Bennett And Sanders Are Run-Off Opponents

Ed Bennett led the balloting in the Precinct 1 commissioner's race Saturday but faces a new campaign with Dean Sanders in a run off election next month.

Collecting 111 votes in the Hart box, Bennett drew 159 votes total. Sanders garnered 103 in Hart and 142 total.

Other candidates and their totals include Bud Steiert, 80, 120; Tom McLain, 77, 101 and George Heck, 10, 53.

Returns for the County found Yarbrough amassing the greatest number of votes for the U.S. Senate post. He drew 1,128; Sanders 722; Wilson, 97; Velloz, 69 and Cartledge, 29.

Governor votes went overwhelmingly to Briscoe who polled 1,177; Barnes, 487; Farenthold, 203; Smith, 178; Wills, 7; Posey, 4 and Looney, 3. Connally received 721 for lieutenant governor with Hobby picking up 519. Hall drew 398; Christie, 174; Jones, 58; McCord, 43; Standles, 29 and Skates, 9.

Hill drew 956 votes to edge Martin in his campaign for re-election as attorney general. Martin drew 910 while Pate received 58.

Comptroller voting went to Calvert, 984; Blankenship, 252; Wilson, 241; Pendleton, 97; V. Smith, 99; S. Smith, 74 and

Robertson, 45.

State Treasurer Jesse James trounced his opponents, garnering 1,085 votes. Others were Robnett, 296; Weldon, 189; Crux, 147; Rudolph, 116 and Smylie, 49.

John C. White collected 1,363 votes to Bell's 428 in the race for agriculture commissioner.

Castro County voters also registered their opposition to forced busing by voting "for" 1,454 to 366, against.

Master Magician Slated To Perform Here Friday

Marguerite McLain Wages Untiring 'Crusade' Efforts

To conquer cancer and "go out of business" is the goal of the American Cancer Society. Generous gifts to the Society's campaign for research and education and tireless workers such as Mrs. L. C. "Marguerite" McLain will enable that goal to be realized.

Marguerite McLain began her own persistent labors for reaching that goal in 1970 when invited by an American Cancer Society representative to help with an ACS unit for Castro County.

Agreeing to help, provided it meant more than "just knocking on doors and asking for money", Mrs. McLain listened to the explanation of the organization's aims and work and then launched into relentless battle against the dread disease.

Loss of her own father, the late Ray Bennett, to cancer a few years ago provided Mrs. McLain with a strong personal vengeance against the disease. The Castro Unit was organized and Mrs. McLain was elected president. She has served in that capacity these two years. She has also served as District Director over a 20 county area for one year and is in charge of public education although she is active in all aspects of the Society's work.

She has spoken to almost every club and organization in the county, telling of the work of the ACS, explaining the seven warning signals of cancer and urging persons to obtain yearly check ups.

Mrs. McLain has shown films on cancer to the schools in the county and is presently manning a mobile unit which illustrates the dangers of smoking and smoking's link to cancer. She has shown this in Dimmitt, Nazareth and Hart. She has arranged numerous programs for schools.

She has logged countless miles and hours going about the state in her work with the Society. She has attended meetings in Dallas, Houston and

Lubbock.

Always busy but still with time to help others, she has traveled to Friona, Muleshoe, Farwell, Floydada, Silverton and other towns to appear before groups in efforts to start ACS units in those towns or counties.

Mrs. McLain is also active in her church and teaches a junior high Sunday school class at the Church of Christ. She is also a member of the Good Neighbors Club and the Zealot Club.

With a smile for everyone she meets and an enthusiasm that wins friends, Mrs. McLain loves life and expounds her personal "recipe" for worthwhile living.

"First," she explains, "is a deep love for the church which my Saviour purchased with His very life. Second, my wonderful, devoted, loyal family. Third, my community which is the best one ever and fourth, this land of ours - America, the beautiful."

