Board of Trustees Attends To Business In Regular Session

The Talco-Bogata CISD held their regular meeting Tuesday May 11 at 7:30pm at the Talco Elementary Library after a 6:45 pm tour of the campus.

First order of business was to administer the oath for newly elected board members Kip Stansell and Frank Stubblefield.

The Board discussed the rules of organization of officers. They reestablished the rule that the community that had four members serving on the Board would house the Presidency and the community of three board members would house Vice Presidency in order to provide each community with representative. The Board reorganized, electing Jerry Russell as President, Frank Stubblefield as Vice-President, and Mollie Williams as Secretary, for 1992-1993.

In general action the Board accepted the minutes, financial report, approved pay ment of bills and accepted the tax report and adjustments.

A new vocational program was discussed by the Board. Approval was given to Superintendent Wade to seek to employ a certified nurse to

instruct a health and human service vocational program.

The Board then approved the 1992-1993 school calendar. August 14 will be the first working day for the teachers. The first day for students K-12 will be August 17. A full calendar will be published on a later date.

A career ladder report was given by Supt. Wade. The Board approved the list of teachers that qualified for each level.

Renovation of Rivercrest track was discussed. Bids received May 8 were reviewed and accepted by the board. Work on the track should begin this summer. A total package bid was \$105,000.00. Contractors receiving portions of the bid are: A.E. Moore for sub-base work, \$45,500.00; A.E. Moore for installation of metric curve, \$6,000.00; Buster Paving for application of hot mix asphalt, \$18,545.00. The application of top running surface contract will go to Track Master of Dallas for \$35,090.00.

A resolution on Special Education was adopted by the Board. Buford Hervey was elected as delegate to the TASB convention in September. Frank Stubblefield was elected alter-

nate.

The Board approved a new pay scale for substitute teachers. Pay was raised from \$30 to \$35 for non-degree substitutes and to \$40 for degree substitutes and \$45 per day for certified teachers who substitute.

The Board approved a proposal that the Superintendent seek someone to install central air conditioners at Talco and Bogata cafeterias.

The Board accepted the proposed combined purchasing agreement with the Region 8 Education Service for School Supplies and Apple and IBM computers.

The Board approved the continuation of Summer Library Programs at both Talco and Bogata Elementary and Junior High Schools.

The Board discussed Kindergarten graduation ceremonies at length, but no change in policy was made.

The Board considered summer maintenance programs on the three campuses.

The Board named Teresa Taylor of Talco as the new Chapter 1 Aide for Talco Elementary.

The next meeting of the Board was scheduled for June 9 at Rivercrest.

Rosie Jasso Wins First In Feature Writing!

Rosie Jasso placed First in Feature Writing at the University Interscholastic League Academic State Meet, May 8 at the University of Texas at Austin. More than 2,000 students, competing in one or more of the 20 UIL academic contests, placed at district and regional contests to earn a berth in the State Meet. Rosie placed first at both the district and regional levels to advance to state competition. She was accompanied to Austin by her coach and advisor, Mrs. Ann Roberts and Jerry Francis who competed in keyboarding on May 9.

The Feature Writing contest consists of an interview with a person and then a story is written from the information that they gather at the interview. The person interviewed this year was Cary White, a motion picture production designer who has worked on films ranging from *Lonesome Dove* to *Texas Chainsaw Massacre II*. He was art director for *Lonesome Dove* and recently, *Ned Blessing*, the CBS made-for-television movie.

"Each year, more than a third of

the total participation in UIL activities involved academic contest, dispelling the myth of the League as a 'sports organization.'" Dr. Bailey Marshall, UIL director said. "Texas has the nation's most comprehensive slate of academic contests. Long before other academic-based competition, the UIL was sponsoring contests in speech, journalism, mathematics and science. In fact, the League was created in 1910 as a forensic league."

In participating at the State Meet, students qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. During the 1991-1992 year, the TILF awarded more than \$660,000 scholarship grants to 543 college students who compete at the UIL State Academic Meet. In 1992-1993 the TILF expects to award an estimated 500 new and renewed grants, valued at approximately \$660,000. The TILF funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals, and families. The TILF has over \$2,000,000 in endowed funds.

