SAILOR DIES IN HARBOR COLLISION

ITALIAN FLIERS OVER MOROCCO IN BRAZIL HOP

ROME TO SOUTH AMERICA JUMP IS UNDER WAY

SUCCESS WOULD GIVE PAIR NEW RECORD FOR DISTANCE

(By Associated Press.)
CASABLANCA, Morocco, July 4.—Two Italian seaplanes in which Captain Arturo Ferrarin and Major Carlo P. Delprete are flying to Brazil passed over Casablanca this morning.

(By Associated Press.)
ROME, July 4.—Two Italian airmen were expected to be speeding toward today in an attempt to make the first non-stop flight from the continent of Europe to the island of South America.

Captain Arturo Ferrarin and Major Carlo P. Delprete, who left Casablanca at 11:30 a. m., are expected to reach Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, about 4:30 p. m. after a flight of 10,000 miles. The flight will break the distance record of 3,000 miles set by the duo last year. They already have set a record of 10,000 miles in 34 hours and 26 minutes.

Took Off Last Night
The flight was made last night at 11:30 a. m. and they left Casablanca at 11:30 p. m. They were expected to reach Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, about 4:30 p. m. after a flight of 10,000 miles. The flight will break the distance record of 3,000 miles set by the duo last year. They already have set a record of 10,000 miles in 34 hours and 26 minutes.

They are using the same plane in which they established the distance record last year. It has a cruising radius of 60 hours and is equipped with 100-horsepower Fiat motor. The plane has a radio set which Major Delprete will operate.

The Polish fliers, Captains Idzikowski and Kapala, who intended to fly from Le Bourget, France, today for the United States postponed the flight when they received reports of unfavorable weather over the Atlantic.

Three Rings Taken

The rings were taken from a dressing table only a few feet from the bed while the watch was stolen from Mr. Cook's trousers as they hung on the foot of the bed.

DEMO LEADERS GIVE PLANS IN BIG CAMPAIGN

A MAIN HEADQUARTERS AND FIVE REGIONAL OFFICES SEEN

(By Associated Press.)
NEW YORK, July 4.—Establishment of nation headquarters to direct the presidential campaign of Governor Alfred E. Smith with four or five regional headquarters at strategic points throughout the country is being considered by democratic leaders.

Governor Smith is understood to have given his endorsement to the proposed plan, which must await approval of the democratic national committee which meets here on July 11.

Tentative plans call for regional headquarters in New York, handling the campaign in all the states east of Ohio and North of Maryland; mid-western headquarters in Chicago; southern headquarters in Atlanta or Mobile and western headquarters in Denver. Plans for additional headquarters in Boston and Los Angeles also are being considered.

Probable Managers
George A. Van Name, who managed the governor's pre-convention campaign, seems the probable eastern manager with J. Bruce Kerner, national committeeman from Montana and former McAdoo leader favored for the Denver post. Fred W. Johnson of Wyoming, president of the western states' Smith for president club is also being considered for the latter post.

Governor Smith is said to favor giving the regional directors a free hand in the conduct of the campaign in their territories. Friends close to him say he will dictate the general policies but feels that those familiar with conditions in their own part of the country should be left free to direct their organizations without many orders from national headquarters.

The governor and his running mate, Senator Joseph T. Robinson of Little Rock, Ark., will meet for the first time since their nomination at the gathering of the national committee here in July. Senator Robinson, from his home in

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AN EDITORIAL INDEPENDENCE DAY

What The Declaration Of Independence Really Means, And Why

THERE are various ways of celebrating the Declaration of Independence, and this nation, in the 152 years of its existence, has tried just about all of them. There is one of them, however, that has never been exercised to the extent desirable. It consists simply in reading that time-worn document anew and devoting a few minutes to pondering what it really says.

In the old days the reading of the Declaration of Independence was a regular part of every Fourth of July celebration. The town's leading orator, warm but resplendent in frock coat and top hat, would mount the flag-draped rostrum, clear his throat magnificently and fling forth the words that once told the world of the defiance of the American colonies.

This event, sandwiched in between a selection by the band and a patriotic recitation by some harassed school-boy, was always greeted with tumultuous applause; but it is to be doubted if the listeners ever really gave very much thought to the sense of the words they were hearing. And that's a pity. There are few things this nation could do with better profit.

