From Drink, Dope

Gert Behanna, author of "The Late Liz," and one of the most widely known and widely heard Christian women, will speak at 7:15 Thursday night, Nov. 14, in First Methodist Church auditorium here.

Sponsoring the program of of countywide interest are members of the Mitchell County Ministerial Alliance with the Rev. L. B. Edwards of Westbrook as president, Rev. R. C. Hamilton of Colorado City as secretary.

Mrs. Behanna, who made more than 1,000 talks last year, travels extensively to speak at colleges, seminars, prep schools, jails, mental hospitals, service clubs, high schools, AA meeting and churches.

She is the only woman to speak in the Yale University Chapel and has just returned from Great Britain where she spoke to university students and faculties.

Her famous book, "The Late Liz," is her autobiography written under the name of Elizabeth Burns. In it she tells the story of her life as a millionaire's alcoholic daughter, reared in the Waldorf Astoria in a "too rich" atmosphere.

She married the first man who asked her just to get away from her father. Three marriages, many drinks and many pills later she tried to kill herself. Falling even in suicide she had a dramatic conversion and at the age of 53 became "a resurrected person."

Since that time, 20 years ago, she has given away her money, and resolved that the rest of her life shall be devoted to telling her story that others may be inspired to seek God.

The book, "The Late Liz," has been filmed for television by the Episcopal Radio and TV Foundation. Mrs. Behanna has also made a number of radio

Jail Probated For 8 DWI Felonies

Eight pleas of guilty for felony driving while intoxicated offenses were heard by Judge Austin McClell in 32nd District Court here Friday.

All defendants were placed on probation for jail sentences and fined.

Prosecuting the eight subsequent offense cases was District Attorney Weldon Kirk.

Assessed a penalty of 90 days in jail, Tomie A. Morris, about 60, of Snyder, was placed on probation for two years, and charged court costs of \$45.

Claude Ezra Beeler of Cross Plains received a fine of \$300, after his plea of guilty, court costs of \$45, plus \$10 per month probation fee. Judge McClell placed Beeler on probation for one year after sentencing him to 90 days in jail.

James Omer Steele of Dublin drew 90 days in jail, probated for two years, a \$300 fine, plus court costs of \$45 and probation fee of \$10 per month.

Zemry Vaughn of Colorado City was given a sentence of six months in Mitchell County jail. Denied probation, Vaughn will have to serve his sentence and pay court costs of \$45.

James Edward Nail of Cuthbert Community heard the judge sentence him to 90 days in jail,

then place him on probation for two years. He was also fined \$300, plus court costs of \$45, and probation fee of \$10 each month.

An Odessa man, William A. Stevenson, was placed on probation for one year after a sentence of 90 days in jail, a \$300 fine, court costs of \$45, and the \$10 each month probation fee.

Brigido M. De La Cruz of Lorraine drew a 90 day sentence, probated one year. Judge McClell also fined him \$150, court costs of \$45 and the monthly \$10 probation fee.

Talking Stage Two-County College

Colorado City's steering committee to study the feasibility of a two-county junior college district, Nolan-Mitchell, met with the steering committee in Sweetwater, there, Wednesday night.

Committee, appointed by James F. Kelley, Chamber of Commerce president, is headed by Dr. John H. Chinn as chairman.

Other members are James G. McMath, Henry Bilberry, Manuel Rivera, and Elmer Martin, County Judge.

Dr. John Bowen of Sweetwater heads the Sweetwater steering committee.

1ST FREEZE LIGHT HERE

Colorado City received its first light freeze of the season Saturday for breakfast.

The freezing temperature came on the heels of a surprising snow and rain Friday which dumped .72-inch of moisture on dry soil.

However, the moisture - although bringing needed moisture - added more worries for cotton farmers as cotton harvest was delayed and a prospect for lower grading brought visions of lower market prices for crops.

20,193 For Area Gins

Report from gins in Mitchell County show the 1968 cotton crop about 65 percent harvested, said Bobby Lemons, county agent.

