Seaman Charles Lee Privitt Died July 31 Overseas

Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Emery Privitt of 801 South Third Street in this city received a telegram Friday, August 3, informing them of the death of their son, Charles Lee Privitt, Seaman First Class.

The telegram stated in part: "I deeply regret to inform you of the death of your son, Charles Lee Privitt Seaman First Class, on July 31, 1945, as a result of drowning in the service of his country." The communication was sent by chief of the Naval Personnel.

Seaman Privitt was on his second tour of duty at the time of his death. He first sailed for foreign service in April of 1944, and returned in June of that year. Again in September he left for sea duty, having gone to the Southwest Pacific.

The young seaman entered service in January of 1944 and received his training in San Diego, California.

He was a native of Lamesa, having been born here on February 3, 1926. Seaman Privitt who was 19 years of age, was a graduate of both the Lamesa Grammar School and High School and had been active in band work here. He had been a student at Tech prior to entering the service, having been enrolled there for a period of 1 year.

Turn In All Scrap Paper For The Current Campaign

Reports On The Oil Activities For County Given

Information carried in Sunday's issue of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram stated that Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Youngblood, in section 29, block M, EL survey, 1 1-2 miles northeast of nearest production in the Welch pool in northwest Dawson County, was drilling below 5,107 feet, in lime. Cores to 4,975 feet had been dense, dry dolomite, with no indications of production.

Sunday's issue of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal also carried news of the oil activities in this county. An article stated that Ralph Lowe, Midland independent oil operator is reported to be preparing to build four miles of five-inch pipeline, and necessary gathering lines, to deliver the oil being produced, and to be produced in the Welch field of northwest Dawson County, to the Texas-New Mexico trunk line from the Slaughter pool, to Midland.

That carrier runs about four miles west of the present western limits of the field. It is understood that work on the connecting line will be started shortly. Provision of the outlet is expected to increase drilling activity in the area in the near future.

It is difficult to realize the enormous importance of paper in war but when you know that waste paper constitutes almost 90 per cent of the content of every piece of paper used in the 70,000 different items made from this material needed by the Army and Navy, you see the necessity of saving every scrap of it.

Waste paper fights for you. It speeds vital supplies safely on their way to the front. It is used for protective bands on bombs, for cartons containing K rations, for shell casings, for V-box containers, for food supplies and life-boat emergency ration containers.

The last bullet fired in this war will go to the front in a paper case. Until then, every item shipped overseas must be made, wrapped or tagged with paper. Your waste paper helps that stream of supplies along. Save all your waste paper—turn it all in—shorten the war with it.

Arrangements have been made whereby you can leave your collections at the first building inside the fair grounds on Tuesdays or Fridays from 5:30 to 6 p. m., or on Saturday from 2 to 6 in the afternoon.

If it is more convenient you may leave your collections at the trailer on the courthouse lawn from 10 a. m., to 6 p. m.

Remember you help in the war effort too when you save waste paper. Make sure all of it is collected about your homes or business.