The Declaration, at times, comes close to being a downright radical affair. What does it say? Simply this: that governments are instituted to protect the individual citizen's inborn rights to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, and that such governments can draw their power only from the consent of the governed. Furthermore, it expressly adds that "whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends it is the right of the people to alter or abolish it."

Those are strong statements. The Declaration of Independence is not a milk and water affair. It was not written and signed by men who lived in constant fear of a change in the existing order. It holds scant comfort for the superegotist of today who would deny the common rights of free speech and free assemblage to all who do not share his own social and economic views.

There has been much loose talk lately about "sticking to the principles of the founders of the country." Fine; let's do it, by all means. But first let's see just what those principles were. We may be a bit surprised, but that will be good for us.

One of the best ways to go about it is to re-read the Declaration of Independence. It would be a good thing if every adult citizen could take the time today to do that, pondering on the implications of the document's statements as he did so. The nation could not celebrate its 152d birthday in a better way.

LUBBOCK IS ON CONDITIONS IN NEW AIR LINE CITY IMPROVE

HEAD OF COMPANY IS HERE OF OFFICIAL INSPECTION TOUR

Lubbock will have direct connection by air with Fort Worth and Dallas, according to plans announced Wednesday by Gary E. Prebensen, president of the American Air Transport company, who is visiting here for a few days.

The growth of Lubbock was a surprise to Mr. Prebensen who said he had not been in the city for nearly two years.

"The officials of the transport line have been figuring on running a direct route from the Hub of the Plains to Dallas," he said. "With the present importance of the city, and the fact that we are making it the western terminus of the line, we believe the short cut to Dallas from this city will prove popular."

"With the Ryan monoplanes we plan to use, the scheduled time from Lubbock to Dallas will be around three hours. With this leg of the route in operation, it will be possible for a Lubbock man to eat breakfast at home, transact business in Dallas or Fort Worth for several days and be home again."

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BANK DEPOSITS SHOW HALF MILLION RISE OVER YEAR AGO

Adding further proof of the continued increase of prosperity in the city, Lubbock banks now have a half million dollars more on deposit than at this time last year, financial statements issued by the institutions revealed today.

Deposits in the three banks of the city total \$3,900,348.64 now, the statements show while one year ago they only totalled \$3,412,076.42. The First National bank with deposits totalling \$1,591,080.63 show an increase of \$162,330.63 over last July 1. The Lubbock National bank with deposits of \$1,025,421.52 at the present time shows an increase of \$359,462.53 over July 1 of last year while the Citizens National bank with \$1,283,837.49 has decrease of \$34,119.94 in deposits.

Loans and discounts are greater this year, however, the statements show. They total \$2,462,472.46 for the three banks while last July 1 they had a balance of \$2,178,790.30. Cash and exchange in the three banks total \$1,821,293.62 now, the statements showed.

GOP MANAGERS PUT UP TARIFF AS MAIN ISSUE

NEED OF FARM RELIEF OVERDRAWN, FLEA OF WORK SAYS TODAY

CHICAGO, July 4.—Prohibition and the equalization fee phase of farm relief will be subordinated by republicans this year to the protective tariff, under the campaign plans announced by Dr. Hubert Work, chairman of the republican national committee. Dr. Work's outline of campaign issues was contained in today's Chicago Tribune.

Work and his issues, said Dr. Work, who stopped over yesterday on his way from Superior, Wis., to Washington, would bring more votes to the republicans than to the democrats. The need of farm relief, he thought, had been greatly overestimated.

No Dilemma Seen
"It is difficult for me to believe that the farmers are in such distress with wheat at \$1.47, hogs at high prices and everything else the farmer sells bringing good prices," he said. "The republican party has stood for the protective tariff which protects wages of the workmen in mill, mine and factory. These, in turn, have money to buy the products of the American farmer."

Dr. Work was optimistic over the outlook for republican success. He had favorable reports, he said, from

SNYDER, July 4.—T. C. Stinson died from heart attack at 11:15 Tuesday morning. He was sitting out on the front porch and walked to the bed lying down where he died suddenly. Mr. Stinson was 53 years old. Mrs. Stinson, his wife died June 29. Mr. Stinson was born in Tennessee and moved to Cherokee county in early manhood where he went to school and was a classmate of the late Governor James Hogg. He moved to Bell county in 1874 where he served as county commissioner for ten years. From Bell county he moved to Scurry county to Ira in 1903. He served six years as county commissioner in Scurry county. Last winter he took the flu of which he had never fully recovered. He is survived by Joe and Lee Stinson of Snyder, Judge Jim Stinson of Abilene, George Stinson of Coleman and Mrs. O. Y. Casey of Camp Springs. Funeral arrangements will be announced later. He was taken to Odom Funeral Home.

