

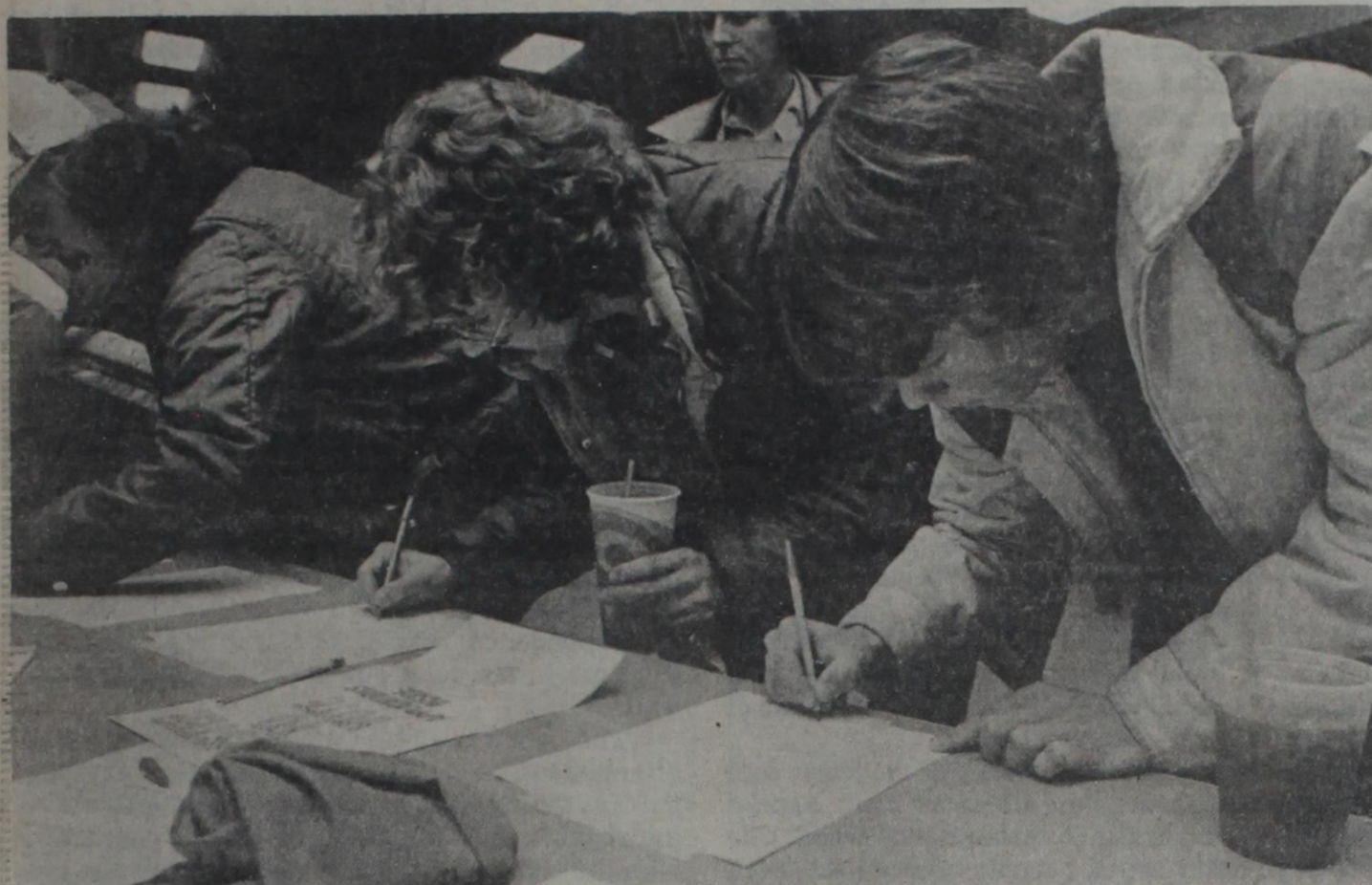

Students rally in support of rights

Crowd encouraged to be visible, vocal

About 1,300 students, according to University Center officials, packed the UC Ballroom Thursday afternoon to show their support for what they called the movement to "reestablish student rights on the Tech campus."

