diseases, polio and genetics as well as arthritis.

Dr. Rivers also noted that 1961 will be memorable because of the licensing by the U. S. Government of two of the three component types of Sabin oral polio vaccine which, like the Salk killed-virus vaccine, was developed with money given to the March of Dimes.

The new arthritis test was developed by Dr. Morris Ziff and his research associates at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School in Dallas. In their studies, the test proved positive in 76 per cent of children with rheumatoid arthritis. By contrast, other tests currently in use seldom pinpoint the disease in more than 20 per cent of youngsters known to have it, according to Dr. Rivers.

Dr. Rivers pointed out that few people realize how very serious rheumatoid arthritis can be in children, or how common it is among them. It is estimated that there are about 30,000 children under 15 in the U. S. who have it, many of whom are severely crippled, he said.

If it is also suspected many other youngsters may have the disease, with perhaps only minor or vague pains and no clear-cut symptoms to label arthritis as the culprit.

The arthritis test, which is particularly sensitive in detecting an unusual blood factor frequently found in persons with rheumatoid arthritis, may all its greatest role in uncovering undiagnosed rheumatic disease in children.

This could be vitally important, because the earlier diagnosis is made and treat-

ment started, the better the chances for prevention of disability in young victims of the disease.

A second scientific achievement highlighted in The Foundation's year-end review was a special field study which disclosed that a great many birth defects are not detectable in early life but may remain hidden until infants reach the age of one or two.

This report was made by a research team headed by Dr. Frank R. Lock of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine, Winston-Salem, N. C.

Among the other developments singled out in the March of Dimes research progress report were the following:

1. Dr. Joseph L. Melnick of Baylor University has come up with two chemical discoveries that promise major improvements in the manufacture of oral polio vaccines. It had previously been necessary to keep

such vaccines in deep freeze until just a few days before use. With the new chemical treatment, however, they can be kept at room temperature for as long as a month. The second chemical improvement removes undesirable viruses that contaminate the vaccine at certain stages of preparation.

2. A new radioactive method of detecting how viruses are formed inside cells was reported by Dr. Councilman Morgan and associates at Columbia University. Another group of workers at the University of Michigan described similar results with techniques involving use of fluorescent materials.

3. Additional evidence that one of the intestinal viruses may also cause an infectious heart disease, sometimes fatal in infants, has been obtained by Dr. George Dempster and colleagues at the University of Saskatchewan.

Some States Allow Cities to Levy Income Tax

Municipalities in each of the five states which out rank Texas in population are permitted to raise revenue through either local general sales taxes or income taxes.

Texas Municipal League research studies show that broad municipal tax bases are a characteristic of state's having large urban or metropolitan populations.

In 1961, 1,772 municipalities in 12 states levied local general sales taxes to help finance city government. However, the TML researchers report, 1,484 of these municipalities—about 83 percent—were in California and Illinois, two of the six most populous states.

As of April 1, 1961, 102 cities in the nation levied municipal income taxes. Ninety-one of those cities, nearly 90 percent, were either in Ohio or Pennsylvania, also among the six largest states in terms of population.

The state of New York, No. 1 in population, permits six municipalities to levy general sales taxes.

In addition to the sales tax and income tax, 375 municipalities in five states collect local gasoline taxes. The TML noted, however, that local gasoline taxes are not used in any of the large population states.

The TML studies show these total yields for these three major non-property taxes in 1960: general sales, \$875 million; local income taxes, \$254 million; local gasoline taxes, \$33 million. (Note: these are composite figures including county as well as city totals.)

Of the 12 states permitting local governments—city or county—to levy general sales taxes, all but three—New York, Virginia and Alaska—also impose state sales taxes. In five states, general sales taxes are administered by the state and are collected in conjunction with the state tax.

In the case of income taxation, neither Pennsylvania nor Ohio, the two states where local income taxes are most prevalent, have state personal income taxes.

The most widely levied rate of local general sales taxes is one percent. This is the rate for cities in Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, California, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico and New York.

The 1,120 Illinois municipalities using general sales taxes levy at a rate of one half of one percent along with a state sales tax rate of 3 1/2 percent. The highest rate for local sales taxes is 3 percent, used by eight municipalities in Alaska, one in New York and one in Virginia.