FRENCH HONOR AMERICANS IN BIG CEREMONY

MONUMENT DEDICATED TO AVIATORS UNDER COUNTRY'S FLAG

(By Associated Press.)
VAUCRESSON, France, July 4.—In memory of the fallen American heroes who flew for France, in the Lafayette Escadrille a great stone monument was dedicated today on the edge of the Bois de St. Cloud.

Fifty of the men who died will eventually be in places prepared for them in the crypt of the triumphal arch which faces a quiet lake in the wooded spot, whose trees and fields were made famous by the noted landscape painter Corot. For a month American graves registration authorities have been moving the bodies from American military cemeteries an arduous work will soon be completed.

Valorous Story Told
The valorous story of "these first defenders of our country's precious name" in the last war, as Ambassador Myron T. Herrick described them, was told by him in introducing the French minister of war, Paul Prudent Painleve. In 1917, then also minister of war, M. Painleve welcomed General Pershing to France.

Ambassador Herrick told how the first volunteers came to the embassy at the outbreak of war, seeking his counsel and how he read to them the low of neutrals. 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MOTOR LAUNCH IS RAMMED BY IN-BOUND SHIP

TANKER PLOUGHS INTO SMALL CRAFT TAKING "GOBS" TO SHORE

(By Associated Press.)
SAN PEDRO, Calif., July 4.—One sailor was killed and another is missing as the result of a collision in the harbor here late last night between the tanker District of Columbia and a navy motorboat loaded with shore-bound sailors from the U. S. S. West Virginia.

The motorboat sank immediately after being struck by the tanker. Most of the sailors, aboard, fearful of being crushed, leaped overboard.

H. D. Cook, seaman second class was killed. His head was crushed. H. E. Hallie, also a seaman second class, was missing.

The motor boat, carrying thirty sailors first ran into a submerged pile and its engine was disabled. As the members of the boat's crew worked to get headway, the District of Columbia, in-bound from Richmond, Calif., drifted down upon them.

The motorboat apparently was not seen by those aboard the tanker because of the darkness.

Two Die, Two Hurt In Auto Accident

GALVESTON, July 4.—A woman and a small girl were killed and two persons injured, one seriously, in an auto accident on the Galveston-Houston highway at Lamarque at 11 o'clock last night.

The dead: Mrs. J. L. Bryant, about 37; Houston; Lucretia Williamson, 9; Mrs. Bryant's niece. Critically injured: Mrs. F. L. Williamson, mother of Lucretia. Slightly injured: J. A. Llewellyn, Houston.

Parked At Side of Road
According to survivors, the car in which Mrs. Bryant and the Williamson were riding was parked at the side of the road while F. L. Williamson, father of the dead girl, was repairing a tire, when a car driven by J. C. Houston, of Houston, crashed into it from the rear. Houston stated at John Seely hospital, where the injured were taken, that he was blinded by the lights of another car and did not see the Williamson machine.

In the Williamson car besides those named were a small girl and a baby, Williamson children.

Output of Machinery
Returning to the subject of farm relief, Dr. Work stated he had been told the output of farm machinery is larger than ever before. Adjustments between the prices of farm products and what the farmer must buy should be made, he said, but subsidies are not wanted by the thinking farmer.

"As for prohibition, that's a local question. Sentiment in the towns is mixed," Dr. Work averred. "The country will vote dry for economic reasons, if for no other. Much of the present prosperity is due to prohibition. Anyway, the wet and dry question is not enough to determine the election."

Dr. Work also gave it as his opinion that internal troubles "will keep the democrats busy."

BANK IS MOVING TEMPORARILY TO REWORK BUILDING

Workmen were busy this morning with the task of moving the fixtures of the Lubbock National bank from the corner of Texas and Main, its location for the past 11 years to the Howard building, 1011 1-2 Main Street, where temporary quarters of the bank will be maintained while the old building is being remodeled.

The building will be remodeled and re-decorated throughout, officials of the bank said today at a cost of approximately \$15,000. A 60 by 24 foot basement will be excavated in which the safety deposit vault and other units will be built.