What was designed as meeting between students and the Student Association to discuss reaction to the recent rejection by the Board of Regents of the SA's alcohol-on-campus proposal, quickly turned into a two-hour rally for the rights of students and their ability to be heard by Tech's governing body.

SA President Chuck Campbell, who was greeted with a standing ovation, outlined the proposal presented to the regents Feb. 3. Campbell then told the crowd he was confident with the

validity of the survey and the way the pub would have been implemented if approved by the regents.

"But the gut of the issue," Campbell said, "is not alcohol, but the right of adults to make their own decisions and the right of adult students to be seriously considered by the governing body of this university."

Campbell said the students who are upset with the regents' decision, which he termed "a serious problem to the growth of this university in general," should act as responsible adults and make their dissatisfaction known through constructive means.

"I encourage you to write the regents, and, if you feel it is proper, speak to your parents and have them write the regents, too."

"But the real difference between legal adults and responsible adults," Campbell told the crowd, "is the privilege to vote where it would be most effective."

Noting that regent Don Workman is a Democratic candidate for the 28th State Senatorial District, Campbell urged students to register to vote in Lubbock County and vote in the May 6 primary as a demonstration of their political power.

After the floor was opened to student comments, many students reiterated Campbell's statements urging students to write letters and sign petitions to be presented to the regents demanding the board members listen to students' wishes.

One student described the board as a body whose "pursuit of private power exceeds their public responsibility" and said students' rights were "grossly violated" by the regents.

Another student, a freshman from New Mexico, said it is the regent's duty and the students' right to be heard by the board or "otherwise it's a farce."

Several senior students said they were fully behind any efforts to establish a pub on campus to back the principle of students being heard by the board.

"It's time we as students, the majority, were heard here," one senior said. "I'm going to be gone and I'm not ever going to use this damn pub, but let's get it in."

Another senior student said he was particularly in support of the pub because "it is a university's duty to provide students with alternatives. If

we make mistakes in drinking then maybe we can benefit from those mistakes in college and not make them later on in life. That's what college is about."

Several students' proposed demonstrations on campus, including one student who said a "smoke-in to really shake up the regents" led by "yippees from New York" is planned for April 1 at Memorial Circle. The idea of campus demonstrations, however, generally was met with disapproval by the crowd.

Campbell pointed out that the administrators and most of the persons directly involved with the daily workings of the university are in full support of the students' desire to have a pub in the UC. Any campus demonstration, he said, would not have a large impact on the regents and might hurt the faculty members who support the issue.

Many students also pointed out that any outside influences in a demonstration would take the issue out of Tech students' hands and provide the regents with even more reason to ignore student wishes.

"We need to keep the issue defined and precise," a student said, "and don't let anyone cloud the issue and get us in trouble. What we really need to do is point out to the regents that we are the future alumni of Tech and if they don't listen to us now, they won't have our support or money in the future."

Many of the students at the meeting came armed with red scarves which they waved each time someone mentioned regent J. Fred Bucy's statement that if a pub was allowed in the UC, Tech would be "moving down the road of liberalism and socialism that goes with it."

Students also applauded at the mention of Regent Roy K. Furr, the only regent who voted for the pub, and Tech President Cecil Mackey, who was described by one student as "coming under pressure for showing some integrity in this matter and supporting the students in the pub proposal."

About 500 students signed preliminary petitions supporting alcohol on campus and denouncing the way the proposal was treated by the regents. A formalized petition concerning this issue will be available in the UC Monday for students to sign, according to Mary Lind Dowell, UC Program council assistant coordinator.

Letter may be responsible for defeat

A form letter, written by First Baptist minister Barry Wood on Jan. 18, may have been responsible for the defeat of the recent alcohol proposal, according to Student Association President Chuck Campbell.

The letter, which Campbell said was sent to parents of Tech students in Wood's ministry, was read aloud by Campbell before a packed University Center Ballroom crowd Thursday afternoon.

The audience alternately jeered boomed and hissed as entire contents of the letter were revealed.

In the letter, Wood said the parents should be involved in the issue of the proposal to have alcohol on campus and asked that the parents express their concern, if they agreed to his summary, in letters to the Regents.