There is a greater variation state to state and city to city in the rate of income taxation, ranging from as low as one fourth of one percent to as high as two per cent.

In 1960 approximately 75 percent of the general sales and gross receipts revenue of cities in the United States was raised in cities having more than 500,000 population.

uary 1, 1962. This represents an 88 per cent increase over the 160 million pounds on hand a year earlier.

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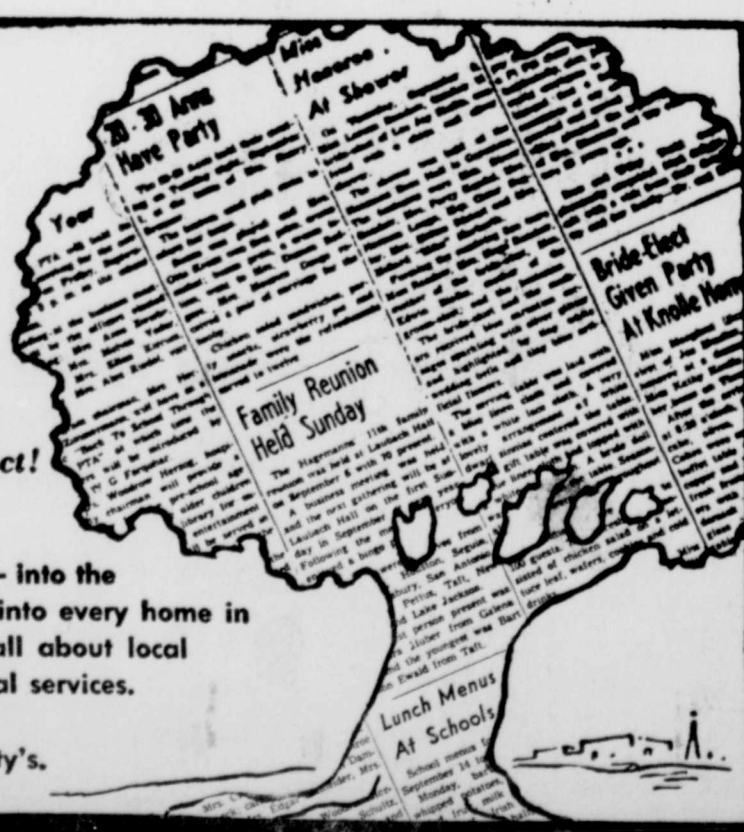
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GARDENING FOR BEAUTY AND PLEASURE MRS. ROY MAGERS

A series of articles on "Gardening for Beauty and Pleasure" by Mrs. Roy Magers, will be a weekly feature in the Burkburnett Star. Mrs. Magers, whose home address is on Shannon Road, is chairman for the Wichita Falls Garden Club.

Mrs. Magers is one of three accredited flower show judges in Burkburnett. She has been very active in Burkburnett and Wichita Falls in various club activities for several years. Among her many club activities she has devoted a considerable amount of time and effort to the Garden clubs. Her articles on "Gardening for Beauty and Pleasure" are of an informative nature, backed by experience and knowledge of the work.

Like the dainty pink and white little girl in the classroom, always well behaved, bleeding hearts are apt to be overlooked by gardeners because they give no trouble, do what they should without fuss, appearing on schedule and creating a lovely picture at a time when flowers are scarce.

Their shy beauty belongs in a garden where pansies are welcome.

Bleeding hearts are remarkably easy to grow. They like deeply dug, well-pulverized, humus-rich soil, but bother little about its acidity, whether it's light or heavy, clay or sand.

Spring is the best time for setting them out. The plant should be in the ground as soon as the soil can be worked, even if you have to protect its emerging growth with a mulch of straw for a few weeks. When you set your out, plan to give each plant lots of room. They do not like to be close to other plants.

These plants don't like their soil either very dry or wet, otherwise they make no complaints. Whether you put yours in full sun or in light shade depends upon whether you prefer many flowers over a short period of time, or a few at a time spreading over two and a half months. Set one plant in full sun and have bleeding hearts to complement daffodils and other spring blooming bulbs. The put another in semi-shade beside the columbines, the dwarf iris, and behind a bed of blue and white pansies and have blooms from it until summer.

