NOTARIES ARE AUTOMATICALLY RE-APPOINTED

A letter from the Secretary of State, received by D. L. Duke, advises that all existing notaries will be automatically re-appointed by that office for a term beginning June 1, 1941 and expiring June 1, 1943. There will be no necessity for an existing notary to write the office or to other persons requesting that he be re-appointed.

Persons who are not notaries at the present time who desire to be appointed notaries should write to the office of Secretary of State giving their correct name and address before May 1, 1942. Applications for appointment received after that date will not be acted upon until after June 1, 1941, for the reason that employees will be extremely busy from May 1 on preparing the lists of appointees.

SELECTIVE SERVICE REGISTRANTS MUST COOPERATE

The advantages which come to a Selective Service registrant by closely cooperating with his Local Board were stressed today in a statement by General J. Watt Page, State Director of Selective Service.

In outlining a few of the most important things for the registrant to remember in his contact with his Local Board, General Page pointed out that the registrant's full cooperation not only speeds up the machinery of the Selective Service System, but directly benefits the registrant in a number of definite and concrete ways.

"The importance of the registrant keeping in touch with his Local Board and immediately notifying it when he changes his address and moves from one place to another cannot be exaggerated," General Page declared. "The reason for this is obvious. The registrant who fails in this violates the law, places himself in needless jeopardy, does himself an injustice and causes the Local Board all kinds of needless trouble."

The State Director also emphasized the fact that registrants can save themselves—and their board—much grief by exercising great care in filling out the questionnaire for his classification.

"Every Local Board has an Advisory Board," he said, "and the registrant who is in doubt as to how to answer any given question should consult this board and follow its instructions. That is what the Advisory Board is for. And to advise him on any other puzzling matter, also."

"The registrant who believes he has been placed in the wrong classification and wants to make an appeal has at his service the Government Appeal Agent attached to his Local Board. This Government Appeal Agent is charged with the duty of protecting the interests of the registrant, as well as those of the government, and to assist and advise him as to the procedure in making an appeal."

The State Director complimented the Local Boards of the State for their understanding and broad sympathy in dealing with individual cases.

"The registrants appreciate it, too," he added, "as witness correspondence and oral comment from them. We don't want any registrant to forget that the Local Board is his friend and that cooperation works both ways. It makes things much easier for everyone."

H. E. IIB GIRLS STUDY CLOTHING BUDGET AND PLAN DRESSES

This week the home economics girls have been studying "How to Dress." The first thing studied was how much a young girl should spend on her clothes yearly, and second, an inventory was made of the clothes on hand to determine what clothes are needed to be made or bought. A record is to be kept on what is spent for spring clothes.

Particularly studied was the general wear dress or dress suitable for both traveling and for church. Such a dress should be of a dark color, a durable material and made in a simple tailored design. Dark colors will not become soiled or wrinkled as readily as light colors.

Each girl studied colors that were most becoming to her, taking into consideration her hair, complexion, eyes and size.

Also designs suitable for different figures were studied. A tall thin person should wear fullness, yokes or horizontal lines, and the short stout person should wear designs with vertical lines. A person with a long thin face and neck is more becoming in a dress with a high round neck, and a person with a short square or round face and neck is more becoming in a dress with a v-neck. The students then selected materials that they will use in making dresses in class.

SANDERSON HAS 23 TROPHIES IN TROPHY CASE

During the past nine years, Sanderson has placed 23 trophies in her trophy case in the corridor in Sanderson High School. Of these 23 trophies, the basketball teams have placed 16 of them in it.

The first trophy to be placed in the five shelf affair was one in 1932 when Sanderson won the last invitational tournament ever to be staged here. It is a large silver basketball mounted on a black wooden stand on which is engraved "Sanderson Invitational Champions 1932." The boys which played on this team were: O. T. Schuppach, Bill Lea, Leo Daniels, Andrew Henry, Charles Robinson, D. C. Thrift, and Jack Hayre.

