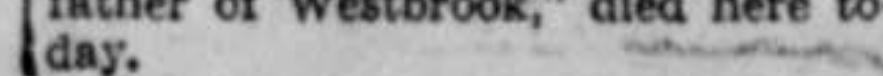

YOUR CHILDREN

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I do not believe that parents as a rule possess the ability to put themselves in their children's place or they certainly would change their tactics in many things, among them public punishment.

If grown-ups only knew how children suffer under public chastisement, not the pain of punishment itself but the agony of shame, I'll lay a good wager there would be less of it—or better still, none.

Something goes wrong—the mother gets mad and takes out her anger or hysteria on the child. Why, I ask you, should our children have to be the eternal safety valves through which we let off steam? One day a little girl getting into an elevator stumbled and fell and cut her lip.

Before she was fairly on her feet her mother caught her and shook her until her teeth rattled. The agony of shame in that little girl's eyes was too much for one passenger at least.

As they got off at an upper floor she stopped and patted the little girl kindly. I've stumbled at that place several times myself.

"Oh, she's always falling," said the mother apologetically. "I get so out of patience."

The other woman did not reply. She would have liked to speak a little piece to that mother, but what would have been the use? Such a mother is a type, and almost incurable.

One day in a top department I saw a little boy pick up a horn and give it a good loud toot.

His mother grabbed the horn and quick as lightning smacked him on the mouth.

He didn't cry but dived across the aisle to where his sister was standing and doubling up his fist gave her a punch in the back. I don't know what psychology was going on in his mind. Either shame or fury—probably both.

But certainly it won't be his fault if he turns out all wrong some day. No matter if a child is really to blame for something, don't scold or punish him in public.

As for striking a child in the face or on the head—that is still another story and a long one.

Deafness Is Aid To Woman Artist

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—A handicap may prove a blessing in disguise. "It's benefit depends upon one's attitude."

"Consider every so-called handicap carefully from every angle of your life, before you bemoan it! You may live to thank your fortune for it."

Wasn't Embittered

This is the optimistic philosophy of an artist who lost her hearing 14 years ago. She was a young girl living in Utica, N. Y., then, dreaming of the day when she would be a sculptor. Instead of becoming bitter over her loss, she packed up her things and came to New York to enter art school.

Today Mrs. Louise Wilder, known for the prizes she has taken with her charming little figures of children from the sidewalks of New York, says of her total deafness: "It has enabled me to carry the peace of the country with me into the hustle of life on the East Side where I work. Artists, in addition to imagination and technical skill, need extreme concentration on their work."

Able to Concentrate

"My deafness has given me more chance than most artists have for this concentration. Being deaf I have learned to work without interruption. I never am distracted by the millions of sounds that drive so many sensitive souls almost crazy. While others must retreat to the country for solitude over so often, I have it where ever I go."

Seeing Mrs. Wilder, one feels the peace there is in her soul, the happiness and total lack of bitterness that is hers.

She and her sculptor-husband work long, pleasant days in their East Side studio, she modeling babies; he, dogs. She laughingly says their natural choice for models fit perfectly. His dog models delight her babies. Her baby models entertain the dogs. To divert both, when they tire of each other, the Wilders keep a small menagerie of white and black pet rats and rabbits.

Many of her best-known baby figures show the interest children have in their surroundings in the studio. Especially is this so of "The Morning Glory Girl," a ten-inch bronze statue of a little girl, sun-bonneted, standing on tiptoe as if to greet the morning, and "Little Faun," an alert little elf-faced lad with diminutive horns and small cloven hoofs.

When Child is Natural

"Even with the children models it has been an advantage not to do much conversation. When I do not talk to them they are much more natural," Mrs. Wilder said.

"I may seem too optimistic to some," she hesitated. "But, after all, one can only look at life through the eyes of her own experience. I feel now after 14 years, that my deafness has never handicapped me in the least. I feel that other so-called handicaps might be turned to advantage, also if folks would refuse to be discouraged by them and realize that through them goals might be obtained that never would otherwise."

steps to neck beauty.

In every case, the first step is cleansing. By using a pasteurized cream for the purpose, you receive double action, for it not only cleanses, but invigorates as well.

Next is nourishing. Select the richest anti-wrinkle cream you can buy and pat it well into the surface. A gentle, downward, throat-grasping movement, as illustrated, is effective in smoothing out the lines. Also a light, caressing, patting movement, with slightly cupped palms, is another good nourishing measure. Stimulating the tissue first with a bleaching chemical stimulant will prove an effective way of quickening the results of your nourishing step.

Lastly, in the morning after cleansing again, massage a good skinfood well into the throat to clear and bleach the skin. Follow this routine regularly, and your neck will testify to its effectiveness.

The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST: Orange juice, cereal, cream, poached eggs on graham toast, extra toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON: Cream of oyster soup, toasted crackers, cabbage, celery, carrot and green pepper salad, nut bread sandwiches, reheated carrot pudding with lemon sauce, milk, tea.

DINNER: Fresh pork shoulder stuffed and roasted, scalloped potatoes, plumpkin winter beets, fruit salad, squash pie, milk, coffee.

If whipped cream is served on a cream soup, don't forget to add a little salt to the cream while whipping. A dash of paprika or light sprinkling of finely minced parsley make attractive garnishings over the top of cream.

Four or five smooth medium-sized beets, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon vinegar or lemon juice, 1 tablespoon grated onion or horseradish, few grains nutmeg.

Cook beets in boiling water until tender. Drain, plunge into cold water and slip off skins. Chop quite finely. Melt butter and stir in remaining ingredients. Add chopped beets, stir and cook for five minutes. Turn into a hot serving dish and serve at once.