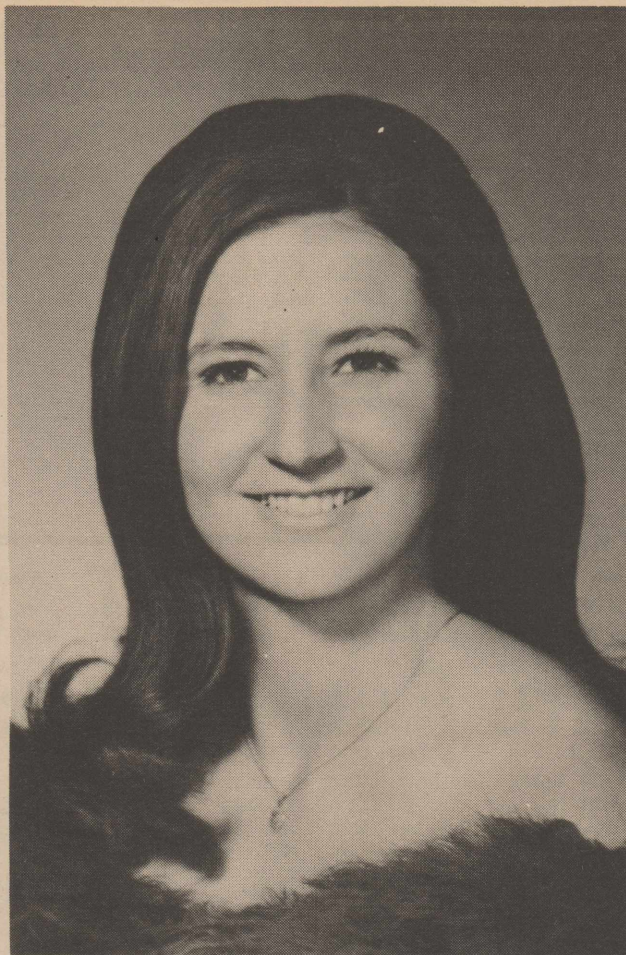
During the business meeting, final plans were made for a bake sale to be held Saturday, May 13.

Other unit officers are Mrs. Leonard Welty, memorial chairman, and Mr. and Mrs. Pete Steiert, Crusade workers.

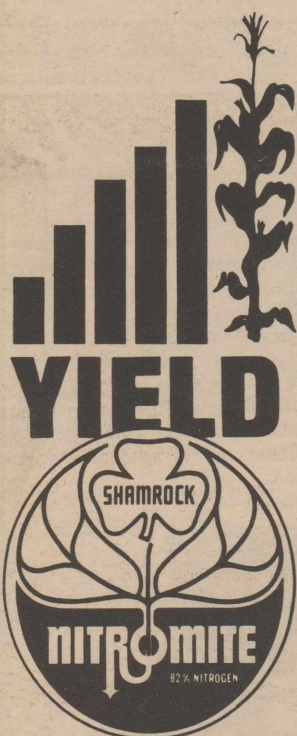
Next meeting of the organization is May 29. New officers will be elected.

Proceeds of the show will be used to purchase uniforms for the Longhorn Band.