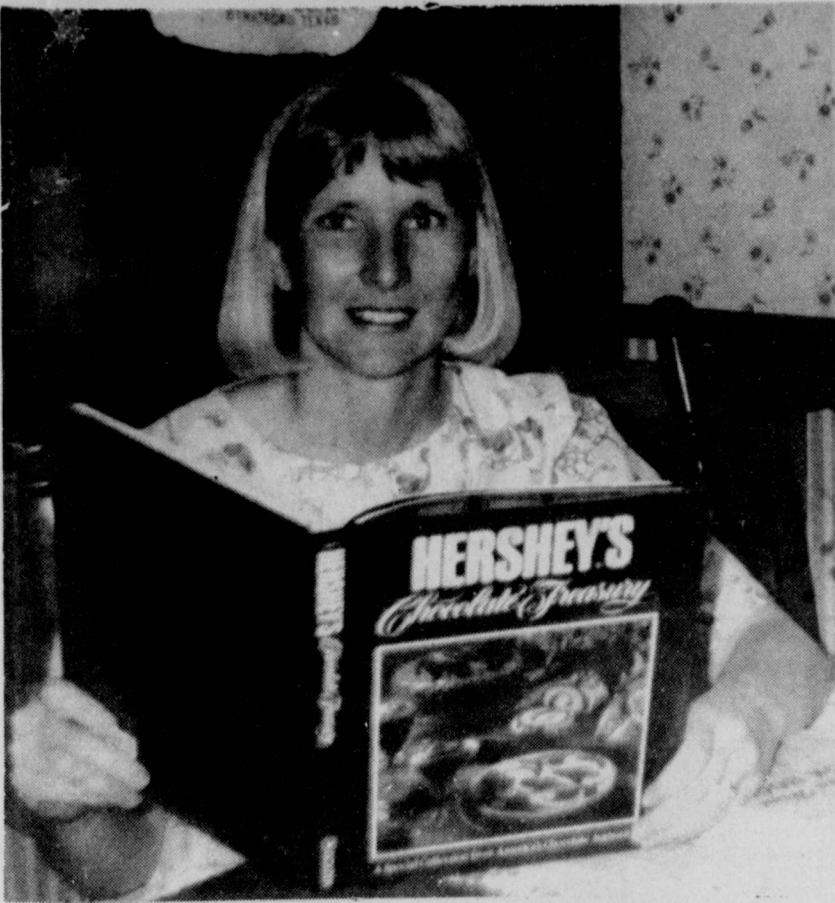

Brownies

- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup cocoa
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 cup Crisco oil
- 4 eggs
- 2 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup nuts

Mix together all dry ingredients then add liquids. Blend well. Bake in 9x13 greased and floured pan at 325 for 30 minutes.

Potato Casserole

- 2 1. pkg Southern Style frozen hashbrowns
- 1/2 cup melted margarine
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 can Cream of Chicken or Cream of Mushroom soup
- 1/2 cup sour cream
- 2 cups grated cheese

Mix ingredients together and put in 9x13 pan or casserole dish. Top with 2 cups cornflakes, crushed; 1/4 cup melted margarine. Bake 1 hour at 350.

Crazy Crust Pizza

- 1 cup flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. Italian seasoning
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 2 eggs
- 2/3 cup milk

Dust and grease pizza pan. Pour batter on pan and tilt until entire surface is covered.

Meat topping:

- 1 lb. hamburger
- 1/2 small onion
- 4 oz. chopped mushrooms
- 1/2 cup chopped bell pepper
- 1 cup pizza sauce
- 1 cup cheese (whatever kind you prefer)

Brown hamburger and onion. Add

mushrooms and bell pepper. Arrange meat, onions, mushrooms and bell peppers on batter. Bake at 425 for about 25 minutes. Take out of oven; add pizza sauce and cheese. Bake for about 10 minutes until cheese is melted well.

Chocolate Upside-Down Cake

- 1 cup flour
- 2 tbsps. cocoa
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 2 tbsps. melted shortening
- 1/2 cup nut meats, chopped
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Cream shortening and sugar; sift flour, cocoa, salt and baking powder together. Add to creamed mixture alternating with milk and vanilla, add nuts. Pour into pan.

1/2 cup white sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
2 tbsps. cocoa
Mix together, sprinkle over top of batter. Pour 1 cup of cold water over top. Bake at 350 for 25-30 minutes.

Hershey Bar Pie

20 lg. marshmallows. Heat 1 min. in microwave, add: 1/3 cup milk. Heat 1 minute then beat with mixer, add: 3 reg. size Hershey bars with or without almonds. Break in pieces. Heat 1 minute. Stir. Add: 3/4 of 8 oz. can Cool Whip. Pour in Graham Cracker Crust. Refrigerate. Top with Cool Whip.

Syrup Pie

- 3 eggs
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cu Karo syrup
- 1 cup coconut (optional)

Heat oven to 350. Prepare pie crust. Beat eggs, sugar, salt, butter and syrup with mixer. Pour into pie crust. Bake 40-50 minutes or until filling is set.

