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# President In No Hurry To Say If He Will Run Again

DENVER, (P)—President Eisenhower, well enough now to discard virtually all medicine, left it abruptly clear today he is in no hurry to say whether he will run again.  
And Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield is the latest to indicate that most of Eisenhower's top strategists of 1952 are against putting any pressure on him for an early decision.  
Summerfield came out of a 30-minute conference at Fitzsimmons Army Hospital yesterday saying here had been no discussion of the 65-year-old Eisenhower's political plans for 1956.  
More important, perhaps, he said the President didn't mention politics to him. Summerfield is a former GOP national chairman who managed Eisenhower's successful 1952 campaign.  
Cabinet member No. 11, Secretary of Labor Mitchell, is coming out to see the President tomorrow. A social visitor Saturday will be Eisenhower's old friend and World War II comrade, British Field Marshal Montgomery.  
Eisenhower's personal friends say he will serve out his present term in the presidency but will decline a second nomination. If that is his decision, the longer he withholds it the better it may be for GOP fund-raising drives. These same friends say Eisenhower will play an important role in the choice of his successor as Republican standard bearer.  
Whatever his role in 1956, the President will make the issues in the State of the Union and subsequent messages he will present to Congress in January.  
Among these will be a commitment of his party to the flexible price supports for farm products that have drawn fire from Democratic advocates of fixed high price supports.  
The President approved suggestions yesterday from Summerfield for a renewal of demands for higher postal rates to offset a yearly Post Office deficit of about a half billion dollars. Summerfield said the President may ask an increase in first class mail rates from three to four cents an ounce and a boost in the air mail rate from six to seven cents.  
Meantime, the President's improvement from his heart attack has brought new discussion of a date for his return east. The talk now is he will fly to Washington in about 10 days, spend several days at the White House, and then go on to his Gettysburg, Pa., farm for a long period of recreation and rehabilitation. All this is subject to approval when Dr. Paul Dudley White, the Boston heart specialist, arrives Sunday for another examination of the President.  
The President walks freely around his room now, a little more each day. An aide said he now sleeps easily without sedatives and that he no longer requires anti-coagulant medicine.  
Dillon Anderson, special assistant to the President on national security matters, arrives from Washington today to report to Eisenhower.

**MARCH OF EVENTS**

**Eisenhower's Condition May Bar January Congress Appearance**

**No Necessity to Present Annual Message Personally**

**WASHINGTON**—President Eisenhower's heart condition may prevent him from appearing personally before Congress in January to deliver the annual State of the Union message.

Even though the President may be deemed well enough to resume his duties by the first of the year, there is a strong probability that his physicians may rule out any potentially strenuous chores such as the personal presentation of his program to Congress.

Such speeches are delivered under hot Kleig lights and are of about three-quarters of an hour duration. The President stands throughout the address.

A factor which might prompt the President's medical advisers to rule out a personal delivery by Mr. Eisenhower is the fact that such a journey to Capitol Hill is in no way mandatory.

In fact, it was only until recent years that the State of the Union speeches have been given in person by chief executives.

In the past, they consisted merely of an annual message sent to Congress by the President and read by a clerk.

**JOHNSON'S TACTICS**—Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon Johnson has had his own presidential possibilities sidetracked by a heart attack but he is expected to operate behind the scenes at the 1956 convention in a decisive fashion.

The Texan is highly influential with senators of both wings of the Democratic party because of his congressional leadership and he has been busy in recent weeks mending political fences with various party leaders.

It might well be that Johnson can line up a solid bloc of votes, including his own state delegation, and thereby achieve a balance of power at the convention, where a dogfight is forecast.

While his heart attack rules him out as a candidate himself, Johnson could emerge as a king maker. In any event, if a Democrat wins the presidency, he could easily be one of the most powerful figures in political life.

**DRAFT INEQUALITY**—Selective Service officials admit the most basic principle behind the nation's draft law is in danger of being violated—and they can't do a thing about it. The principle is that the burden of military service should fall equally on all American youths. It may be violated because draft calls are so low.

As a result, it is altogether possible that some boys—perfectly eligible for induction—will have to be passed over by the draft because available manpower far exceeds the number of men needed in uniform.