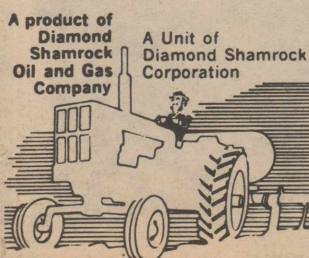

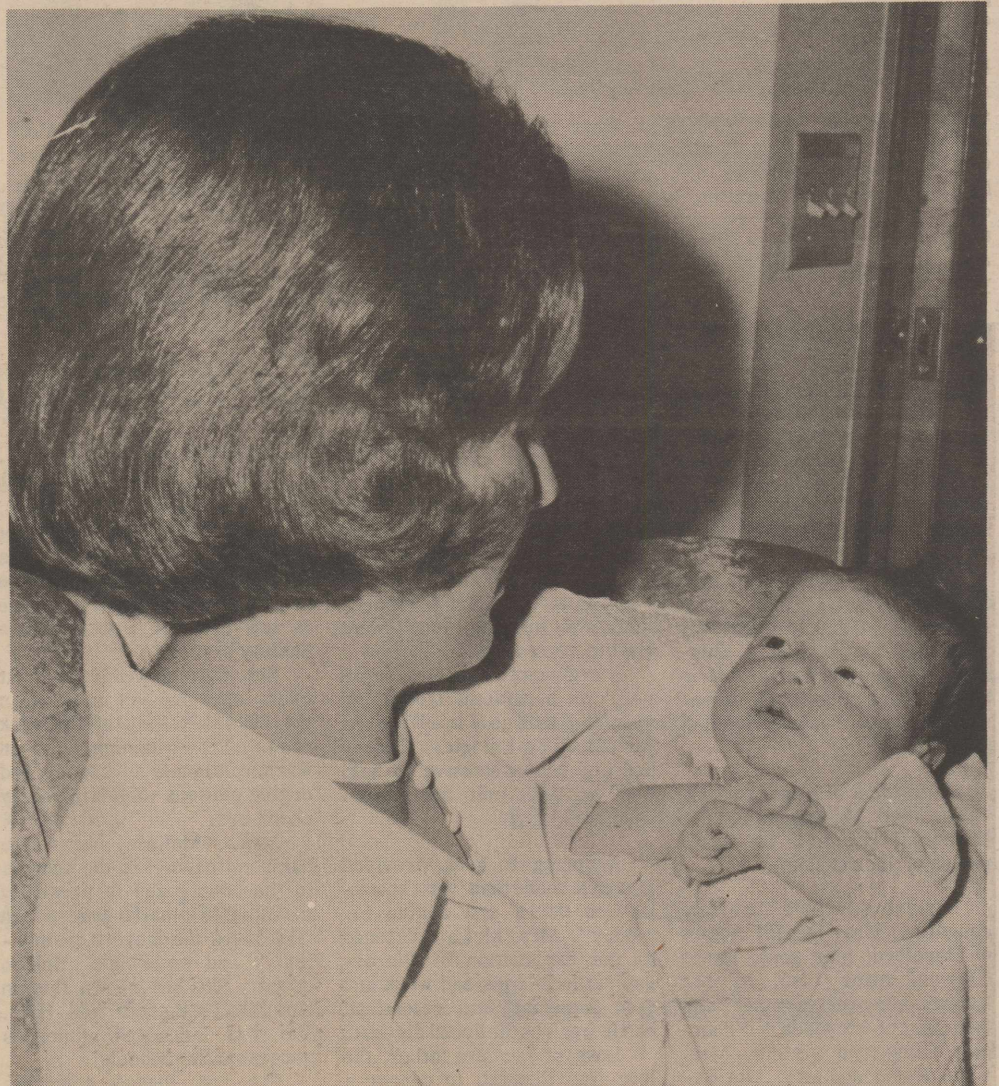

Moments of Meditation

Thomas H. Taylor

"...the driving is like the driving of Jehu the son of Nimshi; for he driveth furiously." (II Kings 9:20)

Jehu, the son of Nimshi, was a crazy driver. The word "furiously" in our text is "shigga-own" and means -- literally, "craziness." It may also be rendered "recklessly." Jehu was a reckless driver who did not regard the safety or the rights of others.

Jehu had just been anointed King over Israel in the place of Joram, and it went to his head. He leaped into his chariot and wildly drove to Samaria.

When the watchman saw the dust of the chariot in the distance he recognized Jehu by his "Crazy driving." What an unenviable distinction-- to be known for reckless driving.

Psychologically this "speed mania" was a symptom of all of Jehu's trouble. This madness characterized his entire life. Do you know that an automobile has about 2,500 bolts holding it together and it doesn't take but one nut to scatter it all over the highway!

The descendants of Jehu are with us today, for speed has become the great killer. Statistics show that excessive speed plus alcohol account for

the vast majority of fatal driving accidents. A Christian should never speed, for in so doing he endangers others, breaks the law and refutes his testimony.

A certain driver had a sign in the back of his car--JESUS SAVES! A policeman overtook the man at 65 miles an hour in a 30-mile zone and said, "First thing before I give you a ticket, take down that sign. Jesus doesn't guarantee to save you at 65 miles an hour."

Today, let people know that you are a Christian by your driving as well as by the way you live the rest of your life.

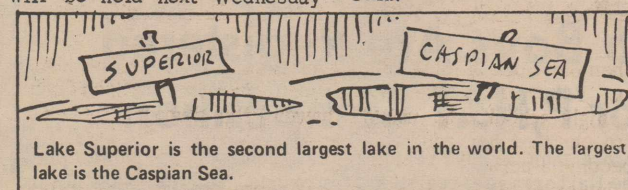

RASPBERRY SAUCE

Pioneer Round-Up Plans Under Way At Plainview

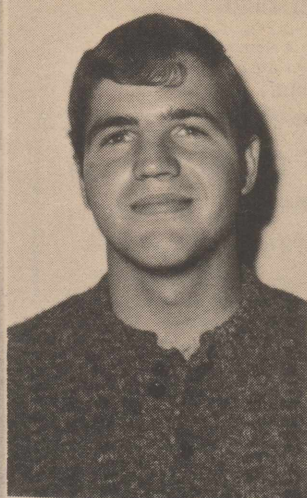

Some Common Vegetation May Be Potential Killer

While vegetation helps sustain life, some common plants, trees and shrubs are potential killers, says the Texas State Department of Health.

We eat herbs and the fruits, leaves and roots of many plants in our daily diet, but some plants we deliberately cultivate are deadly.

To the average person, the term "poisonous plant" usually brings to mind visions of poison ivy, or some similar plant that poisons or irritates upon contact. But most poisonous plants are harmful only when they are eaten. In fact, more than 700 species of plants in the United States are known to have caused death or illness. Every year about 12,000 children in this country chew or swallow potentially poisonous plants. A study conducted several years ago revealed that 10 per cent of all child poisonings were caused from eating toxic plants -- yet over half of the parents were unaware of the dangers of the plants. Eighty-five per cent of all poisoning cases involving poisonous plants involve children.

It is difficult to believe that one leaf of the graceful poinsettia could kill a child, or that tea made from mistletoe berries has killed adults. Who would expect that the beautiful oleander bush -- grown indoors and outdoors all over the country--contains a deadly heart stimulant, similar to the drug digitalis? So powerful is this poison that a single leaf of an oleander can kill a child. And many people have died merely from eating steaks speared on oleander twigs and roasted over a fire.

