UFO 'Mystery' To Be Observed In Planetarium

One of the most unusual sights observed by stargazers is a complete mystery to astronomers. They have been called unidentified flying objects, or UFO's.

Visitors to the Planetarium at West Texas Museum in Lubbock during August will have a chance to observe several UFO's as reported by observers and hear something of the present state of affairs on the UFO mystery from Project Bluebook to serious reviews by popular authors.

Even ancient people observed UFO's as they are reported in many early sources, including the Bible. In recent years many men have spent long hours trying to find out just what the strange things are that whiz unexpectedly through the sky on some nights.

Most people think that a UFO is a "flying saucer," and, in fact, some people have reported going aboard space ships from outer space. On the other hand, many UFO's have been confirmed as hoaxes and optical illusions, but there has been entirely too much reliable information about these strange objects to discount them entirely.

The public is invited to explore the UFO mystery each Sunday in August at 3 p.m. at the Planetarium. Admission is 50c for children and 25c for students. Parking is available in the Museum parking area on the Texas Tech campus.

Death Learned Recently of Early Matador Publisher, C. P. Kendall

One of Texas' real veterans in the newspaper business, C. P. Kendall Sr., 88, died on April 23 in Freeport, it was learned here recently. He was a former owner of the Matador Maverick.

A native of Tennessee, Kendall came to Texas in 1900 for his health and published the Matador Maverick until 1908 when it was acquired by H. A. Mullenix. He was unmarried at the time he came here, and returned to Tenn., on a visit. When he returned to Matador he brought with him his bride, Miss Susie Terry, his former sweetheart. She passed away in 1963, at Freeport.

They went to Freeport on Nov. 20, 1912, when Gov. O. B. Colquitt dedicated the new townsite. Soon afterward a group of businessmen acquired the Velasco World and asked Kendall to take over as publisher. A year later he bought the Freeport Facts, then a new publication.

He built the first residence in Freeport and the first brick business building. In 1916 he was instrumental in promoting an election to incorporate the city. During the ensuing years he served as secretary for the school board, was one of the organizers of the Brazos River Harbor Navigation District, secretary of the Freeport Commerce League and active in the Brazoria County Development Association. He and Mrs. Kendall were founders of the Freeport First Christian Church.

In 1931 Kendall turned over to his three sons the operation of the Freeport newspaper. Then he bought the Sealy News. While there he was president of the Chamber of Commerce. In 1935 he returned to Brazoria County when a group of Angleton businessmen purchased the Angleton Times and urged the Kendalls to operate it. They did so until 1952 when they sold all of their newspaper interests and retired to their home in Freeport.

He is survived by two sons, C. P. Kendall Jr. and Kermit Kendall; and a daughter, Mrs. Mary Pearce, all of Freeport, and a sister, Mrs. C. M. Jordan of Savannah, Ga.

Sen. Hightower, who is from Vernon, Texas, was elected to the Senate in 1965 from senatorial district 30. He is chairman of the Senate Contingent Expense Committee and a member of the committees on Finance; Insurance; Agriculture and Livestock; Counties, Cities, and Towns; Labor and Management Relations; Oil and Gas; Water and Conservation; and Legislative, Congressional and Judicial Districts.

Ranchers Waging War on Mesquite

One of the greatest problems of the West Texas rancher is the steady increase of mesquite growth. The tough tree continues to invade greater areas of ranchland, cover vast areas and sap the water in the ground from valuable grass.

But a war is being waged against the mesquite with modern chemicals sprayed from a plane. County Agent Bill Palmeyer said yesterday that contracts have been allowed for 15,000 acres of mesquite infested land. He said, however, that the spraying of range land will depend to a great extent on favorable weather conditions.

'Texas' to Open Season Saturday

The Pioneer Amphitheatre at Palo Duro Canyon State Park once again will echo to the strains of folk tunes and dance rhythms, to the laughter and cries of recalled happy times and times of misery and heartbreak on the frontier.

"Texas," Paul Green's symphonic drama of early life on the Plains, will open its third season Saturday.

Performances will be at 8:55 p.m. nightly except Tuesday through Labor Day.

The fictional tale loosely based on personalities that settled the Panhandle-Plains embodies the spirit, vigor and tenacity of the homesteaders and ranchers as they faced the unrelenting cold and heat, drought and wind in their daily struggle to make a life in the new land.

Festivities at "Texas" include a barbecue before the show, strolling musicians to entertain during dinner on some evenings, and fireworks for opening night and Fourth of July performances.

Governor Expected Friday Gov. John Connally is expected for the preview performance Friday, to be presented for members of the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation and invited dignitaries.