Allow plenty of time for cooking winter beets. Two hours at least will be needed.

Tolls Reduction Ordered On Spans Along Red River

Complaints Filed by Highway Commissions of Two States Get Results; War Secretary Orders Cut

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Complaints by the highway commissions of Oklahoma and Texas against excessive tolls charged for passage over the Gainesville Red River Bridge company bridge across the Red river near Gainesville, Texas, has caused the secretary of war to direct a reduction of tolls.

Valuations of Bridges Asked by State Official

AUSTIN, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Assistant Attorney General R. M. Tilley said today that he will wire the secretary of war at Washington for his findings as to valuation of the four private toll bridges spanning the Red river boundary between Oklahoma and Texas, so the two states will know how to proceed with chase of the bridges or construct their own.

Tilley expects later to go to Oklahoma City for a conference with members of the Oklahoma state legal department and highway department.

Five Are Held On Kidnaping Charge

Disappearance of Raymond Horst Brings Arrest Of Four Men and One Woman; Boy Missing

ORRVILLE, O., Jan. 3.—Four men and one woman, members of the same family, are in the county jail at Wooster awaiting grand jury consideration on charges of child stealing in connection with the disappearance a week ago of Melvin Horst, 4, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Horst of Orrville.

Those held are Elias (Ned) Arnold, 55, of Orrville; William Arnold, 30, electrical supply dealer of Akron, his son, Arthur Arnold, Orrville, another son, Mrs. Dorothy McHenry, 27, of Orrville, daughter of the elder Arnold, and her husband, Bascom McHenry.

County Prosecutor Walter Mougey said the warrants charge all five had a part in enticing the small boy from his home late last Thursday, but added the arrests had thrown no further light on whether Melvin is dead or alive.

Six Divorce Suits Are Filed In 1929

Two divorce suits were filed here Thursday, one each in the Seventy-Second and the Ninety-Ninth district courts. These make a total of six divorce suits filed in Lubbock this year.

Running neck and neck with the divorces marriage licenses, too, numbered six, up to Thursday afternoon and since January 1.

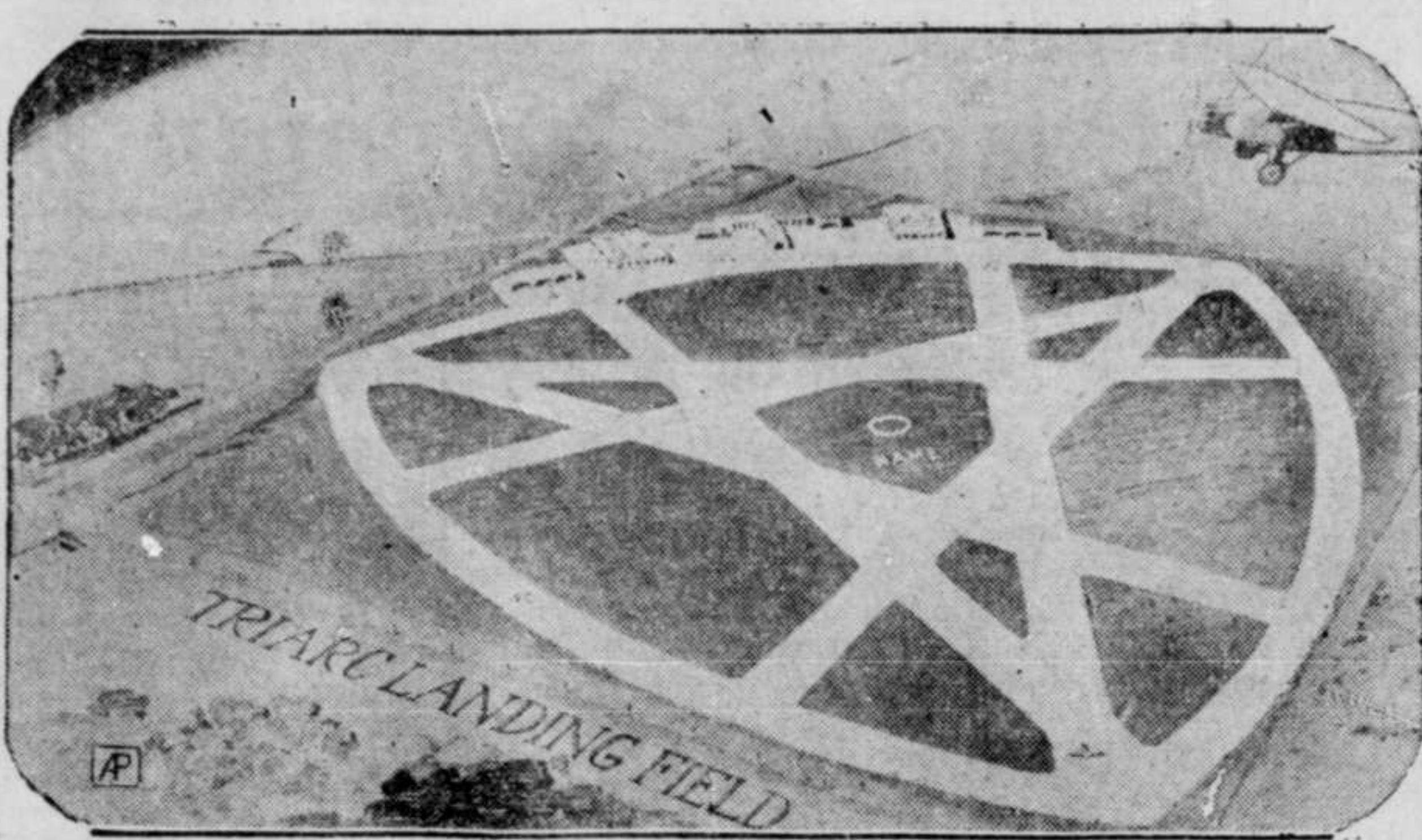

Flood Control To Be Complete In 10 Years, Leader Says

At Present Rate of Progress Work Will Be Finished, Robins Declares; Red and Arkansas Rivers Delayed

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Should the present rate of progress be maintained, the Mississippi flood control project will be completed in ten years, in the opinion of Lieut. Col. T. M. Robins, of the war department.