**HELP FOR THE VEEP**—A bill is expected to be offered during the next session of Congress to provide for an official residence and a larger staff for the vice president, whose job is getting bigger each year.

The idea is not new, but it gained impetus when Vice President Richard M. Nixon assumed a larger role in government after President Eisenhower was stricken with a heart attack.

The President himself has endorsed the idea. He supported legislation offered last year by Senator Styles Bridges to provide an official residence for the vice president but nothing came of it.

If such a measure is enacted, it probably won't go into effect until a new administration takes office, however. Backers of the bill want to avoid any talk that it's a political ploy for Nixon.

### Maryland Tops In AP Grid Poll With Oklahoma, Michigan Pushing Hard

Maryland, Oklahoma and Michigan, continuing a race that's knotted up like a coach's nerves on the eve of a big game, still are 1-2-3 in the national college football ratings.

The seventh weekly Associated Press poll of sports writers and broadcasters drew the season's heaviest vote, but it left the situation unchanged with Maryland on top by a scant handful of points.

The tabulation of 220 ballots brought Maryland 74 first place votes and a total of 1,884 points—

counted on the usual basis of 10 for each first place vote, nine for second, etc. Just behind came Oklahoma with 54 firsts and 1,852 points, then Michigan with 53 for 1,774.

A week ago, with fewer votes cast, Maryland topped Oklahoma by just 30 points.

Navy, soundly beaten by Notre Dame, lost their fourth place rating to Michigan State but salvaged ninth place. And the Irish hopped from ninth to sixth and almost drew even with UCLA.

All-winning West Virginia, a 39-0 winner over Marquette last Saturday, held onto seventh. Resurgent Georgia Tech and Texas Christian took over the eighth and tenth places as Auburn and Southern California dropped out.

### Miler To Fight Permanent Ban

QUANTICO, Va. (AP)—Marine Lt. Wes Santee, America's star miler, was poised today to fight a permanent suspension as an amateur athlete which would bar him from the 1956 Olympics.

Santee, a former University of Kansas runner, said last night he planned an immediate appeal of the suspension voted Sunday by the Missouri Valley AAU Registration Committee. It said he had accepted excessive expense allowances for competing in three California track meets last May.

An official of the registration group said it was found Santee received \$1,200 in all from sponsors of the three meets, whereas AAU rules allow amateur runners up to \$15 a day in expenses, plus travel costs.

Word of the suspension action reached Santee yesterday at this Marine Corps base where he is stationed. He said he had never done anything to violate amateur athletic standards.

### Draft Exam Set For Series Hero

WITHERBEE, N. Y. (AP)—Johnny Podres, the Brooklyn Dodgers' left-handed pitcher who pitched them to two World Series victories, has been ordered by his draft board to report for a physical examination.

Miss Mary Podres, his sister, said last night that Johnny had been ordered to take the examination in Albany Nov. 14.

Podres pitched Brooklyn to an 8-3 victory in the World Series on his 23rd birthday and went on to shut out the New York Yankees 2-0 in the final game last month.

Johnny was rejected by his selective service board because of a back injury when he was called up in 1952. He was playing with Montreal in the International League then.

### Broncos Game Is Moved To Friday

ROSWELL, (AP)—The Broncos of New Mexico Military Institute have only three days to get ready for a non-conference game with the Cameron Aggies of Lawton, Okla. The game will be played at Lawton Friday night instead of Saturday as previously scheduled.

"We are making the shift at the request of our opponents," said athletic director Col. L. T. "Babe" Godfrey.

"It will mean advancing our practice and travel schedule one day. However, we want to cooperate with the Aggies because they feel that the spectator turnout will be better on Friday."

Although the Cadets slipped by New Mexico Western last weekend only by the slim score of 7-0, they now have a firm hold on the second place in the championship race. They have a 3-1 record in conference play, with one more conference opponent to meet—Arizona State of Flagstaff at Homecoming on Nov. 26.

### Maryland State Small But Tough

PRINCESS ANNE, Md. (AP)—Four undefeated football seasons in the last seven and well on the way to another is Maryland State today.

That's Maryland State—not the University of Maryland which you might think at first glance. Maryland State is the poor, Negro relation of the university which also wins a lot of football games but gets more national recognition.