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Public Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 1-B-92
The State of Texas
City of Talco
County of Tarrant

An ordinance declaring certain building conditions a health hazard and unsightly, declaring same to be unlawful, providing for notice and abatement and the fixing of penalties.

WHEREAS, it has been brought to the attention of the City Commission of the City of Talco that certain situations exist within said City limits that are dangerous to the public health and welfare of its citizens and that same should be abated. The City Commission under and by virtue of its police powers hereby provided the following ordinance for the control of same.

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Talco:

Section I-The term "substandard building" as used in this article is hereby defined to mean and include:

(a) Any building, shed or fence, or other man-made structure which is dangerous to the public health because of its condition and which may cause or result in the spread of disease or injury to the health of the occupants of it or neighboring structures.

(b) Any building, shed, fence or other man-made structure which because of faulty construction, age, lack of proper repair or any other cause is especially liable to fire and constitutes or creates a fire hazard.

(c) Any building, shed, fence, or other man-made structure, which by reason of faulty construction or other cause is liable to cause injury or damage by collapsing or by a collapse or fall on any part of such structure.

(d) Any building, shed, fence or other man-made structure which because of its condition or because of lack of doors or windows is available to or frequented by malfactors or disorderly persons who are not lawful occupants of such structure.

(e) All buildings or structures that have become deteriorated to the extent that the roof, windows and doors or any other portions of the building or structure which protect from the weather will no longer reasonably protect from the weather, whether such deterioration results from natural causes, or through damage from exposure to the elements (especially wind, hail or rain) or through fire or through any other means.

(f) All buildings or structures which are so structurally deteriorated that they are in danger of collapse, or which cannot be expected to withstand storms such as may be reasonably anticipated in the area.

(g) All buildings or structures constructed hereafter which do not conform with the city building code as same now exists or as it may have been amended to exist at the time of such construction.

(h) All buildings or structures as are now constructed, or as are permitted to be constructed in the future, so as to constitute a menace to health or safety, including all conditions conducive to the harboring of rats or mice or other disease-carrying animals or insects, reasonably calculated to spread disease, and including such conditions hazardous to safety as inadequate bracing or the use of deteriorated materials.

Section II-Substandard buildings or structures declared public nuisance.

Within the terms of this article which shall constitute a menace to the health, morals, safety or general welfare of the occupants thereof or of the public are declared to be public nuisances and shall be ordered to be vacated, repaired or demolished as provided in this article.

Section III-Inspection of buildings as structures reported substandard; preparation, filing, distribution of report.

The Mayor, any member of the city council or any city personnel may direct the building inspector to make an inspection of any building or structure in the city reported to be or believed to be substandard as defined by section I and upon being so directed, the building inspector shall make such inspection. He shall prepare and file with the Mayor, the council or city personnel a written report of said inspection, giving therein a general description of the building or structure in question, a

description of the land on which it is located and street address, and stating in his opinion as to whether or not such building or structure should be ordered to be vacated, repaired or demolished as provided in this article. In addition to this inspection and written report, the city council may direct the city personnel to engage some person other than a city employee to make an inspection of said building or structure and to prepare and file a written report with the Mayor or council based upon said inspection and containing the same information required in the above report by the building inspector. Upon the filing of said written report or reports, the city personnel will have copies thereof prepared for and distributed to the Mayor, each member of the council and city attorney.

Section IV-Conditions, regulations and procedures for declaring building or structure substandard.

Final determination of whether a building or structure is substandard and required vacation, repairing or demolishing shall be made under the following conditions, regulations and procedures:

(a) Emergency measures. When there exists an emergency, as defined in the following subparagraph, certain measures which may be taken, notice which shall be given of the order and the procedures which shall be followed in carrying out said measures are as follows:

(1) When it shall appear to the city building inspector that a building or structure in the city is a substandard building under the terms of this article and that such building structure or the manner of use constitutes an immediate and serious danger to life or property, the condition shall be deemed to justify the use of emergency measures and upon being so advised by the city building inspector, the mayor, city council or city personnel may order any of the following emergency measures to be taken:

(A) Immediate vacation of such building or structure or of adjoining building or structures;

(B) Vacation of the danger area around such building or structure;

(C) Such emergency shoring up and bracing of walls, roofs and supports as are required to render such building or structure safe;

(D) The destruction of such walls, roofs and supports or of the entire structure or so much thereof as cannot be braced or made secure with safety;

(E) Posting of notices on or near such building or structure which notify the public of such orders and order all persons to keep out of such building or structure and the areas of danger surrounding it.