"February 3, a group of Student Association people led by Student Association president Chuck Campbell, and coached by Regent Chairman Judson Williams will present a proposal to the Regents advocating a 'pub' in the Student Center," Wood said in his letter. "Their proposal will be very

persuasive."

Wood listed what he thought the SA's reasons would be for the proposal and said, "I personally am opposed to this reasoning as are several key men on the Board of Regents."

"However," he continued, "there are a few men who are undecided who need to hear from those who are opposed and why we are opposed."

Wood listed seven reasons why the current policy of no alcohol on campus should be continued, including, "Many younger students (freshmen and sophomores) are very impressionable and this official endorsement by alcohol on campus can 'set up' these 17-19-year-old people into a life style that can do a great deal of damage."

Liquor in the pub "will encourage liquor in the dorm and turn our Resident Hall Assistants into Bouncers in a tavern," the letter continued.

Wood said that "Just because students want a pub on campus doesn't mean there should be a pub on campus. What if they wanted a massage parlor, would we give them that, too, for the convenience and the revenue?"

According to the letter, Wood said

parents have told him if "liquor comes on this campus, they'll transfer their child to a church school like Baylor, etc. Is it fair to ask these people to pay higher tuition when the taxes help provide for a state school education?"

Wood's seventh reasoning in opposing alcohol on campus read that "The Student Association which is pushing for this policy change was elected by 3,000 votes. They do not represent the student body, only a voters minority who wanted to drink. It is a rebellious fraction and needs to be seen in that perspective."

Wood said, "This is enough to give you some idea of our thinking. If you are supportive, I encourage you to seek to influence one or all of the following men: Roy Furr, A.J. Kemp, Jr. Clint Formby, and James Snyder."

"These men are 'on the fence' so to speak," Wood said. "We really only need one or two more votes to win this fight."

In conclusion, Wood said, "I personally will publicly stay out of it. Please keep my name quiet, because the University Daily will bring up the 'religion' bit."

"Do what you will now, soon!" he

added. "If you know of alumni who can influence these men, let's get with it. Here is your chance to do much good for our campus, its students and Lubbock in general."

Jaroy Weber, pastor of First Baptist Church, said he was "not familiar with any letter going out," and he doesn't think any students have talked to him about such a letter.

"There's been no church vote made about it," he said, "but I can assure you that generally the feeling of the church would be that they would be against the use of alcoholic beverages wherever it was, not just the Tech campus."

In an earlier interview with The University Daily, Wood said he didn't know whether he would contact any regents on the issue, but he "may."

"I'm not a Tech student or a Tech alumnus," he said. "I think the issue needs to be dealt with on campus by the students and the alumni. The issue is not moral, not religious and has nothing to do with my religious views."

"The issue should not become a religious or a moral issue, but an educational one," he said. "and it needs to be decided on an educational basis."

Register to vote

Students who wish to vote in Lubbock county must register with Lubbock as their permanent address, according to Student President Chuck Campbell.

If a student has already registered in Lubbock County, he said, but has not received a registration card, the student probably needs to register his change of address with the Lubbock County Clerk. Those who are planning to mail their current blue registration cards to the County Clerk's office to change registration to Lubbock County, are reminded to detach the card from the surrounding paper, Campbell said. The cards will not be processed unless detached, he said.

EMS rate hike approved

Lubbockites are paying more for ambulance service today after a rate hike for Emergency Medical Service was approved by the Lubbock City Council Thursday.

The 25-30 percent rate increase for ambulance pickup and emergency medical care was requested by EMS, which blamed the hike on a dramatic increase in operating costs over the past six months.

The basic ambulance pickup rate in the city was \$35 with the approval the charge increases to \$45. Accessory service

charges were increased proportionately.

Dave Butler, an EMS spokesman, told The University Daily Wednesday that EMS operating costs had risen more than 10 percent in the past six months.

In other business, the council approved an amendment to city building codes controlling insulation practices.

In the past few months insulation regulations have raised a furor with city builders and realtors. Building inspection officials here red tagged several new homes because the insulation was not approved by Underwriter's Laboratories or the Federal Housing Administration.

Under federal and state law all insulation must meet certain fire retardance standards before being sold. The city code amendment will accept independent laboratories tests.