Total number of bales ginned, including China Grove gin total which is at least 50 percent Scurry County cotton, is 20,193. Expected total for Mitchell County cotton is about 30,000 bales, said Lemons.

Gin report follows: Buford Co-Op, 2,018; Gultar at Colorado City, 1580; Producers, 3557; Farmers, 2057; Lorraine Co-Op, 4,866; Gultar at Lorraine, 1,250; Westbrook Planters, 1,492; China Grove, 3,363.

Hoss Dragging Case Appealed

A unique case charging cruelty to a dumb animal has been appealed to County Court.

R. H. Drennan, convicted in Precinct 1 Justice of Peace Court, is the appellant.

He claims he is not guilty and seeks to erase the justice court conviction and a \$50 fine imposed by Justice of Peace Leonard Henderson.

City police filed a complaint against Drennan Oct. 7 in Henderson's court after Joe Orona claimed his horse had been dragged and injured.

Drennan, who said he led the animal off his property at the city's east limits after it had caused damage, was found guilty of unlawful and unnecessary cruelty to the horse by pulling the animal behind his pickup with a rope.

Dr. J. D. Williams, veterinarian, testified the animal had been injured on the legs in the area of hoofs.

W. A. Hillhouse, lineman for Shell Pipe Line Corporation's West Texas Division - Operations Engineering Section in Colorado City, recently observed 25 years of service with the firm.

Hillhouse began his Shell career with Shell Pipe Line in October 1943, as a lineman in St. Louis, Missouri. After one year military leave in the U. S. Navy, Hillhouse returned to Shell as a Maintenance Lineman and Truck Driver in Lebanon, Missouri.

In August, 1947, he assumed the position of District Telephone Maintenance Foreman in Tulsa, Oklahoma. He served in the same capacity in Hobbs, New Mexico, and in Colorado City, where he transferred in 1957. Hillhouse was appointed to his present position as lineman in October, 1963.

Mascots this year are "Jody and Buffy," who play the twins in the television series "Family Affair."

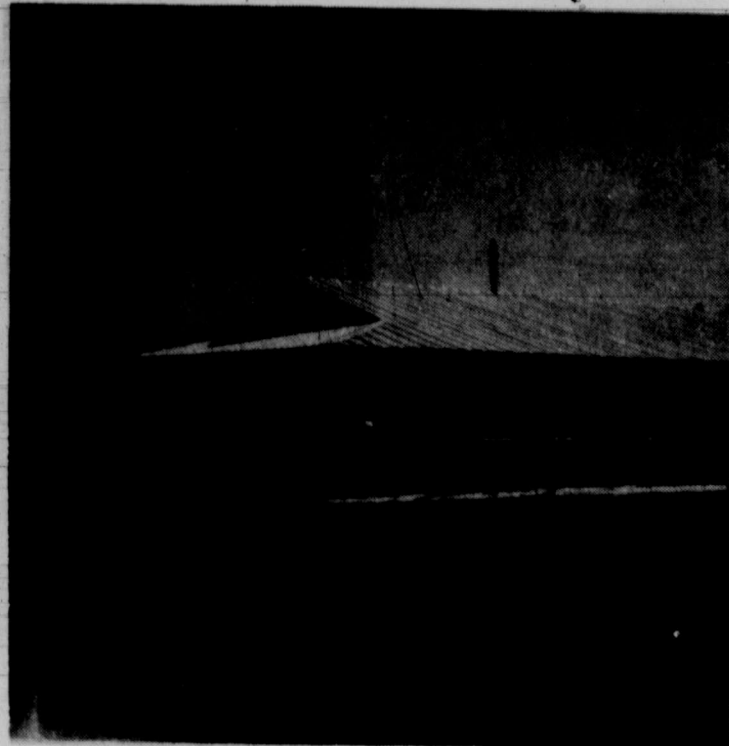

New Fish-a-rama Opens Here Today

Sunday will mark the official opening of a new fish-a-rama on Colorado City Lake.

