Scrap Metal Drive Launched In County To Aid War Effort

Another scrap metal drive has been launched recently, under the leadership of W. T. Meeks of Welch, the local salvage chairman.

The importance of scrap metal in the production of steel, and consequently, in the production of war equipment, cannot be over-emphasized. A shortage of scrap iron and steel at the mills could jeopardize our entire war program.

As you know, such a shortage threatened last year. Some furnaces were compelled to shut down for lack of scrap, and the inventories of other mills were dangerously low. The country was asked to go all-out on a scrap collection campaign, and they did a magnificent job. The necessary scrap metal was gathered in every community, and the steel mills were able to meet their increased production schedules.

The Texas Salvage Committee needs your help again. The steel mills have on hand only about two months' supply of scrap. That is not a safe margin, particularly in view of the fact that scrap shipments normally decline sharply during the winter months.

The War Production Board has launched a new campaign to build up a "Victory Scrap Bank" in each community. This program aims at creating a stockpile of scrap iron and steel to fill immediate and future needs for new steel production.

Scrap metal is, of course, less plentiful because of past collections. Therefore, it is necessary to emphasize the urgency of this program, the imperative need to stockpile every available piece of scrap in a "bank" to be drawn upon as needed by the steel mills. The community scrap pile is the "blood bank" of war industry—it will bring about tons of guns, tanks, ships and planes.

Citizens are urged to cooperate in this scrap drive and to take one more step in helping the war effort.

Shortage of Book 4; Others To Be Issued Later

Superintendent V. Z. Rogers announced Saturday that 9,232 Ration Books 4 were issued at the local gymnasium throughout the 3 day rationing period. Approximately 1,000 more books were issued this time than previously.

The Lamesa group received 9,250 books, and 18 were voided because of errors. The issuing of the books ceased at 11 o'clock Saturday because of the shortage of book 4. There were 944 unfiled applications.

Other reports on the issuing of Book 4 throughout the county are incomplete.

The people who failed to obtain their Ration Book 4 will be issued their books at a later date which will be announced later to the public.

At the meeting a program of planning to meet municipal post-war problems was presented. Sessions were held to discuss what is being done and what ought to be done by the cities and towns of Texas in planning now for the Post-Victory period and for the years following.

Topics relative to general law in smaller cities, and state highway plans were heard and discussed. The sessions were devoted to the discussion of management and general city problems. Many city managers from Texas presented discussions.

This annual conference had the best attendance that they have had at such a meeting in the last few years.

The National War Fund is the American direct approach to the support of the numerous war services and war relief agencies of these times. It is the first unified program of the sort ever carried out in the United States and grew out of the need of the American Public for one single war appeal for all purposes. It is designed to speed Victory and to save lives by providing the American people with an opportunity to contribute just once a year in one campaign to meet the needs of our Allies, our men in the fighting forces, and our own local health and welfare agencies. It meets the obvious necessity of conserving manpower and the urgent need for unity and singleness of purpose in time of war.

Texas has been divided into 21 regions to raise the goal of nearly \$5,000,000 which the state has accepted as its portion of the National War Fund. Regional chairmen have been appointed to direct the program in each of these big areas, and in addition, a competent, full-time regional field representative has been assigned to aid in carrying out the work under the direction of the Regional chairman. From this basis, county and community organizations have been set up.

The dollars we give will be working, fighting dollars. They will go toward strengthening the USO and its splendid program for our armed forces. These dollars will fight through our allies — through the United China Appeal, Russian War Relief and the British War Relief Society. These dollars will fight for the oppressed and imprisoned people of the occupied countries, for the hounded and oppressed—adults and children — who have been compelled to flee the Axis and occupied countries.

The responsibility of this state is to take a Texan's share, the most generous share that we are able to take.

Fire Program To Be Presented At District Meet Soon

Jimmie Little and Velda King have concluded their fire prevention work with an excellent record. During the period when fire prevention was stressed, the students gave programs to the Lions Club, to 6 different schools, including 2 schools at Lamesa, the Key School, Ackerly School, Dawson School, and the Klondike School. They presented the program to a total of 1650 students. The two pupils gave the program before district agent K. J. Edwards and state girls agent, Miss Onah Jacks.

Sheets were passed out to the students after each demonstration so that they could check the fire hazards present at their homes. The pupils turned these sheets into their teachers for a further check.

It has been noted that fires decreased 10 per cent in rural schools last year when work was done by farm girls and boys on fire prevention with the aid of rural teachers, county agents, and home demonstration agents.

The schools where fire prevention programs were presented will get credit on fire insurance.

The local agents have been asked to bring this program plan to the District Meeting, which will probably be held in Lubbock, November 8. The District Meeting will have representatives from 20 counties attending.