The measure was approved on an emergency reading which means it will be effective within two weeks. A red tagged building cannot be sold or occupied under city regulations.

The amendment also requires city permits and bonding for insulation companies.

The council also approved a \$16,500 contract with an architectural firm to design a new two-story central fire station to be located at 18th street and Avenue K. The present central fire station at 6th Street and Avenue K will be used for administration offices and equipment maintenance.

In the council's work session, City Manager Larry Cunningham was asked to prepare an impact study of the city's use of "fiscal notes" over the next five years.

"Fiscal notes," in effect loans to the city, would be used

for unbudgeted expenses or projects. Austin uses a similar plan to take advantage of federal state grants that arise after a city budget has been set.

Canal debates 'hot'

WASHINGTON—The Panama Canal debate escalated Thursday as both Democratic and Republican leaders conceded they aren't likely to make any points with the voters back home, no matter which way they vote.

Relinquishing the Panama Canal "is a killer issue politically," said Senate Minority Leader Howard Baker of Tennessee. From a political standpoint, Baker said, a senator can stay even or lose, "but you can't profit from it."

Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd and Baker, beginning the second day of an emotional, freewheeling debate on the issue, acknowledged that the specter of relinquishing U.S. control over the international waterway is not a popular one with most Americans.

"The American people are opposed to the treaties and I urge my colleagues to get in close contact with the people before casting your votes," Sen. William Scott, R-Va., reminded Byrd.

Byrd responded by saying, "there's no political mileage in voting for the treaties. I know what my constituents are saying. But I have a responsibility not only to follow them but to inform them and lead them...I'm not going to betray my responsibility to my constituents."

"I owe them not only my industry but my judgment.

That's why they send me here," said Byrd, paraphrasing the 18th century British political thinker Edmund Burke.

Byrd was interrupted repeatedly by opponents who challenged him as he recounted a history of the original 1903 treaty giving the United States control of the canal.

They urged Byrd to pay close attention to the voters before casting his ballot for ratification of the Panama agreements, embodied in a pair of treaties before the Senate.

The Panama arguments, carried live by National Public Radio in an unprecedented broadcast of a congressional debate, are expected to last several weeks. Hanging in the balance are the two treaties, which took 14 years to negotiate. One pact would relinquish the canal to the Panamanians by the year 2000 and the other would provide for the continued neutrality of the Canal Zone after that date.

If all 100 senators are present for the vote, it will take 67 of them to ratify the pacts. Thirty-four senators could defeat them.

Turning the tables

Student meeting gives 'credibility' meaning

Objectivity. It is a relatively small word, but in its meaning it carries a lot of weight. To a journalist, as I profess to be, the word carries a much stronger connotation.

As a journalist it is imperative to cover both sides of an issue. I feel The University Daily has done just that in respect to the recent alcohol proposal. I heartily disagree with and resent the statements made by J. Fred Bucy during the Feb. 3 meeting of the board that the UD was not objective in handling the proposal.

Both sides of the issue were covered. The pro and the con factions were presented in an objective manner in order for the students to form their own opinions.

Granted, the editorial page might have reflected some biases, but that is the purpose of the editorial page. It exists to reflect the attitude of not only the students, but of UD staff members as well.

By endorsing Thursday's student meeting, I have removed myself from the ranks of the objective, and I beg your forgiveness. It is hard to sit back and remain objective in an issue in which the rights of the students were so blatantly disregarded. My remarks are carried on the editorial page, and as such are personal opinion. Perhaps during the matter I have suffered a loss of credibility. If so, I regret it. I just can sit by no longer while the Tech Board of Regents is more responsive to the wishes of a religious faction than the desires and interests of the university's own students.

The student meeting in the UC Ballroom demonstrated remarkably strong support of the alcohol proposal. Never before in the history of Texas Tech has such a large turnout appeared in response to what students feel is no longer the issue of alcohol, but the issue of student rights and the right to be heard in an "objective" manner.

The maturity of students present is in itself another noteworthy event. The student or students responsible for defacing one wall of the Administration Building with the words "Bucy Sucks," were not acting in a responsible manner. If you disagree with the regents' action then take it upon yourself to write to the regents personally. Do not take it upon yourself to deface university property. After all, administration support added additional credence to the alcohol proposal.