Testifying before a house appropriations subcommittee, Col. Robins declared that work was progressing rapidly 65 contracts having been let to date for levee work involving total movement of 15,194,500 cubic yards of material.

As for the Aachafalaya floodway, Robins said the government was getting prices on rights of way for levees there as well as prices for which landowners would waive their claims for flowage rights in the floor of the basin.

Plan Additional Work
In addition, surveys of the Mississippi river's tributaries authorized at the last session of congress have progressed to the point where army engineers believe it will be possible to recommend to the next session flood control projects for the St. Francis and White rivers in Arkansas and Missouri.

"For the Arkansas and Red river however," he continued, "the situation is somewhat different. The drainage basins of these streams are widespread, including parts of the states of Colorado, New Mexico, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Missouri, Arkansas and Louisiana. Extensive information in this great area is incomplete and the extensive investigations and surveys which must be carried out will necessarily require considerable time. The same condition exists to an even greater extent in the area drained by the Missouri."

CONSIDER APPLICATION

Motor Bus Merger To Be Up On January 8 In Austin

AUSTIN, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Application of the Missouri Pacific transportation company to purchase three Rio Grande Valley motor bus runs operated by the Black Diamond Bus company, will be heard here the afternoon of January 8, Mark Marshall, motor bus transportation chief of the state railroad commission, said today.

The runs are Brownsville to Mission, San Benito to Rio Hondo and Brownsville to Port Isabel.

Wage Phone War Booths Closed Due To New Rate

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—(AP)—"Buy a shoe," didn't mean much in Chicago today. Most of the telephone booths in hotels, drug stores and other places were closed to the public because of contract differences between the owners and the Illinois Bell Telephone company.

Old contracts between the phone company and the hotels and business places, which had been in effect 30 years, provided for a guarantee of four phone calls a day on each telephone, dividing the fees for all over that guarantee equally between the company and the subscribers.

New contracts, against which the subscribers now are in revolt, eliminate the guarantee and provide that the company shall take 77 1-2 cents out of every dollar, with 22 1-2 cents for the subscriber.

Hotel and drugstore owners, having many booths, declare this represents a great loss of revenue. Smaller subscribers, however, who formerly received only 20 percent of the receipts above the guarantee, will benefit.

J. K. Blatchford, secretary of the Chicago Hotel association, said no public telephone service will be provided in the 30 hotels represented in the organization until a settlement is reached.

Snyder Signs To Boss Houston Buffaloes Next Season

Babe Ruth Starts Preparations For 1929 Baseball Campaign Determined

Swat King Avers He Has Plenty Of Baseball to Play

Bambino Laughs at Rumor That He Is Through With Baseball; Feels More Like Kid Than Ever

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—"Wham!" The little rubber hand-ball, propelled by the swinging southpaw of a big man with a bigger waistline, smacked the end of the court and streaked back.

"Wham!" perspiration streamed down his face as he lunged for a boy's one.

"Think I'm getting too old, hey? or too fat and slow? Watch that one."

"Wham!" another point for the big fellow.

That's a cross-section of the way Babe Ruth started off the new year today with his first workout in preparation for the 1929 baseball campaign. It is the earliest he has begun any systematic training since 1926, when he made the big come-back.

It was apparent that Ruth already is close to playing condition. He weighed 234 1/2 pounds. That is 15 pounds from his best playing weight, but low enough to testify that his gold and hunting have helped keep him in condition. The waist-line, is ample but not unusual.

Between vicious swipes at the hand-ball and growls at the trainer massaging his thigh, Ruth grew a bit indignant.

"Did you see that piece in the papers about me fattening up to 250 pounds, being about through and that this would be my last year? That's hot stuff. And a fine lot of bunk."

"Say, I feel more like a kid than ever. I'm not getting any younger but I will only be 35 next Monday and I've got a lot of baseball left."

Ruth doesn't think much of the ten-man team proposal under which an extra man would bat for the pitcher, although it has been suggested that such an innovation could give the Babe almost a lifetime job.

"That would take a real scientific feature away from the game, I think, and spoil a lot of strategy," said Ruth.

"It would make it too tough for the opposing pitchers. He's entitled to at least one break in the line-up with a regular hitter in there, he would never get a soft spot."

Dempsey Comeback Is Almost Certain

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 3. (AP)—The Tennesseean tomorrow will say that Jack Dempsey, in an interview today, announced it was almost certain that he would attempt to regain the world's heavyweight title which he held from July 1919, when he defeated Jess Willard, until he lost it to Gene Tunney in Philadelphia in 1926.

Strolling Down Sports Lane

The ever-debatable question of the new historic "long count" which enabled Gene Tunney to retain the heavyweight championship of the world in his last fight with Jack Dempsey at Chicago, has been brought up again by Dave Barry, the referee of that battle of the century. The story now is just as confusing as ever. Barry now comes out with an explanation that is interesting as well as odd.