In ceremonies preceding the barbecue and show, the governor will dedicate a relief map of the Texas Panhandle and historical markers prepared by the Texas Historical Survey Committee.

The map is a 10-by-10-foot granite structure erected on the amphitheatre grounds in memory of Dr. W. A. Warner and his wife, Phebe, who lived in Claude. It is a gift of their children.

As with earlier seasons, the souvenir program will contain reproductions of original art work depicting the Southwest.

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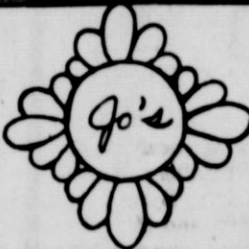

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Grain sorghum planted over an extended period this season has made conditions ideal for development of damaging sorghum midge populations. For the first time, significantly damaging midge populations have been observed in the Rio Grande Valley area. Midge damage, up until 7, has been reported as far north as Maverick, Uvalde, Bexar, Wilson and Live Oak Counties. Just this week, damage has been confirmed even further north in Hill County, and the Central Blacklands have also been under heavy siege by the insects.

Later-blooming grain sorghum will likely be damaged more than any other. General dates have been set up for grain sorghum which has not bloomed and could be significantly damaged. This critical period of potential midge damage begins about Aug. 1 on the High Plains. Reduction in grain yields in late-blooming fields has ranged from 20 to 100 per cent.

To control the midge it is necessary to realize that damage occurs at the time for spikelet pollination (bloom) and once pol-

ination has begun in sorghum fields, the producer must determine when the population has reached economic levels.

The life-cycle of the sorghum midge is one which is relatively hard for the producer to break. The midge will attack grain sorghum, sweet sorghum, Johnson grass, sudan grass, "Sorghum alatum" and certain wild or uncultivated grasses. The small, orange-colored, fragile-looking gnat or fly of the adult is about one-twelfth inch long. The adult females lay their eggs in the flori or seed husk of the host plant at the time of blooming. Early planted sorghum, combined with volunteer sorghum, serve as developing grounds for the midge buildups.

The early populations are not economically important as they are not damaging enough. Early, uniform planting is the best means of avoiding heavy midge damage. Although the early grain sorghum infestations are not damaging, they can lead to more problems as later plantings are made.

Midge damage closely resembles blasted or blighted sorghum heads resulting from disease, infertility, drought, high temperatures at booting-time and a lack of plant nutrients in the soil.

Best control of midge damage

is still considered to be early planting. Where damaging midge populations do develop before blooming, chemicals must be relied on.

Proper timing of applications to control the sorghum midge is most important. The first application should be applied when 90 per cent of the heads are out of the boot. A second application should be made in three to five days. In fields where the yields are high, a third application may be advised.

Recommended insecticides for control of the pest and additional comments are given in MP-339, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Mites on Grain and Forage Crops," available from my office.

Pesticide accidents don't just happen. They are caused by people who do not use chemicals properly. Don't let a pesticide accident mar the year for you by remembering these safety precautions:

Identify your pest carefully. You may choose the wrong chemical and be dissatisfied with the results.

Read the pesticide label properly and thoroughly.

Follow all directions and precautions exactly, including the wearing of respirators and pro-

TECTIVE clothing when recommended.

Keep unused pesticide containers under lock and key, and away from children and pets.

Avoid breathing pesticide mist or vapors. Don't spill liquid concentrates on your skin.

Wash your hands immediately after using any pesticides.

Two more tests for Motley County Livestock owners to watch were established on June 21.

Grub control demonstrations using the pour-on method were established at the John Russell and Ward Rattan places. Coral was the material used.

This material is recommended for grub control, but additional limited benefits are obtained for a limited time on the control of horn flies, ear ticks, and lice. Co-operators will watch the treated animals to determine how long protection from these insects is obtained. This fall a check will be made to determine the effectiveness of the grub control treatment against untreated animals in the same pastures.

AUSTIN—Texas Constitutional Revision Commission has completed its series of winter and spring work sessions, rewriting the Texas charter of government. It will not meet again until August.

Any fair analysis of the status of constitutional revision in Texas would have to be based on a note of pessimism regarding the chances for ultimate acceptance of the committee's work to date.

Main problem for the 25 revisionists to overcome was created when the Commission was established—by a divided legislature—in the spring of 1967.

Originally the Commission was to be formed by a joint House

and Senate resolution. However, the Senate refused to go along with the plan so the House acted alone. Speaker Ben Barnes named a House Committee. But Lt. Gov. Preston Smith declined to make any appointments. Gov. Connally gave considerable moral support to the committee, but now he is a "lame duck" and will not be governor when the Commission submits its report to the legislature next January.