During Thursday's meeting, flyers were distributed with the mailing address of all nine members of the Tech Board. I encourage you, if you feel strongly on the issue of the rights of students to be heard, to take some time out to use that information.

Avoid, however, the use of name-calling and threats. That will lead nowhere. Take time out to think about what you are saying and frame the correspondence in a constructive manner. Perhaps in the long run it will be worth your while.

The overwhelming number of students who attended will serve to point out one very important factor. It is hoped it will demonstrate to the regents that students are indeed concerned with the course of the university. It is also hoped it will serve to show that students should be given some credence in their opinions.

Tech is considered by many to be a first-class institution. Perhaps that is not really the case. It is doubtful, to paraphrase the words of one Tech professor, that Tech will become a first-class university until it learns to cater to the rights of its own students.

Owens encourages a dream

Jesse Owens, a 1936 Olympic gold medalist, urged members of a small audience in the UC Theater Thursday night to "believe in a dream."

"We all must have dreams," Owens told the audience. "It is not a sin to dream. It is a sin to have never had a dream and never to have had goals to reach."

Owens' speech on the Tech campus was one of the highlights of Black Awareness Month, currently being sponsored by SOBU, the Student Organization for Black Unity.

Owens attended the 1936 Olympic games in Berlin as a member of the United States Olympic team. He set several Olympic records in events such as the 100 and 200 meter dashes and the broad jump. He was also a member of the

winning relay team.

Since the Olympics, Owens has "had the opportunity to work for lots of large corporations. He has been involved with Sears, Roebuck and Co., and the Lincoln-Mercury division of Ford Motor Co. He has also worked for Greyhound and the Atlantic Richfield Co.

Through his association with such corporations, Owens said he has had the opportunity of seeing the companies "become aware of what America is doing for people."

Owens said he has also seen opportunities for black Americans grow in recent years. He said he was personally aware of 24 corporations in the United States with black vice presidents in positions of "great responsibility" for the companies. Each individual is responsible for a "budget of

not less than \$1 million," Owens said.

These people "had dreams that they might be prepared to do the job," Owens said. The next step was to be prepared. Owens suggested ways for Americans to be prepared to fulfill dreams.

He told the audience that many of them were "in an institution of learning. The purpose is to get an education to take into the economic world. You must be prepared for the job ahead."

"America is the greatest nation on earth," Owens said. He credited this with the fact that Americans sought out the fulfillment of their dreams.

"Life is like a relay race," he said. "Every generation has a certain distance to run. This country has become the greatest nation because of young people with ideas of where they want to go."

Owens also talked about his

personal achievements. "I'm no different from anyone else. I had dreams too."

He explained that his track career began in junior high school, and that his coach at that time was one of the people behind his success.

The coach told him that "dreams are like rungs on a ladder."

Rungs represented in the ladder were determination, dedication, self-sacrifices and the attitude one uses to achieve his dreams, Owens said of his coaches advice.

Owens said it was hard work and a belief in God that worked for him in seeing the fulfillment of his dreams.

Following his showing at the 1936 Olympics, he said his dreams did not stop, but expanded and were for the most part realized.

Owens said that through experiences in his life he had found that "blackness is great." He added that men such as Martin Luther King Jr., Whitney Young and Roy Wilkins made him aware of the potentials of black Americans.

In discussing his dreams of the future, Owens said he wants man to keep communication doors open. "Mankind needs to be able to sit around the table of discussion. As long as man is able to talk together, we can build a bridge to the 'brotherhood of man.'"

Suspense, emotion, power combine in 'Julia'

"Julia" is a film replete with suspense, emotion and terror. It chronicles the perilous European life during Nazism's rise to power. The friendship of two intelligent, but distinctly different women is documented. The personality of famed American playwright Lillian

Hellman is exploited and explored, adding insight and background to the movie.

Jane Fonda and Vanessa Redgrave contribute stellar performances as the film's main characters. Fonda is the personification of reality—she has emotions, she has suspicions and, like many literary types, has weaknesses which she often

allows to overtake her.