Among other things, Barry says that he counted 10 over Tunney. Sounds peculiar, does it not? He says that as he shouted 10, Tunney was up. Coming from a man as experienced in the game as Barry, this statement assumes amazing proportions. As we understand it, it isn't customary for a referee to shout "ten" after a fallen boxer has reached his feet. From all indications, however, Barry's tactics in that bout were unusual in more ways than one.

Hundreds of newspaper men at the ringside, all experienced at the fight racket as well as moving pictures of the fight have failed to reach any definite decision as to the real truth of the matter. Robert Edgren, one of the foremost boxing experts in the country has taken the side of Dempsey, as has the majority of the close observers.

"Sitting with three feet of where Tunney reclined listening to the latter part of the long count, it was my impression that Barry counted nine and then stopped counting and waited for Tunney to get up, as Gene hadn't moved at 'nine'. I didn't hear him shout ten. Barry's statement that Dempsey attempted to stand over Tunney while he was down isn't backed by moving pictures, a permanent record of what might be overlooked in the excitement of a startling finish. The picture shows that Dempsey went to his own corner immediately and leaned back on the ropes, in no position to 'slap' a fallen boxer who was on the floor midway across that side of the ring, although not in the 'farthest corner' according to Illinois rules.

This question will probably never be settled to the satisfaction of both sides, but it is interesting to note the observations of one like Mr. Edgren who was within a few feet of the fallen Tunney, watching every move through the eyes of an expert. There will always be people who will believe that Tunney won fairly and squarely, and on the other hand there will likely be a larger number who will always hold that Dempsey won squarely and sensationally in an uphill fight and was beaten out of a world's championship either by blunder or connivance.

And Tavener finally delivered. The last few weeks of the campaign he played almost perfect ball. To following year he played the full season at short, despite the fact that he boosted his batting average only 20 points—this on a team known always for its offensive strength.

Well, the Cleveland Indians thought enough of his fielding to trade the veteran pitcher George Uhle (who may have three or four good years of pitching hidden in his system) for the diminutive infielder and an in and out pitcher, Hallaway.

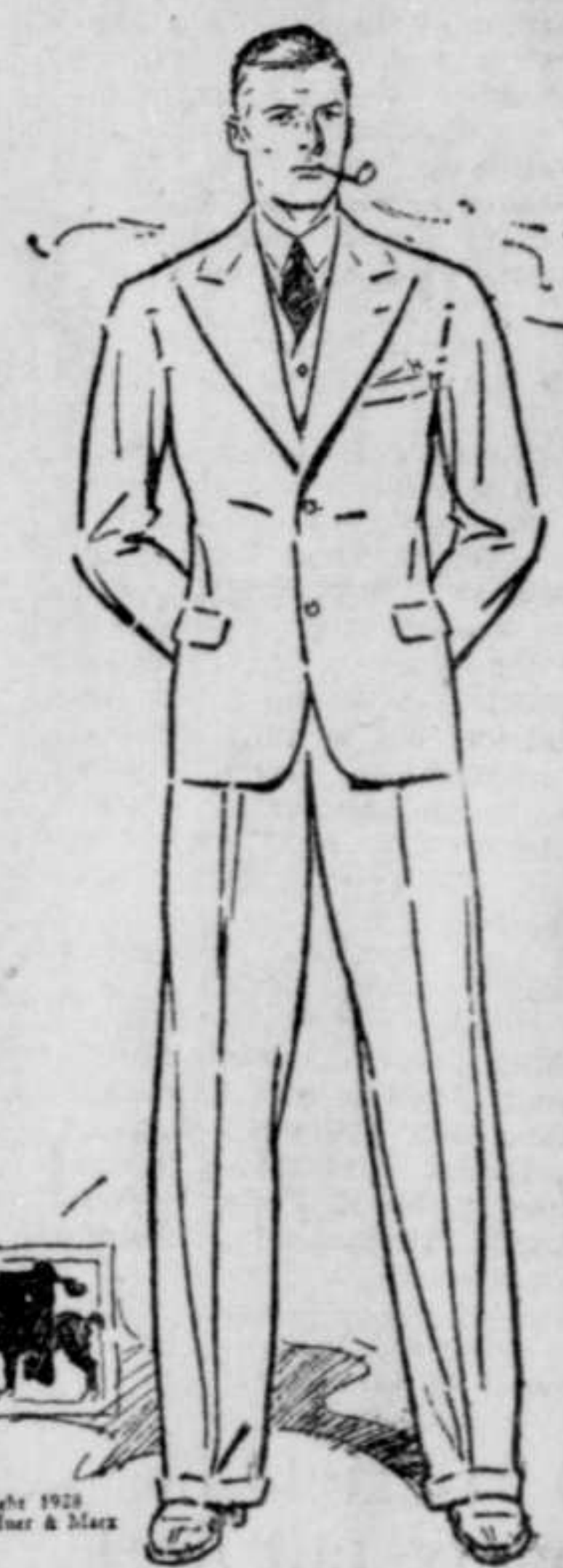

It was said that the 72-year-old leader naturally would consider that the whole work of his life was threatened.

But to those who do not, it is money that some one owes to another and has not paid, and cannot get the guilt of their conscience till restitution is made payable in advance. We have heard of many cases of this kind, but none had ever come before our eyes as this one did. The merchant stated that it was the first case he had ever experienced, however, others have occasionally been presented with letters and money to pay for articles lifted from the stores. It is a great lesson that everyone should learn that honesty is the best policy, and one cannot feel perfectly at ease unless they can face the world and their God as the pages of the ledger of life are checked over and the necessary credits to make it balance, with a good reserve of good deeds on hand.