The entire length of the building will be used by the bank, the offices of the Lubbock Building and Loan company being moved to other quarters. Modern marble bank fixtures will be installed throughout the building when completed. unpleasantness will be over-

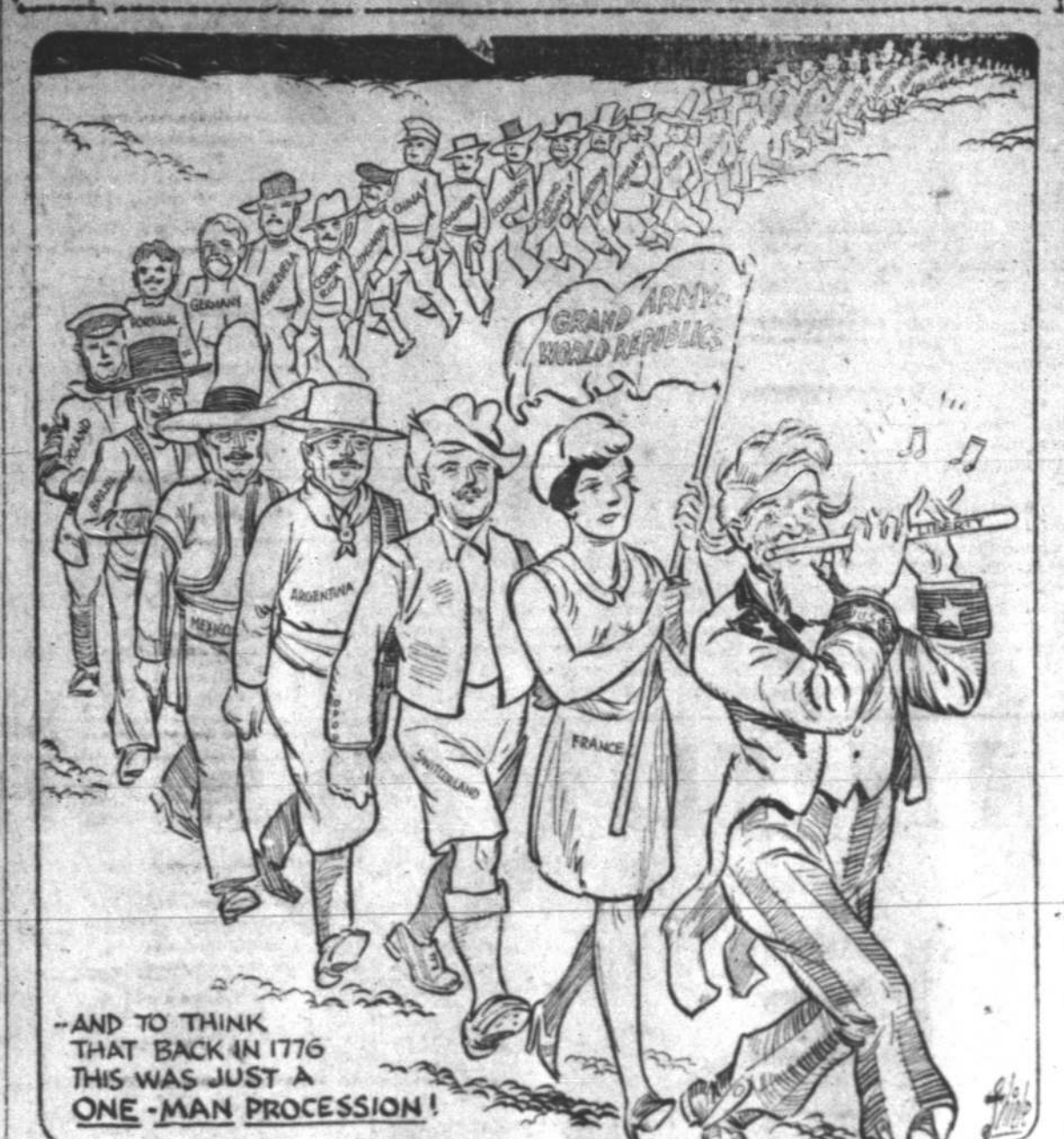

Negro Vote Is Likely To Have Its Effect When Ballots Are Counted In Presidential Derby, Rodney Dutcher Says

HOUSTON, July 4.—Down here in
the land of the Jim Crow car, one is
apt to forget that the vote of the
negro in those states where the vote
is not denied him is likely to deter-
mine the result of this year's presi-
dential election.

