Witnesses sought in 2015 disappearance of C-City man

SNYDER— May 6, 2019 — The Snyder Police Department is asking for the public's help in solving the 2015 disappearance of a Colorado City man.

David Emerson Jr., was originally reported as missing on Christmas Eve 2014; however, police have now confirmed Emerson was last seen sometime between midnight and 4:00 a.m., on January 1, 2015, New Year's Day.

Although David Emerson's roommates told police he had moved to Lubbock, Texas, there have been no confirmed sightings of him in that area.

At the time of his disappearance, David Emerson Jr. was 36 years old. He is 5'10", and weighs between 160 and 170 pounds. He was last seen wearing a plain, white T-shirt, black athletic pants, a black bandana, sunglasses, and Nike Air Jordan shoes. Emerson wore a lot of jewelry, including: a silver Fleur-de-lis necklace, a silver cross necklace, a black rope necklace with a key on it, a yellow rubber bracelet, stud earrings, a watch, and a silver ball tongue ring.

There is a \$1,500 reward for information regarding the whereabouts of David Emerson Jr., Anyone with knowledge of his whereabouts or the circumstances of his disappearance is asked to call Lieutenant Mike Counts at the Snyder Police Department at 325-573-2611.

Wildfire damages historic buildings

BIG BEND NATIONAL PARK – Late Wednesday, May 22nd, a fast moving wildfire crossed the Rio Grande and caused extensive damage in the Castolon Historic Area of Big Bend National Park.

Smoke was initially observed on May 21st on the Mexican side of the river near the Castolon Historic District of Big Bend National Park. Park staff monitored the fire, and at 6:00 pm on May 22nd they observed embers crossing the river and starting spot fires on the U.S. side. Wildland and structural fire crews were alerted and mobilized. The fire rapidly spread, and embers from the fire landed on the historic barracks building, which housed the La Harmonia Store and Castolon Visitor Center. This building and the nearby restrooms were destroyed. The Officer's Quarters suffered slight scorching damage. Cottonwood Campground was evacuated, but has not been damaged. All employees and visitors are accounted for and safe.

The fire has burned approximately 100 acres and is not yet fully contained.

Wildland fire and structural crews from Big Bend National Park, Terlingua Fire & EMS, and Fort Stockton are on scene and continuing to work toward containing the fire. Additional crews, including the international Los Diablos crew, will be arriving later today.

"It is heartbreaking to have lost La Harmonia, a major icon of Big Bend's history," said Acting Superintendent Tom Vandenberg. "High temperatures, extremely dry conditions, and strong winds have made this fire particularly challenging. The entire staff extends our deep appreciation to all of the fire crews who are working hard to contain this fire."

The historic buildings in the Castolon District were built nearly 100 years ago to house units of the U.S. Cavalry during the Mexican Revolution. Damage to these

structures is a terrible loss to the rich history that the park is honored to preserve. More information about this area can be found at: <https://www.nps.gov/bibe/learn/historyculture/castolon.htm>

Closures are currently in place within the park including the Ross Maxwell Scenic Drive, Old Maverick Road, and River Road West from Buenos Aires to Castolon. This includes Cottonwood Campground and Santa Elena Canyon areas. These closures are in place for public safety and to allow the fire crews to work as efficiently as possible.

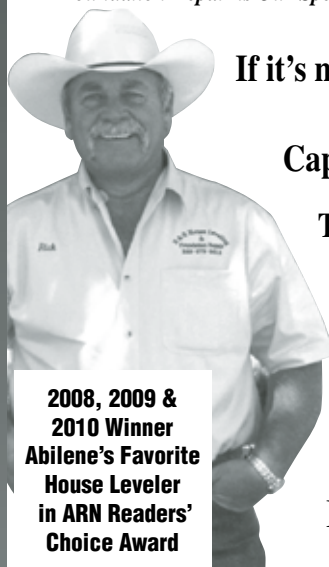

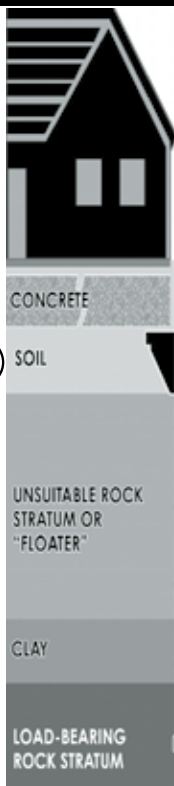

Contract Bridge

Test your play

1. You are East, defending against Four Spades.

- North
♠ Q 1 9 5
♥ J 4
♦ 6 3
♣ A Q J 7 2
- East
♠ 6 2
♥ Q 10 3
♦ A K J 9 4
♣ K 8 3

The bidding has gone:
East South West North
1♦ 1♠ 2♦ 3♠
Pass 4♠

West leads the diamond five to your king, and when you continue with the ace, South ruffs. Declarer cashes the queen and ace of trump, West following suit, then leads the club ten and finesses, losing to your king. What would you return?