She told the driver that he was under the age limit for charging and got by with it, as the youngest was small and young looking, but before he woman and the boy left the bus, we heard the boy tell the party next to him that his grandmother had told him to tell the bus man that he was only a certain age, if he should happen to ask him, in order to save a possible two dollar bus fare at half price. This was a fearful example to set before the young fellow and it will probably get one hundred times as many as it may be that it will be the cause for his success in breaking into the state or federal penitentiary, who can tell? It will no doubt be necessary for him to repent of the sin before he can make peace with his God. It's a poor way to raise a child, and such people as that payment is made through those who are trying to live right, and do the honest thing throughout their lives to tread along and live the honest life that they want to.

THE BURDEN OF MANY GOVERNMENTS

Chicago Daily News: Some city and county officials declare that the present situation in this community is breaking down. The declaration has so long an element of truth that it deserves the serious attention of the public.

The technical decision of the Illinois Supreme Court in the real estate revolution case, the serious plight of the Chicago school system, the thousands of suits brought by taxpayers who have challenged the courts the validity of the assessments, the heavy deficits in property and the heavy deficits in several city funds combine to threaten a desperate state of confusion. Manifestly a concerted effort must be made to bring decent order out of the disheartening chaos.

The taxpayers of the community are in rebellion, and rightly so, against waste, hopeless inefficiency and corruption in government. Constructive thinking and comprehensive planning are essential if the present situation is to be met.

There are two primary sources of waste in local government—incompetence, negligence and spoils in the several taxing bodies, and wanton multiplication of such bodies. The city, the sanitary district and other tax-eating agencies have furnished proof lately of the crippling cost of political extravagance. Just now an effort is being made by the finance committee of the City Council to apply the pruning knife wisely and yet unmercifully to the departmental estimates in order that overappropriations in the budget for the coming year may be avoided.

An efficiency bureau is engaged in surveying the school system, and in due time, doubtless, it will recommend various economies. The sanitary district is pledged to adopt a merit system of appointments, to the end that it may be deprived of facilities for squandering tax money on incompetent employees and padded pay rolls.

Unfortunately, honest application of the principles of efficiency and economy alone would not suffice—great as would be the ensuing benefits—to solve the menacing problems facing the community. What the situation requires is a thorough reorganization of local government, the gradual consolidation of scores of hundreds of parasitic taxing units in the neighborhood of 425 taxing governments within the county, and each of them is piling more and more burdens upon the property owners.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK
KANSAS CITY, Jan. 2. (AP)—(U. S. D. A.)—Cattle trade around the 11-market circuit was somewhat spotted due to the uneven distribution of receipts; most points had normal supplies and reported further declines on the in-between grades of weighty steers; yearlings were in broad demand at most markets with prices firm; Kansas City, with limited receipts had a fairly active steer and yearling trade at strong to 25c higher values; slaughter cows were unevenly steady to 25c lower but packers continued to show an active interest in desirable light weight heifers; aggregate receipts were estimated at 29,000 an increase of 7,700 over last Thursday

but 10,500 short of a year ago. Hogs were tendered another decline of 10 to 30c; packers, bearish at most centers and shaving prices 20 to 30c; the days' extreme top of 9.15 was paid at St. Louis; total offerings were around 130,000 as compared with 128,527 a week ago and 178,263 the same day last year.

No material price changes were registered on fat lambs; the early undertone at a few points was weak; but closing trade rules active at firm values; aged stock was steady to slightly higher; choice while best native lambs at St. Louis lambs in Chicago stopped at 16.25; realized 15.50; the supply approximated 44,000 a decrease of 2,500 from a week ago and 5,000 more than a year ago.

NEW YORK STOCKS
NEW YORK, Jan. 3. (AP)—Anti-liquidation of the huge increase in federal reserve brokers loans was an incentive to heavy profit taking on today's stock market. After the sobering effects of the drastic reaction of early December, many traders were inclined to view with misgivings the beginning of the new year with the establishment of new high records.

Although the slackening of the year-end credit squeeze definitely appeared, with a drop in the call loan rate to 7 per cent for the first time since before Christmas, the view was taken in many circles that the market was growing too heavy. Fear that the federal reserve bank, with brokers loans again mounting, might act to stem the flow of credit into stock speculation, now that the holiday requirements for funds have been met, also prompted selling.

The market opened with a brilliant display of activity and strength, but the ticker began to fall far behind trading, and without late information as to trends on the floor and uncertain of their position, traders lost confidence. The volume of trading fell off on the decline, and as the ticker began to catch up with the market in the afternoon, pools staged a rally which reduced some of the losses. Total sales were about 5,089,000 shares.

The increase of \$238,676,000 in federal reserve brokers loans, announced after the close, was even larger than had been expected, wiping out, as it did, about three-fourths of the declines of the past three weeks. The completion disclosed that the loans "for others" decreased about \$156,000,000 as corporations and foreign banks withdrew funds to meet the year end requirements, but that the New York banks more than offset this and a minor reduction in the account for out of town banks by putting more than \$500,000,000 into the market.

The increase over Nov. 30 to \$48,000,000 in the total of brokers loans as of Dec. 31, as reported by the New York Stock Exchange, was a disheartening development, as it established a new high record of nearly \$5,449,000,000.

The reserve bank announced an increase of 1-4 of one per cent in the buying rate for 90-day bankers' acceptances in an effort to provide a better market for this form of commercial credit.