The Republicans, from year to
year, have never lost sight of that
fact, and have seen to it that lowly
black brethren always received cer-
tain nourishing crumbs from the
groaning board of patronage.

The Democrats don't overlook the
fact, either. But whereas the
northern democracy is sometimes
inclined to take the Republican at-
titude, as shown in Tammany's con-
vention delegates are manipulated
in the south by the party in power
and the Republicans in turn re-
frain from making nasty remarks
about the disenfranchisement of the
negro wherever necessary below the
Mason-Dixon line.

But when Perry Howard of Mis-
sissippi boasted that he represented
a group which held the balance of
power in about ten states, he wasn't
talking much bigger than the facts
permitted. The group of delegates
of whom Howard is representative
not only nearly always controls the
Republican nomination but the
racial group of which he is a mem-
ber is also credited, with turning
tides in November.

There are large blocks of negro
votes in New York, Illinois, Indiana,
Ohio, Pennsylvania, Maryland and
other states. Except in New York,
they generally vote Republican, re-
calling the civil war and believing
that the G. O. P. is a little more
friendly toward them than the
Democrats.

Politicians in some of the larger
cities consider their negro votes
their most important nest eggs. Big
Bill Thompson, for instance, in
Chicago, the negroes in a given
community nearly always vote as a
group. One is advised, however,
that if Lowden had been nominated
this year, the Republicans would
have lost the votes of some 12,000
Pullman porters who work for him
and as many more votes as the
porters could have influenced.

While the negroes are generally
delivered by their political leaders
and, as remarked, are overwhelm-
ingly Republican, one or two fac-
tors are at work which may cause
some sort of a split among them
this year. They have nothing
against Smith or Tammany Hall,
which is at least one Democratic
machine that has played with them.
On the other hand, they may prove
fully appreciative of Hoover's order
abolishing race segregation in the
census bureau at Washington. One
recalls Senator Cole Blawie's absurd
assurance some time back that both
Hoover and Smith planned to put a
negro in the cabinet if elected.

Meanwhile, one observes with
mild interest but no surprise that
although there was a considerable
group of black and tan delegates
tucked discreetly far in the rear of
the Kansas City convention floor
those negroes in sight here serve in
a distinctly menial capacity.

UTILITY HEADS OFFER PLAN TO AID ENGINEERS

FELLOWSHIPS GIVEN TO WISCONSIN U. FOR STUDENT BODY

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 1.—Money to finance three \$500 fellowships for engineering study at the University of Wisconsin is furnished by the Wisconsin Utilities association, John H. Cadby, secretary of the association testified today before the federal trade commission investigation of power utilities.

The testimony was brought out under questioning by Robert E. Kealy, chief counsel for the commission.

"We pay the money to the board of regents of the university," Cadby said, adding that disposition of the fund was left entirely to the university authorities.

Text Book Activities
Activities of the association in connection with civic text books used in the schools of Wisconsin were revealed through testimony and correspondence of Cadby.

In May, 1922, Cadby wrote to B. Sheridan, of St. Louis, secretary of the Missouri committee in public utilities information concerning a survey of Wisconsin text books then being conducted.

"A summary of unfair quotations used by subject and giving reference to pages in the latest edition of each text in use in Wisconsin," he said, "is being compiled. The national association of railway and interested and I believe a national utility commissioners are very much interested in doing a little bit of such. In the meantime we are using that a few good texts are being published and getting a little sentiment developed around the state for better texts."

Read Manuscripts
Cadby testified that he had read manuscripts prepared by Professor Martin J. Glasser and Frank B. Woy of the University of Wisconsin, and had suggested certain changes to the authorities. He also said of the supplying illustrative material to Dean Edward A. Fitzpatrick of the Marquette University graduate school for use in text book.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., July 1 (P.).—An employee was killed, another seriously injured, and property to the value of \$100,000 was destroyed in an explosion and fire which swept the yards of the Sun Oil company early today.

Henry Karpenter, 18, of Chicago, was killed. James Kinsley, 35, was seriously injured. He escaped from the yards after the explosion and his clothing in flames, turned in the alarm.