This year they're going side by side down the football victory trail with seven apiece and no defeats. Maryland State has scored 176 points to 19 for the opposition.

Behind the team which was unbeaten in 1949, 1950, 1953 and 1954 regular season schedules is Coach Vernon McCain. In his seven years he has the imposing record of 61 victories, one tie and five defeats. And he's only 36 years old.

A modest man, he prefers to talk about a 67-19 game. That was one he lost to Florida A&M in a post-season game in the Orange Bowl last December.

But there was some reason for such an unusual licking. With only 31 players to begin with, three of the regulars were out with injuries before the game started. They still were losing by only 26-19 late in the third quarter before four more got hurt. Florida had 72 players dressed.

shooting the Woodwards had returned from a party given for the Duchess of Windsor at an estate near their own weekend home at Oyster Bay on Long Island's fashionable North Shore.

Pinnell said the investigation would include questioning of other party guests and of Woodward's mother, who might shed light on the relations between her daughter-in-law and son.

Gulotta said the martial background of the Woodwards was one of the aspects of the case that still needed investigation.

There were newspaper reports the marriage had been a stormy one, with separations and threatened divorce. There were also reports that both had employed private detectives to keep an eye on each other, but neither turned out to be involved with other men or women.

Friends of the Woodwards generally told investigators the marriage was a happy one. Pinnell stated, "we have found no indication of any difficulty or animosity between the husband and wife."

Gulotta said the investigation, when completed, will be submitted to a grand jury.

He commented:

and said, "I'd like to try to be of help."

Gulotta, Pinnell and a police stenographer spent about half an hour at her bedside. Afterwards Gulotta reported she had again told of being afraid of a prowler whom her husband believed was responsible for two intrusions on the property already.

When they drove to the party, Gulotta said, Woodward took along a loaded pistol and tried to reassure his wife. He said her story continued:

"When they got home, she was still frightened. They felt that they had better arm themselves and each took a shotgun from the gun case downstairs. Mrs. Woodward put her loaded shotgun on a chair next to her bed and then she went to bed.

"She was awakened by something she thought could have been the barking of her dog. The fright built up in her — she threw off her covers and went for the gun — it was a reflex action. She pulled open her door and shot what she thought was the prowler.

"Almost immediately she thought it might be her husband and it was. At this point in the questioning she broke down."

Pinnell added to this account the statement she believed she had fired more at "something she heard" than at "something she saw." He said she also thought she was firing in the direction of the dining room rather than directly across the hall at her husband's bedroom door.

The husband toppled to the floor, the right side of his face blasted by shot. He died almost immediately.

## Personality Of Candidates Big Item In Next Election

WASHINGTON (AP) — It's been true in other years that the personality of the presidential candidates was a far more vivid factor than the party platforms. It will be particularly true in 1956.

The Democrats and Republicans are so close in their thinking — after allowing for extremists and die-hards in both parties — the voters will have trouble choosing between them.

Since neither the parties nor their candidates will want to rock the boat with novel notions at a time of high prosperity, the voters will be inclined to look closer at the candidates to decide which is more likely to keep the country steady.

This is written on the assumption President Eisenhower will not run again. It's especially because of him, even though he doesn't run, that the voters will examine his would-be successors critically.

They have been exposed, in Eisenhower to an unusual political personality. It is an extraordinary political feat that he has retained his enormous popularity after three years of the hurly-burly in the White House.

This in itself is enough to make the voters not only conscious of what the 1956 candidates represent in the way of party promises but of what kind of men they are in themselves.

The Democrats will probably argue that they set the country on the road to the prosperity it is enjoying now. The Republicans will not doubt claim the credit for Eisenhower, with assurances they will keep up the good work.

But aside from the social and economic aspects of Eisenhower's administration, one thing became clearer the longer he stayed in office: He kept himself and the office of the presidency above the mud and feuds of American politics.

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## Surgeons Launching Special Probe Of Surgical Charges

CHICAGO, (AP) — Do some or many surgeons charge fees that are too high?

The American College of Surgeons today announced it is launching a special study of surgical fees.

A committee of "six or seven distinguished surgeons" will investigate the fee matter, making a preliminary report to regents of the college about mid-December, said Dr. I. S. Ravdin, of Philadelphia, chairman of the ACS board of regents.