Julia (Redgrave) is, on the other hand, quiet and reserved. Her introverted personality is typical of her sophistication and intelligence. She has nothing to talk about because her mind is on such an intense level that she can communicate with

only a small number of political activists.

Director Fred Zinneman and screenwriter Alvin Sargent take the viewer on a daring, and often moving trip through the lives of Hellman and her close friend.

The film spans a time period of about 40 years and

Zinneman answers to the demanding call by costuming his stars in realistic period costumes. The costuming is done so well by wardrobe designers Joan Bridge and Annalisa Nasalli Rocca that one hardly notices the time progressions and transitions. Fonda and Redgrave work

well together, much like Shirley MacLaine and Anne Bancroft in "The Turning Point." The relationship between Lillian and Julia is a strong, often tender one (Zinneman's shots hint of a possibly intimate relationship at one time or another). Redgrave portrays Julia as rational and composed during Julia's least pleasant moments, the very same moments which lead to her destruction.

Fonda is more the extrovert. She gets some of the good lines and her lover-teacher relationship with Dash Hammet (played with economy and skill by Jason Robards) is comical and educational. Hellman is vulnerable and Fonda shows this well.

Most of the movie's action takes place in the late 1930s when the Nazis' power and its underground adversary were maturing.

Lillian has been working on a play, but her mind clouds

and her need to "get away from it all" drives her to find her European friend. Lillian's extravagant life is a direct contrast to Julia's wretched and poverty-stricken existence. Lillian must covertly deliver several thousand dollars of Julia's cash to the underground organization so that she may see her friend again.

The meeting occurs, but only for a few moments as the two share bread and wine.

Suspense and intrigue are the name of the game from the time Lillian is approached by Julia's mysterious agent Johann (played with aplomb by Maximilian Schell) to Lillian's climatic meeting with Julia.

One will find that the most effective moments come during the film's mid-section when all the mental and physical action takes place. "Julia" is a film of power

and meaning and director Zinneman cuts no corners in bringing this to his audience. The film should not be missed.

