

Sterling Will Not Vote For Ma

Austin, October 10—Reaction over the state was waited today as result of Governor Ross S. Sterling's announcement last night he would bolt the democratic ticket and refuse to vote for Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson for governor.

Whether Sterling's position will cause followers to swing from Mrs. Ferguson to Orville Bullington, republican candidate, or candidates of other parties, was the question that climaxed the long court fight for the democratic nomination for governor which ended Saturday in a decision in favor of Mrs. Ferguson.

Mrs. Ferguson led Sterling by less than 4000 votes in the democratic run-off primary, and should most of his supporters follow his action a hard-fought general election was foreseen.

Sterling said, however, he would vote for Franklin D. Roosevelt for president but did not say which of the other candidates for governor he would support. Tickets have been filed by the republicans, communists, socialists and Jacksonian parties.

The manner in which Sterling's position will effect the national ticket was being awaited with keen interest. President Hoover carried Texas in 1928 by 126,000 votes. Should some of Sterling's supporters turn to the republican candidate for governor, it was seen as a possibility they might vote the straight republican ticket.

SUPREME COURT RULES IN FAVOR OF MRS. FERGUSON

The Texas Supreme Court ordered the name of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson certified Saturday as the Democratic nominee for governor of Texas.

Announcement was also made that no motion for rehearing will be entertained. This made the decision final.

The court also ruled on the appeal from the decision of District Judge W. F. Robertson, holding his court had no jurisdiction to try an election contest for governor. The high court held that Judge Robertson's decision was correct and should be affirmed, although it found his reason wrong.

The opinion directed that the certification of Mrs. Ferguson's name be sent to the various counties by telegraph if Mrs. Ferguson guaranteed that expense.

So ended the Democratic controversy over its nominee for governor. The substance of the 24-page opinion handed down by the Supreme Court is that Judge Robertson's court did have jurisdiction to try the election contest, but that by reason of the time that must elapse for the contest, the case must necessarily be moot when decided, so that it was properly dismissed.

Colorado To Get New P. O. Building

Colorado's fight for a post office building, which has extended over a period of several years, seems near realization as the Secretary of the Treasury and Postmaster General announced at Washington Wednesday that funds had been definitely allocated to finance the project. Eight other Texas cities and towns are to receive new buildings under the same allotment.

Funds to finance construction of the building were made available through the Garner-Wagner relief law. A total of 227 buildings scattered throughout the country were authorized at the same time. Three of the new structures were given Oklahoma.

Since leases on buildings expire prior to July 1, 1934, the government must construct buildings, according to a statement issued by Comptroller General McCarl at Washington last Wednesday. Colorado is within that specification, meaning that the projected building will be constructed.

Congressman R. E. Thomason announced by telegram that bids for site would be advertised in a short time.

Other Texas towns and cities to receive buildings under the same authorization are: Athens, Eastland, Graham, Kerrville, Lamesa, Nocona, Vernon and Pecos.

Cotton Report Up 115,000 Bales

The Department of Agriculture at Washington Saturday issued its report of the condition of the cotton crop and the estimate of the number of bales to be ginned this year. The estimate was placed at 11,425,000 bales, an increase of 115,000 bales over the forecast of September 1.

Slight declines in probable production in Texas and Tennessee were noted.

Condition of the crop on Oct. 1 was reported at 54.2 per cent normal, compared with 69.3 per cent a year ago.

The average yield, as of Oct. 1, was 149.3 pounds per acre, compared with 201.2 pounds in 1931.

The indicated crop is 5,671,000 bales less than the 1931 crop.

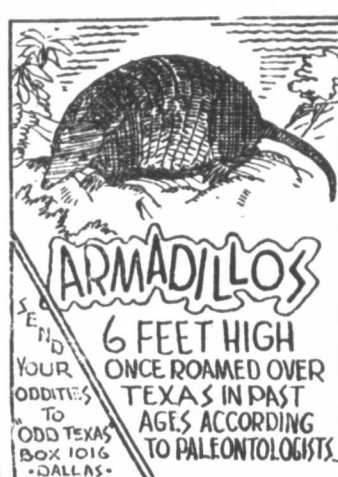

POINTERS GIVEN ON WINTER GARDENS

Denton, Oct. 8—A new departure in garden development for the winter months is the so called "cold-frame garden," according to Fred W. Westcott, director of rural arts at Texas State College for Women.

In discussing the construction of this type of garden and the vegetables adapted to its use, Westcott says that not all sections of Texas are suitable for winter gardens, but a cold-frame garden may be expected to succeed in practically every section of the state.

The cold-frame should be located in a well-drained place with a southern exposure, if possible, on the south of a building, board fence, hedge, or other shelter, extending east and west in order to receive the maximum amount of sunlight.

A standard cold-frame large enough to supply a family of five, is 6 feet wide and 30 feet long. After the site has been chosen, a stake of 2x4 inch lumber should be driven at each corner, and at intervals of 3 feet along each side. The tops of the posts on the south side should be 6 inches below the tops of those on the north side

in order to give the frame a 6 inch fall. That box part is constructed of 2x6 inch lumber. Sufficient 2x4 inch cross-braces must be used to hold the frame together.

In collar sections of Texas standard glass sashes 3x6 feet should be used, using cloth sashes or rolled cloth in milder sections. The inside of the frame is dug out to a depth of 6 to 8 inches and this soil be replaced with a loose rich garden loam. This type of garden are beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, chard, chinese cabbage, fai, lettuce, mustard, onion sets, radishes and turnips.