"Statements have been made that in many instances exorbitant

fees have been charged. We intend to look into this matter, and find out if it is so," Dr. Ravdin told newsmen.

He said the regents had unanimously approved appointing an investigating committee. He declined to name the members, saying they could best do their work if their names were not made public.

"This is not a white-washing committee," Dr. Ravdin declared. "We will make public whatever it finds, if there is anything to make public. We won't hide anything when we get the report."

The College of Surgeons made news several years ago in announcing its opposition and a campaign against fee-splitting. It defined fee-splitting as a sharing of a fee between a surgeon and a physician who referred the patient to the surgeon, without specific billing for the services that each had performed.

"We believe we have made a very wealthy dent in that practice," (fee-splitting) Dr. Ravdin said. "We will study this matter of fees as it affects all other practices, and particularly as it affects fellows of the college."

To become fellows of the college, surgeons "take an oath that they will not participate in what are considered immoral practices," the chairman of regents said. Surgeons judged guilty of disobeying these ethics are dropped from the membership "and a number of fellows have been dropped for regular practices."

Dr. Ravdin declared that if complaints of over-charging are substantiated, "we will see to it that the public interest

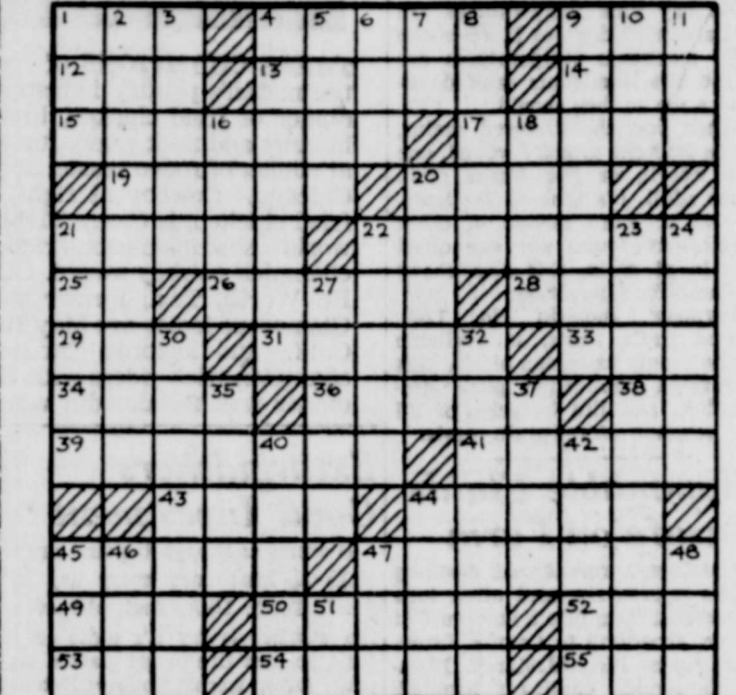

## Personality Of Candidates Big Item In Next Election

WASHINGTON (AP) — It's been true in other years that the personality of the presidential candidates was a far more vivid factor than the party platforms. It will be particularly true in 1956.

The Democrats and Republicans are so close in their thinking — after allowing for extremists and die-hards in both parties — the voters will have trouble choosing between them.

Since neither the parties nor their candidates want to rock the boat with novel notions at a time of high prosperity, the voters will be inclined to look closer at the candidates to decide which is more likely to keep the country steady.

This is written on the assumption President Eisenhower will not run again. It's especially because of him, even though he doesn't run, that the voters will examine his would-be successors critically.

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## Surgeons Launching Special Probe Of Surgical Charges

CHICAGO, (AP) — Do some or many surgeons charge fees that are too high?

The American College of Surgeons today announced it is launching a special study of surgical fees.

A committee of "six or seven distinguished surgeons" will investigate the fee matter, making a preliminary report to regents of the college about mid-December, said Dr. I. S. Ravdin, of Philadelphia, chairman of the ACS board of regents.

"Statements have been made that in many instances exorbitant

fees have been charged. We intend to look into this matter, and find out if it is so," Dr. Ravdin told newsmen.