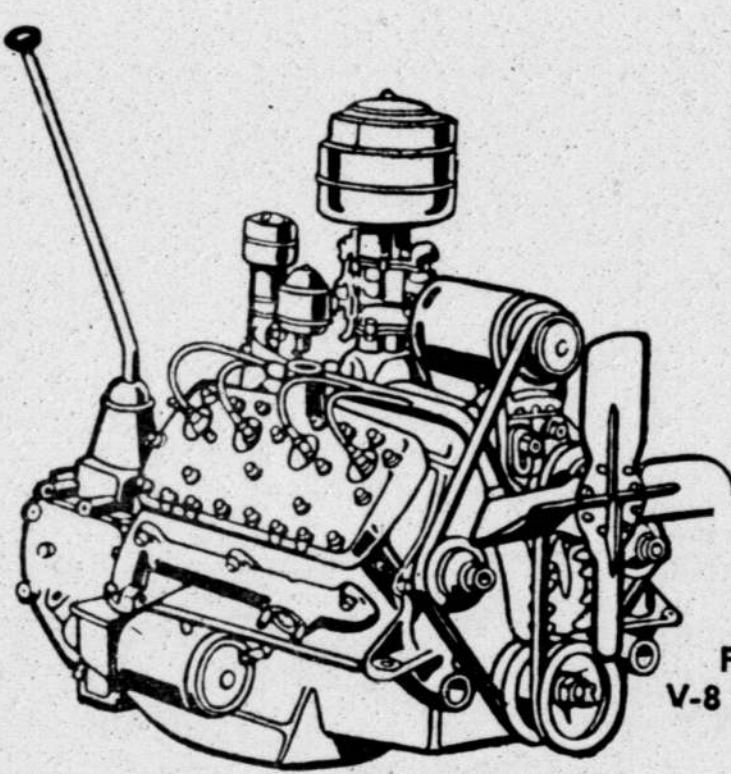

The Use of DDT and What It Means

WASHINGTON — DDT, the war-developed insecticide, is undergoing a rigorous trial this summer by scientists seeking to determine whether large-scale use will prove a boon or a menace.

The laboratory men want to learn the effects of spraying DDT from aircraft over forest, field and stream. It's already known that it can kill a greater variety of insects than any other insecticide known to man. It's been successfully employed against a host of pests which beset man, beast and plant, thus offering wide possibilities for its use in agriculture, preventive medicine, forest conservation and the protection of recreational areas.

But the tests also have shown that DDT also can be injurious to many beneficial insects, such as honey bees, as well as to forest parasites and other natural enemies which help keep other insects under control.

So the scientists want to determine from large-scale tests the effects of the insecticide on these beneficial insects on fish, birds and other wildlife.

Experiments Extensive

Extensive experiments in aircraft spraying of woodland areas are being conducted this summer by cooperating federal and state agencies in Pennsylvania, Maryland and Nebraska.

The agencies taking part are the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine and the Forest Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture; the Fish and Wildlife Service of the U. S. Department of the Interior; the Pennsylvania Bureau of Plant Industry; and the New York Conservation Commission, cooperating in both the Pennsylvania and Maryland experiments.

Until the tests are completed, says Dr. P. N. Annaud, chief of the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, DDT can not be recommended for large-scale use by aircraft spraying for control of forest pests.

"The large-scale use of DDT against forest pests might upset the balance of nature," declares a statement by experts of the Department of Agriculture.

"This might result in depriving woodland recreation areas of birds and fish. It might cause more harmful forest pests to be prevalent, killing or weakening more trees than is caused by common forest insect pests now held in check by natural enemies. Finally, it might affect food production by killing honeybees and other insects which pollinate some 50 important crops."

Effects Sought

The investigators will seek to determine whether birds, reptiles, mammals and other wildlife are injured from feeding on insects poisoned with DDT, by eating foliage covered with the spray residue or by being deprived of food through extermination of insects.

In Pennsylvania the tests are being made on 1,800 acres of upland forest near Wilkes-Barre, in Maryland on 117 acres of the Patuxent Wildlife Research Refuge at Bowie, and in Nebraska on 500 acres of the Nebraska National Forest at Halsey.

Before the areas are sprayed, sample counts of the extent of insect and wildlife in the sections are taken. Throughout the summer, further "census-taking" will be made periodically.

Certain areas will be left unsprayed to serve as "control" areas for comparison.

Latest News From THE HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

Commercial companies hire home economists to work up new and better recipes for their products. I have a cake recipe which should appeal to women who do not produce their own butter and who have a struggle with red meat points. We usually find that there are several good fats on the market which can be interchanged in these recipes. This does sound like a good, easy cake, if you can spare the sugar. If you can't, you might try the one Mrs. J. W. Middleton of the Ackerly Home Demonstration Club uses. This recipe has appeared in this column before.

CHOCOLATE CAKE

Bake in two 9 inch layers (1 1-2 inch deep), oblong pan (8x12 inches) or as cup cakes.

Baking temperature: 350 F.