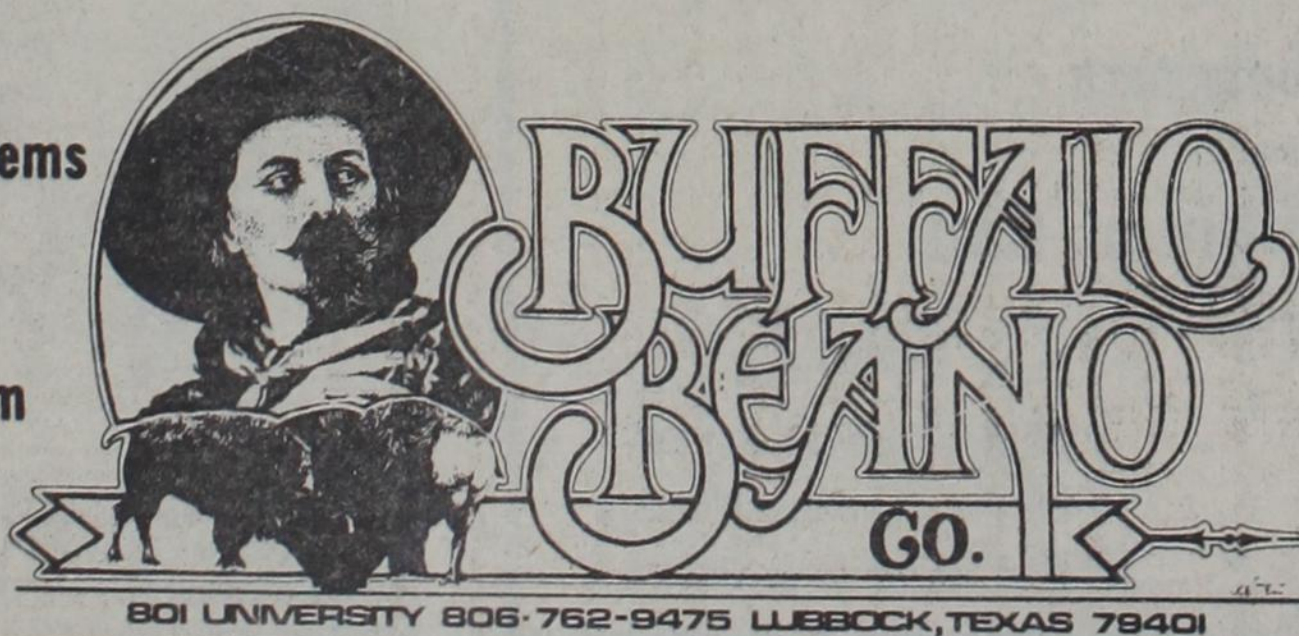

Tech lacrosse team opens against A&M, Bears

Lacrosse, a popular sport back East, will take on a Western flavor this weekend as the Tech lacrosse team travels to College Station Saturday to play the Aggies and then compete against the Baylor Bears Sunday in Waco. Both games are Southwest

Lacrosse Association (SWLA) league games.

Lacrosse, popularly played at schools such as Maryland, Virginia, Penn, John Hopkins and Navy, has been gaining popularity in Texas during the last few years.

Tech's Lacrosse Club was formed in 1975, a year in which some of the Raider players

had never heard of lacrosse.

Phil Marshall, now the lacrosse team adviser, and fellow faculty member Jim Chapman, formed the young club.

"We had starting players who had less than a month's experience," Marshall said.

In 1976, Tech became a member of the SWLA,

recorded a 4-2 record and second place in the college division of the SWLA.

Tech improved its record to 5-2 last season and again garnered second place in the SWLA college division.

The college division of the SWLA includes Tech, Texas, Houston, SMU, Baylor, A&M, Tulane and Louisiana State University.

According to Marshall, defending league champion Texas, along with SMU, should be the league favorites because both teams have experienced lacrosse players from the East.

Texas beat Tech, twice, last year. A&M is a different story. Tech has a 4-0 regular season record against the Aggies.

"We don't know the Aggies' strengths," Marshall said, "but they are always tough." The Raiders have also fared well against Baylor, having never lost to the Bears during a two-year span.

Tech, though, did lose

something from last year: its top two scorers, Roy Jarnagin and Chris Kearby.

However, three returnees have taken over the starting offensive positions for the Raiders.

Steve Gentry, Bill Notturmo and Reed Durant will be the "attackmen," a term used to describe offensive players

who attack the opposing team's defense.

The Raiders will also field an experienced defensive unit, headed by three-year letterman Mark Goska at goalie, returnee Tom Zolnerwich and Bob Whitter. Whitter, who played varsity lacrosse last year at Washington College in

Maryland, will also handle the team's coaching duties.

Last year's coach, John Wilkie, who did not play during 1977 because of knee surgery, is slated to play this

year. Following weeks of seven-day-a-week practices, the Raiders begin their 11-game, one-tournament season Saturday.

Jesse Owens: Track a sport for individual

Track requires discipline effort and endless practice, Olympic legend Jess Owens stressed to the Tech track team Thursday afternoon.

Owens, the star of the 1936 Olympics in Berlin, Ger., was in Lubbock in conjunction with the University Center's Black Awareness Week.

"Track is an individual's sport," Owens said. "It calls for sacrifice because you must discipline your body and muscles. You must train them to do their best. Only you can help yourself."

"Track also teaches you about life. It teaches you to

take criticism for the sake of improvement. You must listen to your coach. He is your camera. You can't see yourself running. Your coach knows what flaws you have and he tells you what is wrong. Listen to him," said Owens.

Owens told team members they must always seek to be better. "If you want a victory, you can get it, but the desire has to be within you," he said. "And once you've won, continue to do better."

"I'm getting old and may sound like a preacher. But what I say is true, I've seen it happen. If you don't practice, if you don't have dedication, then track is not your sport—

turn in your running shorts." Owens recalled his first experiences with track and said, "I was in the junior high and the four fastest boys in our school represented the school at meets. It did not matter what grade you were in. I worked to make that team and I acquired a feeling that I kept all throughout college—the want to run."

Owens was a junior at Ohio State University in 1936 when he went to the Olympics. In 1932 he tried out for the American Olympic team but did not make it. In the 1932 trials, Owens competed against the father of Tech

Track coach, Corky Oglesby. "It gave me a great pleasure to find out that your coach's dad was at those trials. That is the great aspect of track—you gather people of all walks of life. In football, one team is on the other side of the field. In basketball, they are at opposite sides of the courts. But in track, everyone runs on the same track field."