The new structure, located on the east side of the lake, was purchased by Billy S. Cooper, owner of Cooper's Cove and will be added to his present installations there to double the capacity for indoor, environment-controlled, year-round fishing.

The metal structure measures 42 by 70 feet inside the enclosure with a wide deck around the structure that will accommodate a large number of fishermen.

To mark the opening, managers of Cooper's Cove, Herman and Gracie Cardwell, will offer a grand prize for the largest game fish caught. There will be no admission charges on this

opening day and refreshments will be served guests.

The peculiar feature that sets the new building aside from similar structures is the method of flotation. It is water borne without benefit of conventional pontoon support. Its base provides the buoyancy necessary for flotation and also serves as foundation and floor.

This base, 12-in. in thickness, is manufactured of a special cellular product, developed by Arman Co., Inc. of Midland. This material provides not only the positive buoyancy (60, 1-lbs. per cubic ft.) necessary for floating the structure, but has inherent qualities that make it impervious to action of water, acids, hydrocarbons and solvents. It is non-combustible and is an excellent insulation material.

company experienced higher federal income taxes, higher interest expenses, lower investment tax credit and less interest charged to construction, and negative earnings results from chemical fertilizer operations in the current nine months, James said.

Record total operating revenues of \$169,406,231 for the period ended September 30, 1968 were paced by gas revenues of \$132,380,914, an increase of approximately \$18,000,000 (15.9%) over last year.

Oil revenues increased primarily because of increased production, but the increase was more than offset by a decline in natural gas liquids revenues due to lower sales prices. Chemical fertilizer sales, increased by approximately 40,000 tons in the first nine months, but revenues declined due to substantially lower prices.

Net income for the 12-month period ended September 30, 1968 was \$22,117,201, equivalent to \$1.51 per share, up from \$1.45 per share last year.

James announced that Lone Star has contracted to supply the fuel requirements of an electric generating plant in central Texas. Deliveries of gas will begin in late 1971. The 20-year contract calls for the sale of approximately 500 billion cubic feet of gas.

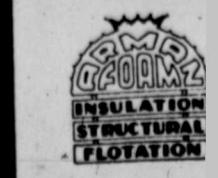

That Virginia Fuller, wife of Raymond, is letting her always short hairdo grow longer?

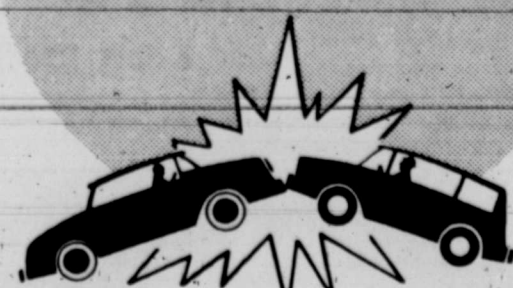
That our Carolyn Howell took a short vacation in New England and plans a holiday in Acapulco, come the Christmas season? She lives and works in Austin.

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Free Shot Program Tuesday and Wednesday

Free shots and follow-up shots in the immunization program for Colorado City children will be given Tuesday evening from 6:30 to 9 p.m. at the College and Dallas St. Church of Christ and again Wednesday at St. Ann's Catholic Church, 6:30 to 9 p.m., according to Mrs. Carl Bell.

Children needing the second or third shot in the three-shot

series for diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus are urged to report at one of the two church immunization centers. Parents of all young or school-age children are again reminded by Mitchell County Medical Association that the public health service is being administered without charge.

Doctors here sponsor and

supervise the program. Vaccine is furnished free by the Texas State Health Department. And registered nurses serve as volunteers to give the shots.

Mrs. Mike Hammans, public school nurse, Mrs. Lindy Merket, Mrs. Bob Pender, and Mrs. Bell will administer the immunization shots or oral dosages. Offered under the program

are the three shots necessary for a child to be safe from diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus.

Measles immunization and polio oral immunization are also given free.

Records of progress of each child are kept for safety's sake, Mrs. Bell said.

Nurses and doctors who sponsor the free shot program plan to continue the one night each month project throughout the year.