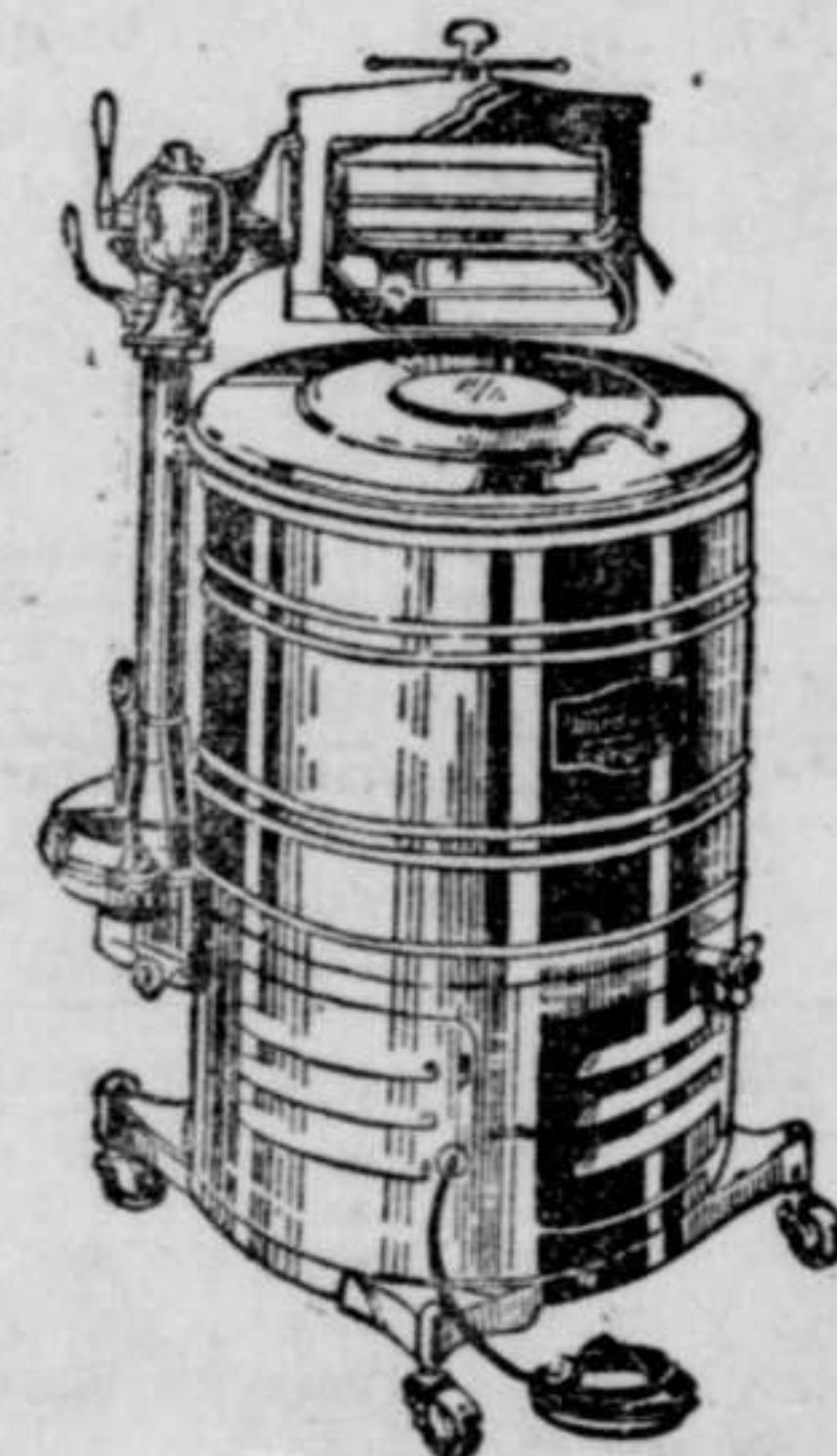

Judge Nordyke Explains Notations On Order For Road Bonds Election

(Continued From Page 1)

mission.

"Quoting from letter R. S. Sterling, state highway commissioner and chairman of the commission, of April 5th, 1928. 'You are quite familiar with the agreement made with the two factions and that was at our own time we would send a disinterested engineer to make this location. We sent Mr. R. A. Thompson, the then highway engineer, who located the route which we adopted.'

"Quoting from letter Judge W. R. Ely, highway commissioner, of May 14th, 1928.

"In regard to the location of Highway No. 53, from Lubbock to Idalou, you are respectfully advised that you or your court had nothing whatever to do with it. It was agreed by and between the commission and the citizens' committee appearing before the commission that the matter would be left to the report of a disinterested engineer. Mr. R. A. Thompson went over the situation carefully and recommended the location. Recently Mr. Sterling and myself went over the route recommended by Mr. Thompson. It was our judgment that Mr. Thompson was eminently correct."

Quotes Cone Johnson

"Quoting from a letter from Mr. Cone Johnson, member highway commission of date 4-12-28.

"There were no private hearings; both sides were given a hearing. Your suggestion, the commission spent much time on the matter, and with the engineer visited Lubbock and looked over the situation. The state engineer recommended the route which was finally accepted as the best and most practicable."

"Quoting from a letter from Mr. G. B. Gilchrist, state highway engineer of October 10th, 1928, containing two telegrams one from me to him and his answer.

"Your telegram reading as follows received:

"When Lubbock county tenders state 100 feet right of way on Highway 53 from Lubbock to Idalou will you accept same and at once take over and maintain said highway from Lubbock to Idalou, Answer:

"To which we replied as follows: 'We expect to begin maintenance new routing Highway 53 into Lubbock when right of way from Lubbock to Idalou is secured but will expect county to secure for us additional right of way from Idalou to county line as outlined previously.'