Since then Sanderson has made it a habit of collecting trophies from Ozona. They have collected six which include everything from runner-up consolation to championship. They have picked up five from the district meet in Fort Stockton, three from the Trans-Pecos tourney in McCombs, and two from the Big Bend tourney in

Alpine. The junior team of 1930 presented a trophy which they won in Alpine and also a large consolation pennant hangs in the back of the case.

The town team has added two from Sul Ross tournaments and the girls basketball team of 1934 can admire their consolation trophy from McCombs.

The volleyball team is getting wound up to go places because they have placed two trophies in the last two years. ship and sympathy between
fathers and sons the world over.
Sylvia Inc., by Margaret Ray-
mond—a book which tells of two

girls who grew up in the same

in an unusual business venture.

Hurricane Sand, by Ralph
Henry Barbour. This book tells
of a young boy who was unjust-
ly accused of a theft and with-

cane and his connections with
a gang of smugglers give much
excitement to this book.

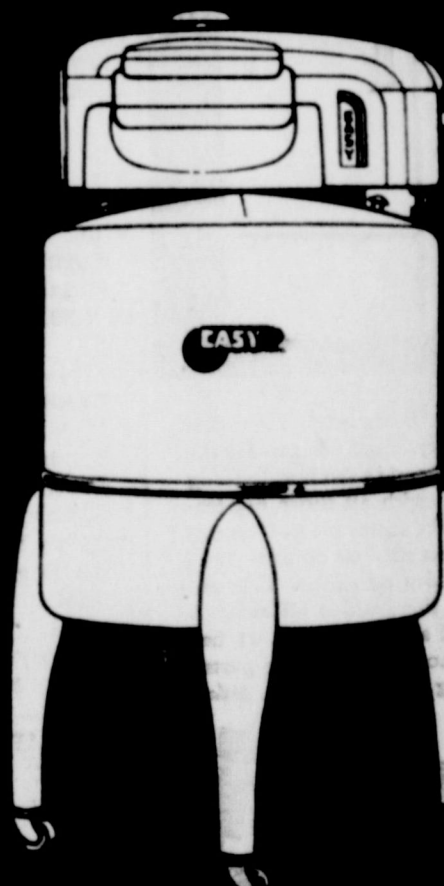

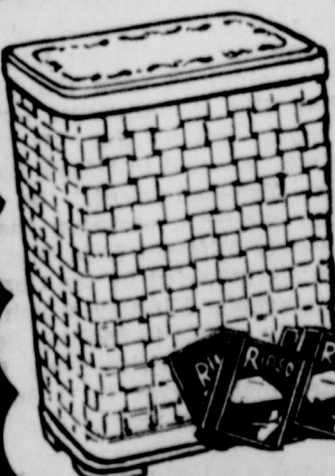

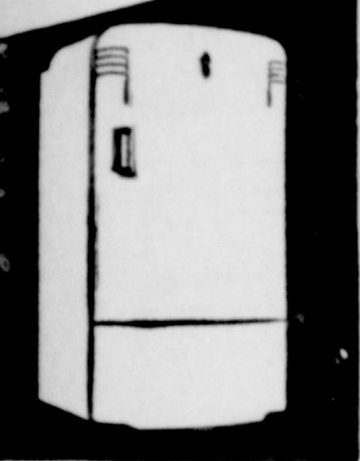

Seized German Films in New March of Time

Uncensored German Army films revealing conditions inside Nazi-dominated Europe today are included in the latest March of Time, "Uncle Sam—The Non-Belligerent," which will be shown here at the Princess Theatre Monday and Tuesday, March 17-18.

This special issue of the March of Time, which presents a comprehensive picture of the grave problems facing the U. S. people in the matter of giving aid to Britain, includes many scenes from the weekly Nazi newsreels, Deutsche Wochenschau, intended for showing in South America only.

The uncensored German film was seized by British contraband control officers and was later obtained from the Canadian Film Commissioner for exclusive use by the March of Time. As used in "Uncle Sam—The Non-Belligerent," the Nazi film carries a meaning that is entirely different from that originally intended by the German Propaganda Ministry, which has eagerly sought to frighten South American countries away from participation in U. S. hemisphere defense plans.
