Jay has six more months before he concludes his army tour. He's home for a month (three weeks to go) and then he reports to Fort Sill, Okla., for re-assignment. He hopes to stay in the Fourth Army Area, which will be kind of close to home.

Jay looks good. Maybe he needs a few more pounds. And he says he feels good. Jay says he doesn't want any more of Korea, but he's pleased (now that it's over) to have had the experience. He plans to complete his college education when he finishes up with Uncle Jay's. A nice young fellow and it was a pleasure to meet him and to talk over the war with him.

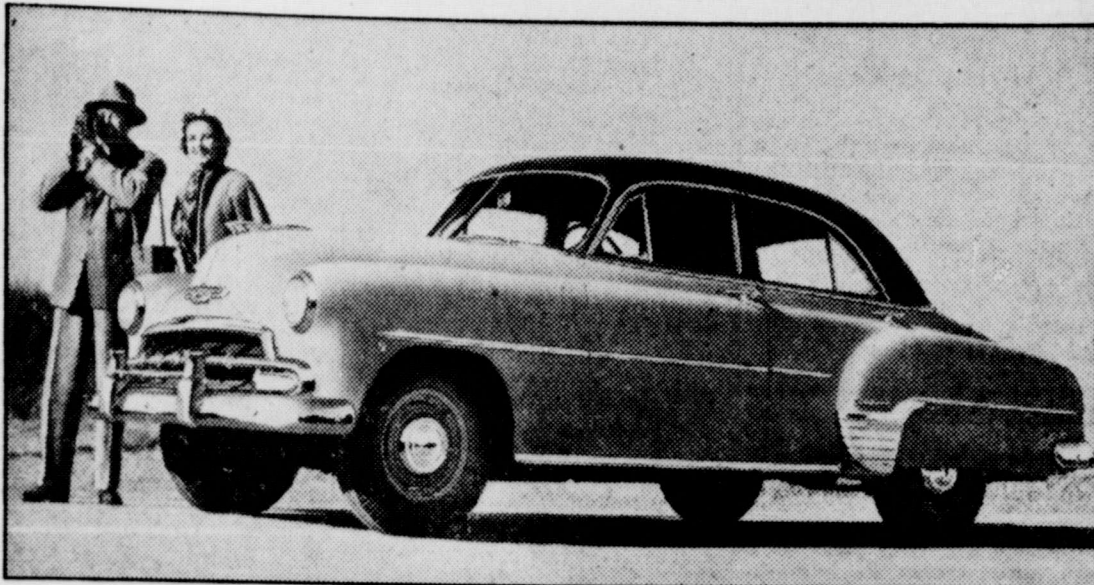

DON'T PARK YOUR CAR IN FIRE ZONES, MOTORISTS ARE TOLD

Fire Chief H. O. (Andy) Anderson has again called the attention of the people of Cisco to an ordinance prohibiting the parking of cars in a fire zone which has been defined as two blocks each way from a fire.

In calling the attention to the zone he issued a stiff warning that the ordinance would be enforced at all times in the future and that tickets would be issued to one and all who are caught violating the order.

The ordinance provides a penalty of a fine for any person who parks his automobile within two blocks of a fire and makes an exception only of those who live in the two block area.

Chief Anderson said that the area would be patrolled at all times and that there would be no

exceptions made in the issuance of tickets. Anyone who is found with an automobile in the area will be considered as a violator unless he can prove that he lives in the area or is visiting in the area before the alarm is turned in.

The warning was issued after a study showed that "fire fans" were increasing and were hampering the work of firemen engaged in fighting blazes. He also pointed out that crossing a fire hose was subject to a stiff fine.

He called upon all citizens to cooperate with the department in its efforts to protect property and lives of the people of Cisco.

Friends, the March of Dimes is "we the people of the United States." Polio is an enemy which we must conquer through our united efforts, because individually we are helpless, but united we can win this battle, as surely as we can conquer any visible enemy who may rise up in arms against us.

As I have told you earlier, my son, Robert, was hospitalized with Polio for fourteen months, during which time our Eastland County Chapter has paid \$5,017.90 for hospital bills, braces and crutches. I would like to remind you again that the iron lung, oxygen, hot pack machine and special nurses were furnished by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, and is not included in the above bill.

Friends let's also remember that Robert is only one of thousands of Polio patients.

The Southern Baptist Radio Commission has been invited by the National Broadcasting Company to televise a program on "Frontiers of Faith" January 27. This is a thirty-minute broadcast, and is a regular weekly feature of the NBC television network.

Charles Wellborn, Baptist Hour radio speaker, will give the message, "Design for Living." Music will be supplied by the choir of the Calvary Baptist Church in New York City, under the direction of Charles Ennis. Dr. John S. Wimbish, pastor of the church, will give the opening prayer. Frank Boggs, Baptist Hour soloist, will also be featured. The program will originate in New York.

Survey Indicates Several Oil Tests Drilling In Area

Arrangements have been worked out by the Consolidated Gasoline Company, a unit of the Hickok interests, to lay some 15,000 feet of pipe line to take natural gas from several new oil wells in the south Cisco townsite and adjacent area, according to an announcement today.