He said the regents had unanimously approved appointing the investigating committee. He declined to name the members, saying they could best do their work if their names were not made public.

"This is not a white-washing committee," Dr. Ravdin declared. "We will make public whatever it finds, if there is anything to make public. We won't hide anything when we get the report."

The College of Surgeons made news several years ago in announcing its opposition and a campaign against fee-splitting. It defined fee-splitting as a sharing of a fee between a surgeon and a physician who referred the patient to the surgeon, without specific billing for the services that each had performed.

"We believe we have made a very wealthy dent in that practice," (fee-splitting) Dr. Ravdin said. "We will study this matter of fees as it affects all other practices, and particularly as it affects fellows of the college."

To become fellows of the college, surgeons "take an oath that they will not participate in what are considered immoral practices," the chairman of regents said. Surgeons guilty of disobeying these ethics are dropped from the membership "and a number of fellows have been

## Mechanical Cotton Pickers Must Be Carefully Adjusted

The New Mexico farmer who wants to machine-harvest quality cotton this fall will adjust his cotton picker carefully and accurately.

"You can't expect efficient harvesting or maximum quality by neglecting your mechanical picker," says County Extension Agent Richard Marek. "Of every eight hours of operation, it takes at least one and a half hours to clean, lubricate and adjust your mechanical picker correctly. And this must be done every day."

"Power sprayers or even ordinary water hydrant pressure does a good job of cleaning the picking unit. As you clean the machine, be sure to remove all cotton streamers and other trash, not only from the picking unit, but also from the basket."

"Check your operator's manual before lubricating the picker," Marek says. "Follow the manufacturer's recommendations, using the quality and type of lubricant specified. Cotton harvesting machinery is expensive, so don't try to save a few cents by buying an inferior oil and grease."

In adjusting all parts of the picker, again follow your operator's manual closely, the county agent advises. The operator's manual tells specifically how to make the right adjustments. In keeping the spindles clean, be careful not to use too much wetting agent and never use one with an oil base. Remember, you need less wetting agent early in the morning and in

the evening than you do during the heat of the day. If a few fibers begin sticking to the spindles, you are using too much wetting agent.

## Feed Chart Saves Money For Dairymen

The dairyman who is a careful feeder from start to finish is usually the one who has a good yearly herd average.

Allowing the cows all of the good roughage they can eat is the most important step in feeding, says county agent Richard Marek. The next is to give them grain on a sensible basis, that is, according to each cow's daily milk flow. This can be done easily and accurately either by having a grain feeding chart tacked to the end of the feed cart or by marking up the number of pounds of grain per feeding on a convenient spot near the feed containers.

The amounts so listed for feeding guidance should be changed when a cow's milk fluctuates in yield as revealed by weighing her milk on test day. The check-up should be made at least once monthly.

Dairymen who feed by the "guess method" usually find tremendous savings in grain after switching to a method of accurate records and feeding according to production requirements.

## TIMELY FARM TIPS

### Autumn Ideal Time to Kill Rats, Mice

Here's how:



With the first signs of chilly autumn weather, rats and mice invade buildings, searching for shelter and a constant food supply for the long winter months ahead. If you prepare for the annual invasion, however, you can head off their damage-dealing activities.

An effective anti-rat and mouse campaign, according to many pest control specialists, includes these three steps:

One—Remedy poor sanitation. Two—Ratproof buildings, when practical. Three—Place rat bait according to directions. To assure good sanitation, remove all rubbish piles, and stack lumber and firewood neatly on racks at least one foot above ground level.

Ratproofing. Step No. 2, can effectively keep rats and mice out of corn cribs, granaries, warehouses, and other places where feed is available. Bulletins describing ratproofing methods may be obtained from your county agricultural agent. Baiting is the third and most effective blow in the autumn anti-

### Stored Grains Must Be Checked

Farm-stored small grains should be checked frequently for insect infestations, says County Agent Richard Marek with the Agricultural Extension Service of New Mexico A&M College.

Most of the grain on farms has been in storage for six weeks or more, and during that period insects may have got a good foothold in many a farmer's grain bin. If protective powders were not applied to the grain at the time of storage, Marek says that a fumigation now, before cold weather sets in, is good insurance against losses to insects during the winter.