Baking Time: 25-30 minutes, layers; 30-35 minutes, oblong; 15-20 minutes, cup cakes.

Measure into mixing bowl:

1 1-2 cups cake flour (sifted before measuring)

1 1-4 cups sugar.

1-2 cup some kind good fat

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon soda

2 squares melted bitter

chocolate

1-2 cup milk

Stir vigorously by hand or with mixer (medium speed) 2 minutes.

Now stir in (yes, all by itself):

3-4 teaspoon baking powder.

Add:—

1-2 cup milk

2 eggs (unbeaten)

1 teaspoon vanilla

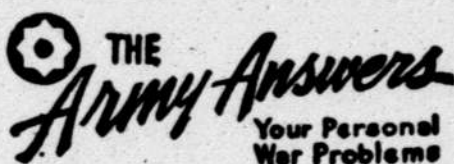
Blend by hand or in mixer (medium speed) for 2 minutes. The batter will be smooth and thin. Pour into pans rubbed with some kind of good fat and lined with waxed paper. Bake in preheated oven for the required time, and frost if you can spare the sugar.

FROSTING

2 egg whites

1 cup Karo

Beat until consistency of 7-minute icing. Use without cooking.



Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters, Eighth

Q. Where can I find out when my husband's regiment will arrive from Europe, so I can be at the port to meet him?

A. The Army is asking relatives and friends of returning soldiers NOT to attempt to meet them at ports of debarkation for these reasons: There is no way of communicating with returnees at ports and staging areas, which are restricted and closed to the public; housing and transportation facilities are overcrowded; the men are usually on their way to reception stations nearest their homes within 48 hours; interference with processing the returnees lengthens the time they can be furloughed.

Q. I am to be discharged from the Army about the middle of August. Will my monthly family allowance go to my dependents, or to me, and will the full amount be paid?

A. A check for your family allowance will be mailed to your dependents in September to cover the period of your August service. The check will be in full for one month, even though your service in August will cover only part of a month.

Q. When a serviceman marries and has his insurance changed to his wife, will she receive a statement showing that the change has been made?

A. No. The record of change will be made by the Veterans Administration, but the new beneficiary will not be informed.

Q. My husband is 39 and stationed with the Army in this country. Can he be sent overseas?

A. If your husband has reached his 39th birthday and will be eligible for discharge when he is 40, he will not be shipped overseas unless he volunteers.