The new line will provide the oil operators in the area with a market for their gas, which has been flared since discovery of the Lake sand and field several months ago. The wells have a high gas-oil ratio and a gas connection was highly desirable, oil operators said.

The Hickok company plans to lay 2-inch, 3-inch and 4-inch lines to connect the wells to their gasoline plant mains southeast of Cisco. The project is expected to cost the company some \$20,000. Right-of-way staking has already begun.

The company has completed gas contacts with J. E. Connally, operator in the area, and is in the process of completing arrangements with the E. K. Gray Drilling Company, which has several wells in the townsite area.

Several months ago, Consolidated Gasoline Company, which has a gasoline plant some seven miles southeast of Cisco, laid lines to the Bankline-Owens pool, five miles northeast of Cisco, and made connections to some 40 or more oil wells.

The Carey Company's No. 1 Masonic Home was completed last weekend as a good well. It has a daily potential of 33 barrels of 40 gravity oil through an 18-64-inch choke with 600 pounds of casing pressure and 520 pounds of the tubing. Production was from perforations at 3,452-58 feet in the Lake sand. Gas oil ration was 29,000 to 1.

Carey's No. 1 Max Witt was testing in a completion operation today. Oil was flowing naturally into tanks, but an estimate of the amount was not available. It was not known whether the operator planned to use the hydrafrac treatment.

The J. E. Connally No. 1 Mrs. Pearl McMurray, a mile southwest of Cisco, has set pipe and will probably be perforated early next week in completion work. A drill stem test in the Lake sand showed gas with no oil at the rate of about 5,000,000 cubic feet daily. The test was carried down for a Ranger sand test, but no show was reported.

A mile northwest of Cisco, the Raymond Thomason No. 1 E. G. Montague was running electric surveys today after being drilled to the Ellenberger lime. It was understood that no oil shows had been encountered.

Four miles northeast of Cisco, the J. P. Lohan No. 1 Sam Hart was drilling at 1,900 feet. And in the Bankline-Owens pool in the same general area, the Bankline Oil Company No. 7 J. H. Reynolds topped the Lake sand pay zone early today at 3,386 feet and was coring.

Ginsberg and Fleishmann of Tyler were preparing to move in to drill their No. 1 Wesley Methodist Church on the old Bedford church property in the Bankline-Owens pool area. Permit for the well was granted several months ago and the Tyler firm paid the church \$10,000 for the small one-week lease.

Six miles southwest of Cisco, the Ownby Drilling Company No. 1 J. W. Brown Estate was flowing in completion tests from the Mississippi lime at about 3,150 feet. A 15-foot section of the 140 feet of the lime formation was perforated for the test. The nearby discovery well has a daily potential of 87.5 barrels of oil and observers believed the new Brown would produce more.

Owby's No. 1 B. A. Brown, a near offset, has set surface pipe and was drilling ahead. The D. W. Henke No. 1 J. W. Estate, in the same area, was drilling at about 1,500 feet.

HEALTH TALKS

BRAIN is the center of understanding and motivation of mankind. The stem of the brain (medulla oblongata) is a continuation of the spinal column, rising upward into the skull like the trunk of a tree, spreading out to the top of the skull in a main branch (cerebrum), lying under the main branch.

Under the bony skull (cranium) is a layer of strong, tough film called the dura mater. Next to that is a weblike membrane of thin tissue called the arachnoid, meaning "like a spider web". Then there is a space, called sinus, which is filled with a fluid, serving as a shock absorber, and finally there is the pia mater, a thin skin which directly covers the brain, following all the ups and downs called convolutions. The whole thing looks very much like the two halves of a walnut.

The cerebellum, under this pia

mater, has first a layer of gray matter, called the cortex. Under the cortex is a mass of nerve fibers called the white matter.

Taking the brain stem as the trunk of a tree, you might imagine that the tree is put in a case (skull), allowing it to grow only so far. All those wrinkles and folds that make up the top of the brain could be considered the branches of the tree, growing as far as possible before being turned back. They grow toward the outside of the skull and turn back toward the middle: there is a cleft in the middle of the brain with a tiny bridge (pons varoli) which joins the two hemispheres.

The branches then would be the grey matter, the cortex of the brain. And those branches turn back toward the center of the head, the white matter may be considered the leaves and blossoms of the tree. The breath you breathe and the ideas you have could be considered the wind that blows the tree, setting the leaves and branches in motion, creating thoughts and action.

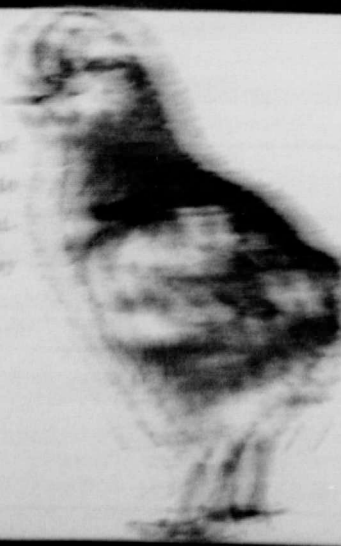