GERMANS HEAR OF NEW PLANS FOR REPUBLIC

FOREIGN POLICY WILL REMAIN UNCHANGED FROM STRESEMANN

(By Associated Press)
BERLIN, July 1.—Dr. Hermann Mueller, the chancellor, submitted the program of the new cabinet to the Reichstag today. The nature of the program would indicate that the government does not consider itself a makeshift body, but is determined to co-operate with the new Reichstag for a full term of years.

After asserting that "the foundation of the new German republic stands firm and unshakable," the chancellor announced that Germany's foreign policy would be continued along the lines set down by Gustave Stresemann of "peace-

ful conciliation with renunciation of all ideas of revenge."

Justice Of Demand
Declaring that "with the whole German people the government is convinced of the justice of our demand for immediate liberation of the occupied areas," Dr. Mueller said that the occupying powers, failing to take advantage of the political development in recent years, are keeping up a barrier which "stands in the way of establishing a real relationship of mutual trust between peoples."

The chancellor pledged allegiance to the League of Nations, saying: "We see in it one of the most important factors of international life, and thereby also of promotion of national interests."

His program on this subject is the nature of an appeal to the nations for universal disarmament. He pointed out how Germany completely disarmed, has done more for international security than any other.

Reparations Question
On the question of reparations the chancellor laid stress on how after the Dawes plan had worked without friction for four years, "the conviction has gained ground in all circles concerned that a final settlement is not only desirable, but also possible."

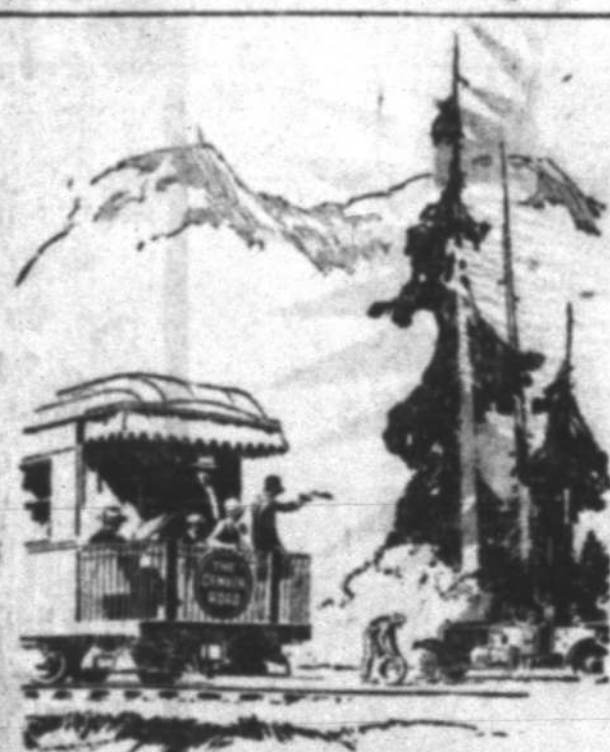

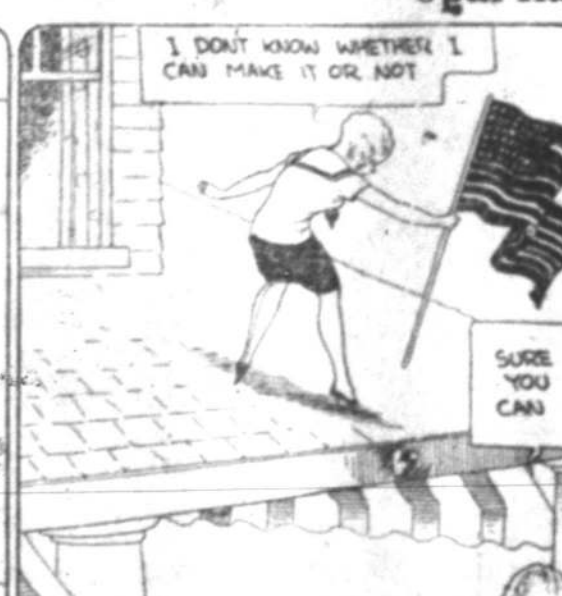

SMITH ADMITS HARD FIGHT IS AHEAD FOR HIM

NO UNUSUAL STRENGTH OF OPPOSITION IS SEEN, HOWEVER

NEW YORK, July 4.—Governor Smith acknowledged today that he expected the presidential race to be a hard fight but he made it clear that this was not in tribute to any unusual strength of his present political adversary.

"Certainly," he told a reported who asked if he believed the battle would be hard fought, "I never knew one that was easy."