2. You are declarer with the West hand at Three Notrump, and North leads the spade nine. How would you play the hand?

- West East
♠ J 10 4 ♠ A K 7
♥ K 7 3 ♥ A J 4
♦ J 8 5 2 ♦ A Q 10 9
♣ K Q 9 ♣ J 10 3

1. The proper return is a club! If you were to shift to a low heart instead, it would hand South the contract if he had, say, ♠ AK1083 ♥ K972 ♦ 10 ♣ 1095 and played low on your return. The same would be

true if you returned the queen, which would establish dummy's jack after South covered with the king. If you returned a club, however, declarer would eventually lose two heart tricks and go down one. You should reason that if declarer has the ace of hearts, he has 10 unassailable tricks — five spades, four clubs and a heart — while if he doesn't have the heart ace, he has only nine tricks unless you are kind enough to lead a heart and hand him his 10th.

2. With correct play, you are certain to make the contract regardless of how the opposing cards are divided. Win the opening spade lead with the ace, cross to the king of hearts and finesse the jack of diamonds. If North has the king, you make 10 tricks easily, so let's assume the jack loses to the king.

South can't hurt you by returning a spade or a heart, either of which would hand you a trick, nor can he harm you by leading a club or a diamond. Your two club tricks assure you of a favorable outcome.

If you started with a spade finesse at trick one, the contract would fail if turned out that South had five or six spades headed by the queen, plus the king of diamonds and ace of clubs. Similarly, you could go down if you took the ace of spades at trick one and played a club at trick two. If North won with the ace and led another spade, you could soon find yourself in serious trouble.

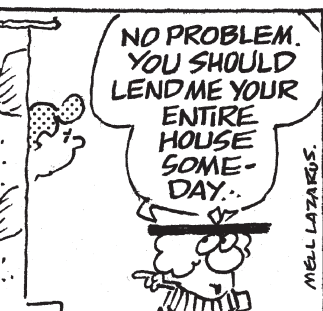

Today's Highlight in History:
On May 24, 1994, four Islamic fundamentalists convicted of bombing New York's World Trade Center in 1993 were each sentenced to 240 years in prison.
On this date:
In 1775, John Hancock was unanimously elected President of the Continental Congress in Philadelphia, succeeding Peyton Randolph.
In 1844, Samuel F.B. Morse transmitted the message "What hath God wrought" from Washington to Baltimore as he formally opened America's first telegraph line.
In 1937, in a set of rulings, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the constitutionality of the Social Security Act of 1935.
In 1941, the German battleship Bismarck sank the British battle cruiser HMS Hood in the North Atlantic, killing all but three of the 1,418 men on board.
In 1962, astronaut Scott Carpenter became the second American to orbit the Earth as he flew aboard Aurora 7.
In 1968, the Rolling Stones single "Jumpin' Jack Flash" was released in the United Kingdom by Decca Records.
In 1974, American jazz composer and bandleader Duke Ellington, 75, died in New York.
In 1976, Britain and France opened trans-Atlantic Concorde supersonic transport service to Washington.
In 1991, the feminist film drama "Thelma & Louise," starring Susan Sarandon (as Louise) and Geena Davis (as Thelma), was released by MGM.
In 2000, the state of Maryland dismissed its wiretapping case against Linda Tripp after a judge disallowed most of Monica Lewinsky's testimony.
In 2001, 23 people were killed when the floor of a Jerusalem wedding hall collapsed beneath dancing guests, sending them plunging several stories into the basement.
In 2017, Ariana Grande suspended her Dangerous Woman world tour and canceled several European