In terms of the substantive proposals for a new constitution, the Commission has been far from decisive to this point.

Reports have been heard from various subcommittees on the executive branch, the judiciary, political subdivision, taxation and other topics.

These reports have been given tentative approval by the Commission as a whole, but on all votes it was made clear that decisions made now can be reversed during the next slate of meetings this coming fall.

One of the most heated debates in the brief history of the Commission came from a recommendation for the appointment of the judges on the Texas Supreme Court and the Court of Criminal Appeals by a five-man commission. Voters would either approve or remove them at pres-

ent these judges are elected by the people.

Two members of the Commission were particularly forceful in their argument against this proposal.

H. S. (Hank) Brown of San Antonio, president of the Texas AFL-CIO, opposed the measure as being a dangerous trend for a democratic society. Brown argued that the people have a right to elect their judges.

Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria contended that such a provision in the revised constitution would insure its defeat when the matter is put to a vote.

Dr. Janice May, government professor at the University of Texas, said Cory and Brown are overlooking the realities of the current system of judicial selection.

"Right now two-thirds of all our judges are initially named by appointment from the governor. Then, as a matter of practice, they run for re-election and are almost always retained in office," she said.

Most of the members of the Commission have expressed some desire to strengthen the hand of the governor. They maintain that a majority of the state agencies are virtually free of his influence and can carry out public policy without regard to his wishes. Opponents of the proposal point out that the governor already has authority to appoint 3,000 office holders.

Commission voted 8-7 to limit the governor to a single term—a procedure which would, in effect, make every Texas governor a lame duck for some undetermined portion of his term in office. Commission also favors providing the governor with a four-year term rather than the current two-year term.

Tentatively, the group approved a provision which would require the governor to be elected during "off-years"—years without presidential elections.

Many Capitol observers recall that a constitutional revision commission created by the Legislature in 1957 submitted recommendations after several years of meetings, but no action has ever been taken on them.

SPECIAL SESSION — There will be a hot time in this old town extending from the June 4 opening of the special legislative session until whenever it ends ... and that is anybody's guess.

Main business, of course, is passing a \$2,500,000,000 appropriations bill to finance state government for the 1969 fiscal year beginning September 1 and approval of about \$125,000,000 in new taxes.

Governor Connally has recommended general revenue spending of \$465,200,000. That would require \$123,800,000 in additional state taxation. Legislative Budget Board proposes a budget of \$471,000,000 from the fund over which the legislature has direct control, would boost the tax bill to \$129,600,000.

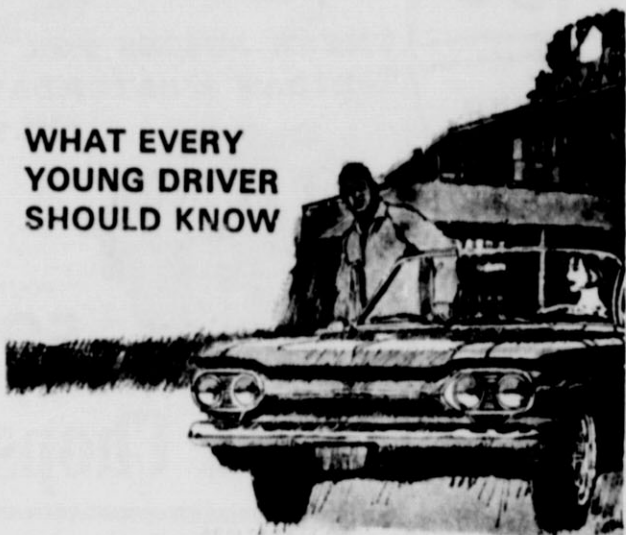
Connally's tax bill calls for an increase of the state sales tax rate from two to three per cent, with cities to get most of the additional revenue in the form of a direct rebate. Many services not now taxed also would be included in the three per cent levy. State-wide tax would do away with one per cent local sales tax now charged in more than 300 cities that contain the vast majority of Texas' population.

Session also is expected to come to grips with the explosive issue of liquor by the drink. A slight majority of the legislators live in districts which approved the May 4 mixed drink referendum by margins ranging from slight to overwhelming. But that's no assurance the measure will pass.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and House Speaker Ben Barnes also are urging Governor Connally to submit riot control bills to the legislators. They propose laws which would give cities authority to contract with each other for the exchange of police officers in the event of violent outbreaks; empower cities to enact strict curfew ordinances curbing sale of liquor, flammable materials and weapons; make it unlawful to trespass on public property with intent to interfere with public business; ban disturbances of public meetings and provide stiff penalties for interfering with police and others performing public duties in riot-hit cities.