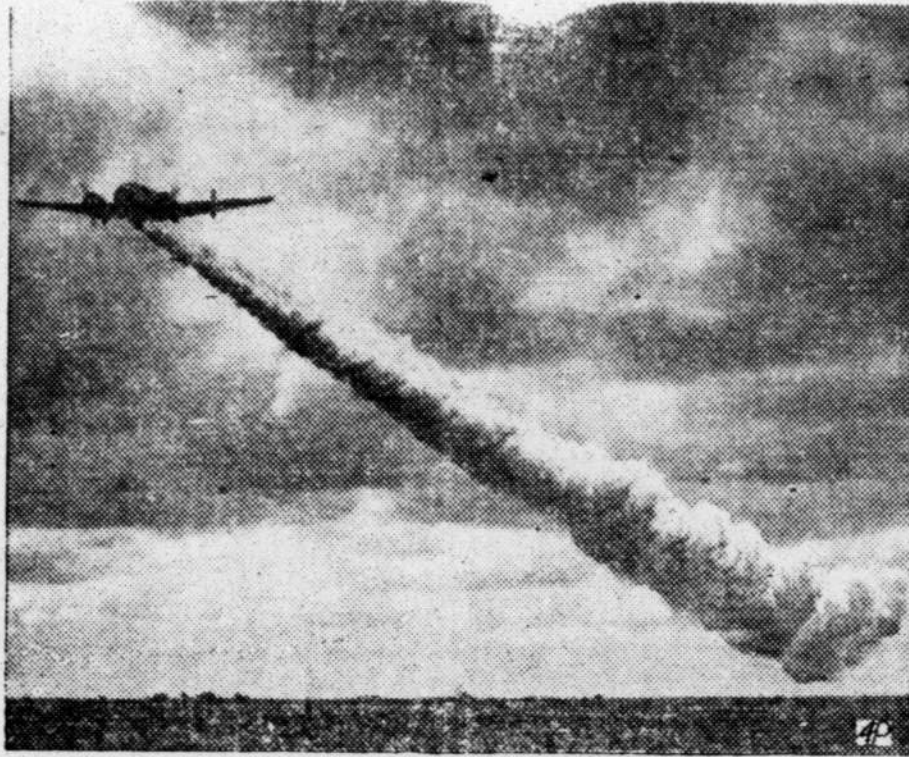

Brazilian Writes Off Wrong Ideas About U. S.

AP Newsfeatures
LOS ANGELES—Erico Verissimo, Brazilian novelist, says his fellow countrymen still have some strange ideas about the people of the United States.

"Many South Americans," he declared in an interview, "feel that you in the United States spend most of your time making money, or trying to make money, and practically no time at all in cultural or spiritual pursuits."
"I think I can refute that view. I have found, for instance, a natural feeling for religion in this country. Your people select their own form of doctrine, and therefore your spiritual feeling probably is more spontaneous than ours, which is regarded more or less as a tradition—and a limited, formalized tradition at that."

Verissimo pointed out some of these false impressions in a book about three years ago, and he asserts that he will do so again when he gets home.

He says he expects his Brazilian friends to be surprised by the information that he found the Catholic church has nearly 25,000,000 followers in the United States.

"I traveled through many American states on a lecture tour," said Verissimo. "I avoided cocktail parties and formal dinners, and talked to the man in the street—the cab driver, the waiter, the butcher, the barber. We discussed not only the war, literature and art, but cooking and human relations. I found that, if you scratch the surface, you will discover strong vestiges of puritanism and a very solid tradition of decency and good Christianity."

Discounting recently reported strained relations between Brazil and the United States, Senior Verissimo came up with what he termed "a fairly good formula for improved inter-American relations."

"The United States," he said, "is very good at producing 'gadgets' which make life cleaner, easier and more comfortable. You teach us how to provide ourselves with such appliances and we will teach you how to enjoy them."

Five hundred and twenty-five musical compositions have been written about Abraham Lincoln, at least 75 of which were funeral marches and memorial hymns.

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (AP)—When ex-President Leon Cortes Castro protested because his picture had been removed from a school house, he started a political crisis.
Soon a congressman protested because the portrait of ex-President

Dr. Carlos Duran had been removed from its niche in the congressional building.
Citizens and journalists began looking for more pictures of politicians which might have been removed. Tempers grew short. Accusations and counter accusations flew. One newspaper urged that all pictures of ex-presidents be

taken down so that everyone could go back to work.
But many ordinary citizens were having fun with the growing anger of the politicians. They stimulated disputes which may have an important bearing on political careers in the future.