"We will not let the right of way situation from Idalou to the county line deter us from taking over the route into Lubbock. Just as soon as you assure us that the right of way has been secured and Mr. Field can get the grade in shape to turn traffic over it, we will maintain that route."

Gib Gilchrist, State Highway Engineer.

Quotes Petition

"All the foregoing letters were addressed to me while I was county judge, dated the dates given in each.

"Quoting from the petition signed by the tax payers of Lubbock county, for a bond election, on which petition the One Million Dollar bond Election was ordered and which will be voted on January 12th, 1929.

"We further pray your Honorable court that the proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds to the extent of \$978,000.00 if necessary, be expended in the construction, maintenance, and operation of paved roads and highways, or in aid thereof, in Lubbock county, as hereafter designated, in accordance with the amount set opposite each of the following sections or units of road construction, or so much of said amount as may be necessary, to-wit:

Here follows the different roads which I will not include for the sake of space.

"Route Was Designated."

"Now, this paragraph, in the petition bound the construction of roads and highways as are 'Now Designated.' Where is 53 designated? If language means anything, and the speakers be honest, there is no question but that 53 is located down the railroad to intersect with No. 9, north of Lubbock about 1.5 miles. Here is the order of the commissioners' court of Lubbock county ordering the bond election, as it relates to that particular part of 53 from Idalou to Lubbock. 'Texas State Highway No. 53 via Idalou on S. side and adjacent to Crosbyton Branch P. & F. R. R. Co. to intersect No. 9, North of Lubbock, Lubbock and Wolfarth.'

"The clause 'or may hereafter be designated' was put in the petition and the bond order to take care of the situation on the Levelevland road, which is only a conditional designation and not permanent, and the possibility of the designation of the Idalou-Becton road, which is not even conditionally designated at this time.

"Bear in mind the commissioners' courts' order for the bond election is not the petition for the election, but is an order for the election. And shall conform to the petition.

"The petition called for roads as are Now Designated. Did the courts' order change the location of 53? I say it did not. It merely clarified it, or said where 53 was located as given by the State Highway Commission. But why give the detailed designation of 53? For the same reason that this article is being written and published. It seems that some people think there is still a doubt as to the location of this highway, and this question is before the people. The commissioners' court felt it was

nothing but fair, right, and that every body was entitled to know the facts. And knowing the facts, they would have no complaint to make after the votes were counted. If the people want to defeat the bond issue because the state highway department has located 53 at where it is, it is so they could cast their vote accordingly. The commissioners' court wanted to act not only fairly but above board and does not want a man or woman to cast his or her vote under a misguided conception. We felt for I was a part of them, that that nothing but a frank statement of the true facts would be desired. I am honestly with the voters of Lubbock county, and that to leave this question unstated would be dealing, with some at least, in a way that was not fully explained.

"Quality Defined by State

"As to the quality, or kind of roads that will be built. This is a matter that lies wholly with the discretion of the state highway commission and the federal department.

"It is the policy of the state highway department never to specify or state just what class of road that will be built; that is whether it shall be concrete, asphalt, gravel, or other kind of road. They call for bids on a number of kinds of road. The value of this is obvious, entering the open market for bidders on all classes, bidders, or materialmen not knowing what class of road will be built, the commission can and will get better bids saving money for the state and county as well, than if they were to advertise for bids for only one kind of road. For this reason it is not only unlawful, but would be an infringement on the right of the highway commission for the commissioners' court to specifically name the kind of road that was going to be built, and for this reason our commissioners' court did not so name the kind of road to be built and why they are going to continue to refuse to attempt to name the road to be built.

"Highway No. 7 from Lubbock to Slaton is already built with the dirt and drainage of this is to be surface this road. The highway from Lubbock to Levelevland is not yet under state control and maintenance. The road from Idalou to Becton is only a talk-of proposition.

"Then there is the state wide bond issue being talked of and no one knows what it will amount to. This one thing is sure in the minds of all people well informed on the highway situation and that is, there is going to be some other way worked out other than the way it is now being financed.

"With all these things confronting the court, they felt that a bond issue for \$1,000,000.00 was ample to pave every mile of Lubbock county's state and federal designated highways, even with concrete and have a considerable surplus left, that in the event the Idalou to Becton road was established it could be built, with very little, if any additional money even though we had, at that time, to continue financing road building under the present system.

"If the bond issue for state-wide bonds, carries, and either that or some other way will be worked out before we get our roads built, it will be long before we will have spent all our million dollars on our roads. And when that event happens, the state will take over, immediately, all highway construction under the new system of financing. Then we will not need the money, and will not have to issue the million dollars worth of bonds.

"Other Funds Discussed"

"But should all proposed financing systems fail to happen, and all the roads named be built, and we have almost, if not quite, sufficient money to do it, and in the event of falling short, by that time the added money received by the county from the increased returns from automobile registration will be considerable, and there is a real possibility that the commissioners' court would be able, even without any additional bond issue, to finance this out of their money, this bond issue would not be needed for from three to five years, and these new roads, if they are ever established, would be easily passed.

