Wolves And Lamesa 3-AAA Opener

Here Saturday

Colorado High Wolves, fresh from a championship-winning performance in the Stamford basketball tournament, begins this week to seek its fortunes in District 3-AAA title play.

And, whom they run smack into title-contender Lamesa in their first contest.

Coach Caddo Matthews leads his Wolves into district play Saturday night here in their own gym.

"It's gonna be tough in this one and all season," groaned Matthews as he sent his young team through a tough work-house.

Lamesa was the class of the district last season.

"They'll be right up there contending for the top again this time," said the coach. Then, he added a long list of other

3-AAA members who can be counted as contender, including Snyder, Dunbar, Brownfield and Sweetwater.

The Wolves have a record of 12 wins against only three losses in non-conference play. But they have gone against AAA competition only a few times.

They are also a relatively young team, short on experienced lettermen. So their real strength won't be known until they get into district competition.

Junior varsities of Colorado High and Lamesa High will start the action here Saturday night at 6:15 o'clock. The varsity contest will follow.

The Wolves defeated AA Stamford, 65 to 44, in the final Tuesday night to win the Stamford Tourney championship

after defeating Merkel earlier.

Along with the title trophy, the Wolves also brought home a major share of individual honors. Jerome Hopkins, who was leading scorer with 18 points against Stamford, was named the tourney's outstanding player.

Named to the all-tourney team were Stan Bracy, who hit for 12 points against Stamford, and Skeet Kimbrell, who scored 13.

Coach Matthews will start those three plus David Matthews and Larry Williams against Lamesa.

They were the big guns in the Stamford tourney, but Matthews also substituted freely with Jim Johnson, Raddy Wright, Joe Russell, Sonney Edwards and Bobby Benson.

200 Animals In Show 4-H, FFA Youths In Annual Competition

Young stock exhibitors from all areas of the county place their animals before judges here this weekend in the 34th Annual Mitchell County 4-H & FFA Stock Show.

They will move almost 200 animals into the County Agriculture Building Thursday and begin competition Friday afternoon.

Here is the judging schedule:
Friday, 1:30 p.m. -- Judging

of swine with about 100 hogs expected for competition.

Saturday, 9:30 a.m. -- Judging of lambs, with about 65 head of sheep expected for competition.

Saturday, 1:30 p.m. -- Judging of calves with approximately 22 steers and three breeding heifers in competition.

"We expect this 1971 show to be one of our finest and we are hopeful that a large crowd will

be on hand when these young men and women exhibit their animals," said Jimmy Moody, president of the show committee.

Building and grounds have been made "ready" for the show by Mitchell County Commissioners Marcus Vest, Drue Cawthron, Paul E. Hunter and Moody Richardson.

The Future Farmers and 4-H Club members in the show will be competing for honors, banners and awards sponsored by the show association in promotion of better agricultural and youth projects.

They will be trying foremost to travel in the footsteps of James (Bimbo) and Frankie Stewart, Becky Merket, James Light, Janet and Marsha Brownfield, David Compton and Clyde Hines -- all top winners in the 1970 county show.

With Bimbo showing their 913 Hereford bred by Colorado City's A.K. Treadaway, the Stewart brothers from Loraine won grand championship of the steer division. Becky Merket, also of Loraine and who will be 16 this

year, exhibited the grand champion last year, a 909 pound Angus-Charolais bred by Colorado City's Robert F. (Bob) Fee Jr.

Champion heifer for '70 was shown by James Light, Colorado City FFA.

Janet Brownfield, 15, and her sister, Marsha, now 18, 4-H members, were tops in the sheep division. Janet's Hampshire lamb was grand champion and Marsha's lamb was reserve champion.

Future Farmer David Compton of Loraine with a cross-bred won the swine grand championship in his first year as an exhibitor. A Westbrook FFA lad, Clyde Hines, showed the reserve champion, a Duroc.

Charles Northcutt is superintendent of the sheep division with J.W. Boyd of Loraine assistant.

Swine superintendent is Bob McClure, with R.B. Golden Jr. as assistant.

General superintendent of the show is Charles Rees with Ken-

neth Merket of Loraine and Leon Light superintendents for cattle.

A.M. Heights Jr. is superintendent of weights and tags.

In one of his first duties as Mitchell County Judge, an office he assumes Jan. 1, County Judge, Bill Carter will present awards. He will be assisted by three beautiful FFA sweethearts -- Terre Pawkett of Colorado City FFA, Gwen Tartt of Loraine FFA and Roxanne Moore of Westbrook FFA.

Four prominent West and Central Texas judges will decide the winners in the two-day competition.

Judging swine will be Jim Allison, Howard County Agriculture Agent.

Sid Long, vocational ag teacher at Gall, will judge sheep and Payton Scott of Rising Star will judge beef.

Denny Belew, Wolforth-Friendship High School vocational ag teacher, will classify sheep.

Textbook Task

3 Months For Selection

A three-month task will begin soon to select textbooks for Colorado City's 1971-72 school year.

A 13-member committee of school administrators and teachers already has been named to organize and head up the work.

Named to committee are Supt. Lloyd McKee and Assistant to the Supt. Gary Gardner, who will serve as chairman and vice chairman. Mrs. Dwight Tomb, art for Grades 1-6, Mrs. John Merritt, arithmetic Grades 4-6,

Mrs. Glen Roenfeldt, vocal music Grades 1-3, Mrs. Randy Hicks, life science, Grade 7, David Woods, literature 3 and 4 and English 1 and 2, Bo Merket, related math 1 and algebra 1 and 2.

Arnold Parker, chemistry 1, Bill Simmons, world history, Frank Brownfield, agriculture 1, 2, 3 and 4, Preston Brady, industrial arts general shop 1 and 2 and metal working, Miss Kathryn Wilson, French 2.