Partial shade brings out the dainty color of the flowers as well as lengthening their season.

Bleeding hearts respond to feeding as well as any plant in the garden, even though it will do well, year after year, with very little food. To have heavier bloom spread a generous scoopful of cottonseed meal around the plant early in the spring, before the summer mulch is applied.

Its foliage disappears in summer. It is well, therefore, to have plants ready to spread their leafy foliage over the blank its leaves. Hosta is excellent for this, or snap drag-

Home Owners Beware:

The Ice Dam Cometh

It's never too late to protect a house against damage caused by ice dams. Even in the dead of winter, roofers can apply asphalt shingles to guard against leaks that may result from ice dams.

Ice dams cause trouble and water damage in many improperly roofed homes in cold climate areas where freezing temperatures allow ice to build up in gutters.

These accumulations of ice act as dams that keep melting snow from running off the roof normally. When this happens, water can creep up and under improperly applied roofing and into the house.

Insulation may be soaked, walls, ceilings, floors, furniture and household goods can be ruined. Dangerous short circuits may result if electric wiring becomes wet.

In areas where the daily average temperature is 25 degrees or less, authorities advise families to make sure a new or replacement roof is applied to protect against ice dam trouble.

Proper application of asphalt shingles in cold climate areas calls for protecting the eaves section of the roof with five layers of material.

A metal "drip edge" is applied first, and is bent down over the

edges of the roof deck boards. The second step is an "underlayment" of asphalt-saturated roofing felt that forms a waterproof layer over the entire surface of the deck.

Low-slope roofs require an application of two thicknesses of underlayment felt which, to form an "eaves flashing strip," should be cemented together from the eaves up to a point at least 24 inches beyond the interior wall line.

For conventional roof slopes, an "eaves flashing strip" is formed by applying a continuous strip of heavy roll roofing along the eaves on top of the drip edge and felt underlayment. It should extend from the edge of the roof at least 12 inches beyond the interior wall line.

Fourth, a 9-inch "starter" strip of roll roofing is applied. Strip shingles laid with their tabs pointing up the roof may also be used as a starter strip.

The first course of the regular shingles is applied as the fifth and final layer. These shingles form part of the visible roof covering. The other four layers lie beneath this course and are designed to give full protection against ice dams and wind-driven rain.

five eyes to each root, or as many as eight. The larger root is the better buy. It will give you immediately a plant with many blooms. Make a rich mellow bed with lots of peat moss, leafmold or compost in it, and set your root so that the eyes are two inches below the soil level.

Mulch the ground well with porous material that first win-

ter after planting. Your bleeding heart is hardy and unless the weather is abnormally cold, you can dispense with winter mulch after that.

Bleeding hearts poke pink noses through the soil early in spring, and grow rapidly. If a late frost should kill the branches, new growth appears immediately.

We have been talking about Dicentra spectabilis, which is what most people think of when they hear "Bleeding Hearts." There are other members of the family well worth growing. Golden Eardrops, a beauty that demands full sun and leans toward a mild climate, but can be grown here with a thick porous winter mulch. It doesn't like to be transplanted, so can be raised only from seed.

D. eximia is a junior sized replica of spectabilis. Then there is D. formosa, an excellent choice of the rock garden, especially if you have a shady corner. The foliage of this one is best of all the bleeding hearts. It has the habit of multiplying by creeping underground rhizomes, making frequent dividing necessary.

Blooms from May until frost. Any of these varieties can be grown easily from seed. Cuttings taken from any of them root quickly and easily in a polyethylene-covered pot sunk into shade and kept slightly damp.

Proper handling when they are picked will make them stay crisp and fresh for as long as five days in a warm room. Pick your bleeding hearts in the evening, cutting the stems on a slant with a razor-sharp knife,

thus avoiding mangling their cells. But them immediately into a bowl of warm water. Now leave the bowl in a cool place overnight. The next morning make your arrangement and see how well its lasts.

Would you like to grow these flower Valentines? It isn't difficult. Plant in deeply tilled humusy soil, giving them room to spread. Feed a little, water when necessary, and all the rest of your garden's life you'll have bleeding hearts.