Fumigation should be carried out within the next few weeks, while day time temperatures are still above 70 degrees F. Once the daily maximum temperatures are in the 60's, fumigants can't do as good a job as they should.

When you check stored grains, if you find one granary weevil, one rice weevil, or one lesser grain borer adult, it's time to fumigate. If five or more insects of other species are found per one quart sample of grain, this also shows the need for fumigation.

Farmers' Bulletin No. 1260, Stored Grain Pests, is available at the county extension office. This illustrated publication gives descriptions and life histories of all the common stored-grain pests.

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## Cattlemen Praised For Beef Cattle Council They Formed

FORT WORTH (AP)—Texas cattlemen heard praise last night from Sen. Price Daniel for organizing the Texas Beef Council and its campaign the last year to promote the use of beef.

Daniel spoke at a dinner of the council launching Beef Week in Texas.

The Senator said he did not believe that any of the current government farm programs will solve the pressing problem of huge surpluses. He said that intensification of marketing activities, such as those of the Beef Council, would help the problem more than any support program.

Daniel said any announcement about his candidacy for governor will be made after Jan. 1.

Daniel visited the U. S. Public Health Service Hospital during the day, a visit he promised to make when he conducted an inquiry into the narcotics traffic at Fort Worth and Dallas recently.

Daniel said Veterans Administration patients should be removed from the hospital and all possible beds devoted to treating drug addicts.

Daniel told the Beef Week audience farmers need a parity of income because, he said, a prosperous agriculture is necessary for the good of the nation. A situation such as now exists when farm income is dropping is not healthy for the rest of the economy, he added.

The importance of livestock men supporting the efforts of the Texas council was stressed by Jay Taylor of Amarillo, president of the American National Cattlemen's Assn. and the National Beef Council.

## Less Demanded Meat Cuts Now More Plentiful

The marketing of beef at this time of year is heavy, with supplies of the less-demanded cuts of meats becoming more plentiful. The spread between the price of round steak and chuck roast in most of the markets over the state ranges from 30 cents per pound upward. The budget-minded shopper can feed her family well and save considerable money while so doing by utilizing these less-expensive cuts of beef.

There are innumerable recipes for Hungarian beef goulash. The one given below is from Escoffier, the great master French chef, world famous for his culinary artistry.

Cut three pounds of shoulder of beef into squares weighing about three ounces each. Fry these pieces in a heavy skillet in half a cup of lard, together with two medium-sized onions cut into large dice, until they acquire an even golden brown. Season with one teaspoon salt and 3/4 teaspoon paprika; add two medium sized peeled, and quartered tomatoes and 1/3 cup of water.

Cover and cook in a 350 degree F. oven 1 1/2 hours. This done, add 1/3 cup water and six medium potatoes, peeled and quartered, to goulash.

Continue cooking in the oven, basting occasionally with cooking juices until potatoes are done and juices are evaporated. Serves six to eight. (to get full benefits of flavor, the paprika should be fresh. Take care not to scorch paprika when adding to the beef-onion mixture.)

Find that small garlic press hard to clean? Cut a small piece, with a kitchen scissors, from a soap-impregnated steel wool pad used for cleaning pots and pans. Rub the small piece of pad over the inside and outside of the garlic press and give it a thorough cleaning.

## Flammable Fluids Unsafe on Farm

Gasoline, kerosene, and cleaning fluids improperly used often turn a peaceful farm into a holocaust of flame, according to County Extension Agent Richard Marek. Flammable liquids, carelessly handled, are among the top causes of farm fires.

An underground tank is the safest place to store gasoline and kerosene. If this is impossible, locate containers at least 40 feet from buildings. Containers must be metal and free from leaks. Small quantities are more safely stored than large, and a well-labeled safety can should always be used to draw off and handle the amounts necessary for immediate use.

Always keep these fluids away from flame and heat. Flame does not need to touch the liquid. A spark may ignite invisible vapors. Gasoline vapors flow down hill like water. They also drift with the slightest breeze. Post signs near all flammable liquid storage areas.

Flammable cleaning solvents should be avoided, but where necessary should be kept in metal-covered containers, and used out-of-doors or in a well-ventilated room. Non-flammable solvents are fire safe but should be used where the vapor cannot be inhaled.