It's easy to be deceived by plants, for one part may be edible while another is poisonous. All parts of the buttercup, rhododendron, and laurel are harmful. In other plants, only certain parts are toxic. A classic example is the rhubarb which has a perfectly edible stalk, but the leaf contains a deadly poison.

In the strict sense of the word, poison ivy and its cousins are not really poisonous. They contain no poisonous substances and are termed "allergens" because, like goldenrod, they affect only persons who are allergic to them. But over 50 per cent of those who handle these plants will develop mild to severe dermatitis, or skin

irritation.

The "poisonous" plants do contain toxic agents which can cause direct harm when in contact with the skin or absorbed by the body. Poisonous saps and juices of some plants cause severe irritation on contact, actually burning the skin. However, most poisonous plants must be eaten to cause adverse effects.

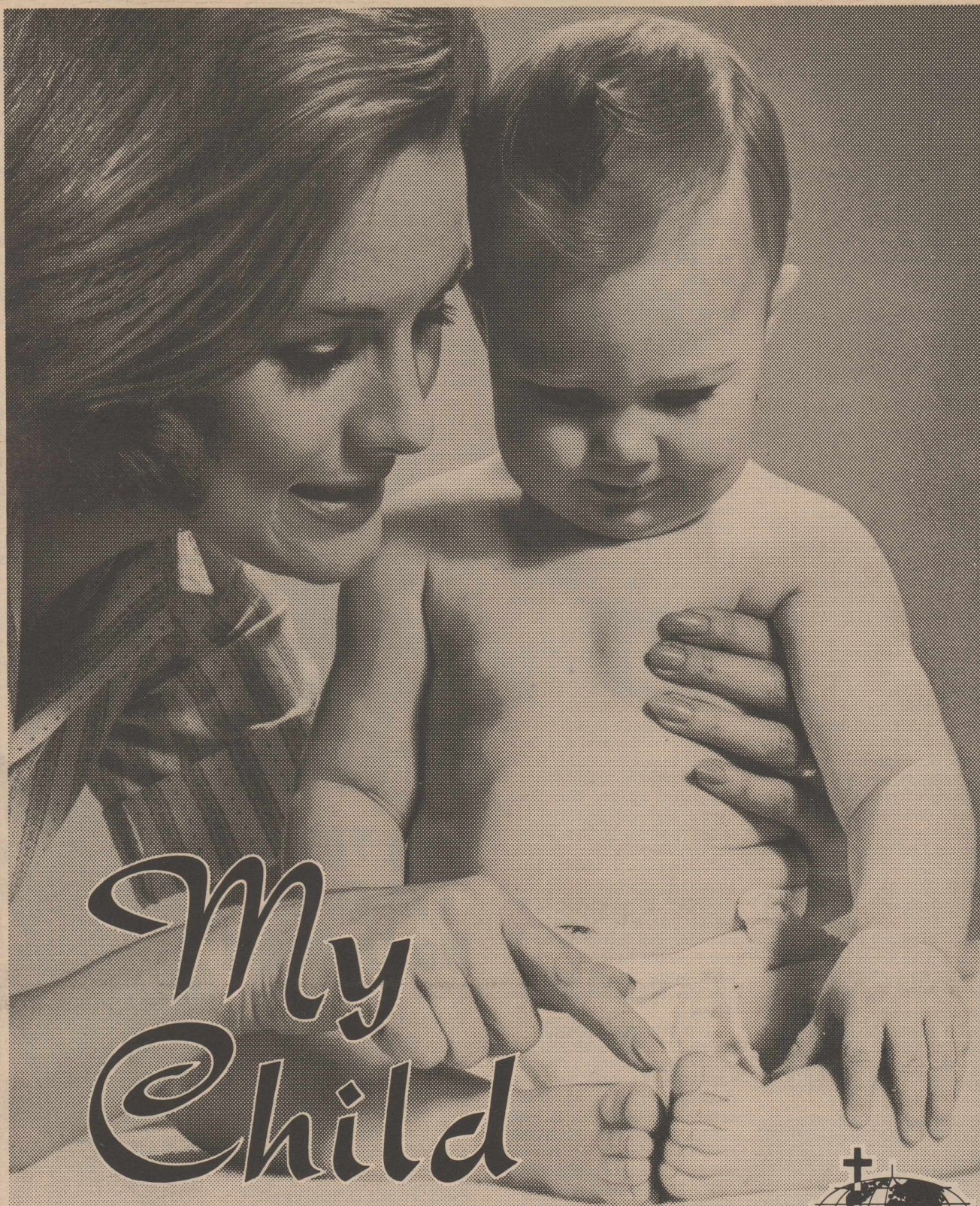