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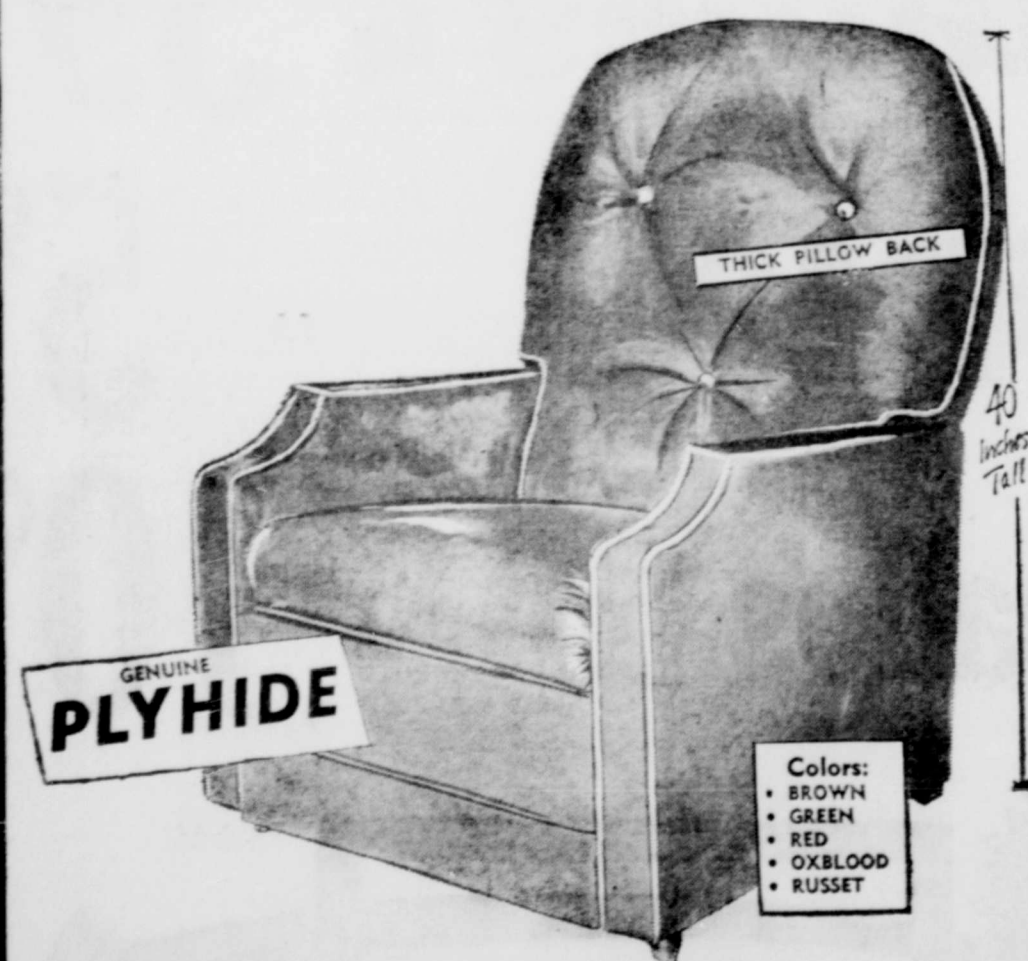

How Bills Become Laws in the Texas Legislature

Senator George Moffett, in a memorandum sent to constituents, explains how Bills become laws in the Texas Legislature. Following is his memorandum:

The Texas Legislature meets in a regular session for about four months once each two years. At a regular session any member can introduce as many bills as he desires upon any subject, except that tax bills must be introduced in the House of Representatives. Only about one-third of the bills introduced ever reach the Governor's desk. He vetoes some which do.

The Constitution provides that the Governor can call a special 30-day session whenever he deems it proper to do so. He called a special session to meet on January 3, 1962, and it must adjourn at the end of 30 days and can consider only the subjects which the Governor places before it for consideration. It is sometimes called the "Governor's Session" because he controls the subjects upon which bills can be passed.

In order to become a law, it is necessary that a bill receive a majority of the votes in each branch of the Legislature. The State Constitution requires that a bill, immediately after being introduced, be referred to the proper committee. This committee may or may not recommend the passage of the bill. If the committee takes no action on a bill, it is stopped and never proceeds further. Perhaps a third of the bills receive a favorable committee report and are placed on the calendar of either the Senate or the House of Representatives, depending upon the branch in which the bill was introduced.