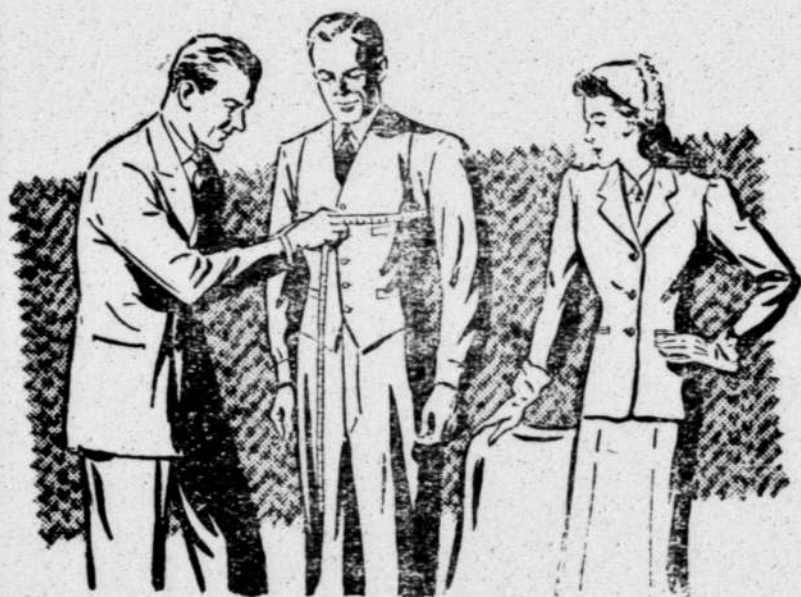

TOWN and FARM IN WARTIME

CIVILIANS AT WAR

The Government needs and asks its citizens in this 191st week of the war against Japan to:

1. Be ready to answer local calls for help from short-handed farmers. By working with the Crop Corps you will do your part in assuring adequate food supplies.
2. Take a non-nursing auxiliary hospital job. Hospitals are overcrowded and badly in need of permanent help. Apply at your local hospital.
3. Report all overcharges, however small, to the Price Control Board of your Ration Board. Without this check by individual shop-

pers, prices cannot be held down. You need not give your name.

NEW RATION BOOK TO APPEAR IN DECEMBER

War Ration Book Five, "smaller than a dollar bill" and containing just half as many stamps as the last book issued, will be distributed through the public school in December, Chester Bowles, Administrator, of OPA announced. At the same time, the new "A" Gasoline Ration Book will be issued.

Distribution will take place at school houses or other public buildings throughout the nation from December 3 through December 15. OPA district offices will fix the exact time for each local area. The new "A" Gasoline Books will go into use December 22, and War Ration Book Five will be used soon after the first of the year for food rationing and for rationing shoes.

CEILING PRICE SET FOR FARM SLAUGHTER

A ceiling price has been established for the grading of beef, veal, lamb or mutton by commercial freezer or locker plants for farm slaughterers, OPA announced, the ceiling, effective July 30, 1945 is 12 1-2 cents per hundred pounds of meat graded, computed to the next highest multiple of five cents.

For example, a farm slaughterer requests a locker plant to grade a 150 pound cut of meat. The ceiling price for grading this meat would actually figure out at 18 3-4

cents. Adjusted to the next highest five cents multiple, however, the final ceiling price would be 20 cents on this particular operation.

QUOTAS OF CIVILIAN TIRES SET FOR AUGUST

August quotas of 2,500,000 passenger car tires and 386,862 small truck tires for civilian motorists, exactly the same as for July, and a reduced quota of large truck tires were announced by WPB and OPA. The quota of truck tires size 8.25 and larger was cut from 234,308 in July to 200,000 for August.

ONLY ESSENTIAL MEN TO GET TRAILER GAS

Special gasoline rations for moving house trailers used by workers who move from job to job will be issued hereafter only if the workers are employed at essential establishments or construction projects, OPA says. Previously, gasoline rations could be issued for mov-

ing a house trailer to be used as housing for a person in connection with his occupation, without regard to the kind of work performed. This permitted persons doing non-essential work to obtain more gasoline for travel, than the maximum "B" rations provide for occupational driving. Occupational rations were not intended for transporting migratory workers not occupied on essential jobs, OPA explains.

PRICE RULE CHANGED FOR REFRIGERATORS

Price regulations governing sales and rentals of used mechanical household refrigerators have been amended, effective August 6, OPA said. The following changes are made:

1. Control of refrigerator rentals by landlords to tenants is clarified.
2. Refrigerators sold "as is" must have all parts necessary for operation.
3. A consumer selling a used

mechanical refrigerator must give a written agreement to pay for all parts and repairs needed to fulfill the guaranty.

All models produced in 1941 and 1942, and all lift top refrigerators, are given dollar-an-cent prices. The \$5 warranty allowance added by the seller on used refrigerators with a one-year guarantee is increased to \$10 on 1939 and 1940 models.

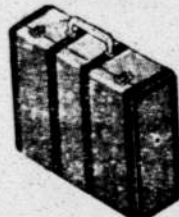
