Barbecue is the "specialty of the house" at Peggy's Place. It is not, however, the only offering which wins compliments for the cook - Mrs. David Scott, who's better known by Hart folk as Tiny.

Tiny had never worked in a cafe before opening up the small restaurant on Highway 194 four years ago. She cooks "just about everything" and opens six and a half days each week. Sunday mornings are strictly reserved for church attendance and honor of the Sabbath.

Cooking is at the top of Tiny's list of hobbies. She gained lots of experience before opening her cafe by providing for the family meals at the Scott home. She and David are parents of six children, Willis, Peggy, Pauline, Cathy, Dale and Debbie. The children also help out when needed.

Tiny is the very proud grandmother of two little ones, LaTonna Michell and Trenette.

A resident of Hart 26 years, Tiny grew up at Marlin in Falls County. That is where she obtained her schooling. The family lives eight miles from town on the Paul Armstrong farm.

Peggy was instrumental in organizing Mt. Calvary Baptist Mission. Church Services were held in the Scott

home for about four months, with three families gathering for worship. When others joined the group and the Scott home was too small, Peggy led in the effort to obtain a building.

Members of First Baptist and First Methodist churches joined together in October of 1961 and rented the building which is presently occupied by Hart Laundry. In 1962, a residential building in Plainview was bought and moved to the Hacker addition where it was remodeled for Sunday school rooms and a nursery.

Mt. Calvary moved to its present location in 1972 and today has a membership of 42 with Rev. Roberts of Borger as pastor. The Mission is self-supporting. It is a great joy to Tiny and her family.

HAMBURGER CASSEROLE

1 lb hamburger
1 med onion
1 carton sour cream
1 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1 can macaroni and cheese
1 t salt and pepper

Brown hamburger and onion until onion is soft; drain off excess fat from pan leaving small amount. Place sour cream and cream cheese in skillet; cook on low hear until consistency of gravy. About 5 mins. Place macaroni and cheese in a casserole dish; put hamburger and onions on top. Pour sour cream and cream cheese on top. Season with salt and pepper. Place in 350° oven for about 40 mins or until gravy penetrates through casserole.

2 T lemon extract
2 T vanilla
2 T almond
2 T butter flavor
Dash of salt
3/4 c 7-Up

Cream sugar and butter together and beat until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time and beat well. Add flour. Beat in lemon extract, almond, butter flavor and vanilla and then add 7-Up. Pour batter into well greased and floured pan (jumbo fluted pan).

Bake at 325° for 1-1/4 hours.

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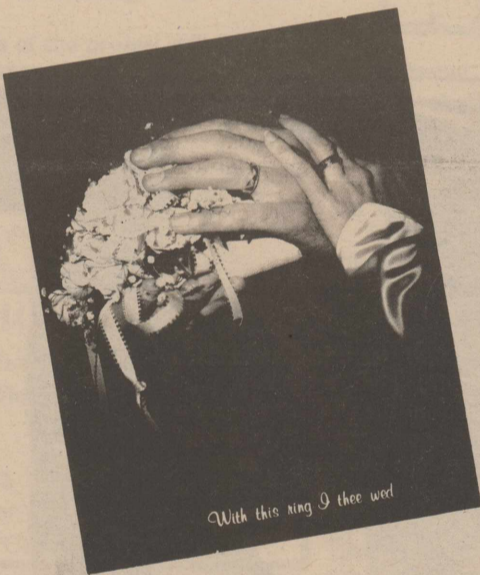

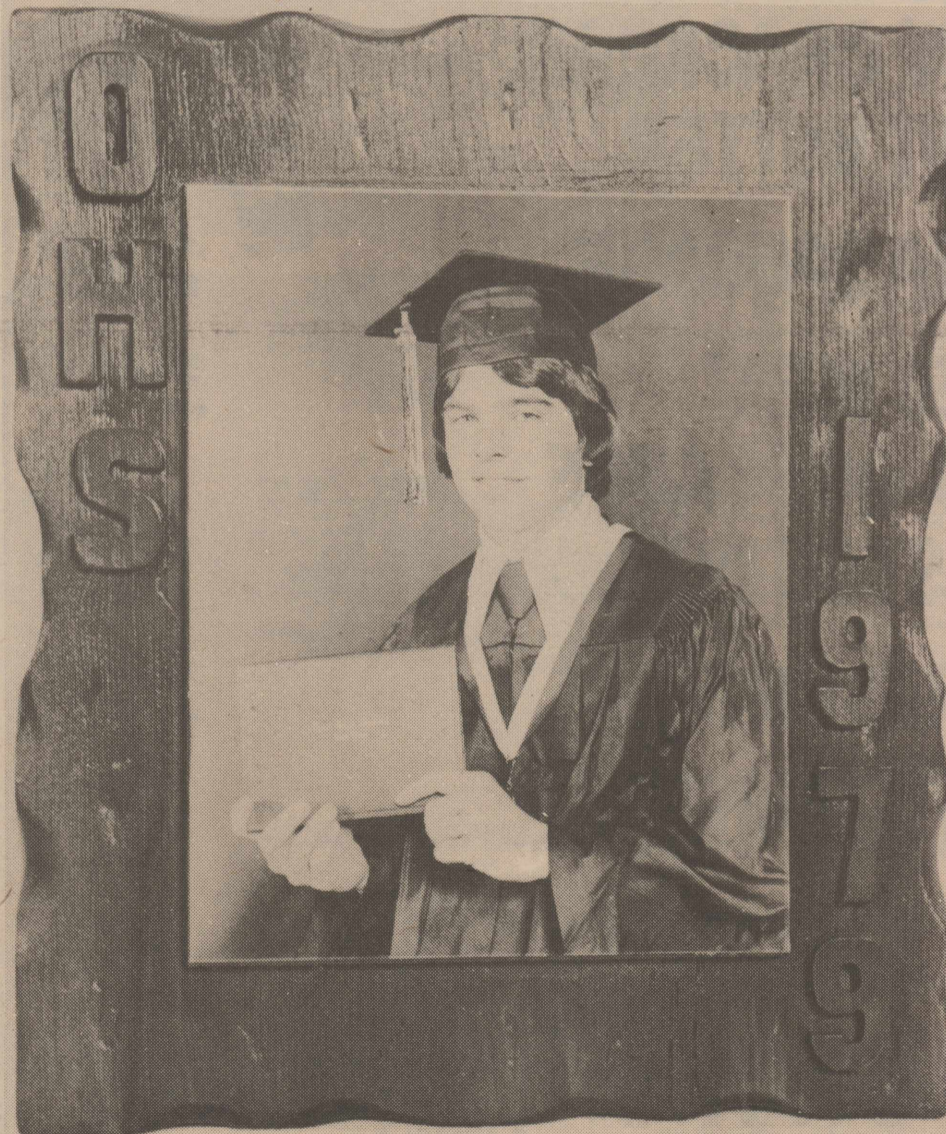