(2) When any of the above-mentioned measures are ordered to be taken, notice of such order shall be given as follows:

(A) Except as provided by (B) below, a copy of said order shall be delivered either personally or by certified mail to the person or persons shown by the tax rolls of the city and county to be the owner or owners of said building or structure;

(B) In the event personal service cannot be made and the owner's address is unknown, such notice shall be given by publication at least two (2) times within ten (10) consecutive days in a newspaper or general circulation published within the city; provided however, that if in the judgment of the city building inspector the notice requirements set forth herein and in (A) above would create such delay as would materially increase the danger to life or property, such notice need not be given to taking the measure which has been ordered. It shall be sufficient in such case for notice to be given within a reasonable time after the measure has been taken.

(3) In the event that notice required above cannot be given or is unnecessary, or in the event that such notice is given and the owner or owners shall fail or refuse to carry out such orders either by private contract or through an agency of the city and the cost thus incurred shall constitute a valid lien against the property upon the filing of a statement of the expenses incurred with the county clerk of Tarrant County.

(b) Normal procedures. Where an emergency does not exist, the following steps shall be taken to determine whether or not a building or structure is substandard and the action to be taken if said building or structure is determined to be substandard:

(1) After the reports have been filed, as set out in Section III, the city personnel shall set a date for hearing the report by the city council and the owner or owners of said building shall be given notice of such hearing as follows:

(A) The notice shall be written and shall be directed to the person or persons shown by the tax rolls of the city and county to be the owner or owners of such building or structure. Said notice shall state the date, time and place of said hearing and shall be delivered either personally or by certified mail to said owner or owners, or an authorized representative thereof if the same be known, and shall be so delivered not less than ten (10) days prior to the hearing.

(C) In the event personal service cannot be made and the owner's address is unknown, such notice shall be given by publication at least two (2) times within ten (10) consecutive days in a newspaper or general circulation published within the city and by posting a copy of said written notice in a place of prominence on the building or structure in question at least ten (10) days before said hearing.

(2) At the time and place stated in the notice of hearing, the city council shall hold said hearing and the owner or owners may make such presentation as he or they desire. After the hearing has been closed, the council shall then make a final determination of whether or not such building or structure is a substandard building or structure. If the council determines that the building or structure has the appearance of being abandoned or is uninhabitable, that it is not repairable, and that it constitutes a nuisance to the citizens of Talco, or a fire hazard to the surrounding property, the council shall issue such orders as shall appear reasonable necessary to prevent the building or structure from being a hazard to life or property and to eliminate the substandard qualities of the building or structure, including but not limited to:

(A) Order demolition of said building by the owner or

(B) File suit in the appropriate court seeking an order declaring the building or structure a nuisance or fire hazard and directing its demolition; or

(C) Order the owner to proceed to make repairs.

Section V-Council to furnish owner copy of findings; time limit destruction by burning.

A copy of the council's findings and order set forth in the preceding section shall be delivered either personally or by certified mail to send owner or owners, or an authorized representative thereof if the same be known, and the owner or owners shall have thirty (30) days in which to comply with the order to repair or demolish and clear the premises. In the event such personal service cannot be made and the owner's or owner's address is unknown, such notice of the council's findings and order shall be given by publication at least two (2) times within ten (10) consecutive days in a newspaper or general circulation published within the city and by posting a copy of said written notice in a place of prominence on the building or structure in question.

There may be instances in which the structure could be destroyed by burning, and if the owner will agree to a destruction by burning, the matter will be referred to the fire chief who will determine whether or not the structure can be burned without danger to surrounding properties and if so, it will be burned at the city's expense and under direction of the fire chief. provided however, the owner or owners shall be responsible for the removal of all debris and rubbish from the premises after

the structure is burned and for the cost of same.

Section VI-Failure of owner to comply; demolition by private contract or city; cost to constitute lien; filing of lien.

If the owner does not repair or demolish in the time set out in the order of the city or the court, the city may proceed by private contract or by the city, to demolish the building or structure and clear the premises. In the event the building or structure is demolished, the cost thereof shall be charged to the owner and shall be secured by a lien on the property. The Mayor and council will determine this cost and cause the same to be filed in the deed records of Tarrant County, along with a description of the property and this lien shall be foreclosed as in Article 342.007 of the Texas Health and Safety Code.

Section VII-Failure to comply with article constitutes misdemeanor; penalty.

Any person who shall willfully refuse or fail to leave a building which has been ordered vacated under the terms of this article, or who shall enter a building which has been ordered vacated under the terms of this article, or who shall enter an area around such building that has been declared to be dangerous and notice of which declaration shall have been posted, and any person who shall interfere with or hinder the vacation, repair or demolition of any building under the terms of this article, the president, vice president, secretary or treasurer of such corporation, or any manager, agent or employee of such corporation shall be also severely liable for the penalties herein provided.