Each of the teachers on the textbook committee will have a sub-committee of teachers who will work with them in studying and recommending textbooks to be adopted. These sub-committee members will be from the curriculum area in which they will be assigned.

First meeting of the committee will come Jan. 13 when sample textbooks will be handed out. A month of study will follow before sub-committees make their reports to the official overall committee.

After the sub-committees make their reports, then the chairman of these groups will report back to the full committee.

Then, the official committee will make its decision and place their recommendations to the school board for review and adoption.

All of this is scheduled for completion so that the list of

adopted books is sent to Texas Education Agency by March 31.

The machinery is set up so that a dissenter on a sub-committee is still heard from and considered before any final ac-

tion on a book. This is assured by the fact that each sub-committee must not only file a consensus report, but each member also must file his own individual evaluation and recommendation.

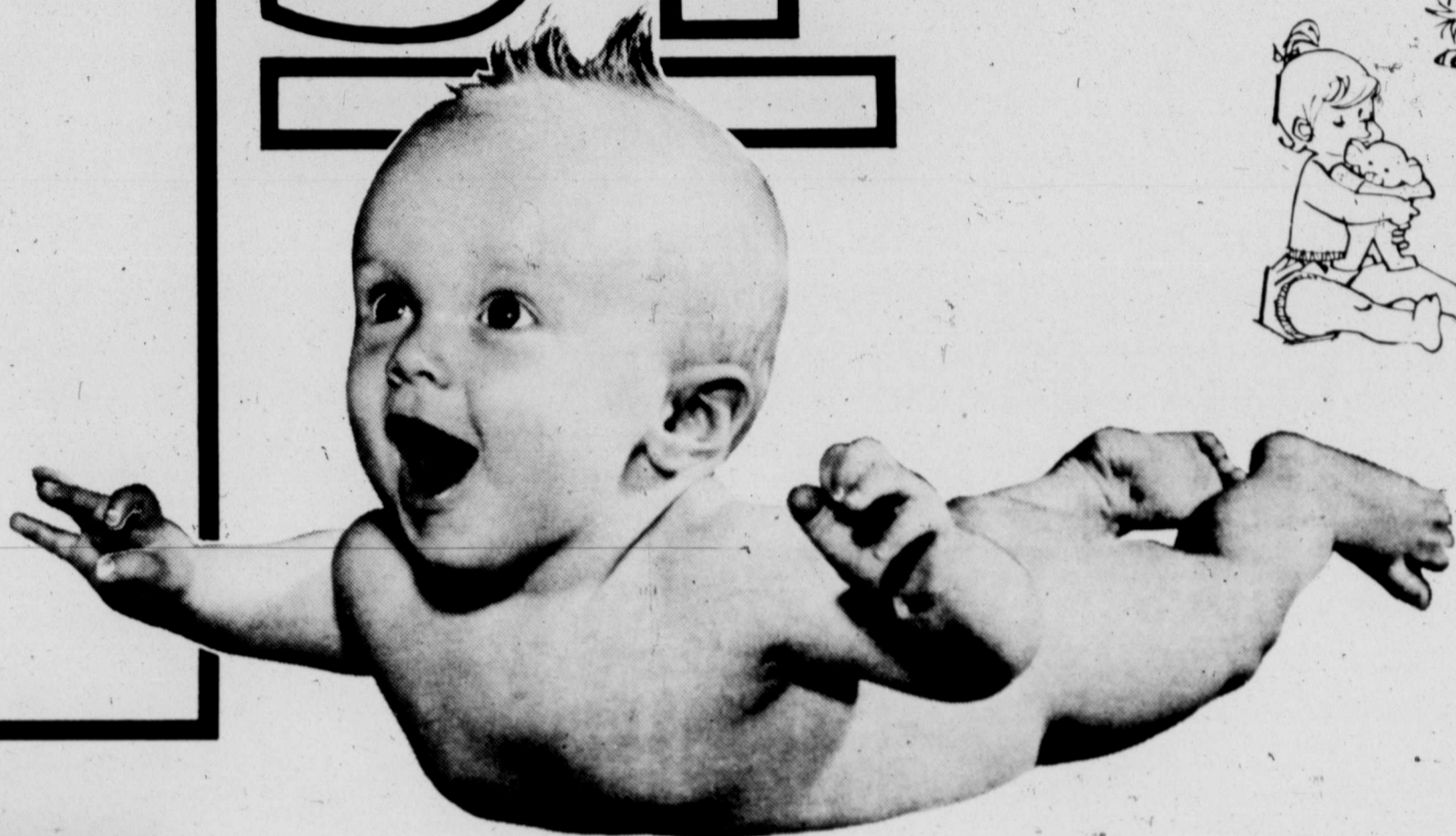

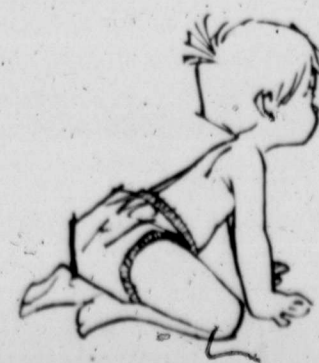
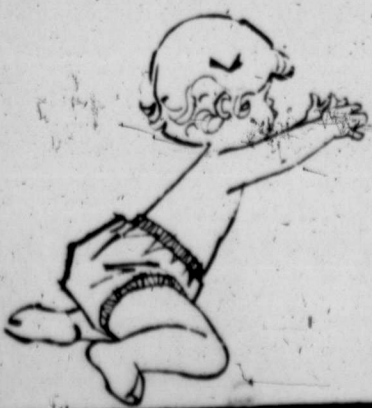