shows due to the deadly bombing at her concert in Manchester, England, two days earlier.
Ten years ago: Space shuttle Atlantis and its seven astronauts returned to Earth, ending a 13-day mission to repair and enhance the Hubble Space Telescope. Brazil's Helio Castroneves became the ninth driver to win the Indianapolis 500 three times.
Five years ago: A lone gunman opened fire at the Jewish Museum in Brussels, killing four people. Pope Francis, in Jordan, denounced arms dealers and appealed for an urgent end to the Syrian civil war at the start of a three-day trip to the Middle East. Reality star Kim Kardashian and rapper Kanye West wed in a Renaissance fortress in Florence, Italy.
One year ago: After a Justice Department briefing, Rep. Adam Schiff, the top Democrat on the House Intelligence Committee, said there was no evidence to support claims that there was a government spy in President Donald Trump's campaign. The president abruptly canceled a planned summit with North Korea's Kim Jong Un, blaming "open hostility" from North Korea. (A week later, Trump announced that the summit would take place in mid-June.) Trump granted a rare posthumous pardon to boxing's first black heavyweight champion, Jack Johnson, more than 100 years after what many see as a racially-charged conviction for violating the Mann Act by traveling with his white girlfriend. The president signed into law a measure loosening restraints for banks imposed after the 2008 financial crisis. A gunman was shot and killed by two bystanders after opening fire at an Oklahoma City restaurant and wounding three patrons. Jerry Maren, the last surviving Munchkin from the 1939 film "The Wizard of Oz," died at a San Diego nursing home; he was

Bucks on brink of elimination after tweaking starting lineup

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Mired in their worst skid of the season at the worst possible time, the Milwaukee Bucks need an answer in the Eastern Conference finals.

A lineup change didn't provide one, so the Bucks have to come up with something else in Toronto.

The Bucks returned to the starting five they used most of the season in Game 5, the lineup that helped them to the NBA's best record. But they were left with the same result as the third and fourth games and now face elimination when the series resumes Saturday.

Guard Malcolm Brogdon finished with 18 points, 11 rebounds and six assists Thursday in his first start since returning from a foot injury in Game 5 of the Eastern Conference semifinals against the Boston Celtics. But his first career postseason double-double wasn't enough as Milwaukee lost 105-99 to the Raptors.

The top-seeded Bucks need a win in Toronto after falling there twice already in the series.

"You know, we've been a resilient group all year," Bucks coach Mike Budenholzer said. "We just need to think about going and winning one game, go to Toronto and get that."

Budenholzer said before Game 5 that he and his staff were thinking of making a change to the starting lineup after going with the same five in each of the first four games of the series. Along with Giannis Antetokounmpo, that group included Nikola Mirotic, Brook Lopez, Khris Middleton and Eric Bledsoe.

After winning the first two games in the series, the Bucks then lost consecutive games for only the second time all season.

Milwaukee's coaching staff elected to switch things up and start Brogdon instead of Mirotic.

"I think Malcolm was very good overall, and it's a group that started 64 out of 65 games for us," Budenholzer said. "Malcolm has been the starter for the preponderance of the season and so I just felt it was the time for that group to start again. He did a lot of things well. (I'm) pleased with Malcolm."

Brogdon scored eight early points to propel Milwaukee to a 32-22 lead after the first quarter. But the Raptors turned the game around early in the second and pulled away behind 15 points in the final quarter from Kawhi Leonard, who finished with 35.

"He's a great player," Brogdon said. "You've just got to make him uncomfortable. Tonight he was able to get to his spots and affect the game on both sides. We've got to be able to limit him if we're going to win the next game."

Mirotic was scoreless in just nine minutes on Thursday. A perimeter-shooting big man acquired during the season from New Orleans in a three-team deal, he averaged nearly 25 minutes through the first four games of the series.

Budenholzer said he wasn't sure what role Mirotic would play in Game 6.

"We'll evaluate everything and see how Niko fits," he said. "He gives us great spacing, great shooting.

If he can help us off the bench, then obviously we'll use him, and he can be very helpful to us."

The Bucks got just 15 points from their bench on Thursday, their lowest of any game this series.

Despite losing Games 3 and 4 in Toronto, the Bucks head north knowing they won two games in the Scotiabank Arena in the regular season.

"Yeah, it's a great environment to play in," said Lopez, who finished with 16 points and eight rebounds on Thursday. "Their fans bring a lot of energy. I definitely think our team will be up for it. We're ready for the challenge, so we just have to obviously go out there and take care of business."