"The Court acted with the sincerest of honesty, and I am persuaded they acted very wisely. These men have been elected by the honest vote of the citizens of Lubbock County, and it was because they were considered honest, just and faithful men; they feel the obligation keenly and whatever criticisms, taunts, accusations that may come, they have too much manhood to allow the unkind words from the misguided or those who are not misguided betray them into being traitors to themselves or unfaithful to the citizens of Lubbock County and the trust that has been committed to them. Their first concern is the welfare of Lubbock County, and that every individual citizen in the County has his interests served fairly, honestly and equitably. Private individuals may have private or individual interests to see after, and where these take them to the Commissioners' Court, and he does not get them all served as he thinks his interest demands, certainly he can see it only from the private and individual standpoint, while at all times the Court is being guided from its country-wide obligation, and I am sure a diligent and fair scrutiny and criticism of all the actions of the Commissioners' Court of Lubbock County will reveal only honest, faithful and impartial service to Lubbock County as a whole, and untainted with any selfish motive or underhanded design.

"My last appeal: Citizens of Lubbock County, know your Commissioners' Court, work with them, understand them, divine their motives, feel their heart beats, then this assurance is mine: YOU WILL NEVER doubt their honesty, and they will select your honest judgment will disagree with them."

TEXARKANA, Jan. 3. (AP)—An epidemic of a mild form of influenza has attacked Texarkana and vicinity, reports today indicating at least 500 cases in the city proper.

Mexico City Has 90 Per Cent of Children Ill

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 3. (AP)—A dispatch to El Universal today from Monterey stated that there were 25,000 cases of la grippe in the city, that 90 percent of the school children were ill and that schools, theaters and all other public meeting places had been closed.

Dr. M. D. Veldee Is Called Into Flu Situation Study

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3. (AP)—Preparations for a nationwide study of the influenza epidemic were accelerated today with the arrival of Dr. M. D. Veldee, of the Public Health Service, formerly in charge of typhoid investigations in Cincinnati.

Dr. Veldee was called here by Surgeon General Cummings. He conferred with officials and began preliminary studies of telegraphic reports on conditions over the country.

Complete reports from 42 states, the District of Columbia and New York City today showed a total of 162,288 new cases actually reported during the week ending December 29, compared with 252,016 new cases in about the same territory during the preceding week. Officials believe this decrease in the complete reports bore out their prediction that the crest of the influenza wave had passed over western and midwestern states during the holidays.

Jess Levens Is Secretary To Senator Parrish

Jess C. Levens, Lubbock attorney, who served as secretary of the South Plains Democratic club during the recent presidential campaign, will be secretary to Senator Parrish during the session of the state legislature, which opens at Austin next Monday.

dreds of thousands of dollars in profits that are being made daily off of this—that when we think of the need of our public schools, of Texas Technological college, of every other state institution, and of our highways, it seems logical that Texas should be getting a small share of all this waste.

Dollar Tax Hinted

"And I do not believe the \$1 tax paid on malt extract would in a very big manner lessen the sale of it."

Senator Parrish did think, however, that the sale could be lessened by making it necessary that every purchaser of malt extract sign an affidavit to the effect the extract was to be used only for legal purposes, with a felony offense waiting for all who swear falsely.

To substantiate his contention that enough trading in malt extract is being done to bring a million dollars in tax revenue to the state treasury, the Senator explained that he has been informed from reliable sources that during the year 1927 there were five carloads of malt extract sold at wholesale in the city of Lubbock.

Each car there are 5,000 cans of extract. That's 25,000 cans of it delivered to the home brewers in Lubbock during that year.

Can Make Five Gallons

One can of malt makes five gallons of homebrew. Therefore, there were 125,000 gallons of beer made and consumed here in a year. As eight pints make a gallon, this represents 1,000,000 bottle of beer. Selling at 25 cents a bottle, you can figure the answer of a year's volume of such business in Lubbock.

Figuring that the cost of the malt of sugar and yeast, of the bottles and caps and bottle capper, all combined total \$2.50, Senator Parrish calls attention to the price of sale netting the maker of homebrew \$8.00 on each can of the stuff.

Has Ample Margin

"He's got ample margin of profit to pay another dollar on each can as taxes to the state, and can continue to sell it at the present price, making only \$7.00 on each can."

If you should happen to think Senator Parrish's figures are somewhat high, (he thinks they are low) for the sake of looking at the possibilities of such a bill, why not take the average of one carload of malt extract being sold each year in every county in the state.

There are 254 Texas counties. With 5,000 cans to each car, we have 1,270,000 cans sold in Texas. At five gallons of beer from each can, there's 6,350,000 gallons of beer brewed in the barn or home or shed or woods or swamps or grass or behind the haystack every year.

Pints to the gallon still are eight, he believes. Multiplication gives us the appalling sum of 50,800,000 bottles of homebrew.

At two-bits a bottle, that's \$12,700,000.

Yeh, it looks possible for Texas to have another million dollar a year crop—in taxes—from an even \$1 tax on every can of malt extract sold at retail.

Highways to Be Headliner

In speaking of other bills expected to come before the legislature, Senator Parrish stated the proposed \$350,000,000 state-wide road bond issue, which is mostly occupied by the law-maker's time, and said he did not believe the proposal would be voted by the people of the state.

"I do think the legislature should carefully work out a plan of state highway building that would be workable, in case the bond issue project should not carry," he declared.

He was optimistic of success for Texas Technological college applying for a bond issue in sufficient amounts to take care of the school's present and immediate future needs with additions in equipment, teachers, buildings, etc., and that the \$15,000 or so asked for a printing plant at the school would be forthcoming. The necessary amount to carry on the summer school will also be appropriated at this session, he said.

Among the bills coming up is to be a bill to regulate the legal operation of theaters on Sundays, the Senator said, and intimated that he would be favorable to a bill permitting picture shows to run on Sundays.

Senator Parrish will leave some time today for Austin, to be in readiness for inauguration ceremonies, induction into his own office, and opening of the legislature's session next Monday.