Owens said of the 1936 Olympics and the day he set four world records in track and field, "I had a feeling every track runner has had—the moment of truth, that is knowing this may be the end if you don't win."

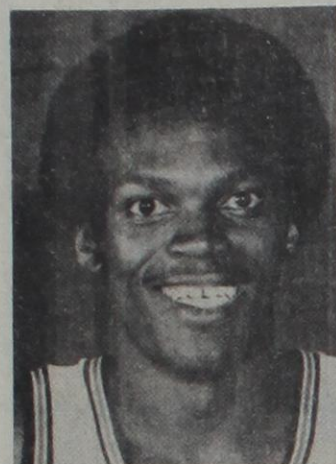

Profile Tommy Parks

Playing defense for offense

Tommy Parks, the 6-0, 160-pound Tech guard, has one thing in common with many old West gunfighters. If you guessed that Parks wears cowboy boots and talks with a western twang then you couldn't be further from the truth.

Parks is so quick he probably could rival the exploits of Billy the Kid, but the Midland junior college

transfer makes his "legend" on the basketball court for the Red Raiders.

"Quickness and ability to penetrate are definitely my strong points," said Parks as he leaned back and listened to the gentle music of his stereo. "I feel that I can offset my opponent's height advantage or shooting ability by outthrusting him."

Parks, who went to high school at Fort Worth Poly, had one of his better games of the season last Saturday against Baylor.

The fiery guard managed to hold Vinnie Johnson, the SWC leading scorer, to a mere 12 points. "I really didn't think about it. I just went out there and tried to hold his point total down just like I would against anybody else. I suppose I did pressure him a little harder because it was Vinnie," said the guard.

Parks started the first 10 games of the season for coach Gerald Myers and averaged 10 points per contest. However,

after the conference games started Parks was moved to a reserve role. Parks isn't hostile about the turn of events. "I'm trying to adjust to it now so when I do go in I'll be ready to play. They're going to need me down the stretch and I'll be ready to go."

The quick guard isn't thinking about next season. "You know everyone is talking about my time going to come and everything, but I'm prepared to help the team this year. Sure, I want to start next year so I can do my thing for an entire 40 minutes. I think I can make something happen when I'm playing consistently."

Anyone who has seen the

Fort Worth native play, knows he sports a very aggressive defense. "When I'm out on the court I try and get it. I play defense for offense," explained Parks. "I try to play defense well, so I can get a steal and generate some offense."

When Parks came to Tech from Midland he brought with him a list of credentials that would fill the biggest of scrapbooks. In high school, Parks was named to the all-district team his junior and senior seasons. His senior year brought all-region honors and he was named to the all-city elite squad.

At Midland, Parks averaged 17.9 points a game and was named to the All-Western

junior college and all-region teams. He also participated in the North-South Texas junior college all-star game and scored 14 points against the best junior college players in the state.

"I came to Tech because the people were real cool, and I feel like Tech offers a better chance for a good education," said the physical education major. "The difference in the style of play is a little slower here at Tech. But, with our players it's a much better offense."

Parks has faced his share of outstanding guards this season including Phil Ford from North Carolina in the Rainbow Classic in Hawaii. "I had to hold Ford, who's

probably one of the best college guards in the nation, and I fared pretty good." Parks ripped the net for 19 points, had eight assists and brought down five rebounds.

Parks credits his start in basketball to his mother. "I've been playing basketball since the fourth or fifth grade, but I really started to concentrate on the game in high school. I played football, but my mother told me to play basketball because you don't get hurt. I don't like those bruises and everything that's associated with football," said Parks with a laugh.

"Our team is playing pretty well right now and we're looking forward to the rest of the season. We play the Aggies

on Saturday and next week we go up against Texas and Houston here," said Parks. "With our home crowds I think we can win both games and be in good shape for the tournament."

"I like the tournament at the end of the year because it gives a team that messes up at

the first of the year a chance to redeem themselves."

Basketball is important to most of the Tech players, but to Parks it is the most important part of his life.

"Right now basketball is probably the most important thing for me."