"Are you in good shape physically for such a battle?" he was asked. "If it was to start right now, I'm all right," he said.

But he immediately made plain his realization that the battle must not be begun prematurely.

The governor was shown a news dispatch carrying a statement in which Adam A. McMullen, republican leader of the Lowden agricultural group at the republican convention, said that the agricultural plank in the democratic platform was satisfactory to the farm organizations.

"Well, if he's satisfied I'm sure I am," was the governor's only comment.

Harrison Lauds Demo Candidate

GUFFPORT, Miss., July 4 (AP).—Governor Smith is elected president I have not the slightest doubt," his administration will get better results in the enforcement of prohibition laws and other laws than have the last two presidential administrations," Senator Pat Harrison of Mississippi, declared here upon his return from the democratic convention.

Senator Harrison said the election of Governor Smith would in no way jeopardize the prohibition law, as any change of the law must be made by congress and the executive can only make recommendations or veto legislation. There are not a dozen senators out of 96 and there are not 50 members of the house of representatives out of 435 who would modify the present prohibition law," he said.

South Carolina To Adhere To Party

COLUMBIA, S. C., July 4 (AP).—Assurance of South Carolina's adherence to the democratic candidates for the presidency and vice presidency and her acquiescence in the choice of the Houston convention was expressed by Governor John G. Richards.

LEADERS GATHER FOR THIRD PARTY MOVE IN CHICAGO

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, July 4.—Leaders and spokesmen of several national groups which are in disagreement with both major political parties' prohibition planks were gathering today in advance of the convention called to meet here July 10.

Although the convention is nominally that of the prohibition party, efforts have been made to combine the strength of all those factions which fall in line with the democratic or republican platforms, the promises they desire. Farmer-labor and other groups have been asked to be present.

League is Invited
The Jefferson-Lincoln league, of which James A. Edgerton of Washington is president, was one of those organizations invited to co-operate. The invitation explained that the league's co-operation was sought because of the league's "fundamental purposes" was assisting "the protection and enforcement of the prohibition act."

The names of William G. McAdoo, former Senator Robert L. Owen of Oklahoma and David G. Roper, who was commissioner of internal revenue under President Wilson, were being mentioned in connection with a nominee for the presidency of the United States. D. Leigh Colvin, national chairman of the prohibition party, said that "a prominent dry democrat" from the south was under consideration for the nomination.

WASHINGTON, July 4 (AP).—Terming Governor Smith "by all odds the most insistent, determined, uncompromising, influential and powerful enemy of prohibition that ever appeared in American public life," Ernest H. Cherrington, secretary of the world league against alcoholism, in a statement today declared it is now time for "every defender of the constitution to wake up."

The judgment recites that the amount was to cover Hightower's shortages after all credits were deducted. The shortages were "by virtue of acts of fraud and defalcation set forth in plaintiffs' petition," the judgment avers.

Hightower is serving five years in the federal prison for confessed violations of the national banking laws.

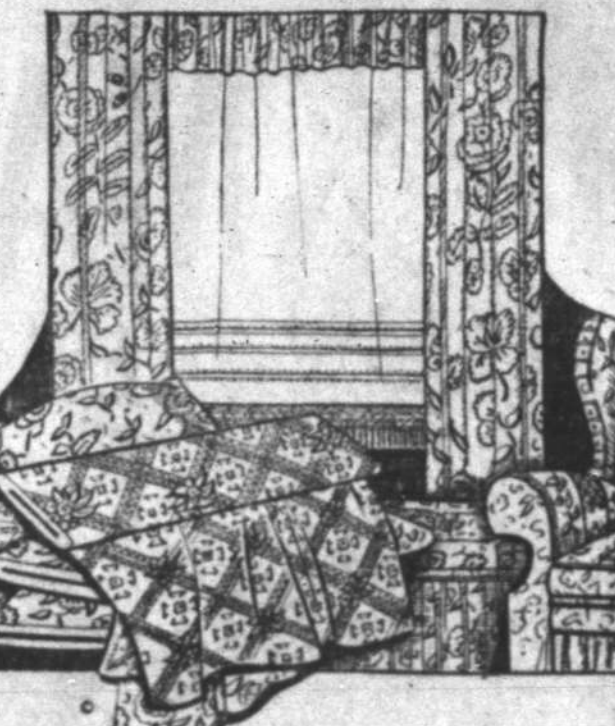