A bill can be, and often is, amended in either or both branches. If it receives a majority vote in the first branch, it is then sent by messenger to the other branch, where it travels the same course that it did in the first branch, and if it is amended in the second branch, it is then returned to the first branch, and if it is amended in the second branch, it is then returned to the first branch. The latter must approve the amendments or the bill does not go to the Governor's office.

I often receive a heavy volume of mail about the various bills that are introduced. Time does not permit a member of the Senate to keep up with the

bills introduced over in the House of Representatives while they are still over there. Since a House bill may be amended several times after its introduction and while still in the House of Representatives, it is almost useless for a member of the Senate to waste time on it until it comes to the Senate. Those which do come receive

proper consideration. This information is intended to explain the conditions under which we work in a special or a regular session of the Legislature. I am always glad to have your advice upon a bill pending in the Legislature.

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IT'S UP TO YOU

A CURIOUS development on the American scene is the strife arising between the union bosses and their numerous employees. The unionization of union employees is a burning question. Top leadership among the unions does not like it, but if their employees are sincere about their work of organizing industrial employees then why shouldn't they be interested in their own union. If unionization is good for industry, they feel, it must be good also for unions.

Actually, labor unions are good. It is the special privileges they enjoy and the autocratic power exercised by their leaders that are bad. It will be interesting to see how top union leadership resolves the dilemma of opposing the unionization of their own employees, while seeking to inspire the loyalty of these people in the organization of industrial employees.

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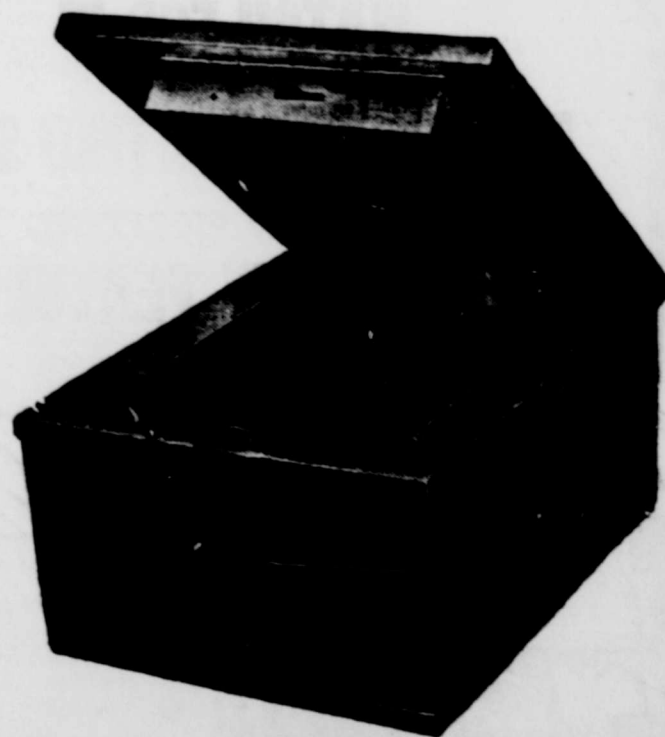
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A. There are a number of ways in which people of even moderate means can make a contribution in the form of life insurance. The simplest way is merely to name your church as beneficiary of a



policy when you die. You might also wish to assign the policy to your church right now. That would mean the church would immediately become the owner of the policy, even if you continued to pay the premiums. One advantage in doing so is that you could probably claim future premium payments as deductions on your income tax. For specific advice on tax matters, of course, you should consult a competent attorney or tax expert.

Q. I am leaving all dividends on my life insurance policy with the company to draw interest. Do I have to report these dividends as income for tax purposes?

A. In most cases, a dividend on a life insurance policy is considered merely a partial return of the premium you pay, and you do not report it as income. This is normally true of the dividend itself, regardless of how you use it. For example, if you leave the dividends with the company to buy additional amounts of paid-up life insurance, you do not have to report this interest earned on dividends left with the life insurance company is usually considered taxable income and must be reported. If your tax problems of life insurance arrangements are unusually complicated, you should consult a competent attorney or tax expert for specific advice.
